

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## MATTERS TO WHICH THE ATTENTION OF PRES-BYTERIES IS DIRECTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

I.

#### Re STATISTICS.

That the Assembly renew with emphasis its injunction to Presbyteries to be careful, prompt and faithful in having returns from all the charges, whether vacant or settled, and stations in their bounds procured and forwarded to the Committee in good time, as required by previous injunctions of the Supreme Court.

That Presbyteries have reported to them by their Clerk or Convener of their Committee on Statistics the returns made, and that they spend some time considering the same. See p. 22.

II.

#### , Re 250th anniversary of westminster assembly's work.

The General Assembly recommends to Presbyteries and Sessions to take suitable measures for celebrating the 250th anniversary of the completion of the Confession of Faith and Catechism by the Westminster Assembly of Divines. See p. 40.

III.

#### Re APPLICATIONS OF MINISTERS TO BE RECEIVED.

That, owing to the defective form in which some of the applications are sent up to the General Assembly, it be an instruction to Presbyteries to have regard in their applications to the provisions of the Act on the Reception of Ministers. See p. 45.

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#### IV.

#### Re CHURCH LIFE AND WORK.

That Presbyteries and Sessions be urged anew to bring before all parents and guardians of youth the supreme importance of family religion, and strive to roll away from professedly Christian homes the reproach of neglected family altars.

That Presbyteries be strongly recommended to adopt some form of Presbyterial visitation, with the special design of promoting the spiritual life of the people. See p. 48.

V.

#### Re WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

That the Assembly renew its instruction of some years ago to Presbyteries to see that ministers at ordination are reminded of this fund, and of the desirability of their connecting themselves with it. See p. 54.

VI.

#### Re DECEASED MINISTERS.

That it be an instruction to Clerks of Presbyteries in the case of the decease of each minister to send an obituary notice to the Clerk of the General Assembly, for its use; and to send a copy of such notice to the *Presbyterian Record*. See p. 56.

#### VII.

### Re COMMITTEE ON ESTIMATES.

Mr. R. G. McBeth moved, seconded by Mr. C. W. Gordon:—"That this Assembly appoint a Committee on Estimates, Eastern and Western Sections, and that all Committees and Boards requiring money from the Church be requested to report to said Committee not later than the 1st day of June annually, the amounts they require for their respective departments, and that the Committee on Estimates take these reports into consideration and submit to the Assembly their judgment as to the estimate that should be adopted in each case, with due regard to the needs and importance of each department and the welfare of the whole."

It was moved in amendment by Mr. H. MacKellar, seconded by Mr. J. A. Turnbull:
—"That the whole matter be sent down for the consideration of the Presbyteries of the Church and report to the next Assembly."

The amendment was carried and affirmed as the judgment of the house. See p. 57

#### FIRST SEDERUNT.

At the City of Winnipeg, and within St. Andrew's Church there, the tenth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, at eight o'clock in the evening:

Which time and place the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to appointment by the General Assembly, held in the City of Toronto, on the eighteenth day of June last year.

The Rev. Daniel M. Gordon, D.D., Professor of Divinity in the Presbyterian College, Halifax, Moderator of the last Assembly, conducted devotional exercises, and preached a sermon from the words contained in John xii, 21: "We would see Jesus."

Dr. Gordon then with solemn prayor constituted the General Assembly, in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

ROLL CALL.

It was agreed on motion of Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Dr. Thompson, that inasmuch as the Roll has been printed, and is in the hands of members, it be held as read. The motion was carried unanimously. It is as follows:—

Dr. Gordon before leaving the Chair briefly addressed the Assembly, reviewed the occurrences of the past year, and, after calling special attention to the approaching celebration of the sixty years' reign of Her Gracious Majesty, Queen Victoria, asked the Assembly to appoint his successor.

The General Assembly then proceeded to the choice of a Moderator, when Principal King proposed Dr. William Moore, Minister of Bank Street Church, Ottawa, as a fit and proper person to fill that office; which proposal was seconded by Mr. W. T. Herridge, and carried unanimously; whereupon Dr. Moore being called and welcomed to the Chair by Dr. Gordon, addressed the House, acknowledging the honour conferred upon him, and asking the assistance of fathers and brethren in the discharge of the duties of the office to which they had called him.

#### REPORT OF THE MODERATOR FOR 1896.

Dr. Gordon reported that the Loyal Addresses had been forwarded, as directed by last General Assembly, and read the replies received. He also read a communication received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs of Great Britain and Ireland, acknowledging the receipt of the Address of last Assembly, regarding the persecution of the Armenians. On concluding, he moved that the Moderator be requested to name a Committee at an early Sederunt to draft the Loyal 'Addresses, in consideration of the special circumstance of the approaching Queen's Diamond Jubilee. This was seconded by Dr. Laing, and agreed to. The Moderator intimated that he would submit the names of such a Committee to-morrow morning,

#### TNOD ROLLS.

Dr. Warden submitted the Rolls of Synods, along with the changes that had taken place during the year, and moved that they be held as read. This motion was agreed to.

#### THANKS TO DR. GOI DON.

It was moved by Dr. Bruce, seconded by Mr. Walter Paul, and unanimously carried,—That the thanks of the Assembly be recorded to Dr. Gordon for his dignified and efficient conduct in the Chair, and for the admirable sermon which he preached this evening at the opening of the Assembly.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Business, which was given in and read by Dr. Cochrane, Clerk to the Committee, who moved the reception of the Report and the consideration of its recommendations. This motion was seconded and agreed to.

The recommendations were severally adopted as follows:-

I. That the Sederunts of the Assembly be from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30; from 2.30 to 5.30 p.m.; and from 7.30 to 10 p.m.; but that this order be so far departed from to-morrow morning as to allow the Assembly to meet at 10 a.m.; and that the first hour be spent in devotional exercises.

#### MANITOBA COLLEGE.

The Report of Manitoba College was given in and read by Chief Justice Taylor, Chairman of the Board of Management, who called attention to the several matters of interest in it, as detailed in the printed documents in the hands of members.

Principal King offered the following motion, which was seconded by Dr. Cochrane, and carried:—

The General Assembly receives and adopts the Report of Manitoba College, expresses its thanks to the Presbyterian Church of Ireland and to the Church of Scotland, for their donations, and commends the College anew to the generous support of the Church.

The Assembly adjourned to meet again in this place at 2.30 p.m., of which public intimation was given, and the Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### THIRD SEDERUNT.

On the same day and at the same place, at 2.30 p.m.:

The General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment, and was duly constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. Hector McQuarrie leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The Minutes of last meeting were sustained.

#### REPORT ON THE ROLL.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to examine the Assembly Roil, which was given in and read by Dr. Torrance, *Convener*, who moved its reception and adoption. The motion was seconded and earried. The Report is as follows:—

The name of Mr. E. Scott appears for the Presbyteries of Montreal and Trinidad; being ineligible for the latter, the Committee recommend the omitting of his name, retaining it for the former. In the Presbytery of Bruce, that the name of Mr. Ross be substituted for that of Mr. Meikle. The name of Chief Justice Taylor occurs for three Presbyteries. Not being an acting eider he is ineligible to serve. Mr. George Hay, appointed to represent both the Presbytery of Ottawa and Victoria, elects to act for Ottawa. Mr. Robert Murray appears as Commissioner from Halifax and Trinidad Presbyteries. Mr. Murray elects to act for Trinidad.

#### KNOX COLLEGE.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Reports of Colleges. The next called for was that of Knox College, which was presented by Principal Caven, in the absence of the Chairman of the Board. Dr. Caven called attention to the more prominent features in the printed report in the hands of members, and made reference to the matter of discontinuing the Preparatory Course in the College, as a subject that may require consideration at an early day. Mr. J. A. Turnbull moved, seconded by Mr. P. Wright, as follows:—

The General Assembly receives and adopts the reports of the Board of Management and Senate of Knox College, expresses gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the efficient services which He has enabled the professors to render, and for the many young men who have been led to consecrate their lives to the Gospel ministry and are being educated for their great work within its walls, and commends it to the liberality of the Church for more adequate support.

The motion was carried.

#### QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE.

Principal Grant, in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presented the Report of Queen's University and College, and drew special attention to the fact that the allowance always hitherto received from the Temporalities Board is likely soon to cease, and that it will be consequently necessary to provide otherwise for the amount thus to be lost. He also held out the hope that it may be in the power of the Board within the next year to submit the name of a third Professor in the Theological Department.

It was moved by Dr. MacTavish, seconded by Professor Ross:-

That the Report of Queen's University and College be received and adopted; that the General Assembly express gratification at the large attendance of students, especially in the Theological Faculty, at the earnestness and enthusiasm with which the Professors have carried on their work, and at the satisfactory condition of the College finance. further, that the Assembly commend the College

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The resolution was adopted.

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#### PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

Dr. Scrimger gave in the Report of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and expressed regret at the absence of the Chairman of the Board, as well as of Principal MacVicar. He gave gratifying information regarding the progress of the institution, and made special mention of the obligations under which the College and its friends were laid by Dr. Barclay, who lectured throughout the session in the absence of the Principal.

He moved, seconded by Dr. R. Campbell:-

That the Report of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, be received and adopted; that the Assembly express its satisfaction at the success which has attended its work during the past year, and encourage the Board in its efforts to secure the increased endowment necessary for the permanent maintenance of the institution.

#### MORRIN COLLEGE.

Principal Macrae presented the Report of the Governors of Morrin College, and gave information of the present state and prospects of the institution, which afforded gratification to the Assembly. He claimed for it consideration at the hands of the Church.

It was moved by Mr. John Hay, seconded by Mr. R. Murray, as follows:-

The Assembly receives with satisfaction the Report of Morrin College, and expresses its pleasure at hearing of the good work carried on by that institution; is pleased to learn that the recent additions to the teaching staff have been followed by an awakened interest in the general community, and a large increase in the number of students; and heartily commends the College to the sympathy and practical support of the Church, and more especially of the congregations in the Presbytery of Quebec. The Assembly fondly hopes that the special effort about to be made by the Board of Governors, to procure substantial additions to the Endowment Fund, may be attended with a large measure of success, and cordially commends this important object to the liberality of our people.

The motion was adopted.

#### PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, HALIFAX.

The Report of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, was presented by Mr. James McLean, who gave a cheering account of the present condition and outlook of the institution.

Ho concluded with moving, seconded by Mr. W. C. Whittaker:-

The General Assembly receives the Reports of the Board and Senate of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, and records its devout gratitude to God for the prosperous condition of the College. The Assembly authorizes the College Board to submit to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, their plans for the erection and pay-

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ment of a suitable building for the library, and empowers the Synod to take such action in regard to the same as they may deem in the best interests of the institution.

The Assembly commends the College to the prayerful consideration and liberal support of all her people in the Eastern Section of the Church, and urges them to wipe out the present debt, and so increase the revenues that the invaluable work which the institution is performing may be carried on with efficiency and without financial embarrassment.

#### YOUNG LADIES' COLLEGE, RRANTFORD.

The report of the Brantford Ladies' College was presented by Dr. Cochrane, on behalf of the Board of Directors. He drew attention to the successful history of the institution, pointing out the good work done by it for the Church and country.

It was then moved by Dr. Gordon, seconded by Dr. John Thompson:-

That the Report of the Brantford Young Ladies' College be received and adopted; further, the General Assembly expresses its gratification at the high standard of scholarship that has characterized the College since its inception, twenty-three years ago, and the aim of the Directors to make it increasingly worthy of the Church with which it is identified. The Assembly is glad to find that not-withstanding the widespread financial depression of the past few years, the College has been well attended, and commends it again to the patronage and generous support of the Christian familles of the Church, as an institution in every way worthy of their support, in which parents may safely entrust their daughters, alike for its moral and religious influences and educational advantages. The Assembly nominates the following gentlemen, from whom six shall be elected at the annual meeting, to act as Directors for the ensuing year, namely:—Wm. Cochrane, D.D., Messrs. Wm. Watt, Robert Henry, Wm. Nichol, M.D., Thomas McLean, C. B. Heyd, M.P., Sheriff Watt, Alex. Robertson, Wm. Grant, Robt. Russell, Adam Spence, Jas. Sutherland and Alex. Turner.

The motion was agreed to.

#### MEMORIAL OF MISSIONARIES IN CENTRAL INDIA.

The Assembly next proceeded to hear a Memorial from the Missionaries in Central India, transmitted by the Presbytery of Indore. The Memorial was read and is as follows:—

The Memorial of the undersigned Ministers and Missionaries of the Church's Mission to Central India.

#### Humbly Showeth

That for years there have been in the Central India Mission differences of opinion as to the policy pursued in reference to certain departments of work, as to the expenditure of Church Funds, and as to the relation of unmarried women to the control of the work.

2. That out of these differences of views there have grown personal feelings, the nature, the extent, and the causes of which have been imperfectly understood even by the Foreign Mission Committee, and still more by the Church at large; which misapprehensions have been to the detriment of the work and have added soriously to the difficulty of settling the matters in dispute.

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3. That the Foreign Mission Committee, at so great a distance from the field, and not possessing the advantage of local knowledge, has, by attempting an adjustment of the difficulties, guided by communications from individuals rather than by the findings of the majority of the Presbytery, increased the divergencies. Many difficulties would soon have been settled had they been left to be dealt with according to the constitutional Presbyterian system of government by a majority of the office bearers of the Church in the country.

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4. Methods and policies have been insisted on by the Foreign Mission Committee against our protest, and large expenditures have been sanctioned against the remonstrance of almost ail, at the very time that small sums have been refused for objects of which all approved.

All this verbore; but now regulations have been imposed on us and insisted on, which we feel bound in conscience to resist by all constitutional means.

Efforts have been made to secure for women an equal voice and vote with the Presbyters in the government of men's work. Step by step this has been granted to them, those who were opposed yielding for the sake of peace to compromises of which they disapproved. In the end of 1895, new regulations were submitted to the Council for consideration. Although, after months of consideration, the Council, by a majority including all but one of the Presbyters, expressed its disapproval of them, they were nevertheless imposed upon us. Thereupon, in August, 1896, we entreated the Committee not to insist upon them, pointing out that they were contrary to Scripture, and subversive of the functions of Presbytery, and if insisted on would compel Missionaries who see this either to do violence to their conscience or to refuse to acquiesce. In reply, the Foreign Mission Committee, leaving them unchanged, have exhorted us to give them a trial; which to our minds can only mean either that they do not believe our assertion of conscientious objections, or else that they require us to disregard our consciences. This we cannot do, and therefore in November, 1896, on receipt of this reply, we felt constrained in the following terms to decline to acquiesce:-

- 1. We recognize with thankfulness the more conciliatory tone of this letter.
- 2. But we see with pain and grief that the entreaty of the majority of the members of the Council against the imposition of new regulations, against which they protest as unjust, fitted to injure the work of Christ, and above all, contrary to the long established convictions of some as to the teaching of Scripture, and the usage of the Church, is refused, and that these new regulations are still insisted on.
- 3. Such coercive imposition, and violation of rights, we deem it our duty, to ourselves, to each other, to other Missions, to our Church, to other branches of the Church, to the Head of the Church, whose work we are in India to do, not to acquiesce in, but to resist by constitutional methods.
- 4. We therefore ask to be excused from accepting office or sitting in Council under these new regulations.
- 5. But, meanwhile, so far as necessary to preserve and carry on the work, we submit, under protest, to recognize the Council as thus constituted.

And we are thus driven, as our next step, solemnly to appeal to your venerable House, as the General Assembly of that branch of the Church of Christ to which we belong, to take the whole matter into consideration, and not only afford us relief, but devise measures for the removal of the evils of which we complain, and

for the more efficient prosecution of the great work committed to us. We ask only that the same rules be given to us which hold in other Missions of our Church, e.g., Trinidad and China, or those of other Presbyterian Churches beside us, e.g. the Irish Presbyterian or Scotch United Presbyterian Missions.

And your Memorialists will ever pray, etc.

Mr. N. H. Russell, one of the Memorialists, being present as a member of Assembly, was invited to speak to the Memorial. At this point Mr. Russell left himself in the hands of the Assembly, and expressed his willingness to forego any right he might have to address the Assembly in support of the Memorial, unless the Assembly desired it.

Thereupon Mr. E. Scott moved, seconded by Mr. H. McQuarrie: -

That the Memorial from Missionaries in India be referred to a special Committee to confer with the Missionaries from India, and with the Foreign Mission Committee, and to report to the Assembly.

To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Gordon, seconded by Dr. Laing:—That Mr. Russell be now heard in support of the Memorial.

The amendment was carried over the motion, and Mr. Russell addressed the House in explanation of the Memorial.

#### SERVICES NEXT LORD'S DAY

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to arrange the Assembly services on the Lord's Day, which was given in and read by Mr. C. W. Gordon, *Convener*, who moved its reception and adoption. The motion was seconded and carried. The recommendations are as follows:—

That there be morning and evening services at the usual hours of worship, and an afternoon service at 4.15, at which the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be observed, in which not only members of Assembly are invited to join, but also all members in good standing of our own or other Churches.

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That the morning service be conducted by the Rev. Dr. MacTavish, and the evening service by Rev. Dr. Somerville, and that at the afternoon Communion service, the Moderator preside and Rev. Dr. Gregg and Rev. Jns. McLean deliver addresses, and that the following elders assist in the dispensing of the Ordinance:—

The minutes of the afternoon Sederunt were read and sustained.

The Assembly called for the Reports of Home Missions, East and West.

#### HOME MISSIONS, EASTERN SECTION.

Mr. Alfred Gandler, in the absence of Mr. John McMillan, Conveuer, presented the Report of the Eastern Section, and explained the operations of the Committee charged with the care of this department of the Church's work in the Maritime Provinces, referring to the hopeful features of the Report for that section, printed and in the hands of members. He concluded with moving, seconded by Mr. A. Bowman, as follows:—

The General Assembly receives the Report of the Home Mission Committee, Eastern Section, and records its gratitude to God for the manifest tokens of His blessing on the work accomplished. The Assembly notes with warm appreciation the deepening interest of our pepole in this great work, and returns hearty thanks for the increased contributions towards its support, especially commending the Woman's Missionary Society and the Christian Endeavour Society for their timely, liberal and much-needed aid; and requests all the contributors to the Fund to continue their support, in order that the present debt may be completely removed, the work developed according to its requirements, and increased aid offered in the same kind of work in the North-West of our Dominion.

The resolution was adopted.

#### HOME MISSIONS, WESTERN SECTION.

The Assembly next called for the Report of the Home Mission Committee, Western Section, presented in printed form, and referred to by Dr. Cochrane, Convener of the Committee, in submitting it. Dr. Cochrane made a strong appeal on behalf of the Scheme, after reviewing the work for the year.

It was then moved by Dr. Warden, seconded by Mr. C. W. Gordon:-

That the Report be received and adopted, that the General Assembly expresses its gratification at the satisfactory state of the Home Mission Fund, and its grateful sense of the liberality of the Congregations, Sabbath Schools and C. E.

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111 Iso Societies of the Church in its support; cordially thanks the congregations in the Maritime Provinces for their continued liberality, and the Colonial Committees, Congregations and friends in Great Britain and Ireland for their generous grants; records its satisfaction with the extension and consolidation of the work, especially in the North-West and British Columbia, and its piensure that the Committee has found it less difficult than ever before to secure suitable men for the fields under its care; that the General Assembly expresses its thankfulness for the success that has attended the labours of Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions, in Britain, and its pleasure in welcoming him back to his work in our own Church. Above sli, the General Assembly expresses its devout gratitude to God for the large measure of success vouchsafed during the year, and resolves anew to prosecute with vigour and earnestness the Home Mission work committed to it by the Great Head of the Church.

The motion was adopted.

Stirring addresses on Home Missions were afterwards delivered by Mr. A. Mathleson, Mr. D. G. McQueen, Mr. J. D. Higginbotham, Mr. Thos. Paton, and Mr. Chas. McKillop.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at half-past nine o'clock, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

At the City of Winnipey, and within St. Andrew's Church there, the 12th day of June, 1897, at 9.30 a.m.:

The General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, prayer being offered, at the request of the Moderator, by Mr. W. Faul.

The Committee called for the Report of the Committee on Statistics, which, being printed and in the hands of members, was referred to by Dr. Torrance, Convener, in presenting it, and in giving explanations of various items covered by the Committee's transactions. On motion, the report was received.

Dr. Torrance moved the adoption of the several recommendations of the Committee, which were agreed to, as follows:—

- 1. That the Assembly renew with emphasis its injunction to Presbyteries to be careful, prompt and faithful in having returns from all the Charges, whether vacant or settled, and Stations in their bounds, procured and forwarded to the Committee in good time, as required by previous injunctions of the Supreme Court.
- 2. That Presbyteries have reported to them by their Clerk, or Convener of their Committee on Statistics, the returns made, and that they spend some time in considering the same.
- 3. That the Committee to be appointed be instructed to adopt means for procuring and presenting in summary form information regarding the Church's

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equipment to prepare Students for the Ministry, the state and progress of her work in foreign fields, and such other matters as may be expected in a Statistical Report.

The adoption of the Report as a whole was moved by Principal Grant, seconded by Dr. Thompson, as follows;—

The General Assembly expresses its gratitude to God for the very hopeful Statistical Report now submitted, and would record its thanks to the Convener for the very able and accurate Report, and for his long and painstaking services, so cheerfully rendered to the Church.

The motion was carried.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICAL FORMS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Statistical Forms, appointed by last General Assembly, which was presented by Dr. Warden, in the absence of Mr. R. Douglas Fraser, Convener. He moved, seconded by Dr. M. Fraser:—

That the Report be received, and the following Committee appointed to consider the present statistical forms, and all the statistical matter furnished by the various Standing Committees of the Assembly, in order to recommend such a rearrangement as will tend to secure greater simplicity and accuracy in the Statistics of the Church, to report to next Assembly.

#### NOTICE OF MOTION.

Principal Caven gave notice of the following resolution, which he proposed to offer at a future Sederunt:—

The General Assembly, while fully recognizing the fact that the duty of imparting detailed and adequate instruction on the doctrines of the Christian religion devolves primarily and mainly on the parent and the Church, yet regards it of exceeding importance that all instructions given in our Public Schools should be in harmony with revealed truth, and that the Bible should have the place in our educational system which its incomparable excellencies and its divine authority claim for it.

In order to assist in giving effect to its convictions on a matter so vital, the General Assembly appoint a Committee on Public Education, whose duty it shall be to act in the name of the Church in any of the Provinces of the Dominion in relation to the subject of religious instruction in Public Schools, and also to cooperate with any Synodical Committee of our Church, or any Committee representing any other branch of the Church, whose views on this question may be in substantial accord with those of the General Assembly.

#### DISTRIBUTION OF PROBATIONERS

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Distribution of Probationers, which was presented by Dr. Torrance, Convener, who referred to the main facts contained in the printed statement in the hands of members.

It was moved by Dr. MacLaren, seconded by Mr. Jno. H. Graham, and carried:-

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oroeh's That the Report of the Committee on the Distribution of Probationers be adopted, and the thanks of the Assembly tendered to the Committee, and especially to the Convener.

#### FINANCE REPORT, EASTERN SECTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Finance Committee, Eastern Section, which was presented by Dr. Morrison, who moved its reception and adoption. This was seconded and agreed to.

#### COMMITTEE ON FINANCE, WESTEIN SECTION,

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Finance, Western Section, which was presented by Dr. Warden, who moved, seconded by Dr. Cochrune:—That the Report be received.

It was moved by Dr. Seringer, seconded by Mr. E. Scott, and carried:-

That the recommendation regarding the financial year be referred to a special Committee representing the different Schemes that would be affected by such a change, in both sections, and to report to a subsequent Sederunt.

#### COMMITTEE ON OBITUARY NOTICES.

The Moderator nominated the following Committee on Obituary Notices, which was approved of;—Dr. Mungo Fraser, Convener; Dr. McCrae, Messrs, J. C. Smith, Geo, C. Paterson, Ministers; and W. Drysdale, Elder.

#### HYMNAL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Hymnal Committee, which was given in by Dr. Gregg, *Convener*, who gave full explanations regarding the Psaiter and Book of Praise, which is now issuing for the use of the Church. He moved, seconded by Dr. Somerville:—

That the Report of the Hymnal Committee be received and adopted. The motion was carried.

Mr. D. Torrance Fraser moved, seconded by Dr. Scrimger:-

That the Committee be instructed to arrange, if practicable, that the large edition with the whole Psalter, as taken from the English Presbyterian Book, be published along with the other editions.

The motion was put and lost.

Mr. W. Drysdale offered the following motion, seconded by Principal Caven:—
That the special thanks of the Church are due and hereby tendered by this
General Assembly to the Convener and Hymnal Committee, as a whole. Their
labours have been arduous, and the results presented to the Church in the New

tabours have been arduous, and the results presented to the Church in the New Book of Praise, now before us, are creditable in the highest degree. Our Convener, Rev. Dr. Gregg, has given many years of close attention to the subject, and as a recognition of his valuable services, it is resolved that there be paid to him the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars, and also that a like amount be paid to Rev. A. McMillan and Rev. Dr. Somerville, severally, in connection with the special services rendered by them in supervising the publication. These amounts to be paid out of the royalty on the Hymnal.

#### COMMITTEE ON PROPOSED CHANGE IN FINANCIAL YEAR,

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at 2.30 p.m., of which public intimation was given, and this Sederant was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### SIXTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at 2.30 pm.:

The General Assembly met by adjournment, and was constituted with praise and prayer, in which Mr. J. C. Smith led at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of the morning Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON REMITS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Remits, which was given in and read by Mr. J. C. Sæith, *Convener*, on whose motion, duly seconded, it was agreed to receive it. It is as follows:—

It was moved by Dr. Warden, seconded by Dr. Cochrane, and agreed to:—That the Report now submitted be sent to the Committee on Bills and Overtures, in order that a time may be fixed for its consideration.

#### THE MEMORIAL FROM INDIA.

The consideration of the Memorial from certain of the Missionaries in Iudia was resumed, when Mr. Hamilton Cassels, John Convener of the Committee on Foreign Missions, was heard on the subject of the Memorial, in explanation of the action taken by the Foreign Mission Committee, Western Division, in the matter complained of.

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After several members had been heard on the subject, it was moved by Mr. E. Scott, seconded by Mr. J. C. Smith:—

That the Memorial from Missionaries in India be referred to a special Committee to confer with Missionaries from India, and with the Foreign Mission Committee, and report to the Assembly. This was agreed to. The Moderator named the following as such Committee and the nomination was accepted:—

The Assembly adjourned to meet at this place on Monday, the 14th inst., at 9.30 a.m., it being understood that the first half hour of the Sederunt should be devoted to prayer for Her Majesty the Queen, in view of her 60 years' reign, and for the British Empire, in view of the present critical condition of public affairs, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

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#### SEVENTH SEDERUNT.

At Winnipeg, and within St. Andrew's Church there, on Monday, the 14th day of June, 1897:

The General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, and, as was resolved at last Sederunt, the first half hour was devoted to prayer on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen, in view of her long reign of sixty years, and for the British Empire, in view of the present critical condition of public affairs, in which Mr. P. Wright, Dr. Thompson, and Mr. S. Houston led at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

The Moderator read a telegram which he had received from Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen, conveying His Excellency the Governor-General's and her own best congratulations and good wishes to the General Assembly, and suggesting that if a suitable opportunity could be found for bringing the Victorian Order under consideration of the Assembly, it would be helpful to the undertaking. The Moderator, in acknowledging receipt of Her Excellency's message, is instructed to convey to Her Excellency the assurance that many members of the Assembly are personally deeply interested in this benevolent enterprise, and will lend it efficient help, but that it is deemed inexpedient to press the project upon the attention of the Assembly as a whole.

An application from the Presbytery of St. John. for leave to receive the Rev. C. W. Irwin, and one from the Presbytery of Winnipeg, in favour of receiving Rev. C. H. Gunn, with accompanying papers, were, on motion of Dr. Warden, duly seconded, reterred to the Committee on such applications.

#### SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Sabbath School Committee, which was presented by Mr. T. F. Fotheringham, *Convener*, who called attention to the several items in the same, as printed and in the hands of members. He concluded with moving that the report be received. This was duly seconded and agreed to.

#### OVERTURE OF PRESBYTERY OF MAITLAND.

The Assembly called for the Overture of the Presbytery of Maitland, on the subject of the appointment of an Editor of Sabbath School Literature.

Mr. A. Miller was heard in support of the Overture. It was moved by Mr. D. McCrae, seconded by Mr. J. G. Stuart:—

That the Report of the Sabbath School Committee and the Overture from the Presbytery of Maitland, be received, and, with the returns of Presbyteries to the Remit on the appointment of an Editor, referred to a Special Committee, to be named by the Moderator, to consider the whole question, and report to this Assembly.

To this it was moved in amendment by Mr. D. Torrance Fraser, and seconded by Mr. T. A. Nelson:—

That a Committee be named to select a Special Committee, whose duty it will be to prepare a scheme of Sunday School Lessons and Teachers' Helps, for the use of our Canadian Presbyterian Church.

To this it was moved in amerdment by Mr. W. Drysdale, seconded by Mr. John Abraham:—

Whereas, the Report presented yearly by the Sabbath School Committee, from a financial standpoint, has been showing an increasing deficit each year, and that now we are face to face with a deficit, according to the Convener's own statement, of over \$5,000, which large sum has to be raised by September next, as these temporary loans cannot be renewed; whereas, in order to the successful carrying on of this work, a further sum of \$5,000 at least would be necessary as working capital, it is hereby resolved that the General Assembly be not held responsible financially, and that the Committee cease the publication of these Lesson Helps, and that tenders be advertised for for the supply of such publications as may be decreed suitable.

It was resolved to send the motion and the two amendments to a Special Committee, and the Moderator named the following as such Committee, and the nomination was approved of:—

Dr. Fletcher, Conrener; Drs. Warden, P. M. Morrison, M. Fraser, Bruce, Mc-Tavish, Somerville, MacCrae, Torrance, Laing, Messrs. E. Scott, A. Gandier (Halifax), W. Farquharson, Joseph Hogg, E. Cockburn, Thos. A. Nelson, T. F. Fotheringham, J. Abraham, Ministers; and Messrs. W. C. Whittaker, J. M. Clark, D. T. Fraser, Wm. Drysdale, J. Armstrong and D. McCrae, Elders.

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#### REPORT ON APPLICATIONS OF STUDENTS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Applications of Presbyteries on behalf of Students, which was given in and read by Dr. Thompson, *Convener*, who moved that it be received and adopted, which motion was carried. It is as follows:—

I. Neil Gilmour.

Application made by Regina Presbytery to license and ordain to Mission work in the Crowstand Mission. Mr. Gilmour has taught in a public school six years, has been in the Indian work five years, and has done good service. Has already been appointed to the Crowstand Mission by the Foreign Mission Committee, who request that he be ordained.

The Presbytery have examined him as to personal qualifications and heartlly recommend him.

Decision of Committee—That the Assembly be recommended to authorize the Regina Presbytery to take him on trial for license.

II. Application of Toronto Presbytery for leave to " ense J. G. Reid.

Facts—Mr. Reid was ill during examination at Knox College, but the Senate granted him a certificate of Standing cum nota of the facts.

Recommendation—That liberty be granted the Toronto Presh, tery, as requested.

III. A. S. McLean.

Facts—Has passed the third year examination in the Literary Course, and also the subjects prescribed for First Year Theology.

Request—That he be allowed his standing as Second Year Student in Theology, although the two years' work were taken in one.

Recommendation—That the case be referred to the Senate of Montreal Presbyterian College, with power to issue.

IV. Hugh Matheson.

Application made for him by the Presbytery of Regina to get the standing of Student in Theology.

Facts—He has taken a course in Law, and has a fair knowledge of Greek, and some of Hebrew.

Recommended-That the prayer be granted.

#### ALLIANCE OF THE REFORMED CHURCHES.

A Communication was received from Dr. W. H. Roberts, Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches throughout the world holding the Presbyterian system, Western Section, forwarding a report of the action taken by the Executive during the year for presentation to the Assembly, and appointing Dr. Cochrane to represent the Executive at this General Assembly.

Dr. Cochrane was heard in relation to the work of the Council of the Alliance. It was moved by Dr. Warden, seconded by Mr. S. Houston, and agreed to:—

That the Communication from the Executive of the Presbyterian Alliance be received, and the Agent instructed to pay the quota of expense falling to our Church.

The General Assembly has listened with pleasure to the interesting statement of the Rev. Dr. Cochrane, who was appointed by the Alliance of the Reformed

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cer F. Churches holding the Presbyterian system, to convey the salutations of that body to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Assembly expresses its continued interest in the work and aims of the Alliance, and is pleased to learn that it has been honoured greatly to promote a healthful and practical sympathy among the many branches of the Presbyterian Church throughout the world, and thus to advance the real unity of these Churches

The General Assembly desires to do its own work in the spirit which the Alliance so impressively represents.

#### REFORMED CHURCH IN AMERICA.

A communication was received from Dr. W. H. Dewart, Stated Clerk of the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America, intimating that the Rev. Albert C. Sewall, D.D., primarius, and the Rev. Peter Crispell, secundus, had been appointed corresponding delegates to this General Assembly.

Dr. Sewall, not being able to appear in person, addressed a letter to the Assembly, which was read, conveying the greetings of the Church which he had been appointed to represent, and expressing the best wishes for the welfare of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Dr. Laing was appointed to draft a suitable reply to this communication.

#### END OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the question submitted by the Finance Committee, Western Section, as to whether it would not be well to change the date at which the financial year of the Church should terminate to the 31st of March, which was given in and read by Dr. Morrison, Convener. The reception and adoption of the Report with its recommendation, after emendation, was moved by Dr. Morrison. The motion was seconded and carried. The following is the recommendation:—

The Committee respectfully report that they have considered the matter, and are of opinion that some change in this direction is needed, in order to give sufficient time to prepare reports for submission to the Assembly early in June. The Committee therefore agree to recommend to Assembly the adoption of March 31st as the close of the Church's Financial Year.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at 2.30 p.m., of which public intimution was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Mcderator.

#### EIGHTH SEDERUNT

At the same place, on the same day, at 2.30 p.m.:

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, conducted, at the request of the Moderator, by Mr. T. A. Nelson.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### PETITION IN TO REV. JAMES MURRAY.

There was read a petition from the Presbytery of Miramichi, asking leave to place on its Roll the name of the Rev. James Murray, a retired minister living within the bounds of the Presbytery, on the ground that the greater part of his

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I. disterial service was spent in the Presbytery, although he was a member of anothe. Presbytery when allowed to retire, and both Presbyteries joined in the request.

Dr. N. McKay was heard in support of the petition, and moved that the request be granted. This was seconded and agreed to.

#### PETITION OF THE REV. J. B. MUIK. D.D.

There was read a petition of Rev. J. B. Mui., D.D., forwarded by the Presbytery of Montreal, asking leave of the Assembly to retire, on the ground that the leave thus granted would secure him a retiring allowance of \$400 from the Temporalities' Fund.

It was moved by Dr. R. Campbell, seconded and agreed to:-

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That as the alleged ground of the application was not well-founded, it might not be to Dr. Muir's advantage to grant his request, and that consequently it be laid on the table.

#### PETITION IN re REV. T. SCOULAR.

There was presented a petition from the Presbytery of Westminster, asking that the name of Mr. T. Scoular, recently appointed Chaplain to the Provincial Penitentiary, be retained on the Roll of Presbytery, in view of his long service in the Presbytery, and the valuable aid which his continuance as a member would afford the Presbytery. This petition was granted on motion of Mr. Clay, seconded by Mr. J. W. Muirhead.

#### APPEAL OF REV. W. HODNETT.

There was read an extract minute of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, dismissing the appeal of Rev. W. Hodnett against an action of the Presbytery of Rock Lake. Mr. Hodnett was heard in support of his appeal, when it was resolved to send the question to a Judicial Committee, to be named by the Moderator.

The Moderator named the following a Judicial Committee, and the nomination was accepted:—

Rev. Dr. Scrimger, Convener; Dr. P. M. Morrison, Messrs. H. McQuarrie, Jas. Patterson, W. MacKenzie, E. R. Hutt, J. G. Stuart, J. A. Anderson, James F. McLaren, Alex. Millar, Ministers; and James Forgie, Andrew Jeffrey, D. D. Wilson, Wm. Ross, George Keith, John Thompson, and J. T. Patterson, Elders.

#### AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND-EASTERN SECTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern Section, which was presented by Mr. T. Cumming, in the absence of the Convener. Mr. Cumming closed his remarks with moving the following resolution, which was seconded and agreed to:—

The Assembly having heard the Report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Eastern Section, receives the same, and expresses gratitude to God for the present satisfactory state of the Fund, recommends that all the Congregations within the bounds of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces contribute to the Fund, and strongly urges all the young ministers, who have not already done so, to identify themselves with the Fund, without delay.

The Assembly agrees to allow Rev. John W. Nelson and Rev. Gavin Sinclair to retire from the active duties of the ministry, and grants to Mr. Nelson an annuity of \$56, and to Mr. Sinclair an annuity of \$35.

It was further moved by Dr. N. MacKay, seconded by Dr. Morrison:-

That in reference to the application of Rev. T. G. Johnston for leave to retire from the active duties of the ministry, the papers in the case being complete, but sent in error to the Clerk of the Assembly, instead of to the Convener of the Committee of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, leave to retire at the end of the current year be granted as desired, and that authority be given to the Committee of the Eastern Section to place Mr. Johnston's name on the Roll of Beneficiaries of the Fund from January 1st, 1898.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND-WESTERN SECTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, Western Section, which was presented by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, Convener, who called attention to the several items of importance in the same, as printed and in the hands of members, and concluded with moving the reception of the report. The motion was seconded and carried.

It was moved by Mr. P. Wright, seconded by Mr. W. Drysdale;-

That the Report be adopted, that the cordial thanks of the Assembly be given to the Committee, and especially to the Convener and to the Agent of the Fund, for their current and energetic efforts on behalf of the same; that gratitude to God be expressed for the goodly measure of success with which their efforts have been crowned, notwithstanding the commercial depression that has prevailed in every Province of the Dominion during the last three years; and further, that this Fund be recommended to all our people, and that our ministers be requested to afford every facility to the Agent in order that the Endewment aimed at may be secured.

The Assembly also approves of the action of the Committee in paying the full amount due to annuitants, trusting to the generosity of Congregations to make up the deficit.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the further consideration of the matter had to be postponed.

The Assembly adjourned to meet again this evening at 7.30 o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### NINTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at 7.30 p.m. ;

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. R. P. MacKay leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The Minutes of the afternoon Sederunt were read and sustained.

REPLY TO THE GREETING OF THE REFORMED CHURCH.

Dr. Laing, as instructed at a former Sederunt, reported a suitable minute as an answer to the warm greeting of the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America, which was received and adopted as follows:—

This Assembly receives with pleasure the letter of the Rev. A. C. Sewall, D.D., extending fraternal greetings from the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America. It takes this opportunity of expressing the high esteem entertained by this Church in Canada for that venerable branch of the Church of God, and the

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appreciation of its unwavering adherence to the Doctrines and Discipline and Government of the Reformed Churches; also of the services rendered in early times to our Presbyterian people in Canada, before sufficient assistance could be obtained from the parent Churches in Britain. The Assembly also is gratified by the expression in Dr. Sewall's letter of interest and sympathy with our people in their effects to solve the most important problems, religious and educational, which from time to time arise among us. The Assembly further thanks the Synod for its fraternal remembrance and cordially reciprocates its good wishes, and implores the blessing of God on the Reformed Church in all its work for the Lord, carried on at home and abroad.

#### FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Foreign Missions, which was presented by Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Joint Convener, who directed attention briefly to the sallent points of the same, as printed and in the hands of members. He moved, seconded by Dr. Morrison:—

That the Report be received, and that it be referred to a Committee to be nominated by the Moderator, with instructions to prepare resolutions to be submitted to the Assembly at a subsequent Sederunt.

The motion was adopted. The Moderator, as requested, named the following such a Committee. The nomination was accepted:—

Mr. Thos. Cumming, Convener; Dr. McTavish, Prof. Baird, Messrs. David McLaren, J. A. McLean, A. Graham, D. Strachan, D. G. McQueen, Ministers; and D. McCrae, Geo. A. Young, John McLeod, R. H. Ferguson, J. R. Alexander, Elders.

#### ADDRESSES OF MISSIONARIES.

#### Dr. Buchanan.

After the singing of a hymn Dr. Buchanan was introduced, and gave a brief address on the character and situation of the Bheels, the aborigines of Central India, and set forth the hopeful features of the work airendy begun among them.

#### Mr. N. H. Russell.

The next to address the Assembly was Mr. N. H. Russell, who earnestly appealed to the Church at home not to compel by its lack of liberality the staff in India to dispense with any of the Agencies in operation, for lack of funds, for never before was the work in Central India more hopeful than now.

# Mr. A. J. McLeod.

Another hymn being sung, Mr. A. J. McLeod gave an interesting account of the good work doing by our Church among the Indians in the North-West Territories, and especially in the Industrial School over which he presides.

#### Mr. Murdoch Mackenzie.

Mr. Murdoch MacKenzie addressed the Assembly on Mission work among the Chinese in Honan, where he and his colleagues have been labouring for several years with zeal and success, showing the special difficulties of the work, which God by His Grace was enabling them to overcome, so that encouraging results were being secured by the good hand of the Lord upon them.

The long metre Doxology being sung, the Assembly adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at 9.30, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

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#### TENTH SEDERUNT.

At Winnipeg, and within St. Andrew's Church there, the 15th day of June, 1897, at 9.30 a.m. :

The General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. M. MacKenzie leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained,

#### LOYAL ADDRESSES.

The Assembly cailed for the Report of the Committee on Loyal Addresses, which was given in and read by Dr. Gordon, Convener. The report was received. He first submitted the draft of the Address to Her Mujesty the Queen, which, on motion, duly seconded, was adopted, the Assembly rising and singing the Nationai Anthem.

The draft of the Address to His Excellency the Governor-General was also submitted, and met with the approval of the Assembly, being unanimously adopted.

#### THE DIAMOND JUBILEE.

The Committee on Loyal Addresses also reported a minute, which they recontinended should be engrossed in the Record of the Assembly, and on motion, duly seconded, it was received and adopted, as follows:-

In view of the approaching Diamond Jubilee of Her Most Gracious Majesty, Queen Victoria, the General Assembly would place on record their profound thankfulness to Almighty God for Her Majesty's long and beneficent reign. They recognize with gratitude the unrivalled progress made, during Her Majesty's reign, in the moral, intellectual and political condition of the people.

While the extent of Her Majesty's Empire has been vastly increased, the various portions of the Empire have been brought into closer relations with the Mother Country, and the separate Colonies of British North America, from ocean to ocean, have been united into one loyal Dominion.

The facilities of communication have been multiplied beyond all precedent through the introduction of rallways and steamships, through the application of electric power, and through the extended postal service.

The suppression of slavery, the relief of human suffering, the care of the sick and the poor, the reform of the vicious, and the administration of justice have been advanced in a degree unequalled in previous history.

With special gratitude would the Assembly refer to the extension of the Missionary operations of the Church of Christ during Her Majesty's reign.

In recognition of these and other blessings that have rendered illustrious the reign of our Gracious Sovereign, as well as of the personal influence which, by the Grace of God, Her Majesty has been enabled to exercise for the welfare of her Empire, the General Assembly appoint that public thanksgiving be offered in the regular services of all the congregations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, upon the twentieth day of the present month, in commemoration of Her Majesty's accession to the throne.

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#### RECORD OF THE SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

The Committee appointed to examine the Record of the Synod of Hamilton and London, reported the same as carefully and correctly kept, and recommended that they be attested accordingly.

The Report was received and adopted.

# AGED AND INFHOM MINISTERS' FUND.

The discussion of Mr. P. Wright's motion for the adoption of the Aged and latter Ministers' Fund was resumed, Mr. Drysdale, who seconded the motion, addressing the house.

#### TIME AND PLACE OF NEXT MEETING.

The order of the day for fixing the time and place of next meeting, and considering the Remit on the question of Representation and the kindred matters seat down to Presbyteries, having arrived, it was moved by Principal Caven, seconded by Principal Macrae:—

That the General Assembly do first determine the place of its next meeting. The motion was carried.

It was then moved by Mr. R. Murray, seconded by Mr. A. Gandier:-

That the General Assembly next year be held at Hallfax.

It was moved in amendment by Dr. Cochrune, seconded by Mr. Walter Paul:—That the General Assembly meet next year in the City of Montreal.

The amendment was carried over the motion, and affirmed as the judgment of the House.

It was then moved by Mr. W. Paul, seconded by Mr. R. Murray, and earried:—
That the Assembly meet next year in Knox Church, Montreal, on the second Wednesday of June, at 7.30 p.m.

# REPRESENTATION IN THE ASSEMBLY.

The Assembly proceeded to consider the Returns of Presbyteries on the Remit sent down to them on the question of a change of representation in the Assembly:—

It was moved by Principal Macrae, seconded by Mr. R. Murray:-

That in accordance with the expressed mind of the Church it be and is hereby enacted that section (1) of the Act constituting the Assembly be amended to read na follows:—

The General Assembly shall consist of one-sixth of the whole number of Ministers whose names are on the Rolls of the several Presbyterles of the Church, and an equal number of Elders.

The motion being put was lost.

#### AGED AND INFULM MINISTERS' FUND.

The discussion of the motion as to the disposal of the Report of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund was resumed. The motion of Mr. P. Wright was adopted.

It was moved by Dr. D. L. MacCrae, seconded by J. H. Graham:-

That a small Committee be appointed to confer with the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, to look into the whole question of the regulations and administration of the Fund, with a view of inducing a greater number of our Ministers to connect themselves with it, and of drawing out towards it a

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in an-Ier larger liberality on the part of our Congregations—to report to the next General Assembly.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the further discussion of this matter had to be postponed.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederant was closed with the benediction by the Moderator,

#### ELEVENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at 2.30 p.m.

The General Assembly mer as per adjournment and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. W. Burns leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator

The Minutes of the morning Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

The Assembly resumed consideration of Dr. D. L. MacCrae's motion in relation to the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. The motion was carried.

#### ASSEMBLY RECORD.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to examine the Record of the General Assembly, which was given in by Dr. Sutherland, Convener. The Report bore that the minutes were carefully and correctly kept, in accordance with the regulations of the Church, and the Committee recommended that they be attested accordingly. The Report was received and adopted.

#### APPLICATION TO MIC. A. MATHESON.

An application was read from the Presbytery of Winnipeg on behalf of Mr. A. Matheson, of Springfield, asking that he may be allowed to retire, with benefit from the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

It was moved by Dr. Warden, duly seconded and agreed to:-

That the application be referred to the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, with power to deal with the case.

# APPLICATION TO MR. J. GEDDES.

An application was read from the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories on behalf of Mr. J. Geddes, formerly a Missionary in the employ of the Church, that he should receive an increased grant from the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

Prof. Baird was heard in support of the application.

Mr. A. Matheson moved, seconded by Mr. C. W. Gordon:-

That the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund be instructed to pay Mr. Geddes \$150 a year.

To this it was moved in amendment by Dr. Warden, seconded by Mr. H. Cassels:—

The General Assembly regrets that it is unable, in conformity with the regulations under which the Fund is administered, to grant the application. The amendment was carried over the motion, and was affirmed as the judgment of the Assembly.

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7. T steps to RECONSIDERATION OF THE VOTE ON REPRESENTATION IN THE ASSEMBLY,

Mr. J. A. Reddon gave notice that at the next Sederant he would move, seconded by Mr. Jas. McLean, a reconsideration of the vote taken at the forenoon Sederant, regarding representation in the Assembly.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONARIES' MEMORIAL.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee on the Memorial of certain Missionaries in Central India, which was given in and read by Dr. Gordon, Convener, who moved the reception of the Report and the consideration of its recommendations scriation. The motion was seconded and carried.

The recommendations were severally considered and adopted, when, on motion of Dr. Gordon, duly seconded, the report was adopted as a whole as follows:—

- 1. That the Council of Missionaries in Central India Mission, as now constituted, cease to exist.
- That the Treasurer of the Mission be appointed by the Foreign Mission Committee, and that his duties be defined by the Committee.
- 3. That the ordained Missionaries from Canada, who have been one year in the field, and who have passed their first examination in the language, shall be a Committee to prepare yearly estimates for their own work, to be forwarded through the Presbytery to the Foreign Mission Committee, and to have general supervision of the finances of such work.
- 4. That the lady Missionaries be constituted into a Council with the right to meet, discuss and formulate their views on all matters bearing upon their own work; to prepare estimates for that work, and to take such action as may be necessary for conducting their work, subject to the direction of the Foreign Mission Committee; with right also to meet the Presbytery at any of its ordinary meetings, to present their views in open Court, and after conference, to forward a statement of their views, with estimates of their work, to the Foreign Mission Committee through the Presbytery; and that in preparing their estimates the Ladies' Council be recommended to invite the assistance of the Treasurer. To be eligible for membership in this Council, Missionaries must have spent a year in India and have passed the first examination in the language.
- 5. That the Foreign Mission Committee shall, at the most convenient time, decide approximately the sum that can be spent in India for the year following, and intimate this to the Treasurer, for the guidance of the Finance Committee and the Ladies' Council in making up their estimates in detail; that in any reduction of grants, as compared with their estimates, it is recommended that, so far as practicable, the Foreign Mission Committee adopt the proportion of grants approved by the Committee of ordained Missionaries and by the Ladies' Council respectively. Salaries of Missionaries from the Canadian Church shall not be affected by this recommendation.
- 6. That these resolutions be adopted ad interim, and that they be transmitted to the Missionaries in India with the request that they report their views upon them, through the Presbytery, to the Foreign Mission Committee, for presentation to the next General Assembly.
- 7. That the Foreign Mission Committee be authorized to take the necessary steps to give effect to these resolutions.

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egu-The the The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at 7.30 p.m., of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### TWELFTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at 7.30 p.m. :

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. A. Ross leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator. The minutes of the afternoon Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### RECONSIDERATION OF THE VOTE ON REPRESENTATION.

Mr. J. A. Reddon made the motion, of which he had given notice in the afternoon, seconded by Mr. J. Melean:—

That the decision reached in the forenoon, in regard to the question of representation in the Assembly, be reconsidered.

A vote being taken, the motion was lost.

#### COMMITTEE TO STRIKE STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Committee of Assembly appointed to nominate the Standing Committees of the Church, presented an interim report, submitting the names recommended for the Hymnal Committee, which, on motion, duly seconded, was received and adopted.

#### AUGMENTATION-EAST AND WEST.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Augmentation Committee, East and West.

The Report from the Eastern Section was presented by Dr. Bruce, who drew attention to its leading features, as printed and in the hands of members, and concluded with moving, seconded by Mr. E. S. Bayne, as follows:—

The General Assembly receives the Report of the Committee on Augmentation. Eastern Section, expresses satisfaction with the many gratifying features of the work stated in the Report; but regrets that the receipts for the Fund were not quite sufficient to pay the grants in full; and particularly calls the aftention of Presbyteries to the importance of such close supervision as will secure, on the one hand, constant increase in the giving to the Fund, and for self-support by the Augmented charges, and, on the other, more general and liberal contributions to the Fund, on the part of non-aided congregations, so that payments may not disappoint the just expectations of those to whom aid has been promised.

The Assembly refers to the Committee ail the cases requiring attention before the close of the year, and authorizes it to deal with them as all the circumstances may require.

The Assembly earnestly prays that the blessing of God may continue to rest on this all-important branch of the Church's work.

The motion was carried.

# WESTERN SECTION.

The Report of the Western Section was submitted by Dr. Warden, in the absence of the Convener. He called attention to the salient features of the Report as printed and in the hands of members, and concluded with offering the following motion, duly seconded by Mr. W. T. Herridge:—

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which diction That the Report be received and its recommendations adopted; that cordial thanks be tendered to the Committee, and especially to the Convener; that the General Assembly commend anew the Scheme to the sympathy and liberality of the Congregations, Sabbuth Schools and Christian Endeavour Societies of the Church.

The resolution was adopted.

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#### FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Board of French Evangelization, which was presented by Dr. Scrimger, in the absence of the Chairman and Secretary. Dr. Scrimger, in explaining the operations of the Board for the year, pointed out many features of special interest in the report, which should encourage the Church to prosecute with renewed vigour the work to which it put its hands so many years ago. He concluded with adverting to the proposal that Coligny College should be taken over from the control of the Board and placed under the charge of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa.

It was then moved by Dr. MaeTavlsh, seconded by Mr. P. Wright, and agreed to:--

That the Report of the Board of French Evangelization be received, that the Assembly express its satisfaction at the success which has continued to attend the work of this Scheme during the year, in all its various departments, and commend it anew to the liberality of the Congregations of the Church, as well as of individuals, Sabbath Schools, and Young People's Societies.

#### COLIGNY COLLEGE.

There was read an extract minute of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, craving that the Assembly transfer Coligny College from under the control of the Board of French Evangelization and place it under control of a new Board, to be constituted out of members of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, or otherwise as may seem good to the Assembly.

It was moved by Dr. Warden, duly seconded, and carried:-

That the extract minute of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa be received, and that it be referred, along with the recommendation of the Board of French Evangelization anent Coligny College, to a Committee to be named by the Mcderator, to report at a later Sederunt of this Assembly.

# COMMITTEE ON COLIGNY COLLEGE.

The Moderator named the following as such Committee:—Dr. Scrimger, Convener; Messrs. E. Scott, W. T. Herrldge, Principal King, P. Wright, Ministers; and Walter Paul, and J. M. Clark, Elders.

# COMMITTEE OF CONFERENCE ON AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND

The Moderator nominated the following as the Committee to confer with the Committee for the Management of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund:—

Dr. D. L. McCrae, Convener; Messrs. J. A. Turnbull, J. G. Shearer, E. R. Hutt, and W. G. Jordan, Ministers; and Messrs. G. Rutherford, Col. D. McCrae, J. Armstrong, and J. R. McNellHe, Elders. The nomination was accepted.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow at 9.30 a.m., of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### THIRTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At Winnipeg, and within St. Andrew's Church there, June 16th, 1897, at 9.30 a.m.:

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. J. M. Miller leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, which was given in and read by Dr. Cochrane, Convener, setting forth all the items yet to be dealt with. He moved its reception. This was seconded and agreed to.

#### 250TH ANNIVERSARY OF WESTMINSTER ASSEMBLY.

This year being the 250th since the completion of the Confession of Faith and Catechisms of the Westminster Assembly of Divines, the following resolution was offered by Mr. R. Murray, seconded by Mr. S. Houston, and carried:—

The General Assembly recommends to Presbyteries and Sessions to take suitable measures for celebrating the 250th anniversary of the completion of the Confession of Faith and Catechism by the Westminster Assembly of Divines.

## CASE OF MRS. GAVIN ROSS.

A petition was read from Mrs. Gavin Ross, craving that the Assembly cause to be investigated a charge which she alleges was made against her in a letter of October 7th, 1891, recorded by the Session of Carmel Church, and the Presbytery of Huron

On motion, duly seconded, the petition was laid on the table.

#### MOTION OF DR. CAVEN re SCHOOLS.

Principal Caven offered the motion, of which he had given notice at a previous Sederunt, with regard to religious instruction in Public Schools. It was seconded by Principal Grant and carried.

#### RECORDS OF PRESBYTERIES OF HONAN AND INDORE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to examine the Records of the Presbyteries o Honan and Indore, which was given in and read by Dr. Laing, Convener, who moved its reception and adoption. This was seconded and agreed to. It bore:—

- 1. That no Record for either of these Presbyteries has been submitted for review.
- 2. That in order to secure adequate oversight of the proceedings of these Presbyteries, while recognizing the difficulty of having the Books of Record annually submitted to the General Assembly, the Committee suggests the following plan as suitable in the premises:—
- (1) That each of these Presbyteries be instructed to send, not later than the 1st day of April in each year, to the Clerk of Assembly, a certified typewritten or printed copy of its proceedings for the year then closed, in such form as will be suitable for being put on file.
- (2) That these copies of minutes shall be submitted for review, and after examination shall be attested in the usual way by the Moderator of the Assembly, and afterwards shall be kept by the Clerk of Assembly on file.
  - (3) That a duplicate of the attestation shall be sent to each Presbytery, which

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to report a suitable deliverance on the Foreign Mission Report, which was given in and read by Mr. T. Cumming, Convener, who moved that it be received and its recommendations considered seriatim. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

While these recommendations were still under consideration, the hour of adjournment arrived.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### FOURTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at 2.30 p.m.:

'The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. Henry Gracey leading in prayer, at the request of the Mcderator.

The minutes of the morning Sederunt were read and sustained.

# THE FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

Before resuming consideration of the recommended deliverance on Foreign Missions, the Assembly engaged in prayer on behalf of the Foreign Mission work of the Church, Mr. Walter Paul and Mr. J. A. Turnbull leading the supplications of the Assembly at the request of the Moderator.

The several recommendations of the proposed deliverance were adopted, and on motion of Mr. T. Cumming, duly seconded, the report was adopted as a whole, as follows:—

That the General Assembly record their gratitude to Almighty God for the success attending the labours of our Missionaries in the different fields occupied by the Church, their sympathy with the brethren who have been made to pass through affliction, especially with the Church in Formosa, where so many have been removed by violence and death, and pray that the Great Head of the Church may sanctify these afflictions to His children, and the extension of His own kingdom: that the General Assembly express their sense of the loss sustained by the Church in the death of Mrs. Ewart, and their appreciation of the services rendered by her to the Foreign Mission work, and extend their sympathy to the Woman's Foreign Mission Society in the great loss which they have sustained by her death, and record their satisfaction with the effort put forth by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, East and West, not only for carrying on and extending the Mission work of the Church, but also with the special effort being put forth to remove the deficit resting on the General Fund.

That the General Assembly, as recommended by the Foreign Mission Committee, refer the proposal to begin Mission work in Korea to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, with power to take final action in regard to it.

That the General Assembly express their preference for the present method of performing the Maritime service of the New Hebrides Mission, namely, by arrangement with a commercial line of steamers; that the General Assembly ap-

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prove of the recommendation of the Foreign Mission Committee (W. D.) that there be added to that Committee for the present year one of the members of the Foreign Mission Committee of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and that the General Assembly appoint the Rev. Prof. Baird to act in that capacity.

Hogg, moved:—The General Assembly is under obligation to use every effort to carry forward with the utmost efficiency the entire work of Foreign Missions, entrusted to it in the Providence of God; but unless the Church shall contribute with increasing liberality for the support of our Foreign work, retrenchment in it will be rendered inevitable.

The General Assembly thankfully recognizes the growing liberality which characterizes so many of our congregations, but notes with regret that not a few Congregations and Presbyteries are as yet doing almost nothing for the evangeliza-

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tion of the world. The Assembly, with great earnestness, instructs the Presbyteries of the Church to see to it that the general work of the Church, and especially the work of Foreign Missions, is effectively brought before all the congregations under their care, and, if possible, that some method of systematic giving be adopted by every one of these congregations, the Assembly being assured that in this way the Missionary revenue may be much increased.

The motion was carried.

#### NOTICE OF MOTION.

Mr. D. McCrae gave notice that he would move, seconded by Mr. D. Strachan, at a future Sederunt, the following resolution:—

That in the opinion of this General Assembly it is desirable to put the whole of the Mission work of the Church under the control of one Committee to be designated the Mission Committee, sub-divided into Eastern and Western Sections.

#### CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Church and Manse Building Fund, which was given in and read by Chief Justice Taylor, the Convener. It was moved by Mr. R. Murray, seconded by Principal King, and resolved:—

The Assembly receives and adopts the Report; expresses its gratification with the work being done by the Board, and its appreciation of the services rendered by Dr. Robertson in Britain, and cordially thanks the Christian friends in Britain who, recognizing the importance of the work of Church building in the North-West, have so generously responded to the appeal for assistance in carrying it on. The Assembly desires at the same time to express its warm appreciation of the services of Chief Justice Taylor, Chairman of the Board.

#### COLIGNY COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee charged with considering the application of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, and the recommendation of the Board of French Evangelization, as to the transfer of Coligny College, which was given in and read by Dr. Scrimger, Convener, who moved that it be received and its recommendations considered seriatim. This was seconded and agreed to.

The recommendations were amended and finally adopted as a whole, as follows:—

- 1. That the thanks of the Assembly are due to the Board of French Evangelization for its careful and wise administration, whereby the College has been brought into its present efficient and prosperous condition.
- 2. That in view of the character, which its work has necessarily come to assume, as a College for English-speaking young ladies, it is desirable, both in the interest of the French Board and of the College, that it should not longer continue to be administered by that Board.
- 3. That inasmuch as the Presbyteries of the Synod of Montreal and Cttawa have shown their interest in this institution and an appreciation of the work it is doing by providing a guarantee fund of \$1,775 a year, for three years, in the confident hope that by that time it may be entirely self-sustaining, the Assembly hereby appoints a Board representative of these Presbyteries, as follows:—Mr. W. T. Herridge (Chairman), Wm. Moore, D.D. W. D. Armstrong, Ph.D. Messrs, J. R. McLeod, J. Scrimger, D.D., W. R. Croskshank, B.A., N. McNish, LL.D., A. H.

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- 4. That the Assembly authorize the change of name from College to that of the Presbyterian Ladies' College, Ottawa, and that it be recommended to the members of the Church as a suitable institution to which they may send their daughters for higher education.
- 5. That the Board be further instructed to procure, with as little delay as possible, an Act of Incorporation, empowering it to hold the property of the College for the Presbyterian Church in Canada, with authority to borrow money on the security of the property, to the extent of existing liabilities, and to perform other such legal acts as may be found necessary in its interest, subject to the approval of the Assembly.
- 6. That as soon as this Act of Incorporation has been obtained, they be authorized to take over the property of the College from the parties who now hold it on behalf of the Board of French Evangelization, and provide for the repayment of the sum of \$25,000 which that Board has advanced on loan to the College.
- 7. That, until this is done, the interest on this sum that is now due, or may become due, at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum, be a first charge on the guarantee fund that has been provided by the Presbyteries as it shall be collected.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE RECEPTION OF MINISTERS

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on applications of Presbyteries for leave to receive Ministers of other Churches into the Ministry of this Church, which was given in and read by Dr. Laing, Convener, who moved that it be received and its several recommendations considered. They were, after consideration, amended and adopted as a whole as follows:—

Your Committee on the Reception of Ministers begs leave to report that .! the applications submitted have been dealt with, and makes the following recommendations:—

- 1. That the application of the Presbytery of Montreal, for leave to receive Rev. Alfred Logan, B.D., be granted.
- 2. That the application of the Presbytery of Montreal, for leave to receive Rev. David Downie, M.A., be granted.
- 3. That the application of the Presbytery of Paris, for leave to receive Rev. Perry A. Tinkham, be granted.
- 4. That the application of the Presbytery of Brockville, for leave to receive Rev. Alfred Fitzpatrick, B.A., be granted.
- That the application of the Presbytery of Halifax, for leave to receive Rev. Dr. W. S. Whittier, be granted.
- 6. That the application of the Presbytery of Halifax, for leave to receive Rev. A. P. Logan, be granted.
- 7. That the application of the Presbytery of Guelph, for leave to receive Rev. B. B. Williams, be granted.
- 8. That the application of the Presbytery of Guelph, for leave to receive Rev. David Anderson, be granted.

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9. That the application of the Presbytery of St. John, for leave to receive Rev. Chas. W. Irwin, be granted.

10. That the application of the Presbytery of Winnipeg, for leave to receive Mr. Henry George Gunn, B.A., be granted.

11. That the application of the Presbytery of Glenboro, for le .e to receive Mr. Nathuniel Stevenson, be granted, on his attending the remainder of the present session of Manitoba College, and on his passing the examination of the III. year in Theology.

12. That the application of the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, for leave to receive Mr. Robert Harkness, B.A., be granted, but before being ordained, that he be required to supplement his previous studies in Theology by pursuing a year's course of study under the care of the Presbytery.

13. That leave be granted to the Presbytery of Barrie to receive the Rev. W. T. Noble as a Minister of the Church; but before being eligible for a call, he spend a year in Mission work under the direction of the Presbytery.

The other applications considered by the Committee were not recommended.

(1) Your Committee further recommend that, owing to the defective form in which some of the applications are sent up to the General Assembly, it be an instruction to Presbyteries to have regard in their applications to the provisions of the Act on the Reception of Ministers.

(2) That inasmuch as the number graduating from our six Theological Colleges yearly is amply sufficient for the needs of the Church, Presbyteries and Ministers be urged to discourage applicants from other Churches.

Your Committee would further report that only eight applicants complied with the regulation of the Assembly, which requires that applicants shall appear in person before the Committee. In the other cases, it appears that the several Presbyteries had advised the applicants that an appearance in their case would not be necessary.

The Committee reports on the Returns from Presbyteries to the Remit re the Reception of Ministers, that seven Presbyteries sent in Returns to the Remits, namely:—Toronto, Guelph, Maitland, Barrie, Montreal, Miramichi, Truro.

Of these four, namely:-Guelph, Montreal, Miramichi, and Truro, approve.

Three disapprove, namely:-Toronto, Maitland and Barrie.

#### OVERTURE TO ORDINATION OF MR. SWARTOUT.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Victoria, craving permission to ordain Mr. Swartout. Mr. W. L. Clay was heard in support of the Overture, and moved, seconded by Dr. Fletcher:—

That the Overture be received and referred to a Committee to be nominated by the Moderator.

The motion was carried.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at 2.30 p.m., of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### FIFTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at 7.30 p m.:

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. J. S. Boyd, of H.Hsburg, North Dakota, leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The Minutes of the afternoon Sederant were read and confirmed.

#### COMMITTEE ON APPLICATION TO MR. SWARTOUT.

The Moderator named the following a Committee on the Overture of the Presbytery of Victoria, regarding the induction of Mr. Swartout:—

Mr. D. G. McQueen, Convener; Messrs, R. P. McKay, James Farquharson, Prot. Ross, Ministers; Humilton Cassels, J. D. Higginbotham, Elders,

The nomination was accepted.

#### OVERTURE TO DR. WOODS.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Indore, craving leave to ordain Dr. Woods as an Elder. The Overture was received and reterred to the Committee charged with dealing with the Overture regarding Mr. Swartout.

#### SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a deliverance on the Sabbath School Report, which was given in and read by Dr. Fletcher, Convener, who moved that it be received and its recommendations considered seriatim. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

While the consideration of these recommendations was proceeding, the hour fixed for taking up the Report of the Committee on Church Life and Work arrived, and the further discussion of the Sabbath School Report had to be post-poned.

#### REPORT ON CHURCH LIFE AND WORK.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Church Life and Work, which was presented by Mr. P. Wright, Convener, who drew attention to both the darker and brighter aspects of the Religious Life of the Church, set forth in the Report, as printed and in the hands of members, and concluded with moving the reception of the Report, and the consideration of its recommendations seriatim. This was seconded and agreed to. The first nine recommendations were considered, amended and adopted, when further action had to be postponed, on account of the arrival of the hour fixed for hearing a deputation from the Methodist Church.

# DELEGATION FROM THE METHODIST CHURCH,

A delegation from the Conference of Manitoba and the North-West, in the Methodist Church of Canada, consisting of Principal Sparling and Professor Stewart, was introduced and addressed the Assembly, bringing the warm greetings of the Church which they represented, and expressing the best wishes for this Church in carrying on the work of Christ in the late.

Principal Caven moved the following resolution, seconded by Principal King:—
The General Assembly has listened with much pleasure to the addresses of Doctors Sparling and Stewart, the representatives of the Conference of Manitoba and the North-West, in the N thodist Church of Canada. The General Assembly

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That and Dr. prays that the blessing of God may abundantly rest upon the Methodist Church, and that through its zealous labours the Kingdom of our Lord may be greatly advanced.

The motion was unanimously carried, and the Moderator communicated the resolution to the respected delegates from the Methodist Church.

#### CHURCH LIFE AND WORK.

Resuming the consideration of the Report of the Committee on Church Life and Work, it was on motion, duly seconded, resolved to postpone further discussion of the subject till to-morrow morning.

#### DR. ROBERTSON'S ADDRESS.

Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions, just returned from his visit to Great Britain and Ireland, where he has been advocating the cause of our Home Mission work for some months past, was introduced and addressed the Assembly, and gave an account of the reception he had from the parent Churches, and of the success attending his appeals.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at 9.30 o'clock, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator,

# SIXTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At Winnipeg, and within St. Andrew's Church there, the 17th day of June, 1897, at 9.30 a m.:

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. Scrimger leading in projer, at the request of the Moderator.

The Minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

## THE STANDING COMPUTTEES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to nominate the Standing Committees of the Church for the year, which was given in and read by Mr. H. Gracey, Convener, who moved its reception and the consideration of its recommendations seriatim. This was seconded and agreed to. They were considered, amended and adopted, with the exception of the Home Mission Committee and Augmentation Committee, Western Section, the nominations for which were remitted to the Committee, also excepting the Foreign Mission Committee and the Sabbath School Committee, the final formation of which was delayed, for cause.

#### GOVERNORS OF MORRIN COLLEGE.

It was agreed to name two Govérnors of Morrin College:—Rev. D. Taít, and Rev. J. Barclay, D.D., were accordingly appointed.

# FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The nomination of the Foreign Mission Committee, Western Section, contained the names of Mr. Hamilton Cassels and Dr. MacLaren. These brethren intimated that they did not desire to continue on the Committee. In this connection, it was moved by Dr. Bruce, seconded by Dr. Warden, and carried:—

That the Moderator appoint a Special Committee to confer with Mr. Cassels and Dr. MacLaren on the matter of their declining nomination on the Foreign

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ı Y Mission Committee, in the hope that they may be prevailed upon to change their mind; and in the event of this not being possible, to bring in a name for nomination as Convener of the Foreign Mission Committee.

COMMITTEE TO CONFER WITH MR. CASSELS AND DR. MACLAREN,

The Moderator as requested nominated the following Committee:—Dr. Thompson, Convener; Dr. Fletcher, Dr. Serimger, Dr. Somerville, J. A. Turnbull, the mover and seconder, Ministers; with Messrs. Jeffrey, D. McCrae and W. Paul, Elders.

The nomination was accepted.

#### REPORT ON UNION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Union, which was given in and read by Principal Caven, Convener. He concluded with moving, seconded by Principal King, the reception and adoption of the report, which reads as follows:—

The Convener of the Committee on Union with other Churches regrets that owing to his Iliness at the somewhat late period when he had purposed to consult by circular the widely scattered members of the Committee, no action falls to be reported for the past year. The members of the Committee, who are present at this Assembly, believing that an organ for conference with other Churches on the important subject of Union and of united action for practical purposes, should continue to exist, have agreed to recommend the General Assembly to reappoint the Committee, with power to resolve itself into three sections, corresponding in locality to the three sections of the Union Committee of the Methodist Church in Canada, thus facilitating conference on the questions which the Committee was last year instructed to consider.

The motion was carried.

#### LIFE AND WORK,

The Assembly resumed consideration of the recommendations of the Report of the Committee on Church Life and Work.

In discussing the last clause, Dr. Laing moved in amendment, duly seconded, that all the words after "Date" be deleted. The amendment being put, was lost.

The clause was then adopted. On motion of Mr. P. Wright, the report amended was adopted as a whole, as follows:—

- 1. That this Assembly, while gratefully recognizing the Divine blessing that has so evidently rested on the Ministers and people of our Church during the past year, enabling them to bear witness to the truth both in life and doctrine, yet feels that a richer baptism of God's Spirit, and a more complete consecration of God's people, are needed before the Church can be clothed with invincible power in rescuing sinful men.
- 2. That Presbyteries and Sessions be urged anew to bring before all parents and guardians of youth the supreme importance of family religion, and strive to roll away from professedly Christian homes the reproach of neglected family altars.
- 3. That Ministers and Elders be earnestly entreated to consider what they can do to make the prayer meeting more attractive and helpful to the people, so that it may be a greater spiritual force in our Church life.
- 4. That Presbyteries be strongly recommended to adopt some form of Presbyterial visitation, with the special design of promoting the spiritual life of the people.

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author institu of the the da nently 5. That Ministers, Elders, Deacons, or Managers be affectionately urged to adopt, wherever possible, the Spiritual method of carrying on the Lord's work, namely, by voluntary, systematic, proportionate weekly offerings

6. That this Assemb'y, prizing above all price the Christian Sabbath as a Divine Institution, and as an unspeakable blessing to mankind, both in its bearing on the spiritual nature and in its benignant aspect towards the sons of toil, would express its deepest sympathy with all the efforts put forth by the Churches, by the Lord's Day Alliance and its Branches, and by all Chatstian people, to preserve to ourselves and to our children the precious boon of a quiet and restful Sabbath

7. That this Assembly would further record its appreciation of the helpful character of recent Ontario Legislation on the Sabbath question, and trust it is only the harbinger of other and still more effective safeguards of Sabbath sanctity; and would express its satisfaction with efforts made in the Dominion Parliament to protect from public violation the sacred day of rest.

8. That while the Assembly rejoices in the growth of Temperance sentiment, it would not less earnestly urge Ministers, Eiders, Parents, Sabbath School and Public School Teachers, to spare no effort to instil into the minds of the young Temperance principles, enforced by scriptural and scientific sanctions; and that total abstinence on moral and philanthropic grounds be earnestly advocated.

9. That our people are hereby earnestly exhorted to use their utmost endeavours in every lawful way to carry the *plebiseite* in favour of Prohibition by an overwhelming majority, and thus free the Church from one of its deadliest foes, our land from untold misery and crime, and our modern civilization from its direst reproach and shame; and further, this Assembly would express the sincere hope that the Dominion Government will submit this question to the electorate at the earliest convenient date untrammelled by any other political or financial issue.

Thereupon Dr. Laing craved leave to dissent from the last clause of section 9, in his own name and in name of all that may join with him. Principal Macrae, Col. D. McCrae, Mr. D. Strachan, Dr. Gordon, and Mr. D. A. McLean joined in the dissent.

It was moved by Mr. J. Hay, seconded by Mr. J. R. Gilchrist, and carried:—
That the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to Mr. P. Wright for his concise, clear and admirable report on Church Life and Work, and the Assembly expresses the hope that Mr. Wright will retain the Convenership for the ensuing year.

# SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Principal Caven moved, seconded by Mr. P. Wright:-

The General Assembly deems it incumbent upon it at the present time to direct the attention of the members and adherents of the Church to their duty in relation to the Lord's Day.

The observance of the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath, rests upon Divine authority, and must not be regarded as having only ecclesiastical sanction. The institution of the Sabbath at the beginning of human history, the incorporation of the Sabbath law in the Decalogue, and the reasons assigned for setting apart the day of weekly rest, clearly show that the keeping of the Sabbath is permanently binding upon all nations and all classes of men.

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In observing, according to New Testament authority, the first day of the week instead of the seventh, we commemorate at once the creation of the world and the resurrection of Christ; and the Lord's Day, even as the original Sabbath, is to be regarded as a day of rest and worship.

The unspeakable value of the Sabbath in relation both to the physical and spiritual well-being of man is attested by all history. Where the weekly Sabbath is not honoured, the Church is seriously hindered in doing its work, while all the temporal interests suffer rather than benefit. The General Assembly is painfully aware of the extent to which the Lord's Day is descerated in nearly all Christian countries, and of the persistent efforts made in our own land by business and pleasure to encroach upon the Sabbath. Unless Christian people shall recognize the danger, and shall unite in defending the Lord's Day from the attacks made upon it in so many forms and from so many quarters, we may before long find that Canada has lost its place as a land distinguished for keeping the Sabbath and reverencing the Sanctuary.

The General Assembly, therefore, earnestly and affectionately exhorts all those whom it represents, to use faithfully the Lord's Day for the holy ends of its appointment, to refrain from all encroachments on its rest, except what "necessity and mercy" justify, and strenuously to bear their part in defending the priceless inheritance of the sacred weekly rest.

The resolution was adopted.

#### REPORT re APPLICATION OF MR. MACKNIGHT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the application of the Presbytery of Peterboro' as to the status of Mr. MacKnight, which was given in and read by Mr. P. Wright, Convener, who moved its reception and adoption. The report is as follows:—

The Committee appointed to consider the application of Mr. Macknight to be restored to the full status of the ministry of this Church, begs leave to report that it has carefully perused all the papers on the subject, and also had conference with a representative of the Presbytery of Peterboro', from which the application comes, and with the Revs. Dr. Laing and Fletcher, of the Presbytery of Hamilton; and after full consideration, it was unanimously agreed to recommend that Mr. Macknight's status as a Catechist be left undisturbed for another year, and that meanwhile the Presbyteries of Peterboro' and Hamilton be instructed to confer with each other on the matter, and report to next Assembly.

# COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE WITH MR. CASSELS AND DR. MACLAREN.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to confer with Mr. Cassels and Dr. MacLaren, which was given in and read by Dr. Thompson, Convener, who moved its reception and adoption. This was seconded and agreed to. It is as follows:—

Committee to meet Mr. Cassels and Dr. MacLaren with a view to inducing them to reconsider their decision to act on the Foreign Mission Committee, met and conferred with these brethren, and regret to have to report that they have been wholly unable to persuade Mr. Hamilton Cassels to allow his name to stand on the Committee for the present year.

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veyi may form Dr. MacLaren, in view of the fact that no final action on the estimates for the following year can be taken until next Assembly, agreed to allow his name to stand, provided a resolution of the following tenor be passed by the Assembly at the present time:—

That in adopting the recommendation complained of by Dr. MacLaren, regarding the pro rain reduction of estimates, the General Assembly desires to disayow in the most emphatic manner possible, any intention of casting reflection on the Foreign Mission Committee, or of expressing want of confidence in this Committee of the Church.

The Committee further recommend that the Moderator, Dr. Moore, be appointed Convener,

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at 2.30 p.m., of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### SEVENTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at 2.30 p.m. :

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. M. Fraser leading in prayer, at the request of the Moderator.

The minutes of the morning Sederunt were rend and sustained.

# REPORT ON CASE OF MR. HODNETT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Judicial Committee, which was given in and read by Dr. Scrimger, *Convener*, who moved its reception and the consideration of its finding. The motion was seconded and carried. The report is as follows:—

The Committee to which was referred the appeal of the Rev. W. Hodnett, against the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, beg leave to report that they have met and conferred with all the parties, and would recommend that the Assembly dismiss the appeal from the decision of the Synod, on the special point appealed from, viz., the resolution of the Presbytery of Rock Lake to sustain the claim of the Killarney Congregation against Mr. Hodnett for the use of the manse for nine months after he ceased to be pastor; this, however, without in any way prejudicing any counterclaims which Mr. Hodnett may have against the Congregation.

Parties were called and the finding Intimated to them. Mr. Hodnett did not appear when called; but the representatives of the Synod and Presbytery acquiesed in the recommendation. It was adopted by the Assembly.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION,

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Legislation, which was given in and read by Dr. Warden, *Convener*, who moved the reception and adoption of the report. The report is as follows:—

The Committee appointed by last Assembly on Legislation, as to holding, conveying and dealing with lands and other property and securities now held, or that may hereafter be conveyed or devised to the Church or any of its Schemes, by the formation of an Incorporated Board of Trustees, or otherwise, beg leave to report

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Justice Maclennan, W. Mortimer Clark, Hamilton Cassels, A. R. Creelman, Dr. Moore, Dr. MacLaren, Dr. R. Campbell (Montreal), Dr. Warden, Courcuer.

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# RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION IN SCHOOLS.

The Moderator nominated a Committee on Religious Instruction in Public Schools, as requested at a former Sederunt, as follows, regard being had to the several Provinces in the Dominion in the formation of the same:—Principal Caven, Convener, Messrs. J. C. Herdman, J. A. Carmichael, W. L. Clay, D. G. McQueen, Thornton Fell, Principal King, Joseph Hogg, P. Wright, Dr. J. McDiarmid, W. W. Miller, Dr. Thompson, Mr. G. R. McNeilly, J. K. Macdonald, Dr. Scrimger, A. J. Mowatt, Principal Macrae, Sir J. W. Dawson, A. C. Hutcheson, Principal Forrest, R. Murray, A. Falconer, Hon. D. Laird, D. Sutherland, Dr. Bruce and Hon. D. C. Fraser.

The nomination was accepted.

# SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Report of the Special Committee on the Sabbath School Report. After due consideration, the recommendations were adopted as follows:—

- 1. That the publication of the S. S. supplies be continued.
- 2. That the Committee of the Presbyterian Record be requested to undertake this work and carry it on under the control of the Editor of the Record from January 1st, 1898.
- 3. That the S. S. Committee be instructed to take special steps toward the removal of the existing deficit, and that in this connection, the total collections taken up on Children's Day be devoted as a help for this purpose, and that in the meantime the Assembly, in accordance with the decision of last Assembly, authorize the Convener of the S. S. Committee to obtain a loan sufficient to meet the present liabilities.
- 4. That If it is found that the worl of printing and publishing the Record and S. S. supplies can be more advantageously carried on in Toronto than in Montreal, the Assembly approve of its being done in Toronto.
- 5. That thanks be given to the S. S. Committee, and especially to the Convener; and further, that the Assembly express its appreciation of Mr. Fotherlingham for his valuable services in connection with publication of the S. S. supplies, in some tangible form, and that in making its appeal for contributions, it be understood that the sum of \$500 be granted by the S. S. Committee to Mr. Fotheringham, if the funds received will allow.

# SYNOD RECORDS.

The Assembly called for Reports of the Committees appointed to examine the records of the Synods of Montreal and Ottawa, of Toronto and Kingston, of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and of British Columbia. They reported that they had discharged the duty laid upon them, and found the records carefully and correctly kept, and recommended that they be attested accordingly. The reports were received and adopted.

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#### YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Young People's Societies, which was presented, in the absence of the Convener, by Mr. J. A. Turnbull, who drew attention to its leading features, as printed and in the hands of members. He moved the reception of the report, and the consideration of its recommendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to. The recommendations as adopted, are as follows:—

- 1. That Ministers and Missionaries supervise the returns sent in from Societies, to the end that these may be more prompt, accurate and complete.
- 2. That the Assembly express satisfaction with the general outline of the plan of study issued by the Committee, and the extensive use into which the plan has come, and authorize its continuance, with such new monthly topics for the coming year as the Committee may find suitable.
- 3. That the Committee be instructed to consider whether some similar plan might not be devised for the use of the children in junior organizations, and to issue such plan if deemed practicable.
- 4. That Ministers, Sessions, and Young People's Societies be specially reminded of the urgent need of seeking to bring a larger proportion of the young men into the membership of the Societies and an active interest in the work of the Church.
- 5. That the Assembly's previous recommendation to the young people in regard to moneys be reiterated, viz.: (a) To adopt some systematic and voluntary method of raising funds; (b) to give the foremost place to the support of work connected with their own Congregation, and to the great Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Schemes of the Church.
- 6. That a first charge on the money contributed by the Young People's Societies to the several Mission Funds of the Church, be the payment of the necessary expenses of the Committee, and the extension of the work in the newer districts; the amounts chargeable against each Fund to be proportionate to the amount received by it from the Young People's Societies.
- Mr. C. W. Gordon moved, and it was duly seconded and agreed to:—That inasmuch as the Session is the Court entrusted with the oversight of the congregations, all communications from the Assembly's Committee to Young People's Societies should be made in the regular way through the Session, and that all contributions from these Societies to the Missionary and Benevolent work of the Church be made through the Treasurer of the congregation entrusted with the transmission of moneys to the Agent of the Church.

# FOREIGN MISSION AND AUGMENTATION COMMITTEES, -WEST,

The Committee to strike Standing Committees reported the names finally recommended for the Foreign Mission Committee, and the Augmentation Committee, Western Section. The report was received and adopted.

The Assembly adjourned to meet in this place at 7.30 p.m., of which public intiniation was given, and this Sederunt was closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

#### EIGHTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the same place, on the same day, at 7.30 p.m.:

The General Assembly met as per adjournment, and was constituted with prayer by the Moderator.

The minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

## FOREIGN MISSION FINANCES.

It was moved by Dr. Warden, seconded by Col. D. McCrae, and carried:—That it be an instruction to the Foreign Mission Committee. Western Section, if, in the end of January next, they find that the revenue of the year is likely greatly to fall short of the expenditure, on the basis of the estimates approved by this Assembly, to reduce expenditure, as far as practicable, so that at the end of the current ecclesiastical year the indebtedness of the Fund do not exceed the amount of the deficit reported to this Assembly.

#### APPEAL OF MR. WALLACE BAILEY.

There was presented and read an appeal of Mr. Wallace Bailey against a decision of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston.

The appeal was received, and laid on the table, in the absence of any one to support the same.

# MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND,

The Assembly called for the Report of the several Ministers', Widows' and Orphans' Funds of the Church.

#### Western Section.

In the absence of the Convener, Dr. Warden presented the Report of the Western Section, as printed and in the hands of members. He gave explanations regarding the Fund and moved its reception and adoption. The motion was seconded and carried. The following are the recommendations:—

That power be given to them to reduce if necessary the annuities hereafter to be paid to the widows and orphans entitled to these, so as each year to equalize revenue and expenditure.

That no one be placed on the list of annuitants who is not entitled to this by the regulations under which the Fund is at present administered.

That discretionary power be given the Committee next year to admit to connection with the Fund, prior to 1st January, 1898, Ministers desiring this, upon their contributing a sum equivalent to the total payments they should have made, provided they had connected themselves with the Fund at induction, together with interest at the rate of 6 per cent, per annum, compounded annually from the date of induction. That only the widows and orphans of Ministers who were connected with the Fund, and whose personal rates were paid up in full to a period not exceeding one year from the date of their death, be entitled to participate in the benefits of the Fund.

That the Assembly renew its instruction of some years ago to Presbyteries to see that Ministers at ordination are reminded of this Fund, and of the desirability of their connecting themselves with it. Mr Easter tion at

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#### Eastern Section.

Mr. R. Murray, in the absence of the Convener, presented the Report of the Eastern Section, as printed and in the hands of members. He moved the reception and adoption of the report. The motion was seconded and agreed to.

#### CHURCH OF SCOTLAND FUND.

Dr. R. Campbell, Clerk, presented the Report of the Fund of the former Synod of the Church of Scotland, as printed and in the hands of members. He moved the reception and adoption of the report. The motion was seconded and carried.

#### MEMORIALS ON BEHALF OF WIDOWS.

There were presented and read Memorials from the Presbytery of Montreal, on behalf of the widows of the late Dr. Smyth and Rev. C. MacKerracher, asking that their names be placed on the Fund. The Memorials were remitted to the Committee, Western Section, for its consideration.

There was presented a similar Memorial from the Presbytery of Rock Lake, on behalf of Mrs. M. MacKenzle. It too was referred to the Committee, Western Section.

#### UNIFORMITY IN WORSHIP.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Uniform.ty in Worship, which was presented by Dr. Laing, Convener. Along with this there was read a Memorial from Mr. Sandford Fleming bearing on the same matter.

Dr. Laing moved as follows, seconded by Mr. R. Murray:-

That the Memorial of Mr. Sandford Fleming be received and be sent to the Committee for its consideration, to report to next Assembly, and that the name of Mr. Fleming be added to the Committee, and that he be invited to take part in their deliberations.

That in view of the small number of commissioners present, and the importance of the matter to which this report refers. it be not now considered; but that the Committee be continued and reappointed, with the addition of Dr. Carmichael, and Messrs. W. Farquharson, J. McD. Duncan, D. D. Wilson (Seaforth), Lieut-Coi. McCrae, and Sandford Fleming.

# ELDER MODERATORSHIP.

It was moved by Dr. Laing, seconded by Dr. R. Campbell (Clerk), and carried:—That the reference and overture on this subject do lie on the table.

#### OVERTURE re MR. SWARTOUT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the Overture of the Presbytery of Victoria, asking leave to ordain Mr. Swartout, which was given in and read by Mr. R. P. MacKay, who moved its reception and adoption. The motion was seconded and agreed to. The report is as follows:—

The Committee recommend that the prayer of the Overture from the Presbytery of Victoria, which was unanimously adopted and transmitted by the Synod of British Columbia, be granted, in terms of the extract minute of the Synod, vlz.:—That the Presbytery of Victoria be instructed to prescribe for Mr. Swartout a course of study in Theology for one year, at the end of which time they shall be at liberty to take him on trials for license and ordination.

#### OVERTURE re ORDINATION OF DR. WOODS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the Overture of the Presbytery of Indore, asking leave to ordain Dr. Woods as an Elder, which was given in and read by Mr. R. P. MacKay, who moved its reception and adoption. The motion was seconded and adopted. The report is as follows:—

Re the application from the Presbytery of Indore, it is recommended, that in the opinion of the Committee it is exceedingly desirable that Dr. Woods, being the only unordained male Missionary in our Mission in India, should occupy the same position in the Presbytery of Indore as his brethren; and it therefore recommends the General Assembly to grant leave to the Presbytery of Indore to ordain him as an Elder, and to place his name on the roll of Presbytery.

## OVERTURE re LICENSING OF STUDENTS.

The Committee appointed by last Assembly to consider an Overture re Licensure of Students, reported progress through Dr. Milligan, its Convener, and asked that the Committee be reappointed for another year.

The report was received and its recommendation adopted.

#### REPORT ON RECORD,

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Record and Children's Record, which was presented for the Convener by Mr. E. Scott, who moved the reception of the same and the adoption of its reco. mendations. The motion was seconded and agreed to. The recommendations are as follows:—

- 1. Pastors, Sessions and Congregations are urged to place the Record, the property and organ of our Church, in every family of the Church, so far as circumstances will admit.
- 2. That the Children's Record should be " ken in all our Sabbath Schools and Congregations, for the children of the Church.
- 3. As it is difficult to adapt one periodical to all ages of our young people, and at the same time desirable that the Missionary work of our Church should be kept before them, and as the financial condition of the Records will now warrant the experiment, the Assembly sanctions the issuing of an additional paper for the older children when the time may appear most suitable for doing so.

# OBITUARY NOTICES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Obituary Notices, which was given in by Dr. M. Fraser, Conrecer, who briefly stated the substance of the notices. It was moved by Dr. Fraser, seconded by Dr. Laing:—That the report be received and be printed as an appendix to the minutes, also that it be an instruction to Clerks of Presbyteries in the case of the decease of each minister to send an obituary notice to the Clerk of the General Assembly, for its use; and to send a copy of such notice to the Presbyterian Record.

#### OVERTURE re POWERS OF SYNODS.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Synod of Toronto and Kingston anent enlarged powers of Synods. Mr. S. Houston was heard in support of the overture. He moved, seconded by Mr. J. G. Stuart:—That the overture be received and referred to a small Committee to define the subject more clearly, so

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nd ort be so as to have something to send down to Presbyteries next year, and to report to next Assembly. The motion was agreed to.

#### REMIT ANENT PERMANENT PLACE OF MEETING.

The Assembly took up the consideration of the Returns of Presbyteries regarding a permanent place of meeting for the Assembly. It was agreed to lay the same on the table.

#### REMIT ON MISSION BOARD.

The Assembly next took up the Returns of Presbyteries ament a Mission Board. No action was taken on the subject.

#### COMMITTEE ON ESTIMATES.

Mr. R. G. MacBeth moved, seconded by Mr. C. W. Gordon:-

That this Assembly appoint a Committee on Estimates, Eastern and Western Sections, and that all Committees and Boards requiring money from the Church be requested to report to said Committee not later than the 1st day or June annually, the amounts they require for their respective departments, and that the Committee on Estimates take these reports into consideration and submit to the Assembly their judgment as to the amount that should be adopted in each case, with due regard to the needs and importance of each department and the welfare of the whole.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. H. MacKellar, seconded by Mr. J. A. Turnbull:—That the whole matter be sent down for the consideration of the Presbyterles of the Church and report to the next Assembly.

The amendment was carried and affirmed as the judgment of the House.

#### COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER ENLARGED POWERS OF SYNODS.

The Moderator nominated a Committee to define more clearly the subject of the overture of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, as follows:—Mr. S. Flouston, Convener; Messrs. W. T. Wilkins, John Hay, H. Gracey, Ministers; and G. M. Roger, Professor Dyde, Elders.

# MONTREAL WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

There was presented and read an extract from the Presbytery of Montreal, transmitting an abstract of the Montreal Woman's Missionary Society for the past year. The communication was received, and it was agreed to record the Assembly's warm appreciation of the important work accomplished by the Montreal Woman's Missionary Society.

# RESOLUTION ANENT MR. CASSELS' SERVICES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to frame a minute expressive of the Assembly's estimate of the services rendered by Mr. H. Cassels to the Foreign Mission work of the Church, which was given in and read by Professor Ross, Convener, who moved its reception and adoption. The motion was duly seconded and adopted unanimously by a "standing vote." The resolution is as follows:

The General Assembly, while deeply regretting the retirement of Mr. Hamilton Cassels, from the Foreign Mission Committee, desires to put on record its high appreciation of his self-denying labours during the fourteen years that he has

served on the Committee, and especially during the six years that he has occupied the position of Convener. It must be gratifying to Mr. Cassels, as it is to the Assembly, that during his connection with the Committee the work to which he has given himself with such untiring zeal and devotion has, by God's blessing, so largely increased and prospered.

His professional training and experience, his patient, kindly, courtesy in the performance of difficult and delicate duties, his calm judicial temper, his appreciation of the difficulties of the labourers in the field, and his sympathy with them in their work, have not only commanded the respect and confidence of his fellow members on the Committee, but have also endeared him to every Missionary.

While it is a source of deep regret that his professional duties compel his retirement, the Assembly gratefully acknowledges the debt of gratitude under which his services have laid the Church, records its earnest hope that his services on the Committee may soon again be available, and prays that the Holy Spirit may continue to make his labours on behalf of our Foreign Mission work fruitful of blessing.

The motion was adopted.

- 7. Augmentation Fund, third Sabbath of January, 1898.
- 8. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, third Sabbath of February, 1898.
- 9. Foreign Missions, second Sabbath of March, 1898.

Ordered, also, that all Congregations and Mission Stations be enjoined to contribute to the Schemes of the Church.

Further, that contributions be sent to the Treasurers of the Church as soon as possible after the collections are made.

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
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## REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE. (WESTERN SECTION.)

The Home Mission Committee present in this, their Annual Report to the General Assembly, an outline of what has been attempted and accomplished during the year. Statistics of Mission Stations, and names of Missionaries and fields occupied, can give no adequate idea of the work done, the labours undergone, and difficulties surmounted, in the prosecution of the vast pioneer Mission work entrusted to the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

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The settlers in the North-West Territories had a fair crop during the year 1896, but distance from the sea-board, cost of transportation, and other causes, materially affected and reduced the resources of the farmers, and as a consequence, their ability to give for the support of Gospel Ordinances. In spite however of drawbacks, the Stations have as a rule done well, and appreciate the efforts made by the Committee, and the Canadian and British Churches, to enable them to enjoy the services of a regular Ministry.

The Committee are glad to state that they have been able to pay the Missionaries in full, without any special appeal to the Church to make up a deficit. For this gratifying state of affairs, the Church is under obligation to the British Churches, more than to our own congregations. But for the timely aid rendered, they would have been unable to meet their obligations.

In the Report now submitted, in addition to the regular congregational contributions to the funds, there are presented the amounts expended by Presbyteries, congregations and societies for Mission work in cities, towns and country districts, not passing through the Treasurer's hands. The list is necessarily incomplete, but in so far as the Convener has been able to secure returns, they have been reported. The Report also contains particulars of the progress of Home Mission work in the different Presbyteries and Provinces, reports of the Students' Missionary Societies, of the Lumberman's Mission, and the names of congregations in Scotland and Ireland, as well as individuals, who have sent contributions.

#### PRESBYTERY OF QUEBEC.

All the Stations in this Presbytery have been fully supplied during the year, with the exception of one or two which received partial supply during the winter months. A larger number than usual have been under the supervision of ordained men with excellent results, and the general outlook is brighter to-day than for some years past. We have nine groups of Missions, con prising twenty-four preaching Stations; to work these we have a staff of five Ordained Missionaries, three Students and one approved Catechist. A new Church has been built at Grande Mere, the people themselves having subscribed liberally, received very generous aid from friends, within the bounds of the Presbytery and elsewhere.

so much so that the Church was opened a few weeks ago free of debt. A new manse has been erected at Valcartier, and only a small debt remains on it. There has been a substantial addition to the membership of the Church, especially amongst the young, on profession of faith in Christ, and the people in several instances have shown their appreciation of the services by increased contributions to the support of Ordinances.

Valcartier.—Good work has been done here, and our Missionary reports that the people turn out in goodly numbers to all the services. A new manse erected.

Marlow.—The Rev. John Turnbull says:—"There is some little promise of increase, as two or three of the young men are settling down on farms, but this is counterbalanced by one of the older farmers selling out to the French, and another expected to do the same any day. Still it is an interesting field, and should be well supported, both for the sake of the old who remain here, and for the young who go forth from us to strengthen our Churches in other places."

Metis.—Rev. Dr. Lamont continues to do quiet, faithful work; not much room for increase.

Lake Megantic.—Work progressing; a more earnest, devoted, plucky, little band of Presbyterians is not to be found anywhere.

Sawyerville, etc.—This field has made very considerable growth, and has now reached the status of becoming a regular charge.

Massawippi and Hillhurst.—These two Stations were formerly connected with the Sawyerville group, and will be supplied by a Student during summer.

Portneuf.—Has been attended to by Students from Morrin College; though small in numbers, very liberal, and services much appreciated.

New Rockland.—The Rev. D. Pugh continues to minister to the Welsh miners in their own tongue, future more promising.

Grande Mere.—New Church built, opened recently, no debt. Will be looked after by the Students' Missionary Association of Montreal, without expense to the Committee.

Chicoutimi.—The Rev. J. L. Campbell reports Church and School doing well. Mr. Campbell teaches School during the week, and preaches twice and three times on Sabbath. Ours is the only Protestant Church and School in the district. Prospects of growth hopeful.

#### PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL.

Progress of the Work.—There has not been much growth in numbers in any field, indeed in some of them there has been a decrease. Most of our fields are hemmed in by a dense Roman Catholic population, in which there is but little change from year to year. These small settlements of Protestants are constantly depleted by the emigration of the young men and young women to more desirable and progressive localities, especially to the North-West.

In three of our fields the Minister preaches in both French and English, and sustains the double character of a Home and Foreign Missionary. Part of his time and strength are devoted to making known the peace and joy of salvation to his French Roman Catholic neighbors. Very often his service is the only Protestant worship in a large town, or in a wide tract of country, containing a dense population. One of the pathetic sights in driving through a fine stretch of land is an Anglican Church, with a small burying ground round it, deserted for years, and not a communicant of the denomination within many miles of it.

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Financial progress is being made in some fields. Year by year the grace of giving is cultivated in a higher degree, although in some instances much remains to be done in this matter. In Mille Isles, where the amount given by the people brought the stipend up to only \$600, they are taking steps to raise \$100 more. In Avoca some arrears have been paid and some new subscribers added. La Guerre has been united with Port Lewis, and the two hope soon to have an Ordained Missionary. In Trout River and Burke, the latter Station, which was originally a Free Will Baptist Church, is taking steps this summer to be fully organized as a Presbyterian congregation. In Lost River and Lake View two new Churches have been completed and opened, and a new manse erected.

A redistribution has been made of a number of fields near the City, whereby they are removed, for the summer at least, from being a charge on the fund. Petite Cote has been joined with Norwood, formerly one of the Stations of the congregation of Cote des Nelges. A Student occupies this field for the summer, and, as Norwood has become a popular place for suburban residences, there is a good prospect of a self-sustaining congregation here. Laprairie has been connected with St. Lambert for the summer, although some other method of supply may be found necessary for the winter. It is proposed to supply Mount Royal Vale from Cote des Nelges, if this should be found practicable.

New Work.—A Sabbath School has been carried on in Montreal Annex, a new surburb, since November 1st, with a view to establishing a preaching Station there in time. There has been an average attendance of 25, and a good deal of interest.

A Mission in Centre Street, Montreal, opened by St. Matthew's Church, has been taken over by St. Paul's Church, and the work there is vigorously prosecuted by the young people of that congregation. It is in a district thickly settled by poor, hard-working people. There is a Sabbath School of 150, an evening service, sewing classes for children, and parents also, with an attendance of over 100. A reading room has also been opened there two evenings in the week.

A new Mission has been begun by St. Matthew's Church in Verdun, where many lots are being sold and houses built. A service is carried on every Sabbath evening and a Sabbath School. A large, valuable lot his been purchased, and a temporary Church will soon be erected on it.

#### PRESBYTERY OF GLENGARRY.

At East Lancaste: the field became self-supporting, and contributed up to January 1st, 1897, \$589 cash towards building a Church, and has now the material on hand.

Vankleek Hill congregation expended on two Stations in its vicinity and under its care the sum of \$765 for building a Church, and \$354 for Student supply. Total, \$1,119.

#### PRESBYTERY OF LANARK AND RENFREW.

The Mission field of this Presbytery consists at present of two distinct parts. There is that which is within the bounds of the Presbytery, and also the large field beyond its bounds, which is being wrought in the general interests of the Church, because for the present there is no one else likely to take it up.

As regards the field within our bounds, the work is well consolidated and progressive.

Eganville has been transferred to the Augmentation list.

Bathurst and South Sherbrooke has built two new Churches; us soon as these are paid we may expect it to take rank as a congregation.

Other fields are doing well considering the hard times, and are being vigorously and successfully wrought by the Missionaries in charge.

The field beyond the bounds of the Presbytery has very largely increased during the past eighteen months, on account of the building of the Ottawa and Parry Sound Railway, and the rapid opening up of the Temiscamingue District.

- 1. Along the line of the Parry Sound Railway are three fields:-
- (1) Golden Lake, Kilaloe-Barry's Bay and Burk Lake. There are five Station in these of which there are Churches. Services were conducted throughout the near the pose are poor, and the fields of wide extent, but much hearty interest business manifested and excellent work done.
- (2) While yeard Murchison --Whitney is a village depending on the milling operations of the St. ... thony's Lumber Company. A Church was built here, the congregations of our Presbytery assisting by contributions of nearly \$500.00. At Murchison the divisional point of the railway has been located, and a village is springing up. There are two out Stations besides, and Rev. J. A. McDonald ha. done a great work in organizing the fields.
- (3) Gilmour's Mills.—Here occasional services were given last summer. This summer a Student of Montreal Students' Society will have charge. The Park headquarters are here, Gilmour's large saw mill, and further west other mills are about to be built.
  - 2. On Lake Temiscamingue there are two fields:-
- (1) Kippewa, at the lower end of the lakes, and serving also the Kippewa District. There are two or three regular preaching places, and much journeying amongst scattered families.
- (2) Haleybury, Leskeard and Bais des Peres, at the upper end of the lake, where is a large tract of fertile land. Mr. Findlay, the Superintendent of Missions, visited this field and urged the sending of an Ordained Missionary, which has been done. He has a large district, said to be rapidly filling up; two Churches are projected. Mr. Garton, an old employee of the H. B. Co., has left us a bequest of \$2.500 for this Mission.

So much outside work, and at such a distance, takes the resources and energies of the Presbytery, and hence arose the proposition for the erection of a new Presbytery, under which there might be more aggressive work; at the same time it has to be borne in mind that this vast Mission field is a magnificent source of healtaful spiritual exercise for the present Presbytery.

#### PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA.

The work in this Presbytery has been carried on with vigour during the year. Most of the fields now enjoy the services of Ordained Missionaries.

Excellent service has been rendered: In Aylwin, by Rev. Jas. Taylor; in Desert and Baskatong, by Rev. Narcisse McLaren; in Eardly and Onslow, by Rev. H. T. Kalem; in Plantagenet, by Rev. W. W. Hardie; in Casselman and South Indian, by Rev. H. McLean. Bearbrook and Navan was acceptably supplied by Rev. D. J. Scott during the summer, and Rev. A. S. Ross, who was appointed to that field in October, has been doing efficient service since.

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Qu winter East Templeton during the summer enjoyed the services of a Student Missionary, Mr. Collin D. Campbell, and during greater part of the winter services were conducted by laymen going down from Ottawa.

Stittsville was supplied during the summer by Mr. Wm. Bremner. Student, and in winter by Rev. E. McCauley.

Chelsea and Cantley have been supplied during the summer by '1c. W. H. Farrer, and during the winter by Rev. R. V. McKibben. An excellent work was done in Cantley by our Student Missionary, where 15 members were added to the roll. A still more extensive blessing followed the labours of our Missionary in Portland, Mr. T. Caser, where 45 were added, and the people so awakened that they have kept up services themselves for the greater part of the winter.

Rev. T. W. Winfield has occupied with much acceptance the Glebe Mission under direction of Session of St. Andrew's Church. Lochaber was occupied during the summer by the Students' Missionary Society of Montreal.

#### PRESBYTERY OF BLOWVILLE.

Home Mission work within the bounds of the Presbytery is still confined to one field of four Stations:—Morton, Lyndlagst, Alfornia and Ellisville. Work was regularly carried on throughout the far with encouraging success. During the summer Mr. A. D. McIntyre, a Student of Queen's, labored with much acceptance; and for the winter months the sumply of the field was in the hands of the Queen's College Students' Missionary acceptance. Sabbath School work and week evening services are held at various points, and the means of grace are appreciated. Beyond this there is nothing special to report.

#### PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON.

Fifteen of the seventeen Mission fields within the bounds were supplied all last winter. In thirteen of these the supply was continuous during the year ending with March last.

Two Mission fields, Tweed and Fuller, and Zion Church, Kingston, were transferred to the list of aid-receiving congregations, and the Ordained Missionaries, Rev. D. M. Martin and Rev. J. D. Boyd, who had served them so well, were called by the people, and inducted to their respective charges by the Presbytery.

In the removal by death of the Rev. Geo. Porteous, for over three years Ordained Missionary at L'Amable, etc., the Church lost a conscientious, earnest, and self-denying Minister.

There are seven important districts in charge of Ordained Missionaries, four of whom were appointed in October last. These are:—The Rev. Dr. Begg, at Consecon and Hillier; the Rev. A. McKenzie, at Sharbot Lake, etc.; the Rev. D. M. Jamieson, at Matawatchan and Griffith, and the Rev. G. Shore, at Portsmouth and Collins Bay. In each of these fields the prospects are reported good, a deepening spiritual interest being manifested among the people. Our Missionary in the Poland district now occupies a comfortable manse recently erected.

New Churches have been built at Coe Hill (Thanet district), and Marmora (Rev. G. L. Johnstone, O. M.). Arrangements are being made to build a Church at Ompah, in the Wilbur district (E. Turkington, Student, in charge for a year). It is expected the building will be ready before the end of summer.

Queen's College Missionary Association supplied four Mission fields during the winter. As usual, members of Presbytery visited the fields and administered the

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by ith by to Sacraments of the Lord's Supper and Baptism, and favorable reports were given of a general increase in membership, and of good work being done.

#### PRESBYTERY OF PETERBOROUGH.

Chandos and Burleigh.—Mr. R. F. Hail laboured in this field during the summer months with great acceptance and success. At the request of the people he has been sent back for the next six months. Rev. J. McEwen supplied the Station, for nine Sabbaths in the autumn, and did excellent work. It is probable that a small Charch will be erected at Apsley shortly.

Harvey.—Rev. D. D. Jamieson completed his two years' engagement as Ordained Missionary in this field last October. Since then Mr. J. McKnight has supplied the Stations, and will continue in charge until the autumn.

Cardiff.—Mr. T. Osward was the Student Missionary at Cardiff, from April to October of last year. He preached at several different places, having conducted services in a new union school house near Wilberforce Railway Station.

#### PRESBYTERY OF LINDSAY.

We have three Mission fields in this Presbytery:-

- (1) Coboconk and Kinmount.
- (2) Minden and Haliburton.
- (3) Sebright and Uphill.

During the year there has been a change of Missionary in all the fields.

The Rev. Jas. McEwen begins his work at Coboconk and Kinmount with promise, and is sanguine if success.

Minden and Haliburton are in charge of the Rev. Jacob Steele, B.A., whose earnestness and devotion cannot but realize fruit.

A Student Catechist is in charge of Sebright and Uphill.

These are all old fields, suffering from the constant exodus of the younger members, making it difficult for us to hold our own. We are hopeful of the present staff on the field.

#### PRESBYTERY OF ORANGEVILLE.

There are two small Stations in connection with the Grand Valley congregation. Services have been held in them during the past winter, but there has been no organization as yet, and it is possible that the prospects may not justify organization in the future. The work is now carried on in connection with the Grand Valley congregation, from which they secure support. During the past year one hundred and sixty dollars (\$160) were expended by the congregation in the work. I know of no other Home Mission expenditure within the Presbysery.

#### PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE.

1. Ardtrea, Gray Church, Severn Bridge.—The reference to these Stations last year was not encouraging. There is cause for thankfulness in the report to be now given. During the past winter the field has been under the charge of Mr. A. E. Thompson, whose labours appear to have been attended with much blessing, and may therefore justify a longer notice than is usually given in these notes. On March 3rd Mr. Thompson wrote, "We are in the midst of a series of evangelistic meetings at Severn Bridge. Without any excitement the meetings are crewded, and the enquiry room always has one to fifteen every evening. We hope

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The Parry So depression pected un to see Severn a very different place. Many have accepted Christ already. . . . At Ardtrea we are working away in spite of opposition, and God is blessing us there." The Rev. Dr. Gray, Moderator of Session of these Stations, wrote on March 29th, "On the 21st February last I dispensed the Communion at Ardtrea. Four new communicants were admitted on profession, and I noticed a considerable improvement in the people. The Rev. G. Grant dispensed the Communion at Severn Bridge on the 21st March. Thirty-six communicants were admitted by profession, and one by certificate, in a place where our cause was very low. Yesterday I dispensed the Communion at Gray Church. Ten communicants were admitted, six by certificate, and four by profession. In four months under Mr. Thompson's labours fifty-one new members have been admitted, of whom forty-four were by profession, and seven by certificate. There has also been a considerable increase in the attendance, and a deep interest aroused throughout the Mission district."

Mr. Thompson has been reappointed for the summer.

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- 2. Washago, St. David's, Black River.—These Stations are weak. They were supplied last summer by the Students' Missionary Society, and received fortnightly supply during winter.
- 3. Medonte, including Moonstone, Victoria Harbour, and Vasey.—These Stations are still doing well under Mr. G. I. Craw. The Presbytery was able to reduce the grant by the sum of twenty-five dollars last year, and the same sum for the present year. It is hoped that they will be able to give a call in about six months.
- 4. Waubaushene, Fesserton, Coldwater.—Will be visited during summer with the view of inducing the ... to become a pastoral charge, and call a Minister.
- 5. Wyevale, Gibson, Van Vlack.—It is hoped that they will be in circumstances to become a settled charge.
- 6. Minesing, Midhurst, Edenvale.—Mr. W. E. Wallace's engagement as Ordained Missionary will terminate in October.
- 7. Banks, Gibraltar and St. Andrew's Church.—Are now removed from the list of Mission Stations. Mr. I. Lindsay, Licentiate, accepted a call, and was inducted to the charge on 29th December last.

It is well known in the Church, that the Rev. Professor John Campbell, of the Montreal Presbyterian College, has for years spent the summer in his residence on one of the Muskoka Lakes, and conducted divine service, which was attended not only by his family and guests, but by other summer visitors. He has also given aid to the Home Mission work of the Church by preaching and administering ordinances in the Mission Stations when required. In September last the Presbytery resolved to acquaint him of its thankful appreciation of the part taken by im in our Home Mission work.

#### PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE.

#### (Communicated by Rev. A. Findlay).

The progress in the northern portion of this Presbytery—in Muskoka and Parry Sound—though not all that might have been desired, yet considering the depression of business in almost every department, is as great as might be expected under existing circumstances.

The work of past years is beginning to bear fruit among some of the older fields.

Emsdale.—Which up to the present year was a field under Student and Catechist supply, have the services of an Ordained Missionary for the first time in their history. Interest in the work is deepening over the whole field, as is evidenced by the purchase of a manse property for the comfort of their Missionary, and the increased attendance at the services in all the Stations in this field.

Magnetawan.—Which some years ago enjoyed the services of an Ordained Missionary, but was constrained to go back to the old order of things because of the large emigration from the surrounding country to the North-West, have steadily overcome the difficulties of their circumstances, and are again rejoicing in the presence among them of their Ordained Missionary. The prospects here never looked brighter than they do at present. They too have purchased a manse for the use of the Missionary, evidence that they have faith in the forward movement. We hope soon to have application from these two fields to share in the benefits of the Augmentation fund.

Sprucedale.—Also would gladly have taken an Ordained Missionary at the present time, if the state of the funds had warranted the expenditure. We trust their turn is not far distant. From what we know of the spirit of the people, a little encouragement at present will help them far on in the way to becoming self-supporting charges.

The congregation at Burk's Falls we hope soon to see on the list of Augmented congregations, and with it the congregation at Powassan.

Other fields, which we might mention, are looking in the same direction, but we will not anticipate. A revival of business throughout the country would mean very much to many of our fields,

During the past year the Stations in Muskoka and Parry Sound, besides contributing to the support of ordinances among themselves, have contributed as follows to other objects: For Church and manse building and congregational expenses, \$1,130.00, and have received aid from our building fund to the sum of \$340.00.

To the Schemes of the Church they have contributed the sum of \$320.00, of which \$255.00 was for the Home Mission fund, \$53.00 for Augmentation, and \$12.00 to other funds.

#### PRESBYTERY OF OWEN SOUND.

Little change has been made in the Mission fields since last report. The continued agricultural depression has hindered progress in the direction of self-support. Three fields are supplied by Ordained Missionaries, and one by a Student. A few years ago nine Students were required for the Missions of the Presbytery. Five have been raised to the status of augmented or self-sustaining pastoral charges.

#### PRESBYTERY OF SAUGEEN.

During the past year the Mission work of the Saugeen Presbytery has passed through a number of changes. Two of the fields have been rearranged, the distance between Stations reduced, and the work of the Missionary made more effective. 1. Ayton and Mildmay are now to be operated together, with a

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Student in charge for the summer, 2. Normanby and Bethel, a newly formed congregation, have been united into a Mission, and the Rev. R. M. Croll pinced over them for a year. These two fields need help for a few years. The Home Mission Committee has made a grant of \$200 to each per annum. There is now some hope of better work being done through this new arrangement. The Bethel people have built a new Church and are hopeful as to the future. 3, Cedarville and Esptin have not yet taken steps to call a Minister. They are to be supplied again this summer by a Student. We hope soon to see them a settled charge.

#### PRESBYTERY OF GUELPH.

In this Presbytery Mr. Henry Knox, who was Ordained Missionary in St. Andrew's Church, Hawkesville and Linwood, died suddenly on the last day of February of the current year. The two Stations are at present supplied by Mr. S. Cunningham, a graduate Student of Knox College, but who had been prosecuting his studies for the Ministry in Scotland before coming to Canada.

The Station of Livingston Church, Baden, which had been organized and carried on for some time by the Presbytery of Paris, was, at the request of the people themselves, and the consent of that Presbytery, received by the Presbytery of Guetph, subject to the sanction of the Synod of Hamilton and London. This sanction was granted by that Court at its meeting in Paris on the 26th April last.

No change has taken place in the circumstances of Knox Church, Dracon, and Metz. They were supplied during the winter by Students from Knox College, and one of its Students is stationed there for the summer.

Eden Mills still enjoys the ministry of Mr. Strachan of Rockwood, and Gale Church, Elmira, that of Mr. Hamilton of Winterbourne.

There is little, if any, opportunity of extending Mission work in the bounds of this Presbytery.

#### PRESBYTERY OF ALGOMA.

In this widely extended Missionary Presbytery it is found very difficult, indeed impossible, to overtake fully all the Mission work which needs to be done, not because of want of men to do the work, but because of want of sufficient means to support them. The general depression and searcity of money, which affected our work severely a year ago, have continued throughout another year, and the result has been that many fields have been unable to raise the amounts expected of them toward the salaries of their Missionaries. This fact, together ith the straitened condition of the Home Mission fund, has led to some retrenchment in the work, which, however, it is hoped, may be only temporary. For example, the fishermen on the Duck Islands earnestly desired to have a Missionary sent to them for the present summer, but for lack of funds their request had to be declined. They have therefore no supply of religious service from any denomination. Two fields also which had been wrought formerly by the Students' Missionary Society, had to be left this year without supply for the same reason. These fields are Mills, on the Manitoulin Island, and Whitefish, or the "Soo" branch of the C. P. R. There are connected with these two fields eight preaching Stations. Another field, that of Chapleau, has had no Missionary of the Preshyterian Church appointed to it since last October, the Presbyterian element there being comparatively small, while the place is regularly supplied by an Ordained

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passed e dismore ith a Minister of the Methodist Church, and an Ordained Minister of the Church of England.

In all the fields that were occupied faithful work was done by the Missionaries, and in many instances it was very hard and laborious work. The ordinances were dispensed in nearly all the Stations, and many additions were made to the membership of the Church. Details of the different Mission fields need not be given here, as the Superintendent of Missions will report fully concerning them.

#### PRESBYTERY OF ALGOMA.

(Communicated by Rev. A. Findlay).

1st. The season just closed has been the most discouraging through which our work has passed since the organization of the Presbytery. The chief cause of this has been the almost utter failure of the lumber business during the winter, as well as the uncertainty connected with the pulp-wood trade. The larger portion of this product, like the saw-logs, finds its market on the American side of the lines. The practical result is, that those engaged in it have no certainty as to when or whether they shall be paid for their labour.

In two of the fields which have received appointments of Ordained Missionaries during the past year there are signs of decided advancement. On the Day Mills field, to which Mr. Garrioch was appointed a year ago, they are this season erecting a manse for his use.

At Tarbutt the old Church has become too small for the accommodation of the increasing congregation under Mr. Hartley.

At Spanish Station they are building a Church this year, the first to be erected in this little village.

Webbwood, till recently a Mission Station, but now on the list of Augumented congregations, provided a manse for the use of their pastor during-the past

At Irwins, a Station on St. Joseph's Island, a Church will be pushed forward with the opening of the season. At other points, in this widely scattered field, Churches would be under way this season but for the scarcity of funds.

There is a general expectation, however, that business will revive with the opening of the season. Mining operations, judging by the number of new companies which are being formed, will be an important industry in the near future. This will mean the circulation of more money among the people, which will help on the cause not a little.

2nd. In spite of the financial difficulties by which they are beset, the Stati ms and congregations in this Presbytery show a very lively interest in the work, both among themselves and in the Church at large.

There was expended by them on Church and manse building the sum of \$1,517.00, and they received out of the building fund, not included in the above, \$230.00.

Their contributions to the Schemes up to date are: Home Missions, \$533.70; Augumentation, \$162.30; other schemes, \$72.46; making a total of \$768.46.

The total amount from all sources during the year is \$1,276.67, of which \$939.63 is for the Home Mission fund, and \$230.48 for Augmentation.

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#### PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON.

This Presbytery has practically no Mission Stations. Ancaster is the only one on the list, and it will probably be removed in the autumn 'w connection with another field.

#### PRESBYTERY OF PARIS.

The Mission Station at Baden, where a very neat Church building has been erected, has been transferred to the Presbytery of Guelph. Alberton and Onondaga, formerly a regular charge, but wrought for the past two years as united Mission Stations, have been separated at the last meeting of Synod, Alberton being transferred from the Paris Presbytery to that of Hamilton, with a view to its being united with Ancaster. During the year a neat Mission Church has been erected in West Brantford, chiefly by the members of Zion Church, by whom it is sustained, as is also St. Andrew's Mission, in another part of the City.

#### PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

The Mission in North Ekfrid has made substantial progress during the past year. The last instalment of the Church debt has been paid off, and the congregation owns a very nice little Church, with splendid Church sheds, free of debt. We hope for enlargement in liberality and every other Christian grace. All of this will take time and patient effort. Mr. Jamieson, of Montreal College, did good work last summer. Mr. J. C. Bain, Catechist, followed this up in the winter This summer Mr. A. G. Sinclair. B.A., of Knox College, is on the field by appointment of the Home Mission Committee.

The Missions in London have made substantial progress also, Pottersburg and North London under Rev. Mr. Gilmore, and Waterloo Street Mission under Rev. Mr. Moffat, Licentiates. The latter Mission has been fully organized, and will likely be transferred to the Augmented list this year. Both of these Missions have been wholly sustained by the London Churches.

#### PRESBYTERY OF CHATHAM.

Harrow has made substantial progress in paying indebtedness on their Church and other buildings.

Price has paid two hundred dollars on sheds, and some balance on the manse, during the past year.

Bentpath is increasing in numbers, and raising more money for ordinary expenses,

Morpeth is preparing to bulld a Church at Scotland, and also arranging for a place of worship of their own in their own village.

Buxton is holding its own, and has the prospect of opening a new field this summer.

#### PRESBYTERY OF SARNIA.

Till recently there were three Mission fields in this Presbytery: 1. Duthil and Sombra. 2. Marthaville. 3. The Inwood field. Recently the Presbytery united into one field Inwood and Martheville. Should the working of the united field be found to be practicable it is expected that in about a year it will be put on the Augumented list as a regular congregation.

Duthil and Sombra are worked during the summer, with the consent of Presby tery, by the Missionary Society of the Presbyterian College, Montreal,

Three weak congregations have been for some time worked as Mission Telds, without expense to the Home Mission Committee or Augmentation Committee.

MANITORA, THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES AND BRITISH COLUMBIA. In the absence of Rev. Dr. Robertson, the Rev. C. W. Gordon took charge of the Reports from the North-West, as to the Mission work done over this wide-spread territory during the year. In order to obtain the fullest details he sent

out on the 1st March the following circular:-

#### TO WESTERN CONVENERS.

The absence of the Superintendent in the Old Country makes difficult the preparation of a Report of our western work, and only by the prompt, hearty and intelligent co-operation of the Home Mission Conveners of the western Presbyteries can a satisfactory Report be prepared. Statistical tables will furnish the bones—the flesh and blood necessary to a living Report must come from the experiences and impressions of men on the ground.

The Report this year should be full and effective, should place the Church tace to face with the present requirements of western work. The year before us will witness an extraordinary immigration. This means that extraordinary demands will be made upon our funds. Let the Church know the facts, and we need not fear the result, but the facts must be set before her.

The accompanying schedule is intended more as an indication of the character of information desired than as a form to be rigidly followed. We want to know facts about the Country, the People, and the Church, Peculiar Difficulties, Moral and Spiritual Condition, Expansion or Contraction of your Work, and your opinion as to the policy the Church should pursue in your Presbytery next year.

This schedule indicates chiefly the character of information desired. Put your remarks on the other side.

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#### MR. GORDON'S REPORT.

Steadily the centre of influence and of interest in Canada moves westward. As the development of the country proceeds, and its resources in lumber, fishries, agriculture and minerals are more fully discovered and developed, the attention of capitalists is being more and more concentrated upon Western Canada While this is true of the West as a whole, it is especially True of the Province of British Columbia, and of the Districts of Dauphin and the Rainy River. A Province that can export over one million tons of coal, produce lumber to the extent of eighty or ninety million feet, and fish to the value of nearly five , dlions of dollars, export gold and silver to the value of over nine millions of dellars, is bound, sooner or later, to make an impression upon the commercial world, and to arrest the attention of capitalists and induce them to invest their money. The improvement in mining methods, and the introduction of new mahinery, will add greatly to the output and to the profit of the British Columbia mines. The old mining district of Cariboo, which has produced sixty millions of dollars, forty millions of this within a radius of two miles, is again attracting the attention of capitalists, and, by the introduction of new machinery and scientific mining methods, will once more become famous as a gold-producing district. In the newer mining districts, the Kootenays and the Slocan, the development in mining during the last two years has been amazing, and the estimates of those who are in a position to know, and are conservative in their opinions, place the output for the next year at four or five times the last year's figure. While last year over three millions of dollars were produced from Rossland mines, it is expected that the production this year will be over nine millions of dollars, and where in the Slocan country 25 to 30 mines were working, it is expected that 30 to 50 paying mines will be at work next year. It is difficult to write sanely about this marvellous land, the discoveries in minerals are in places so rich and are distributed over so vast an extent of country.

In the Rainy River District, too, the mining development has reached large dimensions. The whole country is dotted with mines in various stages of progress, from those paying large dividends to those swallowing large investments, developing camps and prospecting outfits, and the opinion is steadily growing that in this district the future of mining is assured.

In the Dauphin country the development is in the line of agriculture, dairying, and cattle raising, and, while there is not the fever of excitement attending upon gold discovery and mine development, there are very good prospects of successful and prosperous settlements being established. Large contingents of farmers are entering the country, and settlements are being established, composed entirely of farmers from Nova Scotia and Ontario. These latter come well furnished and with ripe experience, and, under their hands, the country, now lying waste, will speedily assume the appearance of a well cultivated district of Eastern Canada.

All this development of resources and extension of settlement calls for the carnest attention of the Church, for the development of resources means the increase of population, and the quality of the resources determines largely the character of this population. Those entering the Dauphin country are the respectable, steady going, religiously trained farmers of Eastern Canada, who bring with

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them all their traditions, moral and religious, and may be expected to become a power for good in the new country. The mining districts, on the other hand, draw to them men from all countries, and of all sorts, the young Englishman with capital to invest and experience to gain; the American miner with no capital, but abundant experience; the lad from the Ontario Christlan home, fresh from the influences of Church and Sabbath School and Christian training; and the hardened rufflan, fleeing from justice, across the line. All nationalities are represented, every European country has its children here. With these mingle men from China, from Japan; men from Australia and New Zealand, and every other English speaking country in the world. All these kinds and classes meet in the mining camp in the mountains. They are possessed with the fever for gold, with the determination to get it at all hazards and at all costs. Standing open to welcome them are the doors of low opera houses, saloons, gambling dens, houses of prostitution. The excitements of the camp are all tinged with vice. There is an absence of everything regenerating, preservative and elevating. Is it any wonder that the young men from the bright, clean, English home, or from the quiet. Christian Ontario family, should soon forget his faith, abandon his principles, and sink into a mire of vice? This is what is happening every day in the mining camps of the West - In one town, for instance, where a Messionary of our Church is carrying on his work, with heroic endeavour and with partial success, there are reported, a theatre comique (a base play-house), 20 to 25 satoons, 22 houses of illfame, besides gambling dens and every low place of resort—this in a town with a population of about 1,000. Another Missionary reports the Sabbath given up to horse-racing, and to traffic in liquor. In another came 13,000 were taken over the bar of a single saloon in one week. What this means of ay the initiated can realize. Public opinion has nothing to say against the desecration of the Sabbath either by work or by sports: supports gambling as a legitimate amusement, and winks at the enormous evil of prostitution. The sins of Sabbath-breaking, gambling, drankenness and prostituting are everywhere prevalent throughout British Columbia, and constitute a most prious menace, not only to the spirituality, but even to the morality and deconey of the people, and consequently to the permanence of the institutions of civilization. At the same time, it is fair to say, and it is cheering to note, that in every mining camp there are to be found those who, in spite of their depressing surroundings, are maintaining, with heroic faith and courage, their Christian principles and Christian life. In every mining town there is a nucleus to be found ready to gather about and to uphold and strenghen the hands of any man who has the courage to represent among them the principles of our holy religion. There is much that the Church should be thankful for in regard to the newer West, but far more to give her serious concern. We are apt to think that Canada is safe from the desolation wrought upon other countries, near us and far away, by these evils now working in British Columbia. But it is folly to close our eyes to the fact that the spiritual and moral future of British Columbia is in serious danger, and that the final triumph of Christianity is still problematical.

The work of the Church has been attended this past year with many signs of encouragement. New Stations have been opened up, older Missions have been advanced a stage, and others have been consolidated into self-supporting charges. The response to Missionary work in western communities, and especially in British

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No or has any d Empire o way, the Columbia fields, has been in many cases marvellous. It is grateful to think of the work being done by our Missionaries in their various spheres of labour. One Missionary reports that he has been able to put down Sabbath horse-racing, Another was instrumental in breaking up a gambling organization in a little town in southern Manitoba, and to effectually stop gambling operations in the town. At another point a saloon-keeper was prevented from obtaining a liquor license at a village on the Canadian Pacific Railway, where over 200 car-loads of wheat were shipped. The advantage to the young farmer lads, in removing this temptation, can be easily understood. On the other hand, the Missionary is often a comfort and a help to the young and to the old, their friend in sickness, their guide in perplexity, and their inspiration to goodness. Here are some notes from Missionary letters:—" I visited an old Christian woman who was dying. She was 86 years old; she had not seen a Missionary for months. Her joy in welcoming a Missionary to her bedside seemed to me sufficient return for all the expenses of this Mission." Another writes:-"I came across a deaf mute, who, though living in a Christian country, knew nothing of even the rudiments of our Christian faith. I instructed him from time to time, and had the joy of seeing him accepting Christ as his Saviour. A man and his wife, who had become careless and indifferent to all the claims of religion, over the grave of their only child, came back again to their faith." Another reports his joy at seeing an old couple of over 70 years of age partake of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper for the first time. In one little Station 14 new members were received into the Church, and I was handed church lines from one man that were received 8 years ago.

In the overtaking of their work, our Missionaries are exposed in many cases to danger, and in all cases to hardship. Long distances are to be travelled in order that appointments may be kept. Storms are to be encountered, cold to be endured. One Missionary tells of how he had to travel 30 miles to a meeting in a schoolhouse in a new district in British Columbia. The trail was heavy, with a crust upon the snow. After various experiences in the way of drifts, upsets and breakages, he arrived at his destination, an hour late, to find forty people awaiting him there. The little school was dimly lit by three smoky lanterns, the air was suffecating, but the Missionary writes cheerfully at it was a good meeting, and ends up with the words, "Was it worth it?—I g s." He had to leave his field this spring, and he beseeches the Church to sen in a "clinker," for his neart is deep in his work. Instances might be multiplied indefinitely, and like experiences on the part of our Missionaries throughout the Territories and British Columbia.

The following are extracts from a prophlet issued last year by the Rev. Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of Missions:—

#### THE PRESENT OPPORTUNITY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

No one who knows Western Canada and its history for the past fifteen years has any doubt that it has a part to play in the destiny of the Dominion and of the Empire of no second-rate importance. The b ilding of the Canadian Pacific Railway, the establishment of a Pacific steamship service between British Columbia and the Orient, and the inaugurating of a fast Atlantic service, which will soon be

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cal. gns of accomplished, combine to give Canada, and specially Western Canada, a position of first importance in Imperial affairs. It is true that the development of the west has not been as rapid as western enthusiasts desire, still the time has not been lost. It has been established beyond any doubt that intelligent and patient industry can plant upon the prairies homes of easy comfort; that the climate, though undoubtedly vigorous, is conducive to vigorous health, and that the people can appreciate and make full use of the privilege of the highest education and culture where these are offered. The resources of the west in mineral wealth, just now beginning to be developed, together with those in fisheries, lumber, and agriculture, that have long been known, lend assurance to the conviction that Western Canada will hold ere long a very large population. This population, drawn as it is from the vigorous stocks of Northern Europe, cannot fail to do for America what these nations have done for Europe. But there are circumstances that make the present opportunity one especially for the Presbyterian Church.

The population is largely from Scottish and North of Ireland stock, and Presbyterian in belief. And as in every land the influence of the Presbyterian element is not to be determined by numbers. Three of the Superior Court Judges in Winnipeg were reared in Presbyterian homes, two are sons of the manse. Four of the five Ministers of the Crown are Presbyterians, and about half of the Legislature. The same is true of the Legislature of the Territories. In the management of the great commercial enterprises, in things educational, social, and professional, Presbyterians hold the leading place. The boss in a lumber camp, the foreman in a construction gang, the captain in a mine, ten chances in one has in him blood from Scotland or the north of Ireland. These people are going to make the West. The Church has to say what they shall make it.

#### THE CHURCH AND MANSE FUND.

The General Assembly started a Building Fund fourteen years ago to enable new and destitute districts to erect Churches and manses. When the Board placed in charge of this work began its operations, there were only eighteen Presbyterian Churches and three manses in the whole western country. During these fourteen years the Board has assisted in erecting 269 Churches and 56 manses or 325 buildings, in all valued at nearly half-a-million of dollars. Although only one-fifth of the capital entrusted to the Board has been expended in manses, the money saved in rent by those manses would yield a return of 9 per cent. on all the capital the Board ever controlled.

The Fund, however, is most inadequate, and unless larger help is forthcoming our work must be seriously hindered. A few facts will suggest the need. A mining village is visited. The Missionary looks round for a place where service can be held on Sabbath. There is no hall, schoolhouse, or other suitable place in the village. At last the use of a butcher's shop in course of erection is promised. The carpenters work ill nearly twelve o'clock at night, and the Missionary has to be on hand bright and early Sabbath morning to "rig up" the place for service. But the carpenters, appear in good time, though they ugree to confine themselves to

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working on the outside of the building till the service is over. Out of respect for the worship of God they suspend, work for one hour during service. Next Sabbath a new place has to be sought and fitted up, and no one knows where the service is to be held till the last moment. This does not help to secure a large audience.

Exploring a new district I concluded to conduct a service in a mining village. The only place I could get was a saloon, and the proprietor stipulated that business must not be Interfered with. Reaching the place a little before eleven, I found a number of men who did not look much like worshippers. In one corner were four playing cards, while others were sltting on chairs tilted up against the wainscotting. I was told I could use the bar as a pulpit. Before me stood a beer-pump, on my left hand stood casks containing liquors, and I was supported behind by bottles, decanters, demijohns, flasks, and all the other paraphernalia belonging to a properly appointed bar. I began with a psalm, but with the exception of a few grunts and groans and a soft derlsive whistle, no one joined. No hats were removed. A few men came in later and took seats and looked around quizzleally. Drouthy souls came in also, and the service had to be stopped till they were served. Some took their grog in silence, and others uttered words that in well-ordered journalism are indicated by dashes. Interruptions, dissents, questions, denials, followed in quick succession, and I had to at last appeal to their sense of fair-play, and offer to answer any questions at the close. This silenced would-be disturbers and I proceeded. At the closing prayer a number of hats came off, and two-thirds of the number joined in singing "Nearer, sly dod, to Thee." They were kind enough to pass a vote of thanks, and to ask me to come back. But amid such surroundings you cannot have a Sunday School, a Christian Endeavour meeting, a prayer meeting, nor can any Church expect to prosper.

The Board, at its every meeting, is forced to refuse the most earnest appeals for assistance to build small Churches. Within the last two months some six or eight such appeals have been rejected owing to the low state of the Fund. What this means to the Missionary in his lonely outpost, or to the little band of workers about him, it is quite impossible for people who have never been out of sight of Church to realize

#### THE TIME FOR ADVANCE IS NOW.

Things move quickly in a new country, public opinion is quickly formed, the moral tone is speedily fixed, the social life crystallizes into permanent forms with extraordinary rapidity. The developments in British Columbia are of the most striking character; whole valleys that a few months ago were the home of the wild goat and the grizzily bear are dotted with prospectors' camps, that rise rapidly into villages and towns. Where two years ago stood a lonely shack, now stands the town of Rossland with a population of 5,000, which is expected to become in lifteen months 25,000. The same rapid development is true of the Lake of the Woods district. It is confidently expected that next spring settlers will pour in thousands in these districts. Can we meet them with the Gospel? or must we see them drift past us? Now is the time; not a few years hence.

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#### SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

(Rev. E. D. McLaren, Convener).

During the past year the Home Mission work throughout the bounds of the Synod has been carried on not only with energy but also with a gratifying degree of success.

With the sum placed at their disposal by the Assembly's Committee, your Committee have been able to overtake with a large measure of efficiency the extensive work committed to their care; and after providing supply, even during the winter months, for all the fields in which it was considered advisable to maintain continuous service, they had the sactisfaction of reporting to the Assembly's Committee that out of the \$15,000 voted to them, they had only expended \$14, 770.75.

This amount was distributed amongst the different Presbyteries as follows:-

The Assembly's Committee were so gratified at finding that the expenditure in this Synod had been kept within the apportionment, that they agreed, without a dissenting voice, to increase the amount granted to this Synod for the present year to \$16,000, in order to permit of the extension of the work, especially in the southern portion of the Presbytery of Kamloops.

As might have been expected, the largest measure of progress within the bounds of the Synod has taken place in the Kamloops.

Two Mission fields, Vernon and Spallumeheen, have been transferred to the list of Augmented charges; two others, Nelson and Rossland, have become self-sustaining, while several fields, which were only opened during the past year, are likely, within a short time, to ask for the status of Augumented congregations.

There are at present under the care of your Committee tifty-eight Mission fields, viz.:

6 in the Presbytery of Victoria.

8 in the Presbytery of Westminster.

21 in the Presbytery of Kamloops.

11 in the Presbytery of Calgary.

12 in the Presbytery of Edmonton.

The estimates of expenditure for the present year, adopted by your Committee at their semi-annual meeting in March, and allowed by the Assembly's Committee, are as follows:—

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the grea ing to ea Your Committee would like to emphasize the extreme desirability of a larger degree of liberality toward the Home Mission fund, on the part of the congregations within the bounds of the Synod. For the year ending 31st March, 1896, the amount drawn from the fund for the work in this Synod was \$13,144.75, while the total contributions to the fund were only \$1,228.00.

Your Committee beg to recommend: --

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- 1. That each Presbytery be instructed to arrange, at as early a date as possible, for a conference with representatives of the Young People's Societies within its bounds, and to arge very strongly that each Society pledge itself to contribute annually a definite sum toward the Home Mission fund.
- That wherever practicable ministers of congregations, in which no Young People's Societies have yet been formed, be instructed to organize Young People's Home Missionary Societies.

#### DR. ROBERTSON'S VISIT TO THE BRITISH CHURCHES,

At the request of the Home Mission Committee, as intimated to last General Assembly, and with its authority, to present to the British Churches the claims of the North-West and British Columbia, Dr. Robertson left Canada end of October last on his Mission. Since that time he has been constantly engaged in preaching and addressing congregations and meetings on Sabbath days and week days, meeting with the Conveners of the various Colonial Committees, and appearing before Synods and General Assemblies in behalf of our work. Dr. Robertson's letters to the Convener, show how indefatigably he has persevered in his advocacy of North-West Missions, often in the face of obstacles that would have discouraged a less courageous and zealous deputy. That he received a cordial welcome from the officials, the leading elergymen and brethren in the several Churches, need hardly be said, although in many cases, where he expected large and continuous contributions for a period of years, his expectations here not realized. There are still to be found among the Churches in Britain, not a few, who do not realize the vastness of our Home Mission Territory, nor the claims which the Canadian Church has upon the Presbyterians in the mother-land. There are others, who in view of our progress as a Church during the past 25 years, and our liberality in other directions, cannot understand why we should need help at all. And there are large and wealthy congregations, who because of pressing obligations connected with Church building, or Schemes towards the support of which their Missionary contributions are pledged for years, are unable to assist us. In addition to this, there were last year, as indeed there are almost every year in Great Britain, Ministers of our Church, pleading for special contributions in aid of individual Churches, or Missions. These, it is presumed, have the endorsation of Presbyteries in some cases, in others they have not. In the opinion of your Committee, appeals of this kind should not be countenanced by the General Assembly, nor continued. Whether the response is much or little, they detract attention from the great Home Mission work of the Church, in whose interests we are endeavoring to enlist the sympathies and liberality of the British Churches.

Notwithstanding all these drawbacks, Dr. Robertson has deepened the interest in our Canadian Missions very materially, and has reached localities never visited before, and secured pledges from a goodly number of Churches for longer or

shorter periods, as well as individual contributions. Some congregations, that have given for the past three years, have intimated their inability to do so longer, but it is hoped that others will take their place.

Your Convener had hoped to present in the Assembly's Report, a formal detailed account by Dr. Robertson himself, of his labours in visiting the British Churches. But as his work was not completed, until almost the day of his sailing for Canada, it was impossible for him to prepare it. As he is now present, the Assembly will hear from his own lips what he has accomplished, and if it is thought necessary a detailed Report will be given to the Church at a later date.

#### HOME MISSION LEAFLET.

Partly on the ground of economy, and partly that there might be no seeming interierence with the very special appeal made last year in behalf of the deficit in the Foreign Mission fund, there has been only one issue of the Leaflet since last Assembly. Of the July number, containing a synopsis of the Report for 1895, nearly 20,000 copies were distributed among the Ministers, Young People's Societies, and congregations of the Church. Letters and cards are continually coming in inquiring about new issues, indicating that there is an increasing interest being aroused in the work of Home Missions, and a consequent increasing demand for literature on the subject. It is believed that the young people of the Church should be kept fully instructed with regard to all the Schemes of the Church, "especially that done within our own country," and the aim of this Committee is to Intuish information by this means two or three times a year at least.

At the meeting of the Committee in March it was agreed to continue the publication periodically of information regarding Home Mission work. Rev. A. Henderson was asked to forward the information to Rev. E. Scott for publication in the Record first, the matter there appearing to be afterwards issued in leaflet form under the supervision of Mr. Henderson and the Convener.

In order to enlist the sympathies and call forth the liberality of the Young People's Societies in special fields, letters have been sent to several of them, of which the following may be taken as a specimen:—

Please notify your Y. P. H. M. Society, that the field selected this year for their special prayers and financial support is the mission to the Meriaon Settlement in Alberta. Rev. Gavin Hamilton, a man of experience, has been appointed to the field. Between salary and expenses, about \$1,000 will be required this year. It is hoped that by making an extra effort, the H. M. Societies of London Presbytery will be able to relieve the H. M. Fund of the greater portion of this, if not the whole. With increased contributions from all the Societies the work can be done. Glencoe promises \$100. The Convener will be glad to hear from Societies what they hope to do.

This work is important, (a) for the sake of the Mormons themselves, it is our duty to try and Christianize them by the Gospel of Christ; (b) for the sake of our country, if they dare not practice polygamy, they defend and teach it; and (c) to save our fellow Christians in that district from being proselytized by another Gospel, "which is not another," for they are most zealous in disseminating their doctrines, and succeed in overthrowing the faith of some.

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#### YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

The following presents a condensed view of the formation and results of the various Young People's Societies in the Church, contributing to Home Missions more or less, so far as reported to the Convener, for the past year:—

#### PRESBYTERY OF QUEBEC.

Almost all our congregations have Young People's Associations connected with them, the majority being Christian Endeavor Societies connected with these Missionary operations, receive much consideration. From this source and from one Woman's Home Missionary Society about \$250 has been given to Home Missions. A Presbyterial Auxiliary in the interests of Home Missions is now being formed.

#### PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL.

Professor Ross, the Presbytery's representative at the Home Mission Committee, writes:—"I am not aware that a single Society exists in the Presbytery. I have had no opportunity of finding out. I shall make a fuller report of this and cognate matters next year."

#### PRESBYTERY OF LANARK AND RENFREW.

A Presbyterial Young People's Home Missionary Society has been in existence now for a number of years, and is doing good educative as well as practical work in the way of contributions.

Home Mission Societies or affiliated C. E. Societies exist in nearly all our congregations and Mission Stations, and it is hoped that very soon all will associate with the Presbyterial Society. An interesting Annual Meeting was held in the month of February in connection with the Presbytery, and part of one evening was devoted to conference on the subject. Honest, faithful work will bring the desired fruitage.


A considerable amount over \$2,000 was contributed by the Societies, and more is expected next year.

#### PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON.

So far as reports have come in, there are no distinctively Young People's Missionary Associations; but four of the Young People's Societies contributed to Home Missions, and these four have altogether contributed one hundred and forty-six dollars for that purpose. A Presbyterial Young People's Union has not yet been organized. A convention of our Societies was held some short time ago, when such a union was proposed, but it was out-voted. Instructions were given to arrange for another convention at as early a date as convenient, when it is hoped such a union will be formed.

#### PRESBYTERY OF WHITBY.

We have a Presbyterial union of Young People's Societies, in which nearly all our congregations are represented. An annual convention is held under the auspices of the Presbytery. These conventions have proved very helpful. The young people thus united are specially interested in the Home Mission work at Glenora, in the North-West, and have this year, through Dr. Warden, sent one hundred and twenty-five dollars to that field.







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#### PRESBYTERY OF LINDSAY.

A Presbyterial union has been formed. Not aware of any contributions to Home Missions,

#### PRESBYTERY OF TORONTO.

One or two changes have been effected in the Home Mission Stations. Swansen has been connected with Fern Avenue, and is now under the pastoral cure of Rev. R. C. Tibb. This arrangement gives good satisfaction. Kew Beach is now under the care of Rev. Mr. Pathune and is prospering. Malton has been disjoined from Dixie and Port Credit, and is now supplied by a Student with excellent prospects.

Fairbank and Fisherville.—This field has made decided progress under the vigorous work of Mr. Adams.

Chester is supplied by a Student, and there is hope of larger increase in numbers.

There are a few of such Societies within the Presbytery, but in the great majority of congregations Christian Endeavor Societies are in existence. Most of them have contributed to Home Missions. The view prevailed in the Presbytery that it is better to encourage our young people to give in the regular way to the Schemes of our own Church—paying all moneys through the Treasurer of the Church.

A Presbyterial union was formed a year ago.

#### PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE.

Salem, Gillies Hill and Sabbinton is still an assisted Mission field. The grant is a small one, only one dollar per week. It has been continuously supplied during the past year. There is as yet but one Church (Salem). Should the Mission continue to hold services every Sabbath in the three places, they will require two other Churches. We think the friends at Gillies Hill should at once begin to build. Considering the partial failure of crops, owing to the grasshopper plague, and the unprecedentedly low price for all kinds of farm produce this year, we make every allowance for them, fully confident that this field will give a good account of itself in the near future.

#### PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE.

The statistical reports show that there are fifty-two Young People's Societies, that \$265 were contributed by them for Home Mission fund.

A Presbyterial union of these Societies has been formed,

#### PRESBYTERY OF OWEN SOUND,

There are twenty-three Young People's Societies in the bounds of the Presbytery. They are all organized into a Presbyterial federation. It includes Young People's Societies, Home Mission Societies, and Christian Endeavor Societies. They have undertaken to raise at least the sum of \$150 per annum for Home Mission purposes, and have taken the Indian Peninsula field under their care. Their contributions are sent through the General Assembly's Home Mission Committee. Societies are left free to contribute to other Schemes, and some of them are doing so.

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#### PRESBYTERY OF SAUGEEN.

Young People's Missionary Associations are now in operation in almost all the congregations of the Saugeen Presbytery. These are earnestly urged to support the Missionary Schemes of our Church. Last year \$266 was contributed to Home, Foreign, Augmentation and French Missions. Several of the above Associations are Christian Endeavor Societies, but have fallen into line with the new methods of the Young People's Association. A Presbyterial union was formed recently by the Presbytery, and will hold its first meeting in July. We hope to see better work accomplished, and more money raised next year.

#### PRESBYTERY OF ALGOMA.

Young People's Societies of Christian Endeavor have during the past year been formed at White Lake, Little Current, Manitowaning, and probably at one or two other places which have not reported. There is no Presbyterial union of such Secieties. The amounts, if any, given to Home Missions have not been reported.

#### PRESBYTERY OF PARIS.

There are Young People's Societies in nearly every congregation in the Presbytery, that give to Home Missions and the other Schemes of the Church. A Presbyterial union has also been formed, which holds an Annual Meeting under the sanction and with the assistance of the Presbytery.

#### PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

There is a Young People's Home Missionary Presbyterial consisting of twenty-one congregational Societies. These contributed \$500 last year for the maintenance of Missionaries at Rossland, B.C., Powassan, in Parry Sound district, and Rainy River. A Presbyterial union of all Young People's Societies has just been organized. Rev. Thos. Wilson, London, is President of the Y.P.H.M.S., and Rev. R. Wm. Ross, M.A., is President of the Young People's Presbyterial union.

#### PRESBYTERY OF STRATFORD.

We have two Young People's Missionary Associations in connection with the Christian Endeavor Societies. They both collected during the year for Home Missions. I sent \$25.00 from Motherwellom the other day to Dr. Warden. I cannot at present say what is the amount sent from Avonbank, but some was collected.

We have as yet failed to form a Presbyterial union of the Young People's Society.

#### PRESBYTERY OF CHATHAM.

Most of the congregations in Presbytery have such Societies, either Christian Endeavor or those called by other names. There is no Presbyterial union in this Presbytery.

Many of them, but not all, contribute to Home Missions. St. Andrew's Christian Endeavor, of Chatham, gave last year \$35 to Home Missions.

I have not been able to ascertain how much the others have given.

#### PRESBYTERY OF MAITLAND.

Christian Endeavor Societies generally act as Home Missionary Associations.

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#### MISSION TO THE LUMBERMEN.

This department of the Home Mission work of our Church has been carried on much as in former years. The aim of this Society is to supply the men in the shanties with a variety of good reading, and thus keep them in touch with the great world beyond them. This is distributed in English, French and Gaelic, and literally "without money and without price," to thousands of men in far away places in our Canadian backwoods. We spent last year about \$325.00 in this work, and we doubt very much if there is any other department of our Church work which shows so much accomplished for the money expended. The reason of this is that we make use of existing agencies. The seven Colporteurs of the Bible Society, who cover the vast Ottawa region, earry our literature each year, and these men all testify to the value of the work. Then our own Ministers and Missionaries are contiguous to all the lumber fields which they visit, and carry our literature with them. Rev. J. A. Macdonald, of Whitney, writes: "I write to thank you on the behalf of hundreds of men in the lumber camps, as well as on my own behalf, for the large and beautiful and well selected lot of literature you sent us. It was very much appreciated. In 32 days I visited 30 camps, with 1,300 men in them, and travelled 440 miles." We have had some twenty men engaged in the work this past winter, and in the various parts of the vast lumbering regions. M. H. SCOTT,

#### STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETIES.

REPORT OF MISSION WORK DONE BY THE STUDENTS OF MORRIN COLLEGE.

During the summer months three of the Students were actively engaged in Mission work, viz:—

- 1. Mr. Pidgeon supplied Langley, B.C., where he had seven (7) Stations under his supervision. Preached in that locality for (22) twenty-two weeks, and received \$220 as a reward for his summer's work.
- 2. Mr. Reid supplied East Clifton, Sawyerville, and New Mexico for (23) twenty-three Sundays, and received \$250, including \$150 from the Home Mission Fund.
- 3. Mr. Wheeler supplied Portneuf for twenty-four Sundays, and received \$240. During the past fall and winter the Students have conducted a service each Sunday at Portneuf, and once a menth at Chaudiere. For the former work we have received \$5 a Sunday. Chaudiere has been supplied at our own expense.

During the Christmas vacation Hillhurst was supplied for three Sundays, and New Richmond for two Sundays. JAMES A. STUART,

Annual Report of the Students' Missionary Society of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, for 1896.

With the year 1896, this Society entered on the twenty-eighth year of its history. In that time we have been privileged to do useful and honoured work for the Master. During the summer months Students appointed and paid by us have laboured in the Mission fields throughout our country. We have always been interested in, and sustained to the extent of our ability, the work of evangelization among the Catholic French, and difficult as such work is we rejoice that the

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labour of our Missionaries has been attended with a fair degree of success. Foreign work in heathen lands has been kept prominently before our members at our regular meetings, and we have made generous donations of our funds to this department of the Church's work.

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The year just closed has not presented any new features in our work. Our regular fortnightly meetings have been well attended and made interesting by reports of the Society's work, and papers on general Missionary topics. No public meetings have been held during the past year, but nearly every field of Missionary enterprise has been systematically reviewed and discussed in the ordinary meetings of the Society. Our work has been enlarged since the last Annual Report issued from the press. All our Home Mission fields were again taken up, and three new places were occupied by our Missionaries. Two men went into the new regions along the upper course of the Ottawa, and another laboured under the auspices of our Society in the Presbytery of Sarnia. The work, as will be seen from the accompanying reports, has been carried on in all our fields with a most encouraging measure of success. At Cacouna, and in the country around Lake St. John, two French Students labouring under our Society encountered the difficulties peculiar to work among the French Catholics; but, as their reports will show, their labours were crowned with the Master's blessing.

We have been favoured during the past year by inspiring and most interesting addresses from several foreign Missionaries of our Church, who returned to Canada on furlough. The Rev. J. F. Smith, M.D., now of the Central India Mission; Rev. W. J. Jamieson, of Neemuch, and later, Rev. Murdech Mackenzie, of Honan, the last two being graduates of this College, at different times presented the foreign work of the Church to the consideration of the Society.

Our finances have kept pace with the enlargement of our work. Our fields have done nobly to sustain the Ordinances in their midst, and in nearly every instance have made special contributions to aid the Society in its work. The Student community has responded to the call made upon them in a manner truly generous. Tithing the income is the rule and not the exception now in our College. Owing to the enlargement of our work, our estimate for needed revenue has been increased from eight to eleven hundred dollars, but from all present indications we will close the financial year clear from debt. We take this opportunity to thank the congregations and individuals throughout our Church who have so generously supported us in the work. They have proved themselves benefactors to many a neglected part of our Master's vineyard, and many a soul to whom the light would otherwise have been denied, will rise up and bless them for their part in the good work.

#### TARBOLTON, MANITOBA.

Tarbolton is one of the choice fields of Manitoba. Although it does not cover a very wide area, there are connected with the different Stations in it over thirty families. In all, there are three preaching points at which service was held each Sabbath. At Tarbolton, the principal one, there is a comfortable Church sufficiently large to accommodate all who are within the bounds of that district. At Brierwood and Ralphton, the other points, service is held in school houses, which are not so convenient or satisfactory, but which serve the purpose until Churches are built. The difficulty here, as in other places, is that there are two or three denomi-

nations all holding services in the one place, and while they, as a rule, attend all the services and show a brotherly disposition towards one another in every way, yet none of them feel able, alone, to build a Church for themselves, although desirous of doing so. We find in most cases a desire to give liberally for the spiritual advantages received, but as is always found, some are unable and some are unwilling to make very great sacrifices. Sabbath Schools are held before the service at each of the Stations, and great interest is taken in the study of the lessons. Many capable and earnest teachers have been found to carry on the good work. Communion services were held in August, when eight new members were added to the roll, making in all fifty-three.

#### FORT WILLIAM WEST, ONTARIO.

This field is situated in the Presbytery of Superior, and consists of three Stations, Fort William West, Murillo, and Slate River Valley. Service was held at each place every Lord's Day, and the attendance was regular.

Fort William West is the site of the original town, which was marked out in the time of the Mackenzie Government. But the place has suffered severely by the removal of the C. P. R. works to Fort William East. A large number of houses are unoccupied, and many have been destroyed by fire; all the hotels are closed, and liquor is not sold, prohibition therefore reigns. Our service was well attended by all denominations, as it was the only one held in that part of the town in the evening. The Methodists and Presbyterians held prayer meetings alternately, and their Sabbath Schools are united. The Church was badly in need of repair, and this work was undertaken by the people. The interior of the building was renovated and put in a comfortable state for the winter. Repairs cost \$105.00, and this amount was paid by the congregaion. The success of the work was greatly due to the enthusiasm of the young people.

Murillo Is situated fourteen miles west of Fort William, on the eastern boundary of the rugged country which extends west to the prairies. It is a farming country. The silver mines in the vicinity are all closed down for the present. The scenery is good. Not far from Murillo are the Kakabeka Falls, on the Kaministiquia River. At this point the river leaps over a precipice about 110 feet high, and the scenery rivals Nlagara in rugged beauty. These falls are to be utilized for the purpose of furnishing electric power for the towns of Fort William and Pert Arthur. Chicago capitalists have the project in hand. In this way there is an opportunity for development, and should the mines open up, everything will become more prosperous in the locality. Service for the first two weeks was held in a school house two and one-half miles from Murillo; but later we moved to Murillo, where we met in the Town Hall, which was kindly placed at our disposal by the Township Council. Service was held here in the morning, and was well attended by all denominations, Catholic as well as Protestant. We were indebted to the Reyal Templars of Temperance for the use of their organ. A union Y.P.S.C.E. meets weekly. Mr. Alex. McLean donated a site for a Church, and the people unanimously decided to undertake the erection of a building. For this purpose they have about \$75.00 on hand, and Dr. Robertson has promised them aid to the extent of \$100. They will get the material ready this winter to build next

State River Valley is a new district, into which settlers are coming from other parts of Ontario. The mountains surrounding it contain silver, but the valley is

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an agricultural district. Last year Mr. S. MacLean visited this field and Murillo, and drew the attention of the Society to the needs of the people. A new Church was opened, practically free from debt, this summer. It is built on a plot of two acres, donated by the executors of the late Hou. Alexauder Morris, of Toronto. The future is a promising one. We were the only denomination holding worship there during the greater part of the summer. About a month ago the Methodists began service again. They had held a service there a year ago for some time, but had discontinued it.

Your Missionary spent a very pleasant summer in this field, and the people did all in their power to make it as agreeable as possible for him. Dr. Robertson visited the place in July, and was pleased with the appearance of the Mission. Communion was dispensed once during the summer by the Moderator, Rev. W. L. H. Rowand, B.A., of Fort William, and twenty-six persons enrolled themselves as members of the Church.

#### MILLS, ONT.

This field is situated about the centre of Manitoulin Island, some twelve miles from Gore Bay, and in the Presbytery of Algoma. It consists of four preaching Stations, Burpee, Mills, Britainville and Long Bay. Manitoulin Island is a beautiful place, especially in summer. The quality of the soil is good (what there is of it), but as a rule it is too shallow for agriculture. The settlers have to depend largely upon lumbering, and their winter's work, as a means of livelihood. They are kind-hearted and obliging, and as far as they can, make it pleasant for the Student. Your Missionary would specially mention the generosity of Mr. John Mackenzie, who so kindly boarded the Missionary free of charge, and in many ways showed a deep interest in the work.

We held service at Burpee and Mills every Sabbath, beginning May 3rd, and every succeeding Sabbath until September 14th. At Britainville and Long Bay we held service every fortnight. The attendance was good at each of the Stations, but remarkably so at Burpee and Long Bay.

At Mills we had a Y.P.S.C.E. and mid-week prayer meeting combined.

Long Bay is a resort for tourists during the summer, and Mr. J. K. McDonald, of Toronto, has taken advantage of the situation and built a beautiful summer house quite close to the bay; and he, his family and party made a welcome addition to our already large attendance. The work at Long Bay gave great promise of success. They have already, together with the Presbytery's grant and Mr. McDonald's handsome donation, subscribed over four hundred dollars for the erection of a new Church building. At present they hold service in the school house.

#### EAU CLAIRE, ONTARIO.

This field is situated in the Upper Ottawa Valley, in the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, and consists of two sections about twelve miles apart. One section is situated along the main line of the C.P.R. and has three preaching Stations, namely, Eau Claire, Amable, DuFond and Rutherglen. Les Erables, the other section of the field, is situated on the Ottawa River, about ten miles from the town of Mattawa, and has only one preaching Station. Service was held at each Station ones a fortnight. The attendance was good, but the work was not as satisfactory as ft would be were it possible to have weekly service.

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other ley is The people were very kind, and were always ready to welcome the Missionary to their homes. They are, for the most part, people who moved west from the older settled congregations near Pembroke and Renfrew since the C.P.R. has been built; and among them the Missionary found many staunch Presbyterians, who, although thankful for services during the summer, yet mourn the fact that they are compelled to be without any during the winter months.

#### ROCKLIFFE, ONTARIO.

The field assigned to me by our Missionary Society is situated in the western part of Renfrew County. Two of the Stations worked are on the main line of the C.P.R., and the third on the opposite side of the Ottawa River, in Quebec. The names of these three Stations are Rockliffe, Mackeys and Des Joachims. Service was held in the first two one Sabbath, and in the latter the following one. The country, as a rule, is largely Roman Catholic, and this fact seems to bind together more closely the few who assembled each Lord's Day to worship the one true God in a holier and purer faith. At Des Joachims there is a neat little Church, free of debt, but many who were once the support of it have moved away to other places, and, consequently, leaves it weak numerically and financially.

Many of the Roman Catholics attended our services at first after I went there, and expressed their desire to go again, but were forbidden by the strictures of their Church. They have no service during the winter months in these places, and they look forward with much pleasure to the spring, when they can go and listen again to the plain and simple story of "Jesus and his love." Only those who are deprived of such services really know how to appreciate them. Most of the elderly people are members of some Church. Communion was dispensed by Rev. G. A. Woodside, of Chalk River, during the summer. Preceding the service, three adults, on profession of faith in Christ, were baptized. On the whole, the work was encouraging, and the people very kind. This field cost the Society \$107.

#### SOMBRA AND DUTHILL, ONTARIO.

This Mission field is in the Presbytery of Sarnia, and consists of two preaching Stations, Sombra and Duthill.

Sombra Village is beautifully situated on the River St. Clair, about twenty miles from the town of Sarnia, and is rapidly becoming a favorite summer resort for those from inland places who are seeking rest and recreation.

The situation is most favorable as far as the temporal prosperity of the people is concerned, for the land throughout the whole township is very fertile, and the crops are usually good; but this place, like many others, is suffering from a superabundance of Churches, and as a result, our work there suffers with the rest.

The number of families belonging to the congregation, as may be seen from the statistical report, is but small, yet the work is in many respects hopeful. During the summer, services were held in the village every Lord's Day. The Sabbath School is now in a prosperous condition, being well attended by many of the children of all the Protestant denominations in the place. The success of this school is due largely to the Christian zeal of two of the women of the congregation. A Bible Class was also started during the summer, in which there was shown some interest; but the lack of a Missionary during the winter seriously hinders all the work.

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This I London, a In the ner tion, whice field was t At Duthill, which is about six miles inland, there was also one service every lord's Day, and a mid-week prayer meeting every fortnight. There is also a very prosperous Sabbath School. The work in Duthill is very encouraging, as there are no other Sabbath services in the immediate vicinity, and the people of all denominations are disposed to come to Church, and contribute to the support of the work; this is the more encouraging since it is a comparatively new settlement, and the amount contributed, as well as the interest taken in the support of the Gospel, is increasing each year.

Notwithstanding the fact that our membership both at Sombra and Duthill is small, yet for the summer months the fleid is self-sustaining, and it is to be hoped that some arrangement may be made by which both places may have the services of a Missionary during the winter as well as the summer.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed by the Moderator of Session, Rev. J. C. McKee, of Brigden.

Your Missionary met with the greatest kindness and hospitality at the hands of the people, and trusts that when the harvest of the Master is gathered in, there may be some fruit from the labours of the past summer.

#### NORTH EKFRID, ONTARIO.

This field is situated due west of London about twenty-five miles, being about midway between London and Glencoe. It is also midway between Glencoe and Strathroy, and is the only Mission in the London Presbytery.

Regular services were first commenced in the field in the spring of 1892, and supported largely by the Y.P.S.C.E. of Glencoe congregation. Since that time a near brick Church has been built, costing about \$1,100, which is now clear of debt, the last payment having been made last summer. Also there are sheds for the accommodation of horses and carriages, almost all the work of which was done voluntarily by the people. There is an organ also in the Church, which is paid for.

Your Missionary entered upon his work the first Sabbath of April, 1896, and continued regular services twice each Sabbath for twenty-six Sabbaths. Sabbath School and a weekly prayer meeting were held also, which were largely attended. A singing practice was commenced and continued weekly, in which all took a lively interest, the result of which was a marked improvement in the singing.

A Sabbath School pic-nic was held in a beautiful grove near the Church, in which several other schools united, and your Missionary will not soon forget the pleasant and profitable day spent with the children. The Sabbath School is one of the most promising features in connection with the Mission.

Anniversary services were held on the second Sabbath in June, and on the following evening a garden party was held. The total proceeds amounted to \$115.00. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed twice during the summer by the Moderator, Rev. A. Henderson, of Appin. Nine persons were received into membership with the Church; two by certificate, and seven on profession of faith.

This Mission is now in charge of Mr. Bain, a Catechist in the Presbytery of London, and, therefore, regular services will be held during the winter months. In the near future this Mission will be united with some neighboring congregation, which would be advisable. The amount contributed by the Society for this field was \$45.50.

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#### LOCHABER BAY, QUEBEC.

This Mission comprises a fine agricultural district on the Quebec side of the Ottawa River. It is a compact field, having only one preaching Station, and a small Protestant population grouped around it. Once it was a part of the neighboring congregation of Buckingham, but through unhappy dissensions became separate, and has been occupied as a Mission Station for several years. In all this part of the Province there is a gradual but perceptible decrease of the English Protestants, and this field is much weaker than it was in past years.

We have a near Church, at which morning and evening services were maintained, with a fair degree of attendance and interest. The labours of the Missionary also included teaching a Sabbath School previous to morning service, and conducting a prayer meeting in the week. The people are most kind, and evince a generous feeling in their liberal support of the Gospel Ordinances. The Sabbath School will be maintained during at least part of the winter.

In addition to his regular work, the Missionary gave a Sabbath afternoon service in the Protestant school house at Masson, six miles up the C.P.R. This is properly a part of the Buckingham congregation, and was taken up at the request of people and Minister, it being impossible to be supplied from Buckingham. The interest here was very encouraging, in face of most unfavourable conditions, a good number attended our service. The great natural advantages of this village are bound to make it important at no very distant day. We hope that religious interest may keep step with its material prosperity.

#### CACOUNA MISSION, QUEBEC.

I had many opportunities of talking to Roman Catholics last summer, and of visiting them in their homes. Led by curlosity, they questioned me about the doctrines of the Protestant Church. Some of those who talked to me had read their New Testaments carefully, and finding there no teaching on puragatory and the confessional, asked the priest by what authority the Roman Catholic Church taught these things. He, not knowing how to defend them on any reasonable grounds, announced on the following Sunday that there is "no purgatory; or, if there is, it is our life on earth. We compel no one to believe in it. As for the confessional, that also is of man, not of God." These very frank words would not have been altogether safe three hundred years ago; doubtless the Church of Rome is more liberal or more politic than formerly.

Some of the people having read that Christ is the only mediator between God and man, asked the priest why the Church taught that the Virgin and the Saints had power to intercede with God. To this the Curé answered, "The Church compels no man to pray to the Saints. Any man who puts his trust in any other than Christ shall perish." But next Sunday, thinking better of what he had said, he preached that Christ is too pure and holy to listen to the prayers of sinners; therefore men must needs pray to the Saints to intercede for them. Many thoughtful men are beginning to be weary of this crooked policy of their Church and the manifest inconsistency of its teaching, and they are ready to welcome a purer faith. Many, however, still live in superstitious dread of anything which savours of Protestautism. This priest is now very careful to avoid all dangerous topics, though, following the dictates of his reason, he rejects the doctrine of the infallibility of the Pope.

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I was frequently asked to begin the building of a Church, to which they might come to hear the Gospel preached. The people are often puzzled to know how we Protestants can know our sins are forgiven by God, when we never receive verbal assurance of it from our priests, as they do from theirs. Their faith in the miracles performed at the shrine of Ste. Anne de Benupré has received a rudo shock from the charge of Monseigneur Belley to them, to remain at home and not spend their money to no purpose. There is a great deal of illicit distilling done during the winter time, and also a good deal of whiskey smuggling. As a consequence, intemperance among the French peasants is rapidly on the increase. No sconer is the ice off the river than the habitants set out for the islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon to buy whiskey, and smuggle it home before the revenue cutter can arrive. The temptation to French Protestants to engage in this trade is very great.

At Morigean, M. Tremblay was converted through reading the New Testament, lie is a miller, and well known in the neighborhood, so the effect of his conversion is very marked. At his mill I met many of the people, and talked to them of religion. They were in a very subdued state, for Abbé Combes, of France, had announced that the world would come to an end in September. The dread of this event had a very good effect upon the caurch attendance, and the women were not satisfied unless they were shriven once a day.

The people of He Verte had some disagreement with M. Langis, the grand vicar, and two Redemptionist Fathers were sent out to heal the quarrel. Their teaching somewhat shocked the good men of He Verte; especially one statement, that a man is not guilty of theft so long as he does not steal anything worth more than four dollars. If by any accident he should happen to exceed this limit, then he has committed a deadly sin.

I understand that the feeling all through Quebee is very bitter against the priests on account of their attempts at coercion during the Dominion elections. The people have at last begun to think for themselves. They have set themselves against the teaching of the Catholic clergy in politics, and it may not be long before they reject their religious teaching also. This is not altogether a matter for congratulation, however, for many now look upon all religious instruction with suspicion or disgust, and interpret it, whether Catholic or Protestant, merely as a pretext for exacting money. Many, too, who are convinced of the falseness of their own Church, prefer to remain in it, nominally at least, rather than endure the petty prosecution to which they would be subjected if they were to leave it.

### CHICOUTIMI MISSION, QUEBEC.

The Lake St. John region is a very important and promising field for Mission work. In accordance with the wish of the Society, I went first to Roberval, which I found occupied by an Episcopal elergyman. As there were only two members of the Presbyterian Church here, I passed on to Chicoutimi, stopping on the way at Chambord.

At Chicoutimi I found some fifty-five members, most of whom spoke English. I arranged with the Rev. Thomas Muir that I should preach in French every Sunday evening and he in English in the morning. Shortly after this Mr. Muir fell ill, and

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purer vours opics. f the it became necessary for me to take both services. Besides preaching twice each Sunday and holding a weekly prayer meeting, I conducted an afternoon class for children.

In July I went to Deguen to visit a sick woman. She and her family were Pretestants—the only ones in that region—and were very grateful to me for my visit. I remained six days, engaging in prayer with the family and their friends. At the end of that time the woman died; but not before she had made confession of her faith in Christ and in His power to forgive sins. Her death opened a way to the hearts of the people, and in the three weeks of my stay there one man left the Church of Rome and others showed a willingness to follow his example. Many of these had been at one time Protestants and had become Roman Catholies only because there was no Protestant Minister in their neighbourhood. They expressed a wish that a Missionary might be sent them again and offered to help in building a school house in which the services might be held.

### WINTER WORK.

We have no fields directly under our control for the winter months, Individual Students are, however, supplying Mission Stations in the vicinity of Montreal, while others are labouring in Missions within the city. Many have found interesting employment in the various Sabbath Schools of the city Churches. The charitable institutions of the city receive, as in former years, services when they desire them. There are many spheres of useful training where Theological Students may become fitted for the great work of their lives.

### LEGACY.

The Society acknowledges with deepest gratitude the bequest of one thousand dollars from the estate of the late Robt. Anderson, of Montreal. Under the terms of the will, only the interest of this sum is available in the work of the Society. We thankfully record this first bequest for our work.

### THANKS.

We gladly express our thanks to our many friends throughout the Church who manifest so kindly and generous an interest in our work. We remember with particular gratitude those who in our various Missions gave material assistance to our Missionaries. We are gratified by the toyal way in which many of our Students have kept the work of the Society before the congregations of our Church. They wrought as they had opportunity, and did their work well. We pray that God, whose work it is, may abundantly bless all who participate in it in any way.

### OUTLOOK FOR THE SUMMER OF 1897.

During the past summer the Society supported ten Missionaries in the field, an increase of three over last year. We hope to do even better in the coming year; yet prudence demands that we make progress slowly. Having no reserve fund, we dare not go beyond the limit of our revenue. We have invited individual congregations to undertake the support of Missionaries; so far our offer has met with no response. We still promise to provide a field and supply a suitable Missionary to any who may be desirous of taking up this form of Christian work. From all Quebec, darkened by the pall of Romish superstition; from the new settlements on the prairies and among the mountains

### ANNUAL REPORT OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY MISSIONARY ASSO-CIATION FOR 1896-97.

### HOME BRANCH.

Again the circle of the year is completed, and the account of another summer's and session's work is presented to our friends. Encouraging reports come from the different fields, where good work has been done by those laboring under the supervision of this Association. During the summer months we had one Missionary in British Columbia, two in the North-West Territories, two in Manitoba, and one in Algoma, Ont. One of the Manitoba fields, which has been for some time under the care of the Association, was more than self-supporting. It has therefore been taken over by the Church Committee and a new and more needy field allotted to us.

Portsmouth and Collinsby, which for many years received winter supply from the Association, now have an Ordained Missionary, Rev. Godfrey Shore. This means a reduction of \$55.00 in our income, as when we supplied the field, the Students gave their services freely and the contributions received went into our Home Mission Fund. However we are glad the field has been able to take this step upwards.

We are pleased to report that Zion Church (formerly Pine Street Mission) is still progressing, and last summer was raised to the position of an Augmented congregation. Rev. Jno. D. Boyd, B.A., who has guided the Mission since its origin, was then inducted as pastor. We trust that this good work will continue to prosper and that it will receive from the other Presbyterian Churches of the city the hearty support which it deserves.

At the last annual meeting of the Association it was decided that henceforth its yearly report should be issued in December instead of in April. In this way we expect to bring our work more prominently before our friends throughout the Church; and we hope that next year the present deficit of \$89.29 will be wiped out, and that the prospect will then justify an extension of our work.

The following are reports from the ields occupied last summer:-

### HILTON, ST. JOSEPH'S ISLAND, ALGOMA.

St. Joseph's Island is situated in the upper part of Lake Huron and has a population of about 2,000. The lumbering industry is giving way to that of farming and dairying, and the Island is being gradually cleared and settled.

During the winter Mr. Steele again conducted services throughout the whole island, but last spring the Presbytery permanently divided the Hilton and Richard's Landing fields. It thus became necessary to elect elders for the former in order that it might have a Session to direct its work, but the election and ordination did not take place until after your Missionary left in the fall.

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Sabbath services were held fortnightly at Tenby Bay and Kaskawan, and weekly at Hilton and Irwin's school. Week-night services were conducted regularly at Irwin's throughout the summer, and once a fortnight for part of the time at Kaskawan. Your Missionary was received in a very kindly way on his return to take up the work for a second season, and he found the people ready to cooperate in furthering both the material and spiritual welfare of the congregation. The Sabbath Schools at Hilton and Kaskawan are doing good work, and efforts were made to make them more efficient by means of better equipment. In the fall a Sabbath School was organized at Irwin's, and at last accounts it was doing well.

The work on the new Church at Kaskawan was carried forward though not quite to completion, and a shelter was erected for the horses of those who drive to service. At Hilton about \$50.00 was raised towards paying off the small debt still remaining on the Church property, and a Ladies' Aid was organized and is doing excellent work.

At Irwin's there is great need for the erection of a Church as the school house was not large enough to comfortably accommodate the congregation. The Wednesday night services here were very encouraging. The average attendance was about 30, and a genuine interest was manifested by most of the young people of the congregation.

Tenby Bay was somewhat weaker numerically than it was the previous summer for the reason that the work there was shared in by the Anglicans and Free Methodists.

On the whole your Missionary found the work much more satisfactory than the previous summer, and he would again acknowledge the co-operation and kindness of the people of the Hilton field, and in doing so would again make special mention of Mrs. Archibald, whose generosity materially lessened the expense of the field to the Society.

After his return from the field last fall your Missionary appealed to the Sabbath School of Knox Church, Dundas, for help towards completing the Kaskawan Church and received a collection of \$33.00.

### HARGRAVE, MANITOBA.

Hargrave is on the main line of the C.P.R., about fifty miles west of Brandon, and between the towns of Virden and Elkhorn. The village possesses good elevators, stores, and post office; and the farming community about is a good one, wheat being raised in large quantities. The services were conducted in the school house every Sabbath morning with an attendance of 60. Prayer meeting was held every Thursday evening, attendance 20. A good organ was purchased and pald for during the summer. A singing class has also been successfully carried on for a

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of Brandon, sesses good a good one, the school ng was held and paid for ed on for a number of months and the musical talent is quite encouraging. This appointment nearly doubled its total contributions over any previous year, and the only hinderance to its progress is the lack of winter services. The people appreciate the interest our Missionary Society is manifesting in the field, and no doubt during the coming summer the work will be still more abundantly blessed.

Two Creeks is a settlement ten miles north of Hargrave. The people are of different denominations, but are mostly Presbyterian. No other service is held at any of the appointments, so most of the people attend our service. The people of Two Creeks attended well, the attendance averaging 60. We had also a good Sabbath School of 30, superintended by the Public School teacher. Six new members joined at the last Communion. At this appointment also your Missionary's labour was much more encouraging than during the previous summer. A number of families began to attend service for the first time, and there is still a possibility of improvement.

Rose Lea is fifteen miles north-west of Two Creeks. Service was held here formightly. There are four Presbyterian families and as many of other denominations. The great distance to be travelled over poor trails renders it difficult to hold service at the three appointments on one Sabbath. The attendance was fair.

Your Missionary wishes to thank the people for their uniform kindness during the two summers which he laboured on the field, and believes that our Society has done right in continuing to aid these friends who are most needy and most deserving.

### ARROW RIVER AND PARKISIMO, MANITOBA.

This field is situated north of the Assiniboine River, in the western part of Manitoba. It consists of three appointments, Arrow River, Parkisimo and Arrowton, at each of which services were held regularly every Sunday during the summer, involving a drive of over thirty miles. At the first two flourishing union Sunday Schools are conducted. There are altogether about twenty-five Presbyterian families on the field, and about an equal number of families in sympathy with the work. The total average attendance at all the appointments was about 220. Your Missionary found the work very pleasant, and on the whole satisfactory, and gratefully acknowledges the uniform kindness of the people in all parts of the field. On his departure the people of Arrowton made him a handsome cash present. Financially the field was more than self-sustaining as the following statement will show:—

### WELWYN, ASSINIBOIA.

Welwyn is situated on the north side of the C.P.R., about 200 miles west of Winnipeg. Very little of this district has been settled more than fourteen years and some of it quite recently, but the richness of the soil and the industry of the settlers give promise that this field will yet be one of the most flourishing in the North-West.

The Welwyn field had been under our Missionary Association for the two previous summers, and thanks to the good work done by your former Missionaries, the labour of carrying on the Master's work was greatly lightened.

A division was made in the field as it had been the year before, so that Hilburn and Rocanville were no longer included. This division considerably weakened the field financially, but some of the newly added Stations are very promising. Five Stations were supplied, Welwyn, Ferndale, Cambridge, Orangeville and New Hastings, service being conducted every Sabbath at Welwyn, and on every alternate Sabbath at each of the other eight Stations. Sabbath Schools and prayer meetings were also carried on during the summer. Services were well attended and all joined heartily in the worship of God.

Rev. Dr. Robertson paid the field a visit during the summer and gave a very interesting address on Mission work in the West.

Communion services were conducted in August by the Rev. John Redden of Moosomin, when eight adherents, on profession of faith, were admitted as members of the Church of Christ.

Your Missionary wishes to return his hearty thanks to the people for their ready co-operation in the work and their many kindnesses.

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### ESTEVAN, ASSINIBOIA.

Estevan is situated about 300 miles west of Winnipeg, in the south-eastern corner of Assiniboia, on a branch of the C.P.R., about 22 miles from the international boundary. The soil is not very fertile, and, though there is a mine here, there is not much shipping done on account of the inferior quality of the coal. Consequently the outlook for the present is not very promising.

This is the first summer that the field has been worked by the Q. U. M. A. The appointments are Estevan, Dunbar, and Portal. Service was held at each Station every Sabbath. At Estevan a union Sabbath School was taken charge of by the Public School teacher of the village. We also find a union prayer meeting here every week, conducted alternately by the Methodist Student and your Missionary.

The distance travelled every Sabbath in keeping these appointments was about 26 miles each way. There was also some work done along the railroad, extending almost as far west as Moosejaw.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed the last Sunday in June by the Rev. T. R. Scott of Oxbow. Your Missionary received every kindness at the hands of the people, and many sympathized with and aided him in the work.

### TRAIL, BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Trail, which is now one of the centres of attraction in the district of West Kootenay, has just begun its second year's growth. It is situated on the Columbia River, about twelve males from the boundary line of the United States, and in a district famous for its gold mines. Trail has a population of fifteen hundred, composed of different nationalities, though the Americans are in the majority.

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Your Missionary on arriving last spring found the religious interests of the people to have been sadly neglected. Service had been held a few times through the winter by the English Church Minister of Rossland, but so seldom and irregularly that very few attended. The axe, saw, and hammer could be heard in every direction upon the Sabbath. Sabbath desecration still prevails, but not to the same extent. Prostitution and drunkenness are not unknown. Seventeen liquor stores are doing a large trade.

The greatest difficulty during the fore part of the summer was the securing of a suitable building in which to meet. The school house was used for some time, but its location was very inconvenient. We canvassed for a new Church early in June. The lumber was secured and the building is now completed and furnished with a new organ, and will be free of debt before the end of the year. Service is conducted every Sabbath and a Christian Endeavor and prayer meeting is held through the week. Fortnightly services are also conducted by the Methodist and English Church Ministers from Rossland. We organized a Presbyterian Sabbath School, which is attended by all denominations. There are over seventy scholars.

The Sacrament was dispensed once during the summer by the Rev. Mr. Dcdds of Rossland. Our Church has over thirty members.

Trail is a promising field, and we believe a bright future is in store for the Church. An Ordained Missionary is to continue the work next spring, and I think it will not be long before the Presbyterian Church of Trail is self-supporting. Fortnightly services were also conducted at Waneta, which is a very small town on the international boundary. Your Missionary has found the people on both fields very kind and ever ready to entertain him, even if not willing to accept his message.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF KNOX COLLEGE MISSIONARY SOCIETY FOR 1896-97.

During the Session of 1844-45 the Knox College Students' Missionary Society was formed for the purpose of evangelizing the Province of Lower Canada. In 1873 the Society thought it best to formally abandon this work and to devote all its energies to sending the Gospel to the more recently settled parts of Canada, which are not provided with the means of grace by the Church, and to the fostering of a Missionary spirit among its members, and promoting of Missionary objects.

Ordinary and public meetings of the Society are held during the Session. At the ordinary fortnightly meetings, the Missionaries who labored under the Society present reports of their work, intelligence is received from Home and Foreign fields, and the general business of the Society is transacted. During the Session 1895-96 two public meetings were held. The first of these was addressed by the Rev. D. M. Ramsey, M.A., B.D., who delivered an able address, dealing with Missions, and the work of the Holy Spirit in Missions; also by Mr. G. R. Fasken,

B.A., on "The Relation of Culture to Missions." At the second meeting, the Rev. John Somerville, M.A., D.D., delivered an address full of valuable suggestions on "Practical Mission Work;" and by J. H. Brown, M.A., LL.B., on "Anglo-Saxon Supremacy and Foreign Missions." Hon. G. W. Ross and Prof. J. G. Hume acted as chairmen at these meetings.

The chief object to which the Society directs its energies is active work on the fields during the summer months. During the past summer the Society sent out thirty-two Missionaries, seven to fields in the West, from the Pacific Coast to Manitoba, ten within the bounds of Algoma Presbytery, two under Lanark and Renfrew Presbytery, eleven under Barrie Presbytery, one under Orangeville, and one under Chatham Presbyteries. The Missionaries' labors consist chiefly of pioneer work, many new Stations were opened up, and wherever the settlers were able to meet together services were held. One feature of Mission work specially attended to is house-to-house visitation. The people raise a large proportion of the funds necessary for the work of the Society. With a little aid from friends outside the fields the Society hopes not only to meet all liabilities, but to be enabled to open out a number of new fields next year. The average cost this year, over and above what the fields raised, is eighty-five dollars, so that virtually help to this extent insures the supply of one field for four or six months. The Society trusts that what has been accomplished may encourage those who have so liberally supported it in past years to contribute again this year.

This work, although under the care of the Society, is carried on in conformity with the regulations of the Home Mission Committee of the Church, and under the supervision of the Presbyteries in which the various fields are situated. The Society, therefore, does not constitute a Mission organization independent of the Church, but rather one working in harmony with it, desiring to supplement it in its efforts to reach the less settled parts of the country.

In addition to the work done in the fields during the summer, supply is given to three Stations in the city—Chester, Claremont and Wychwood. Mission work is also carried on by members of the Society, at the Gaol, Central Prison, Grace Hospital, Old Woman's Home, Sick Children's Hospital, Convalescent Home, and among the Chinese.

The following is a description of the fields taken up by the Society during the past summer. Statistics of the work done will be found in a table at the end.

### TRAIL CREEK.

The district of the Kootenay Valley, known as Trail Creek, is now well known to all readers of the daily and weekly press, by its connection with the gold fields. It is beautifully situated among the mountains. As the population consists of miners and speculators, there is much need of Mission work. This part of British Columbia is being rapidly opened up.

The Missionary held regular fortnightly services in Naksup, New Denver, Three Forks, and Sandon. Weekly services were conducted in Slocan City. Besides these he visited a number of the small mining camps as frequently as possible.

The work, although meeting with opposition in some places at the commencement, was not materially hindered, and many of the people have expressed their thanks to the Society for sending the Missionary among them,

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This is a great field for labor, and one in which good work may be done. It also needs to be taken hold of by the Church, in order that she may grow up as one of the fixed organizations of the community.

### FIELD, B.C.

This Mission field is situated on the main line of the C.P.R., in the Klcking Horse Pass, on either side of the summit of the Rocky Mountains.

On the ascent going west, Laggan is the first Station belonging to the Mission, a group of four or five houses containing a score of people, where monthly services were held under difficulties.

Hector is a section house near the summit. The section foreman, his wife, and half a dozen men, Germans, Swedes and English, seemed to appreciate the monthly visits of your Missionary.

Field, on the western slope at the foot of Mount Stephen, my headquarters, is a strictly railroad town of 65 or 70 people. Weekly services and Sabbath School were held with a fair proportion of the population in attendance. A Communion service was held here in August by Rev. Mr. Glassford, of Donald, when four were united with the Church, three by certificate, one by profession.

Ottertail, further west, has a small saw mill where four or five men find employment. Monthly services were attended and appreciated by all.

Palliser is another mill site, where an entirely adult population of from 30 to 40 men both appreciated and encouraged the efforts of the Missionary when on his weekly visits.

Your Missionary also assisted Rev. Mr. Glassford at Golden. Friendly treatment was met with everywhere, but the contempt for religion prevalent among some of the mén could not but be felt by your representative at times.

### MAPLE CREEK.

This field is located in Western Assinibola, on the main line of the C.P.R., and although organized some years ago, was for the first time this summer under the care of our Society. Services were held in Maple Creek one Sunday, morning and evening, and the following in the morning. In the afternoon of this Sunday a service was held at Fish Creek, twelve miles out, and in the evening at Grayburn, thirty miles distant from Maple Creek.

In Maple Creek the work was encouraging. In connection with the Church there is a healthy Christian Endeavor Society, and also a very prosperous Sunday School. The Missionary was here aided in his work by the support of a few faithful Christian workers. The people, although few in number, have shown commendable enterprise in erecting a neat and well furnished stone Church, which reflects credit on themselves and is an ornament to the village.

### MARYFIELD.

This field extends along the southern bank of the Pipestone in Eastern Assiniboia, and is about forty miles in length. It comprises a variety of country, but is mostly open prairie, well adapted for mixed farming, but is as yet but sparsely settled, there being only thirty-six Presbyterian families on the field.

Services were held at four points, at two of which Sabbath Schools were started, in which there was much interest taken by parents and children. The

services were well attended, and the work on the whole proved very interesting and encouraging. One new Station, Heron, was worked up to be added to the field next summer.

The Sacraments were dispensed by Rev. A. Reddon and Rev. J. Dobbin. There were eleven Baptisms, and five additional members sat at the Lord's Table.

Twelve dollars were raised for building purposes in addition to contributions to the Society.

### LONGLAKETON.

Longlaketon is situated about thirty miles north of Regina, in the district of Assinibola, sixteen miles north-east of Lumsden Station, on the line of railway connecting Prince Albert and Regina; Kennell is tweive miles east of Longlaketon in the Qu'Appelle Valley, and Pengarth, the third Station, is twenty miles northwest along the east side of Long Lake.

At Longlaketon, where there is a Church, service is held every week, and at Pengarth and Kennell fortnightly, in private houses. Sunday Schools are carried on at all of the Stations with increasing interest, and at Longlaketon a prayer-meeting was held weekly, from house to house, during the summer.

The people in the Qu'Appelle Valley are engaged in ranching, keeping large herds of cattle and horses. General farming is carried on successfully in other parts of the field.

Rev. A. Matheson, of Qu'Appelie Station, visited the field in August, and dispensed the Sacraments at Longlaketon and Pengarth. Two members were received by confession of faith.

This field, besides supporting the Society, contributes to nearly all the Schemes of the Church.

### BROOKDALE.

This Mission field, worked by our Missionary Society for the past four years, is situated in North Cypress, Manitoba, about eighteen miles north-west of Carberry, in the district known as the "Great Plains," famed for their beauty and fertility.

The field comprises three Stations, the central one being Brookdale, the remaining two, Oberon, eighteen miles north-east, and Woodlea, six miles southwest. Regular weekly service was held at each Station, and a prayer meeting at two of the points. The Missionary was much encouraged in his work by some earnest Christians on the field. A spirit of liberality towards the Missionary's salary and the Schemes of the Church was very gratifying.

It is expected that regular winter supply will be provided for this field.

### GILBERT PLAINS.

This is the second year that the Students' Missionary Society has occupied this field. It is situated in North-Western Manitoba. The number of Stations worked this summer was the same as last. The Missionary met with a cordial reception.

The services were all fairly well attended, and considerable interest was manifested in the work. The Sabbath School work is one which is of the greatest importance.

The finances of this field have been really increased by the fact that the Missionary has taught school for six months.

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### COLLINS' INLET.

On north shore of Georgian Bay, sixteen miles east of Killarney, the nearest port. Supplied by our Society for six years. The last two summers Student has taught school during the week, in addition to the Missionary's regular duties. Milling the only industry. Fifty men employed at mill during summer. Only eleven families resident; four of these Roman Catholic. No chance of building up a Church, but urgent need of a Gospel messenger during at least the milling season. For six months of the year no day school and no Church services. Sabbath School continued part of winter by the Company's bookkeeper, who also taught a Bible class during the summer. Sabbath services were held morning and evening; also prayer meeting and Sabbath School weekly. Much encouragement and help given by the Company's officers, and by the Protestant families on the field.

### WAHNAPITÆ

This field, comprising Wahnapitæ and Markstay, is in the district of Algoma, east of Sudbury, on the line of the C.P.R. Owing to the dulness of the lumbering trade this summer the population of both places was small.

Weekly services were held, but the attendance was necessarily small.

Weekly prayer meeting and Sabbath School were also held at Wahnapitæ.

The people, though small in number, ably supported the Missionary. The Sacraments were not dispensed.

### WHITEFISH.

This field comprises Whitefish, Worthington and the Inez Mine, all a short distance west of Sudbury on the C.P.R. All are in a small way mining or lumbering centres, with prospects of becoming important in the near future.

Inez Mine has been almost deserted for the last few years, but work was resumed this summer and the place is now speedily being repopulated. Services were resumed in June.

Weekly service was held at each Station. At Whitefish there was a weekly prayer meeting and Sabbath School.

The work throughout was encouraging.

R. W. A. Campbell, M.A., of Coppercliff, dispensed the Sacraments in September. One member was added on profession of faith.

### LITTLE RAPIDS.

The five Stations in this field—Little Rapids, Kirkwood, Ansonia, Cloudslee. McBeth's Bay—are situated near the "Soo" branch of the C.P.R. They are principally farming settlements, though Ansonia and Little Rapids see a good deal of river driving.

At Little Rapids a Church was built and fitted up very neatly. On Aguust 30 it was formally opened and dedicated by Rev. W. C. Armstrong, M.A., of Thessalon. A Young People's Society was organized and held weekly meetings. An energetic staff of teachers kept the Sabbath School in a flourishing condition.

The young people at McBeth's Bay organized a Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, and have made it a success.

Sacrament was dispensed at McBeth's Bay, Ansonia, Little Rapids, by Rev. Mr. Armstrong, of Thessalon, and at Cloudslee by Rev. D. H. McLennan, M.A.,

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of Bruce Mines, when thirty new members in all were sided to the roll by profession of faith and certificate. Eight elders were elected, ordained and inducted at the different points.

The field contributed \$2.62 towards the Presbytery and Home Mission funds of the Church,

The work has been one entirely of organization. Its outlook is bright.

### IRON BRIDGE.

The Iron Bridge field lies about 20 miles east of Thessalon, Algoma. The chief occupation of the settlers is agriculture, which can be carried on very successfully in many parts of the field. Besides, the lumbering and pulp wood industries are carried on to some extent.

The field consists of three Stations, at each of which service was held every Subbath

At Thompson the services were held in the school house. The attendance was only fair, but otherwise the work was very encouraging. A Sabbath School was conducted entirely by the members. Five miles from this is Iron Bridge, where the services were held in the Orange Hall. Eleven miles north-west of this is Bellingham. This was formerly divided into two appointments, but three years ago these were united in one. The services have since been held in an old lumber camp, but a new Church building was begun this summer. Two Sabbath Schools were conducted at this place by local workers.

Prayer meetings were carried on weekly at all three appointments and valuable assistance was given the Missionary.

The prospects for the whole field are encouraging. A number of new settlers came in during the year, and with painstaking work good congregations may be built up.

In August the field was visited by the Rev. J. Garrioch, of Sowerby, who dispensed the Sacraments.

Besides contributions to the Society, the field raised 7.38 for Presbytery and Home Mission funds.

### SOUTH BAY.

South Bay is situated in the south-eastern part of Manitoulin Island, and comprises four Stations.

South Bay Mouth is a small fishing village to the south of the Island. As fishing has been light, and because there is no school, the number of families has decreased. The Sabbath School is conducted by one of the members.

Tehkummah and the Slash had fortnightly services. The Methodists also occupied the former and the English Church the latter.

White Lake is a farming settlement. The weekly services were well attended. A Christian Endeavor Society organized in June was a very encouraging feature in the work. A shed was erected here during the summer.

The Missionary was welcomed wherever he went, and had the hearty support of the people.

### KORAH.

Bounded on the south by the St. Mary River, on the north by a chain of rocks, and lying west of the town of Sault Ste. Marie, is a fertile belt of land comprising part of the townships of Korah, Park, Prince and Awenge. In this

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valley are three Mission Stations, Canal, Base Line and West Korah, which in '91, '92 and '93 were taken up by our Society. From '93 to '96 the field was under the care of the H. M. Committee, but have been supplied by the Society during the past summer.

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Sabbath services were held weekly at each of the Stations, and a weekly prayer meeting at the Canai. At Base Line the Christian Endeavor Society held weekly meetings, which were well attended, and we believe were a means of good to all who were interested in them. Sunday schools were also conducted at all the Stations.

The Missionary must ever be grateful to those who so heartily helped him in the carrying on of the work.

No charge being made for board, the expense of the Society was greatly lessened.

On June 28th and September 20th, the Rev. N. A. Duncan, of Sault Ste. Marie, administered the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper.

### SPRAGGE.

There are four Stations in this field, all situated on the Soo Line of the C.P.R.—Cutler, Spragge (Cook's Mills formerly), Algoma and Blind River. At all except Algoma, a railway town, the people are engaged in lumbering.

Services were held at each of the Stations every two weeks, and during August and September weekly at Spragge. Sabbath Schools were also held at the different Stations, all being union schools.

At Cutler, where they are mostly Americans, there is only one Presbyterian family, but here, as at the other Stations, people come to service irrespective of denomination. There are a few earnest workers here, and the Sabbath School is successfully carried on. Prayer meetings were started during September.

Spragge, formerly the strongest Station, lost a number of families this year, but services were well attended. A Christian Endeavor Society and prayer meeting were also held during the week.

Algoma has only a few Protestant families now. The Presbyterian Missionary alone held service here during the greater part of summer.

As there are quite a number of people at Blind River, services were very well attended, and there is promise of further growth, as several companies have made it their headquarters.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed by Rev. John Garrioch, of Day Mills, in August, when three persons united with the Church on profession of faith and one by certificate.

### MASSEY.

This field is on the "Soo" branch of the C.P.R., and is made up of three Stations—Massey, Walford, and Spanish.

Walford is a farming settlement. Our people there are fairly numerous, and when properly organized should soon become strong. A union Anglican and Presbyterian Church has been built.

At Spanish our services were held in the house of Mr. Trowbridge, to whom the thanks of the Society are specially due. No Protestant services are held here besides our own, and the prospects of development are good. Steps have been taken towards the erection of a Church.

Massey is a lumbering centre with a mixed population. There is a large field for work here and promise of good results.

Services were held every Sabbath at each of these Stations. At Massey marked interest was shown in the prayer meeting. At Walford, during the whole summer, the Christian Endeavor weekly meeting was largely attended. At Spanish no week-night meeting has yet been started. At all places the relations between the people and the Missionary were most cordial, and the Society hereby wishes to gratefully acknowledge the many kindnesses shown its representative.

The field contributed \$6.60 to Schemes of the Church.

### SQUAW ISLAND.

This field is on a pretty little island of the same name, in the Georgian Bay, about five or six miles east of the Manitoulin. The island is the temporary home of a number of fishermen and their families. This summer there were sixteen families, and besides these about forty men.

Morning and evening service is held in the Church each Subbath and Subbath School in the afternoon. Prayer meeting each Wednesday evening. Day school was taught by the Student for part of the summer, but the attendance was very small, as there were very few children of school age on the island.

Mr. A. T. Laing, B.A., of the S.P.S., Toronto, presented the Mission with twenty-five hymn books for this field—a much appreciated gift.

### KILWORTHY.

Eight miles south of Gravenhurst is the settlement of Kilworthy, comprising about thirty families, many of whom are Lutherans. Services were held at this point morning and evening, and at Morrison Lake, nine miles west, every Sunday afternoon.

The late Mr. J. B. Torrance, who was one of the most devoted Missionaries of the Society, laboured on this field during the past summer. His work was cut short by his alarmingly sudder death by drowning on September 25th, but those among whom he laboured bear testimony to his consecrated service.

### BUCK LAKE.

The work was carried on in this field during six months, from the first Sunday in April until the first Sunday in October. The field is beautifully situated in one of the most picturesque localities in Muskoka.

The services held in the different Stations were well attended, and the people seemed to be much interested in the work. The Sabbath School work is one which is of great importance and promises to be a great help in the future, as it is now training those who will soon become influential in their communities.

The prospects for this field are good. There will always be, at nearly all the Stations, a number of families, and it will be necessary to keep the cause of Christ strongly before these people, as there will always be more families moving in.

### ASPDIN.

This field is in the district of Muskoka, about ten miles west of Huntsville, and was taken up this year by our Society for the first time. It consists of two Stations: Aspdin and Chalmer Church, yearly. Services were held in each of these places weekly, in which a deep interest was manifested. In connection with the

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Station in Aspdin, a Sabbath School was conducted, at which there was a good attendance. Prayer meetings and singing classes were held weekly in this part of the field.

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The Student had the pleasure of doing some pioneer work in Strond's settlement, about seven miles west of Aspdin, and the services held there were greatly appreciated by the people.

The Rev. J. Sieveright, of Huntsville, visited the field in August and dispensed the Sacraments, receiving two new members into the Church.

### FRANKLIN.

This field is in northern Muskoka, and lies amid the bays of the Lake of Bays. One new Station was added to the field which had formerly been worked in connection with another field; this made it impossible to work the field the same as had been done in former years.

The main Stations are now Dwight, McCutcheon and Dorset. At each of these piaces there is a comfortable little frame Church and a few warm-hearted people.

In Dwight regular services were held and were well attended. We have also a Sabbath School and weekly prayer meeting, which were also well attended.

McCutcheon is making more progress, having done considerable work on their Church; it is now a very comfortable place of worship. Two leading men in the place united with the Church the first time Sacrament was dispensed. We also succeeded in organizing a Sabbath School in July, which was well attended up to the time of leaving. The people also are anxious to continue the school through the winter.

Dorset was added to this field. Services were held weekly on the Sabbath and were fairly well attended. The place is quiet since the lumbermen have moved back, yet the prospect for a good work being done among the settlers is promising.

Occasional services were held in Portage and Haystack Bay, which were also well attended.

### LORING.

This field is situated in the Parry Sound District, about 42 miles west of Trout Creek. It has now been under the Society for a number of years. Services were held during the summer at Loring, West Loring and Wolf River, the first having a weekly service and the other two a fortnightly one. This year progress was made in the erection of a Church, and it is hoped that it will be ready for use when the services open in the spring. On September 13th, Rev. W. G. Smith, of Callender, dispensed the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

### COMMANDA.

This field lies in the northern part of the District of Parry Sound, about 15 miles west of the Northern Railway. It is a farming community, and the field is over 25 miles in length; it comprises four Stations, Rye, Commanda, Nipissing and Sharp's Corners, the last of which was taken up for the first time this year. There are Churches at Commanda and Nipissing, but the services were held in school houses at the other two Stations. Fortnightly service was conducted at each of the Stations, though the attendance in the most of cases was rather small.

Union Sabbath Schools were conducted at Commanda and Rye, and a considerable amount of interest was manifested in this department of Christian work by both tenchers and scholars. A union prayer meeting was held each Wednesday evening at Commanda.

Rev. W. G. Smith, of Callender, visited the field on the third Sabbath of September and dispensed the Sacraments, on which occasion two young people observed the Lord's death in His appointed way for the first time.

### CARLING.

This field was during the last summer taken up by the Society for the first time, the work there having previously been carried on by the Home Mission Cmmmittee. The field is situated in the district of Parry Sound, about nine miles from the town of Parry Sound. It comprises three Stations—Carling, Shebeshekong and Dewe. At Dewe fortnightly services were held and weekly services with Sabbath Schools at the other two Stations. Weekly prayer was held at Shebeshekong, at which the attendance was good and the work encouraging. From the beginning the people manifested a lively interest in the work. The Sabbath Schools will be carried on during winter months, though the people will be deprived of the regular means of grace.

Rev. Mr. Childerhose visited the field in July and dispensed the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper.

### LAKE JOSEPH.

This field is situated in a favorite section of the Muskoka District, and is composed of four Stations, Port Carling, Killiecrankie and Glenifer Braes, Stoney Brae and Craigie Lea.

At Port Carling and Killiecrankie and Glenifer Braes, service was held every week; at Stoney Brae and Craigie Lea every other week, thus making a distance of about twenty-two miles a Sabbath, eighteen miles of which the Student rowed (generally with help), and walked the other four. Two prayer meetings were conducted during the week, one at Killiecrankie and the other at Foot's Bay.

There are a few earnest Christian workers on the field, and the outlook on the whole is hopeful. The Student received much encouragement from the tourists who made up the greater part of the congregations, and who took a deep interest in the work. The thanks of the Society are due those who permitted services to be held in their houses during the summer.

On August 16th the Rev. J. G. Shearer, B.A., of Hamilton, dispensed the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at Port Carling, when five new members were received into the Church, three by certificate and two by profession of faith.

### BERRIEDALE.

In the district of Parry Sound this field lies situated between Burk's Falls and Sundridge. It is composed of four Stations: Berriedale, where a weekly service and Sabbath School were held and two prayer meetings every alternate week; Ely, Hartfell and Harkness, where fortnightly services were held, and a weekly Sabbath School, with weekly prayer meetings at Ely and Hartfell.

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A Christian Endeavor Society was formed at Ely and was the means of having the weekly prayer meeting established there, and also of helping the work considerably. All the prayer meetings were well attended, being a source of great spiritual blessing.

The work was very encouraging in many respects, and the people took a deep interest in the work of the field. Rev. J. J. Cochrane, M.A., of Sundridge visited the field in August and dispensed the Sacraments, when tweive entered into full communion on profession of their faith in Christ.

Considering the present status of the field, there is every reason for gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the prosperity and progress manifested in this part of His vineyard.

### BLACK RIVER.

In this field there are three Stations: Washago, a small village at the northern extremity of Lake Couchiching, and two in the township of Rama, in North Ontario.

At Washago there is a neat frame Church. Necessary improvements were made on the building, at considerable cost, this summer. St. David's Church, Rama, is a creditable structure, and is fully paid for.

At the third Station the service was held in the school house, which, by a provision in the deed, is at the disposal of the Presbyterian Church for purposes of worship.

Occasional services were also held at Ragged Rapids, a small settlement of eight families in North Victoria.

At all places the services were well attended and profitable.

At the celebration of the Lord's Supper the Rev. J. Skene, of Hillsdale, preached. Six persons were added to the Church, three at Washago, two at the Town Half Settlement, and one at St. David's.

### BETHUNE.

This field lies along the line of the Ottawa, Arnprior and Parry Sound Railway, in the district of Parry Sound.

The building of the railway has induced a large number of people to settle in that part of the country.

As the road is still in process of construction, the number of men employed on it added largely to the population of the field. These were kept supplied with literature during the summer.

The services were well attended, and encouraging interest shown in everything pertaining to the Mission.

Kearney, one of the leading Stations, is uniting with an adjoining congregation to call an ordained man.

Rev. Mr. Carswell, of Burk's Falls, visited the field and dispensed the Sacraments.

### KIPPEWA.

This field is situated on Lake Kippewn in Quebec, and extends to the foot of Lake Temiscamingue. It comprises five Stations, viz., Kippewn, Gordon Creek, "The Soo," Sunnyside and Hunter's Point. With the exception of Sunnyside, services were held on an average fortnightly, and at Sunnyside occasionally, as it was practically closed up during part of the summer. Kippewn is beautifully

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s and ervice week; eekly situated on a most picturesque lake bearing the same name. It is only a very small place, yet on account of its being the terminus of a branch of the C.P.R., and the point of transfer for steamboat traffic, consequent on the lumbering that is very extensively carried on north of here, it is very lively.

Sunnyside and Hunter's Point are twelve and twenty-six miles respectively up the lake. This was travelled by steamer, and although the steamboats here are owned and run by Catholics, your Missionary always travelled free of charge. Seven miles west of Kippewa along the railway is Gordon Creek; here a large mill and other lumber industries were running all summer, though most of the employers are French Roman Catholics. A short distance west of here is "The Soo," where a few Protestant families are settled.

Owing to the roughness of the country, agriculture is very little carried on. Your Missionary received a hearty welcome on his arrival, and the hearty cooperation in his work from all denominations; Catholics attended many of the services, and, in cases, aided in the finances of the field. Although the population on the field is very small, yet they contributed very liberally, and we are glad to note that an Ordained Missionary is to visit the field throughout the winter. Rev. A. Findlay, of Barrie, visited the field the second Sabbath in August, and dispensed the Sacrament at Kippewa and Gordon Creek, where two were baptized and one was received into the Church on profession of faith in Christ. The field raised \$19.49 for Home Mission fund, besides its contributions to the Society.

### TEMISCAMINGUE.

The Missionary had to travel over a distance of about 100 miles on this field. There were six Stations at which services were held regularly, besides the lumbering camps whenever there was opportunity. Two of the places were visited once every two weeks; the other places, which were not so important, were visited once a month. The travelling was done mainly by steamer, but the rowboa and canoe had to be used also.

The Presbyterian cause, considering the size of the place, is strong in Haileybury and Liskeard. Mr. Findlay, Superintendent of Missions, laid the foundation of a future congregation in Haileybury. At this place we received as a free gift, from Mr. Farr, a member of the Anglican Church, two town lots for Church purposes. The location of these lots was chosen and trustees appointed. The people are anxious for the services of an Ordained Missionary. This is certainly what the field requires.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed at Haileybury and Liskeard by Mr. Findlay. Six young people joined the Church by confession of faith and partook of the Sacrament, also a number were received by certificate. The Sacrament of Baptism was also administered to five children, four in Liskeard and one in Haileybury.

### SOUTH BUXTON.

South Buxton lies twelve miles south-west of Chatham. There was no Presbyterian service here for the past year. This year morning and evening services were held each Sabbath. The attendance and interest taken was very encouraging. There is also a good work being done in the Sabbath School.

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Preservices ouragDuring the week the regular prayer meeting and the Y.P.S.C.E. prayer meeting were conducted, both of which were fairly well attended. Rev. Mr. Larkin, of Chatham, visited the field and dispensed the Sacraments. One member was added to the Church.

### TARBERT.

This field comprises two Stations, Tarbert and Campania, both farming districts, in Dufferin County. It was occupied by this Society for the first time this summer. Weekly services were held at both places.

Tarbert had enjoyed only fortnightly prayer meeting, conducted by Rev. Mr. Crozier, of Great Valley, previous to the arrival of the Missionary on the field. The attendance at the Sabbath services was encouraging, and eleven members were added during the summer.

There are only a few Presbyterian families at Campania, yet the services were well attended and the prospects are good.

Weekly prayer meetings were held at both places, and were a great means of good. There are also union Sunday Schools at both points. The field is an important one and the prospects are encouraging.

Number of fields, 32; time: 20, six months; 2, five months; 10, four months. Number of Stations, 114: 52 had weekly, 49 fortnightly, 6 monthly, 7 occasional services. Number of week-night meetings, 55; number of Sabbath Schools, 62; number of Presbyterian families, 665; total number of members, 971; of which 115 were added this year. Total contributions from fields, \$3,859.23: total cost of fields, \$6,550.30; cost to Society, \$2,691.07.

The contributions received during the year ending October 31st, 1896, amounting to \$2,606.08, as shown in the Treasurer's Report, were devoted to meeting the current expenses of the summer of 1895. We are, therefore, dependent upon our many friends to help us defray the indebtedness of the past summer, which amounts to \$2,691.07.

### WINTER WORK.

Every Sabbath morning fifteen or twenty Students go from the College to teach in the Gaol and Central Prison. The Sabbath School Lesson is studied, and an opportunity afforded for personal interviews with the prisoners. By this means a large number of these people are reached each Sunday. Some of the prisoners remain indifferent, others seem deeply affected by the presentation of the Word. Tracts and religious literature were distributed and accepted gladly.

The work carried on in the Old Woman's Home and the Convalescent Home is very encouraging. At the former a weekly, and at the latter monthly, Sunday

evening service is conducted. By the manner in which these services are entered into, there is every indication that they are appreclated.

About six or eight Students go every Sabbath morning to the Sick Children's Hospital and Grace Hospital. An hour is spent in speaking of Him who is the friend of the afflicted. In the former place the work among the children is especially interesting. Three of the City Missions are also in charge of the Society—Wychwood, Chester, and Claremont Stations. The reports from these places are very encouraging, and do much to stimulate the Students in their work. Besides this, two of the Students are engaged in Mission work among the Chinese In the city.

## MANITOBA COLLEGE STUDENTS MISSIONARY SOCIETY, ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1896 97.

One of the objects of this Society is to foster a Missionary spirit among the Students, which is largely secured by means of the fortnightly meetings held during the Theological Session.

The Society seeks to support Missionaries in outlying fields, which might not otherwise be supplied with Gospel Ordinances.

The favorable state of the funds of the Society has enabled it to sustain services in three such fields during the past winter, viz.:—Bellafield, a Crofter settlement in south-western Manitoba; Fort Frances, in the Lake of the Woods mining district, and Leduc and New Lunnon, Alberta. The reports from these fields show that the services have been greatly appreciated, and that good work has been done by the Missionaries.

### BELLAFIELD.

Hector N. McLean, of Manitoba College, Missionary.

This field is situated along the southern banks of Pelican Lake, about half-way between Killarney, on the C.P.R., and Hilton, on the N.P.R. The people are chiefly Highland Crofters. Services were conducted in both Gaelic and English.

This year, under the energetic influence of the Missionary, \$500 have been raised for the purpose of building a Church, \$300 of this amount being subscribed by the people themselves. For this reason the field has not been able to contribute very much towards the support of the Missionary, and this burden falls on the Society, which it cheerfully shoulders, hoping soon to see a bright future opening up for the Church of Christ in this place.

### FORT FRANCES.

D. Oliver, Manitoba College, Missionary.

This field is about 165 miles from Rat Portage, in a mining district. The town of Fort Frances has a population of 500, and possesses a comfortable Presbyterian Church. Service was held every Sabbath evening with an average attendance of about 100, and Sabbath School work was also carried on very successfully.

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A morning service was held in a newly-settled district, at a place called Crozier, five miles from Fort Frances, the people taking great interest in the services.

About forty miles from Fort Frances there are extensive gold mines, which give employment to a considerable number of men. The Missionary visited the mining camps monthly, spending several days among them, and holding services. Mine Centre and Bell City, two mining towns, were also supplied with week-night services. The land owners of the latter place have given a site for a Church, and it is hoped that before the summer is over it will be built and opened.

### LEDUC AND NEW LUNNON.

This field lies in the neighborhood of South Edmonton. There are five Stations, each having been supplied with a fortnightly service, and the settlers showed their interest in the work in many ways.

At one of the Stations-a new settlement-the people decided to build a Church, and began operations during the winter; it is nearing completion, and will be opened early in the summer.

Mr. J. J. Ferguson, an elder in the South Edmonton congregation, in conjunction with the Missionary at that place-Mr. R. M. Dickey-carried on these services, the Society merely bearing the expenses of Mr. Ferguson.

### WORK FOR THE SUMMER.

### Rosenfeld and Plum Coulee.

These are two Stations on the Deloraine branch of the C.P.R., Rosenfeld being at the junction of the Great Northern Railway. During the winter they have received services occasionally on week nights, being supplied by the Gretna Missionary, Mr. F. J. Hartley, B.A., but the distances, 22 and 16 miles respectively, are against this mode of supply. The Society therefore purposes to supply these two places during the summer session from the College.

Plum Coulee is a little town of 200, with a School and Baptist Church. The Baptist people have kindly offered us the use of their Church whenever they are not using it. A flourishing English Sabbath School once existed there, but it has given place to a German Baptist Sabbath School. There is room for an English School yet, without interfering with our neighbors.

Rosenfeld has a Sabbath School, conducted by a good Presbyterian, Mr. Stewart. There are only about half a dozen families who attend our service here. but all are anxious for service. If we do not undertake this field, the services they receive will be irregular, and often neglected.

While paying the above amounts, the Committee agreed to ask the Synod's Home Mission Committee to forward a statement showing the amounts due for past six months, in order to give the Missionaries \$850 without house, which, in the judgment of the Executive, was the Assembly's resolution, the difference between this and the above amounts now paid to be deducted from the claims next March.

Young People's Societies.—A letter was read from the Rev. R. b. Fraser, Convener of the Assembly's Committee on Young People's Societies, soliciting the co-operation of the Executive in preparing Home Mission matter for the Presbyterian Record for February next. The Convener agreed to prepare and forward matter for this purpose.

Efficiency of Missionaries.—It was agreed to ask Presbyteries to report to this Committee before the 1st March next their opinion regarding the efficiency, or otherwise, of the respective Missionaries who have laboured in their Home Mission field during the year. It was resolved to issue a circular to the Conveners of the Presbyteries' Home Mission Committees regarding this.

Appointment of Students, etc.—It was resolved that applications at the spring meeting of the Committee for appointments from University Students, who only offer their services for the summer, will not be considered until all Theological and other Students, who agree to remain for at least one year in the Mission field, have received appointments.

It was further agreed that hereafter no Student or other Missionary appointed to fields in the Synods of Manitoba and the North-West, and of British Columbia, will have his return expenses paid from the lunds of this Committee unless he labour in the field continuously for at least ten months. Further, it was agreed that only those Students who offer their services for a term of at least six months will hereafter be eligible for appointments.

The claims from the Presbyteries in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West for the whole year being \$700 in excess of the lump sum promised by the Committee, it was agreed to pay the claims in full, the brethren from the North-West, present at the meeting, having guaranteed that they will by special effort collect and forward to the Treasurer, prior to the 25th April, a sum of at least \$350.

Annual Expenditure for Mission Work in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, and the Synod of British Columbia.—The following Sub-Committee were appointed to consider what lump sums should be granted for the ensuing twelve months to the Synods of Manitoba and British Columbia;—Drs. Warden,

McMulien and Somerville, and Messrs. C. W. Gordon, E. D. McLaren and J. Farquharson. This Sub-Committee, at a later stage, presented a report recommending:—

- 1. That for the year beginning 1st April, 1897, a sum not exceeding \$16,500 be granted to the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, and a sum not exceeding \$16,000 to the Synod of British Columbia—these sums to cover the entire expenditure from the funds of the Committee, excepting the salary and expenses of Dr. Robertson, and the traveiling expenses of Missionaries to and from their fields of labour.
- 2. That these Synods, through their Home Mission Committees, be required to submit to this Committee, at its semi-annual meetings in March and October, a financial statement for the six months then ending; and accompanying this a report, on the schedules prepared by this Committee, of the work done during the half-year in the respective Mission fields, with the names of the Missionaries, the amounts contributed by the people, and the appropriations made by the Synods' Committees to the several fields.
- 3. That these Synods, through their Home Mission Committees, be instructed to submit to this Committee, on or before the 25th of April annually, a financial statement of the receipts and expenditure for the year ending 31st March, together with an annual report of the several fields, on the schedules furnished by this Committee.

The report was adopted.

Dr. Robertson's Mission.—The Convener read a number of letters he had received from Rev. Dr. Robertson, Superintendent of North-West Missions, now in Britain, reporting as to the result of his labors there in getting assistance on behalf of the Home Mission work in Manitoba and British Columbia. The Committee expressed their warmest appreciation of the sympathy and liberality shown by the friends in Britain.

Proposed New Presbytery.—A communication was received from the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, asking the General Assembly to organize a new Presbytery, embracing the northern portions of the Presbyteries of Lanark and Renfrew, Barrie and Algoma. It was agreed to express, generally, disapproval of the proposal.

Travelling Expenses of Ordained Missionaries.—It was resolved that the Committee will not be liable for any travelling expenses of Ordained Missionaries or Catechists going to or returning from fields to which they are appointed in Ontario and Quebec, unless a grant to meet such expenses is specifically made at the time of their appointment.

Students' Missionary Societies.—It was resolved hereafter to make no grants from the Home Mission Fund to any field supplied by the Students' Missionary Society of any of the Colleges, unless the sanction of this Committee, and of the

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It was further agreed to invite the Students' Missionary Societies of Knox, Queen's, and Montreal Colleges to send a representative to the meeting of the Home Mission Executive in October next, to confer regarding the relation of these Societies to the Home Mission work of the Church, etc.

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### CONCLUSION.

The financial statement shows a balance in hand of \$4,000.00. That the balance is not against the fund, is not due to the increased contributions of congregations, but rather to the severest economy in the administration of the funds. The Committee feel that they ought not to go beyond the revenue that can be reasonably expected, and must keep out of debt. Some of the largest and wealthiest congregations are giving considerably less to Home Missions than in former years; and others give small amounts in proportion to what they give to other objects, that really require less assistance. Many congregations give nothing whatever, and strange to say, Mission Stations that have been aided for many years give nothing, or the merest pittance, while contributing generously to other Schemes of the Church. These anomalies your Committee cannot remedy, as they are not acquainted with all the facts; but Presbyteries should certainly carefully enquire into them, and insist that Mission Stations, under the care of, and supported by Home Mission funds, should recognize the prior claims of that fund to their contributions, whether they be small or great.

Unless the congregations throughout the Church give more liberally to the fund, the Committee instead of making grants to the many new fields, that are seeking help in the vast mining regions of British Columbia, (towards which thousands are now looking), must not only decline, but reduce what amounts have been promised. The entire amount received from the British Churches during the year, could profitably have been spent in the mining regions alone. Such places also as the Morman Territory, in the North-West, need very large grants, if the Church is to hold them at all. In some cases the entire salary has to be guaranteed the Missionary for a time. The brethren in British Columbia and the North-West, and in the larger Mission fields, such as Algoma, in view of the lack of means at the disposal of the Committee, have found it necessary not only to decline applications made to them, but to reduce the amounts asked from the Committee. But such a state of matters effectually bars all progress, and jeopardises the very existence of many of our Mission Stations in promising fields.

The Committee is profoundly thankful for the handsome contributions received from the British Churches during the past three years, but the Church in Canada should not regard the help thus given as a reason for lessening their contributions to the fund. We should rather show to the British Churches, that for every dollar they give, there will be a similar increase in our own gifts. The Church in Canada must feel that upon its own efforts and liberality, primarily and mainly, rests the responsibility of evangelizing the North-West. While outside help is always welcome, it can never be depended upon as a certainty, and the more we do for ourselves, the more likely are we to secure the continuance of contributions from the British Churches.

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### REPORT OF AUGMENTATION COMMITTEE

(WESTERN SECTION).

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

Your Committee entered on the year's labors with much misgiving, realizing that the loss of their trusted leader and the lack of his counsel and guidance might seriously affect the interests of the scheme. Knowing that God had taken him from us, we sought His guidance the more, and thankfully acknowledge the tokens of His favor, as He has led us in the forward path. At every step, also, we have taken our loyal people into our confidence, and thus, though it has been a year of stringency, and many just and pressing calls have been made and responded to in other directions, we gratefully report that the claims of this scheme have been remembered, and provision made for all the work which it was thought pru lent to undertake.

### FINANCIAL RESULTS.

The appended financial statement shows that the income from all sources was \$22,957,93, a decrease of \$934,77, whilst the expenditure was \$21,981,94, a decrease of \$2,028,05, as compared with the former year. The balance on hand is \$2,066,72, being swelled at the last moment by receipt of a legacy of \$1,000, without which the receipts of the year would have been \$30 less than the expenditure. We are sorry to have to say that most of the Presbyteries have decreased their contributions, but we are very hopeful that better things are in store for us in the future. Some friends ask why we are so close in our scrutiny and so urgent for speedy reduction of grants. Those who examine the above statement will have no difficulty in answering the question. Too poor to be generous; so poor that it is hard to be just.

### A LEGACY.

A legacy is such a rare experience that we never count on such a possibility in making our estimates; so rare that we report that one has been received from the executors of the late Mrs. Leslie. Toronto. Why should such an experience be rare? Having had our hopes aroused, we append a "Form of Bequest" for the use of friends who may desire to make testamentary provision for assisting the Augmentation Fund.

### PROGRESS OF THE WORK.

Last year we reported twenty-one congregations as having become self-sustaining, and twelve congregations received on our list. This year twelve became self-sustaining and sixteen are taken on the list. The vigorous forward movement of last year, and the stringency in business, very well account for the smaller number becoming self-sustaining, and the Committee is assured that in every way the work is prosperous and vigorously prosecuted. It is of interest to all to know what the changes are, so the Secretary's statement is appended.

### SYNODICAL COMMITTEES.

Great care and much regard for economy have been exercised in laying out the work. In this connection the assistance of the Synodical Committees has been very valuable, and has greatly lightened the labors of this Committee. Intermediaries between the Presbyteries and the Committee, they, on the one hand, strengthen the just claims of Presbyteries, and, on the other hand, have a more wholesome control over the work in the various districts, whose wants they understand, and in whose progress they are interested.

The results have been harmonious arranging of grants and acceptance in almost every instance of new congregations offered to our care, whilst very considerable

reductions have been secured without eausing friction and dissatisfaction.

### ECONOMY AND PROGRESS.

The Assembly will understand that there is a point beyond which economy becomes extravagance, and hurtful to the best interests of the Church—Your Committee believe that in many cases further reduction of grants, unless after reasonable lapse of time, must be thus hurtful. It is trusted, therefore, that the Assembly will encourage a prudent and not a false economy by instructing and enabling the Committee to press on and to undertake even large expenditure when requisite, especially in the case of our outlying and new settlements.

### WESTERN WORK.

We have in mind the Algona District, but most of all the North-West and British Columbia where augmentation work has been languishing when it ought to have been progressive. Why? For lack of funds, and because the consequent pressure for economy and speedy reduction of grants is unsuited to the circumstances of these new settlements. Not only may yearly reductions be impossible, but in years, for instance, of erop failure, they may need increased help. Congregations in such circumstances hesitate to undertake the responsibilities of settlement as augmented charges, whilst doubtless the Assembly believes in a settled ministry as the better, as well as the time-tested and time-horored Presbyterian way of building up congregations. It appears all important, therefore, that when so great an impetus has been given to immigration your Committee should be placed in a position to encourage settlements in prosperous missions, as also to maintain settlements where the rush to the go'd fields, or other influences, may deplete augmented or presently self-sustaining congregations. Economy will not avail. Increased revenue is the only way out. \$5,000 additional for the coming year, and eventually \$10,000 a year, beyond our present average should be aimed at. The whole position has been submitted to the Synods of Ontario and Quebec, and, as the synodical reports show, each of them has endorsed the Committee's opinion, and has agreed to aim at providing a due proportion of the \$5,000 extra required for the coming year.

Your Committee ask the As-embly strongly to commend this movement to the

sympathy and generous support of our ministers and people.

### YOUNG PEOPLE'S FUND.

Your Committee also ask the approval of the Assembly to the institution of a Young People's Angmentation Fund, incorporated with the general fund, whose income shall be provided in accordance with the following suggestion: That Young People's Societies be requested to give one meeting in each year to the consideration

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of augmentation work, in connection with which a collection shall be taken on behalf of the Young People's Augmentation Fund, and that similarly Sabbath schools be requested to contribute to the same fund each year.

Our desire has been not to interfere with any other line of missionary effort. We do not ask large collections; it seems proper, however, that our children and young people should know something of, and be doing something for, every form of the Church's mission work.

A beginning has been made, and \$800 of this year's income has been from the sources above-mentioned. We doubt not that the Assembly will endorse the proposal, and that year by year larger results will be shown.

The following extracts from Synodical and Presbyterial Reports give interesting details of the work in the various districts of the Church.

### SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA.

The Synodical Committee through Dr. Kellock, Convener, reports: The scheme is meeting with fair support, and is still proving a signal benefit throughout the various Presbyteries. The Synod really does little more, however, than provide for its own work, which is somewhat large. The Committee feel, therefore, that the time has fully come when strenuous and united efforts should be made to increase our contributions and to reduce grants, where such a course can be followed consistently with the maintenance of the work in hand. Thirty-eight congregations are on the list. It is recommended that, in view of the pressing need of the work in the North-West and elsewhere, this Synod resolves to raise, in addition to present contributions, \$1,000 towards the \$5,000 needed by the General Assembly's Committee to carry out the necessary extension proposed.

It is also recommended that members of Synod in their various charges maker special appeal to their Young People's Societies and Sunday schools for augmentation funds.

### SYNOPSIS OF REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIES.

- 1. Quebec—Not a single vacancy, and such progress made that grants have been reduced from \$1,900 in 1893 to \$1,175 in 1896, and ministers are working with contentment and zeal. On all hands we have signal testimony to the value of the Scheme.
- 2. Montreal—The Scheme continues to be a boon of inestimable value to weak congregations in our bounds. Every augmented charge is settled. Efforts towards reduction are promised, but there cannot in the circumstances be large reductions.
- 3. Ottawa—L'Orignal, Hull and Hintonburg remain as before. Fitzroy Harbor and Richmond are expected to be off the list. East Gloucester has been weakened through removals, and Aylmer also. Bryson, etc., and Portage du Fort, etc., have been added and a heavier draft on the fund will result.
- 4. Glengarry—Substantial progress made. Avonmore is off and Glen Sandfield asks reduced grant. The others remain as before.
- 5. Lanark and Renfrew—Admaston is off list. Eganville has been added. As a result of a re-arrangement, Douglas and Barr's gives place to Douglas and Scotch Bush, and saving to Mission Funds affected, though a little more will be required from the Augmentation Fund.
- 6. Brockville—Depletion of augmented charges through removal, and the claims are heavy, with little present hope of reduction. All missions but one have become augmented congregations, and, on the whole, there is helpful work being done, though the draft on Augmentation Funds is larger.

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### SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON.

The Synodical Committee, through Dr. Somerville, Convener, reports as follows: The number of congregations at present on the list, with grants, is forty-five, nine having been added during the year. There has been a considerable decrease in contributions and a very considerable number of congregations have made no contribution. Your Committee need not urge upon the Synod the great benefit which this fund has conferred on many of the congregations of the Church, and the relief it has brought to ministers laboring in difficult fields. The very existence of such a fund, however, calls for the most careful scrutiny on the part of Presbyteries, that is may not be an incentive to illiberality in the congregations receiving aid. Experience proves that Presbyteries should exercise diligent oversight of all their augmented charges, and should see that their financial affairs are managed on intelligent and businesslike principles. Better methods adopted by Boards of Managers of congregations might in many cases hasten their reaching the position of being self-sustaining. Presbyteries should give time and attention to furnishing such counsel as will assist them in attaining this end. Your Committee, therefore, would recommend as follows:—

1. That the regulations of the Assembly be fully observed by Presbyteries before

applications are made for grants.

2. That Presbyteries make a thorough visitation of all their augmented charges before the meeting of the Committee in October, when the grants are revised: that enquiry be made as to their methods of raising funds, and that assistance be given where necessary in adopting better methods.

3. That Presbyteries give sufficient time during their sessions for considering the interests of this fund, and that an effort be made during the year to increase the amount given for augmentation by at least \$2,000, to provide for the extension

needed in the North-West.

### SYNOPSIS OF REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIES.

1. Kingston—Grants are larger than for some years past, owing to the addition of Tweed and Division Street, Kingston, to the list. Within a few years five congregations reached the self-sustaining stage through the aid of this fund.

2. Peterboro —There are five augmented charges, three of which were vacant for some time. All are now happily settled. In only one case can self-sustaining rank be hoped for soon, but good, solid work is being done. Good has resulted from apportioning the amounts required from the Presbytery to congregations.

Whitby—No augmented charges, but interest in the Scheme is maintained.
 Lindsay—Sunderland and Vroomanton small but liberal. Grant reduced by
 Cambray and Oakwood steadily growing, and will likely not be long on the

list. Good work being done.

5. Toronto—The Presbytery's Augmentation Committee are preparing for a vigorous visitation of all their augmented charges. A Committee of Presbytery, also has in hand the equalization and, as far as possible, the reduction of grants in augmented charges in the city; and also the matter of the re-arrangement of certain contignous charges in Toronto and Lindsay Presbyteries.

6. Orangeville—No congregations have been placed on the augmented list during the year, and none of the five augmented have become self-sustaining. One congregation reduced its demands on the funds \$25. Two congregations that were allowed to fall into arrears have been persuaded to pay such arrears. The membership of these congregations has been gradually increasing, and the work

on the whole is reported as satisfactory.

7. Barrie—All the congregations which were on the list last year are there still. The grant to Penetanguishene and Wyebridge was reduced by \$25. The pastoral charge of St. Andrew's, Banks and Gibraltan has been added. The two last have been for many years mission stations, supported by the Home Mission Committee. The Presbytery desired for a long time to erect them into a pastoral charge, and succeeded by uniting them to St. Andrew's, which was formerly a part of the West Nottawasaga charge.

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To show that the stations and congregations in this Presbyfery are not unmindful of the claims of the Augmentation Fund upon them, I may state that, for the past year, notwithstanding the untoward circumstances by which they are sur-

rounded, they have contributed over \$175 of the \$200 expected of them.

9. Owen Sound—Temple Hill and Holland are now self-sustaining. Holland Centre attached to Sydenham and grant greatly reduced. Markdale and Berkely and also Hapworth and Cruickshank are progressing favorably. Augmentation has been a great boon to this Presbytery.

10. Saugeen—There is but one augmented congregation in this Presbytery—that of Drayton and Moorefield. These stations were very recently united and formed into a pastoral charge, excellent work. A grant of \$200 per annum has been made by the Augmentation Committee, but it is hoped that in a very few years the congregation will be self-supporting. Were it not for the existence of the Augmentation fund this congregation would still be unsettled.

11. Guelph-No augmented charges.

### SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

The Synodical Committee, through the Rev. J. C. Tolmie, Secretary, reports as follows: -There are thirty-seven augmented charges within the Synol, of which seven are vacant. Probably four or five will be off the fund by the end of the year, but others will take their place, and the call on the fund will not be materially lessened. The contributions have fallen short, but it is hoped that better things will be done in the future.

It is recommended: (1.) That in view of the needs of the field in the North-West and British Columbia, this Synod aim at raising \$700 next year, and instruct its Committee to take whatever steps may be necessary to secure the same. (2.) That Presbyteries send deputations to visit those fields that are markedly deficient in contributions to this fund.

SYNOPSIS OF REPORTS OF PRESBYTERIES.

1.—Hamilton—There are eight augmented charges. These have been visited and are doing all that can be expected of them. All the Congregations at first on the fund are now self-sustaining, and those at present on are making progress towards that point.

2. Paris—Two augmented charges—Burford and Mount Pleasant.

The Committee having visited the field, is of the opinion that the Congregation is doing all that can reasonably be expected of them at present, but does believe that West Brantford might be of assistance if added to the charge. Delhi and Windham Centre have only been on the fund since December. Delhi was transferred from Hamilton Presbytery and united with Windham Centre, erected into a pastoral charge, and receives a grant of \$200,00.

3. London—Seven receive aid; one, Alma Church, St. Thomas, has become self-sustaining, but assistance has been asked for Chalmers Church, London, a recently organized and promising charge, so that the number will be the same. All the augmented charges are in a healthy state, doing good work, and several, it is believed, will require less assistance this year. No applications for aid are made without full and impartial investigation; none but weak receive support.

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- 4. Chatham—Has two augmented charges. Dresden was settled and placed on the fund in 1895, receiving \$250.00. In 1896 the grant was reduced to \$150.00. The Presbytery has reason to believe the Congregation will be self-supporting before end of present year. The other augmented charge is Blytheswood. It is now vacant. We hope, when settled, a smaller grant will be required.
- 5. Sarnia—Three augmented charges; one congregation, Albert Street, at Sarnia, was during the year removed from list and self-sustaining.
  - 6. Stratford--Has no augmented congregation.
- 7. Karon—Three augmented charges. These are doing all that can be expected of them. The grants are same as last year.
- 8. Maitland—Three augmented charges. Of these one, North Kinloss, Riverdale, and Enniskillen, was last year transferred from Bruce Presbytery; the grant asked, \$150.00. The deputations have visited all the assisted congregations, but there is no prospect of their doing better, except North Kinloss, which may advance a little during the present year.
- 9. Bruce—Two augmented charges, Glamis and North Brant and West Bentinck. Glamis will soon be self-sustaining; the congregation of late has greatly increased, and had it not been for building a new church last year, the charge would already have assumed all financial liabilities. The other charge, North Brant and West Bentinek, has suffered from failure of crop, being in the belt which for three years has suffered from drouth. It has also been weakened by removal of families from the district.

### SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

The Synodical Committee, through Mr. Farquharson, Secretary, reports: At the beginning of the year there were eighteen congregations, of which six were vacant. At present there are sixteen on the list, of which eight are vacant. The pressure for reduction of grants led to financial difficulties and resignations. Recently grants have been increased and settlements effected.

Possibly 'he work has reached the stage where progress will not be so marked. The village congregations are mostly self-sustaining, hence the augmented congregations are in growing proportions situated in the more thinly settled districts, and cannot advance rapidly.

### SYNOPSIS OF REPORTS FROM PRESBYTERIES.

- 1. Winnipeg—Selkirk settled during the year; doing well, but will need help some time longer. The four others were vacant when Committee met in March, but two have called since, and will likely be soon settled.
- 2. Rock Lake—Crystal City, not strong but doing well. Two churches and a manse are being built, and the burden has prevented increase of stipend. Killarney has been supplied by students. Signs of progress now. A church to be built and doubtless a settlement will soon follow. Roland has just been added to the list.
- 3. Glenboro—St. Luke's recently placed on the list. At Hilton the crofters are in financial difficulties and advance is slow.
- 4. Brandon—Rounthwaite gaining strength and will soon be off list. Elkhorn and Brookdale will require assistance a little longer.
- 5. Minnedosa—Hamiota has become self-sustaining. Birtle is progressing; grant will be reduced soon.
  - 6. Melita-Hartney has become self-sustaining; Melita is likely to call soon
- 7. Regina—Moosejaw, self-sustaining. Two missions are ready to be put on list, but will need large grants and patience as regards reducing.

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### SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Synodical Committee, through the Rev. E. D. McLaren, Convener, reports: That the Synod is of opinion that representation on the Augmentation Committee should henceforth be accorded to them as well as to the other Synods. Also that the circumstances in that Synod are such that the minimum stipend should be \$900 and a manse, or an allowance of \$100 in lieu thereof, with turther provision for exceptional eases. The recommendations approved by Synod are:—

- (1). That Presbyteries be urged to bring their non-ordained mission fields up to the status of augmented congregations.
- (2). That it be an instruction to Presbyteries to make careful enquiry into the circumstances of each augmented congregation before making application for a grant from the augmentation fund and especially before recommendation.

### SYNOPSIS OF WORK IN PRESBYTERIES.

- 1. Victoria.—Two congregations, viz., St. Paul's, Victoria, and St. George's Union, are on the list.—It was hoped that the latter would be self-sustaining, but a small grant will be needed for a time.
- 2. Westminster.—Chilliwack, self-sustaining for a year, has had to return to list, several families having left the district.
- 3. Kamloops.—Spallumcheen, from Mission list, has been placed on augmented list. Vernon has also been transferred. These congregations have also been weakened through migration of families to other districts.

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### Report of the Home Mission Committee (Eastern Section,)

1896-97.

To the Venerable the General Assembly :-

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Victoria

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Your Committee on Home Missions, for the Eastern Section of the Church, in submitting their Annual Report, desire to praise God for the prosperity of the work under their care, indicated in the reports of the laborers generally, by additions to the membership of the Church, improved attendance on the means of grace, and enlarged liberality in supporting the missionaries engaged in the work.

Our field of operations changes to some extent from year to year. A few places pass on to the list of augmented charges and a new station is occasionally set up in some portions of the Country receiving settlement, or in an old part where population has gradually grown. These changes are necessarily slow in a country that does not rapidly increase its population; but they are steady and mark constant progress. Besides this, there is growth in the organization of the fields occupied, and in the development within them of the purposes for which the Church exists. The past year compares well with its predecessors in these tokens of prosperity.

Of the three classes into which the Committee's laborers are divided, the only one in which there has been any scarcity of men is that of Ordained Missionaries, and here the want has not been severe. Of good students for catechists, and ministers desirons of supplying our vacancies there has been an embarassing riches. The fields have been well-supplied, but a number of useful men have been without the opportunity of the regular exercise of their ministerial gifts. While regetting this state of matters, the Committee do not feel able to propose a remedy. They cannot regard it as proof that too many men are entering the ministry, because all the graduates of our College, for the last two sessions, have been immediately called, or placed as Ordained Missionaries over places seeking their services; and, if there had been several more of a similar stamp, they too, would have been settled at once.

The roll has had upon it 42 probationers, or ministers without charge; 33 Ordained Missionaries; and 52 catechists. Of the first class 8 have been called and settled as pastors, 17 appointed as Ordained Missionaries, 5 have removed, and 12 are still on the roll. Of the second class there labored during the whole year 10, and during a portion of it 23. Of the whole 33, three have accepted calls, 1 is on the probationers' list, t has died, 3 have removed, and the remaining 23 are now at work. Of the third class 46 were employed during the summer and 5 in the winter.

Running over the Presbyteries, the work of catechists and ordained missionaries was distributed among the following places:

In the Presbytery of Sydney, students occupied the mission stations of Pleasant Bay, Little Bras d'Or, Louisburg and Little Lake Lounond. Louisburg and Little Bras d'or paid them in full The other two drew from the fund \$49 and \$67 respectively. Besides these the Presbytery received catechists from the Home Mission Committee for the following congregations,—Cape North, and Leitch's Creek, which are vacant, and Boularderie, under the charge of the Rev. D. Drummond. This large field desired an assistant to their pastor, and paid for his services in full. Of the two vacant charges, supplied by catechists, Cape North cost the fund nothing, and Leitch's Creek received \$41. A catechist labored in Cape North during the winter.

In the Presbytery of Inverness, Arichat, with its surroundings, and Baddeck Forks, are mission fields. The latter always pays the categorist the whole of his bill; the former, being numerically very weak and scattered, must get regular aid. Last summer it drew \$117 from the fund. This Presbytery supplied River Inhibitants, a section of Port Hastings congregation, by a catechist who received full remnneration from the people.

Picton Presbytery has under its care, as mission fields, Cape George, Mulgrave, Country and Isaac's Harbors, Wine Harbor, Barney's River, Cariboo River and Fifteen Mile Stream. Students labored in all these places last summer. The only one that paid the laborer in full was Barney's River. The others drew from the fund \$129, \$132, \$60, \$80, \$69, and \$3 respectively. Country and Isaac's Harbors were supplied through the winter by a catechist.

This Presbytery had an ordained missionary, the Rev. J. B. Mae Lean in charge of the congregation of Little Harbor and Fisher's Grant. He completed his appointment in October. The Home Mission Fund paid at the rate of \$100 per year. A minister is now settled over the congregation, and the supplement will be met by the Augmentation Fund.

The Presbytery of Wallace employed a catechist as assistant to Dr. Sedgewick. He was paid in full by the congregation. New Annan, formely part of a congregation, is now a mission station. The people fully paid their catechist. The new congregation of Westehester, Greenville and Wentworth w s supplied by two catechists, who drew from the fund \$37, and \$50, respectively. The Rev. J. 11 Kirk has completed a two years appointment at Linden, and under an arrangement with the Augmentation Committee, received a supplement of \$300 from the Augmentation Fund. He is now settled as pastor under the Augmentation scheme. The congregation of Shemogue, Port Eigin and Tidnish have for years been ministered to by Rev. A. W. K. Herdman, who received at the rate of \$250 from the fund. Mr. Herdman now goes on the probationers roll.

The Presbytery of Truro has two mission fields, North River and Harmony. These had catechists last summer who received \$69 and \$20, respectively from the fund. In two of the congregations catechists were employed to assist the pastors in their wide fields. One labored on Partsboro shore, and drew \$100 from the find, the other assisted the pastor of Economy and Five Islands, and received from the find \$46. The Rev. F. L. Jobb presides as missionary over Maccan and River Hebert, and receives at the rate of \$250 per year from the Home Mission Fund.

In the Presbytery of helification of the berging of Digby and Bay View, Middleton and Melvern Square, Mt. Unincke and indicates which is a partment and Montague, and Moose River and Cariboo Mines. The categories is a gin them received from the fund the following sums, in the order given above, \$134, \$75, \$67. Ordained missionaries were employed, viz., Rev. D. O. McKay in Carleton and Caebogae. Pev. A. Boyd, Kempt and Walton; Rev. A. E. Vert, St. Croix and Ellershouse; Rev. W. C. More'son, Bay of Islands; Rev. Geo. S. Milligan, Harbor Grace; and Rev. Win. McLeod, Labrador. The grants to these places per year are \$300, \$250, \$300, \$150, and \$300, respectively. The Rev. T. H. Marray who has larely been called away by death, occupied Lawrencetown and Cow Bay as ordained missionary under a two years appointment and received a supplement of \$250 from the Augmentation Fund. The Rev. R. Murray has been appointed under a like arrangement for the next two years. St. Croix and Ellershouse has lately received a pastor, the Rev. M. G. Henry, and will be assisted by the Augmentation Fund. Bay of Islands, in which there are only about 30 Presbyterian families in straitened circumstances, receives aid to the extent of \$200 a year from the congregation of St. Andrew's, St. John's Labrador is the protege of the Students' Missionary Association, who deserve much praise for their fostering care of this needy place which costs them about \$490 annually. A catechist labored here during the winter.

The Presbytery of Lunenburg and Shelburne had two large fields, one on the west side of the LaHave, south of Bridgewater, ministered to by the Rev. Henry Crawford, who received from the fund \$175; and the other north of Bridgewater, covering the whole northern part of the County of Lunenburg and taking in a part of Annapolis, presided over by the Rev. S. G. Lawson, who was

paid \$225 out of the fund.

The Presbytery of St. John, covering the Western part of New Bruhswick, and shaped like a letter L, the St. John River being the opright line, and the southern shore of the Province the base line, is the great missionary centre of the Synod. It had last year ordained missionaries, at Milltown, Rev. J. Hawley receiving \$200; at Waweig, Rolling Dam, Tower Hill, and Bailey, Rev. A. W. Lewis, \$250; at Fairville and Grand Bay, Rev. J. R. MacDonald, \$250; at Andover, Tilley, and Grand Falls, Rev. H. G. Gratz, \$400, specially provided by United Church, New Glasgow; at Edmonston and Connors, Rev. A. J. Lods, \$150, at Shediac, Rev. A. S. Morton, \$125; and at Dorchester, Rev. J. D. MacKay, \$200. It had catechists at St. Martin's, Waterford, Welsford, and Riverside, who were paid in full by their fields; and at Salina, Portland and Rothsay, Norton and Campbell Settlement, Three Brooks, Fort Kent, and DeWolfe's and Lynfield, who drew \$14, \$80, \$134, \$103, \$8 and \$10, respectively. The pastor of the wide-spread field of Chipman was aided by a catechist, who cost the fund \$15. A catechist labored during the winter at St. Martins, and was paid in full. One also spent 3 months at Salina, and 3 months at Shediac and was paid all but \$30.

St. Paul's Church, Fredericton, and St. John's, Moncton, have each undertaken to raise the supplement necessary for the support of an ordained missionary in one of the fields; and the W. H. M. S. of St. John Presbytery paid \$500 for the missionaries laboring at Fairville, Shediac, St. Martin's, Rothsay, \$100 each, and at Dorchester and Waterford, \$50 each. The W. F. M. Society of this Presbytery promise a portion of their collections to Home Missions. They will raise about \$400 for this scheme.

The Presbytery of Miramichi had one ordained missionary, the Rev. J. A. Crawford, who labored at Metapedia, and recoived at the rate of \$300 from the fund. It had catechists last summer at Kouchibouguac, Caraquet and New Bandon, and Boiestown and Doaktown, who were paid in full by the fields; and at Douglastown, Hardwicke and Miscou and Shippegan Islands who received respectively \$77, \$26, and \$137. Boiestown and Doaktown was also supplied by a catechist in the winter.

The Presbytery of P. E. Island had ordained missionaries in three of their congregations, for a portion of the year, viz.: West Cape and Campbellton, Tignish, Montrose and Elmsdale, and Richmond Bay. In Tingish the missionary Rev. A. D. McDonald has been called and settled as pastor, and the supplement of \$200 will be paid by the Augmentation Fund. West Cape received at the rate of \$250 from the Fund. One catechist was employed. He labored at Richmond Bay East, an old but weak congregation, which paid for his services to within \$7.50 of the whole cost.

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Ministers Ordained Catechists In the fields supplied by our missionaries, there are about 4000 families that hold connection with the Presbyterian Church. They raise for the support of ordinances about \$16,000 a year and contribute to the schemes of the church with a fair measure of liberality. On the whole they meet very well one of the conditions on which the church is expected to help them liberally, namely, that they help themselves, if not to the full extent of their ubility, at least to a degree comparing favorably with that of the strong congregations.

The Home Mission Committee with us acts as a committee of distribution of probationers, or ministers without charge. A sub-committee meets monthly for this work. It receives the applications of Presbyteries for the number of men they require to supply vacancies during the next mouth and assigns that number to them, taking care that each man shall have a fair opportunity of preaching in as many vacancies as possible, until he is settled or Presbyteries refuse his services. Within the Presbytery, the distribution of the preachers is made by the Presbyteries. The committee appoints to Presbyteries—the Presbyteries appoint to fields. The number on the roll of the committee varies from a half-dozen to two dozen. During the two years past there has been more difficulty in securing work for the men, than men to meet the demands of Presbyteries. These laborers report monthly to their Presbyteries,; and if there is anything due them for services by the congregations in which they have been working the Presbyteries collect it, or if satisfied with the giving of the people, request the Home Mission Committee to pay.

The cost to the fund for the different branches of the work, for the past year ending April 30th

will be found in the subjoined tables.

The debt at the beginning of last year was \$3650.77. This debt has been reduced to \$1597.69. Towards the reduction, Christian Endeavor Societies contributed \$1263. The special thanks of the Church are due to these societies for voluntarily undertaking, last Sept. The total expenditure for the year, including the animal to the North West was \$13,001.61, giving a surplus on the year's work of \$2093.08. The large amount is the more gratifying, because it is all from our own people. The gifts from Seothald, for which in past years we were called upon to record our hearty thanks, have not come sential, for which in past years we were called upon to record our hearty thanks, have not come sential, for which in past years we were called upon to record our hearty thanks, have not come sent and this year. We are very grateful for past valuable aid, and now that it has ceased, we shown themselves able and willing to supply the necessary funds for this work. The committee strive to keep down expenditure to the lowest point consistent with efficiency, and last year expended considerably less than the year previous; but our people must count on an average increase, if we are to deal fairly by our Home Mission fields. We trust that during the coming year, the debt will be completely cleared off and current expenses fully met, as well as the North West liberally remembered. To do this we will need at least \$16,000 or about \$1060 more than was given last year.

The Superintendent of Missions in the Presbytery of St. John has continued to do excellent work. The Committee have resolved to pay him a salary of \$1200 and travelling expenses. He will give all collections made at his meetings and money received for supply of vacant charges, which will amount to over \$200, to the Home Mission Fand. The W. H. M. S that formerly applied their funds to the partial payment of the Superintendent's Salary, now send all their money to the treasurer for the support of special fields.

During the winter months, the Home Mission fields, which were made vacant in the fall be the return of the catechists to their College studies, were committed to the Presbyteries for such oversight and dispensation of ordinances as might be found practicable. All the Presbyteries report that regular or occasional supply has been given to nearly all the fields within their bounds.

report that regular or occasional supply has been given to nearly all the fields within their bounds. By means of our Home Mission work, the church is kept alive and growing. The growth is not rapid, because our population, especially in rural sections of our provinces is not increasing. But there is, and will be gradual growth. Groups of stations which till lately, could not more than pay for a catechist during halt of the year, are now raising \$400 for an ordained missionary; whilst others, that a few years ago were mission charges, are now nearly self-supporting congregations. The encouragement to continue the work with unllagging zeal, is very great. Whilst we must aid the western brethren to overtake the rapidly increasing fields in our new North West, it would be most fatal for us to slacken our effort on behalf of our people in the East. To leave sections of our country without the gospel and the means of grace, would be to consign them to the blight of religious indifference and social disorganization; and to rob the church, to which they should belong, of the prestige they now give, and the strength they are destined to impart, at no distant day.



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



IMAGE EVALUATION TEST TARGET (MT-3)



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### Report of the Augmentation Committee, (Eastern Section,)

1896-97.

To the Venerable the General Ass mbly :-

Angmentation work, in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, has been carried on successfully during the past year. We present the receipts in our usual tabular form, so as to facilitate comparison with previous years.

The Committee presented to Synod, last October, a statement of the amount needed to pay the grants in full; and asked that court to call upon Presbyteries to raise \$10.500, or one-sixth more than was asked for the preceding year. The Presbyteries responded to the call of the Synod for this amount, with heartiness and unanimity; and all of them succeeded in obtaining more than for years past; yet only three, viz., Sydney, Wallace, and Truro, came up to the standard set for them by the Synod. In these Presbyteries every congregation gave something. In all the others, except Miramichi, there are several congregations that did not honor themselves by this token of brotherly love. Had these 20 defaulting charges done their duty, the fund would have been more helpful to the weak congregations dependent on it. The non giving list, however, is smaller than in the preceding years. But the list of those that gave up contributing before they reached the sum expected of them is much larger than the year previous, being 74, as against 46 in 1896 and 50 in 1895. The consequence is that the receipts fell \$700.00 short of what was asked and needed; and the disbursements had to be made subject to a discount of 7%. The Committee deeply regret the repetition of a discount on the already severely pared grants to fields occupied, in most cases, by brethren who stand in the front rank of the preachers and pastors of our church. We sincerely hope that some way may be devised of delivering them from this pinch year by year. Their own charges must be induced to do more for salary than they have been doing, and thus reduce largely the aggregate sum to be collected for the fund; or the church as a whole must give more liberally, so as to make the fund adequate to the requirements. Probably in both these directions there is room for improvement; and the committee would be speak the good offices of the Assembly in urging upon Presbyteries more strenuous efforts to advance along both these lines.

(EASTERN SECTION).

In the direction of greater self-support, through consolidation, the Presbytery of P. E. Island is deserving of special mention—three grants being thus dispensed with in that Presbytery. It is also very gratifying that Coldstream, in the Presbytery of Truro, Wolfville in the Presbytery of Halifax, and Sussex and Richmond in the Presbytery of St. John, have taken their leave of the fund in the graceful way of providing a full support for their own ministers. Such instances as these, now attaining the goodly number of 27 since the fund was instituted, prove the inestimable worth of Augmentation, as a foster-parent of weakly charges. We have just cause of pride in a scheme that works so benignly and powerfully. We have also further evidence of its stimulating influence, in the fact that 13 congregations increased the stipend paid by them, from \$25 to \$75 apiece, and in all aggregating \$470.

With heart-felt gratitude, your committee report that not one of the 60 congregations to whom grants were promised last year, has failed to draw at least a portion of it through vacancy during the whole year. A few were vacant a portion of the time, and did not draw the grant in full; but 54 of them enjoyed the services of a pastor without interruption the whole year round. In this we have another proof of the value of this scheme, in giving permanency to the pastoral relation in even the most scattered and helpless charges of the Church.

In accordance with the permission granted to the Committee by last A sembly, the following grants were made at the semi-annual meeting in October:

At the annual meeting of the Committee in April, the Presbyteries applied on behalf of 56 congregations for grants. After full consideration, the Committee made grants to 47, amounting to \$8583.33 Nine applications were deferred till October, which, if then considered favorably, will require at least \$1500 more—It is thus clear that the current year will call for the continued liberality of the Church up to the full measure of the giving \$\vec{c}\$ last year. The Committee praise God that He has put it into the hearts of His people to do so well in the past, and pray that He may give the grace to continue in the exercise of brotherly love, so practically set forth in the working of this scheme. The Presbytery of Sydney applied for a grant to the extensive congregation of Cape North, large enough—but not exceeding \$300.00—to bring the salary up to \$800.00 and a manse. The Committee, while in the meantime deferring the grant, agreed to ask the Assembly to make this a special case, and to empower the Committee, should sufficient cause be shown, to accede to the request of the Presby'ery.

The Committee report that a few grants have been made where the rules could not be strictly applied; and ask the Assembly to allow these, on the special grounds that seemed strong to the Committee. Permission is also asked to consider and deal with the deferred applications, and such others as may emerge, and generally to take such steps as may best serve to make the fund completely successful.

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### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

It is deemed fitting in this report of the year's proceedings to make brief reference to juestions that are occasionally asked.

### WHAT IS AIMED AT BY THE BOARD?

The answer is, to give the pure Gospel to those of the French Canadian people of the Dominion who do not possess it, and thus to bring them to the knowledge of the Saviour and to secure the Christian education of their children. This is regarded as an aim both Christian and patriotic, and the agencies employed for its accomplishment are Colporteurs, Missionary-Teachers, Evangelists, and Pastors who place Bibles and instructive literature in the hands of the people.

### IS THIS SPECIFIC WORK CALLED FOR?

The Annual General Assemblies since the union of the Churches in 1875 have answered this question in the affirmative by commending the Mission to the prayerful and liberal support of the Church.

As justifying this action it is to be remembered as an undeniable fact that the people whose spiritual emancipation is sought, hold and cherish many unscriptural and anti-scriptural beliefs which are persistently inculcated by their religious teachers. These errors and their propagators are decidedly aggressive, and if left alone and not counteracted by the truth of God will inevitably act injuriously upon our children, our educational progress and all our most sacred institutions. It is well known that many thousands in the Province of Quebec have long been kept in a state of illiteracy which hindered their advancement in secular pursuits and unfitted them for the proper exercise of their rights as free citizens. They now keenly feel this to be the case, and there is a wide-spread demand for better education. As the outcome of missionary effort, the diffusion of wholesome knowledge in various ways through the press and by conversations, lectures and addresses, and by letters from friends in the United States and elsewhere, and, above all, by the circulation of the Word of God among them during the last fifty years, a powerful movement has set in of the nature of revulsion from the religio-political system to which most of them hitherto have yielded unquestioning submission. Even their representatives in the halls of legislation have, with the emphatic approval of their constituencies, asserted independence of clerical domination in civil matters. The present moment in the history of the people is therefore both hopeful and critical, and furnishes opportunities of aiding them in the struggle for freedom such as never before occurred. The fact that they are more and more rapidly losing faith in their old creed and religious institutions is attended by serious danger, and lays special responsibilities upon those who have the truth. History conclusively proves that the transition is natural and easy from irrational superstitions and credulity to the most appalling scepticism. Is this to be the issue in Canada? This is certainly the problem with which we are now face to face.

If, therefore, we are to be patriotic, if we are to be loyal to our Saviour's command to declare His gospel to every creature, if we are to love our neighbors as ourselves and to give practical proof of it, then it is plain that we should do all in our power to save this people'and our country from the impending dire calamity of their lapsing into utter unbelief.

### IS THE WORK BEING DONE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE MASTER'S WILL:

We think so. Our Colporteurs and Missionaries go from house to house in the spirit of love, delivering no other message than that proclaimed by Christ and His apostles. Our Teachers, while imparting a knowledge of the ordinary branches of an elementary education, give special prominence to the Word of God in the case of all their pupils, whose ages range from five to thirty years and upwards. Our Pastors and Evangelists are devoted and zealous, discharging the duties of their office along lines similar to those followed by other Ministers of the Church, but usually under circumstances more discouraging and trying. They enforce the same discipline, and follow the same order and forms of worship. They use the Shorter Catechism in the instruction of the young; and the attendance in their classes and prayer-meetings compares favorably with that of English Churches.

The entire work is under the immediate and constant direction of the Superintendent-Secretary who confers with Presbyteries, visits all schools, mission fields, stations and congregations, preaches in French and English, and delivers addresses in the interests of the mission as he may have opportunity, gives counsel and encouragement to missionaries and converts, and uses all possible means of gaining a personal knowledge of their spiritual state and progress and of cultivating in them a spirit of Christian liberality in support of the ordinances of the Gospel.

### WHAT ARE THE HINDRANCES ENCOUNTERED?

They are the indifference and superstition of the people; the lamentable subserviency of the secular press; the wealth and power of the Romish Church, which by the law of the Province collects tithes and levies taxes to any amount for ecclesiastical purposes; the abject fear inspired by belief in the divine right of priests to inflict the most awful spiritual penalties upon refractory persons by withholding from them the sacraments and rites of the Church without which they cannot be saved; and the local persecutions which converts invariably suffer, and which have compelled many thousands of them to leave the country. It is this depletion of the roll of converts that makes it extremely difficult to establish self-sustaining churches.

These are grave hindrances among the people themselves, but there are others hardly less discouraging and formidable among Protestants. Such as the growing conviction that errors in religious faith and practice are of little moment—that one creed is practically as good as another—that Romanism and Mohammedanism and Buddhism are good enough for those who conscientiously accept them, and that it is undesirable and a species of reprehensible proselytism to disturb any one's sincere belief, however unscriptural. The prevalence of these forms of broad and spurious toleration begets lethargy and even active opposition regarding our mission. Hence some ministers fail to bring its claims before their people and to give them an opportunity of sending assistance; Protestant merchants and employers of labor who desire to secure the favor and patronage of priests, nuns, and Romanists decline to employ our converts, and thus effectually aid the persecutions by which many of them are expatriated.

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### HOW ARE HINDRANCES TO BE OVERCOME?

With men it may be impossible, but with God all things are possible, "Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts." The Romanism of Canada can no more withstand the truth and gracious energy of the Eternal Spirit than did the Romanism of Germany and Scotland in the days of Martin Luther and John Knox.

Our path of duty therefore is obvious. We are to go forward. We do not require to change our general course of action. This is the unanimous conclusion of the Board after protracted and prayerful consideration of the matter. We can wield no better weapon than the sword of the Spirit. With this in our hand, faith, prayer and perseverance become mighty through God, to the pulling down of strongholds. And in spite of all the hindrances referred to among the French people there are to day far more promising openings than we can enter. Had we fundsfor the purpose we might at once double our staff of Colporteurs and Teachers, and thus cultivate new fields, greatly improve the accommodation and equipment of existing mission schools, and establish several institutions similar to those at Pointe-aux-Trembles.

It is clear, therefore, that the most perplexing weakness is in the ranks of Protestantism owing to lack of knowledge of the spirit and distinctive principles of Romanism. We are straitened among ourselves. Very many of our people, however, heartily and prayerfully support our work. This is the case wherever Ministers give them information and plead earnestly in its behalf. Sabbath schools, Bible Classes and Young People's Societies render invaluable assistance when urged to do so, and our desire is that all should become enthusiastic in the same good cause. We can only strive to stir up one another that we may not grow weary in well-doing, knowing that in due season we shall reap if we faint not. And as to those who are "otherwise minded," let us hope and pray that "God may reveal even this unto them."

### WHAT ARE THE RESULTS?

They are such as neither figures nor sentences can record. Spiritual success is not to be reckoned by human arithmetic. God alone knows fully what has been accomplished. The names of the fifteen or twenty thousand converts who have been expatriated in ways already referred to, are not on our roll—nor can we tell how many have passed into the eternal rest that remaineth for the people of God. The uplifting and spiritual forces generated throughout the country are beyond our cognizance. We can neither tell how much they have had to do in bringing about what is already cause for abundant thanksgiving and rejoicing, nor how far-reaching their influence for good may be in the future. We are unable to tabulate the peace of heart, the comfort and light in seasons of darkness and sorrow, the courage and strength in moments of weakness and conflict imparted by the sympathetic and loving ministrations of our missionaries. We know not how many young hearts have through their services been touched by the love of Christ among the humble homes and primitive Sunday schools of rural and out-of-the-way districts. Our report is thus necessarily defective and even silent regarding what is of supreme value in the sight of God and His servants.

To meet, however, the desire of those who lay stress upon statistics, the following figures and facts are submitted:—During the whole or part of the year 28 Pasters and Ordained Missionaries, 17 Evangelists, Colporteurs and Students and 20 Teachers were employed.

There were occupied 37 mission fields and 93 mission stations, with a Sabbath attendance of 2,415. There are 928 families under our care, with 1,079 church members, and 990 pupils attending Sabbath schools and Bible Classes. There were 153 members

added to the church during the year, and there were distributed 901 Bibles or New Testaments, and 21,976 tracts, etc. The amount contributed by converts for salaries and other expenses was \$5,917.70; amount paid as school fees \$1,602.30; making a total of \$7,520.00. There were 25 mission schools in active operation, some during the year and others for a shorter period, with an aggregate attendance of 809 pupils.

We cannot emphasize too strongly the importance of these schools. Those at Pointe-aux-Trembles have already given a Christian education to about 5,000 pupils, a large proportion of whom became true converts and have exerted an immeasurable influence for good in various walks of life. Not a few have become missionaries, pastors and teachers, and others lawyers, doctors, artisans and agriculturists.

### EXPERIENCES ON THE FIELD.

All Missionaries, Colporteurs and Teachers are required to report monthly to their respective Presbyteries and to the Board. The information thus furnished is full and minute.

The following specimens from these reports for the past few months indicate something of the nature of the work and the conditions under which it is prosecuted, and at the same time amply justify the foregoing statements.

### PURPOSE AND METHOD.

"While I have tried not to arouse unnecessary antagonism in a community of such a mixed character, I have tried nevertheless to do my duty, hoping that others would learn to know the privileges of the Gospel and enjoy them as I do. I have more particularly among my own countrymen tried to be faithful to God, and to make the Gospel known to them by preaching, visiting, and the distribution of Bibles and good literature."

"I have taken as addressed to myself Luke viii: 39, and have been telling my father and brothers what great things the Lord has done for me. My father has agreed to read the Bible, and my brother is reading it with interest, and my sister has accepted the Saviour."

### TRIUMPH OF TRUTH.

"Now, regarding the aggressive work, it is in this I have met encouragement. A gentleman to whom both Mr. R—— and myself had often spoken on religion during the last three or four years, had lost all faith in the Church of Rome, but unfortunately and become a rank infidel; no argument could convince him of the existence of a God; as to the Bible, he had read it, but would not accept it as truth. Still we kept on speaking to him and praying for him. Finally the Lord heard and answered our prayers in his behalf. He humbled and enlightened him, so that he came to me and wept, saying to me: 'Rejoice with me, I have found the pearl of great price; the Lord has enlightened my mind and converted my heart. I now believe in Jesus as my Saviour; henceforth I will give myself wholly to the service of my Saviour who did so much for me. I want you to baptize me first, that all may know that I have accepted Jesus as my Saviour, and His blessed Gospel as my rule of faith and conduct.'

"He is a conquest for the Gospel. He went to see his former priest and told him what great joy he experienced by having accepted the Lord Jesus, and he wished to tell all men of the great love of Jesus for them, so he asked him permission to preach, or rather speak in his church on the Sabbath. The Prest listened to him and said: 'llow do you prove your mission to preach the Gospel? Can you perform miracles like St. Paul? If so, I will let you speak in church, if you can heal the sick and raise the dead like Paul; if not I cannot let you, as I fear you have become a heretic.' The man than said: 'Do you call a Christian who has been rescued from infidelity by the power of God's Spirit and enlightened by His blessed Gospel, do you call that man 'an heretic?' If so, you will not wonder if I am compelled to leave your Church in which I found nothing but error, and in which I became an unbeliever and an infidel. You will not wonder, then, that I leave you for ever to go and join a Gospel Evangelical Church, where I have found truth, peace and joy. Therefore I bid you farewell, to go and work among Christians who will rejoice on hearing me declare before all men of the Saviour I have found.'

"Truly the harvest is great, and the fields are getting white; there is a great change, there is a mysterious restlessness among the nation, something they cannot understand nor define, but which I consider the Spirit of God working among the people. Hosts of them are unhappy and gradually seeking some other source of spiritual enjoyment."

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
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### THE PRIEST AND THE BIBLE.

"A man who is reading the Bible said to me, 'Sir, the priest is right. There are many things that I do not understand in the Bible, but I don't mind. I have found all about Jesus being the Saviour, and I read that every day, but the most beautiful of all is St. John. Ah! Sir, he speaks well and I understand him."

"Some of the people having read that Christ is the only Mediator between God and man, asked the Friest why the Church taught that the Virgin and the Saints had power to intercede with God. To this the Curé answered, 'The Church compels no man to pray to the saints; any man who puts his trust in any other than Christ shall perish. But next Sunday, thinking better of what he had said, he preached that 'Christ is too pure and holy to listen to the prayers of sinners, therefore men must needs pray to the saints to intercede for them.'"

"During the day I read the Word of God to eight Roman Catholic families, and had prayer with them. Not one of them would buy a copy of the Scriptures, because their good Curé had warned them against buying my books, however much they liked what was in them. 'His word will not return unto Him yoid.'"

### DARKNESS DISPELLED.

"Monday evening I wrote a friend as follows: 'In three days I shall be able to say whether or not this place is to be ours. God grant that it may become His own possession, for in His name we wish to triumph.' The same evening I held a large meeting, which lasted till one o'clock, in a Roman Catholic house. The people were spell-bound, with their eyes and ears open, as slide after slide bearing on the 'Life of Christ' passed before them. I accompanied every view with suitable passages from the New Testament. The exclamations of satisfaction coming from their hearts and lips were often amusing and droll. They crowded me afterwards for New Testaments. I placed five in their hands and twenty-five copies of 'Le Portrait de Marie dans le Ciel,' 'Ce que Croient les Protestants' and 'Le Catholique Chretien.' They seemed so anxious to read them. While I was distributing these tracts I read each title. One man exclaimed, 'Bring them on, we cannot have too many.' When I mentioned 'Ce que Croient les Protestants,' a man shouted out, 'Give me that. For a long time I have been told that Protestants don't I will now see if that be true.' They have invited me back, saying believe anything. that hundreds would come and welcome me."

"A young Roman Catholic after the service on Sunday said o me, 'Go on and preach the Gospel, you will soon need a larger church, for you have no idea how many people are speaking about religion, and how dissatisfied they are with the Priests, and the errors of Rome, etc.' An old man, eighty years old, at L——, said to me last week, 'Since I have heard you preach I do not any longer go to the saints to pray as before, but I go to God through His Son Jesus Christ, for which teaching I am thankful to you.' A very poor man and his wife have attended our services for some weeks. He came to me to-day, before going away to the woods to work,' and asked me not to forget him, when away, in my prayers."

### LOOKING FOR THE TRUTH.

"Two Roman Catholics from P——came to me and said, 'So there are to be Protestants at J. Will there be meetings there? We want to know the Bible. We are not satisfied with our religion.' A woman wanted to know why we had so many meetings in the Lomes, and then said, 'I am going to the meeting at Mr. F.'s, and then I want you to come and have a meeting in my home.' Three good farmers are sending their children to our Sabbath school. One of them said to me, 'Sir, my child won't pray but to Jesus now, and she wants me to try it; it's so good, she says.'

"I have been much encouraged during the month. I have been called three times by Roman Catholics to go and visit them. On the 8th two young ladies called at my house, and said, 'Sir, will you be kind enough to call and see mother, she is very anxious to see you at once.' I went and found the woman waiting for me, and I had a good talk until two o'clock in the morning with her and her five children, the youngest being fifteen years old. The Bible was open and everything proven by the Word of God, and they were all satisfied. Again, on the 15th, a young man came to me and said, 'Mr. B—, my brother would like to see you.' I went and found that he was son-in-law to the above named woman, and that he also wanted to speak of the Bible. We had a glorious conversation, and since all these people have been coming to our services."

"Many of the Roman Catholics are anxious about their salvation and are studying the Bible in order to learn the whole truth. Mr. C—, of whom I spoke to you, said that if the Bible had to be followed, they were all lost. It was for him that I ordered a large

Bible lately."

"I was frequently asked to begin the building of a church to which they might come to hear the Gospel preached. The people are often puzzled to know how we Protestants can know our sins are forgiven by God when we never receive verbal assurance of it from our priests as they do from theirs."

"Many who are convinced of the falseness of their own Church, prefer to remain in it, nominally at least, rather then endure the petty persecution to which they

would be subjected if they were to leave it."

### SOWING BY THE WAY.

"On the train from G. I met a man from that place to whom I offered a New Testament for sale. He was about to take it when another man came up and said, 'It will work separation in your family.' There happened to be a Priest in the next ear and the would-be adviser challenged me to go to him with my books. I immediately went. On presenting my book to him for examination he said, 'That is a bad book, for it disturbs the faith of our people.' I explained immediately his difficulty by saying that truth always disturbs false peace. He became much embarrassed before the two men who had come with me, and said, 'I don't want to discuss with you, for I am occupied with my breviary and have no time, so leave me alone.' Then the man to whom I had offered the book asked it of me, giving for his reason that the Priest did not want to let him have it, wishing to hide so many things from the people."

"Some time before I had lent a Bible to a Mr. R. and a New Testament to Mr. G. Mr. G. came to me on the train to ask me to come into a private department where Mr. R. was, in order to speak about the Gospel. These two men have been studying the Bible and Mr. G. said he found many things to be true, but some hard to accept."

"For every person between S. and B. that I found well disposed towards the Gospel, I met fifty who were opposed to it. In spite of this not encouraging fact, however, we can rejoice that even the few copies of the Word of God that we placed, seem to have been received in the full understanding of what they were, and 'the entrance of Thy Word giveth light.'"

### THE GOSPEL AND THE SCHOOL.

"At the evening school forty-seven have followed the lessons. Ten have received Gospels. All have heard of the great work of Jesus for sinners. Not one of the forty-seven, so far as I know, have attended the public worship. I doubt not that God calls many who understand and pray and struggle. Our day-school here provides two ways of doing good: in the class room by religious instruction and hymn-singing; outside, by visitation of the homes of the pupils. Many Bibles have been given and read. Tracts

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given to scholars sometimes open up the way. Our little mission has suffered the loss lately of five Protestant and six Roman Catholic families. I am glad to know that the latter continue to follow up the teachings of the Gospel. I am comforted with the fact, amid discouragements, that our little mission is doing a work for the salvation of souls."

### UNEXPECTED WELCOME.

"Visiting the Roman Catholic families at S. C., I visited a family I was prevented from visiting before by some Protestant ladies telling me I had better not go to see such bad people, because the man has a very bad name. At last I thought it was my duty to go and try to do them good in offering them the pure Gospel of Christ. So I went and was well received. The woman told me she was very sorry when she heard that I went to visit the others and not them; and when she saw me passing a couple of times without calling. She told me she was brought up Protestant, her parents live in the States, and when she married, her husband promised to leave her free about religion, but after awhile he forced her to go with him and at last for peace sake she went, but does not like it because she can't go to hear the pure Gospel. I spoke, and read, and prayed with them, and she regretted that her husband was not at home to hear me, but hoped that when I came again he will be there."

### USELESS INTERDICT.

"I entered a house where I found a man and his wife and a neighbor, and offered them the New Testament for sale. The woman and her husband were disposed to buy, but the neighbor warned them that it had been forbidden by the Priest to buy a book from any Colporteur who had not a paper signed by him authorizing its sale. The woman bought the book and paid for it, saying she would like to see the priest who would dare burn it on her. We have reason to hope for fruit from that seed."

### INTER-PROVINCIAL INFLUENCES.

"At L. I went once and often twice a day, during my stay there, to the people on barges and steamboats passing the locks. I speak only of those who were French Roman Catholic people from every part of the Province, and some from Ontario; these last ones are generally more learned and not so bigoted as those of Quebec and know more about the Scriptures and are more willing to accept the Gospel. I sold and lent some Bibles and New Testaments to them and gave many tracts and papers, and these will reach many homes. I tound some men very indifferent about religion, but it is because they don't know the Gospel, and I tell them so. They all want to be instructed. I am sorry for them, for they are not responsible for that state of things. One of these men told me that his Priest said it was a good thing to fight Protestants."

### DISCOURAGEMENT AND ENCOURAGEMENT.

"The year now ending has been a strange mingling of discouragement and encouragement, of tears and songs of triumph. Depression in business, the closing of some factories and short hours in others, has so demoralized the poor working man and unsettled his mind and purposes that we found it difficult to get their ears attentive to anything else but sympathy in their troubles; their pre-occupation being how to get and where to go to earn an honest living. Over forty have thus left seats vacant in our church. Still we are cheered by hearing that their faith in the Gospel is a source of strength to them in their battle of life in the places to which they have gone.

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received he fortylod calls wo ways side, by Tracts "Many converts were in doubt as to the validity of their baptism as administered in the Church of Rome. Accordingly, eight whole families and several individuals, numbering forty-four in all, were baptized in the presence of a crowded congregation of witnesses and friends."

"Last Sabbath twenty-four partook of the Communion. Four were received as members on public profession of their faith, all of whom were formerly Roman Catholics,"

"Four Roman Catholics, probably six, will unite with us next Communion. God alone can open hearts, and we are asking for this."

"An old Roman Catholic couple was present at a recent prayer meeting. The subject taken up was salvation by grace through faith. Our visitors, who heard the pure Gospel for the first time, were profuse in their thanks, and promised to come again and bring others."

"We had also the pleasure of welcoming four French persons into full Communion lately, and of baptizing seven children of a family, all of whom were Roman Catholic not long ago. We have organized a C. E. Society, which is doing an excellent work among Protestants and Roman Catholics."

"Our Sunday school is increasing. A good number of Roman Catholies attend our C. E. meetings. There are abundant opportunities for earnest work among them. There are more open doors than I can possibly enter."

### GROWTH OF LIBERALITY.

"I am encouraged by seeing our little flock growing in the knowledge of the Gospel and in spiritual life. It is a fact, known to all observers, that those brought up under the bondage of Romanism, especially among the poor, need to be taught and elevated morally as well as spiritually. They are learning also the importance of giving of their little means (of their daily earnings) for the support of God's cause among themselves, and even to give a helping hand to such as are more unfortunate than themselves."

"Since we introduced the envelope system a few weeks ago, our contributions have increased one dollar and a half per week."

"Services well attended. Contributions have increased considerably over last year."

"The Sabbath attendance is good. Temperance is well observed, and the liberality of the people is good considering the poverty of most of the families."

"We have organized a W.M.S. and divided the congregation into districts, and two lady collectors have been appointed to collect for the Schemes of the Church. Several of our women belong to the French W.C.T.U."

### A MOTHER'S COURAGE.

"I have had the pleasure of seeing many timid Roman Catholics present at our meetings. The father of the family S——, whose children are at Pointe-aux-Trembles, comes regularly. The mother went to confess lately, but the Priest refused her the Sacrament unless she withdrew the children from Pointe-aux-Trembles. She has refused to do so. This whole family will, I hope, soon be won to the side of the Gospel. They are a brave family and number thirteen."

### OPEN DOORS AND ADVERSARIES.

"At St. R. we found the people 1 st so bigoted as they were ten years ago. This time we have been insulted only in a few places, but ten years ago they threw stones at me and insulted me everywhere. We would have sold this time many New Testaments if

### THE OUTCOME OF NEGLECT.

One of the most impressive and sadly instructive reports that has reached the office of the Board is from the pen of a man eighty-four years old. He has spent his whole life in the Province of Quebec as a faithful witness to the truth. He gives the names of eleven heads of Frotestant families—six of them Scotch, two English, two Swiss and one Dutch—who settled at Murray Bay in 1812. He carefully tabulates the number of descendants from each family for five generations, and finds that they aggregate ten thousand and thirty souls. Had these been brought up in the faith of their fathers they would now constitute as many as three-fourths of the population of the parish of Murray Bay, and be a great strength to the Protestantism of the Province; but through the neglect of the Churches to which the original families belonged they all speak only the French language and are Roman Catholic. It is to prevent the recurrence of a history of this sort in the case of many groups of our own people, as well as to give the Gospel to those that surround them, that our Church trains and employs missionaries and ministers who speak both French and English.

### CENTRAL MISSION SCHOOLS AT POINTE AUX TREMBLES.

As enquiry is frequently made for information regarding the Mission Schools at Pointe aux Trembles, we repeat what has appeared in previous reports:

The Schools are situated on the north shore of the St. Lawrence River, nine miles east of Montreal. They were founded in 1846 by the French Canadian Missionary Society, and were purchased by the General Assembly of our Church in 1880. On the Mission property there are two school buildings, one for boys, which can accommodate about 110, and the other for girls, with accommodation for between 70 and 80, including the recent extension. About 5,000 French Canadians have already been educated here. Many of these now occupy positions of trust and influence as ministers, teachers, physicians, lawyers, merchants, etc. Pupils are admitted between the ages of thirteen and twenty-five, the average age being seventeen. A preference is given to the sons and daughters of French-Canadian Roman Catholic parents and to the children of recent converts from Rome, living in parishes where there is no Protestant school. Many of these are unable to read or write when first received into the schools. The session begins in October each year and continues for seven months. The pupils all reside in the buildings, and thus enjoy the advantages of a Christian home, under the watchful nurture of earnest, devoted teachers. They all take their share of house-The day's duties are thus laid out :- Rise at 5.30 a.m. All are in the class room studying privately from 6 to 7. Breakfast at 7. House and out-door work from 7.30 to 8.45. Family worship, when all assemble together, boys and girls, at 8.45. School begins at nine with united Bible class for all, and continues till 12. Dinner at 12, followed by recreation to 1.30. Then classes till 4, recreation from 4 to 5, classes from 5 till 6, tea at 6, recreation to 7; studying privately in class room till nine, then family worship (boys and girls in their separate buildings) at 9, and all in bed and lights out at 9.30 p.m. There are eight teachers, all of whom reside in the buildings. They are earnest Christians, of devoted, Missionary spirit, thoroughly consecrated to their work. The Principal, Rev. J. Bourgoin, has been 26 years connected with the institution, and is admirably adapted for his position. The Directress of the girls' school is Miss L.

Haddow, from Dalhousie, N.B., a distinguished student in Modern Languages of University College, Toronto, and one who had some acquaintance with French-Canadian life from a residence in a rural district of Quebec Province, acquiring the French language. For two years Miss Haddow has occupied this position and has discharged the duties of it with fidelity and success.

Special prominence is given to the religious instruction of the pupils, and to the teaching of God's Word on the points of difference between Protestants and Roman Catholics. In these every pupil is thoroughly indoctrinated, and it is no exaggeration to state that comparatively few of our English-speaking young men and women are better acquainted with their Bibles, or are better able to give a reason for the hope that is in them, than are the pupils of Pointe aux Trembles when they leave the Mission School there.

The attendance last session was one hundred and fifty-five. Not only is great care exercised in the selection of pupils from the increasingly large number of French Canadians applying for admission, but the policy of the Board, in inducing the brightest among them to continue for three or four consecutive sessions, is bearing manifest fruit. The schools are visited and examined monthly by a committee of the Board, appointed for the purpose, and towards the end of the session written examinations are held on all subjects taught during the year.

When the Board acquired the property in 1880, it resolved to admit no pupils gratuitously, except Roman Catholics whose parents were unable or unwilling to contribute. All others are required to pay something, in proportion to their ability, towards board and tuition. The amount received in this way during the past session was \$1,147.30. A considerable portion of this amount was money earned by the pupils themselves during the preceding summer. After deducting these fees, the average cost to the Church of each pupil is \$50 per session. The Board desires that the institution should be supported by means of scholarships of \$50 each, guaranteed by private individuals or Sabbath Schools. A particular pupil is assigned to the donor of a scholarship, to whom reports as to the progress made are forwarded from time to time. In this way a Sabbath School contributing a scholarship is put directly in correspondence with the Mission School, and the letters, if read publicly to the Sabbath School, tend to keep up their interest in the work. The enlargement of the buildings and the consequent increase in the number of pupils necessitates a very large increase in expenditure annually. It is hoped, therefore, that many more of the Sabbath Schools of the Church and Christian Endeavor Societies will assume the support of pupils. From those unable to do so, a contribution is earnestly asked. The Board has no hesitation in warmly commending the schools as worthy of public confidence, assured that no means are likely, by the blessing of God, to be more efficacious in the work of French Canadian evangelization, and in advancing the cause of Christ in the Province of Quebec. Year after year God has manifestly set His seal upon this work, and blessed the labours of the teachers. "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad."

## PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude towards the friends and supporters of our Schools that we beg to present them with a brief report of the work of the past session.

Your unabating generosity has provided for our material wants, your prayers and your sympathy have sustained us, and the Holy Spirit has blessed the teaching of the truth for the conversion of several of our pupils.

We received last fall two hundred and fifty-three applications for admission in our Schools. With careful discrimination in the selection of those young people two

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mission in people two hundred and three were admitted, but, as usual, many of them were not permitted to come. One hundred and fifty-five pupils have been received. Fifty-three were girls and one hundred and two were boys. Seventy-eight belonged to parents still attached to the Church of Rome.

We have had the satisfaction of noticing a decided change in the views of many of those who came to us full of faith and confidence in the errors of their Church, while twenty-one, who had already spent a few years with us or who had been under Christian influence at home, have openly confessed their faith in Jesus as their Saviour and have united themselves with His Church.

It would be interesting perhaps to record how the Lord has brought some of them to the acceptance of His saving grace.

Some time ago a young phan was brought to us by his uncle whose children had been benefited by our School.

When our young friend went home after the session was over, his grandmother, having found a Bible in his valise, said she would never consent to his coming again to Pointe aux Trembles. During eight years he made constant efforts in order to obtain permission to return to school. It was not only a desire for education which pushed him in that direction, but he wanted to know more about the Bible. Last fall, seizing his first opportunity, he came back to us, and we never had a more attentive pupil at our Bible lessons. He was thirsting for the truth and before the end of the session he was rejoicing in Jesus as his only Saviour.

He said that the first session he spent here he was convinced of two things, first that we must obey the Bible, second that God alone can pardon our trangressions. He never went again to confess his sins to the priest except when compelled by his grandmother.

This fact shows once more that even when our pupils have not the liberty of coming back after their first or second session, what they have learned about the Gospel is not lost and sooner or later we find them in the ranks of the army of Christ.

A young girl who had obstinately fought against the truth for a long time and who had seen her father, mother and sisters, openly renounce the errors of Rome without being shaken in her convictions, at last understood that we must obey God rather than men. From that moment scales fell from her eyes, she saw Jesus in His love, she heard His voice and gave Him her heart.

The father of a large family who had sent us several of his children, having met with a severe accident which kept him from his work, the priest advised his people to let that family starve if they refuse to withdraw their children from Pointe aux Tremble. The mother who had been reading the Bible for a few months answered those who brought her that news: "We shall neither call back our children nor starve, because we now rely upon a loving God and not upon a greedy priest." We kept our pupils and the Church of Rome has lost the whole family.

A young boy who arrived in the School last fall, a Roman Catholic, received the Gospel after a few months of attentive study, and he soon took an active part in the prayer meetings conducted by the boys.

Having written to his father about the great change which had taken place in his views, his father answered him that he was glad to hear about it because for a long time he had shared the same views without having the courage of stating openly his religious convictions, not even in his family.

Another was writing twice a week to his sister at home in order to communicate to her the discoveries he was making through the study of the Bible, but, advised by the pricat, she said she would never answer his letters again if he continued to speak about religion. He had to discontinue his attacks, but he remained determined to

renew them in a more vigorous way when at home during the vacation. His father and a brother have already ceased their connection with the Church of Rome, but the other members of the family still have ears which do not hear.

Every year we witness such examples of young boys and girls who endeavor to

bring their parents and friends to the source of the living waters.

From the beginning an increasing spirit of prayer has been manifested. One of our former pupils who was visiting the school, having been present at one of the boys' meetings, said that he had been moved to tears on hearing so many young boys pray and speak so fervently.

As usual our scholars, especially the more advanced, have manifested a laudable ambition in the pursuit of their studies, and they have done their work with great care and punctuality.

Our higher division was composed of seven boys, all studying with a view to entering college.

Two of our pupils left a few days ago for missionary fields, where they shall work during summer, and many others had been happy to follow their example had the means been provided for their employment.

The Missionary Association of the pupils held its annual meeting in February and made a grant of one hundred and twenty dollars towards the schools.

During the past session the Girls' School has been again under the able management of Miss Haddow and her assistants, while the staff of teachers in the Boys' School counts again among its members Rev. E. H. Brandt, who had for a few years discontinued his teaching in order to complete his studies with a view to the ministry of the Church.

During the past year three events of great interest for the school have taken place. The first consists in the putting up of a hot air pump with a large filter, which gives us an abundance of clear water. The second is the inauguration of the electric railway, which has placed us at the very door of the city. The third is the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of the school.

During the past fifty years these schools have proved a powerful instrumentality for sapping the foundations of superstition, ignorance and prejudices, and they have also become the birth-place of many a young soul who was born again by the power of the Holy Spirit.

And yet we may not rest satisfied with the results of the past. Everything is pointing towards a mighty transformation which is going to take place in this Province, and more extensive sacrifices will be required from every Christian, who shall feel it his duty to guard our frontiers against infidelity.

Young people of our S. S. and C. E. S., we entreat you by the results of the past, by your Christian and patriotic duties, by the spiritual miseries of your French countrymen, to increase your efforts for freeing them from the bondage of Rome and give them the Gospel, which makes your superiority and your happiness.

REV. C. CHINIQUY, D.D.

This report would be incomplete without some reference to Dr. Chiniquy. For several years the Board has not assigned him any particular field. This has in no way limited his apostolic zeal and labours in the good cause. Since his removal from Kankakee he has resided chiefly in Montreal and preached and held conferences in many parts of the Province with gratifying results.

## COLIGNY COLLEGE, OTTAWA.

By order of the General Assembly this institution was purchased in 1889 for \$20,000, which sum, with the addition of \$5,000 laid out in repairs, etc., remains as an indebtedness on the property.

In compliance with the decision of the Assembly, the Board has diligently sought to carry on the institution as a French-English College, in the interests of French Evangelization, but with results which do not appear to justify the continuance of such efforts.

The number of French students from the first was small, and for the last year none have been in attendance. Inasmuch as it is not the work of the Board to conduct a

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upon beha the former years the College for the education of English speaking young women, the whole matter of the future of Coligny College was brought before the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, which will report its action thereanent to the General Assembly.

In view of the facts now reported, the Board recommends to the General Assembly either to relieve it of the responsibility of this institution and provide for the payment of the indebtedness thereon or give instruction regarding the immediate disposition of the property by the Board.

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## I. NEW HEBRIDES.

This, our first-born F. M. child, retains its hold on our hearts and gives us new joy every year, by the progress which marks its yearly history. Although the number of our missionaries remains stationary, we rejoice that the Australasian Churches and the Free Church of Scotland have together added four men to the staff engaged in the work a year ago. Two of those, the Rev. Thompson McMillan, of South Australia, and the Rev. F. H. Paton, of Victoria, are settled on Tanna; and two, the Rev. James Sandilands, of Victoria, and the Rev. Gatherer Bowie, of the Free Church of Scotland, are at work on Santo. The number of native laborers grows rapidly, and in this respect our service is well abreast of that of the sister Churches. Mr. Robertson employs over forty, and the native Christians support a quarter of them; whilst on Efate, under Mr. McKenzie, although the number is much smaller, it is increasing, and the workmen are paid in full by the native Christians.

As throughout the whole group, both Mr. Robertson, of Erromanga, and Mr. McKenzie, of Efate, speak warmly of the liberality of their converts, and point to the fact as indicating, along with a growing appreciation of Divine Ordinances and correct lives, a deepening spirit of true Godliness among the Christians. They both bear testimony also to the influence thus exerted on the few remaining heathen on their islands, in disposing them to view with increased favor the claims of Christianity. There is a large reduction of the stubborn remnant of heathenism, both on Efate and Erromanga. Additions to the communion roll were 85 in Erromanga, and 74 in Efate.

Dr. Annand devotes his whole time and strength to the institute located at Tangoa, for training teachers and preachers.

He reports as follows :-

"The Teachers' Training Institution has been in session fifty weeks during the year. The classes were taught twenty-three hours a week, exclusive of Sunday meetings and a Saturday evening prayer meeting. The classes for women were taught five hours a week. We began the year with thirteen male pupils, and we closed it with thirty-two on our roll. The total number of our family for which we have to provide is sixty, with the promise of more by the first steamer.

"The subjects taught are reading, writing, arithmetic, geography and singing. The Bible is our principle text book, both for reading and oral lessons. Some of our pupils have made marked progress. One young man from Male acted as my interpreter when I dispensed the Lord's Supper there on the first Sabbath in December, and he did very well indeed. All his knowledge of English has been acquired from the missionaries.

"On Sabbath days three companies usually go out to speak to the heathen. One of these goes to Araki, an islet three miles away, with a population of a little more than a hundred. Another goes to the two shore villages, and the third company goes to the hills. In all they have visited twenty-two villages, some of these ten or fifteen miles distant in the forest. The total population of the district we do not know, but some six or seven hundred in all have heard the gospel during the year.

"We have only four church members—these are all in the institution. Three others

are under training with a view to admission. "As this should be my last report of the evangelistic work on South Santo, I may add that we have now in this language the gospels of Mathew and John, the ten commandments, a catechism and eighteen hymns; all printed on our own press here.

"Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Bowie are expected here in a few weeks, to take up and carry

on this department of the work.

"I am sorry to have to report that our training institution is not sufficiently provided for financially. The assistant's salary of £150—has to be paid out of the common fund Nearly all the clothing, food and medicine for our large family, have to be purchased by us. The total income for the year was only £166. 13s. 7d, and our expenditure has been about £83 above that sum, hence any sums sent to help make ends meet will be thankfully received and promptly acknowledged.

"I omitted to state that our students work eighteen hours a week at manual labor,

Rates of Mrs. Ge Steamer Salary of Exchange on the plantations, housebuilding, boating, food, etc. We have erected six additional lime cottages for pupils during the year."

In a note dated February 15th, he says :-

"The number of students is now 39, of whom 13 are married. I have just received a cheque for £150 from the J. G. Paton Mission Fund, and £25 from Otago, for our institution. These sums have cleared off our debt and set us on our feet again. Things are now moving along smoothly and satisfactorily."

The new Mission S.S. Dayspring was wrecked on its fourth trip from Australia to the Islands. In the good providence of God, no lives were lost. Arrangements for the transport service of the mission were at once made by the Dayspring Board in Sydney, and that service has since—as it had been for some time previous to the arrival of the new Dayspring in the Autumn of 1895—been efficiently rendered by the Australasian New Hebrides Company, through their line of steamers.

The Churches supporting the Mission are now called upon to decide what method shall be adopted for the carrying on of the service, after the contract for the present year shall have been fulfilled. Shall this contract be renewed, and this method perpetuated; or shall a new Mission Steamer be procured? The F. M. Committee have hitherto taken the ground on which they have had the Assembly's support, that not only is a mission vessel not essential, but not as usoful, all things considered, as the steamers of a reliable commercial company. While the cost is much less than that of a mission vessel, the service is better, because of its frequency, its tendency to develop trade and elevate the natives in business capacity, and the general encouragement which it shows to enterprises calculated to better the outward condition of the people among whom we labor. The committee therefore recommend to the Assembly to decide in favor of the continuance of an arrangement with the A. N. H. Co., or some other S.S. Company that will perform the needed service on the most favorable terms.

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## H. TRINIDAD.

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ABSTRACT ACCOUNT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 1896.

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Fron we make Anot 9 During the year the work of this Mission was carried forward on the usual lines.

Rev. Wm. L. Macrae and Miss Fisher left on furlough in May. The former returned in December and the latter is expected shortly. In December Miss Kirkpatrick retired after her full term of service in the San Fernando School and Miss Archibald has returned to take her place.

In October, Rev. J. B. Cropper, who completed his course of study in April, returned from Canada, was received by the Presbytery, went on to Demerara, and took up the work at "Better Hope" East Coast, thus extending the work of this Canadian Mission to that Colony.

On April 3rd, three Senior Students who had completed their course of study were ordained to the work of the Ministry, and appointed, David Ujagarsingh to Oropouche, Paul Bhukhan to St. Joseph, and Andrew Gayadeen to Caroni, where they have labored with success.

The work has extended in many new settlements and centres of population, following up the people, who are flocking out into the country as road and railways prepare the way. In this work our catechists are a most valuable branch of the service.

No change has been made in the Education Ordinance during the year, and the present cumbersome fee-system still continues, to the annoyance of Teachers. Managers, Wardens and Education Officers. Changes of some kind will probably be affected before the end of 1897. We reaffirm our conviction that school fees must be abolished, and a moderate measure of compulsory attendance enforced to get the full benefit of the expenditure on Education.

The death of three teachers within two months greately weakened the staff in Couva, and nearly all our schools suffered during the year from the prevalence of measles.

Sabbath School work has greatly extended in 1896, and there are prospects of still further advance in the future.

There has been an increase in nearly every item of the following statistics:

To name each of the teachers and catechists, and give even a brief estimate of his work would unduly lengthen this report. Let it suffice that generally their conduct and diligence have been commendable, while some have excelled.

Miss Blackadder, however, must be specially noticed. She has now completed 20 years in Trinidad, a ong term of school service in such a climate. In the lack of room for her school children and the lack of funds to enlarge the building, she has been exerting herself among friends to raise means, and has the near prospect of getting her new room without drawing on the ordinary funds. Her report shows that she has given our Mission another year of good work.

The test of the secular work for the year is the Government annual examination for results. Out of eleven schools assisted by Government, six were graded very good, three good and two fair.

The religious instruction of the young falls upon both teachers and catechists, and is the point upon which particular attention must be concentrated, because many children can be reached in the day school who cannot be got into the Sunday school.

In the Tunapuna school the senior classes were taken into Mrs. Morton's daily Bible class for the Home girls with results so excellent that we are stimulated to devise an extension of similar measures for other schools in 1897.

The Girls' Home was re-opened at the end of January and closed December 19th. Eight girls took the full course or nearly so. Two were from Princestown, two from Couva, and four from different parts of the Tunapuna District. Six of them had passed the 3rd or 4th standard in our day schools. This made the work of the Home more satisfactory than in previous years.

They were taught in their own language Scripture knowledge, with training in the art of teaching others; off-hand translation of Hindi and English; singing, arithmetic and a simple English history; besides all the arts necessary to their housekeeping.

The conduct of the girls was excellent, and it was with much regret our people saw them leave the Home. The four belonging to this district will shortly be employed in

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ople saw ployed in school work and thus turn to account what they have been taught. The others have returned to their respective districts.

Most of the girls formerly trained were married from the Home. The four who remained unmarried when the Home closed in 1894 have been useful and well-behaved. Two have since been married, and the last two will be so shortly—three out of the four to teachers.

The Home closes for the present to give Mrs. Morton some relief from the confinement, and a change of work, and to allow a new set of girls to come forward.

A large number of school and temperance entertainments were held during the year. In this way we drill the school children to entertain their friends and present to all the dangers of intemperance.

I have placed the statistics of the year at the beginning of this report, that they may be pendered over with praise and prayer.

The original three who weathered the storm that dismasted the "Aurora" in Dec., 1867, after 29 years are here still, and Miss Blackadder after 20 years. Around us are these native agents and converts, the fruit of our past labors; and a vast multitude still to be called. Hopefully and thankfully do we lift up our hearts to the Lord who giveth the increase. Brethren, pray for us.

We give the following from the report of Rev. K. J. Grant, D.D., Missionary in San Fernando District:

As Mr. Fraser furnishes a full report on schools with statistics, and Babu Lal Bihari on the work of catechists, I will avoid in my brief report of the year any reference to these matters.

From the middle of May to Christmas Mr. and Mrs. Fraser were at Princestown, but from the superintendence and general direction of schools I was relieved by my son George, who also visited three stations on the Sabbath, chiefly to promote Sunday school work. Mr. Fraser continued in charge of the finances of the district and paid monthly salaries to teachers, catechists, etc.

I was daily engaged in the training school; the time given averaged one and a half hours daily. When the College was in session I gave two days weekly to instruction there. The remaining part of the week was occupied in matters almost innumerable, and nearly every hour of the Sabbath was devoted to active work. Hindustani was the language of the morning service in town and at all country stations visited, and English in the Bible class and in evening service.

The erection of St. Mary's Village, Rusillac and Fyzabad stations, into a congregation known as the Oropouche congregation, by the Presbytery, and the ordination of Ujagar Singh were events of interest. The election of elders there, and for the church here, showed a discrimination most creditable to the members, and we believe has deepened the interest and sense of responsibility, not only of the elders, but of those who chose them. The presence of Dr. Morrison at the ordination of elders at Oropouche added very much to the service, and his stay here, though brief, will not soon be forgotten.

Miss Kirkpatrick's retirement a few weeks ago, and the appointment of Miss Archibald who is now with us as her successor, may justify a special reference to San Fernando school. The whole history of this school shows steady progress. In 1876 we erected a school-house 40 x 20. Ten years ago, to provide additional accommodation, the main building was raised and the basement has ever since served for the infants. The two stories are now inadequate, and the limited space around will not allow of additions. When to this I add that the school-house stands within thirty-six feet of the Manse, it would not appear desirable to have more than 150 children in such close quarters. This has pressed upon the Council the question of acquiring a property with a large house,

fairly suited to our needs, on our western boundary; but I will not anticipate the action of the Council.

This school has settled the question of educating girls. Out of a roll of 260 the girls numbered 101. Of 145 children of Christian parents, 79 are girls and 66 boys; whilst of 88 Hindoos there are 18 girls and 70 boys; and of 27 Mohammedans, 4 are girls and 23 boys. Did Hindoos and Mohammedans give the same proportion of girls as Christians, the families now connected with the school would send up sixty-two girls additional.

Linked with the day school is the work of the Sabbath school. We follow closely the International lessons, and every day's lesson in school bears directly on the Sabbath school which is attended in this district by upwards of 900 children. Many of these can give the titles and golden texts for the whole year without being prompted; this was done last Sabbath by a little girl under six years, daughter of Rev. Lal. Bihari—104 distinct propositions without an error. Many know the Shorter Catechism by heart, and we aim at having it committed by all the more advanced pupils.

A growing sense of responsibility is a hopeful feature of the Mission.

The marked and constant co-operation of gentlemen in charge of estates deserves special acknowledgment. And, above all, we give thanks to God who hath daily loaded us with His benefits.

We call as follows from the report of Rev. W. L. Macrae, Missionary in Princestown District:

For various reasons the school work in this district is at a disadvantage necessitating constant work and worry. In all we have fourteen schools, ten of which are assisted by Government, and four upheld entirely by our Mission. We hope to have one of these placed on the Government list before the end of 1897.

The native teachers for the most part did their work well. A gradual but steady improvement is apparent in the work of this class of agents.

Miss Sinclair has completed her second year's work very successfully.

Catechist work received the usual attention. Eleven men were engaged during the whole year and four others gave a part only of their time to the work.

Attention was also given to their instruction every week. In going about their daily work these faithful men are not unfrequently called upon to endure hardness, in the form of abuse, from the baser sort of their countrymen, but this is cheerfully borne for the Master's sake and perhaps helps their training.

Special work among women has received some attention. Miss Eliza Baptiste—who is now Mrs. Toolsee—was engaged, with three others, in this work for several months with encouraging results.

Mrs. Mahabir and others rendered invaluable help gratuitously, and Mrs. Fraser made her influence felt admirably in this direction. Thus an effort has been made to bring the light of divine truth into some of our homes through this important agency, which we hope to see more effective in the future than it has been in the past.

Considerable advance has been made in Sabbath school work. Throughout the district twenty-two schools were in operation, with an enrolment of 884 and an average daily attendance of 483.

Much credit is due to cur young people—chiefly members of our Y.P.S.C.E.—who so cheerfully undertake this work in the different districts.

At the beginning of the year a written examination on the entire lessons for 1895 was held, and the majority of the children who attended made a commendable percentage.

Two Christian Endeavor Societies are regularly carried on, which materially help to interest our boys and girls in Bible study and train the older ones for Christian work.

Perhaps never in the history of our Mission did the need of earnest united prayer for

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the outpouring of the Holy Spirit seem so urgent as at the present time. On the one hand there is the whitening of the "fields to harvest" and a growing need for extension of work which the present financial depression forbids. On the other hand there is a deep craving on the part of your missionaries for a larger measure of the Power from On High, to operate in and through the entire machinery of our Mission, which never was so complete. as at the present time.

Rev. A. W. Thompson, Missionary in the Couva District, reports in part as follows: The work of the year has been carried on under heavy disabilities. As reported last year, two of our most intelligent teachers were cut off by death in the latter part of December. Our first work was to fill their places. This done, we began to gather up the ends of the work that had been in the hands of others while we were on furlough. School work had just begun when death claimed a very promising teacher. Ill-health compelled another to retire from the work. In July three more went up to the Training School at San Fernando, Miss Fisher went home on a well-earned furlough, and it was no easy task to carry on the work of her school.

Rev. Mr. Macrae kindly loaned us Edmund Mahabir, one of his teachers, who, with several assistants, did his best for Exchange School.

For the other schools we were obliged to use whatever materials we could lay our nands on.

At the close of the year only two teachers occupy the places held by them at the beginning of the year.

An epidemic of sickness passed over the greater part of the district, and while we lost but few scholars by death, the attendance at a number of the schools was much reduced. Heavy rains in the latter part of the year added their quota towards a further reduction of the attendance in the country districts.

Notwithstanding all these hindrances, good progress was made. The results of the school examinations were in every case satisfactory, and the general trend of school work has kept steadily upward. The young lads who were early called upon to fill up the gaps in the ranks of teachers met our expectations, and have given promise of being in due time worthy successors of those who have been called away.

Those at the Training School will be able to graduate, we trust early in June, and will form a most welcome addition to our weakened staff.

Ten schools were in operation throughout the year with an average quarterly roll of 669, an average quarterly attendance of 403, with 904 enrolled for the year. These figures show a considerable increase over those of the previous year.

In "making disciples of the Nations," the Sabbath school is one of the most potent factors and must have the first place in our scheme of education. Our work is to "disciple" the nations, "teaching them," etc.

The plan of work required by law for the day school allows but scant time for religions instruction. Our commission is not to teach grammar or arithmetic, but the truth and with the one aim of leading men and women to become disciples of Christ. Secular studies are useful only so far as they help to the accomplishment of this end. The Sabbath is a day of rest from all labor, and there is an opportunity for teaching old as well as young.

To get them together is our first task. Men and women make all sorts of excuses, and he must needs be a wise fisher of men who would catch them. Parents, though wide awake to the advantages of the day school, either oppose or are indifferent to the Sunday school, and the boys and girls are clever enough to make the most of this to avoid attending.

To secure suitable teachers is the second task. Our available Indian workers for the most part have more the need of being taught themselves than the ability to teach others. This can easily be understood, and is not by any means a reflection upon them. In time this difficulty, we trust, will pass away.

To this important work much thought and effort were devoted during the year, and it is now in a much more satisfactory state than ever before. The number of schools and scholars has increased - the latter has almost doubled—and the interest of the teacher, has been much quickened.

Three Bible women were also employed during the greater part of the year. They aimed at doing for the women and girls what the catechists do for the men. From this new venture encouraging results have followed.

Over 100 women are under instruction and many homes have been cheered and brightened by their visits.

Regular weekly prayer meetings are held by the people in four districts. We have been much cheered by this step in advance over past years, and take it as an evidence of quickening and developing spiritual life.

Fraser, Missionary, with Dr. Grant, in the San Fernando Field, says: I took charge of Princestown district in May, when Mr. Macrae left on furlough to Canada. I still continued the management of the finances of San Fernando field, and Mr. George Grant took my place in visiting the schools, and thus greatly aided his father in the work.

In Princestown, which was a comparatively new field to me, I was greatly assisted in the visitation of the schools and in the general management of the work by the zealous and trustworthy, Mr. C. C. Soudeen.

We carried on the work very much along the lines laid down by Mr. Macrae. This field is in some respects an exceptionally difficult one, but under the blessing of God, and by daily effort and constant watchfulness on the part of many of our workers, steady progress has been made

For statistics and particulars see Mr. Macrae's report.

Returning to San Fernando. By mutual arrangement my report of work in this district is to consist largely of statistics, which will perhaps be dry to some, but to the more thoughtful will give food for reflection. Dr. Grant will report on the general features of the work, including particulars about Sabbath schools.

A good many changes have been made in our list of catechists during the past year. Nehal Singh, one of our college students, went to Grenada early in the year to assist in mission work among the Indian people of that island. Later, Rameshwar went to Demarara in response to an appeal made by Mr. Slater for a catechist to hold the ground until the arrival of Mr. Cropper. Telik Singh, who had been a successful catechist in Oropouche and La Fortune some years ago and returned to India, came back to Trinidad in October, and has again taken up work in La Fortune. He is a strong man, and I have no doubt will do good work. Baldeo, one of our senior college students, commonly known as the deaf pundit, died in October after a long illness, which he bore with Christian patience and resignation. Our catechists have generally been very faithful, and have overtaken a large amount of work.

Services have been conducted regularly during the year by the catechists and missionaries in twenty-eight different places every Sabbath day. Hospitals are all accessible to our agents and are frequently visited, and the Gospel is preached from door to door on the estates. The seed has been sown in many hearts. We look to God for the increase.

There has also been a number of changes in the list of our schools, and a considerable extension in school work. Caratal was closed from the first of the year on account of the small attendance and the poor prospects of any appreciable increase in the population in the near future.

A few of the more advanced children are attending one of our other schools.

It was mutually agreed that Canaan and Bien Venue Government schools should revert to us, as they had not been making satisfactory progress under the Creole teachers employed by the Government. We took charge of them the first of June with the result that the attendance in one has been doubled and the other greatly increased. Indian teachers, as a rule, are required for the successful a magement of our country Indian schools. Government aid has been granted to Rusilac School for six months from the 1st January, 1897.

Early in the year a heathen man living in the jungle came entreating us to open a school in that locality and offered a building for school purposes. We visited the place to see what the prospects were for the opening of a school, and from one little hill we were able to count over sixty families where a few years ago there was not a house.

These people, when the term of their indenture expired on the estates, moved into

the jungle, purchased a small piece of land on which they raise, in some cases, sufficient rice and vegetables to support themselves. Many of them will doubtless in a short time become independent. It is important that we follow these people with the Gospel, as many of them were under religious instruction while on the estates. A school was opened. The attendance has not been large chiefly because the people have no roads, and the heavy rains in the wet season made their little paths in many places impassable.

The action of this heathen shows that a change is taking place in the minds of the people regarding the education of their children.

I reported a small school last year in Tabaquite, but early this year we suspended school work and approached the Government by a petition for a Government school. Our prayer was not entertained so we resumed work again in August on a larger scale, and have now just completed a new school house sufficiently large for the school and teacher's residence.

We have now in this prosperous cocoa district, which is being tapped by a new branch of railway, a flourishing school with eighty children on the roll and an average attendance of fifty-nine. Application has been made to have it placed on the list of Government Assisted Schools.

Our schools have generally done very satisfactory work, a number of them attaining a high mark of efficiency.

The old difficulty of getting the children into the schools still exists to a considerable extent. We hope the Government will have wisdom given them to pass a compulsory education Ordinance and thus save us expense and worry, and help to give to the people, who are too ignorant to know its value, the blessings of education.

Our twelve night schools have also done good work. About sixty people have passed the examination in Hindi. The demand for Christian literature is increasing from year to year. Rev Lal Bihari sold about 5,000 books and tracts during this year, amounting in value to \$120.00.

In addition to the new building at Tabaquite, we have erected a large schoolhouse at Harmony Hall, which gives us a teacher's residence and ample accommodation for ninety-tive children. Building has also been erected on the outskirts of San Fernando for Sabbath school and night school purposes. Our young people in San Fernando voluntarily came forward and gave a table, benches, etc., and carry on the Sabbath school themselves.

At a congregational meeting of Susamachar Church, San Fernando, it was unanimously agreed to contribute £25 more to Dr. Grant's salary, thus making the annual contribution from the congregation in San Fernando town £200.

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## COLLEGE REPORT, 1896.

Work in the Presbyterian College, Trinidad, began January, 1896, and closed at the end of November. There were two vacations—two weeks at Easter and four at Mid-Summer.

During the first term I was absent three weeks in St. Lucia, and so pressed with work on my return that I took no part in the college work, so that Dr. Grant and Lal Bihari will report respecting it.

As we had a student from St. Lucia, who was to return at the end of a year it was decided to form only one class from April 13th, and let the students come into residence every alternate week. This plan was carried out and worked well.

Eleven students were in attendance. I took the work on Monday and Tuesday. My subjects were Biblical Theology, The Life and Parables of Christ, and practical training for Mission work. The subjects studied were a constant source of interest to teacher and taught, and with a narrow margin for the indolence inherent in our nature the lessons were satisfactorily prepared.

All the arrangements and work of the year were carried out with the utmost harmony.

#### REV. LAL BIHARI REPORTS.

My work is performed chiefly in Hindustani, and in any part of the San Fernando district in which I appear to be most needed. In the town work I am associated with Dr. Grant, but chiefly among the Hindustani speaking; in the country I accompanied Mr. Fraser until he went to take charge of Mr. Macrae's work during his absence in Canada, and then I went with Mr. George Grant, B.A., when he visited and examined schools. I would go to the estate hospital in the morning, and in the afternoon, if it suited, to the laborers' houses.

I also gave a day weekly to college work. In comparing Hindooism and Mohammedanism with Christianity, or the religion of the Shaster and Koran with that of the Bible, I made free use of a well known Christian book called "Sat Mat Nirupan"; and also "Divine Revelation," this being the title of the book published by the Canadian Mission Press at Rutlam, and written by Mr. Wilson, a missionary there.

From the writings of Moses, I selected ten types of Christ, and in the New Testament traced the Apostle Paul in his three Missionary journeys.

We also studied several Christian hymns in Hindi; and in astronomy went far enough to satisfy the students as to the absurdity of the Hindoo's explanation of eclipses.

On every Saturday all the Catechists and some of the teachers met at 9 a.m. and remained in session till 11 o'clock. The International Series of Sunday School Lessons supplied us our weekly subject. Weekly, two, as pre-arranged, read each a paper on the lesson, others followed, aiming at enlargement, and then I followed with such a presentation of the subject as I thought suitable. Sometimes Dr. Grant, or Mr. Fraser, being present, assisted. It was expected that all would make this lesson the basis of at least some remarks on Sabbath.

All Catechists are required to keep a diary, an abstract of which is entered up in my book once a month. From entries made I find that the Catechists held 6,868 meetings in the year, attended by 65,718 people—the burden of their message is Christ died for our sins and rose again according to the Scriptures. Statistics may look meagre, but we have often satisfactory proof that the leaven is working where there is no open profession. God has given us fruit enough to show that we labor not in vain; but our joy would be full if the picture of the doves flying to their windows were realized in the ingathering of my Indian countrymen.

The Rev. J. B. Cropper has entered upon the work in Demerara with characteristic

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enthusiasm. His field comprises the estates of Better Hope, East Coast, some seven miles from Georgetown. He pleads earnestly for means to employ catechists to extend the work among the thousands of itindoos employed in the colony. We trust the Church will hear his call, and place the Committee in funds to give him such assistance as is immediately pressing. No more needy or inviting field can present itself to the Church than this, and having entered it, we hope that a determination to win it to Christianity will be manifest in our praying and giving on its behalf.

#### Korea

The last General Assembly approved of the action of this Committee in declining, in the meantime, to enter upon work in Korea. Since that time the question has come to many in the Eastern section of the Church with a new interest, and the Committee have looked at the whole subject again.

The Executive of the W. F. M. S., East, appeared before the Committee in February last, and expressed a strong desire that the Church would open up a field of mission work in Korea, giving their reasons for making the request. After consideration, the Committee resolved to lay the whole matter before the Presbyteries of the Eastern section of the Church, giving the reasons urged by the W. F. M. S., and also a statement of the obligations of the Church in the fields, under the supervision of the Eastern Division of the Committee, and to ask the Presbyteries for their opinion on the question submitted to the Committee by the W. F. M. S. All the Presbyteries replied, and at a meeting of the Committee on the 25th of May, the following resolution was adopted:—

"In view of the Reports of Presbyteries on the question of opening a mission in Korea, which show that, while a majority favor the step, there is diversity of opinion on the subject, and some desire that the matter be submitted to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces for consideration and final action, the Committee hereby request the Assembly to refer the further consideration of the whole question to the said Synod, and empower it to finally accept or reject the proposal to enter upon mission work in Korea."

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# III. INDIAN MISSIONS IN MANITOBA AND THE NORTHWEST TERRITORIES.

The y ar now closed has been a year of concentration, rather than of expansion. During the previous year three new missions were opened, but during this year not only did we undertake no new work, but the boarding school at Lakesend was closed, with a view to the transfer of the children to the Regina Industrial School, and it is now proposed to close the Mistawasis day school, with the same object in view. This does not mean the abandonment of any part of our work, but rather its increased efficiency, for it is expected that the total number of pupils will, at the worst, be no fewer than before. and that they will receive a training in Regina, both more thorough and at less cost to the Church than can be given in the smaller schools. There have been several changes among the workers. The Rev. Geo. Arthur, B.Se., has resigned his charge, and entered upon Home Mission Work. No successor has, up to the present date, been found, and the place is temporarily supplied. The closing of the Lakesend School has rendered unnecessary the work of Miss McWilliams, the teacher, and Mrs. Leckie, the matron of the school. Mrs. Lockhart, of the Crowstand, gave up work on account of ill health, and Miss McIlwaine has taken her place. Mr. G. W. Sahlmark resigned his position as teacher at Round Lake to enter upon a course of study for the ministry, and his place has been taken by Mr. R. G. McKay. Mr. D. C. Munro, the chief teacher at Regina, has been obliged, by ill health, to resign, no appointment to fill his place has been made in the meantime; his duties will be divided between Miss Nicoll, the teacher, and monitors chosen from among the older pupils.

The stringency in the funds of the Foreign Mission Committee has been severely felt in the West, and the erection of several much beeded buildings, for which plans had been prepared, had to be abandoned. A new and very promising opening for work which the committee now has under consideration cannot be entered upon until the finances are in better condition.

The most distinctive feature in the history of the year's work was the Conference of Indian Missionaries and Helpers held in Winnipeg last November. It was attended by nineteen of those engaged in the Church's work, and was carried on for three days, and it is a matter of common agreement that it proved of great advantage both to the committee and to the missionaries.

## REGINA.

The Regina Industrial School has an enrollment of 155, and an average attendance for the last quarter of 127. The system of sending older pupils out during the summer menths, the boys to work on farms, and the gi ls to act as domestic servants, has been pursued with a considerable measure of success. In this way their education is continued under very favorable circumstances, and they have an opportunity of becoming confirmed in the Christian and civilized ways taught in the school. Over forty pupils were out at service last summer, and the average wages of the boys was \$15 per month and board. The industries taught in the school include carpentry and cab. It making, shoe making printing and farming, besides all kinds of house work. The little fortnightly nowspaper. Progress, the printing of which is done entirely by the boys, has been published throughout the year, and has been the means of putting in circulation much information about Indian school and mission work. Bes. es the regular Sabbath services, there is a Chris-

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of worst remove any con success, abstaine hope th the Ind dations, in the v during t tian Endeavor meeting on Sabbath evening, a prayer meeting on Wednesday evening, and a missionary meeting on Thursday evening. Thirty-two of the pupils professed faith in Christ during the year. The number of Indian communicants is now fifty-four. The school contributed during the year \$218 to the Schemes of the Church, and \$111 to other religious and benevolent objects. On the 20th day of April the School had its first graduation ceremonial. Five young men and five young women, whose school education is complete, were sent forth to make their way in the world. Most of them have already secured situations among white people.

## MAKOCE WASTE (PRINCE ALBERT).

The Sioux Indians, who formerly lived on the north side of the Saskatchewan, opposite the town of Prince Albert, are being gradually transferred to a reserve some miles west of the town. The more enterprising and industrious have already made the change, but the work of persuading the others to move is very slow. During this transition time the school is necessarily small, but the enrolment has increased within the year from nine to fourteen. All the children and some of the women from the reserve attend the Sabbath school, and the progress, both in day school and Sabbath school, is very encouraging. These Indians are still heathen, but the suspicion with which, a few years ago, they looked upon the missionaries is being gradually disarmed, and there is a very noticeable improvement in cleanliness, industry, and friendliness with white people. It is still the time of seed sowing for Miss Baker and Miss Cameron, but the sowing is being done in faith, in confidence that in His own time the Master will bless the work.

#### MISTAWASIS.

This is our oldest Indian Mission, and nearly all the Indians in it speak English, not a few of them indeed, speak English better than Cree. Morning and afternoon services are held in the Mistawasis Church, the afternoon service being chiefly in Cree. On one Sabbath in the month a service is held in the Nebo settlement, and on this day only one service is held at Mistawasis. There are fifty Indian communicants, seven of whom were added during the year. A weekly meeting upon Christian Engleavor lines is held on Wednesdays. The attendance at the day school has been very small during the past quarter, partly on account of the severe weather and partly on account of sickness among the children. Miss Laura McIntosh, the teacher, has tendered her resignation to the committee, to take effect at the end of June. The Government suggests that the school be closed with a view to the transfer of the pupils to Regina. This proposal is under consideration.

#### LAKESEND.

The difficulty which has existed for some years of choosing suitable sites for places of worship still exists. The Government is making efforts to persuade the Indians to remove from the Qu' Appelle Valley and settle upon the plain, where alone, farming, to any considerable extent, can be earried on. These efforts have met with but indifferent success, but the committee, not to prejudice the efforts of the Government, has hitherto abstained from erecting church buildings of a permanent character in the valley, in the hope that before long the unsatisfactory village life in the valley may be broken up, and the Indians scattered as farmers on the plain. But it looks as if some temporary accommodations, more convenient than the Indian houses which are now used, should be provided in the valley, for the prospect of removal still seems to be remote. Services were held during the year on the three reserves which are included in the Mission and at the Mission House. The average attendance at each place varied from fifteen to twenty. There

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are sixteen Indian communicants, one being added during the year. The Rev. George Arthur, the missionary, resigned his position at the end of March, and has entered upon Home Mission Work in the west. The attendance at the boarding school became very small in the course of last summer, and in the autumn it was agreed to close the school and try to persuade the children of these reserves to go for their education to Regina, which is some thirty or forty miles distant.

#### FILE HILLS.

This school, which is still in charge of Mr. and Mrs. Skene, has an enrollment of sixteen, and an average attendance of the same number. Mr. Skene says: "During the past year we have moved on steadily. The children have made substantial progress both in the literary and the industrial parts of their work. They now speak English entirely, and the older boys and girls prefer it to Cree. Some of the older boys are looking forward to having farms and stock for themselves. We encourage them to think in this direction, because we believe that the desire for bettering their position, and cutting adrift from the old life and habits must have become a fixed principle in the minds of such children as ours are. Could we but get them thoroughly in love with farming, caring for stock, etc., and ambitious enough to wish to own these for themselves, the question, what is going to become of our children would settle itself."

Mr. Jacob Bear, the native assistant at Round Lake, visited the File Hills several times, and spent eight weeks in all with these Indians during the year. His faithful and sympathetic work in preaching to the Indians and visiting them in their homes has not as yet, however, borne any fruit in the way of professed conversions, but the general attitude of the Indians is much more friendly to the missionary and his teaching than it was a few years ago.

### ROUND LAKE.

Last autumn death entered the home of the Rev. Hugh McKay, and carried away his infant and only child, and the hearts of the parents still yearn for their little boy. The health of the pupils has been good, and there has been no case of illness in the school during the year, the average attendance, therefore, has been high in proportion to the enrollment. The numbers are twenty-three on the roll, and an average attendance of twenty-two. There are still about twenty treaty children on the reserve who are not attending school, and the only opening for them is in the Regina school, but the Indians are urging upon the Government that provision should be made for their maintenance in the Round Lake school, which is much nearer home, but this the Government has not agreed to do. The farm connected with the school not only gives the boys an opportunity of learning how to do farm work, but has been a considerable source of revenue to the school during the past year. The boys have, out of their own earnings, contributed about \$50 towards the support of the poor on the reserve. On the reserves regular religious services are conducted at five places, and there is an occasional service at a sixth place. The attendance varys from fifteen to thirty-five. Mr. McKay says the most discouraging part of the field is Shesheeps. The people there do not want a missionary. "We cannot hold meetings with them, for they will not attend. They tell us plainly that they wish to live in the enjoyment of their own religion. They are much troubled about compulsory education; they are afraid of it, and the women think, when they see the missionary, that he has come for their children, hence they dread and hate him. The people at the other reserves are more reasonable, although some of them still think that the meeting is not orthodox if there is nothing to eat. We have tried to change a little on this point, and ask them to give a collection instead of receiving one. The collection is on behalf of the poor of the reserve. They have no money, but they have the opportunity of bring from constant abunda are sorn and get

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of bringing a rabbit or a prairie chicken or anything else they can spare. The suffering from cold and hunger has not been as great as in some former years, than to the abundant supply of warm clothing ser! by the Woman's Foreign Mission Society. We are sorry to report that there is much drinking. The Indians sell hay and wood in town and get whiskey for it."

Mr. Jacob Bear, the native missionary, has continued to assist Mr. McKay, and has also made periodical visits to File Hills. Mr. McKay speaks highly of his bithful work, and says, "no matter how stormy the day, or how drifted the roads, Jacob is always at his appointment."

#### HURRICANE HILLS.

This is a new Mission. Until September last there was no place in which to hold services, and the meetings which were held in the Indian houses or tepees were poorly attended, not averaging more than six at a meeting. A stone building to serve both as a residence for the missionary, and a place for holding services was erected at a cost of nearly \$2,000. But even after that, serious opposition was encountered in the firmly established custom of holding an Indian dance every Sabbath afternoon and evening. But after some misgiving it was agreed to effer to each Indian, who attended the evening service, a cup of tea and a ship biscuit. The result has been that there is an average attendance at the morning service of twenty, and at the evening service of thirty-seven, and Sunday dancing has been given up, although a special house had been crected for the purposs. "There is no trace yet," Mr. Gilmour says, "of any deep religious impression, but God, no doubt, in His wise time and way will bring about a change."

#### THE CROWSTAND.

The Rev. C. W. Whyte says: "The past year has been in many ways the happiest in present incumbency. The attendance at church services has kept up. The church building has been improved by a lining of lumber, which has added much to the appearance of its interior. The intercourse between missionaries and people has been very friendly. The years spent among the people have increased their confidence, and it would seem that the natural antipathy to the white man has been, to a great extent, overcome." In addition to Sabbath services held more or less frequently at five places, there is a Biblechass on Monday evening, and a Christian Endeavor Society on Friday evening. On account of the large number of non-treaty children in attendance, the Government of the N.W.T. has promised a grant of \$300 per annum, as to a public school. This Mission is about to lose the services of the Rev. C. W. Whyte, on account of the unsatisfactory condition of Mrs. Whyte's health, and of Miss Gillespie, who goes to fit herself, by a course of hospital training, for further missionary services. The school has an enrollment of forty-one pupils, and for the last quarter an average attendance of thirty-six.

## BIRTLE.

Since the beginning of last July the Government has increased the grant to this school, so as to provide for forty pupils instead of twenty-five, as formerly. The number upon the roll now is forty-five, and the average attendance for the year is forty-four, all of whom are provided for out of the Government grant. A junior Christian Endeavor Society has recently been organized, and the children are taking a great interest in it. The place of Wm. Martin, out door assistant, has been taken by Hugh McKay, an Indian lad from Regina.

#### BIRD TAIL.

This reserve mourns the loss of Jason Ben, one of the main helpers to the missionary, who had been in failing health for three years, but who has left behind him a life

example of great influence. There are twenty-two Indian communicants, of whom five were added during the year. There is a weekly prayer-meeting and a Sabbath school, both held during the greater part of the year. There is also a meeting for men, under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association, and one for women, under the care of the Woman's Foreign Mission Society. The old log church which has stood for more than twenty years is beyond repair, and should be replaced this summer.

#### LIZARP POINT.

This is a new Mission and we have no church building yet, but services are held in different Indian houses, with an average attendance of thirty. Two members of the band have professed their faith in Christ. The long established stoms of gambling and holding heathen dances on the Sabbath have been given up, but Mr. Black's attempts to hold weekly prayer meetings have not been successful, and instead of trying to carry them on, he spends his time in visiting among the Indians.

#### ORINISH

Mr. R. C. Macpherson acts both as missionary and as teacher on this reserve. He reports that the average attendance on the Sabbath is about fifty. The attendance at the Wednesday prayer meetings, which are held in Indian houses, is fourteen. There are thirty-eight Indian communicants; four were added during the year on profession of faith, and three were removed by death. Mr. McPherson reports that "there is a deeper spiritual feeling manifested among most of the people, but particularly among the women, who are anxious to learn to read the Bible in their own language; one of the chief's daughters is giving lessons in reading to two of her elder sisters." For the quarter ending March 31st, the number on the roll of Sunday school was ten, and the average attendance seven. This is considerably smaller than during the previous quarter, owing partly to the severe weather and partly to the transfer of several of the larger pupils to industrial schools.

## ROLLING RIVER.

Services are held in the house of an Indian every Sabbath morning, with an average attendance of fourteen, and in the house of another Indian on a different part of the reserve, with an average attendance of six. There is also a Wednesday evening prayer-meeting in the mission house. The improvement among the Indians, in the way of cleanliness and house work, is very noticeable, but the missionary confesses that the signs of spiritual advancement which he hoped for a year ago are not apparent.

#### PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE.

There are thirty-six names upon the rell, and during the last quarter the average attendance was 29. Three of the older girls have had their names removed from the school roll, and are constantly engaged in domestic service in the town. A Christian Endeavor Society has recently been organized, and the children take great interest in it. Sabbath and mid-week services are held in the Indian Church on the outskirts of the town, with the assistance of Mr. Edward Brown, now Mayor. The average attendance at these meetings is forty. "The work is increasing in interest. The prejudices against the Mission are slowly dying out. A spirit of enquiry as to their way or ours being best is prevalent, and although only able to report one new communicant, we feel sure that many are not far from the kingdom of God."

#### PIPESTONE.

There are now four Indian communicants in this Mission, all added recently. The Sabbath services are fairly well attended, and there is a prayer-meeting every Wednes-

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ly. The Wednes day. An evening class was carried on during the winter for the purpose of instructing the young people in reading their own language. Mrs. Thunder, the wife of the missionary, has a class of women for instruction in knitting, etc. The interest shown and the progress made are very satisfactory.

#### MOOSE MOUNTAIN.

Until the beginning of Ap il the missionary on this reserve was Mr. D. A. Mackenzie since then his place has been taken by Mr. F. T. Dodds. The work on this reserve is still in its elementary stage, and the avowed hostility of the Indians to Christianity has only been partially overcome, but the foundation has been laid by Mr. Mackenzie amid many hardships, and the future is likely to be the smoother on account of his sacrifices. Mr. Dodds is at present engaged in the acquisition of the language, but has already begun to hold services with the aid of an interpreter. This Mission has suffered a very severe loss in the removal of Mr. J. J. Campbell, the Indian agent, who took a great interest in the Mission, and who did much to make the life of the missionary comfortable and his work effective.

Nearly every missionary makes grateful mention of the assistance which his work received from the clothing and other gifts in kind provided by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. These gifts provide for the children who attend the boarding schools, and so reduce in a considerable massure the cost of maintenance, and for the sick and infirm Indians on the reserve, with their tendency to pulmenary troubles, the abundant and warm clothing which the ladies provided is a means of warding off disease and prolonging life.

#### SUMMARY.

Exclusive of the Indian Missions in British Columbia, which are reported elsewhere, the work of the Presbyterian Church among the Indians of Manitoba and the North-West Territories is carried on from sixteen centres, on twenty reserves, and with regular Sabbath services conducted at thirty-five places, besides occasional services at many other places. The number of communicants is 234, of whom fifty-eight were added during the past year, a net gain of forty over the previous year. There were twenty-three baptisms of adults and thirty-nine of infants. The number of industrial and boarding schools is six, which is one less than last year, on account of the closing of the Lakesend school. These schools have 331 pupils enrolled, an increase of one over last year, and an average attendance of 274 for the quarter ending March 31st, which covers the severest months of winter weather, and is lower than for any other period of the year. There are three day schools, which have an enrolment of forty-three, and an average attendance of thirty-four. These missions have contributed \$512 to religious and benevolent work of various kinds, of which \$335 was given to the Schemes of the Church.

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## IV. MISSION TO JAPAN.

## FORMOSA.

The past year has been one of trouble, anxiety and sorrow for Christians in North Formosa.

- 1. The rebels not only harassed the Japanese, but as heartless robbers captured defenceless Formosans, who had to be ransomed by friends, or be tortured to death. In Kap-tsu-lân preachers and people passed many nights under trees and bushes to escape the pillaging banditti.
- 2. Buddhist priests from Japan have been zealously laboring to increase their number of devotees. Of course Christianity has been attacked and vilified by the enemies of the Cross.
- 3. Locusts for the first time appeared, and in numbers so vast that the boldest peasants were filled with alarm.
- 4. Bubonic plague also, which was hitherto unknown, claimed numerous victims in the crowded streets of North Formosa towns.
- 5. Drought added to the misery, and at one mission station farmers left their homes to labor for rice because they had no harvest to reap.
  - 6. The stations where mission work was not interrupted were few indeed.
- 7. Several young men on probation were led by family troubles to go into business; but they have not forsaken the worship of the Lord our God.
- 8. It is said that nearly all the Japanese women who parade the streets of towns and cities are prostitutes. If that be so, I have only to exclaim, alas!! alas!!! alas!!!
- 9. Three older and two younger preachers have gone on high, whilst two more are consumptive and will soon enter where "there shall be no more death." These seven were faithful servants, and contracted disease through labor and exposure in the Lord's service.

The above will show somewhat the dark side, whilst the following will make the bright side of the mission more apparent :—

1. Since the new Governor-General, Baron Nogi, entered on his duties there has been a milder reign. There can be no doubt he desires to govern faithfully, honestly, and justly.

The Mission has already shared in the good fruits. Japanese soldiers have not only vacated our chapels, but have become more civil in their deportment towards our workers

- 2. Rev. Ogimi, sent by the Church of Christ in Japan, spoke in many chapels, and labored to remove obstacles. Mr. Kawai, a Japanese evangelist, rendered profitable service among his own countrymen.
- 3. Since our return from Canada eighty-two idols, and fifty-eight ancestral tablets, have been presented to my museum by Formosans who have embraced the Gospel of Jesus Christ. One idol, which was worshipped to fifty years in Tek-chham, is simply a plain stone, five inches high.
- 4. Promising young men, one of whom was an idol maker, have come forward to fill the broken ranks of preachers who have fallen in battle.
- In Tek-chham, Sin-tiam and elsewhere the work is vigorous, healthy and progressive.
- On Jan, 10th, in Bang-kah Church, 384 Chinese and twenty-six Japanese met for worship. Although it was not a meeting for neighboring stations, I baptized five Japanese

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and thirty-six Chinese. Then 106 commemorated the dying love of our Adorable Redeemer. Mr. Kawai spoke in Japanese to his nationals. It was an encouraging, interesting and inspiring meeting.

7. From April till the end of June, Rev. Wm. Gauld, Koa Kau, Iap Sun and Rev. Giam Chheng Hoa took part in teaching at Oxford College. Others taught Bible women, girls and children in the Girls' School, and every evening these joined preachers and students in college hall, and engaged in the various exercises.

8. Quite a number of converts came from the Sin-tiam hills to escape the bandits and occupied the back part of the college. Others were frequent visitors; besides a number of men on probation came to remain until the rebels should become less hostile. So as not to lose precious time, Koa Kau and Iap Sun assisted me in teaching in an irregular way from October till the end of February. The college was not formally opened, still old and young made excellent progress.

9. Henry A. C. Bonar, H. B. M. Consul, gave \$20 to assist the refugees in college, and Mr. W. Beauclerk, from the British Legation, Peking, presented some red cloth to the most needy girls.

10. Since our return from Canada, until the beginning of this year, I had to bear the whole responsibility of MacKay Hospital, because the English doctor through illness became incapacitated for work. I did not take charge of the Record book however till July 1st, and can only state the number of patients from that date till the close of 1896.

There were 584 new and 3,317 old patients during that time. Considering the state of the island and the absence of Chinese soldiers, who were wont to swell the numbers, these figures will compare favorably with those of any year in the Hospital history.

11. Rev. Wm. Gauld has been faithfully visiting all the stations in the neighborhood. Rev. Tan He at Sin-tiam continues as in past years. Rev. Giam Chheng Hoa has given attention to the chapels around Bang-kah. Iap San preaches at Tamsui, and Koa Kau is a sort of servant for the entire mission, as converts, preachers and students come and go without a break, and he is all hours of the day interrupted to attend to their various wants. Seeing the Japanese flag—a rising sun—floating on every hand, I often think of the time when the Sun of Righteousness shall arise and make this island so full of natural beauty—a place where the Church of God shall shine with all the glory of our glorious and glorified Christ.

"Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion, Behold, thy King, cometh unto thee."

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## V.—CHINA.

## HONAN.

Our missionaries in this difficult field are in labors abundant, and in spite of the enemy's most strenuous opposition, are seeing indications of a coming harvest. There has been a considerable amount of sickness, and again and again their hearts have been made sore by the loss of little ones, doubly precious because of their surroundings in that dark and weary land. Dr. McClure's daughter, Margery, died on the 5th August, and Mr. Maclennan's daughter, Marion, on the 31st December. The same disease proved fatal in both cases—dysentery followed by meningitis. Our prayer is that God may give comfort in their great sorrow. Others who have been afflicted are happily restored and again engaged in the work. There are in this mission three central stations—Chu Wang, Ilsin Chen and Chang Te—in which our missionaries are distributed. Each of these central points is surrounded by a number of out-stations, that are regularly visited. The circle of out-stations gradually widens as the influence of the mission and ability to overtake the work increase. The area to be overtaken is boundless; the fields are wide and white unto the harvest. The methods of work are substantially the same at the different stations.

1. Medical Work—At Chu Wang Dr. McClure performed during the year 564 surgical operations. In one day he successfully operated for cataract and restored sight to six men who otherwise would have been hopelessly blind for life. Three days later four others were similarly treated in one forenoon. Thus within four days ten men were delivered from the awful doom of blindness in China. During the year 75 cataractous eyes had sight restored by operation; 52 had sight improved by the formation of an artificial pupil; and 288 had sight improved, or eyes saved from becoming worse, by operation for Euntiopion.

The forenoon was usually devoted to surgical practice and the afternoons to other treatments. There were treated during the year 8,238 new patients, and 19,866 return visits—in all 28,104 treatments. This number does not include the many who were turned away as hopeless.

The one room in which all this work was done is only 12 ft. x 17 ft., with brick floor and corn stalk ceiling. The operating table is a wide board on two wooden trestles, and the pillow a brick. In one day 210 have been treated in that apartment. As each patient has usually a friend or relative along, we can imagine the current of diseased and loath-somely unclean humanity passing through that small room, and the condition of the atmosphere. Every reader will instinctively feel that they ought to have better accommodation for so great a work.

At Hsin Chen Dr. Malcolm is doing similar work, but patients are not so numerous. Dr. Menzies has begun his work in Chang Te. Miss Dc. Dow has been employed amongst the women at Chu Wang, and has co-operated with Dr. McClure.

2. Chapel Work - These sick multitudes, many of them from great distances, were ministered to in the street chapel every day. Some remained in the Hospital for two or three weeks, and some for months. During that time they were constantly instructed in the Word of Life, and when returning to their homes, took tracts and Scripture portions with them.

In Chang Te the chapel services were of peculiar interest. Mr. Goforth writes: "Our chapel has been open from eight to ten hours a day, the whole year. In it from

thirty to forty thousand people have heard more or less of the way of salvation. Many were evidently convinced of the truth by the Holy Spirit. Interested ones came again and again. During the B. A. examinations three or four thousand students were in the city, and many of them came to the chapel." The enemy as usual tried to cause trouble by the circulation of vile reports, but no serious consequences followed. Enquirers were persecuted and became more earnest than ever.

At Hsin Chen the faith of the missionaries has been seriously tried. They write: "We have preached and taught so long and constantly that our message is to the natives as an 'oft-told tale." It is so familiar in the town that little children mock us by singing snatches of the hymns they have heard us singing. The devil has them so bound in unbelief that their hearts remain unaffected by the truth they are so familiar with. Some of our nearest neighbors are our worst enemies, seeking to annoy us in every possible way, reviling us in the street, insulting us to our faces, and even gathering around the door of our meeting place armed with knives, and threatening to take the lives of the natives who are with us. So that while we deplore the fact that we cannot tell of precious sheaves safely garnered, we can and do with thankful hearts acknowledge that God has preserved us in the midst of enemies, giving us many opportunities of declaring His message, and of returning good for evil in healing some diseases which the native doctors could not heal."

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These are pathetic words and should elicit the sympathy and prayerful co-operation of the Church,

3. Out-Stations—These are regularly visited from the central stations. The converts in these stations become witnesses in other stations farther afield, and thus the work widens in area and influence. The number of missionaries and native helpers is the only limit to the enlargement of the work. The doors stand wide open and invite laborers.

The Roman Catholic invasion has been a serious hindrance to the work. The priest uses money freely to induce enquirers to connect themselves with the Catholic Church. Employment is given as teachers, etc., dobts are paid, security against persecution is promised, etc., resulting in the defection of many who gave promise of usefulness in the near future.

- 4. Station Classes—Our missionaries have been cautious in baptizing converts. They wish to have the foundations well laid. Interested ones are, after careful examination, enrolled as enquirers. At Chu Wang 26 have been enrolled during the year. At intervals those enquirers are assembled in one place for eight or ten days for a course of instruction in Bible knowledge. At Chu Wang such a class was attended by 27 men, who were taught by Messrs MacKenzie and MacLinnan. A class for women, attended by seven, was held about the same time. At each of the other stations a similar class was held.
- 5. Woman's Work—Large numbers of women hear the Gospel daily in the Hospital at Chu Wang. At Chang Te, during the first four months of the year, Mrs. Goforth says: "There was a wonderful time of seed sowing amongst the women, many thousands came within hearing of the Gospel. It was an opportunity for reaching the women, the like of which would probably never return again in the history of the station. Every effort was therefore put forth to tell they way of salvation to all who came. Curiosity, with but few exceptions, brought them to us, but though they came only to see, many stayed hours listenting to the Gospel, and in not a few instances returned again to learn more. In the early summer, vile stories were circulated about us, and prejudiced the people, so that no woman who valued her good name dared come to us, and thus almost all who had given us good cause for hope were kept away."

Thus the conflict continues. There are weary waitings, disappointed hopes, but in the end, to the eye of faith, certain victory.

## VI. CENTRAL INDIA.

India has been visited by plague and famine during the year. The amount of suffering and mortality is appalling. The conditions of society arising from their superstitious beliefs, especially their caste system, are such as to greatly intensify such calamities when they do come, rendering inoperative methods successfully adopted elsewhere to minimize distress.

Central India has suffered only indirectly, yet the helping hand has been extended by our Church and Mission, in the adoption of a number of children who shall be eared for, and in the giving of employment to others who were suffering.

## INDORE

Mr. Wilkie says :

"The past year has been on the whole one of steady progress. We had a larger number of baptisms last year than before—28 in all; in some cases at least more marked Christian life and carnestness; larger givings by our Christian people by nearly one half; more outsiders present at lectures etc., or a grarely Christian character; a larger number of students in both High School and College with nearly double the amount in fees; a larger average of passes in the University Entrance or Matriculation Examination last year—all we sent up, six in all; a larger number this year sent up for all the University Examinations, viz: 6 for the B. A. Examination, 10 for the First Arts Examination, held at the end of the 2nd year college course, and 17 for the Entrance or Matriculation Examination; and as a new feature 21 Christian students formed into our 'training class.'"

Congregational—There are 134 on the communion roll, and the congregation is now taking the important step of extending a call to Mr. Johory to become their pastor. Mr. Johory was for some time a teacher in the Indore College, and afterwards gave his time to evangelistic work at the same station. He is a graduate of Calcutta University, and has proved himself to be an efficient worker. It is a cause for congratulation that one of our congregations in Central India has reached this stage, which all missions regard as desirable. A native Church with a native Ministry is the hope of India.

## I. MFDICAL WORK.

1. Hospital for Women—Miss Oliver and Miss McKellar have been in charge of this Hospital. During the year 271 patients were received for treatment. They were quietly conversed with and some eagerly sought to know more about Christ. Some had been varned by friends not to listen to what might be said. One nice Mahommedan woman used to send her mother away on some pretext and then say, "Tell me about Jesus, teach me to pray to Him."

Deaths—Elizabai was one of Miss Ross' teachers in Mhow. She died of peritonitis. Friends did what they could to destroy her faith and often were abusive, but she stood fast. In her delerium she prayed for her people, and said, "I want only Jesus."

Kashibai, the wife of a Ujjain Christian, died of phthisis. Friends could not believe she was going, until she 'fell asleep.'

Helena was the younger sister of Hattiebai, and a Cl. ristian of rare beauty. She was in heaven when on earth and rejoiced in the prospect of going home.

Matron—A middle-aged Eurasian widow has been engaged as matron and give promise of being a suitable person.

2. Dispensaries—(1) The Bazaar dispensary has been removed to a less desirable locality, but more suitable building. Old patients find it out, so that the attendance is better than before.

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4. attenda diligent for less accustos causing (2) The Hospital dispensary has been attended about as usual. The Bible woman when not in the villages, talks to the women in waiting for treatment in the dispensary.

3 House-to-House Visiting—During the year 141 women have been treated in their homes, who were willing to pay for that privilege, rather than come to the dispensary.

4. Village Work—The range was widened this year, and 34 villages and mobullas visited, most of them several times. This work is done chiefly during the cold season. In two villages where European women had never been seen before, they were afraid, but elsewhere our missionaries were kindly received. Although in almost all villages the women will gather and join in singing, yet seldom more than one or two are interested in the gospel message. The missionaries soon learn who these chosen ones are,

5. Treatments—In-patients, 271; out-patients, 7,495; treatments, 21,841; visits to patients 1,423; major operations, 53; minor operations, 214.

## II. EDUCATIONAL.

1. College and High School—Mr. Wilkie's report has not come to hand, but the report of the High School Inspector has been received, and is a favorable one. There are English, Urdu and Hindi departments, with nearly 300 pupils in all. There are about 15 teachers in the different departments, but these teachers do not all give their time exclusively to college work. Mr. Ledingham and Miss Chase, who are themselves University graduates, have rendered valuable service in the English department, before they had acquired the language of the country.

2. Girls' Boarding School—Until Miss Sinclair's return in November Miss White was in charge of this school. There were during the first half of the year 33 enrelled. After the holidays, one was married and is now helping Miss Jamieson in school work in Ujjain. Another helps Miss O'Hara in dispensary work at Dhar, and a third was married to a Christian worker in Indore and assists Miss Greir in the Hindi Girls' School. Two of the senior girls assisted Miss White by teaching the less advanced, at the same time carrying on their own work.

Inspector's Report—"I am glad to see that in all respects the school maintains its high standard of proficiency." "The school is graded into five classes, with 4, 6, 9, 2, 8 scholars respectively, making a total of 29, besides one child not of school age." "Progress in Hindi is very satisfactory and also making good progress in English." "Singing by ear is beautiful in time and tune, and in lower classes kindergarten drill and action song are done correctly and with spirit."

Y. W. C. A.—Weekly meetings have been well attended and interesting. They contributed for Christian work Rs. 10, since holidays.

3. Normal Training Class—This work has been conducted in two departments—
"Methods of Teaching," and "School Arrangement"—Miss Ptolemy taking the former
and Miss White the latter. The classes have so far been conducted in English, and yet
creditable examinations have been passed. The native ideas of teaching are so primitive,
consisting of "weary repetitions" and memorizing, that these classes will be of the
greatest value. Each pupil teaches two hours a day in some part of the city where a class
is gathered by themselves. They then spend three hours a day in the high school classes,
and are besides led through a course of Bible study such as will firsthem for Christian
work.

4. Hindi Girls' School—Miss Greir is in charge of this school, which has a regular attendance of 40 girls, besides 5 women who, with babies in arms, come to the school and diligently seek to learn. Miss Greir says that wool crotchet work is taught as a reward for lessons well done and proves effective. Geography puzzles them because some were accustomed to think that the earth rested on a serpent's head, the movements of the head causing the earth's motion. The head teacher is one of the boarding school girls, married

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desirable ndance is last autumu, and who proves so efficient as to make them appreciate the value of boarding school training. There are three teachers in all.

5. Marathi School—Miss Greir had charge of this school for eight months, but it is now controlled by Miss Ptolemy. This school has suffered by too many changes of teachers. Besides Miss Dougan, Miss Greir and Miss Ptolemy, succeeding each other within a few months, one teacher was married, one died and a third was dismissed. Two teachers remain who were there a year ago. The result is only an average attendance of 57 out of an enrolment of 207. Under the present head teacher, Shañtabai, the average attendance is rising. One of the teachers who has never broken caste and is therefore called a heathen still, has many friends amongst the Brahmin caste, and has taught them so much about Christianity that they are eager to learn more. This illustrates the folly of estimating results by the number on the communion roll.

6. Sewing Classes for Mang Women—Miss White, who is in charge of this class, is much encouraged by the progress made in sewing and knitting, but especially in Scripture knowledge. Seven of the younger women have undertaken to learn to read, and others

are inspired by their success.

7. Industrial Home—This is supported by the Congregation. It is in charge of Mrs. Johory, who without salary or assistance carries on the work. The women are taught to sew and knit so as to earn an honorable living. Many are being transformed into Christian workers, who would have been outcasts. "They who a short time ago were regarded as fit only for the lowest dens of the city, are to-day eagerly sought for as wives by our Christian young men and they will in most eases probably, as wives, as teachers. etc., more than repay the Mission for all expended upon them, and what of the happy eternity beyond, the joy in Heaven even now? There are 24 in the 'Home' now."

- 8. Zenana Visiting—Miss White, accompanied by a Bible woman, visited 25 Hindu and Mahonmodan homes in which 70 women were reached and interested. Miss Greir had two Bible women engaged who went together, one day into Marathi and the next into Hindi, speaking homes connected with the Marathi and Hindi schools respectively. They were kindly received in almost all classes of homes, but they chiefly labored amongst the middle classes. They made during the year 810 visits and came in contact with 2,876 women. Fancy work is usually taught to gain entrance, but in these cases was not necessary, singing and reading proving sufficiently attractive to secure a welcome. In cases in which English is taught the missionaries must teach it, but that takes more time than they can well afford.
- 9. Sabbath School Work—There are many of these. In the waiting-room of the Hospital 25 or 30 met and were led through the Life of Christ; golden texts, the commandments hymns, etc., were committed to memory. None of them can read. \*\* ss McKellar, Anniebai and a Bible woman did the work.

A Sabbath School in the Girls' Boarding School was in charge of Miss Oliver: Miss Chase, thus relieving Miss White for work in the College Sunday School in number of the girls at these schools took prizes in the annual examinations by the S. S. Committee. There are in all about 24 Sabbath Schools in Indore, and at Christmas, etc., they can assemble 800 or 900 Sabbath School children in the College Hall. Such a sight gives hope for India.

## MHOW.

1. Congregational.—There have been 18 baptisms during the year, making a total membership of 66. The Church has a Session and Deacon's Court, who seek to discharge their respective duties. There have been a considerable number of candidates for baptism, who were enrolled as enquirers.

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- 2. Evangelistic.—There are over 100 villages about Mhow which are visited as far as it is possible to overtake. Christian workers go out in bands, sometimes preaching three or four times in an evening. Miss Calder writes that more villages ask for visits than can be overtaken.
- 3 Out Stations.—Manpur, Berwai and Parlia are centres of operation, from which surrounding villages are visited. In the former of these the Roman Catholics made an effort to interfere with our work a few years ago, but by persevering effort they were forced to withdraw. Gradually in each of these centres land is secured, the interest and sympathy of authorities won, and the Mission becomes a resort for those seeking help in trouble.
- 4. High School.—In his report on the Mission High School, Mhow, for 1896, the Inspector says:—"The organization of the school has much improved, and the records are now in order, neat, and up to date. The building is neat and tastefully decorated, affording ample accommodation for all the classes. As already remarked, a further improvement has resulted from the re-arrangement of the duties of the staff, and from the care and attention of the head master, of his assistants, and the year's work reflects great credit on Mr. Anketell and his assistants, as well as on the missionaries under whose general direction the work is carried on." The Bible in all these educational institutions gets a prominent place.
- 5. Primary Schools.—Besides one in connection with the High School, there are three branch schools, on the rolls of which are in all 251 pupils. Miss Ross writes that the bazaar school has an average attendance of 103, in which children are taught in Hindi, Urdu and Marathi. At Krishnapura school about 40 attend, and in Garibpura school there are from 17 to 20. Miss Calder is engaged in this work in very unsanitary buildings.
- 6. Boys' Home.—This is intended to accommodate the sens of Christians in the villages where education is not obtainable. Ten boys were in the Home, under the care of Mr. Anketell, the head master. Miss Calder teaches them to sing.
- 7. Sunday Schools.—There are in all 12 boys' Sunday Schools. There is an average attendance of 321 in the large school in connection with the High School.
- 8. Chaplaincy.—This is now in charge of Dr. J. Frazer Smith, who has been appointed treasurer of the Mission. The services are for the soldiers, and conducted in English.

## DHAR.

Our missionaries in this field have been graciously protected in the midst of two epidemics—one of small-pox and the other of cholera. In the work there has been little opposition, and there are indications of progress.

- I. Native Congregation—Mr. F. H. Russell reports eleven baptisms during the year, and there are on the communion roll twenty-five in good standing. Out of their slender earnings some give a tenth for the Lord's work amongst their own people. They support a worker amongst themselves, and have also purchased land (\$100) in the hope that soon they may get a church, which they much need. The services at present are conducted on the verandah of a dispensary, which neither protects from sun nor rain, nor from deafening noises on the street. A church would cost about \$760.
- 2. Evangelistic Work—In the city of Dhar services are conducted at each of twenty-five points, about twice a month. To the surrounding villages within a radius of eight or ten miles visits were made as frequently as possible. It is estimated that 33,000 persons have had the Gospel preached to them at these services during the year.
- 3. Touring—Mr. Russell visited during the touring season twenty-two villages to the north of Dhar. He also, in company with his brother, Mr. Norman Russell, travelled

into the Bheel country and they acquainted themselves with the needs and opportunities of that district.

4. Medical Work—This is carried on by Miss O'Hara, who with very inferior accommodation has accomplished a great amount of work. She reports ten in-patients, forty-eight visits to villages, 717 treatments in villages, 245 houses visited, and 957 visits to these houses; 3,706 patients treated in the dispensary, and 11,191 treatments. The fees from patients when received are not usually very large, but she attended the Maharajah of Dhar, who paid a fee of Rs. 1,275, which was a handsome contribution to the Hospital Building Fund.

Every effort is made to accompany bodily treatment with saving truth, and thus thousands of women have been reached.

5. Primary Education—Mr. Russell has one school, which has varied in attendance from eleven to thirty-nine, on account of the opposition to Bible teaching. If the Bible were excluded, the children would readily be allowed to attend.

Miss Dougan has two schools, in one of which Marathi is taught, with an average attendance of twelve children, and the other in the Mohammedan portion of the city, with an average attendance of eleven, and in which both Hindi and Urdu are taught. Dhar is a new station, and the difficulty of securing competent teachers will gradually disappear, so that the present progress is encouraging.

6. Sabbath Schools—Mr. Russell reports seven Sabbath schools in different parts of the city, with an average attendance of 159. Miss O'Hara conducts a Sabbath school in connection with the dispensary, and Miss Dougan in connection with her day-schools.

7. Buildings—A suitable bungalow has been erected at Dhar, in which the missionaries live together. A dispensary is nearing completion, and a hospital and church are eagerly waited for.

NEEMUCH.

r. The Congregation—Mr. Wilson reports good attendance, although they have been disturbed by the inconsistencies of some of the members. Two Mohammedan brothers were baptized, and also a Hindu of the Bania caste. The latter repeated from

memory the whole Shorter Catechism, and seemed to have an intelligent grasp of its meaning. An annual Christian Mela (Conference) held this year in Neemuch has proved quickening to the spiritual life of the Church.

2. Day Schools—Miss Duncan reports one Camp school in Neemuch, one Chamar and one high caste school in the native city Neemuch, and one at Jarad—four in all—under her care.

Miss Campbell has two Camp schools under her care, and Mr. Wilson laments the discontinuance of useful school work for want of funds. The common difficulties are irregularity in attendance, owing to heathen festivals, etc., removal from the school through early marriages, superstitious fears excited by the singing of Christian hymns by the children in their homes, the difficulty of getting efficient teathers, etc.

Notwithstanding these difficulties, the effects of school discipline are seen, much truth stored in the memory, and Christian influence felt in their lives. These results are especially manifest where competent teachers are available.

They also conducted a night school in the city for the benefit of men and boys, and a number took advantage of it.

3. Sunday Schools—Bible instruction is a part of every day-school course of study, but besides that, in every day-school a Sunday-school is held, and is usually attended by the day-school pupils. The ability of Indian children to memorize is remarkable, and accordingly their knowledge of the Bible is often very extensive, far surpassing in many cases the children of the Sunday-schools in our own land. The truth is mighty and will

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4. Training Classes—Mr. Wilson and Mr. N. H. Russell took charge of the classes for the training of native helpers. They had a Junior class with ten students, and a Senior with eight, each of which was taught for six weeks. The students in these classes are led through courses of Bible study corresponding somewhat to our own Theological schools.

The students were very much encouraged this year by the presentation of prizes, which their teachers were enabled to give through the interest of some friends of the Mission. Where the inhabitants are so poor and books so scarce we can imagine the joy with which a valuable book would be received by a student.

India must be converted by her own people, hence the importance of such classes as these. Efficient native helpers are the greatest need.

5 Zenana Work—Miss Duncan reports 1320 visits paid by Rebecca (Bible woman) and herself during the year, whilst Miss Campbell reports 825 visits to schools and zenanas. Each of these visits represents personal earnest talks with one or more about the soul's salvation.

The effort is to acquaint the women in these homes with as much as possible of Scripture truth and lead them to Christ. Visits are often cordially received, but often interrupted by the interference of friends, who threaten what in this country would be called "the boycott," unless the visits of the Christian teachers are discontinued. The papil is sometimes taken away to the home of a mother-in-law, where the missionary is not welcome. Sometimes curiosity subsides, the pupil becomes indifferent. Notwith-standing all this, many a life is brightened by zenana visitation work, which is becoming more and more possible as the missionaries are better known.

6. Village Work—Neemuch, like other cities, is surrounded by scores of villages. Miss Duncan and Rebecca visited thirty-four of these villages during the year, eighteen of them being visited a second time. In almost every case a good audience was rathered by the sound of the accordion, hymns were sung, the Gospel story told, books and leatlets sold and distributed.

But what are one or two visits to a whole village! Yet, that is all they were able to do. "The laborers are few." Miss Turnbull accompanied Miss Duncan in some instances, and dispensed medicines to the needy.

Mr. Wilson devoted the whole of the cold season to this work. In the larger towns he found opposition more pronounced than ever, owing to the revival of Hinduism, but in the villages the interest was greater and the work more encouraging. Many assented to the truth, promised to throw away idols, etc., and a few promised to come to Neemuch for more teaching.

7. Dispensaries—Miss Turnbull has two dispensaries in Neemuch and one in Jawad. Her only assistant, Mrs. James, was most of the time in Jawad, so that she was entirely alone whilst at the other dispensaries. In every case, however, the patients who came for medicine heard the Gospel message, and some heard gladly.

Patients sometimes take friends with them that they also may hear what the missionary has to tell. Neglect in carrying out instructions, particularly in surgical cases, often brings disappointment to the missionary and distress to themselves.

There were during the year 3,814 patients, 12,471 dispensary treatments, and 105 patients treated in their homes.

Dr. Woods laboured in Neemuch, visiting Barnagar and Rutlam monthly. During the cold season he visited many villages and amongst other cases removed sixteen cataracts from blind eyes.

Sickness-Mr. Jamieson was taken ill with typhoid fever about the middle of Octo-

ber, and four months passed before he was able to sit up. His life was despaired of for a time, and, under God, his recovery is due to the untiring care of Dr. Thompson.

Afterwards Dr. Thompson's health failed, and has been ordered to leave India as quickly as possible in order to save life. Although a short time in India he won the affection of all, and gave promise of great usefulness. God's ways are not our ways.

Lepers -Six lepers were baptized in May of last year. They are learning to read, and are supported by the native congregation. They live in a small hut in the centre of a plot of ground secured as a cemetery.

Workers' Classes—During the hot and rainy season, when it is not possible for the missionaries to do outside work, attention is given to the training of their workers. They are drilled in such courses of Bible study, etc., as will be most helpful to them in teaching their own people.

Schools—Mr. Jamieson says: "Instead of three branch schools we ought to have twenty in the twenty-two districts of the city." Small houses are a reliable for school purposes, and they could also be used for preaching services.

Miss Jamiesou has a high caste girls' school, which makes good progress, but would be more progressive if it were possible to secure a high-caste calling woman suitable for the work.

Three widows have been in attendance, and from their lives the horrors of widow-hood in India are learned. There are in this class also two blind boys, who can read and are making exceptional progress.

Sunday Schools—These are conducted, as elsewhere, in the day-school buildings, and are conducted in the usual way.

Bible Class — Miss Jamieson conducted a Bible class for Christian women until sickness in the home prevented its continuance.

Mangs—This low caste and very poor section of the population, amongst whom so much interest existed at Indore, are in Ujjain also; a small school has been started amongst them. The children are worked so continuously that it is difficult to secure attendance, but when they do come they are bright and interesting.

Kote—Another school has been opened for high-caste girls in this district. It is yet young and has the usual difficulties.

Medical Work—Dr. Thompson's removal has not altogether stopped this work. Mr. B. Philips, a graduate of Agra Medical College, is doing painstaking and faithful duty.

## RUTLAM.

Mr. Campbell reports comfort throughout the year in the native helpers associated with him.

Church—Communicants 28, baptized adherents 39, unbaptized 3. Services are conducted morning and evening on the Lord's day, and in the afternoon during the cold season. The chapel is a building 17 feet x 60 feet and 8 feet high. It is open to the street nearly the whole length, and outsiders come and go freely. There is also every Sabbath evening an English service in the Railway Institute, with an audience varying from one to fifty.

Sabbath Schools—There are seven of these held in chapel, a private house, black-smith shop, under the shade of a tree, etc.

Y.P.S.C.E.—This and other gatherings are held during the week for study and instruction.

Itinerancy—Other parts of the city and neighboring villages are visited, chiefly by the native brethren. Sometimes hearts prepared are met. "The mental condition of the people among whom we labor is seen," says Mr. Campbell, "in a scare caused by the report that 'the Government, in order to appease a goddess and so remove the plague, had sent out men to distribute poisoned sweets among children, and thus destroy a required number."

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Girls' Schools—One school of 14 children in the city was closed for want of a suitable teacher. Mrs. Campbell conducts a school in their own home, attended by 10 girls, and a third in Jaora, of which Victoriabai is the successful teacher, with an attendance of 10 children.

Boys' Schools - In Rutlam there is but one, attended by nine Christian boys, and in the three outstations, Jaora, Khachraod, and Barnagar, one each.

Orphans—Mr. Campbell has brought up three orphan boys and one girl, all of whom have become communicants. One of these young men, who was very useful in Sabbath school work, tract distribution, etc., died last March of pneumonia. The girl is now in the Indore Boarding School, and the other two are useful in the mission. Dr. Buchanan had charge of five orphans, who were left with Mr. Campbell when he (Pr. B.) came away on furlough. Two famine children have been added to the number.

Dispensary—New patients, 14,626; old patients, 8,345; in-patients, 6; treatments, 12,971; men, 5,999; women, 2,282; children, 5,090.

Printing—Mr. Campbell prints the Indian Standard and Gyan Patrika, besides during the year over a million pages of tract and other literature. He writes: "Though doing all the job work which is sent (if in harmony with the work of the Divine Proprietor, for I have refused such as seemed fitted to do men harm instead of good), the two great objects have been kept steadily in view, of directly doing mission work and of employing Christians and teaching them to earn their living, and at the same time to work with Christ for men's salvation. Others have been employed when there was need, and of these one proved to have been favorably disposed, and he has since professed his faith and been baptized."

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## VII.—MISSION TO THE CHINESE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

## REV. A. B. WINCHESTER.

Mencius went to see King Hwng, of Leang. The King said, "Venerable Sir, since you have not counted it far to come here, a distance of 1,000 miles, may I presume that you are likewise provided with counsels to profit my kingdom?" Mencius replied, "Why "st your Majesty use that word 'profit'? What I am likewise provided with are coun: Is to benevolence and righteonsness, and these are my only topics."—Mencius, Book I., Part I., S. 3.

To those to whom there is no other or higher than the utilitarian standard by which to measure values this annual review of our Missionary effort among the Chinese in B. C. would not be cheering. But taking the noble reply of one of China's greatest philosophers, above quoted, raising the terms "benevolence and righteousness" to their highest power—a power undreamed of by any sage not twice-born—and declaring the promulgation of these by lip and life as our only concern, we thank God and take courage.

The keeping of the roll was entrusted to one of the Christian Chinese when Mr. Ng and the writer were out of the city. The above figures are just as the roll shows, but some days have been left out. Our actual attendance has been larger during last year than during any previous year.

One Chinese, a Christian, was present 222 nights out of 248, besides being present on Sabbath days and on prayer meeting nights.

- (c) New Westminster.—For this school we have not full statistics. The attendance was so small in the early part of the year that it was thought best to close the school during the canning season. The school was closed on the 18th day of June, and re-opened on the 20th of October. Since the re-opening the attendance has been very encouraging, averaging about twenty each night for five nights per week.
- (d) Union.—Until October the attendance average I twenty per night. About that time one of our Christian scholars refused to subscribe money for the practice of heathen rites at a funeral. For this he was persecuted and the school boycotted.

At the time of writing the average attendance is twelve.

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voluut compa (2) Prayer Meetings.—Only at Vancouver has there been a regular prayer meeting, i.e., an evening during the week devoted to Scripture reading, prayer and praise. This meeting has been kept up during the year by Mr. Colman, when in the city, and by the Misses Dick and Kellar and Mr. Kelman, in Mr. Colman's absence.

- (3) Subbath Services. (a) Victoria.—Regular Sabbath services have been held twice each Lord's day throughout the year; a Bible class in the afternoon and a preaching service in the evening. In addition, when the weather and light would allow, two outdoor preaching services were held in Chinatown each Sabbath. By the street services we were able to reach quite a number who would not otherwise have been reached. Our services in the hall have not been well attended, the average being about eighteen.
- (b) Vanconver.—Regular Sabbath services have been kept up throughout the year Mr. Colman has conducted these services himself, except on those days he was at West. minster or at the Canneries. Average number present about fifteen. Street services were also held in good weather.
- (c) New Westminster.—Only occasional Sabbath services, and those were poorly attended, whether on the street or in our school-room. But good, we believe, has been done by visiting the Chinese in their homes, speaking to small groups who congregate there and circulating the Scriptures and tracts among them.
- (d) Union.—Sabbath services during the year conducted by Mr. Hall. The attendance is about the same as the school.
- (e) Canneries on Fraser River.—For two months in summer the Gospel was preached on Sabbath and week days wherever opportunity offered.
  - (4) Baptisms. (a) Victoria, 3; (b) Vancouver, 2; (c) Union, 6.

Besides these we have none members at different points, some of whom have been baptized in our own Church, and some we have received from other branches of the Presbyterian Church.

For the first three years we had no baptisms to report. The fourth year only one. This fifth year eleven baptisms. To the workers this seems very hopeful progress. May the drops be succeeded by showers abundant.

The four Y. P. S. C. E. Societies of our Church in Vancouver contributed \$118 for the maintenance of the Mission in Vancouver.

The three Presbyterian Societies of C. E. in New Westminster contributed about \$72 for their Mission School.

J. T. Bethune, Esq., of Victoria, gave \$100 for special purposes, in connection with removal.

The C. E. Societies in Vancouver and New Westminster have also largely furnished voluntary teachers to carry on the teaching work of the school. After all it falls upon a comparative few -to them belongs the greater praise.

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out that reathen In Victoria, whilst some Endeavorers help us in our work, only one Society—St. Paul's, Victoria West—has taken the responsibility to supply teachers for one evening each week. The number of voluntary teachers are still too few; and of some who come, there is a lack of conscientiousness with respect to their obligations. Some evenings we will be without a single teacher, and no intimation given us before hand of their inability to be present. On the other hand there are a number of teachers most faithful and helpful More than they know, they are a source of comfort and strength to the missionaries and a blessing to the school.

#### III. CONCLUSION,

An annual report is not the occasion in which to review hindrances, ordinary and special, against which we have had to contend. Yet manifestly an intelligent estimate of this or any work implies a knowledge of quality and condition of material; resisting as well as assisting factors, etc., etc. As many of our Church members and even ministers know almost nothing of our work and its conditions, an added paragraph giving some hints as to hindering and helping factors may be of service. Among the former are:—

- (1) The irrational prejudices against the Chinese-apart altogether from the labor These find expressions in many ways, all of them disposing the Chinese, especially new-comers, unfavorably toward us. The public press of the Pacific Slope is for the most part guilty of Sinophobia, and discuss Chinese questions, apparently, as if conscious of the vigilant eye of anti-Chinese subscribers and voters upon them; and the comforting reflection that as the Chinese are political ciphers in Canada they are not to be reckoned with. Labor unions and mass meetings pass resolutions against the Mongolii, and refuse to patronize those who employ them; stores, hotels, factories, etc., advertise that they have no Chinese about them in any capacity; others have lying caricatures designed to poison the people against them; even the Provincial Legislature can hardly pass a bill, where one can possibly be inserted, without an anti-Chinese clause. All this has its effect upon the rising generation, to many of whom among their most appreciated sports is the practice of annoying or injuring Chinese. Cases in large numbers have come under my notice of Chinese brutally, and in some cases seriously injured, and that absolutely without cause. All this makes the Chinese skeptical of the white man's religion, and prejudices them against us.
- (2) Another class of hindrances come from the Chinese. The virtuous and patriotic amongst them are against us because Christianity forbids the worship of ancestors, idols, etc., which their fathers have practised generations beyond number. The Highbinders, gamblers, opium dealers and brothel-managers are against us, because we are against their wicked ways. Whenever it becomes known that a Chinese is interested in our Christian faith, they are sure to meet with threatening and persecution.

Some of those whom we baptized during the year have suffered much for their faith, but have suffered patiently through the ennobling graze of our strong Saviour, who Himself in the days of His flesh endured the contradiction of sinners.

But before closing this Report permit me to say in a very brief word that we have encouragements. Among these are the gratifying attendance at all our schools, and the apparent deeper interest on the part of a number of our scholars; the faithfulness and loving service of our Chinese converts. This is a very encouraging factor. The number of white Christians who sympathize with our work seems growing. The teachers who assist us week by week are a great help and comfort to us, and last but not least the continued cordial sympathy of the ministers of our Church is a source of undoubted strength.

## VIII.—INDIANS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

## ALBERNI.

There are here two bands of Indians—the Sheshahts and Opitsheshahts—about 225 in all, located less than a mile from Alberni village.

Girls' Home—The new building has been a great boon to this work. It is intended to accommodate from 40 to 50 girls, and under the management of Miss Johnson is a real "Girls' Home." It is beautifully situated on the Somass river, at the head of the Alberni Canal, and within sight of the perpetual snows. There are 27 children in the Home, about one half the number being boys. Miss Johnston says: "The girls who have been with us two or three years excel in bread making, laundry work, knitting, dressmaking, etc., and are becoming proticient housekeepers. These girls go home every Saturday and teach the younger married women, so that good bread, nicely prepared food and clean homes, are becoming the order in the Indian villages. The children are fond of music, the eldest boy, Harry, presiding at the organ at the regular Sabbath evening services, conducted by Mr. Taylor, the Home Missionary at Alberni village. They have Sabbath School and evening services at the mission, and in the afternoon attend service in the church in the village, about a mile away. They also hold praise services in Indian homes, as opportunities offer. Six of the girls expressed a desire to be baptized, which was a great encouragement to the teachers.

Day School—The school-house stands a few yards from the Giris' Home. Mr. Armstrong had charge of it during the first half of the year, and proved herself, there as elsewhere, to be an efficient teacher. She also worked with zeal in behalf of the Indian women.

Mr. John Ross is now in charge of the school, and 'so teaches the boys industrial work during a portion of the day. Mr. Ross, in addition to the day-school, attends to all outside work connected with the mission, and is gradually leading the boys into helpfulness in that respect.

Deaths—From the two small Indian bands—about 225 in all—death claimed 24 during the last year. § Four of these were pupils in the school—three girls and one boy—besides a baby girl adopted by Miss Johnson, because motherless, and also because she wished the older girls to learn how to care for a little child.

Drink—The Indians have been trying to protect themselves from the drink curse, and with considerable success; but the white man is their enemy in this respect as in many others.

UCLUELET.

Miss Armstrong took charge of the school in November, having been up to that date in charge of the Alberni school. Ucluelet is a small village, on a rocky promontory on the Pacific coast, in which live the Ucluelath tribe, about 200 in all. Miss Armstrong lives with Mr. Swartout's family, a considerable distance from the school. The shore is heavily wooded with pines and the tide rises within a few feet of the door of their home. She accordingly, in order to get to the school, has to follow a trail through the woods, which is exceedingly rough. Being a day-school, there is no way of securing the attendance of children but by winning their confidence and affection. Yet she has an enrollment of 32, and an average attendance of 18, which is exceedingly encouraging. The children are bright and quick, and more willing to speak English than at Alberni. The agent speaks of this as one of the best Indian schools on the Pacific coast. Miss Armstrong has already acquired enough of the Indian language to be able to hold some intercourse with the Indian women.

Evangelistic Services—Mr. Swartout when at this point was able to hold regular services, but since his removal to Dodger's Cove, returns every second Sabbath. A young Indian, named Septice, was baptized by the Rev. Mr. Winchester on the 2nd of April, who gives promise of being exceedingly useful. He has been holding three prayer meetings a week in his own house for his people, and makes occasional trips to other tribes, besides taking Sabbath services in Mr. Swartout's absence.

## DODGER'S COVE.

This island is 17 miles south of Ucluelet in the Barclay Sound, and is inhabited by the Ohiaht! band, about 200 in all. Mr. Easton, who began work amongst them withdrew last autumn, and Mr. Swartout took up the work, leaving his family at Ucluele. The children are not numerous, and they must cross a body of water before they can reach the building at present used as a school, and, besides, the building is itself unsuitable. In addition to that, the school is frequently interrupted by the fact that Mr. Swartout's attention is divided, He still visits Ucluele', and also the Alberni Indians (Sheshahts), who spend part of the year for fishing purposes on an island lying between Ucluelet and Dodger's Cove. Notwithstanding that fact there is a distinct inprovement as to the drinking habit, and as to their appreciation of what Christianity means. They begin to see that being Christians means breaking away from old customs, which arouses increased opposition on the part of some, whilst others are drawn towards the light. But here especially at Ucluelet there are signs of life, although the mission is very young. In order that Mr. Swartout may be able to do his work effectively and have his family with him a new house must be provided, which will serve as school, church and home; all of which can be done at no great expense.

## ABOUSAHT.

This Indian village is 38 miles north of Ucluelet, having a population somewhat less than 300. The Missionary, Mr. J. W. Russell, began work in December, 1895. The

The Potlatche and dance are serious hindrances. 5. The native doctor is much dreaded because of his supposed powers, which are wielded against the Gospel. 6. The constant shifting of the able-bodied population for sealing and fishing purposes, which are the only industries, and they often take their children with them.

Mr. Russell built a house, the lower part of which is for church and school, and the upper part a home for himself. There are 80 children in the tribe and an average attendance in the school of 15. The attendance at church services is fair and increasing. A considerable number of new houses were erected last year, farther away from the water's edge, on higher and better sites, and of good quality. Except old people, who are nearly always neglected by the Indians, there is not much want of food or clothing. Between June and December of 1896 there were 16 deaths and about half of these received Christian burial. Mr. Russell was greatly saddened by the death of a young man who had accepted Christ, and gave promise of great usefulness. Another of the older men died whose only theme in his latter days was "Jesus the Saviour." Notwithstanding obstacles, the Gospel prevails. The Holy Spirit will honor His servants.

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## IX.—CHINESE IN ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

Rev. J. C. Thomson, M.D., reports encouragements in the work notwithstanding business depression suffered by Chinese as by others, and an exorbitant laundry tax in Montreal. They have been less abused than formerly, and show an increasing adaptability to western ways. More and more they are being received into homes as domestics, and with satisfactory in state.

Many who are the above now, by correspondence, that the Christian influences of Montreal have not have best upon them. Much would be gained if Christian people at these points would thow up these good impressions.

Chinese Schools.—There are 16 schools in all in Montreal—12 in churches on the Sabbath day, with an average attendance of 24 scholars and 21 teachers. There is a tendency to centralization, the attendance at certain churches being very large. If more teachers were available more pupils could be secured.

The church schools are in Knox, St. Paul's, Stanley, Crescent St., Erskine, Chalmers. Calvin, St. Mark's, St. Giles, St. Mathew's, and American churches; and all without expense to the committee.

Teachers have been very earnest and faithful, and amongst them are some of other denominations. This, with the practical sympathy of the pastors, has much to do with the success of the work.

Church Membership.—There are seven in the full membership of Knox Church, and many are intellectually convinced but have not yet made open profession. Many heathenish practices have been discontinued, because of this Mission, which prevail in other cities. There are in Ottawa two, and in Toronto three, in church membership, the result of effort organized by Dr. Thomson.

Means Used.—Correspondence, distribution of Chinese literature, addresses at meetings in churches of all denominations, Chinese entertainments, visiting of Chinese women by Miss Thomson—who is in charge of the day and night school—are some of the means adopted, supplemental to regular Sabbath and week-day services.

Macco Mission.—It has been decided to start a mission at Maceo, China, the region whence Chinese in Canada come. It is to be supported by the W.F.M.S. of Montreal, and is to be under the supervision of the Canton Mission of the American Presbyterian Church (North).

During the last year the Chinese of the United States contributed \$10,000 for the erection of a heathen temple at the very point where our missionary, Dr. Thomson, wanted to buy a chapel, then available for \$75. There are now about 15,000 Chinese in Canada. Many of them are interested in their own people, and will contribute to give them the Gospel, learned by themselves in Canada. This mission will be an important bond between the work here and in their home land. In that light the Christian work done for the Chinese in Canada becomes very important.

Rev. Mr. Dewey, Convener of the F. M. C. of the Presbytery of Montreal, writes:—
"The work among the Chinese in Montreal has enjoyed another year of encouragement.
Dr. Thomson, ably assisted by his devoted wife, has labored with great zeal and fidelity in this difficult field. Twelve Sabbath schools have been in operation, with an attendance varying from six to one hundred and fourteen. The congregations of the city have continued their sympathy and co operation, providing the large staff of volunteer helpers necessary. Several from other denominations assist in teaching, so much are they interested

Ou who as the Chu in the work. The collections at the Sabbath schools amounted to \$537.48, during the year. Other contributions, which have been secured through this work, raise the amount to over \$1,000. This shows that the work is almost self-supporting. A service, conducted in Chinese, is held every Sabbath evening; and several of the men are in fellowship with some of our congregations. Many difficulties have been met with, and there is much to try the faith of our devoted workers.

Miss M. E. Thompson resumed work in the day-school in September last. She reports that the evening school has been attended by as many as eighty scholars—quite frequently by sixty, but at other times the number is small, the average being twenty-nine. The morning attendance is about fifteen. The pupils make satisfactory progress in reading, writing and singing. A class of six read the Bible very well, and are apparently much interested in it; and it is hoped many may be brought to give themselves to the Saviour through this work. Miss Thompson has been assisted by several very faithful volunteer workers. We are greatly indebted to Mr. David Yuile for his generous liberality in bearing all the expenses of the mission premise—ad part of the salary of the teacher. Contributions from St. Paul's, Erskine and the amount churches have provided almost the entire salary of Miss Thompson.

Our work is highly appreciated by the Chinese, is not resting and helpful to those who assist in it, and and has been honored of God. We commend it to the support of the Church, and solicit for it the earnest prayers of God's people."

The Society has suffered a great loss in the death of Mrs, Ewart, who, for so many years, presided with so much grace and efficiency. The F. M. C., at their meeting on the 19th May, adopted the following resolution:

"At this first meeting after the death of Mrs. Ewart, the Committee would put on record an expression of their sense of loss in the departure of that honored 'Mother in Israel.' Appropriate tributes to her memory have already been paid by others who loved and esteemed her in other relations and in other forms of Christian service. We refer to her in her relation to the Foreign Mission Committee and the work for the Lord under its supervision.

"Since the organization of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, twenty-one years ago, Mrs. Ewart has been closely identified with it. She was for sixteen years its President, and a few days before her death she was elected for the seventeenth time to the position which she had so long and worthily filled. The work of the Woman's Foreign

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Missionary Society has been singularly blessed. It has told, with beneficent effect, not only on the work with a view to which it was specially organized, but on every department of the Church's work. How much of this was due to the influence and efforts of Mrs. Ewart could not easily be estimated. To the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society she gave her life. The command of our Lord, 'Go ye into all the World and preach the thospel to every creature,' was to her a reality. This one thing she did. All the gifts with which she was endowed were made subservient to this. There was something unique in her strength of character and faculty of management. To the tact and efficiency with which she guided the deliberations of the 'Woman's Board,' and presided over the great annual gatherings, her fellow-workers, who labored with her in the Gospel, have borne appreciative testimony. This Committee can bear witness to the clearness and firmness of her views and the unfailing courtesy with which they were expressed, when from time to time she had conference with them. And now that we feel the blank occasioned by her removal from this earthly scene, we bow in loving adoration before Him who doeth all things well. The manner of her departure left nothing to be desired. Having served her generation according to the will of God, she fell asleep. We do not sorrow concerning her as those who have no hope. We remember the Divine assurance that, as Jesus died and rose again, even so them also that sleep in Jesus will God bring with Him. We comfort one another with these words.

"Her testamentary dispositions give additional evidence of the large place which the Foreign Mission cause held in her affection. The provision she has made for affording partial help to some of those who may come to the proposed Training Home will make her name a household word there, as it is already in many of the homes of our land.

"With affectionate and respectful sympathy, the Committee send this minute to the members of her family whom she has set behind. And they rejoice with them in thinking of the entrance ministered unto her abundantly into the everlasting Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour, and of the gracious welcome, "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of the Lord."

## GENERAL.

3. In Sept., 1896, Dr. J. Frazer Smith was appointed Treasurer of the Central India Mission. Dr. Smith's experience in Honan is thus not lost to the cause of Missions. Although the state of his health would not permit his return to China, his medical adviser deemed it safe for him to accept an appointment to Central India.

4. Dr. J. J. Thompson, who was appointed in 1895, has been compelled to leave India, greatly to the regret of his fellow-missionaries, whose affection and confidence he has won. Dr. Thompson was carefully examined before his appointment and his health reported as satisfactory, but under the trying conditions of an Indian climate lung trouble rapidly developed, necessitating an immediate return to his native land.

5. It has been agreed to start a Training School in Toronto for the benefit of ladies who may engage in home as well as in foreign work. It is to be required of candidates for foreign work that they possess such qualifications as are at present necessary, in order to obtain appointment to the foreign field, and that such candidates reside six months in the Training Home before receiving an appointment, except in such special cases as shall be otherwise determined by the F. M. C. Such a course of Biblical study and practical Mission work will prescribed, as will be deemed suitable for such candidates.

6. In Honan, there has been sorrow upon sorrow; Dr. McClure's daughter died on the 5th Aug., 1896, and Mr. MacLennan's child died on the 31st Dec., 1896; Mr. Mac-Gillivray has suffered in health, and now Mr. and Mrs. MacLennan are on their way back to Canada for the same reason. Mr. and Mrs. Goforth and Dr. Menzies have also suffered

summary

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in health, but are happily restored. The climatic conditions in which they labor, and the unsanitary condition of the houses in which they live, together with the temptation to overwork, account for this state of affairs.

7. There is a constant demand for bungalows in Central India, five are asked for at the present time. They are all necessary, in order to preserve health and life, and accomplish the work most effectively. It is felt that a special fund should be provided for this purpose, that they make too great a demand on the General Fund, which is always too limited to meet the direct claims of the agencies employed.

8. Mr. Percy Campbell Leslie, M.D., has been appointed to service in the foreign field, and is to be supported by Erskine Church, Montreal.

### Finances.

9. The East began the year with a debt of \$4,290.61, and closed with one of \$4,228.10. The receipts, in that section, were \$28,008.70, and the expenditure \$27,946.19, being \$62.51 within the income. When it is remembered that a good deal was given for the purpose of extinguishing the debt, this condition of affairs does not strike one as very satisfactory. Still it is encouraging to note that, outside of gifts for the removal of the debt, the giving is better than ever before. As compared with the previous year, the real increase was more than the apparent, because \$1,200 that for many years came from the W. F. M. S. (W. D.) was last year withheld, for good reasons, which were stated when the fact was announced. Apart from this amount, the increase in the East was \$3,975.47, showing that the extension of our work to Demerara, and the increased cost thereby entailed met the hearty approval of our people.

10. The Western Division of the Committee have had much anxiety during the last year on account of the insufficiency of the revenue for the work already undertaken. An appeal was made to the Church for special contributions, which was generously responded to by a large number of congregations, and the Committee desire to express very sincere thanks to all those congregations, Young People's Societies, Sabbath Schools and individuals who came to their aid in this time of need. It is necessary, however, to state that the year has closed with a deficit of \$9,685, about \$900 more than that reported to the Assembly last year, and that there must be either an increased revenue or a serious reduction in the work. It should be remembered that in the nature of this work there must be expansion, if we are to reap the results of our labors. Interest springs up in new centres which must be followed up by our Missionaries, and that implies the employment of new agencies. The Church cannot stand still. There must be either advance or serious waste of energy. The Committee feels that the Church is face to face with an important crisis, to which the General Assembly is asked to give its most earnest attention.

11. The General Assembly is asked to add to the F. M. C. (W. D.) a member of the F. M. C. of the Synod of Manitoba, in order the better to keep in touch with the work amongst the Indians in Manitoba and the North-West.

12. That the General Assembly adopt the following estimates for the ensuing year:—

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# Report of the Board of the Presbyterian College, Halifax,

1896-97.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

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nt Conveners

The Board of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, record their gratitude to God for His goodness to the institution under their care. Another year of prosperity has passed. May like goodness and mercy crown the years to come.

The city water was extended to the site of the College last summer, and the Board gladla availed themselves of the opportunity to have the use of it in the building. At a cost of severy hundred and seventy dollars, the necessary plumbing and sewerage were effected in a most stiffactory manner. Other improvements brought the whole capital expenditure up to one thousand dollars.

Two bequests of five hundred dollars each were received during the year,—the one from the late Dr. R. F. Burns, of memory dear to the College, and the other from the late Rev. Alexander Campbell, who, for years, labored in the Synod. These bequests were made unconditionally; but the Board have under consideration a special object to which they may be applied, and on which a further report will be made at some future time.

The Rev. Mr. Campbell left also certain forest lands in Nova Scotia, that may hereafter grow into value, for the purpose of founding an Alexander Campbell Bursary for a Galie student—one bearing the name of Campbell preferred.

The Board has had under consideration the feasibility of erecting a suitable building for the valuable library now stored in the class-rooms and other parts of the College. It is considered that such a building should be of fire-proof material, and that it might contain accommodation for a gymnasium and additional lecture-rooms which, on occasion, might be converted into a convocation hall. The desirability of such a building has been affirmed by the Board, and the General Assembly are hereby asked to allow the Board to present to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces a plan for securing the same, and authorize the Synod to order steps for its erection, should they consider it wise to do so.

The library has grown during the year by the gift of the most valuable of the books of the late Dr. McCulloch, and of many of those of the late Dr. Burns, as well as by the purchase of many of the best current books in the different departments of theological inquiry.

The finances of the institution are fairly satisfactory, inasmuch as the revenue was slightly in excess of the expenditure. The present debt is \$998.14, which the Board will aim at removing as soon as possible.

The Bursary Fund is in a better condition than last year. Receipts were \$1,181.43, and expenditure, \$879.05, thus reducing the debt from \$522.08 to \$219.70.

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Instruction was given in Elocution during five weeks. The graduating class met on two days a week for instruction in practical subjects such as how to dispense ordinances, marry, conduct session meetings, etc. The Senior Class met on four, and the Junior Class on three days a week for Elocution. The attendance was regular, and the marks attained in the written examinations gave evidence of good progress.

Besides the routine of ordinary class work, the students have attended societies which have had for their object intellectual culture and practical training in Church work. At the meetings of the Theological Society papers bearing upon important topics have been read and discussed, and the influence exerted by the Missionary Association has already been productive of great good. If any one feature of the last session is deserving of special notice it is the intensifying of the Missionary spirit. Members of the Faculty have generally been present at the meetings of these societies, and have taken part in the proceedings as occasion required.

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## REPORTOF THE GOVERNORS OF MORRIN COLLEGE

FOR THE SESSION OF 1896-97.

The Governors of Merrin College have much pleasure in being able to report to the Venerable the General Assembly, that the work of the last Session has presented several features of an unusually cheering character. Including students taking special lines of study, eighty-seven were recorded as enrolled at the meeting of Corporation held in midwinter at McGill, with which University Morrin is affiliated, and that number was increased to considerably over one hundred during the succeeding part of the Session.

Eight of the regular undergraduates have in view the office of the sacred ministry, and three of these received regular lectures and passed respectable examinations in Systematic Divinity, Church History and Apologetics, while five pursued studies in Hebrew.

matic Divinity, Church History and Apologetics, while five pursued studies in Hebrew. In addition to the work done in the usual Arts Department, much interest was awakened by special courses in Biology, under the Rev. T. W. Fyles, F. L. G.; in Political Economy, under L. R. Holmes, Esq., B.A., of Cambridge, England; in Applied Chemistry, by the newly appointed Professor, A. E. Macintyre, of Jena; and, above all, by the enthusiasm created for the study of Modern Languages under Professor Gunn.

In addition to the existing staff of six regular and two honorary professors and lecturers, the Board has engaged a seventh, in the person of the Rev. John Sharp, M.A., to take charge in part of the classes in Philosophy and English, in relation to which departments Mr. Sharp gave evidence of singular fitness during the Session of 1895-96, and from whose appointment as a member of the College staff, the Governors anticipate marked advantages to the course of study. With this addition the Arts Department may be considered to be not insufficiently equipped in all of its essential branches, and the Board of Governors have in view adding, with a like aim, to the regular staff in Divinity.

To accomplish this aim they have already taken steps to increase the Endowment Fund, and expect to have secured a material increase to their resources ere the lapse of another year.

Placing at the service of the Church, as they do, a valuable property free from all incumbrances of debt, and a fund already adequate to the providing of a staff of seven devoted and competent professors, and occupying ground in the very midst of a population, for the winning of whom to purer views of the Gospel this venerable court has instituted a distinct branch of missionary effort, the Governors venture to deem themselves entitled to the confidence of the General Assembly, and to a larger measure of sympathy and assistance than has heretofore been rendered. Neither during the days of the first honored Moderator of this Court, Principal Dr. Cook, was Morrin College burdensome to the Church, nor does it now aspire to occupy a position so irksome. Simply the Governors cherish the belief that their efforts to develope the ideas contemplated by its founder merit recognition, and they are not without hope that such recognition, in practical ways, will not be withheld by the highest Court of the Church. It is their firm determination, in humble reliance on the Great Head, to spare no toil to render the Institution under their charge a successful means of promoting the cause of education, and also of ministering to the advancement of the temporal and spiritual interests of the community amid which it is situated, and of the Dominion at large.

The Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, beg leave to present their report for the past year, and to transmit therewith the Treasurer's statement and the report of the Senate. In doing so they express their gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the continued prosperity of the institution.

As appears from the Senate Report, the number of students in actual attendance last

session was 80, of whom 18 completed the course necessary for license.

The Board are gratified to state that they have again been able to end the year without indebtedness in the Ordinary Fund. Upwards of \$1,000.00 were expended in connection with certain necessary repairs to the buildings. Owing to a legacy of \$900.00 (\$1,000, less 10 per cent. Government tax) received from the executors of the late Mr. A. C. Leslie, of Montreal, this special expenditure has been defrayed, and there remains a balance to the credit of the Ordinary Fund of \$127.78.

The Endowment Fund has been slightly increased during the year, and now stands at \$191,656.11, which is invested according to the appended statement of the Treasurer. The Board are gratified in again being able to report that they have never yet had to foreclose a mortgage, and that there is not a single dollar of interest in arrears, all of the

College investments being in every respect first-class.


The generous friend who, during the last five years, at his own experiment in full the salary of one of the Professors, has kindly agreed to continue do our another year, in the hope that before its expiry the Chair may be endowed. The term for which the special subscriptions received from friends in Montreal and elsewhere, for the past five years, for the support of the Chair of Exegesis, having expired, the Board are seeking a renewal of these for another term of five years, and trust that this effort will be crowned with success. This is, however, a somewhat precarious source of revenue, and it is earnestly hoped that upon the return of business prosperity this Chair may be endowed by the friends of the institution.





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REPORT OF THE SENATE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, FOR THE SESSION 1896-97.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:-

The Senate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, in presenting this, their annual report, feel that they have cause for thankfulness in the continued prosperity of the institution. Nevertheless, during the past session, they have been called upon to mourn the sudden removal by death of a promising young student preparing in the Arts Faculty for a course in Theology—Mr. J. T. Stewart, of Athelstane. Other cases of sickness there have been, but this one alone among the students resulted fatally. A further loss to the College is that caused by the death of a member of Senate, the Rev. John McGillivray.

B.D., B.A., of Westmount.

During the absence of Principal MacVicar in Europe, where he enjoyed a well-earned furlough, the classes in Systematic Theology have been taught by the Rev. James Barclay, D.D., M.A., of St. Paul's Church, Montreal. Professor Campbell continued his prelections in Biblical and Church History and in Apologetics; Professor Coussirat, his in French Theology and literary preparation; Professor Seringer, his in Introduction and Old and New Testament Exegesis; and Professor Ross, in addition to his subjects of Homiletics and Sacred Rhetoric, Pastoral Theology and Church Government, lectured once a week on Biblical Theology. The Rev. Neil MacNish, B.D., LL.D., lectured during three weeks of the session to a fair attendance of Guelic-speaking students. Mr. A. T. Taylor, F.R.I.B.A., R.C.A., with his customary generosity, continued to deliver gratuitously his much appreciated lectures in Ecclesiastical Architecture; and Mr. J. P. Stephen taught the class in Elecution. Mr. W. M. Townsend, B.A., a post-graduate. gave instruction to the Preparatory years in Classics, and Mr. J. C. Robertson, B.A., taught them mathematics.

The number of students on the roll at the beginning of the Session was 105, but of these only 80 were in actual attendance, the rest being temporarily engaged in other work. 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# QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE.

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

The Trustees submit to the General Assembly the report of the fifty-sixth session of the University. They believe that it will be found gratifying from almost every point of view. The attendance, especially in Theology, was large; the administration has been so economical that the year's accounts show a small surplus; there is a fair prospect of an additional Professor in Theology being secured next year, and the spirit of the students is all that could be desired.

#### I .- ATTENDANCE.

I.—Attendance.

The number of students registered in the different Faculties, not counting those in affiliated institutions, was 567; as compared with 564, 533, 456 and 432 in the four preceding years. The small increase in the total this year is due to the fact that the unmatriculated and the Medical students are fewer in number than formerly. We have only twenty-four unmatriculated students, a smaller proportion probably than in any other Canadian University.

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#### II. - FINANCE.

Partly because of an increased amount received from fees, and a small increase in the collections Farty recause of an increased amount received from fees, and a small increase in the collections from congregations, and partly because of an enforced economy which dispensed even with the services of the Watkins' Lecturer on Elocution, the year's accounts show a small balance to credit. This surplus not having been expected, an appeal was made to graduates for special contributions to avert the anticipated deficit. Four hundred dollars were contributed for the purpose, and it is determined—with the consent of the donors—to put this sum aside as the nucleus of a reserve fund to prevent as far as possible any deficit in future. In view of this determination, the accumulated deficiency of pravious accountances. deficiency of previous years—amounting to nine thousand dollars, caused by shortage in the contributions from the General Assembly's Fund—may now fairly be added to the sum asked from the butions from the General Assembly's Fund—may now fairly be added to the sum asked from the Church this year. Having contributed in the past only from one-half to three-fourths of the modest sum of four thousand dollars asnotioned by the Assembly fifteen years ago, it is reasonable that an appeal to the Church be made to wipe out the deficiency which has thereby resulted. It is all the more necessary that this appeal should be responded to now, as the Board has been informed that the Grant of \$2,000 per annum, hitherto received from the Temporalities Fund, will not be continued for more than two or three years longer. The statute declared that this sum was to be paid to Queen's in perpetuity, but the Fund has been unable to meet all its obligations, and Queen's in consequence will be obliged to suffer this heavy loss. The Board feels that at any rate it should not be in debt, when so important a part of the revenue is about to be cut off. In connection with this subject it may not be amiss to remind the Assembly that in regard to both of the sources of income from which our Theological halls derive their support, namely, the interest from sources of income from which our Theological halls derive their support, namely, the interest from investments and the contributions from congregations, Queen's receives much less than the Colleges in the same territory, east and west. After twenty-two years of Union, and after the frank response of the Board to the request of the Assembly for control of the appointments to the Theological Faculty, this state of things cannot commend itself to the best thought and heart of the

#### III .- ADDITIONAL PROFESSOR.

The necessity for an additional Professor in Theology has been admitted again and again by the Assembly, but the Board, resolute not to incur debt, has refrained from taking any action till the necessary funds were subscribed, at least in measure. The General Secretary was instructed more than a year ago to collect for this sole object, and we are happy to state that his success has been such that it is hoped that an appointment may be made and submitted for the Assembly's approval at an early date. Provision has been made for the ensuing Session by securing lecturers specially qualified to deal with prescribed periods and phases of Church History, and the Rev. Dr. Thompson,

of Sarnia, has promised to continue his much appreciated course on Homiletics and Pastoral Theology, without salary.

#### IV .- ALUMNI CONFERENCE.

This has been a growing success since it commenced five years ago. Its peculiarity in our case is the great interest taken in it by the Professors in Classics, in Mental and Moral and Political Science, in English Literature, in History, in Biology, as well as by the Professors in Theology and the Alumni in all parts of the country. The programme for next February will be found in Queen's Quarterly for April.

# STATEMENT OF REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE OF QUEEN'S COLLEGE, KINGSTON, FOR THE YEAR ENDING 2ND APRIL, 1897.

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# KNOX COLLEGE.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF KNON COLLEGE.

The Board of Management of Knox College has much pleasure in presenting to

the General Assembly its fifty-third Annual Report.

The graduating class of 1897 numbered twenty-two, and the total attendance of students during the past session has been 113. In addition to these enrolled students it may be mentioned that a number of young men now attending the University of Toronto have announced their intention of entering theology in the College on the completion of their course. The total number of students having in view the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, at Toronto, cannot be fewer than 140.

The work assigned to the Professors, and the duties discharged by them in their respective classes, will be found fully set forth in the report of the Senate herewith

The Board desires to express its great satisfaction that the last Assembly acceded to its oft-repeated request for the appointment of additional professors, and has gladly welcomed the gentlemen selected by the Assembly to take charge of the important subjects of Old Testament Literature, and Church History and Apologetics. The Rev. Professor George L Robinson, Ph.D., and the Rev. Professor James Ballantyne, M.A., entered on the duties of their respective Chairs at the beginning of the session, and have fully realized the anticipations of the Church as to their fitness for their important positions. The Board feels, however, that Professor Ballantyne has been over-burdened with the care of two departments, and trusts that at no distant date he may be relieved by the appointment of a new Professor in one of the subjects assigned to him.

The Board under the power in that behalf contained in the Charter of Incorporation appointed the Rev. R. H. Warden, D.D., to be Treasurer, and the Rev. William Burns to be Secretary of the College, and desires to express its obligations to these gentlemen for the valuable services rendered by them in their respective departments.

The Board regrets that the Rev. W. A. J. Martin, who for several years discharged the duty of Librarian with much satisfaction, was compelled by his removal to Guelph to

The Rev. W. MacWilliam, LL.B., has been appointed Librar an, and under his charge the Library has been thoroughly re-organized and arranged. His careful management and literary taste, combined with numerous purchases of new works obtained through the income arising from the bequest of Mr. MacLaren, of Ottawa, have placed the Library in a satisfactory position.

The Board has at the last session of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, obtained an amendment to the Act of Incorporation, enabling the Senate to confer after examination the degree of B.D. on ordained ministers of the Church, who have not previously obtained a degree in Arts. It is hoped that this may prove an inducement to many of our ministers to pursue their literary and theological studies still further after leaving College. The same high standard of attainment will be required from them as is now maintained in the case of University graduates.

The financial year of the College opened with a deficiency of \$6,576.34, and as the year advanced this adverse balance was largely augmented by the increased expenditure occasioned by the appointment of new Professors and other charges, until at one time it amounted to fully \$15,000. The Board is thankful to be able to report that from the collection of arrears of interest by the Treasurer on various securities, the liberality of friends of the College, and the receipt of a legacy of \$2,000, from Mrs. Jacqueline Lesslie, an old friend of the College, the deficiency has disappeared, and the Treasurer is permitted to close his account with a balance of \$249.70 in favor of the College. The Treasurer's statement hereto appended, affords full information as to the various items of receipts and disbursements in connection with the different departments of the College work.

While the year closes so favorably, the Church must not overlook the fact that the result has been brought about not through the ordinary sources of revenue, but by subscriptions from private individuals, varying from \$1,000 downward, and by the bequest of Mrs. Lesslie. The estimated requirements of the College for the year 1897-98 will be about \$21,000, and the Board can rely only on the two ordinary sources of College revenue, namely, the interest from investments and congregational subscriptions. From this it will be seen that congregations cannot relax their efforts, and must strive to increase their contributions. The continual fall in the rate of interest and the abnormal decline in the value of securities, combined with the difficulty of finding suitable investments, greatly reduces the income from the Endowment Fund. In fact, the addition of \$100,000 to this fund, would be required from the fall of the rate of interest alone, to bring the revenue from that source to the amount received some years ago. The Board observes with regret that upwards of three hundred congregations contribute nothing for College purposes, and many more remit exceedingly trifling amounts. Were these congregations to include the College among the objects of their liberality, there would be little difficulty in securing adequate support for this institution and the other Colleges of the Church. As mentioned in the last Report of the College, a Society was established for the purpose of stimulating the interest felt in the College and raising funds by extended effort for the improvement of the financial condition of the College, This Society has had several meetings and has organized a scheme of operations, but the general depression which prevails in the country, combined with the urgent appeals made by the representatives of other Schemes, for funds to reduce the deficiencies in their revenues, have seriously operated against much progress being made in the work contemplated by this new Society. The Board resolved some time ago, instead of seeking for new investments for money paid on account of existing securities, to apply these funds towards the reduction of the mortgage debt on the College. This mortgage originally stood at \$26,500.00, but has now, from the moneys received at the time ( . the Semi-Contenary of the College, and from payments made on investments, been reduced to \$5,000.00. The Treasurer is now in funds to pay this amount, and has given to the mortgagees the required notice prior to payment.

The Board has had under its repeated consideration the matter of the College Residence, and contemplates making changes which will conduce to the comfort of the students, as well as reduce the annual outlay in the management of this department. The Board hopes to be able to make arrangements for securing the services of a resident Dean who will exercise a general superintendence over the students living in the College.

The Rev. George Logie, B.D., who has for some years taken charge of the Preparatory Course in the College with much acceptance, was relieved of his duties in order to permit him to pursue his studies in Edinburgh and Germany. The Board has instructed the Senate to make provision for the conduct of the class during the coming winter, which it is hoped will be satisfactory.

Since the last Report the Board has made much needed improvements in the ventilation of the class-rooms by the use of electric fans. This change has already greatly conduced to the health and comfort of professors and students alike. The Auer light has been introduced into the students' rooms, and it is expected that in addition to the great increase in light, a very considerable reduction will be made in the expenditure for

The following is a summary of the class reports : Dr. Caven conducted the classes in New Testament Literature and Exegesis and in Biblical Criticism. In the former subject the Senior Class (2nd and 3rd years) heard lectures in exposition of part of the Epistle to the Hebrews, and on Introduction to the Pauline Epistles and the Revelation. The Junior Class (1st year) read critically part of the Acts of the Apostles, and heard lectures on Hermeneutics. The class in Biblical Criticism (mainly Textual) met every Monday for the study of that subject. The Greek Critical Exercises of the second year were examined and

Dr. MacLaren reports that the Senior Class in Systematic Theology heard lectures on the Decrees of God, Creation and Providence in Theology Proper, on Authropology, and on the Covenant of Grace and the Person of the Mediator, in Soteriology. The students of the second year underwent a written examination on Fairbairn on the Revelation of Law in Scripture. The whole

class studied the Confession of Faith, chapters xviii. xxiv.

The Junior Class heard lectures on Inspiration, the Rule of Faith, the Attributes of God, and the Trinity, Chapters i. viii. of the Confession of Faith were studied analytically. Some prelimi-

nary questions were also handled in this class

Dr. Robinson conducted the classes in Hebrew and Old Testament Introduction. The Senior Class heard lectures on the Prophecies of Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel; and read exegetically, Isaiah, chapters i.-ix. The Hebrew Critical Exercises of the third year students were also examined.

The Junior Class were given a course of lectures on the Contents and Criticism of the Penta-

teuch, and read in Hebrew, Deut., chapters i. viii.

Profes or Ballantyne reports that in Apologetics, the Senior Class heard lectures on the Evidences of Christianity, in connection with which the greater part of Fisher's Grounds of Theistic and Christian Belief was discussed. In the Junior Class lectures were given and discussion held on Flint's Theism and the parts of his Anti-Theistic Theories which treat of Atheism, Materialism and Pantheism.

In Church History the Senior Class studied the history of the Church during the Middle Ages and the Reformation in Germany and Switzerland. The Junior Class was occupied with the period covering the first six centuries. Fisher's History of the Christian Church was used as a text-book,

and the whole course was conducted by means of recitation and lecture.

Dr. Proudfort delivered to the students of the second and third years a course of lectures on Systematic Homiletics. He taught Practical Homiletics to the same years in connection with hearing and criticising forty-seven discourses. He heard and criticised twenty-seven discourses by students of the first year, giving as much homiletical instruction as the time available would permit. One lecture a week during most of the Session was given to the students of the Preparatory Classes on Elementary Homiletics.

All the professors report satisfaction with the diligence and deportment of the students.

Mr. J. F. Evans reports that the attendance on the classes in Elocution and the interest evinced in the subject were very satisfactory. In addition to the fifty lectures delivered to the students he devoted a great deal of time to their private instruction—more than sixty hours of private drill was given chiefly to the students of the second and third years. This extra time was spent mainly in voice culture and the delivery of memorized selections.

The opinion is expressed that increased interest would be taken by the students in the work of

this department were it deemed worth, of a larger number of marks than is at present assigned to it.

He would also recommend that more extended teaching should be provided for.

The work prescribed in the calendar in Greek, Latin and English was almost all taken up in the classes, and formed the subject of the closing examinations. Short term examinations in Latin and Greek were held before the Christinas vacation. Essay-writing formed part of the work of the classes in English. Three hours a day were given to the classes in Greek, Latin and English. In addition to the instructions of Mr. Logie in the subjects indicated, Dr. Gregg conducted a class in Mathematics for those in the first year, and Dr. Proudfoot (as above stated) gave hemiletical instruction to all the students of the Department. The attendance, diligence and deportment of the students were quite satisfactory.

#### THE LIBRARY.

The Rev. W. A. J. Martin, who for a series of years discharged the duties of Librarian with zeal and fidelity, in consequence of his removal to Guelph, resigned his office. The Senate desires

The Senate desires to record their appreciation of the service so heartily tendered to the College during his incumbency. The Rev. William Mac William, LL.B., was unanimously appointed to succeed Mr. Martin, and entered upon his duties at the beginning of the Session now ending. Mr. Mac William reports that during the Session now closing 1,485 volumes were taken out of the Library. Most of these have been returned. A few are still in the students' hands, but will be returned before the closing, on the 8th inst. During the past twelve months 438 volumes have been added to the Library—most of them by purchase. These additions, it is believed, have been of considerable value to the Library.

#### COLLEGE SOCIETIES.

The Literary and Theological Society, of which Mr. John Bailey, M.A., was President, held its ordinary meetings for literary and elecutionary purposes regularly during the Session. In addition to the usual work of the Seriety in its private meetings and its public debates, a special course of lectures was arranged for, as last year. These were delivered by Mr. J. W. Mr. George Arnold, B.A., is President of the Society; Messrs. D. B. Macdonald, B.A., and H. McCulloch, B.A., Vice-Presidents; R. J. Ross, B.A. Corresponding Secretary; and J. F. Taylor, B.A., Treasurer.

An interesting feature of the Session was the formation of a class for the study of the Gaelic language. The Senate expresses its deep sense of obligation to Alexander Fraser, Esq., M.A., and D. Spence, Esq., for their great kindness in devoting an hour weekly, during the Session, to the instruction of the class; and to the Gaelic Society of Toronto for their generosity in appropriating one hundred dollars to be awarded as prizes in connection with the work accomplished. This work consisted of reading in the Gaelic language, translation from and into Gaelic, composition and grammatical exercises. As there are still many connected with our Church whose knowledge of the Gaelic tongue is much in advance of their knowledge of English, it is of considerable importance that we should have ministers who can freely use this venerable language. Six students went up for examination, but several others attended the class. dents went up for examination, but several others attended the class.

An amendment to the Act incorporating Knox College, obtained during the present session of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, gives to the Senate "power to confer the Degrees of Bachelor of Divinity and Doctor of Divinity upon graduates in Arts in such Universities as the said Senate shall recognize for that purpose, and also upon such ordained ministers of the Presbyterian Church in Canada as the Senate shall determine to be possessed of the necessary qualifications, subject, however, in either case, to such regulations as to examination or otherwise as may from time to time be prescribed by by law of the said Senate." The Senate has pleasure in stating that no fewer than nine candidates for the degree of B.D.—six ministers and three theological students, all graduates in Arts--will write immediately after the close of this Session on the subjects of the First Department, and that one of the number will write on the whole examination.

The Senate has great pleasure in referring to the action of the last General Assembly in appointing the Rev. George L. Robinson, Ph.D., to the Chair of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis, and the Rev. James Ballantyne, B.A., to the Chair of Apologetics and Church History. The Senate may be permitted to record its gratification with the zeal, ability and success with which the work in these Departments has been conducted during the Session.

The Senate records its gratitude to Rev. Drs. Parsons and McTavish and Mr. Neil for valuable addresses delivered by them in connection with the Saturday Conferences. During the first week of February a Conference for the discussion of Theological and Social questions was held in the College, under the auspices of the Alumni Association. The attendance was large and much interest was taken in the proceedings. Each subject was introduced by a carefully-prepared paper, and afterwards free discussion was engaged in by the members of the Conference. Subjects of general interest were cuscussion was engaged in by the members of the Conference. Subjects of general interest were brought forward at the evening Sederunts, when the attendance from the city was usually quite large. On all hands testimony was freely given to the value of the papers read and the stimulating character of the entire occasion. The Conference was under great obligation to Professor Shortt, of Queen's University, and to Professor Alexander, of the University of Toronto, for the admirable addresses given by them. Several ministers, not members of the Association, also contributed largely to the success of the Conference.

The Association reflects with sorrow that the Rev. John Mutch, M.A., who was so zealously active in preparing for this and preceding Conferences, has since, after a short illness, passed away. But he has gone to join the great host of God's faithful servants who have preceded him, while he has left to his brethren in the ministry an example of fidelity and earnestness in the service of the

# MANITOBA COLLEGE.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE MANITOBA COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR 1896-7.

The Board of Management of Manitoba College begs to submit the Report for the past

year, and to transmit the Report of the College Senate.

During the winter session, just closed, the number of students in the Faculty of Arts and the Preparatory Department was 177, and there are now in attendance in the Faculty of Theology 23 students, making a total of 200, being 6 fewer than in the previous year. At the University examinations of 1896 there were 3 medals and 11 scholarships won by students of the College. At the examinations just closed 103 students of the College have been writing, 11 more than last year; of these, 32 are candidates for the degree

A detailed statement of the accounts and funds of the College, duly audited, is pre-

sented herewith.

There has been received from the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, £100; and from the Church of Scotland, but too late to be included in the present year's accounts, £50. Mrs. Barbour, of Bonskeid, has again sent £20 for the Scholarship Fund. For these continued practical expressions of interest in the College and its work, the Board desires to

return its most grateful thanks.

The congregational contributions from Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, have been \$3,120. This is a slight advance upon those of the previous year, but somewhat disappointing, in view of the steps taken at last Assembly. A larger number of congregations in Ontario have contributed to this College Fund than in any preceding year, and the thanks of the Board are cordially tendered to those ministers in the several Presbyteries whose exertions have contributed to secure this result. That the increase in the amount given is not larger is due to the fact that several large congregations which have been accustomed to give from \$100 and under, have, this year, made no congregational contribution. It is necessary to state also, by way of explanation, that the contribution from the Maritime Provinces, \$500, or more than double that of the previous year, arrived too late to be embraced in the accounts of this year. This increase receives, as it merits, the cordial thanks of the Board. The total income of the year, however, it will be seen, includes the contribution of that Synod for 1895-6.

In accordance with the decision of last Assembly, an appeal was made to secure personal donations, with the view of meeting specially the expenses of the Summer As the result of this appeal, \$1,540 has been contributed to the revenue of the The names of the contributors and the amounts given will be found in an appendix to the treasurer's statement. The Board cordially thanks these contributors, and especially the Rev. Dr. Robertson, to whose energetic canvass the College is indebted

for a large portion of the subscriptions, most of them for three years.

The amount contributed by the Synods of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and of British Columbia, is \$3,600. This amount is rather smaller than that of the previous year, but several contributions had not been received when the accounts were closed. The appendix will show that this includes several generous donations from friends of the College, chiefly in Winnipeg, most of them given without solicitation.

The amount received from investments, this year, is \$3,299, being an increase of \$762.43 over the previous year. To this increase, and to the personal donations from Ontario and Quebec, is mainly due the fact that the College closes the year with a balance

somewhat larger than it had at the beginning.

The total receipts for the Ordinary Fund, including the balance in hand of \$799.24. has been \$21,918.21, as compared with \$20.580.65 of the previous year. This includes \$8,835.09 for fees and board of resident students, being \$228 more than during the previous year. The expenditure has been \$20,822, leaving a balance in hand of \$1,096.21. the v Profe the S to th Syno

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the see the thr the late of lectu during the tra The legacy from the late Warden King, Esq., mentioned in last report, has been paid during the year, \$5,000, less \$500, the succession duty. This money will be invested

as soon as opportunity offers; with it the Endowment Fund is now \$51,215.

The Board fully concurs in the opinion expressed in the Report of the Senate, as to the value of the services of Professor McLaren, given for the fourth time, and of those of Professor Dr. George Adam Smith and Dr. Beattie. The Board is also of one mind with the Senate that steps should be taken, without unnecessary delay, to secure an addition to the teaching staff of the College. This is in full accord with a resolution passed by the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories at its last meeting. The making of such an addition will, of course, necessitate an increase in the annual income of the College.

All which is respectfully subm tted.

# REPORT OF THE SENATE OF MANITOBA COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR 1896-97.

The Senate of Manitoba College begs leave to submit to the General Assembly the following Report regarding the work of the year. That work has proceeded continuously since the date of the last Report, with the exception of the month of September. For a portion of the time the Theological and the Literary Classes have had to be conducted

contemporaneously.

The number of students in attendance in the Thoological Classes is this year twenty-three, thirteen in the first year, six in the second and four in the third. The number enrolled in the Literary Classes has been one hundred and seventy-seven. The aggregate attendance has thus been two hundred. A severe illness, by which Professor Hart was overtaken last summer, rendered it imperative that he should be relieved from duty during the Session, to open in October. Happily, rest and change have already in large measure restored his health, so that the College may anticipate his return to work in October next. His classes have been efficiently taught in his absence by two of the graduates of the College, both of whom had previously had considerable experience in teaching. The health both of Professors and students, with the exception mentioned, has been well maintained. The conduct of the students has been exemplary and their diligence as a whole very gratifying. It is hoped that when the University examinations now in progress are completed, Manitoba College will be found to have maintained the high place which it has so often taken.

#### I. THE THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The number of students reported to last Assembly as in attendance in this department when the Report was presented was twenty-seven. Of this number, nine completed their Theological course at the close of the Session; eight are now at work in the Synods of Manitoba and the North West Territories, and of British Columbia; the ninth re-

turned to Algoma, where he had been previously laboring.

During the Session referred to (1896), the College had the advantage of the services of Professor McLaren, D.D., of Knox College, and of Professor Beattie, D.D., of Louisville Seminary. The important department of Systematic Theology was conducted entirely by these brethren, the one taking the work in the earlier part of the Session, the other in the later. Dr. Beattie gave in addition a course of Lectures in Apologetics. The subjects of Church History (down to the period of the Reformation) and of the Canon of, and Introduction to, the New Testament were taken by Professor Baird; by whom also a course of Lectures in Biblical Criticism was given, and a class in Hebrew conducted, which met every day and was attended by students of the first year. Dr. King conducted the classes throughout the Session in Old Testament Excgesis, attended by the students of the second and third years, and in New Testament Excgesis, attended by the students of the three years; in the former, portions of Leviticus and selected Psalms were read; in the latter, the 1st Epistle of John. Dr. King also delivered the second part of a course of lectures in Biblical Theology. Mr. J. F. Evans, B.A., gave instruction in Elocution during the latter part of the Session. The students expressed their sense of the value of the training given by Mr. Evans.

Smith, of the Free Church College, Glasgow. The Lectures were marked by the complete knowledge of the subject and all the charm of style known to belong to the Lecturer. To the students and to the citizens also who heard them, the Lectures proved both instructive and inspiring.

During the current Session in addition to the lectures of Dr. King in Old Testament Exegesis, New Testament Exegesis and Biblical Theology, and of Professor Baird in Hebrew, Church History and Introduction, the students are having the advantage for the fourth time of Dr. MacLaren's services in the important department of Systematic Theology. When Dr. MacLaren leaves, Dr. Beattie, of Louisville, is expected to take up the subject at the point reached and also to give a course of Lectures in Apologetics. Dr. Scrimger, of Montreal, has agreed to give the College the benefit of his services for the third time, and will accordingly give instruction in New Testament and Old Testament Exegesis during the latter part of the present Session. The Rev. Peter Wright, B.D., of Portage la Prairie, who gave three years ago a valuable course of Lectures on Homiletics, has kindly consented to give instruction in this department to the students of the first and second years.

The Senate would record its grateful sense of the service rendered and to be rendered to the institution, and thereby to the Church, by the gentlemen named, and it would especially tender its cordial thanks to Dr. George Adam Smith, of Glasgow, and to Dr. Beattie, of Louisville, connected as they are with other branches of the Church, in so readily agreeing to give the College the benefit of their services.

## II. -THE ARTS DEPARTMENT.

As already stated the number enrolled in this department, including the Preparatory Classes, last his year been one hundred and seventy-seven. Over one hundred of these are taking the examinations of the University at the time when this Report is being drawn up. While it is not thought to be any longer necessary to give the names of all the students in the various years of the Arts Course, it may be of interest to give those of the Graduating class. Coming to the teaching, Dr. Bryce has taken the Higher English Classes, together with those in History, Ethnology and Botany. He has continued to represent Manitoba College in the teaching given in the various branches of Natural Science to the students of the affiliated Colleges, in rooms provided by the University of Manitoba.

Professor Baird lectured during four months of the Session on Political Economy to the students of the Junior and Senior B.A. years. Mr. Baird also gave instruction in English in the first part of the Session to the students of the Preliminary year, and in Latin and Greek to the students taking a special course with a view to the Ministry.

Dr. King lectured throughout the Session on Calderwood's Hand-book on Ethics, to all the students of the Junior and Senior B.A. years, and to the students taking the Philosophical course, on Sidgwick's History of Ethics. He also continued to conduct the classes in German, of the Junior and Senior B.A., the Previous and the Preliminary years.

Mr. W. E. James, B.A., has continued to conduct the Mathematical Classes of the Preparatory, Preliminary and Previous years, filling at the same time the important position of resident tutor in the College.

Wardlaw Taylor has given valuable assistance for the second Session in the teaching of the Mental and Moral Science course, having this year lectured on the History of Philosophy, Ancient and Modern, and on the Ethical systems of Janet and Spencer.

of Philosophy, Ancient and Modern, and on the Ethical systems of Janet and Spencer. In the absence of Professor Hart, his work in the Greek and Latin Classics has been taken by Mr. F. W. Clark, B.A., and in French by Mr. J. R. McArthur, B.A. Both these gentlemen have done the work entrusted them to the satisfaction of the Senate; and, indeed, it has been a matter for thankfulness, than when Professor Hart's state of health made a season of rest imperative, two of the graduates of the College were so well prepared to take up his work.

In addition, Mr. Augustus Ball, B.A., another of the graduates of the College, has been engaged since Christmas in giving instruction in Latin, Greek and English, in

the Preparatory classes of the College.

There have thus been in all seven instructors at work this Session in connection with the Arts Classes; nor is it easy to see how the increasing work required by the University can be overtaken by any smaller number. The Senace is of opinion that an addition must almost immediately be made to the permanent staff of instructors, and the Church may be expected to be asked to sanction such an addition at an early date. The requirements of the College in its two departments of Arts and Theology would be best met by the appointment of a Professor, who should take the subject of Systematic Theology and at the same time take a large portion of the Philosophic teaching.

The Inter-Collegiate work of instruction between Manitoba and Wesley College is still maintained with obvious advantage to both institutions. The students of Manitoba College, who are taking the special course in Mathematics, have received instruction from he Professor of Mathematics in Wesley College, while those of that College who are aking the special course either in Philosophy or in Classics, have attended the lectures

given in these branches in Manitoba College.

The Societies connected with the College have been in efficient operation throughout

The Senate, in closing its Report, would again record its grateful sense of the goodness of God experienced by the Institution in many forms during the year.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND FOR MANITOBA AND THE NORTH - WEST TERRITORIES FOR THE YEAR 1896-97.

The Board of Management of the Church and Manse Building Fund begs to

present its Annual Report as follows :-

During the past year the operations of the Board have not been so extensive as in some previous years of its history, the state of the fund having prevented the making of grants in several instances. Assistance has been given towards the erection or extension of 14 churches and 2 manses. The amount advanced by way of loan has been \$3,800, while grants amounting to \$440 have been made. Of these, 9 churches are in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, with 5 churches and 2 manses in the Synod of British Columbia. A more detailed statement of these loans and grants is afterwards given.

In the report presented to last Assembly it was said that, owing to the state of the fund, grants could no longer be made except out of interest, and even then only under exceptional circumstances. This policy the Board has had to pursue during the past year. It is with great regret that it has done so, but no other course was open to it, unless the capital of the fund was to be seriously impaired.

Of the moneys advanced by J. T. Morton, Esq., and of which mention has been made in the reports of former years, there has been repaid \$4,125.55, leaving a little

over \$10,000 still due to him.

Through the Rev. Dr. Robertson, who has spent the past six months in Great Britain, various sums have been received in aid of the fund, amounting in all to \$3,886.78. This amount, it is believed, has been obtained from individuals and not from congregations, but the Board is not yet in possession of any detailed information on the subject. It, however, desires to express most grateful thanks to the Christian friends who, on having the great work this Church is carrying on in the North-West brought under their notice, recognized the claim resting upon the Motherland to share in the work of providing for her children and sons settling there, and generously responded to it.

Indianford, a small village in a good district in southern Manitoba. Grant of \$75 towards a Church costing \$800.

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#### PRESBYTERY OF MINNEDOSA.

Forecarren, village on the Manitoba and North-Western Railway. Church costing \$800, loan of \$250.

Crotter Colony, near Saltcoats. Church valued at \$500. Grant of \$50.

#### PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

Wapella, small, thriving town. Church costing \$1,000, loan of \$300.

# SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

#### PRESBYTERY OF EDMONTON.

Fort Saskatchewau. Loan of \$500 upon a manse costing \$1,000.

Fairfield, a new settlement near Edmonton, the prospects of which are encouraging. No other Church supplies ordinances in that neighborhood. Church costing \$500, grant of \$75.

Colchester, another station to which a grant of \$90 was made in aid of a Church.

#### PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY.

Cardston, a mission begun among the Mormon settlers. Rev. Dr. Robertson got promises from a number of Christian Endeavor and Young People's Societies and Sabbath Schools of assistance to build a Church and school. The Board agreed to advance \$1,000, to be repaid from these sources; but work on the building has not yet, so far as known to the Board, been begun. The sum of \$233.64 appears in the treasurer's statement as having already been received towards repayment of the proposed advance by the Board, and a further sum of \$50 has been received since the treasurer's books were closed. This money is in the meantime held by the Board.

Dewdney, a village on the line of railway between Calgary and Fort Macleod. Manse to cost \$1.300, loan of \$300.

# PRESBYTERY OF WESTMINSTER.

Central Park. Last year there was reported a grant to this congregation of \$\frac{1}{0}\$0 towards a Church costing \$1,000. This Church was unfortunately destroyed by fire after its completion, and under the exceptional circumstances a second grant of \$75 was made.

Chilliwack East. A small additional loan of \$50 was made to this congregation.

With reference to the "Ordinary Fund," a comparison with the previous year will show the following results: A decrease of \$404.93 in congregational contributions and donations; also a decrease of \$260.87 in ministers' rates, and an increase in interest of \$499.58.

In regard to congregational givings it is surely to be deeply regretted that, while the Church finds it necessary to add to the list of annuitants from year to year, congregations, or at least many of them, fail to respond in an adequate measure to the necessities of the fund. It is to be feared that the claims of this most important fund are largely left out of sight when moneys collected for the Schemes of the Church are being distributed, and in probably too many instances it only gets what happens to be left over after all the other Schemes have been considered. Congregations do not realilize that probably not less than eleven per cent. of the ministers in the Western Section of the Church are on the Fund and are drawing benefit from it. The Committee earnestly press, and ask the Assembly to press, upon congregations the claims of those ministers on the fund who, after rendering faithful service to the Church, have been compelled on account of age or infirmity to retire from active work with, in most cases, but small incomes outside of what this fund gives them to procure the necessaries, we dare scarcely say the comforts, of life.

It will not call for any undue or even large measure of liberality on the part of congregations to bring the annuities up to the full amount allowed under the rules, namely, \$350 to a minister who has served the Church for forty years in active ministerial service. This is not a large sum, and the Church is well able to give it. The Committee pleads earnestly with ministers and congregations for greater effort in the support of our aged and infirm ministers. They are worthy for whom the plea is pressed. Let the effort be made, and give, even if late, a better provision for their declining years.

With regard to ministers' rates, we cannot look for much, if any, increase in them. For some years past the collections have included a large amount of arrears, which, through the exertions of Mr. Burns, have been both discovered and very largely collected. We are now approaching the normal, and, of course, can only look for normal collection of rates.

As to interest, it will be a matter of satisfaction to the Church to see the important part which interest is bearing in the amounts paid to annuitants. Fortyone per cent. of the sum paid to annuitants was contributed by interest. This fact suggests two things, namely: The deplorable position the ministers on the fund would occupy but for the endowment, and the desirability of reaching the two hundred thousand minimum at the earliest possible date.

With regard to the investments and the interest arising therefrom, it may be stated that those belonging to this fund have suffered in common with similar investments of loan companies and private individuals. It has not always been possible to collect interest, and it is to be regretted that it has been necessary to take over properties to the extent of \$26,589. Your Committee assumes no responsibility for the investments formerly made, since neither convener nor committee was consulted in regard to them.

There are a few matters connected with the finances which will call for adjustment by the Committee, which could not very well be done up to this time.

#### ANNUITANTS AND ANNUITIES.

Seventy-six annuitants have received benefit from the fund during the year, the total sum-being \$14.997.18.

Three names appear in the list for the last time, viz.: Revs. J. G. Cavruthers, Dr. Smellie and N. Paterson. The Master has called them home.\*

The Rev. Duncan Cameron has voluntarily relinquished his claim for benefit for the present. This is practically a gift of \$255 to the fund.

In ordering the payment of the annuities the Committee was met with a great difficulty from the fact that the funds available were nearly \$1,800 short of what was necessary, even under the modified basis of the past few years. It was a question of reducing the annuities by twelve per cent., which the Committee felt would mean much to many of those on the fund, or to go with a deficit to the Assembly. It was decided to adopt the latter course, and meanwhile make a special appeal to congregations, which has been done.

#### THE ENDOWMENT.

Very much difficulty has been experienced in connection with the effort to raise the balance of the two hundred thousand dollars. The commercial depression, so widespread and severe, has been fully equaled by the continued unwillingness on the part of some ministers in charge to have their congregations canvassed, or permit the use of their pulpits for the presentation of the claims of this fund. The Convener was requested by the Committee to bring this matter specially before the General Assembly in order that the highest court of the Church may pronounce on the action of ministers who, in the past, have not seen it to be their duty to obey the previous direction of the Assembly. The Committee realizes that ministers may feel a delicacy in advocating the claims themselves, though they should not, but there does not seem to be any good reason why the Agent of the Church, appointed by the Assembly for the very purpose, should be barred from making an appeal to congregations.

It will be noted from the financial statements that a further sum of \$2,200 has been received on account of the Wright Bequest, and that a further bequest, by the late Warden King, of \$3,000, has also been received, less the succession tax of ten per cent.

The Committee would appeal to ministers, sessions and congregations to allow the claims of the fund, which are those of our old ministers, who deserve the best the Church can do for them, to be presented. That will bind no one, while it may help to clear away misunderstandings and remove prejudices.

The Rev. Robt. Hughes, formerly of Rosemount, and now in Worcester, Mass. U.S., asks to continue his connection with the fund under the rules. The Committee recommends that leave to do so be granted.

The Committee judges it proper to bring to the notice of the Assembly the fact that the Committee in its management of the fund, and the rules laid down for its administration, have been made the subject of adverse and severe criticism, chiefly at the hands of writers who did not append their names to their letters. These were published in the Northern Presbyterian. The Presbytery of Paris overtured the Synod of Hamilton and London in the same direction, and prayed the Synod "to overture the General Assembly to institute thorough investigation of the state of the fund, of the investments, of securities held, of losses incurred, cost of administration," etc.

The Convener, while objecting to answer charges made by anonymous persons, felt that the interests of the fund demanded that he should do so, and consequently he replied through the same medium in which the charges appeared. He also attended the meetings of the Synod of Hamilton and London, and of Toronto and Kingston, and by the courtesy of these courts was permitted to discuss the fund both in regard to the rules and administration. It is hoped that much misconception has in that way been removed, and, possibly, some measure of good done to counteract the evil likely to result to the fund from the way in which the matter was presented in the newspaper correspondence and overture of the Paris Presbytery. The Committee has no objection to the fullest investigation being made, and will be glad to facilitate it in every way possible.

#### SPECIAL GRANTS.

As has been done for some years past, the following special grants have been made: To Rev. John McNabb, \$50: to Rev. W. C. Young, \$30.

It will probably not be out of place to refer under this head to the case of the special allowance voted by the last Assembly to the widow of the late Rev. Alex. Urquhart. The Committee, though not in funds to pay the amount, have done so since the closing of the accounts, which, of course, has added the sum of \$176.25 to the deficit shown in the financial statement. The convener has been directed by

the Committee to call the attention of the Assembly to the great danger which may arise from an action of this kind, as, while such a direction to pay from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund might not be out of keeping with the spirit of that fund, it is entirely contrary to the spirit and intent of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

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THE CASE OF REV. W. M. ROGER.

With reference to the case of Rev. Mr. Roger, referred by the last Assembly to the Presbytery of Hamilton and to this Committee, the Committee has fully considered the matter, and felt compelled to come to the conclusion that until the Church recognizes the evangelistic work as a branch of ministerial service, ministers engaged in evangelistic work can only be recognized as engaged in cognate work, and preserve connection under rule 5, by paying \$10 per year.

The Committee recommends that Messrs. Geo. Flett, John McEwen, John McRobie, A. McDiarmed, Andrew Tolmie and Robert Gray be allowed to retire and go on the Fund for benefit. In view of the special circumstances in the case of the Rev. Geo. Flett, it is recommended that his annunity shall date from the last Assembly.

In regard to the case of the Rev. A. D. McDonald, D.D., while recognizing the precarious nature of his health, the Committee sees great difficulty in the way of granting the leave asked for, and recommends that no action be taken in the meantime, inasmuch, as should he find it necessary to retire, the case would come up at the following Assembly, and would therefore entail only a short delay.

and would therefore entail only a short delay.

In regard to the case of the Rev. W. M. McKibbon, as it may be found that great benefit will result from entire rest, it is recommended that he be placed on the Fund for benefit for one year, his case to be again considered.

The case of the Rev. Simon McDonald is somewhat peculiar, and is not provided for un ler the rules. The committee, therefore, transmits the papers to the Assembly with the recommendation that he be allowed an annuity of \$50. Mr. McDonald had not paid rates.

With regard to the application of the Rev. H. Lamont, D.D., it is unnecessary to take any action, as it has pleased the Divine Father to call him to his rest and reward a few hours before his papers came before the committee.

With regard to the case of the Rev. D wid Mitchell, who has been on the Fund from year to year, and the case of Rev. W. K. McCulloch, who was put on for one year by the last Assembly, it is recommended that they be continued for another year.

Application for connection with the Fund has been received from Rev. John Mackay, of Elphinstone, Man. As Mr. Mackay is 65 years of age, and only made one payment on account of rates in 1835, and there are circumstances connected with his ministerial labors which might have a bearing on the case, the committee declined to recommend that the application be granted, and suggested that any application would better be made through his Presbytery.

Collections were received from one hundred and forty-eight congregations. The Committee agreed to refer these applications simpliciter to the General Assembly as special cases.

After several years og anxiety over adverse balances your Committee is able, at last, to report that all obligations have been met. This satisfactory state of affairs is to be traced, to a considerable degree, to the increasing interest taken in the Fund by young ministers, who not only pay rates which considering the protection afforded, are the cheapest insurance imaginable, but who also secure contributions from their congregations, thus making sure the permanency of the good work. At the same time it should not be forgotten that the Committee is often placed in a trying poisition between appeals to the sympathies by ministers in sore need backed up by Presbyteries, and the regulations framed for the administration of the Fund. It must be apparent to all that the largest efficiency of the Fund depends, in no small measure, upon the rules being faithfully carried out.

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# MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND (WESTERN SECTION.)

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

It is with feelings of more than ordinary pleasure and gratitude that your Committee submit this report to the General Assembly. During the preceding year the revenue was nearly \$3.700 less than the expenditure. For the year just ended, the revenue has been sufficient to meet the entire expenditure. While grateful for this result, your Committee do not lose sight of the fact that it has been attained because of special circumstances which cannot be looked for in future years.

The amount received from interest upon investments is considerably in excess of the normal annual revenue from this source because of certain arrearages which were collected during the year. The receipts from ministers' rates are nearly \$1,000 in excess of the preceding year, owing to the fact that a number of ministers took advantage of the opportunity given by last Assembly to connect themselves with the fund, and to pay up rates for quite a number of years, thus materially swelling the revenue. The receipts also include the return of a loan of nearly \$600 and a legacy of \$900. But for these exceptional circumstances the revenue would have been nearly \$3,000 less than the amount required to pay annuities. In other words, the normal revenue of the Committee is \$3,000 less than the expenditure, rendering absolutely necessary a considerable reduction in the annuities paid, unless there is very largely increased revenue from the congregations of the Church. After careful consideration and in view of all the circumstances, your Committee are shut up to the recommendation that power be given to them to reduce if necessary the annuities hereafter to be paid to the widows and orphans entitled to these, so as each year to equalize revenue and expenditure.

Your Committee farther recommend that no one be placed on the list of annuitants who is not entitled to this by the regulations under which the fund is at present administered. It is required that ministers contribute regularly from year to year the personal rate. This is a comparatively trilling sum, which without much difficulty can be given by every minister of the Church desiring an interest in the fund. Your Committee are satisfied that the fund can never be administered with satisfaction or success, unless this regulation is strictly adhered to in all cases. The plea is sometimes adduced that because congregational contributions have been made to the fund, therefore the widow of a pastor of such congregation has some claim thereon. It ought to be borne in mind, however, that all contributions heretofore made, have been made under the existing regulations, which require a minister to be personally connected with the fund before his family can receive benefit therefrom, and it seems to your Committee unfair that the widows and orphans of ministers, who, during their life time regularly complied with the regulations and contributed the personal rate, should have their annuity reduced because of others being placed upon the Fund who have no claim upon it, according to existing regulations. Should the General Assembly in its wisdom legislate that for the future a congregational contribution entitles widows and orphans to participate in the Fund, legislation of this nature should not be made retro-active to the disadvantage and loss of those annuitants who are regularly on the Fund. Your Committee, however, after careful consideration cannot recommend the General Assembly to adopt such legislation. It would mean such a radical change in the regulations under which the Fund is administered, as to revolutionize the scheme, and to place at serious disadvantage the families of those ministers who for many years have regularly contributed the ministerial personal rate, as well as forwarded the congregational contribution.

Applications upon behalf of Mrs. A. MacKenzie, from the Presbytery of Maitland, and Mrs. Wright, from the Presbytery of London, were, by the Assembly referred to your Committee. After enquiry into all the circumstances, your Committee were unable to grant the applications.

Quite a number of ministers availed themselves of the opportunity given by last Assembly to connect themselves with the Fund. It is very desirable that the number should be still further increased, and with a view to enable others to do this, your

Committee recommend that discretionary power be given the Committee next year to admit to connection with the Fund, prior to 1st Jan., 1898, ministers desiring this, upon their contributing a sum equivalent to the total payments they should have made, provided they had connected themselves with the Fund at induction, together with interest at the rate of 6 per cent, per annum, compounded annually from the date of induction. And further, that only the widows and orphans of ministers who were connected with the Fund, and whose personal rates were paid up in full to a period not exceeding one year from the date of their death, be entitled to participate in the benefits of the Fund.

Your Committee further recommend that the Assembly renew its instruction of some years ago to Presbyteries to see that ministers at ordination are reminded of

this Fund and of the desirability of their connecting themselves with it.

"As the Overture of the Presbytery of Toronto deals with the constitution and administration of the Miristers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund, Western Section, which in both respects is different from our own, the Committee feel indisposed on this account to offer any criticism upon it.

"Two remarks, however, they may be permitted to make.

1. "'They believe that the duty of providing for a Minister's Widow and Orphans should, in the first instance and to a large extent, rest upon the minister himself, and all the more, as the Church now furnishes every minister with ample means for doing so.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF PROBATIONERS.

Your Committee have to report that they met regularly once every three mouths during the year just closing, made distribution of the supply at their disposal among Presbyteries, according to the report of their vacancies, and transacted such other business as fell within their province. They are pleased to be able to state that their work has been through ut more pleasant than for some years past—that confidence in the Scheme appears to be increasing, and this it is hoped will increase after some additional improvements in its regulations, or as these are more correctly and generally known and more faithfully enforced. For the most part, or in very many instances, Presbyteries do not seem to be acquainted with its provisions, and this is particularly the case with the Moderators of Sessions in vacant congregations, and the Committees of Supply in these when such are appointed. One of the recommendations with which the Report concludes bears on such.

Your Committee think that it was a wise action on the part of the last General Assembly to allow some measure of discretion as to admission to the roll of Probationers. It will surely not be disputed that the roll should be composed of such as are eligible and likely to be called. If vacancies desire to hear only candidates from whom they may be guided to seek a Pastor, those sent by the Committee should be such a are likely, one or other of them, to meet their expectations and present an acceptable appearance. Necessity has been felt in the course of the year to act upon the discretion granted, and to refuse one or two who were certified by Presbyteries, but whose work within their bounds was not such as to encourage the anticipation that they would be successful in other quarters. It was also judged prudent in the interests of the Scheme and of vacancies to drop a name from the list. Two whose names had been formerly on the list and had received appointments for the period allowed, namely, two years, applied to be replaced, but their request was not granted. In this it is thought the Assembly will concur.

From Appen lix I. it will be seen that 80 Vacancies were reported during the year, some of these since the arrangement of the Scheme for the quarter now current. Of these, 41 were settled at the dates and by the persons recorded and 39 are still under

supply.

Appendix II. gives the number of Probationers on the roll whose services were at the disposal of your Committee, namely, 24. Of these, 4 obtained stated charges; 3 accepted appointments as Ordained Missionaries; 1 was dropped from the roll; and 1 withdrew. leaving 15 on the roll at the present date.

Your Committee would commend the Scheme or Act to the approval of this Assembly, and ask that it give the influence of its authority in favor of its faithful and impartial operation.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

- I. That the Presbyteries be required to report all vacancies when they occur, or exist, in their bounds to the Committee, for some supply, either full or partial.
- 11. That the names of interim Moderators of Sessions in vacancies be sent by the Presbytery Clerks to the Convener of the Committee, that he may furnish them with a copy of the Regulations, and help them in the fulfilment of their duties.
- III. That presbyteries on the licensure of students to preach the Gospel recommend them to place their services at the disposal of the Committee for employment in the regular way.
- IV. That the attention of Presbyteries be called again to the regulations in force guarding pulpits of vacant congregations from the undue preponderance in supply by ministers in settled charges, or students.

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# PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA—REPORT ON CHURCH LIFE AND WORK, JUNE, 1897.

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The report now submitted is the second presented to the General Assembly under the plan adopted by the Assembly that met in London two years ago. That plan aimed at combining and unifying several departments of Church work, which had previously been administered by four separate committees. Many were opposed to disturbing the old system, and expressed their fears that some branches of the work might suffer by reason of inadequate treatment, not only from the General Assembly, but also from Synods, Presbyteries and Sessions.

It is now admitted that those fears have not been justified by the results of the change so far; and it is a cheering fact, well worth recording, that the agreeable disappointment is on all hands frankly acknowledged. While, last year, many of the Presbytery Reports freely criticized the Assembly's action, and one or two were very pronounced in their expressions of hostility to the new plan, this year there is not a single murmur from shore to shore, and many have expressed unfeigned satisfaction. Brockville Presbytery voices the sentiment of several reports when it says-"The radical change in the order of things instituted by the Assembly of 1895 was not effected without serious misgivings on the part of many. The valuable report submitted to last Assembly, though drawn up in the face of very great difficulties, has served to convince not a few of the wisdom of the new order." In the introduction of the report of Montreal Presbytery these words ar: "Your committee do not think that in any previous year so much heartiness has been shown in the returns as has been manifested this year. In the majority of cases Sessions have entered on the work of preparing their reports in a spirit of earnestness, so that the task of examining them has been a source of real pleasure and stimulus." And Kinoston report has on its opening page this cheering statement : "Replies are in almost every case characterized by thoughtfulness, carefulness, and a spirit that recognizes the importance of the subject. The monosyllabic answers which were at one time so common indications of peariness, indifference, or a rush of business come now only from one or two peaceful : ural parishes." Similar sentiments might be quoted from other reports, but your committee deem these at once necessary and sufficient to assist the Assembly in forming a correct judgment as to how the recent change is viewed when judged by its fruits.

The Committee prepared a series of questions early last November, and sent an ample supply to every Presbytery Convener for distribution to Sessions and Mission Stations. The Presbyteries of autumnal Synods were requested to send their reports directly to Assembly's Convener, while those of the vernal Synods were asked to send a copy to Synod and Assembly Conveners respectively. In the former case the reason for this request is obvious; in the latter searcely less so. The report for Assembly should be in proof form early in May, that it may be submitted to all the members of a Committee scattered over the entire Dominion. The reports of the May Synods are, therefore, too late to be available for this draft report, though they should be received in time to incorporate any

special features or important recommendations in the final form, as presented to Assembly. The importance of furnishing an avenue by which the views of all the lower Courts of the Church may reach the General Assembly, is fully recognized by your Committee; and as far as circumstances permit, the Synods have found a voice in this report.

No questions were sent to our Foreign Mission Presbyteries, as many of the inquiries are obviously inapplicable, and as every feature of their work receives copious treatment from the Foreign Mission Committee. There are now fifty Home Presbyteries, and from every one of them a report has been received. These reports have all been carefully prepared, and some of them are very elaborate—that of Sarnia containing forty-five pages of foolscap closely written. Last year the number of Sessions responding to Assembly's circular was reported as very gratifying, about eighty per cent. of the This year the proportion can hardly organized Sessions having made returns. be less than ninety per cent. In several Presbyteries, such as Whitny, Gueller, Brandon, Glenboro and Portage La Prairie, all the Sessions have responded. In Inverness, Paris, Maitland, Rock Lake, Calgary, Kamloops and Victoria only one Session in each has failed. In Prince Edward Island, Shelburne and Lunen-BURG, PICTOU, KINGSTON, SANNIA, MINNEDOSA and EDMONTON three in each have failed, and in London four. In many other reports where numbers are not stated, great satisfaction is expressed, as in St. John, Montreal, Owen Sound, Barrie, Hamilton, Huron and several others. In a few Presbyteries, however, the language of complaint is employed, which seems to attain its maximum emphasis in the reports for WALLACE, OTTAWA, TORONTO and ALGOMA. The improvement in this respect is encouraging, and leaves the impression that our Sessions are becoming more deeply interested in the spiritual welfare of the people, as that is exhibited in devout lives, consistent conduct, and growing liberality.

#### L -A STATEMENT FOR THE PAST YEAR REGARDING

1.—THE INTEREST MANIFESTED IN THE REGULAR SABBAIR SERVICES AND IN THE WEEK EVENING MEETINGS.

Great unanimity characterizes the reports so far as they refer to the Sabbath services. As regards this manifestation of Church Life there is everything that is hopeful and heartening. And surely we employ a legitimate method of measurement when we apply the reed of the sanctuary. Christian life, wherever it exists, will find some way of embodying itself in visible form. Life of any kmd will make its presence felt and known. The joyous lark springs upward to vent her gladness in her morning song. Even the life that circulates in the stem and branches of the tree reveals itself in the opening buds, expanding blossoms and the ripened fruit. And surely that highest life of all that thrills the bosom of Christian men and women, will in some way assert its presence and reveal its power.

A conscientious attendance on the public worship of God is one of the most hopeful signs of the spiritual life of a community. It is a duty which Chr. stian people owe to themselves, their minister, their fellow-members, and to the Lord who bought them. It is also a delightful privilege, and when deprived of it for a time by distance, sickness, or old age, there are few things for which Christians more ardently long than to see God's "power and glory as they have seen them in the sanctuary." Nor is there a more God is sign of spiritual decay in a church than when the members "forsake the assembling of themselves together."

Hence there is much to evoke our heartfelt gratitude to God in the uniform testimony of our Presbyteries that our people love the gates of Zon, and, in increasing numbers, througher courts. Trunco says, "Attendance on Sabbach services is well sustained

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iform testiasing numll sustained and encouraging, both as to numbers and interest. In no case is any decline noticed, while in some there has been gratifying increase." Pictou, "The great majority of our people love the gates of Zion, and their seats in the house of God are never empty except for a good and sufficient reason." BROCKVILLE says that, "judged by this test, religion is not losing its grip upon the masses. Increasing attendance and deepening interest bespeak a love for the habitation of God's House." Quenec, "Not a murmur as to attendance or attention." Kingston reports that there is "everything that is gratifying," in respect to Sabbath attendance. Guelful speaks of "great unanimity in regard to a growing interest in the matter of Church attendance," and believes "there is positive evidence to day in Canada that the preaching of the Gospel still retains its ancient power to secure the interest and attention of perishing men." London says, "The reports of Sessions are full of gratitude for the improvement in church attendance"; and Victoria bears testimony that "the interest in Sabbath services is deepening and on the increase."

There are representative utterances and might be multiplied at pleasure. There is hardly a discordant note in all this gladsome peal of heavenly music. Here and there we find a solitary Session reporting unfavorably to its Presbytery, as one in Petersorous "very inadequate attendance and great carelessness," and one in Regina that is troubled with a few "chronic non-church-goers." But the general testimony is cheering beyond all precedent. And since it is admitted that the public service on the Lord's Day is the one directly sanctioned and enjoined by God, and the one on which special blessings are promised, our hearts may well be gladdened as we behold those Sabbath throngs repairing to the fountains of living water, or hear them saying "Let us go into the House of the Lord."

But the week evening meetings for prayer, praise and mutual editication, have not been utilized by our people as their fidelity to Sabbath privileges would lead us to expect. While many Presbyteries speak of fairly attended prayer meetings, and all acknowledge their utility in cheering the hearts, strengthening the faith, and beautifying the 'ives of believers, yet it is evident that only a small proportion of our professing Christian people take advantage of this means of renewing their spiritual strength. MIRAMICHI reports that though in one congregation "the attendance at prayer meeting is doubled," in several congregations Church Life, when thus tested, is "well nigh zero, and men are conspicuous by their absence." HALIFAX says, that though this department of Church Life is not satisfactory, yet, with the exception of two congregations, the average tendency is towards growth and increasing interest. LANARK and RENFREW, while speaking in a subdued tone of the prayer meeting service, tells with a sigh of relief of "some faithful men and women who stand by the prayer meeting, and who would rather want their supper than this midweek meal." Hamilton reports a small attendance "with but three exceptions," and suggests that social engagements are largely responsible for the failure. Paris utters a wail of sadness broken only by the report of one Session that says, "very well attended," but, as if so strange a thing needed explanation, it adds, "perhaps a new pastor is the attraction." Stratford has a few cases of "splendid prayer meeting audiences," and Bruce reports prayer meetings to be "in most cases satisfactory." Five Sessions in VICTORIA Presbytery report that the "attendance is gratifying," but the general complaint is that too few of the male members attend.

But though these are far from being optimistic utterances, yet there are not wanting many indications of growing interest. Young people are becoming more attached to the mid-week meetings than ever before. Where once only the very pious and aged were expected to attend prayer meetings, now are to be found many of our young people listening to the old Gospel and often bearing testimony to its power in their own lives. Guelph suggests in the case of a particular congregation, that an earnest effort be made to double

the attendance during the present year. Yes, it would surely be, for hundreds of our congregations, a magnificent method of celebrating the Diamond Jubilee of our beloved Queen, to give this fresh proof of their loyalty to the King of kings, and their increased consecration to His service.

A hearty, cordial, enjoyable prayer meeting usually indicates a church spiritually alive. But if the meeting is nearly deserted, if the few present in body seem to be absent in spirit, if the prayers offered are languid and formal, then the pastor has great cause for heaviness of heart. Press of business, social engagements, and frequent meetings of another kind, so often mentioned in these reports, may explain but can never excuse. The business, occupation or calling that necessarily interferes with a man's spiritual interests, and robs him of his religious privileges, cannot be of God. "Let every man wherein he is called, therein abide with God."

2.—THE DEEPENING OF SPIRITUAL LIFE AND THE EXHIBITION OF CHRISTIAN MORALITY BY MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS IN RELATION TO SOCIAL AND COMMERCIAL LIFE.

It was not expected that definite and formulated proof of spiritual quickening could in every case be furnished by our Sessions. Their own honest conviction that there is a deepening of spiritual life, even though it has not come "with observation" and has made little report either to the eye or ear, should be accepted with gladness. It is surely something to to say with Kingston "in many places there is felt the earnest yearning for a true, whole consecration of those who name the name of Christ." We can also fully sympathise with the sentiment of Huron, that "The sphere of outward effort may not fully express the depth and power of secret prayer or the strength and growth of vital godliness,"

While replies are cautious, and information sparingly furnished, to that part of the question that bears on spirituality, yet a few speak decidedly and cheerfully. Pictor speaks of Sessions that "have not been dismayed by this formidable question," and cites in proof of a deepening religious life "increasing delight in prayer in the home and in public, greater earnestness in Christian service, etc." Montreal says, "a deepening of spiritual life, especially among the young, is observable; but the reports distinctly reveal the need of a great revival." While Glengarry has some Sessions that report "spiritual life deepening among the young," it has others that admit that "worldiness has been getting more and more hold of their congregations." Chatham speaks hopefully here, and so do a dozen others. And though no Presbytery ventures to use the language of exultation when dealing with this deeply important part of the Assembly's inquiry, yet there is emphatically an upward tendency, and a growing conformity to the image of Christ.

But when we come to inquire regarding those more tangible fruits of the Spirit, as embodied in the social and commercial life of our people, all hesitation disappears from the replies, and Sessions and Presbyterics seem to vie with one another as they speak in strains of superlative praise. Only a few quotations can be made room for here, but let it be borne in mind that they are representative, and are given on the principle of "ex uno disce omnes." Halifax says, "Many are beginning to realize more fully that religion can and must manifest itself in the daily life," and again "it is a patent fact those who violate social laws and commercial integrity are very rarely Presbyterians." Orangeville: "In every case but one the Christian morality ranks high," and again, "the three great evils of modern society,—drinking, dancing and card-playing,—are on the decline." London has about twenty Sessions reporting that "a deepened spiritual life has exhibited itself in purer social life and a higher tone in the commercial life of members and adherents." Brandon says, "Our members as a whole have been upright and of a high moral character." Westminster illustrates, by profuse quotations from Session reports, its own Presbyterial judgment, "that the Spiritual life and Christian morality of our

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This testimony is cheering and is scarcely affected by any rebuttal evidence, though one or two Presbyteries speak with considerable reservation, as Edmonton when it says, "careful qualification is made even in the cases that report favorably." And this high standard of public and social morality must lend a power to the testimony of our Church that will become irresistible in proportion as it reaches perfection and universality. The work of the Church is to manifest the truth. If therefore the truth be obscured or perverted by the imperfection of the human medium, to that extent is the strength of the Church weakened and her aggressive power abated. But where the Spiritual forces in the Church exert their transforming energy on the souls of men, and are revealed in loyal and consecrated lives, then human life is perfected and crowned. Religion is no more a burden and a yoke, but an inward and inspiring life.

3,-THE DISCHARGE OF PARENTAL DUTIES AND THE CULTIVATION OF RELIGIOUS LIFE IN THE FAMILY.

Here we lay our finger on the weakest spot, perhaps, of the whole religious life and experience of our people. From shore to shore a wail of sadness rises from neglected family altars, and from ten thousand homes where altars have never yet been reared. And were we to dogmatically assert that family religion can in no sense exist apart from the formal act of family worship, then might we shudder as we read the prophet's prayer, "Pour out Thy fury upon the heathen that know Thee not and upon the families that call not on Thy name." But the cry arising from these reports is one of disappointment and not of despair. This beautiful social and public life that has been held up to our gaze, we instinctively feel, must root itself in much that is true and pure in private and domestic life. The Master Himself asserts that "by their fruits ye shall know them," and it holds in the spiritual sphere with all the force of a natural law, that "whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." If, therefore, the outcome of our domestic life is seen so largely in consistent Christian conduct, and in an almost universal recognition of a rising tide of spiritual life among the young, then we infer there must be wholesome religious influences in most of our homes, even though they should exist more in the spirit of devotion than in its outward act, and more in a winsome example than in formal instruction. While we deplore the comparative rarity of family worship, and would leave nothing undone to quicken our people's consciences in this regard, yet there is very much in the home life of our people for which we may well bless God. Even the family altar is by no means falling into desuctude, but is gradually, we think, becoming more potential and prevalent. Sydney says, "the reports concerning religious life in the family are generally more than encouraging." The Sessions of INVERNESS "are unanimous in the statement that family worship is generally observed morning and evening." Mont-REAL says the reports speak on this "generally in a disappointing tone," and refers to the suggestion of one Session that the General Assembly should be approached with the view of preparing a manual of devotion for use at family worship. Hamilton reports that "only in a few cases are answers given that reveal a satisfactory state of things, or any improvement;" and sums up the subject thus: "The discharge of parental duties, and the cultivation of religious life in the family call for our serious consideration. Parents woefully neglect their duty, and religion in the family is at a low ebb, if these reports are correct. Time occupied in dealing with this vital aspect of our work would be well spent." Huron says, "The honest ring about the answers may be judged from their general sadness in tone," though even that Presbytery can make some very precious and cheering quotations. Maitland reports a "deepening sense of parental responsi-

bility, an increasing desire for its faithful discharge, and hence a consequent growing observance of the divinely recognized means of grace." WINSIPEG speaks cheerfully and says, "We have reasons to hope our people are changing for the better in these matters." REGINA has a congregation reporting morning and evening worship as established in almost every family. And so the reports run, with many a friendly sunbeam amid the general gloom, many a single rose upon a heath where thistles and thorns abound. Kamloors strikes a sad note here, it says, "as regards the cultivation of religious life, all, with exceptional households, seem wrapt in impenetrable gloom." And yet we are encouraged to believe from these reports as a whole that the gloom is being slowly dispersed, and that the light that beams from Zion Hill is more and more illumining our home life, carrying with it the promise of that time when God "instead of the fathers shall take the children and make them princes in all the earth." It is evident from many of the replies, as Kingston remarks, "that, despite unfavorable circumstances, the pressure of business, or the claims of pleasure, it is perfectly possible to have the home manifestly the dwelling of the righteous, with every member of the family a willing worshipper at the altar; and what is possible should be striven for till it becomes actual."

#### 4.-ANY KINDRED SUBJECTS SUGGESTED BY YOUR OWN EXPERIENCE AND CIRCUMSTANCES,

Very little has been reported under this head. BARRIE fully endorses the reports of single Sessions, one of which says "the financial depression has affected the congregation more or less in its work," another that "the Presbytery should hold meetings in all our congregations for the purpose of deepening spiritual life," and a third that "the excitement of modern sports and entertainments has an injurious effect on spiritual interests; and that keen competition in business and politics puts a premium on unbrotherliness, deceit and dishonesty." One London minister "holds regular meetings with the young people of the congregation for the study of the Confession of Faith, including the Larger and Shorter Catechisms." A KINGSTON minister speaks under this head of the great benefits accruing from the systematic visitation of the flock by elders, and says "the duty fulfilled in a kindly spirit would be a powerful factor in furthering Church Life and Work." A Paris Session says "The multiplicity of public and religious meetings is destroying family life," while another notes a startling combination of adverse powers to be fought against when it says, "card parties and a lottery in one place, and 'holiness' in the same place, have been the drawback to our work." A SARNIA Session says it "is much encouraged by the results of cottage prayer meetings conducted by elders." And a Toronto Session says here "The ninth commandment is largely broken; and it is leading to social separation, political degradation and Christian isolation."

#### II.-THE HELPFULNESS OF SABRATH SCHOOLS AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

Here again we have much information of a heart-gladdening kind. The wholesome and helpful influences of our Sabbath Schools, and Young People's Societies, are invariably spoken of in terms of highest commendation, and the value of their work gladly conceded. As other Committees will deal with these important elements of Church Life and Work, and present their condition and doings to the Assembly, this Committee needs but to touch lightly on those points that are most vitally related to the spiritual life of our people.

The Sessions were asked in what ways the Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies have been helpful during the past year in bringing the young to Christ, and in quickening the spiritual life of the congregation. Your Committee thought that by putting the qestion in this form, Sessions, in answering it, would be compelled to reflect carefully on Sabbath School and Christian Endeavor work in all its bearings and in-

At all events it was not prepared for the charge of heresy implied in the KINGS-After giving a long and precious list of good things accomplished by these agencies-a list of the very things we deem "helpful" both in bringing the young to Christ and in increasing their loyalty to Him-the report adds: "The end, however, of such institutions seems, according to the question, to be something different and higher, namely, to bring to Christ, and in one reply we seem to have the exact answer desired-'A few from the Sabbath school have become Christians and joined the Church.' Such questions and answers are greatly to be regretted, for they, perhaps unintentionally, but none the less really, establish a doctrine regarding the relation of our children to Christ which both the Scriptures and the Standards of our Church repudiate." Your Committee finds in this passage "some things hard to be understood," for surely it cannot mean that the glorious work of "bringing the young to Christ' is so alien to the scope and functions of our Sabbath school workers, that even to ask if they have been "helpful" in doing so, is to incur the charge of "establishing" a heresy. Except for the word "few" in the condemned answer above, we should regard it as worthy to be written in letters of gold. The goal before every true Sabbath school teacher is Christ for all his uncon verted pupils, and greater likeness to Christ for all the rest. And as soon as they "become Christians "the duty of a public confession should be wisely and tenderly urged.

The noble work done by those agencies, and especially by the Sabbath school, is attested by a great cloud of witnesses. TRURO says: "The young in this way become better acquainted with the Word of God and the Plan of Salvation; most of those received into the full communion of the Church come from their ranks." The Presbytery of LANARK and RENFREW, in its summary of those "helpful ways," may be regarded as fittingly voicing the conclusions of not less than forty other Presbyteries: " The ways in which Sabbath schools and Young People's Societies have been most helpful may be summed up under the following heads-faithful and systematic study of God's Word; deepening sense of responsibility; personal dealing; exerting influence in inducing others to attend service; the cultivation of the missionary spirit; visiting the sick; friendliness to strangers; pastors have been greatly helped; the spiritual life of the congregation increased; while many through these agencies have been turned to a more serious view of things." Guelph Sessions speak warmly of "personal dealing" and unite in thanking God "for the interest the Sabbath school teachers, and members of our Young People's Societies have shown in such hand-to-hand work." Toronto says "The teaching in many of the Sabbath schools is of a very definite character, and has resulted in leading many young souls to Christ."

There is practically a unanimity of sentiment in Presbyterial reports when speaking of Sabbath schools. With regard to the Christian Endeavor the praise bestowed, though generally profuse and cordial, is not invariably so. A Paris Session says: "We have not found our Young People's Society so helpful during the past year as the Bible Classes we held, the system of Bible study in it is not edifying." One or two others speak cautiously or even doubtfully of the Christian Endeavor, but the vast majority represent its work as specially helpful and inspiring. St. John speaks enthusiastically of the Christian Endeavor movement, and says "The gathering together of the young people under proper conditions and efficient organization must be the means of incalculable good."

III.-THE HOLY SPIRIT'S PRESENCE AND POWER: SPECIAL MEANS.

The inquiry here was for "marked" manifestations of the Spirit's presence and power. For we are well aware that even the lowest measure of Christian life and activity is to be ascribed to His gracious agency. The reports abound in statements that the Holy Spirit's presence is enjoyed in our churches in connection with the ordinary means of

grace, though not often are " marked " manifestations acknowledged. But why should we not look for distinct and fruitful baptisms of His grace and power? As Kingston says: "Is it that God the Holy Ghost is not clearly recognized, supremely exalted, intelligently, reverently worshipped? Is it that our methods of working are hindering the revelation of His presence and the output of His power?" The subject is one vitally important to the life and work of the Church, and claims the earnest attention of all who desire more signal success and a more radiant joy in the work of the Lord. a Session in Hamilton Presbytery we say in regard to these "marked manifestations," 44 We don't really look for such," there we cannot believingly pray for them, and according to our faith so shall it be unto us." But if we read these reports aright there is not that spirit of contentment with present attainments that such language implies. There is a yearning for better things, which in many cases is not only a prophecy of their advent, but an instalment of the fuller blessing that is on the way. That richer blessing, we cannot doubt, will come in answer to the earnest cry of God's people, when they shall come under the control of new influences, and when Christian work will be no longer a burden, but a joy, assumed with a glad enthusiasm and clothed with a new sacredness and sublin ity.

Truro says the reports nearly all speak of "a more than usual hungering after righteousness, and an experimental knowledge of divine truth. While there has been nothing among our people during the year, of the storm, or the whirlwind, or the fire, there has been much listening to the still small voice that heals and soothes and leads multitudes to sit at Jesus' feet, and then to arise, in the spirit of a new consecration, to fight in His name the good fight of faith." This adequately portrays the sentiments of a large majority of our Presbyteries, and may be regarded as not unfairly representing our Church as a whole. Hundreds of Sessions have made cheering references to cases illustrating the soul-saving power of the Gospel, large accessions to the membership, widespread harmony, and increased liberality. These manifestations of the Spirit's presence may not be regarded as "marked," yet they are both prized and precious, and we may, with Guelph, "return thanks to our Heavenly Father that He has honored the work of our Church in such measure during the past year."

Sydney says that seven of their congregations "have had times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord," and speaks of evangelistic services in Sydney town as so blessed of God that "they will for long make the last months of 1896 remarkable." Pictou also has seven congregations that are able to answer this question in the affirmative, and they report "larger accessions to the fellowship of the Church than usual, an inflow of larger, fuller life into all the channels of church life and activity." These Presbyteries, while honor ing the ordinary means of grace, and relying on these for success, have no hesitation in acknowledging that God also uses extraordinary means and special agents for the good of His Church and the glory of His name. WALLAGE reports three Sessions that have held special services and these have been fruitful in the "conversion of sinners and the edification of saints." Miramichi also has one congregation that ever since certain special services has been enjoying a kind of "prolonged spiritual festival." Quenec reports good results from special services during week of prayer, and Montreal speaks of cases of "special services that were attended with good results." OTTAWA has one congregation that "during the year had marked evidence of the Holy Spirit's presence," and another "that received into the fellowship of the Church at one time fifty-two on profession of faith." OWEN SOUND reports special services in several congregations with "gratifying results." Melita records some interesting cases of conversion of men far advanced in SAUGEEN had some cheering testimony on this point. Several congregations have enjoyed special blessing, and some report that marked manifestations of the Spirit's pres Tore bapt

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These quotations reflect the sentiments of many other reports, and while in a large majority of our congregations there seem to be no "marked" spiritual features to relate, yet nearly all can say, with VICTORIA, "while we have not the occasion to rejoice in pentegostal days we still rejoice in the Spirit's abiding presence."

The ordinary means of grace—public worship, prayer-meeting, visitation by pastor and elders, and private religious conversation—have been relied on for success, and many of the best results recorded have sprung from their faithful use. Still there must be nearly a hundred of our congregations in which special services were held, and as far as our reports can guide us, most of them have reaped a harvest blessed and bountiful.

IV. -THE CHIEF HINDRANCES TO HIGHER SUCCESS, AND HOW TO OVERCOME THEM.

No question is more fully answered than this, though there is naturally a good deal of similarity in the replies. Whither has four Sessions that make no reply, and some other Presbyteries report one or two similar cases. Mainland has one that says, "There are no hindrances," and Guelph has one that distinctly states that it has no special hindrance. Your Committee hopes that such reports really indicate superior spiritual attainments, and not the lack of spiritual discernment or aspiration

It may suffice to mention a few of the hindrances that are most frequently referred to as hurtful to the progress of the Gospel. There are a few mentioned that arise from external circumstances, and that do not involve the moral element, as the isolated condition of the people in country charges, distance from church, bad roads, frequent storms. This class of hindrances has not been taken much account of, and reference to them comes chiefly from Wallace Presbytery. The moral and spiritual hindrances are, however, exceedingly formidable, and may be regarded under two classes.

External Hindrances.—Those forces that antagonize the Church in her aggressive work. As examples of those mentioned, we give the following: Intemperance, irreverence, indifference, unbelief, love of pleasure, Sabbath driving and cycling, rum-selling, dancing, levity, Sabbath excursions, impure literature, theatre-going, card-playing. This list might be indefinitely lengthened, but what is noted may well suggest the necessity of carnest prayer and ardent struggle. These forces of evil never pause. Satan never calls a trace. Scenes of wicked pleasure and haunts of vice never close. And surely we may expect that Christians who believe in judgment to come, in hell with its endless night, in the loss of the Christless and impenitent, will neither be indifferent nor pitiless, but full of zeal to rescue the perishing. And yet, according to the information furnished, by far the most serious obstacles in the path of progress are:

The Internal Hindrances.—Those that exist in the bosom of the Church, and lurk in the hearts of many of God's professing people. Of these also we can give only examples, since their name is Legion: The worldly spirit, spiritual pride, spiritual apathy, superficial views of sin, formality, reading hurtful books that often sneer at fundamental gospel truths, love of ease, love of money, love of display, jealousy, want of aggressiveness among church members, satisfaction with mere financial prosperity and numerical strength, the increasing relentless intrusion of worldly business and amusements, ignorant and arrogant criticism of men, means and doctrines used for the spiritual improvement of humanity, failure of parents in teaching their children to seek Christ early, love of questionable amusements, moderate drinking on the part of Church members. These must be regarded as samples of the multiform hindrances that exist within the Church and that sadly cripple her power for good. They are a hateful

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brood, but they form no argument against the religion and Church of Christ, as many of our adversaries contend. They rather furnish a proof that the Church has a divine vitality. For what but a divine organization could carry such dead weight? And yet in spite of the fact that so many money-loving, fashion-worshipping, theatre-going, card-playing, Sabbath-visiting Christians enter the Church and try to drag the world after them, the Church still lives, and spreads, and gathers in the elect of God. If church members were all alike, as our enemies often insinuate, can they tell us how the church exists at all, and how in so goodly a degree it reflects "the beauty of the Lord our God"?

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To overcome these hindrances there is no suggestion either to change our methods or to adopt other weapons. But there seems to be the breathing of a general and ardent desire that our work should be prosecuted with a more glowing zeal, with a firmer faith in the power of God's truth, and in more absolute and prayerful dependence on the power of the Holy Spirit. The provisions of grace are ample, and we must pray for its fullest power and sway. The omnipotent aid of the Holy Spirit is freely offered, and when seized by the Church to the fullest possible extent, her working power will be increased beyond all human measurements.

#### V .- THE DEVELOPMENT OF SYSTEMATIC AND ADEQUATE GIVING.

1. As to the means employed to stimulate and regulate this noble Christian grace, almost nothing new is noted. The ordinary revenue of our congregations is obtained largely by the weekly envelope system, and by open collections at Sabbath services. An occasional glimpse is got of the periodical collector; and the subscription list in rural congregations is not yet an obsolete document. But we seem to have almost seen the last of what Maitland calls "the pew rent barbarism." It has fallen into disuse, and its place taken by more modern methods. Hard times are occasionally referred to by way of apology for diminished contributions. But probably the frank admission of Bruce has a wide application -- "The lack of liberality is due to want of faith in God's promises and complete dedication to Him." Peterborough formulates a list of means employed to foster liberality that covers much of the ground taken by nearly all the Presbyteries:— "Presentation of the truth in God's word; teaching that it is an act of worship most sacred and joyous; by monthly references in our services to our mission fields; by missionary sermons every quarter; by giving full information of the great work we are called to perform, and the grand opportunities which God places before us. MIRAMICHI has a Session that distributed one hundred booklets on "What we Owe and how to Pay it." A Brockville Session would teach that "giving is a God-established condition of sanctification," and the Presbytery itself has great faith in "presenting the need in a straightforward manner," while Kingston, on the other hand, has Sessions that report among their hindrances to higher success "the many vexatious importunities from Church Committees," and the "constant, persistent appeals for money." Pictou has one congregation, alleged to be the only one of the kind in the Synod, that practises the purely voluntary system both for ordinary revenue and for the Schemes. The Session says: "The plan has been practised for fifty years and never failed," and the "resbytery adds this testimony: "The splendid results achieved by this plan are its best recommendation." BARRIE thinks it worthy of note that "the congregations that report progress are those in which the pulpit is used most freely in bringing the claims of missions before the people." Regina says: "Among the means employed socials are resorted to but are not recommended." We should hope not; for the inquiry is regarding means used "to cultivate the grace of liberality," and no means less likely to evoke that grace could be devised than those REGINA declines to countenance. On the whole there is improvement. as many of ine vitality, spite of the g, Sabbaththe Church are all alike, and how in

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More systematic methods are being employed; fuller unfolding of the Church's needs, and more urgent appeals on the loftier ground of Christian obligation and privilege.

- 2. The reports indicate a corresponding progress in the direction of systematic and adequate giving. Pictou reports "cheering progress" in this respect, "a slow and steady movement toward the giving of a tenth," that goal having been already reached by several families. Lindsay, Owen Sound, Maitland, Hamilton, Chatham, Calgary, Victoria, and several other Presbyteries report progress in the same direction. Kingston, while not shewing much advance on the whole, has some progressive congregations. One says: "This year quite a number have given more than a tenth of their incomes towards the church alone," and another says: "Several heads of families comfortably off have been persuaded to tithe their income, and their giving is out of all proportion with what it used to be, and which was considered generous."
- 3. The young people in the Sabbath schools and C. E. Societies are being trained to give. The testimony on this point is all but universal, and often very emphatic. Great hopes springing from this fact are cherished by our Ministers and Christian people. There is great need for improvement. It is to be feared we fall far short of the ancient Jew, as to the liberality of our gifts to Christ's cause, and probably we come still further short of the Christian ideal—giving "as God has prospered us." If the confession and resolve of a Session in Paris Presbytery could be sincerely adopted by the whole Church as expressive of her mental and spiritual attitude on this question, it would light up the future with a ray of genuine hope. "We are conscious that we have been woefully defective in the grace of liberality, but we begin the year with the determination that by God's grace there will be a better record read in the future." It is not the lack of wealth even though the times are hard. Should a deep sense of obligation to Christ seize hold of our people, resulting in a nobler consecration, then would the flinty rock of our selfishness be smitten, and rivers of beneficence would gush forth, making glad the desert and carrying the Water of Life to millions of dying men.

#### VI. -THE SABBATH QUESTION.

The Sessions were allowed a free hand in giving their views on this intensely important theme. They were asked to state fully the local conditions with respect to the main features of the Sabbath question. The replies have often, as was intended, a local coloring, and furnish information regarding many ways in which the law of the Sabbath is violated, its sacred hours profaned, and its beneficent purpose to a large extent frustrated. There is, however, no evidence in the reports of any retrogressive tendency within the Church. On the contrary, there seems to be a greater determination than ever on the part of Christian people to uphold the sanctity of the Lord's Day. This in itself is exceedingly gratifying, and should inspire us with courage in the struggle now being waged. For there are undoubtedly tremendous forces arrayed against us on this question. The railway, steamboat and street car companies, for the most part, labor to obliterate all distinction between the Sabbath and ordinary week days, so far as their traffic is concerned. The railways in certain parts of the Dominion make little distinction now, and where steamboats and street cars have the power the distinction is usually emphasized by a vastly increased business on the Sabbath. It is, indeed, this larger volume of business that incites the cupidity of these corporations and inspires their persistent efforts to deprive the laborer of his rightful rest and his religious privileges. The result of tampering with the Divine law of the Sabbath would be the toning down of public sentiment on the subject, and perhaps the lowering of the Church's testimony. The eye and ear would become accustomed to the sights and sounds of labor and worldly pleasure; the worldly spirit would become more defiant and the Christian conscience more accommodating, until we should have a genuine continental Sabbath, with all the physical, social and moral evils of which it is the fruitful source.

Toronto has been the storm centre of the struggle for a quiet Sabbath during the past year. A remarkably able and effective campaign has been conducted by the friends of the Sabbath, in which many ministers and members of our Church have borne a conspicuous part. A delegation of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance, with distinguished ministers and laymen from all the Churches, waited on the Ontario Government asking for such amendments to the Lord's Day Act as would ensure the fulfilment of its original design, and such, too, as would prohibit the running of street cars on the Sabbath, and make the penalties of the Act apply to corporations as well as to individuals. An earnest protest was entered against local option in such a matter, as it is a question equally and vitally affecting the whole Province. One result of this was an amendment to the Ontario Lord's Day Act, introduced by the Government, whereby it was enacted that no Street Car Company, or Tramway, or Electric Railway Company, should run on the Lord's Day, saving certain special exceptions, which are neither numerous nor far reaching.

Whatever be the outcome of these efforts to make our present Sabbath law more luminous and effective it is quite clear from these reports that our Church neither designs nor desires to trust unduly to legal measures, or to any pains and penalties that might vex and offend the characteristic and essential spirit of the Christian religion. The uplifting power of the Gospel can alone be trusted to bring men into sympathy with, or any true appreciation of, the divine wisdom so plainly seen in the Fourth Commandment.

Though Presbytery reports speak cheerfully, as a rule, on this theme, yet nearly all cite forms of Sabbath desecration, more or less flagrant, prevalent within their bounds. The following are those most frequently referred to: Visiting, driving, bicycling, Sabbath excursions, late hours on Saturday night, inspection of grain and stock in rural districts, driving to the lake, parades of fraternal societies, pic-nics, miners and smeltermen working, band concerts, novel reading, barber shops open, boating, hunting and fishing. In some Presbyteries, as in Brandon, "the Seventh Day Adventists and the bullennial Dawnists have a pernicious influence." In a larger number the day is seriously disturbed by railway traffic, and a multitude of men are thus robbed of their religious privileges. A few Presbyteries report the railways as growing more audacious in this respect, and KINGSTON says the increase of freight trains on the Sabbath, during the year, on the Grand Trunk Railway, demands "serious attention and prompt action." BROCKVILLE reports that evils, such as the unnecessary traffic on railways and steamboat lines, " are flaunted in the face of Christian sentiment." LANARK and RENFREW speaks of the Sabbath violation near a summer resort as "increasingly worse." SARNIA has a Session declaring that "strict Saboath observance is a thing of the past," while, on the other hand, ROCK LAKE notes that "even Sabbath visiting is a thing of the past." In some Presbyteries, as Bruce, the German element, by their lax views, is causing much anxiety; and wherever Roman Catholic people abound, their habit of spending the greater part of the Sabbath as a holiday is exerting an injurious effect. Westminster says that Sabbath excursions by steamboat to dancing-booths and by railways to skating grounds and Sabbath concerts, called sacred, are telling powerfully for evil. Hamilton has had street cars running on the Lord's Day for over two years, also the suburban electric railway and the "boat." One of the city Sessions says that "business men, some prominent in our churches, are making gain thereby, and many Christians think it no harm, when it suits their convenience, to patronize this form of traffic. These forms of desecration are affecting the attendance at Sabbath school and also somewhat the regular services."

There is a reasonableness and moderation in the tone of the reports when referring to railway and steamboat traffic, by which through traffic and all necessary work connected

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with it are distinguished from the more gratuitous forms of desecration which could easily be obviated, and which have their roots in mere greed of gain. In this connection we may note that, according to Petersorough report, "no Sabbath work is done under the Trent Valley control." The great bulk of the reports have but little flagrant violation to complain of, and are almost a unit in exonerating our own members and adherents, except as to the mildest forms, and, in a few cases, where positions can be held only by consenting to Sabbath labor. Many are the earnest resolves expressed in these reports by our ministers and elders, to contend earnestly for the sanctity of the Lord's Day against the secularizing spirit and ruthless forces that are arrayed against it.

#### VII.- TEMPERANCE WORK IN THE CHURCH AND COMMUNITY.

1. The reports on this question are practically unanimous in recording decided progress, both as to habits of sobriety and a sentiment in favor of legal prohibition. In many Presbyteries a very manifest improvement is noted in the attitude of our people, and of society in general, to the liquor traffic and the drinking customs. There is indeed a long list of evils mentioned as resulting from the use of strong drink, and nearly every Presbytery has occasion to bewail the prevalence of some of them. Even in districts covered by the Scott Act, as in several Presbyteries of the Maritime Synod, many of these evils are felt, though in a modified degree. True, as BARRIE says, "the disastrous results cannot be stated in words," yet words are our most common method of expressing thought, and questions our best means of eliciting information. The black list includes the following: Drunkenness, profanity, vice, poverty, squalor, misery, spiritual indifference, irreligion, domestic woe, the wreck of promising lives, ignorance, taxation of industrious people, loss of moral principle, crime, searing of conscience, paralysis of trade, destruction of manhood, Sabbath breaking, loss of time, money and character, ruining young men, unpaid bills, gambling, tighting, suicide, death. These by no means exhaust the catalogue of evils, but they suffice to tell us how formidable is the foe. They might well inspire us, too, with increased zeal to rescue the victims, and with a more intense hostility to a traffic of which these are the inevitable fruits.

Yet your Committee rejoices to report that the tendency is decidedly upward, and that the long process of education, and especially the power of Christian truth, are beginning to exert a beneficent influence. Perhaps the loftiest note in this chorus of glad voices is struck by Kingston. That Presbytery characterizes the Session reports on this topic as "wonderful, 'and illustrates its meaning by copious quotations, all showing a marked decrease in the evils of intemperance, and some speaking of their virtual disappearance, especially in rural districts. "The liquor traffic is almost nil in our locality," "a drunk man is rarely, in fact, never, seen within the bounds of our parish," etc. Algoma thinks, from the tenor of the reports, that soon those wretched homes with their cheerless poverty "will be seen no more." Orangeville reports these evils to be "on the decline, almost over the entire Presbytery." OTTAWA says, less liquor is used now than in former years, and the temperance sentiment is growing. Hamilton says: "In some communities few evil effects of the traffic are evident." HALIFAX: "The reports on temperance are most encouraging," and some of its Sessions report "no liquor sold within a radius of thirty miles." Guelph says: "Five Sessions report no hotel within the bounds, and consequently no evil results." Pictou admits illicit selling, with the ruin of young men and boys, in towns; but says the evils are very limited in rural districts. Many similar references might be made, but these show the general upward tendency. But it is not time yet to "rest and be thankful," for, as BROCKVILLE observes, "in spite of our boasted progress in temperance sentiment, there is great need of faithful work in the matter of teaching and training the young in the principles of total abstinence."

2. There are hundreds of organizations of various kinds for the promotion of temperance and for educating the people up to the point of total prohibition. The W. C. T. U., Bands of Hope, Sons of Temperance, Royal Templars, and I. O. G. T. are the societies most in evidence. They are doubtless doing a good work in promoting temperance sentiment. Many of the Sabbath schools and C. E. Societies are organized for aggressive Temperance work. Our ministers and elders are faithful, and are bearing a telling testimony. Indeed these reports make the fact more and more evident that the Church is doing the most effective work in promoting the cause of Temperance, and is God's elect agency for the uplifting of men. Other organizations are clothed with most power when wielded within the Church, and as part of her equipment for vanquishing the powers of evil. The argument that remains ever invincible is the grand Christian principle of selfsacritice for the good of others. We might well lese heart, in this or any good cause, unless we have the conviction that the whole genius and uplifting power of the gospel is beaund the movement. But with this assurance nothing can discourage. When reverses come the loyal hearted only cling to the cause with a fonder affection, assured that a movement so pregnant with great moral issues must in due time reach its fitting coronation.

3. Preparations for the Plebiscite in the line of an educational campaign were not, when Sessions reported, in an advanced stage. Paris reports some united meetings in churches to prepare for the Plebiscite. In Halifax four congregations had made preparations. In Guelph city a series of sermons and prayer services, bearing specially on the subject, had been arranged. A county organization for this subject had been formed in Cape Breton. In Glengarry "some public meetings had been held and literature distributed." In many other Presbyteries, such as Pictou, Miramichi, Peterborough, Maitland, Stratford, Chatham, Portage la Prairie and Brandon, beginnings had been made. Many are waiting for the Government to name the date, when a short, sharp and decisive campaign is promised.

Your Committee would earnestly urge our people not to unduly postpone preparations, and not to esteem too lightly the foe we have to face. There is danger of expecting an easy victory in the coming contest, arising from past plebiscite majorities. But the a wful energy and unscrupulous character of the liquor traffic will be brought out on this occasion as never before. Let this be matched by the sublimest effort the Church and all good people have ever made to overthrow this giant evil. The Hon. Sidney Fisher, the present Dominion Minister of Agriculture, said in a recent address: "The temperance people of this country must not suppose that they are going to have a walk over in connection with the forthcoming plebiscite; on the contrary, it will be the hardest battle of their life. It will be war to the death." But victory is sure to reward faithful effort, and then a more favorable state of things will be inaugurated than we have hitherto seen. National prohibition, and not provincial, is the true goal, as far as legal suasion is concerned. The enacting and enforcing powers will then be identical. Public sentiment will not support a system of espionage, but it will support, and even applaud, the proper officials in carrying out the sternest enactment our Government can frame. Dominion prohibition will meet the case as no partial or patchy enactments ever could. It does not perpetuate the treason to humanity involved in turning over the crowded cities to the liquor power which so largely controls them, but it utilizes the comparatively pure rural communities to level up to the salvable point the rum-ridden centres.

The Assembly's "plan of work" has, during the year, remained in charge of Rev. D. Stiles Fraser, who is willing to continue the good work. He has still in stock three thousand pledge cards, three hundred pledge books and about four thousand five hundred manuals. The "Plan" is comfortably self-sustaining, and a small credit balance is reported. Mr. Fraser's report is as follows:

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#### "PLAN OF WORK."

"The 'Plan of Work has extended to an encouraging degree during the year. Altogether, since its organization, about twenty thousand Pledge Cards and about eight hundred Pledge Books have been sold. The Plan has been adopted by a goodly number of Sabbath schools and Christian Endeavour Societies, and by its means nearly twenty thousand children and young people have been pledged to Total Abstinence in connection with Christian instruction. In many congregations, besides, many thousands more are pledged in outside organizations, such as Bands of Hope and other juvenile societies. Thus the work of training up a generation of Total Abstainers goes gradually but steadily on. In this movement lies much of the hope for the future success of the Temperance Reform, for it strikes at the two great roots of the liquor traffic—the Power of Appetite and the Power of Custom. Let these two roots be destroyed, and it is easy to see that such questions as the Power of Money, Vested Rights, and the Revenue, must settle themselves; for with a generation of total abstainers the liquor traffic will die for lack of customers, and there will spring up a society that will know nothing of the drinking customs that still have so strong a hold on the social life of many people in many places.

"Our Church has done much to encourage the Total Abstinence Movement, without which we could have but little hopes of success, by placing its stamp of approval upon it, as has been done by the adoption of the 'Plan of Work.' Very many sentences of appreciation from those who have tried it could be given, but space will be claimed for only one: 'I think the Manual,' which fully explains the Plan of Work, 'is complete; just the thing we need to bring Temperance work in most effectual form before our people.'

"It is not intended that any less work is needed along other lines, but that, in order to obtain the best results along other lines, more must be faithfully done along this line. Here, then, is a work, a foundation work, easily within the reach of the humblest, and, at the same time, too important to be overlooked by the most advanced S. S. or C. E. worker.

"The 'Plan of Work' will continue in charge of Rev. D. Stiles Fraser, Upper Stricke, N. S., from whom samples of 'Manuals,' Pledge Cards, etc., can be obtained free on application."

#### SYNOPSIS OF SYNODICAL REPORTS.

Since the preceding pages were in print, reports have been received from the following Synods: British Columbia, Toronto and Kingston, Montreal and Quebec. The only other Synod that meets in the Spring season is that of Hamilton and London. It had no Committee on Church Life and Work during the past year, and consequently no report. A committee on the subject was appointed at its last meeting, so that all the Synods are now fully organized for this work.

As all the more important recommendations suggested by these Synods are virtually embodied in those presented by your own Committee, it only remains to give a brief synopsis of other salient features of the reports.

#### SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Synod's attention is called to some encouraging features—as the goodly response made by Sessions and Presbyteries in furnishing information from the Congregations and Mission Stations; and the encouraging character of this information in regard to the moral and spiritual life of the members and adherents. Though the Synod is less optimits in its utterances than any other, yet it speaks of a deepening interest in spiritual things as

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Rev. D. k three undred .nce is evidence I in many places by greater activity in Christian work, and an ever-increasing number of young men at the Sabbath services.

The Report calls attention to the sad neglect of family religion, and quotes with approval suggestions regarding a "curfew bell" for towns and cities, believing this would certainly prevent children becoming acquainted with many forms of vice and crime. The Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies are highly praised for the blessed work they are doing, and cases are mentioned of children having brought their parents to a saving knowledge of the Goppel. It is stated also that "the Young People's Societies are drawing more closely under the sheltering wing of the Church," and that the whole work among the young is of the most hopeful character.

To combat the many hindrances to higher success, pastors are called on to show a more kindly spirit, to encourage healthy and helpful amusements, distribute good literature, and culist members in practical Christian work, using for these ends press, platform and pulpit.

In the newer districts little effort has been made to develop systematic giving, but the stirring addresses of Dr. Robertson on Home Missions, and the visit of Dr. McLaren and Mr. McKay, in the interests of Foreign Missions, are referred to as very helpful in this direction.

The Provincial Subbath law is complained of as inadequate, and it is suggested that a strong potition, signed by all the churches, be presented asking over a better enactment. The liquor traffic is condemned in the strongest terms, and a vigorous indictment made against it as the author of a fearful amount of crime and week.

#### SYNOD OF TORONTO AND K: GSTON,

This Synod makes generous reference to the high character of the Presbytery reports, and would be glid to see them all printed in full for the public benefit. The large attendance on public ordinances is joyfully acknowledged, "especially when we consider the non-church-going habits that so largely obtain in some parts of the continent." But it is sorrowfully admitted that the week-evening meetings would indicate that "the congregational life throughout the Synod is not all that it ought to be."

The report mentions some "healthful indications of spiritual life," which are glully accepted on the Saviour's own principle that "by their fruits ye shall know them." It regards one of the Presbytery reports as doing substantial justice all round, when it says: "Everyone agrees that the morality of our people, both in social and commercial life, is high; no one ventures to say their spirituality is striking." Its estimate of family life coincides with that already given for the whole Church, and is illustrated by some of the same quotations. It thinks the state of affairs "suggests grave danger to the Church, and calls for deep humiliation, wrestling prayer, and more earnest, persistent effort to secure a revival of religion in the home, for it is the very citadel of the Church."

Throughout the Synod there have been such gracious manifestations of the Spirit's presence and power as call for deep gratitude; and the report suggests a gospel faithfully preached and practised, more earnest and believing prayer, more whole-hearted consecration, as the most effectual means of overcoming hindrances to higher success. It also calls on the Church to set her face as a flint against the inroads being made on the Christian Sabbath; and concludes by warning all Christian men not to expect a victory for Prohibition, except as the fruit of their intense and earnest struggle during the coming Plebiscite Campaign.

#### SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND QUEBEC.

This Report speaks of the abundant material sent from Presbyteries this year, as compared with the comparative scarcity last year. From the satisfactory attendance on

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s year, as ndance on public worship noted by most Sossions, the conclusion is reached that the pulpit ministrations of our Church are of a high order, and that our people take pleasure in the gates of Zion.

The week-evening meetings are not attended as they should be, and the multiplicity of social and secular meetings is given as one reason. As to the deepening of spiritual life, the report says: "The Synod will be pleased to learn that the very purpose for which the Church was organized and its ordinances maintained, namely, the planting, the preserving and the perfecting of spiritual life in the soul is being realized in a large degree."

To partially remedy the admittedly low condition of religious life in the family, it is suggested "that young people be taught to lead in prayer in their several societies; then, should they subsequently become heads of families, they will find it easy to lead the devotions of the home." Also that "the General Assembly be approached with a view of preparing a Manual of Devotion for use at family worship." The report also speaks enthusiastically of the work among the young, "the cultivating of the missionary spirit; contributions to the schemes of the Church; bringing many young people to Christ; visiting the sick, and brightening the lives of many an invalid."

Systematic giving if spoken of hopefully, as being on the increase. A larger number than before are reported as giving one-tenth. Still, "there can be no doubt that the wealthier portions of our people could easily make an advance without exercising any great self-denial."

The Lord's Day is well observed by our people as a whole, but great vigilance is urged in seeking to preserve its blessings intact. The report speaks, too, of the overwhelming evidence that the liquor traffic is still a gigantic evil in our land, and calls on the Church to do battle with it, using as her main instrument the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God.

The Synod concludes its report with a series of recommendations, nearly all of which had already found expression in those which are now submitted to the Assembly.

#### CONCLUDING REMARKS.

However imperfect may be the sketch your Committee has been enabled to give we yet believe it may convey to this venerable Court a fairly accurate idea of the moral and spiritual life of our people as reflected in the various phases of Church Life and Activity dealt with in these reports. While in the face of the information disclosed no intelligent man can be a pessimist, yet there is much to awaken religious solicitude and call forth the most earnest and prayerful efforts of Christian people. What the Church needs is a rich and gracious baptism of the Holy Spirit. We are grateful, we trust, for the increasing throngs that gather together for public worship on the Lord's Day, and for the comparatively high plane of public morality on which, as a whole, our people live, Nor do we doubt but that these things should be taken as an evidence to some extent of the Spirit's presence and power; and yet there may be a certain amount of the merely mechanical in our worship and in our outward lives. What we must have is the Holy Spirit's ind. elling grace. Those questions that probe most deeply, with a view to get at the hidden springs of the Church's life, are not those that have been answered with the most joyous satisfaction. This is sought to be accounted for by the inherent difficulty of formulating spiritual results. But after due allowance is made for this, your Committee fears the results are not stated, because they had not been in any satisfying measure produced. Those sessions that really had a deepening of spiritual life to note, or marked spiritual movements to record, seemed to have had their tongues loosened as they bear glad testimony to God's mighty grace. There is only one bosom from which the Church's nourishment can be drawn; and when she realizes that all her well-springs are in God, and hangs in helpless dependence on His Blessed Spirit, then will she achieve spiritual victories and effect moral transformations that will adorn individual character, enrich family life and uplift the nation.

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But there are many things for which we may well bless God, and that should make us hopeful and glad. The tendency is decidedly upward, and that fact is, in itself, the pledge of final victory. Our Young People are better organized than ever before, and vastly more energetic and efficient in Christian work. Our people, under the power of moral sussion, are becoming more and more averse to the use of strong drink, and see more and more clearly the national guilt involved in licensing a traffic so fruitful in misery and crime. Our ministers, elders, S. S. teachers and our whole staff of Christian workers are loyal to the Gospel and are doing noble service in the Redeemer's cause. And above all should we be grateful and glad for the noble band of Christian women who, with increasing devotion, are helping on the work in every congregation, and developing a passionate desire to rescue from degradation and death their sisters in heathen lands.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That this Assembly, while gratefully recognizing the Divine blessing that has so evidently rested on the ministers and people of our Church during the past year, enabling them to bear witness to the truth both in life and doctrine, yet feels that a richer baptism of God's Spirit, and a more complete consecration of God's people, are needed before the Church can be clothed with invincible power in rescuing sinful men.

2. That Presbyteries and Sessions be urged anew to bring before all parents and guardians of youth the supreme importance of family religion, and strive to roll away

from professedly Christian homes the reproach of neglected family altars.

3. That Ministers and Elders be earnestly entreated to consider what they can do to make the prayer-meeting more attractive and helpful to the people, so that it may be a greater spiritual force in our Church life.

4. That Preshyteries be strongly recommended to adopt some form of Presbyterial

visitation, with the special design of promoting the spiritual life of the people.

5. That Ministers, Elders, Descora, or Managers, he footionately used to

5. That Ministers, Elders, Deacons, or Managers be affectionately urged to adopt, wherever possible, the Scriptural method of carrying on the Lord's work, namely, by voluntary, systematic, proportionate, weekly offerings.

6. That this Assembly, prizing above all price the Christian Sabbath as a Divine 1 stitution, and as an unspeakable blessing to mankind, both in its bearing on the spiritual n ture and in its benignant aspect toward the sons of toil, would express its deepest sympathy with all the efforts put forth by the Churches, by the Lord's Day Alliance and its Branches, and by all Christian people, to preserve to ourselves and to our children, the precious boon of a quiet and restful Sabbath.

7. That this Assembly would further record its appreciation of the helpful character of recent Ontario legislation on the Sabbath question, and trust it is only the harbinger of other and still more effective safeguards of Sabbath sanctity; and would express its satisfaction with efforts made in the Dominion Parliament to protect from public

violation the sacred day of rest.

8. That while the Assembly rejoices in the growth of Temperance sentiment, it would not less earnestly urge Ministers, Elders, Parents, Sabbath school and Public school Teachers, to spare no effort to instil into the minds of the young Temperance principles, enforced by Scriptural and scientific sanctions; and that total abstinence on high moral and philanthropic grounds be earnestly advocated.

9. That our people are hereby earnestly exhorted to use their utmost endeavours in every lawful way to carry the plebiscite in favour of Prohibition, by an overwhelming majority, and thus free the Church from one of its deadliest foes, our land from untold misery and crime, and our modern civilization from its direct reproach and shame; and further, the Assembly would express the sincere hope that the Dominion Government will submit this question to the electorate at the earliest convenient date, untrammelled by any other political or financial issue.

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### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

#### L-STATISTICS.

#### REV. J. W. RAE, Vice-Convener.

The report this year is believed by your Committee to be, on the whole, quite accurate, and to the faithful work of Presbytery and Synod Conveners your Committee are very much indebted for the satisfactory showing of this year.

Less difficulty has been experienced in obtaining information than formerly, and the objections against either the number or nature of the questions submitted, and which were so common a few years ago, are now no longer made. Not one solitary complaint has been received from any Presbytery, and it is believed that the living touch of your Committee from year to year with the schools of our great Church, has tended to produce this satisfactory condition of things, and to bind the schools in greater loyalty to the Church.

The statistics tabulated below are their own interpreter, and the briefest possible summary will here be made.

There is a gain recorded in every department of our work, and the fact that the totals for 1896 are greater than those of the year preceding, in every column, is probably unprecedented in the history of our Church. This is due to the fact that 222 more schools are this year reported than were last year.

#### 1.—ATTENDANCE.

17,656 teachers and officers have charge of 150,569 scholars, of whom 100,933 are present each Sabbath.

#### 2.—RECITATIONS.

48,908 memorize Scripture, while 60,538 are studying the Shorter Catechism. 3,230 having committed the whole book to memory. 68,550 study their lessons at home, showing the satisfactory increase of 14,108, due, we believe, to the extended use of the Assembly's Home Study series of Lesson Helps. But 247 schools hold teachers' meetings.

#### 3,-Church Relations.

#### 4.—Contributions.

\$75,347 were given by the scholars, of which \$47,703 were expended on the school, to which must be added \$13,144 given by congregations, making \$60,847 in all. The amount contributed to the Schemes of the Church was \$24,265, while in acts of benevolence and for local objects \$7,107 was given.

#### II.—HIGHER RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

#### REV. W. FARQUHARSON, B.A., Vice-Convener.

In this department the work moves on steadily, the number presenting themselves not varying greatly from year to year. A somewhat widening interest is manifested by a greater number of schools taking part in the work, though there is a slight decrease in the number of candidates

enrolled for examination, the total number being 404, as compared with 436 of last year. This decrease, however, is more than counterbalanced by the great increase in the number certified as having correctly recited all the answers to the questions of the Shorter Catechism, the number being 395, as compared with 210 of last year. Of the 404 who wrote in the examination 16 have been awarded medals, 75 prizes and 203 diplomas, making a total of 294 who have honorably passed the examination as compared with 317 of last year.

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#### SYLLABUS FOR 1897.

With regard to the work for the coming year, your Committee recommend very few changes. For the Biblical Department the work is still the International S. S. Lessons, the additional work prescribed for Seniors being "The Life of St. Paul," by Rev. Jas. Stalker, M.A. In the Doctrinal Department the "Shorter Catechism," by Prof. Salmond, D.D., is retained for all grades, the part for the present year being questions 82-107. In the Bible History Department the text-book is still "A Manual of Bible History," by Rev. W. G. Blakie, D.D., LL.D., the portion for the present year being pages 164-266. In the Essay Department the subject for Junior and Intermediate grades will be "The Missionary Journeys of St. Paul," and for Seniors "St. Paul as a Missionary." In the Teacher Training Department the work for the present year is "The Bible the Sabbath School Teacher's Text Book," by Alfred Holborn, M.A. Copies of syllabus, with full particulars, will be sent on application to Rev. W. Farquharson, Claude, Ont.

Appended to this report will be found copies of the papers set at the annual examinations, as well as a list of the successful candidates.

#### III.-PUBLICATIONS.

Children's Day was observed in a much larger number of our Sabbath Schools than in any previous year. An edition of 100,600 copies of the programme of exercises was entirely exhausted. This was an increase of 29,000, or 40 per cent., over last year.

The Scheme of Lessons was prepared as usual and given to all publishers who desired it.

The circulation of our publications has largely increased during the past year, as will be seen from the following table:

The thanks of the Assembly are due to Mr. Geo. H. Archibald, who has continued so efficiently to edit the Primary Department without any remuneration for his valuable services. No less are we indebted to Rev. Prof. Campbell, LL.D., for his analysis and comments upon the book assigned to Sunday School teachers for study during the year. The following have assisted the Convener in the preparation of the lesson notes: Revs. R. H. Abraham, D.Sc., S. Lyle, D.D., A. B. McKay, D.D., J. McMillan, B.D., and W. Moore, D.D., together with another who wishes to remain anonymous, and who writes the "Practical Lessons" for the current month. To all of these the thanks of the Committee of the Church are due for their willing and valuable co-operation.

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### IV. -FINANCE.

The Financial Statement is given with the utmost fulness of detail and will, we believe, afford all the information that will be asked for, so that comment here is unnecessary. Children's Day contributions have risen from \$1,474.12 last year to \$2,208.19, an increase of nearly 50 per cent. A special appeal was made to friends of S. S. work to contribute towards wiping out the deficit of \$5,000 reported to last Assembly. It met with a liberal response wherever a personal canvass was possible, but, as will be seen from the appendix, only a few places were reached in this way. It is intended to repeat this effort in the coming year. There is a large number who take no active part in S. S. work, but who are both able and willing to shew their interest in it by an annual contribution

Last year the liabilities amounted to \$3,916.19 and the assets to \$2,473.75, leaving a deficit of \$1,442.44. This year the liabilities are \$5,356.31 and the assets \$3,486.50, leaving a deficit of \$1,869.81, an increase of \$427.37. This amount will be fully covered by an asset not included in the sum given above, namely, subscriptions continued on the mailing list, but not posted, owing to lack of time, into the ledger.

It will be seen from the report that the business of the committee has more than doubled during the past year, and it has become quite impossible to continue to conduct it as in the past. Moreover, the liabilities have to be met at once as they consist chiefly of loans and promissory notes, amounting together to over \$5,000, which must be paid before Sept. 1st.

In view of the difficulties attending the present management, and the encouraging prospects which they are warranted in entertaining from the favorable tenders received, the committee are convinced that success can only be attained by a more thorough organization of this department of the Church's work, and the removal of the publication to a more advantageous centre.

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# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada:

In this, its second report to the Assembly, the Committee is happy to state that there are now corresponding Committees in all the Synods and Presbyteries, except the Presbyteries of the foreign field, and that the work has been carefully reviewed by all these bodies. This is sure evidence of the Church's interest in its young people, its sympathy with their organizations and its desire to assist them in their endeavors. "As a rule," says the report of the Presbytery of Halifax, "those connected with the Young People's Societies are characterized by anxiety to be good and to do good, and by true loyalty to the ministry and the Church. They deserve the heartiest commendation and encouragement.' This witness is true.

### THE REPORTS FROM PRESBYTERIES

are, with a very few regrettable exceptions, fuller than last year. The fact that, from large Presbyteries, such as Halifax, Toronto, and Hamilton, not to speak of smaller and more compact Presbyteries, the reports are practically complete, shows what may be done. Conveners must be excused for persistency, and ministers, missionaries and officers of societies should attend promptly to sending in the returns at the proper season.

The Statistical and Financial Summary appended gives full details. A few comparisons with last year's figures are made. More extended comparisons would be interesting, but they are not possible, owing to the tentative character of last year's reports.

### SOCIETIES.

The total number of societies reporting is 919, an increase of 123 over 1895. It is probable that there are upwards of 1200 Young People's Societies within the Church. Of those reporting, 818 are C. E. (which number includes 37 Junior C. E.): 21 are Young People's Home Missionary Societies, and 12, Boys' Brigades. There are 2 other societies of various names. The C. E. has, so far as appears, the whole in the Presbyteries of Truro, Sydney, Inverness, Halifax, Wallace, Pictou, Mirand, Glengarry, Lindsay, Algoma, Saugeen, Stratford, Huron, Bruce, Superior, Brand Melita, Regina, Edmonton and Victoria, 20 Presbyteries in all.

In the Maritime Provinces three, four, five, or even six Societies of C. A are sometimes found within the same congregation.

The Y. P. S. C. E. of Cooke's Church, Toronto, enjoys the unique distinction of being the largest C. E. Society in the world, having an enrolment of 500 we we and 114 Associate members, a total of 617.

The 37 Junior C. E. Societies and a number of boys' and children's Mission Bands represent the experiment of putting the children in training for Christian work. Where wise leaders have charge, the experiment has been distinctly successful. It is worthy of much more extensive trial. Why should not the teaching of the home and the Sabbath school and the pulpit be thus supplemented? Can we begin too early to lead our children to understand that they are part and parcel of the great host by which the world is to be conquered for Christ, or too early show them what there is to do and how it is to be done?

### MEMBERSHIP.

The total membership reported is 31,615, an increase of 6,789, with an average of nearly 42 for each society as against 40 last year, a slight, but gratifying advance.

The proportion of young men to young women stands about the same, 37 to 63. Several Presbyteries, whilst recognizing the fact that there is probably a larger number

of the young men now enlisted in active Christian service than ever before, lament that the proportion is not still greater, and urge to more strenuous endeavor to increase it. Some suggest the adoption of the methods of the St. Andrew's Brotherhood or the Brotherhood of Andrew and Philip, organizations "of men, for men," which have proved successful in other Churches.

Twenty thousand and six of the members of the societies are in full communion with the Church; but it would appear that there are about 2,599 of the "Active" members who are not communicants. (These probably include the majority of the juniors). Fo this number add the 11,945 "Associate" members, most of whom are non-communicants, and it will be seen that there is a wide field for personal and evangelistic work within the societies themselves.

It would also seem necessary to call attention afresh to the repeated recommendation of the General Assembly that the "Active" membership should be composed of those in full communion with our own or some other evangelical Church.

### CONTRIBUTIONS.

The counsel of the Assembly to its young people to raise funds by systematic and voluntary methods and to give a foremost place to the support of the work connected with their own congregation and the great Schemes of the Church is already proving its value.

The total raised for all purposes has increased from \$26,911 in 1895 to \$34,181 in 1896, and the average givings of each society from \$34 to \$38. The appended tables show that, were all sections of the Church to give attention to this matter as some do, the aggregate would be much increased, and the detailed reports reveal like possibilities within each Presbytery.

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Some Presbyteries express disappointment that the givings are not larger and more general. In others remarkable advance is noted, as, for example, in the Presbytery of Hamilton where, "whilst the membership of the societies show an increase of but 21 per cent., the increase of contributions is 77 per cent."

The special effort of the societies in the Maritime Provinces to relieve the Home Mission Fund of debt by an extra contribution of 25 cents per in unber was most successful, \$1,264.68 having been thus raised up to 30th April.

The young people seem to recognize, as the Presbytery of Brockville's report puts it, "that a society, like an individual, cannot thrive on a selfish policy." As last year, their money a have been mootly expended outside themselves. In a total of \$34,181 for all purposes, only \$6,510, or 19 per cent., went for running expenses. Congregational objects received \$8,158, or 23 per cent.; the Schemes of the Church \$13,487, or 40 per cent., and other objects \$6,225, or 18 per cent. The "other objects" include the large amounts given for the Armenian iRelief and the India Famine Funds. This probably accounts for the fact that \$3,182 more appears in this column than last year. The increase is exceptional, and by no means to be held as indicating lessened interest in the Church's Schemes. These show the substantial advance of \$3,467.

Every Scheme received something, Home Missions leading with \$5,911, followed by \$5,463 for the Foreign work. A knowledge of all the Schemes of the Church, on the part of the roung people, sympathy with them all, and contributions, however small, towards them all—no blanks—is the committee's ideal. To follow this persistently for ten years, by which time the present generation of "young people" will have matured and have become largely responsible for the working of the congregations, will be to solve the difficult problems of the less popular Schenes.

### MEETINGS.

The "Questions" sent down to societies make inquiry for "new methods" in the conducting of the meetings.

Answers in great variety have been returned, shewing that there is much fertility of invention, and in almost every case of a wholesome sort. A "talent for suggesting" is an excellent gift.

The new methods spoken of include: (a) Evangelistic effort, such as "after meetings"; the study of a manual on "How to bring men to Christ." (b) Missionary lesson (c) The recitation in common of the Lord's Prayer, the Apostles Creed, and the responsive reading of Scripture. (d) An installation service for officers. (e) Literary evening (f) A song service for the whole or part of the meeting. (g) Blackboard outlines. (h) Studies in the life of Christ, the life of St. Paul, "Imago Christi," Drummond's

issued at the New Year, under instruction from last Assembly, has meet with wide approval from Presbyteries and Synods, and has been warmly endorsed by C. E. Conventions, the leading C. E. papers, and by many workers in other Churches, who are seeking to achieve, on somewhat similar lines, the same object, namely: The more adequate instruction of the young people in the Doctrine, Polity, History and Work of their own Church.

The Plan has already found its way into 290 societies, whilst many more are proposing to take it up next year. In the Peterborough Presbytery, all the societies which are

reported have already adopted it.

The Plan of Scudy, to use the language of the committee in issuing it, has been most carefully considered and will, it is hoped, come widely into use, and add to, rather than take from the spirituality of the devotional meetings, whilst deepening also the love of the young people for their own Church and stimulating them to more diligent effort on behalf of the great enterprises to which she has set her hand.

The Plan is adapted to all the various sorts of young people's societies, and is in the

form of a graft upon the methods already in use.

It is in brief, (a) For Doctrine—Five minutes of each meeting, the shorter Catechism being the text book; and (b) For the Polity, History and Work of the Church, a meeting each month."

The monthly topics for 1896 take the form of a "General Survey," and are as

October 10-How the Ministry is trained: Our Colleges and their Work. -2 Tim. 2, 1-3; 3, 14-17;

November 14—Our Weaker Congregations: the Augmentation Scheme. 2 Cor. 12, 12-27. December 12—What the Young People may do for the Church.—Psalm 122; Luke 2, 42-52.

Helpful literature is recommended and space has been kindly allowed in the Record, month by month, for a discussion of the topic designed to aid the young people in preparing for their meetings. In this work, which is supervised by the Convener, he has been assisted by the Conveners of the Assembly's Committees on the Schemes, and by a number of leading writers throughout the Church, to all of whom the thanks of the Assembly are due. Various papers in more or less close relation to the Church, have also treated the

topics of the Plan of Study.

A Y. P. S. C. E. Topic Card especially arranged for Presbytcrian Societies, containing the "uniform topics" and incorporating the Plan of Study, was issued by the Endeavor Herald Co., Toronto, at a cheap rate, and has been widely used. Various suggestions for the improvement of the form of the Topic Card have come to the Committee and will be acted upon, should the Assembly authorize the continuance of the Plan of Study. The Committee also contemplate following up the General Survey of this year with detailed studies for the monthly topic which, it is hoped, may be as acceptable to the young people as the present list. It should be added that, from several quarters, the Committee has been urged to propose some plan for the systematic study of the whole Bible.

### WORK.

A list, in detail, was given in last year's report of the forms of practical work undertaken (a) within, (b) outside the congregation. The returns this year show that neither energy nor ingenuity has lessened. Young life is active life. It is of its very essence to be up and doing, and it is sure to be inventive as well as aggressive. The efforts within the congregation range all the way from pumping the church organ to holding an evening service when the minister cannot overtake it, and outside, from placing good literature in the barber shops and hotels, to engaging in slum work or supporting a worker in the mission field. One society says, "We are interested in all the work of the congregation" an excellent model. Nor is such a society likely to neglect the outside calls.

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### PRESBYTERIAL SOCIETIES.

The Assembly will be gratified to learn that, in accordance with its recommendation of last year, several additional Presbyterial Societies have been organized. A brief form of Constitution was issued by the Committee and has, in the main, been followed. It sets forth the Object of such Societies to be "To promote the welfare and the usefulness to the Church of the young people of the Presbytery, by uniting them in frierdly intercourse, the cultivation of their spiritual life, the study of the doctrines, history and work of the Church, and the support of its missionary, educational and benevolent Schemes; the Membership to consist of "The various Y. P. Societies within the Presbytery under the oversight of Sessions; each society to be represented by its President and one delegate for every seven members. In congregations where no young people's organizations exists, Sessions may appoint delegates in the proportion of one to each twenty names on the commonion roll." Provision is also made for Meetings, for an Executive, on which the Presbytery and the Presbytery's Committee on Y. P. Societies are represented, and for necessary changes in the Constitution. The Convener will send copies of this form of Constitution on application.

Presbyterial organizations now exist in the Presbyteries of Peterborough, Whitby, Lindsay, Toronto, Orangeville, Barrie, Owen Sound, Saugeen and Guelph, in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston. The Presbytery of Kingston, in the same Synod, had an excellent convention of its young people, but deferred the matter of organization for the present.

In the Synod of Hamilton and London, the Presbyteries of Hamilton, Paris, London (also has a Presbyterial Y. P. Home Missionary Society), Huron, Maitland, Bruce and Sarpia have Presbyterial Societies. Stratford held a convention, but was not prepared at a column to organize.

In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces there is, as yet, no Presbyterial organization, although one is to be formed in the Presbytery of Sydney. A large portion of the territory is so wholly Presbyterian that the County C. E. Unions are held to cover the field pretty fully.

In the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa the Presbyteries of Quebec and Brockville have taken steps towards organization, and a most active Presbyterial Y. P. H. M. Society is in operation in the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew.

In the West the Presbyte v of Winnipeg is to form a Presbyterial as soon as practicable, and the matter is under obscussion in the Presbytery of Westminster. The Synod of British Columbia, at its recent meeting, recommended that an effort be made to form Presbyterial Societies within the bounds.

As to the practical work undertaken by these Presbyterial organizations it is chiefly

of four sorts:—
(a) The holding of conventions. These have already done much to develop an esprit de corps; and where the programme has been put chiefly into the hands of the young people themselves, they have given evidence at once of a deep spirituality, a large grasp of the topics, and great resource in practical methods.

(b) The encouragement of the societies by visitation and suggestion. The Toronto Presbyterial Union has been specially active in this direction. In a handsome little pamphlet, "Echoes of the Convention," just issued, it furnishes the societies with a summary of the papers and addresses given at the convention and presses upon them the claims of Sabbath observance, the Plan of Study, and the Missionary Schemes of the Church.

(c) The organization of new societies.
(d) The support of missionary work by the united efforts of the societies, as in the Presbyteries of Peterborough, Whitby and Owen Sound. The Presbyterial Y. P. H. M. Society of the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew is an example of what may be done. It combines all the young people's societies which will unite with it in support of Home Missions. As a result, the 26 societies reported contributed \$983 for that work, or an average of about \$38 for each society.

Both the Toronto and Hamilton Presbyterials are arranging for district conventions to be held during the summer.

### NEW MATTERS,

As the schedules show, the young people's societies flourish mostly in the older and more closely settled communities. In missionary tere ory they are confined chiefly to the centres.

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er and lefly to And yet nowhere are they more needed than in the scattered mission districts, where the regular services of the Church are few, and in many places intermittent. What may not a trained band of zealous young people do in such places to keep atlame the light of the Gospel!

At the meeting of the Committee in September last the Convener was instructed to correspond with the Missionary Superintendents and with the Conveners of Committees in the newer Presbyteries with a view to the formation of societies where none are now found. Little, however, has been done. It is a work that requires much correspondence and a good supply of suitable literature, constitutions, etc. This, of course, means expense, and it is believed that the outlay would be well made; but the Committee has no funds for this or any other purpose. If it could be provided with a small income, something worth while might be accomplished toward extension in the newer districts during the coming year.

In this connection the Convener feels constrained to state that the labor which has necessarily fallen upon him during the past two years in the way of correspondence, communicating with societies, maturing the plans of work, and the preparation of reports for the Assembly, and, for the enrrent year, the direction also of the Plan of Study, has been very exacting. It has necessarily been done almost entirely without clerical assistance and at little more than the bare cost to the Assembly Fund of printing and postage.

and at little more than the bare cost to the Assembly Fund of printing and postage.

This can hardly be continued. Some provision for more adequate clerical help is absolutely requisite. The Committee, however, believes that, in consideration of the benefits received, societies would gladly send in a contribution, if asked. A small sum annually from each society would not only meet all ordinary expenses as mentioned above, but would enable the Committee to do something effective for the extension of the young people's work in the wide and distant missionary fields.

### THE SOURCE OF PROGRESS.

The Committee would, in conclusion, express its profound conviction that the source of true progress in this, as in every part of the Church's enterprises, is only to be found in a deeper and more abiding experience of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, the fountain of all knowledge and strength, and zeal; and its prayer to God is that the Spirit in His fulness may be poured out upon all the young people in their endeavor the better to serve Christ and the Church.

### RECOMMENDATIONS.

The following Recommendations, as summing up the points in the report upon which present action is desirable, are submitted for adoption by the Assembly:

1. That ministers and missionaries supervise the returns sent in from societies, to the end that these may be more prompt, accurate, and complete.

2. That the Assembly express satisfaction with the general outline of the Plan of Study issued by the Committee, and the extensive use into which the Plan has come, and authorize its continuance, with such new monthly topics for the coming year as the Committee may find suitable.

3. That the Committee be instructed to consider whether some similar plan might not be devised for the use of the children in junior organizations, and to issue such plan if deemed practicable.

4. That ministers, sessions, and young people's societies be specially reminded of the urgent need of seeking to bring a larger proportion of the young men into the membership of the societies and an active interest in the work of the Church.

5. That the Assembly's previous recommendation to the young people in regard to moneys be reiterated, viz:—(a) To adopt some systematic and voluntary method of raising funds. (b) To give the foremost place to the support of work connected with their own congregation, and to the great missionary, educational and benevolent Schemes of the Church.

6. That the Committee be authorized to request of the various young people's societies under their care a contribution towards the necessary expenses of the Committee and the extension of the work in the newer districts.


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




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### THE "RECORD" AND "CHILDREN'S RECORD."

To the Venerable, The General Assembly :-

The Presnyterian Record, like the Church to which it belongs, has attained its majority. With 1896 it completes its 21st year. A matter for regret and amendment is that its circulation has not quite kept pace with the growth of the Church; the past year showing a very slight decrease. The reasons given are, hard times, removal of subscribers, etc., while worthy elders have coased to take it that they "may have more time to read their Bibles." "Hard times" affect it in two ways: (1), in congregations which provided it for each family reverting to individual subscriptions, and, (2), in decreasing subscription lists in less prosperous and less interested sections of the Church.

The total of copies printed was 582,250, a monthly average of 48,250.

THE CHILDREN'S RECORD has completed its eleventh year. There have been printed during 1896 nearly 288,000 copies, or an average of about 24,000 copies monthly, a slight increase over the previous year.

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The above balances, in both Records, include advance receipts for 1897.

The approval of the Assembly is asked for the following recommendations:—

- 1. Pastors, Sessions and Congregations are urged to place the Record, the property and organ of our Church, in every family of the Church, so far as circumstances will admir.
- 2. That the Children's Record should be taken in all our Sabbath Schools and Congregations, for the children of the Church.
- 3. As it is difficult to adapt one periodical to all ages of our young people, and at the same time desirable that the missionary work of our Church should be kept before them, and as the financial condition of the *Records* will now warrant the experiment, the Assembly sanctions the issuing of an additional paper for the older children, when the time may appear most suitable for doing so.

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### REPORT OF HYMNAL COMMITTEE.

At last meeting of the General Assembly, the Hymnal Committee was authorized to proceed with the publication of the Book of Praise, after making any necessary revision of its contents.

In the month of June, the Committee revised the Book. In the Hymnal little change was made. A few hymns were omitted and a few added. In the selections from the Psalter greater changes were made. A considerable number of Selections were added, in accordance with an instruction of the Assembly to make this part of the Book of Praise "more fully representative of the great richness and variety of the Book of Psalms."

For the purpose of carrying on the Committee's work, several Sub-Committees—Executive, Index. Editorial, Music, Publishing—were appointed or re-appointed. These Sub-Committees held numerous meetings during the year, discharging the duties especially assigned to them.

The Index Committee revised and completed the four following Indices:—An alphabetical Index of the first lines of Hymns with names of authors; an Index of Subjects referred to in the Hymns; an Index of Scripture texts quoted, illustrated, or referred to in the Hymnal; and also an alphabetical Index of first lines of Selections from the Psalter, with the number of the Psalins from which selections were made.

The Editorial Committee carefully and critically revised the text of the hymns, with view to correct any verbal inaccuracies, and any needless departures from the original text.

The Music Committee completed the selection and arrangement of tunes, according to the principles recorded in last year's report, and moreover, carried on extensive corres pondence, in order to obtain the use of tunes from the proprietors of copyright. For the use of hymns a similar correspondence was conducted by the Executive Committee. The use of the largest number of copyright hymns and tunes has been generously and gratuiously granted by their proprietors.

To the Publishing Committee was entrusted the task of obtaining tenders and entering into a contract for the publication of the Book of Praise. Tenders were obtained from several Publishing houses in Canada, England and Scotland; the Committee considering that the tender from the Oxford University Press was, on the whole, the best, accepted it. The contract extends over a period of ten years.

According to the terms of the contract, the Oxford Press agrees to furnish Book-sellers with copies of the Selections and Hymns, in cloth binding, to be sold by retail at the following prices:—Small, medium and large type, at 10, 30 and 60 cents each respectively; Sabbath school copies of Selections and Hymns, at 8 cents each; large Music edition amaller Music edition, at 90 and 60 cents, respectively, for each copy. Other editions with the whole Psalter are to be provided, but the prices of these have not, as yet, been definitely agreed upon.

For the purpose of superintending the publication of the Book of Praise, in accordance with an earnestly expressed desire of a representative of the Oxford Press, the Executive Committee appointed the Rev. Dr. Somerville and the Rev. A. Macmillan to proceed to England. These brethren accordingly proceeded to London and Oxford, and in co-operation with the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, a member of the Hymnal Committee, now residing in London, rendered laborious and valuable service in the way of obtaining the use of copyright tunes and hymns, and examining the proof sheets of different editions of the Book of Praise, and also in conferences regarding the exact title of the Book.

At the time of preparing this Report, complete printed copies of the Book of Praise have not reached this country. It was believed that copies would have been ready for sale about the beginning of May. But various unforseen difficulties have caused delay.

Before the meeting of Assembly, however, some complete editions, it is hoped, will be in

the hands of booksellers throughout the Dominion.

The last General Assembly authorized the Committee to co-operate with any other Presbyterian Church or Churches in preparing a revised and improved metrical version of the whole Psalter. The Committee, therefore, appointed three of its members viz., Rev. Dr. Scrimger, and the Rev. Messrs. Murray and Dey to attend and confer with committees of other Churches regarding a revision. In the month of last April, a meeting of representatives of the following Churches was held in Philadelphia: (1) The Presbyterian Church of the United States (North.) (2) The United Presbyterian Church of N. America. (3) The Reformed Presbyterian Church of the United States. (4) The General Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of America. (5) The Cumberland Presbyterian Church. (6) The Associate Reformed Church (South.) (7) The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The members of our Committee present were Messrs. Murray and Dey.

After lengthened consideration the following rules were cordially and unanimously

adopted :-

1. The proposed Psalter must not be a pharaphrase, but a metrical translation aiming at expressing the exact thought of each line of the original in its exact connection, in perfect metrical form and in idiomatic English.

2. That the Scottish version (that is, Rouse's version, so called), in the main, be

followed as best fulfilling the above requirements.

3. That as a rule no psalm be represented by more than two versions, and usually by one, unless second versions of commanding excellence present themselves.

For carrying out these rules a detailed plan was adopted.

It was further agreed that the incidental expenses, which it was supposed would be small, should be divided among the Churches represented, each Church being left to pro-

vide the travelling expenses of its representatives.

Our representatives report themselves as on the whole well satisfied with the proceedings in the meeting at Philadelphia, and hopeful for the results. They reised the question as to whether any of the Churches in Britain had been invited to co-operate. It was replied by the American brethren that they had not been invited because of the difficulty of co-operating with Churches at so great a distance, and because they supposed the Churches in Britain would not wish to co-operate. But the door is left open for asking the co-operation of British Churches.

### BRANTFORD LADIES' COLLEGE.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BRANTFORD YOUNG LADIES' COLLEGE, 1896-97.

To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada:

The Directors of the Brantford Presbyterian Ladies' College, in presenting their annual report to the General Assembly, are glad to state that, notwithstanding the severe financial depression of the country during the year, which has affected the attendance of many of the higher educational institutions of the country, the number enrolled has been exceedingly gratifying. Up to the present date the attendance has been, between regular boarders and day pupils, about 100. It is, as yet, impossible to give the exact number of graduating students for the year, as the final examinations have not yet taken place, but the prospects are that there will be ten or twelve, between English, Music, and Art. Several graduates of the College are at present prosecuting advanced studies in our own Universities, and others are engaged in different parts of Canada and the United States, in Colleges and Public Schools. These instances serve to show the thoroughness of the instruction given in every department of the College curriculum.

Mrs. Rolls, who has so long and so faithfully filled the position of Lady Principal, having resigned, the Directors have after due consideration and enquiry appointed Miss Caroline Phillpots in her place. Miss Phillpots is now, and has been for many years, Head Governess in Rolleston House, Toronto, and is well known among a large circle of Presbyterian tamilies whose daughters have been under her care. She is also highly recommended by Sir Oliver Mowat, Rev. Dr. Wardrope, Rev. J. C. Tibb, B.D., and other well-known ministers of our Church; and also by Wm. Tytler, B.A., Inspector of Schools; Bishop Sullivan, of Toronto, and Bishop Baldwin, of the Diocese of Huron, and educationalists of high standing who have known her past record as a most successful teacher and trainer of young ladies. Under her direction it is confidently believed the College will maintain the high character it has attained by the

wise and able management of Mrs. Rolls.

The teaching staff of the College has never been more complete than at present. It comprises seven Governesses in the regular English branches and Modern Lauguages, including Elocution, Stenography and Typewriting; a Professor and four Governesses in Music, a Professor and two assistants in Drawing and Painting; and Lecturers and Teachers in Philosophy, Natural Theology, Evidences of Christianity, and Bibical History. In addition to the regular instruction, lectures have been given during the winter by leading Ministers of the Church, on Historical, Ethnological, Literary, and Biographical subjects. The Directors gladly welcome the daughters of Clergymen, to whom reduced rates are given, enabling them to take the full College course, and thus prepare themselves for teaching, Foreign Mission service and other important positions in life. They are satisfied that many more of the Ministers of the Church would avail themselves of the privileges afforded their daughters, if they would only make themselves better acquainted with the workings of the College, and the exceedingly moderate sum that is charged for board and tuition.

During the past year the College has been visited and the classes examined in History English Literature, Mathematics, Latin, and the Modern Languages, by Rev. E. Cockburn, M.A., representing the Synod of Hamilton and London, and Rev. J. C. Tibb., B.D., of Streetsville, representing the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, and also the Rev. Dr. Robertson and Rev. Dr. Gordon, the Moderator of the General Assembly. The examiners have reported to their respective Synods their impressions of the College, and testified as to the high qualifications of the teachers employed, and the

proficiency of the pupils in the various departments of study.

The Directors do not hesitate to say that, in comparison with other institutions of a similar character, no college offers greater attractions to studious young women, alike for its homelike social comforts, the beauty and healthfulness of its surroundings, the solidity of its teaching, its moral and religious atmosphere, and last but not least, its fidelity to the principles of the Presbyterian faith, and evangelical truth, common to all evangelical denominations. On such grounds they claim for it a still greater amount of patronage from the Ministers, Elders and Members of the Presbyterian Church.

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# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICAL FORMS.

To the Venerable, the General Assembly :

The Committee appointed by the last General Assembly (minutes, p. 26) "to consider the present statistical forms, in order to recommend a re-arrangement of the questions that will tend to record greater simplicity and accuracy, and report to next Assembly," beg to report as follows:—

A meeting was held in Toronto, on April 8th, at which were present, with the Convener, Drs. McLaren and R. Torrance, and Messrs. T. F. Fotheringham and D. Torrance Fraser.

Some difference of opinion was found to exist as to whether the Committee was restricted, by the terms of its appointment, to the consideration of the Forms of the Standing Committee on Statistics alone, or whether it should examine all the statistical matter furnished by the various Standing Committees of the Assembly. The Committee, ther \_\_\_\_\_\_ did not enter upon the revision of the forms in detail.

Convener stated that, on the understanding that the Committee's instructions bore the wider interpretation, he had, through correspondence, obtained samples of the statistical sheets of a number of the principal Churches in Canada, the United States and Britain, and had also, through correspondence, received numerous and valuable suggestions from several of the more experienced ministers and laymen of our own Church as to possible improvements in the forms now in use and in the mode of collecting statistics. A summary of these was, by request, laid before the Committee, from which it appeared that, in addition to some minor changes in detail, it might be possible, through co-operation amongst the various Committees seeking statistical information, to reduce the bulk of statistics now required, and hence, also, the labor and expense of producing them, as well as to avoid repetitions and conflicting figures, and so increase the accuracy and value of the statistics.

The Committee therefore agreed,-

1. To report, as above, to the General Assembly.

2. To ask that the Committee be continued, its duties more definitely stated, and its numbers increased so that all the interests involved may be fully represented.

The Convener would also respectfully request to be relieved of the Convenership of the Committee, on account of the onerous duties already laid upon him as the Convener of the Standing Committee on Young People's Societies.

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# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1896.

To the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, met in Winnipeg, June, 1897:

Looking back upon 18%, the year embraced in this report, your Committee feel constrained, as their first duty, to bear testimony that God has still been mindful of his grace and truth towards our Church; and that, in the sovereignty of his Providence, and his faithfullness to covenant engagements, he has been encouraging and gladdening her by his presence, supplying her with his Spirit, and enabling her, not only to maintain the position to which she had attained, but to lengthen her cords, and reach into districts which were "beyond."

On all hands it must be conceded that he has called her to occupy a high and influential place among those religious denominations in our country which go to make up the Church Catholic. She holds advantageous ground from the geographical situation of the land itself, for, on the one side, she can stretch forth her hand to Christian civilizations which have been in existence for centuries, and Christian activities which have never been more energetic and aggressive than they are at the present period, while there lies, on the other hand, the far-reaching and populous East, in which heathen culture, coming down from most ancient dates, and carried to a degree which, in certain respects, was not surpassed, if indeed it was equalled, by that of Greece and Rome—to whose spiritual condition and prospects she is bound to have regard, under the terms of her commission to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature; in which there are so many fields inviting her to go up and occupy; from which there are so many bright—we must not say possibilities

-hut certainties, of gems being gathered to add to the brightness of the crown of him who sits at the right hand of the Majesty in the heavens, and of advancement in all that constitutes the glory and excellency of manhood, and contributes to the elevation of individuals, families and nations. And it cannot be disputed—the nature of the case guarantees it, the facts of history prove it—that Christianity stimulates and conduces to intellectual vigor, development and refinement, and to the welfare of man in all his relations.

Approaching to survey the year that has just been added to the history of our Church in this wide Dominion, we could not cherish the anticipation that all would be bright. A landscape is not always, and in every part, lighted up with unclouded sunshine. Victory does not always peren upon the ensigns of an army that has been led forth to places and deeds of daring. Unobstructed and uninterrupted success has not been a characteristic of the Christian Church in any age since it was founded. And when we look at the extent of territory over which our Church stretches, the number of individuals included in her pale, each of whom, whether office-bearer or not, whether in the front among active workers, or in some more retired rank has his personal peculiarities, and the variety of outward circumstances by which she is affected, is it not to be expected that there will be shadow as well as brightness on the scene; that there will be arrest, more or less marked, if not worse, in the warfare, as well as conquest, and it may be events and circumstances which demand grave and earnest consideration? We need not give prominence to the statement of the fact that the state of nations, the keneral condition of the people, have a material influence on the work and prosperity of the Church. That statement has been often made, and is self-evident. When God blesses a country, and causes its soil to bring forth plentifully; when the wheels of industry are in smooth and rapid motion, when abundance walks on every side, and hearts are soothed and gladdened with her gifts, there is the fuller opportunity, as there is the more urgent call, and the greater readiness of mind to make grateful returns to the Giver of all good through the various channels that may be open, whether of baseoul or pality wintry.

whether of personal or relative piety.

In looking at the report it will be observed that some slight changes have been made by the Committee on the forms prepared and sent out for collecting the information which they are expected to procure and tabulate and summarize this year, as compared with the preceding one. It is well known that the Christian Endeavor movement has assumed such proportions, and has become such an important element in our Church organizations, that provision should be made for some special notice of it. If the Committee had been able to carry out their own desire there would have been a distinct question on the slips issued to congregations and stations, and a distinct column in the tabulated forms, "Is there a Christian Endeavor Society connected with your congregation?" Unable to do this in the meantine, and also deeming it more prudent to introduce the matter tentatively, we modified the question of 1895, "Is there a Woman's or Young People's Missionary Society, Christian Endeavor, or other Young People's Society connected with the congregation?" directing that initials should be employed to distinguish each. Then a new question was added, asking for the number belonging to the Young Peoples' or Christian Endeavor Society. To make room for this it was agreed to omit, although not without some small reluctance, a question that has been used for a few years—"Total number under pastoral oversight"—a question which was intended to elicit information from which

it could be ascertained what was the actual number of Presbyterians under church cognizance as compared with the entire number in the Dominion as learned from the decennial Dominion census, Such are the changes in the questions in the Statistical slips, with the reason for there being made.

In the Financial department the question and column for entering payments to Coligny College were—omitted, and in place of them a question and column substituted for returns of the amounts contributed to the Schemes of the Church by Young Peoples or Christian Endeavor Societies.—In this way the number of questions has not been increased, and it was necessary to secure this in order to make the pages of the report in its printed form agree in size with the printed minutes of Assembly, and it is not desirable that there should be any change in their form.

Before proceeding the Committee will be excused if they refer to the dates and shape in which returns are made by Presbyteries. They will not put on record any specific statement as to the want of promptitude in keeping by the time at which these returns should be forwarded. We know the excuse that is pleaded by the dilatory, that they were waiting for reports from congregations, and the ground there is for this. But several large Presbyteries observe a praiseworthy punctuality, why might not all? Your Committee would further suggest that Clerks of Presbyteries generally observe care fullness in tabulating the returns they receive, and making their additions. In very many instances the entries do not receive proper attention, and the additions are far from correct. There are a few commendable exceptions, but they are very few. Of these, let us be pardoned in mentioning two, not quite the whole number, but very nearly so, Barrie and Toronto, the two largest, the most neatly and accurately prepared of the fifty that come in. In the case of the Financial department such instructions are given both in the slips and sheets as would secure against inaccurate compilations, or detect inaccurate entries if made.

#### STATISTICS.

#### SYNOD OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

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Proceeding now to a detailed consideration of the reports received, your Committee begin as usual at the East and take the Presbyteries in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces. At one time, and till quite lately, this Synod embraced eleven Presbyteries, but owing to that of Newfoundland becoming defunct through a decrease in the settled ministry, it has now only ten, the congregations of the late Presbytery being joined to those of Halifax, making a corresponding increase in its num-

Observing the arrangement followed in other years, the Presbytery of Truro first claims notice. This has now 43 Churches and Stations forming pastoral charges, being 1 fewer than the preceding year, with 12,430 sittings, an increase of 45; 1,926 families, an increase of 68; and 420 single persons, whether communicants or adherents, not belonging to the families enrolled, a decrease of 88; and 3,988 communicant members, an increase of 143, or an average of more than three to each charge, while the total average membership is less than 100. The additions to the rolls of communicants during the year were 209, and of these 207 were on profession of their personal faith, which was 135 fewer than in 1895, and 92 on certificate, or 15 fewer. The removals were 158, of whom 56 were by death, 1 fewer than in the foregoing year; 68 by certificate, 3 more; 30 without certificate, 20 fewer, and 4 by discipline, against 3.

BAPTISM is on Scriptural authority, and, by the express appointment of the Great King and Head of the Church, held as one of the two Sacramental Ordinances which are to be observed till the present dispensation of grace shall have filled up its period, and accomplished its object. terians believe that they have equally explicit divine authority for administering that ordinance to the infants of such as are members of the visible Church, and that to withhold it would be a loss to themselves and their little ones, as well as a sin against a precious and authoritative appointment. Their sympathies are with those who have not enjoyed the privilege in their earliest years, but they maintain, and their practise is in accordance, that adults should be baptized, and that the sacrament should be administered before sitting down at the Lord's Table, and partaking of the feast which is spread upon the New Testament Mount Zion. Our statistical forms call for the number of cases of baptism, and the returns from the Presbytery of Truro give 137 infants, and 53 adults, 5 more of the

former, and 18 fewer of the latter than for the former year.

In the number of ELDERS, 140, there is a decrease of 9, and of other office-bearers, that is Mana-

pers or Deacons, 132, a decrease of 6.

The attendance at Week-Day Prayer Meeting has fallen off by 87, being reported at 1,785; in the Sabbath School and Bible Class by 88, the total number being 2,858, or an average to εach charge of less than 70; and there are 5 fewer engaged in Sabbath School work, the whole number being 344, an average of 8 in each charge, and of 1 to every 8 scholars.

Missionary Associations have fallen from 12 to 10, but Women's Foreign Missionary Societies, 16, have increased by 1; and Home Mission, Young People's and Christian Endeavor Societies have increased by 10, all of these given as "Christian Endeavor," with a membership of 1,258, or an average to each of more than 30. age to each of more than 30.

The MANSES are reported at 13, and the Rented Houses 1: no change in the one year from the other. In each year 1 Manse was built, in 1896 a Church was erected, and in 1895 a Hall, so that in these two particulars the one year may be regarded as corresponding with the other.

In the Presbytery of Sydney, there were 41 Chulohks and Stations forming pastoral charges, being an increase of 11 on the preceding year; with 15,748 sittings, an increase of 4,590; or about 33 per cent.; 2,499 families, an increase of 641; and 127 single persons, and increase of 43; and 2,609 communicant members, an increase of 753. The total additions to membership was 250, and of these 203, an increase of 67, were on profession, and 47, a decrease of 4,000 or certificate. Removals sum up 131, of whom 38 were by death, an increase of 12; 65 by certificate, an increase of 28; 27 without certificate, an increase of 14; and 1 by discipline, none such being reported for 1895.

From this summary and comparison it will be seen that this l'EES BYTERY has been blessed with a large degree of prosperity, perhaps unprecedented in its history, but it is hoped to be repeated by Him who has the residue of the Spirit. One is naturally led to ask has there been any special effort in the way of evangelistic services, either by the ministers of the bounds helping one another in the work of the Lord, or the calling in of aid from outside sources?

In the PRESNYTERY OF INVERNESS there were 24, an increase of 1, Churches or Stations under regular pastoral care, with sitting accommodation for 7,455 persons, an increase of 265. Connected with these there were 1,516 families, a decrease of 42; 97 single persons, a decrease of 18; and 1,482, a decrease of 10, communicants, or an average of about 60 to each charge, the number of communicants being less than the number of families. The additions to membership during the year

were 74, a decrease of 9, on profession; and 5, a decrease of 18, on certificate.

The Removals by death were 27, a decrease of 2; by certi. ate 12, a decrease of 16, and without

certificate 3, a decrease of 18. No cases of discipline are reported, leading to loss or suspension of membership; in the preceding year there were 2.

BAPTISM was administered to 143 infants, being 6 fewer than the previous year, and to 17 adults,

being 3 more.

The number of Ruling Elders had increased from 90 to 93, and of Managers and Deacons

The number of Ruling Elders had increased from 90 to 93, and of Managers and Deacons from 123 to 126, being an average of less than 4 of the former, and more than 5 of the latter to each

The attendance on Weekly Prayer Mretings had increased by 227, giving a total of 1,274. and on Sabbath School and Bible Class it had decreased by 34, the whole number being 1,118. The former gives an average of more than 50, and the latter rather better than the same for each charge. There is a decrease of 3 in the number engaged in Sabbath School work, but each of these has charge of 8 scholars.

In the year 1895, there were no Missionary Associations reported, in 1896 there is 1, there were 13 Chuistian Endravor and 1 kindred organization, against 14 the previous year, so that it may be inferred that almost all the organizations of the former year became Christian Endeavor organizations in the latter, with an attendance of 349, or an average of about 27 to each.

There was no change in the number of MANSES, 10; there was 1 RENTED HOUSE additional; 1 CHURCH was built during the year; no Manse built in either.

In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces the Presbytery of Halifax stands foremost in the number of its PASTORAL CHARGES, 102, but this is less by 4 than that for the foregoing year. With this reported decrease of CHARGES there is an increase in SITTINGS of 933; in FAMILIES of 260; and in COMMUNICANTS of 833, while there is a decrease in SINGLE PERSONS of 21.

Additions to COMMUNION ROLL for the year amounted to 627, and of these 479 were on Profession, an increase of 52, and 148, a decrease of 58, on Certificate.

Removals by Death were 85, a decrease of 23; by Certificate 169, a decrease of 26; Without Certificate 51, an increase of 14; and by Discipline 8, an increase of 7.

Particularly was administrated to 285 information increase of 42 and 152 and 152 and 152 and 152 and 153 a BAPTISM was administered to 384 infants, an increase of 43, and to 94 adults, an increase of 20. In the Eldership there was a decrease of 100, the actual number being 232, not an average to

FIGURE ATTENDANCE at the Weekly Prayer Meetings, 2,464, had fallen off by 450, giving an average of 24; on Sabbath School and Bible Class, 5,008, a decrease of 41, giving an average of 50; and in those taking an official interest in Sabbath School work, 697, a decrease of 30, giving an average of not quite 8 to each.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS had fallen from 9 to 7; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies had risen from 31 to 35; Home Missionary, Christian Endeavor, or other Young People's Societies had risen from 22 to 55, of which 52 were Christian Endeavor, with a membership of 1,787, being an average in each of close upon 35.

The number of Manses was the same for each year, 23; there was 1 Rented House for minister fewer, and 1 Church was built. Neither Church nor Manse was erected in 1895.

In the Presbytery of Wallace there were 42 Churches or Stations under Pasteral Oversight in each year, so that in this particular it just holds its own; the sittings in these, 8,565, show an increase of 700; in families, 1,303, there was an increase of 35; in Single Persons, 127, of 27; and in communicant members, 2,264, of 121.

There were added to COMMUNION ROLLS in these charges 225 members, of whom 194 were on Profession, an increase of 54, and 31 on Certificate, a decrease of 17. The removals aggregated 152

and of these 40, an increase of 1, were by Death; 63, an increase of 9, by Certificate; and 49, a decrease of 48, Without Certificate. No cases of Discipline in either year.

Baptism was administered to 120 Infants, a decrease of 32; and 25 Adults, an increase of 5.

In the Ruling Eldershift there was an increase of 10, the full number being 105, which gives an average of between 2 and 3 to each charge, and 1 Elder for every 13 families; while Other Office

Bearers numbered 70, an increase of 5, not an average of 2 to each charge.

In the number attending Werkly Mertings, 1,155, there was an increase of 10, the average attendance in each charge being about 28; in Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes, 1,808, there was a decrease of 22, and likewise a decrease of 14 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 211, giving

an average of about 9 to each one so employed.

Missionary Associations had fallen from 3 to 2; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies had risen from 13 to 14; Home Mission, Christian Endeavor or other Young People's Societies had risen from 9 to 16, of which 15 were Christian Endeavor, with 503 members, or more than 33 on an average to each.

Mansks were the same in number, 8, each year, there were no Rented Houses in either, 1 Manse was built in each and 1 Church in 1893, none in 1895.

By the Presbytery of Picton there were 50 Chunches or Stations under Pastoral Care, being an increase of 7 on the foregoing year; and these contained sittings for 21,300 persons, an increase of 3,550; with 3,426 families, increase 507; 435 Single Persons, 36 of an increase; and 4,923 Constant of the contained sitting the second situation of the contained situation of the contain municants, 971 of an increase.

An Addition of 582 was made to the ROLLS OF MEMBERSHIP in the congregations in the bounds, of whom 426 were for the first time, 184 of an increase, and 156, an increase of 36 on Captificate. On the other hand the removals amounted to 378, and of these 148, an increase of 59, were by Death; 170, an increase of 12, by certificate; 52, a decrease of 57, Without Certificate; and 8, an increase of 2, by Discipline.

BAPTISM was administered to 304 Infants, an increase of 16, and to 17 Adults, an increase

In the RULING ELDERSHIP there were 252 persons, an increase of 35, and giving an average of 5 to each Charge and of 1 for every 14 families and 27 Communicants, while the number of Managers or Descons was 227, an increase of 45, and an average to each Charge of fewer than 5

Weekly Prayen Meetings were attended by 3,292, an increase of 407; Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes by 4,105, an increase of 44, an average of about 80 in each Church or Station, and these had 544, an increase of 50, actively engaged in their religious instruction, thus giving about 8 scholars to each teacher.

Altogether there were 4 MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS, a decrease of 2; 30 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, being 2 of an increase; 41 Christian Endeavor and 6 Young People's Societies against 13 kindred organizations in the foregoing year, with a membership of 1,161

There were 17 MANSES, being 3 of an increase; no Rented Houses, 1 of a decrease, while 2

Manses were built and I Church during the year.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island has Churches or Stations which aggregate 79, against 81 in the previous year. In these there are 21,170 sittings, which shows 70 of an increase, and 3,664 families, being 176 of an increase; 255 Single Persons, 5 of an increase; and 6,240 Comnunicants, or 406 of an increase.

During the year the accessions to MEMBERSHIP aggregated 330, of these 269 being on Profession

and 61 on Certificate, a decrease of 189 in the former, and an increase of 4 in the latter.

REMOVALS aggregated 221, and of these 100, a decrease of 6, were by Death, 98, a decrease of 29, by Certificate, and 23, a decrease of 4, Without Certificate. In 1895 there were 30 Removals by Discipline, in 1896 none.

In 1896 there were 391 Infants, a decrease of 12, baptized, and 37 Adults, a decrease of 4. The number of RULING ELDERS was precisely the same in each year, namely, 236, or about 3 to each Charge and 1 for each 16 families and 27 Communicants, while Other Office Bearers numbered

287, an increase of 24, and an average of not 4 to each Charge.

The Weekly Prayer Meetings were attended by 3,495 persons, a decrease of 116, which gives an average of more than 40 to each charge; and there were 4,776, an increase of 518, in Sabbath School and Bible Class, which gives an average of 60 to each, with 459, an increase of 34, which was called for by the increase of the attendance, looking after their welfare, which gives at the rate of not quite 11 to each one so engaged.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS had declined from 7 to 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies from 18 to 14, and Home Mission, Christian Endeavor and Young Peoples Societies from 28 to 23 now called Christian Endeavor, with a membership of 1,544. There are 6 other societies.

Mansks are provided for Ministers in 31 instances, an increase of 1. One Church was built during the year.

Luneuburg and Shelburne contained 40 Churches or Stations, an increase of 3; with 7,355 sittings an increase of 1,275; 716 Families, showing 77 of an increase; 576 Single Persons, 348 of an increase, and 1,372 Communicants, being 382 of an increase.

Additions to MEMBERSHIP were made to the extent of 163, of these 154 being on Profession, an increase of 83, and 9 on Certificate, an increase of 8. The Removals numbered 70, of these 34 being by Death, an increase of 21; by Certificate 11, an increase of 10; and Without Certificate 25, an increase of 19. No Removals by Discipline.

BAPTISM was administered to 82 Infants, 23 of an increase, and 10 Adults, 8 of an increase. There were 54 RULING ELDERS, an increase of 12, not much more than 1 to each Pastoral Charge, not altogether 1 to each Family on an average, about 1 for every 25 Communicants. There 55 Managers or Deacons, giving about the same average.

There were 445, a decrease of 25, in ATTENDANCE on Weekly Prayer Meetings, an average in each Charge; 1,042 or 66 of an increase, in Sabbath School and Bible Class, an 8 to Wol

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In 1896 a Missionary Association was formed, there not being any the previous year; 3 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies were formed, an increase of 2; there were in operation 9 Christian Endeavor Societies with a membership of 252, not quite 30 to each, and 1 Ladies' Aid against 5 similar organizations in the foregoing year.

There were 8 Mannes, an increase of 1, provided for ministers. 1 Church was built.

In respect of number of CHURCHES or STATIONS the Presbytery of St. John stands next to Halifax, having 105 of these, an increase of 26; with 20,840 Sittings, 4,270 of an increase; 2,853 families, 435 of an increase; 942 Single Persons, 314 of an increase; and 5,021 Communicants, 565 of an increase.

The MEMBERSHIP was increased by 480, and of these 432, a decrease of 23, were on Profession, and 48, a decrease of 7, on Certificate. The Removals were 80 by Death, 18 of a decrease; 96 by Certificate, an increase of 39; Without Certificate 155, an increase of 113; and none by Discipline.

BAPTISM was administered to 284 Infants, 39 of an increase, and 70 Adults, 7 of an increase.

In the RULING ELDERSHIP there were 183, which shows 30 of an increase, but not 2 to each Charge, about 1 to every 15 Families and every 27 Communicants. The Other Office Bearers numbers 286, not an average of 3 to each Charge.

There were 2,111, an increase of 154, ATTENDING the Weekly Prayer Meeting, or about 20 to each; 4,897, an increase of 487, were in Sabbath School and Bible Class, or nearly 49 in each on an average, and there were 600 employed actively in Sabbath School duties, or say I teacher to S

Missionary Associations were 1 fewer, 9, than in 1895; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 27, were 10 more; 20 Home Mission, Christian Endeavor and Young People's Societies had grown to 29 Christian Endeavor, with a membership of 1,361, besides other similar organizations. In 1895 there were 14 Manses, in 1896 there were 20 and 1 Rented House. I Manse and 3 Churches were built each year.

The Presbytery of Miramichi includes 55 CHURCHES or STATIONS constituting Pastoral Charges, an increase of 4 on the preceding year, and these have Sitting Accommodation for 10,781 persons, an increase of 156, with 1,344 Families, an increase of 105; 188 Single Persons, an increase of 31;

and 3.014 Communicants, an increase of 57.

Additions to COMMUNICANTS were made to the number of 389, of these 339 being on Profession. Additions to COMMUNICANTS were made to the number of 389, of these 389 being on Profession, an increase of 192, and 50 on Certificate, an increase of 12. Removals numbered 178, of these 60 being by Death, 4 fewer than in the previous year; 101 by Certificate, 46 more in the latter year than in the foregoing one; 15 Without Certificate, being 1 fewer, and 2 by Discipline, 2 fewer.

347 INFANTS were baptized, an increase of 62, and 18 Adults, an increase of 11.

The number of RULING ELDERS is reported as 132, being an increase of 8, giving an average of between 2 and 3 to each Charge, and of about 1 to every 15 Families and 23 Communicants, and of Other Office Bearers, 1,889, being an increase of 18.

Werkly Phayer Mertings were attended by 1,795, a gain of 230; Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes by 2,636, a falling off to the number of 241, while there was also a falling off of 15 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, the whole number of such being 345.

There were 10 Missionany Associations, an increase of 5; 8 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, a decrease of 2; 10 Home Mission, Christian Endeavor, or other Young People's Societies, an increase of 3 with a Membership of 309.

Collecting the Statistics of this Synod we have the following results: 586 Churches or Stations supplied by pastors, an increase of 45; Sittings in these 145,894, an increase of 15,854; Families 23,263, an increase of 2,162; Single Persons, 4,259, an increase of 677; Communicants, 40,049, an increase of 4,241; added on Profession 2,777, an increase of 276; on Certificate 647, a decrease of 59; Removals by Death 668, an increase of 7; by Certificate 853, increase 70; Without Certificate 430, increase 12; by Discipline 23, decrease 26. E.ptism was administered to 2,466 Infants, increase 117, and 378 Adults, increase 54. The number of Ruling Elders, which was 1,579, shows an increase of 41; Other Office Bearers, 1,908, of 243. There was an increase of 1,087 in those attending Weekly Prayer Meetings, namely: 20,276, of 998 in Sabbath School attendance which aggregated 31,187 and of 154 engaged in Sabbath School work, 3,775. In Missionary Associations aggregated 31,187 and of 154 engaged in Sabbath School work, 3.775. In Missionary Associations connected with congregations, 48, there was a decrease of 6; in Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 163, an increase of 16; an increase of 127 in Home Mission and related Societies, 240 of these being reported as Christian Endeavor, with a membership of 9,015. Besides these there were 17 Young Peoples'; 13 Home Mission and 6 others. The number of Manses, 159, has increased by 7, Rented Houses 17, the same each year. 21 Churches were built, 5 more than the preceding year and 9 Manses, 6 more.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA.

The first Presbytery in order is Quebec, with 24 Churches on Stations each year, containing 7,546 Sittings, being 516 of an increase; with 1,332 families, an increase of 63, connected with them; 262 Sirgle Persons, 2 of an increase, and 2,319 Communicants, 132 of an increase.

COMMUNICANT MEMBERS added during the year aggregated 197, of whom 145 were on Profession,

the same as the previous year, and 52 on Certificate, a decrease of 15.

Total Removals 123, of whom 41 were by Death, 3 of a decrease, 44 by Certificate, 12 of a decrease, 38 Without Certificate, 7 of an increase, and none by Discipline.

Baptism was administered to 184 infants, being 20 more than the preceding year, and 3 adults,

d fewer than in that year.

In the Eldership there were 86, increase 9; not an average of 4 to each Church, but giving 1 to every 15 families, and 27 Communicants. There was an increase of 19 in other Office Bearers, the whole number being 145.

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The ATTENDANCE at Weekly Prayer Meetings averaged 906 for all the Churches, an increase of 11; in Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes there were 2,114 enrolled, an increase of 112; and Sab-

bath School workers numbered 229, an increase of 7, and allowing nearly 10 scholars to each.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS and WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETIES were the same in each year, namely, 6 and 2 respectively. 12 Young People's Societies and 2 others are reported. with a membership of 263.

17 Manses were provided, an increase of 2; the former year there was a Rented House, there

was none in the latter, and 1 manse was built.

The Presbytery of Montreal reports the same number of Churches or Stations each year, namely 72; the number of sittings in these, 20,848, shows 2,263 of an increase; families have innamely 12; the number of strings in these, 20,648, shows 2,255 of an increase; families have increased by 188, making altogether 4,297; the number of Single Persons 1,602, has diminished by 300, whereas the number of Communicants, 9,909, has increased by 231.

Additions to Membership on Profession were 460, which was 37 fewer than in 1895, and on Certificate 375, a decrease of 33.

Altogether there were 639 Removals, and of these 125, increase 2, were by Death; 256, an increase of 15, by Certificate; 238, a decrease of 22, Without Certificate, and 20, an increase of 3,

by Discipline. 543 Infants, decrease 72, and 15 Adults, decrease 11, were Baptizen.

In the Eldership there were 282, an increase of 15, giving an average of a little less than 4 for each Church, but allowing 1 to every 15 families, and 18 Communicants under their charge. Other

Office Bearers numbered 395, an increase of 18.

At Werkly Prayer Mertings the attendance 1,571, had increased by 27, an average of 20 to

each Church; in Sabhath Schools and Bible Classes there were 6,886, an increase of 107, with 817 active workers, increase 17, thus allowing 8 scholars to each worker.

\_\_\_\_\_\_MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS remained the same, 17; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 22, had increased by 1; there were 26 Christian Endeavor Societies with a membership of 1,113, and 8

The number of Manses was without change, 21: there was 1 more Rented House, whole number 3; and 1 Manse and 1 Church were built, in the preceding year none.

In the Presbyte y of Glengarry there is a decrease in the number of Churches from 35 to 35. On the other hand there is an increase in Sitting Accommodation of 702, making the total 12,377, but the number of Families has fallen off by 19, leaving it 2,170, and of Single Persons by 39, leaving it 415, while Communicants, 3,764, have increased by 1.

In the ranks of MEMBERSHIP there has been a falling off of 17 in those joining the Church on their own Profession, 201; and of 29 on those changing their Congregational connection, whether from more or less remote districts, 65. The Removals sum up to 136, of these 64, an increase of 12, being by Death; 53, a decrease of 12, by Certificate; 17, a decrease of 4, Without Certificate, and

2 by Discipline, the same as in the previous year.

There was a decrease of 73 in the number of Infants, and of 20 in that of Adults Baptizer,

the numbers being 170 and 7 respectively.

In both the Eldership and other Office Bearers there was a falling off, in the former of 3, and in the latter of 8. The proportion of the whole number of Elders, 176, is somewhat more than 5 to each Church, and 1 to every 12 Families, and every 21 Communicants.

There was an increase of 23 in the number attending Weekly Prayer Mertings, 1,743; but a decrease of 186 in Sabbath School and Bible Class attendance, 2,869; and of 5 in the active

workers in these classes, 305, giving an average of 9 scholars to each one so employed.

In each year there were 6 MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS, and 22 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies; Home Mission and related Societies have increased by 4, of which 20 were Christian Eudeavor, with a membership of 993.

There were 17 Mansas on the Presbytery in 1896, there was 1 more in 1395; Rented Houses remain at the same figure, 2; there was no addition to Manses during the year, but 2 Churches were In the foregoing year, 1 Manse and 1 Church were built.

The Presbytery of Ottawa shows the large increase of 11 in the number of its Churches and Stations, 79; of 280 in the Sittings contained in these, 15,673; of 171 in Families, 2,898; a decrease of 170 in Single Persons, 1,005; and of 695, in Communicant Members, 5,056.

The Additions to membership on Profession of Faith were 340, an increase of 34, and on Certificate, 219, an increase of 47; while the Removals by Death were 75, a decrease of 4; by Certificate 139, an increase of 31; Without Certificate, 67, an increase of 24, and by Discipline, 3, a decrease

419 Infants, increase 86, and 16 Adults, increase 4, were BAPTIZED.

In the Eldership there was a reduction of 8, leaving the reported number 196, not an average of 3 to each Church; of 1 to every 15 Families and 26 Communicants. In the number of other Office Bearers, 338, there was an increase of 4.

The attendance at the Weekly Prayer Merring had increased by 120, making the number 1,840; in Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes there was a falling off of 45, bringing the number of the preceding year down to 3,976; whereas there was an increase of 10 in those engaged in Sabbath School work, 470, allowing 1 to every 8 or 9 scholars.

Missionary Associations were the same in each year, namely, 8; there was a decrease of 5 in Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 20; there were 20 Young People's and related Societies, an increase of 6, and of these, 14 were Christian Endeavor, with a membership of 659, an average to each of about 47.

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There is 1 Manse and 2 Churches fewer reported in 1896 than in 1895, the numbers being 20 and 2 respectively. No Manses were built in either of the years. 1 Church was built in each.

In the Preshytery of Lanark and Renfrew there were 56 Churches or Stations, 1 fewer than in the preceding year, with 14,907 Sittings, 218 fewer; 3,197 Families, 25 more; 669 Single Persons, a decrease of 53; and a Communicant membership roll of 6,841, a falling off to the extent of 126.

On Profession of Faith, 402, an increase of 19, were added to the Communion rolls of Kirk Sessions in the hounds, and on Certificate 160, a decrease of 1.

The Removals aggregated 390, and of these 101, increase 3, were by Death; 158, a decrease of 76, by Certificate; 39, a decrease of 9, Without Certificate, and 2, a decrease of 3 by Discipling.

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Baptism was administered to 452 Persons, of whom 395, an increase of 9, were Infants and 57, increase also 9; were adults.

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increase also 3; were admits.

In the ELDEBSHIP there was a decrease of 13, the actual number being 228, which gives an average of about 4 to each charge; of 1 to about every 15. Families and 30. Communicants. Other Office Bearers numbered 356, an increase of 24; and the Weekly Prayer Meetings were attended by 2,520, an increase of 8, and the Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes by 5,647, an increase of 516, requiring an increase in the staff of Sabbath School workers, and this was provided, for this had increased by 22, bringing it up to 542.

Missionary Associations had decreased from 12 to 8; and Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies from 33 to 32. There was also a decrease in Home Mission, Christian Endeavor, and Young People's and related Societies from 22 to 18; but of these, 15 were Christian Endeavor, with

a membership of 1,076, giving an average of more than 70 to each.

28 Mansus, a decrease of 1, were owned by congregations. I House was under rent each year for the Minister, and I Manse and 3 Churches were built; neither the previous years.

The Presbytery of Brockville had 35 Churches on Stations, a decrease of 5. In these there were 10,488 Sittings, an increase of 753; and connected with them as their places of worship were 1,705 Families, increase 216; Single Persons, 199, decrease 122; and Communicants, 3,200, an increase of 84.

Appirions to Membership on the Communion rolls summed up to 175, and of these 114, a decrease of 68, were on Profession, and 61, a decrease of 43, on Certificate.

Removals aggregated 104, and of these 44, a decrease of 16, were by Death, and 60, decrease 5, by Certificate. There are no Removals reported Without Certificate or by Discipline, but of the former there were 42, and of the latter 1, in the report for the previous year.

There were 160 cases of BAPTISM, 151 of these Infants, decrease 2, and 9 Adults, decrease 1.

There were 136 RULING ELDERS, being 25 of an increase, about 4 to each charge, and 1 to every 13 Families and 24 Communicants, while the number of other Office Bearers was 186, an increase of

At the WREKLY PRAYER MEETINGS the attendance had fallen off by 87, making the number 656, as set against 743; Sabbath School and Bible Class attendance had diminished by 62, and there was a falling off in the active Sabbath School workers of 34, making the number 264, thus allowing an average of rather less than 9 each.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS had fallen from 8 to 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 23 in number, had increased by 1; Home Mission and related Societies, 15, had increased by 5, of

which 10 were Christian Endeavor, with a membership of 403.

15 Mansks, an increase of 6, were owned by these Churches, and 3 Houses were rented for the Ministers occupancy, the same as the year before. No Manses were built in either year, 1 Church

In the 6 Presbyteries of this Synod there were 299 Churches or Stations, 3 of an increase; with 81,809 Sittings, 4,206 of an increase; 15,509 families, 614 of an increase; 4,152 Single Persons, 373 of a decrease, and 31,089 Communicants, 373 of a decrease.

There was an increase of 102, in the number, 9,236, attending WARKLY PHAYER MERTINGS; of 72 in attendance on Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes, 23,651, and of 17 in those engaged in 8abbath School work, to each of whom there was an average of 9 scholars.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS aggregated 46, a decrease of 11, and Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 1231 advances of 2

Societies, 121, a decrease of 2. There were 85 Chuistian Endeavor, and 32 Young People's Societies, 3 Home Mission, 1 Mission Band, and 1 B. B., in all 122, against 95 such organizations in 1895. The reported mem-

bership was 4,507 There were 118 Mannes, an increase of 5, and 11 Rented Houses, a decrease of 2. During the year 7 Churches, an increase of 4, and 2 Mannes, an increase of 1, were erected, with 2 not specified whether Churches.

#### SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON.

In this Synod there are 11 Presbyteries, and in this particular it stands higher than any other in the Church.

The Presbytery of Kingston contains 45 Churches or Stations forming or connected with pastoral charges, a decrease of 15 on the number reported in 1895, the latest being 45. In these there are 13,425 Sittings, a decrease of 110; 2,416 Families, a decrease of 110; 476 Single Persons, a decrease of 47; and 4,574 Communicants, a decrease of 156. To whatever cause the reduction in

the number of Churches and Stations is owing, and there is no reference to such in the report, its effect is seen on the other entries that have been mentioned.

On Profession of their Faith 279 were received to the privileges of members in full standing.

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The Removals sum up to 268, of whom 76, an increase of 9, were taken away by Death, 137; an increase of 10, left on Certificate; 42, a decrease of 46, Without Certificate; and 13, an increase of 10, were subjected to Discipline.

BAPTISM was administered to 239 Persons; of these 224 were Infants, a decrease of 39, and 15

were Adults, an increase of 3.

The number of RULING ELDERS was 149, a falling off of 3, an average of a little more than 3 to each Church, and of 1 to every 16 Families and 30 Communicants. Other Office Bearers, 266, had decreased by 49.

The average attendance on WEEKLY PRAYER MEETINGS was 1,323, a falling off of 65; that on Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes shows the large decrease of 764, the full number being 3,898,

and the active workers in these classes were 60 fewer, the number reported being 497.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS, of which there were 6, had increased by 1, Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 21, had decreased by 2, Christian Endeavor and other Young People's Societies show an increase of 18, of which 14 are Christian Endeavor, with a membership of 593, being an average of 43 to each.

There were 19 Manners, a decrease of 1, and 3 Rented Houses, reported the same as in the foregoing year. 1 Church was built, the previous year there were 2. No Manners in either year. In the Presbytery of Peterborough there were 36 Churches on Stations, a decrease of 13. In

the sittings which these contained, 10,750, there was a decrease of 548; in the number of families, 2,201, of 58; of single persons, 404, an increase of 3; and of members in full standing, 4,632, a decrease of 223.

On Profession, 266 members were added, an increase of 11; and on Certificate, 156, a decrease

The Removals by death were 72, an increase of 2; by Certificate, 103, a decrease of 88; without certificate, 86, an increase of 9; and by discipline, 2, the same as in 1895

192 infants, a decrease of 24, and 24 adults, an increase of 14, were admitted to the standing in Church to which the administration of this Sacrament entitles.

In the ELDERSHIP there were 150, a falling off of 25, giving about 4 to each church, and 1 to every 15 families and 31 communicants. Managers and Deacons numbered 229, an increase of 6, 1,045, a decrease of 34, attended the WREKLY PRAYER MEETING; and 3,024, a decrease of 334.

Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes, under 369, a decrease of 10, actively engaged in their interests. an average of 8 to each worker.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS numbered 14, an increase of 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 19, a decrease of 2; and Christian Endeavor Societies, 25, an increase of 4, with an average membership of 30 to each.

The number of MANSES, 12, was the same; there were no rented houses in either of the years. 1 Manse was built in 1895 and 1 Church in 1896.

The Presbytery of Whitby had 20 CHURCHES OR STATIONS each of the years, with 6,600 sittings. an increase of 250; 1,083 families, an increase of 36; 256 single persons, an increase of 8; and 2,216 communicants, an increase of 32.

Additions to membership rolls aggregated 155, of these 80, a decrease of 25, being on profes-

sion, and 75, an increase of 11, on Certificate.

The REMOVALS make 146, of these 39, increase 3, being by death; 88, an increase of 6, by Certificate; and 19, a decrease of 7, Without Certificate. No case of Discipline in either of the years.

Of 84 Baptisms, 76, an increase of 3, were infants; and 8, an increase of 2, adults.

There were 80 Ruling Elders, 5 fewer than the year previous, which gives 4 to each station, an average of 1 to every 13 families and 28 communicants. Other office-bearers were 152, or 14 fewer

than the year before.

WREKLY PRAYER MEETINGS were attended by 537, being 13 of an increase; Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes by 1,634, being 11 of an increase, and those actively engaged were the same in

number for each year, 194, an average of 8 scholars to each thus engaged.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS had declined from 9 to 7, and Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies from 17 to 16. Christian Endeavor and Young People's Societies, 15, had increased by 2, with a membership of 529—average 35.

According to the reports, Manses had fallen in number from 15 to 9, and Rented Houses from 2. Neither Church nor Manse was built in either year.

In the Presbytery of Lindsay there was an increase of 3 in the number of Churches or Stations, which were in all 24; an increase of 775 in the sittings, 8,900; of 288 in families; of 18 in single persons; and of 413 in Communicant members.

The Additions on Profession were 175, showing an increase of 37; and on Certificate, 98, which

gives an increase of 10. Altogether, there were 143 REMOVALS-34 by death, 1 of a decrease; 73 by Certificate, 39 of a decrease; 35 Without Certificate, a decrease of 10; and 1 by Discipline—there were no such cases the previous year.

Baptism was administered to 132, of whom 118 were infants, an increase of 27; and 14 adults.

To each of the charges there was an average of 5 Ruling Elders, and each of these had an average of 12 families and 24 communicants, the whole numbering 117, an increase of 17. Other office-bearers numbered 149, an increase of 33.

There was an increase of 204 in those attending WEEKLY PRAYER MEETINGS, namely, 1,070, giving an average of about 45 to each; an increase of 341 in those attending Sabbath Schools and in the report, its

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MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS were at work in 3 charges, an increase of 1; Woman's Foreign Missionary Associations in 18, an increase of 3; there were 13 Home Mission and kindred Societies, against 1 previously, and of these, 12 were Christian Endeavor, with a membership of 319, an average of 27 to each.

There were 12 Manses and 2 Rented Houses, an increase of 1 each. Neither Church nor Manse

was built during the year

In the Presbytery of Toronto there was the same number of Churches or Stations both years, 76, with a decrease of 35 in the sitting accommodation, 35,913; an increase of 481 in the families, 7,420, and of 1,446 in Communicants, 17,331, while there was a decrease of 350 in single persons, 4,118 being the whole number.

Additions of Communicants up to 2,124, of whom 949, an increase of 90, were on Profession, and 1,175, a decrease of 236, on Certificate. Over against this must be set the Removals, of whom there were 194, a decrease of 5, by Death; 927, a decrease of 170, by Certificate; 522, an increase of 119, Without Certificate; and 4. an increase of 1, by Discipline.

705 persons were BAPTIZED, 631 of these, a decrease of 5, being infants, and 74, a decrease of 6,

In the 76 Churches there were 484 RULING ELDERS, an average of 6 to each, and an increase of 66 in those in that office the preceding year, and there were 674 Managers or Deacons, a decrease

The attendance at Werkly Prayen Mertings was 3,286, not 50 to each, but an increase of 457 on the previous year, and Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes were attended by 14,103, a decrease of 80, with 1,537, a decrease of 12, taking an interest in this department of Church work, giving an average of 9 scholars to each.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS numbered 20, a decrease of 2; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies stood at the same figure, 51; Home Mission and kindred organizations were 59, an increase of 21, all Christian Endeavors, with a membership of 2,850, which gives each an average of 56.

There were 8 Manses and 1 Rented House each year, and in each 1 Manse was built; in the for-

mer 1 Church, in the latter 1 Sabbath School.

The Presbytery of Orangeville had 47 CHURCHES OR STATIONS, an increase of 2, and in these there were 9,820 sittings, an increase of 585, with 1,922 families, 124 of an increase; 437 single persons, 314 of a decrease, and 3,863 Communicants, 67 of a decrease.

In the Additions to membership on personal profession, 215, there was a falling off of 70; and on Certificate, 98, a falling off of 25. The REMOVALS were as follows: 66 by Death, 7 more than in preceding year; 148 by Certificate, 14 more: 59 Without Certificate, 16 fewer; and none by Discipling 4 the preceding year.

The Presbytery of Barrie is interesting because of the extensive Mission Fields it presents. Its Clerk, as usual, has been at great pains to collect returns, and, if those among delayed reports are counted, these are complete from pastoral charges and mission stations. It is only proper to add that they have been tabulated and the additions made with great accuracy. In this Presbytery there were 77 CHURCHES OR STATIONS under pastoral supply, an increase of 1 on the preceding year. In these there were 18,066 Sittings, a decrease of 450; with 3,169 Families, an increase of 164; 1,110 Single Persons, 23 of an increase; and 5,766 Communicants, 292 of an increase.

468, a decrease on the previous year of 18, were added on Profession, and 277 on Certificate,

The Presbytery of Saugeen had 24 Churches or Stations each year. The sittings reported, 8 030, show a decrease of 50; the Families, 1,604, of 57; Single Persons, 177, of 19; and Communi-

cants, 3,548, an increase of 116.

ADDITIONS to membership were 425, of these 330, an increase of 59, being on Profession, and 95, a decrease of 29, on Certificate, and the REMOVALS numbered in all 309, of whom 51, a decrease of 3, were by Death; 168, an increase of 45, by Certificate; 90, an increase of 26, Without Certificate. No removals by Discipline. In 1895 there were 5.

221 were BAPTIZED, 198 of these being Infants, increase 11, and 23 Adults, increase 1

According to the returns, there were 102 ELDERS, 4 fewer than the foregoing year, which gives rather more than 4 to each church or station; 1 to every 16 families and 35 communicants. Other office-bearers, whether Managers or Deacons, numbered 182, a decrease of 6.

There were 1,015 in attendance on Werkly Prayer Meetings, 113 of an increase, and allowing a proportion of more than 40 to each charge. Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes were attended by 2,470, an increase of 83, and these were cared for by 295, an increase of 17, so that each had more than 8 in average attendance.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS to the number of 12 were in operation, being an increase of 7; and also 16 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, an increase of 2; while there were 19 Home Mission and related organizations compared with 11 the previous year, and of these 17 were Christian Endeavor, with an average membership of nearly 56 and a total membership of 947.

There was 1 Manse fewer, 7, in 1896 than in 1895, but 2 Rented Houses more, 3; 1 Church was

built in each year.

The Presbytery of Guelph shows an increase of 2 in the number of its Churches or Stations, 30. There are also increases in the following: in sittings, 725, the actual number being 14,144: in families, 225, whole number 3,105; in single persons, 27, the number being 527; and in Communicants 280—actual number 7,590.

The Additions during the year were 380 on profession, an increase of 17, and 314 on certificate, increase 50; while the removals were by death 82, which was 34 fewer than the former year; by certificate 306, which was 45 more; without certificate 99, a decrease of 33, and by discipline 1; 110 case of such occurred the previous year.

#### SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

In the Presbytery of Hamilton there were 66 Churches or Stations under ministerial care, an increase of 1; having 22,503 sittings, decrease 640; 4,577 families, an increase of 196; 1,433 single

persons, being 231 of an increase; and 10,060 communicants, decrease 83.

The Additions were 596, a decrease of 38, on profession of faith, and 348, a decrease of 12, on certificate; while the removals were 130 by death, 2 of a decrease; 406 on certificate, 71 of an increase; 246 without certificate, 2 of a decrease; and 3 by discipline, 8 of a decrease.

BAPTISM was administered to 335 infants, a decrease of 41, and 93 adults, an increase of 3.

In the office of RULING ELDER there were 328, a decrease of 29, about 5 for each Church and 1 for every 14 families and 30 communicants; and Managers and Deacons numbered 458, a decrease

The ATTENDANCE at Weekly Prayer Meetings is reported as 2,034, an average of about 31 to each Station, decrease 347; in Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes there were 8,058, a decrease of 329; with 908 engaged actively in Sabbath School work, a decrease of 74, but allowing about 1 teacher to every 9 scholars.

Missionary Associations were the same, 18, each year. Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies had increased from 36 to 40; Christian Endeavor Societies from 24 to 36; while there was a decrease of 1 in kindred organizations, 7 in number, with a membership of 2,057, giving an average of 57 to each.

Manses, 35, had increased by 11, and rented houses, 1, by 1. Two Churches were built in

1896, only 1 in 1895. The Presbytery of Paris shows a decrease of 1 in the Churches or Stations supplied, 28. In these there were sittings for 11,639 worshippers, and connected with them were 2,855 families, an

In the Eldership there was an increase of 20, making the number 194, about 7 for each Church, and 1 for every 14 families and 30 communicants, while 225 filled the office of Manager or Deacon, an increase of 9.

There was a falling off of 102 in the number attending WEEKLY PRAYER MEETINGS, 1,462, an average of a little mere than 50 to each Church; and in the Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes there were 4,116, an increase of 309, who were attended to by 478, a decrease of 1, allowing more than 8 scholars to each.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATIONS were 16, an increase of 2; Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies remained the same, 18; Christian Endeavor Societies, 18, had increased by 4; other kindred organizations, 2, by 1; while the membership was 1,100, an average of more than 60 to each Christian Endeavor Society.

There were 15 Manses, an increase of 1; rented houses remained the same, 2; 1 Church was

built: neither Church nor manse in 1895.

The number of Churches or Stations supplied in the Presbytery of London was the same in both years, 51. In these there were 18,728 sittings, 275 of an increase, with 3,431 families, an increase of 106; single persons 813, an increase of 149; and 7,441 families, an increase of 58, on prefession, and 264, a decrease of 54, on ertificate;

The Additions were 439, a decrease of 88, on prefession, and 264, a decrease of 54, on certificate; while the removals were 96 by death, for a decrease; 233 by certificate, 26 of an increase; 59 without certificate, a decrease of 104; and 1 by discipline, 7 of a decrease.

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Baptism was administered to 259 infants, an increase of 15, and 76 adults, a decrease of 35.

#### SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA,

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Before taking up the Presbyteries in this Synod it is only proper to call attention to the fact that a new Presbytery was erected by the appointment of the General Assembly on the northern part of the Territory, lying in the Presbytery of Calgary, on the 14th July last. The new Presbytery was to embrace 14 Congregations and Missions, in 5 of which there were ministers all belonging to the existing Presbytery of Calgary. It is with a tinge of sadness in our feelings that we look upon Calgary as it was and is, but if mutilated its vitality is not impaired; it has still ample field for the forth putting of its energies, and we are persuaded that it will not be slack in turning its opportunities to good account. What has been stated must be kept in mind as explaining the decrease in this Presbytery, which has entered upon a new period in its history.

According to the returns of 1895 the Presbytery of Calgary had 77 Churches or Stations, those of 1896 give 20, a decrease of 57. In these there were 1,984 sittings, a decrease of 1,625; 448 families, of 419; 195 single persons, 156; and of 500 communicants, of 422.

The Additions of Communicants on profession were 35, a decrease of 34, and the same number on certificate, decrease 56; while 7, a decrease of 2, were removed by death; 36, a decrease of 4, by

The ADDITIONS OF COMMUNICANTS on profession were 30, a decrease of 34, and the same number on certificate, decrease 55: while 7, a decrease of 2, were removed by death; 36, a decrease of 4, by certificate; 7, a decrease of 8, without certificate, and 0 by discipline, a decrease of 1.

Additions during the year on profession, 12,075, which was 27 fewer than the previous year, and on certificate, 7,015, being 584 fewer.

Removals by death, 2,711, or 12 of an increase; by certificate, 6,406, increase 146; without certificate, 3,263, an increase of 99; and by discipline, 95, which was 67 fewer than the preceding year.

10,519 infants, a decrease of 134, were baptized; and 1,318 adults, an increase of 12.

There was an increase of 165 in the addersity making the number 6,007 which gives an apparature.

In taking up and examining the Financial Statements your Committee will not enter into the same details as in the Statistics. However important the former, yet the latter brings before upmore directly and impressively the Church in her internal character and condition. The examination of the department to which we proceed will be confined to the four items, Stipend Paid by Congregation Alone, Total Amount Raised for (1) Strictly Congregational Purposes, (2) for the Schemes of the Church, and (3) for Al: Purposes.

Inverness Presbytery, with its 24 Churches, paid \$5,668, an increase of \$835, for Stipend to those who ministered to them in the Gospel; \$9,032, a decrease of \$1,554, for Congregational Purposes; \$4,577, an increase of \$373, to the Schemes; and \$11,055, a decrease of \$903, for All Purposes. By the 102 Churches in the Presbytery of Halifax \$35,138, an increase of \$1,265, were paid as

Stipend; \$72,836, an increase of \$3,388, for Strictly Congregational Objects; \$14,839, increase \$116, to the Schemes; and \$92,313, an increase of \$7,410, for All Purposes.

The 42 Churches in the Presbytery of Wallace paid \$7,227, an increase of \$214, for Stipend; \$13,053, an increase of \$1,394, for Congregational Purposes; \$3,038, a decrease of \$286, to the Schemes; and \$16,878, an increase of \$1,779, for All Purposes.

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Pictou had 50 Churches which contributed and paid \$23,541, an increase of \$2,141, as Stipend: \$41,442, an increase of \$1,752, for Congregational Purposes: \$10,602, an increase of \$1,246, to the Schemes: and \$54,869, an increase of \$3,169, to All Purposes

Prince Edward Island has 79 Churches or Stations, and these paid \$23,209, an increase of \$3,026, for Stipend; \$37,818, an increase of \$1,187, f Congregational Objects; \$7,339, an increase of \$1,420, to the Schemes; and \$47,251, an increase of \$3,321, for All Purposes.

By the Churches, 40 in number, in the Presbytery of Lunenburg and Shelburne, \$5,010, an increase of \$1,269, were paid for Stipend; \$9,402, an increase of \$2,206, for Congregational Objects; \$1,340, increase \$328, for the Schemes; and \$11,180, increase \$2,714, for All Purposes.

The Presbytery of St John has 105 Churches or Stations, and these paid \$25,867, increase \$4,138.

The Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, with 56 Churches or Stations, paid \$25,774, a decrease of \$383 as Stipend; \$47,336, a decrease of \$1,654, for Congregational Objects; \$13,820, an increase of \$1,157, to the Schemes; and \$64,300, a decrease of 250, for All Purposes.

#### SUMMARY COMPARISON, FINANCES.

The Stipend received from All Sources in the 2,432 Churches or Stations was \$965,102, which gives an increase of \$58,321. Of this amount \$870,043 were paid by the Churches themselves, an increase of \$32,975, and giving an average to each Church of less than \$360.

Arrears of Stipend S15,004, show a decrease of \$4,034, and it is gratifying to your Committee and must be to the whole Church, to observe that steps were taken to wipe off the burden of undischarged liabilities that rested on these Churches.

On Manse and Church building and repairing, \$403,330 were paid, a decrease of \$21,490, although it is known from the reports sent in that 53 Churches and 22 Manses were built during

On other incidental Congregational Expenditures \$468,738 were paid, a decrease of \$15,566. On these two items, then, there was a falling-off to the amount of \$37,056, but no unfavorable couclusion can be drawn from this as to the prosperity of the Church as a whole.

The payments for strictly Congregational purposes were \$1,743,923, a decrease of \$2,675. On the amount raised for Congregational Purposes, \$1,137,832, there was an increase of \$107,704 and on the amount raised from Mortgage or other Securities, \$133,974, an increase of

Taking up in detail the payments to the Schemes of the Church it is seen that \$23,630 went to the Ordinary Fund for Colleges, and \$10,620 to the Special, an increase in the former of \$2,771, a decrease in the latter of \$704.

Total payments for All Purposes \$2,140,301, an increase of \$5,311.

According to the practice followed for many years, your Committee have prepared a Table which shows the average contribution per family and communicant towards Stipend, all strictly Congregational Objects, the Schemes of the Church and All Purposes. It would be instructive to compare this with those of preceding years and learn the progress made.

The average payment per family towards Stipend paid by Congregation alone was 88.51, a decrease of 26 cents, and per communicant member \$4.43, an increase of 2 cents.

The contribution per family for strictly Congregational Purpose averaged \$17.06, a decrease of \$1.03, and per Communicant \$8.88, a decrease of 40 cents.

For the Schemes of the Church each family paid on an average, \$2.84, a decrease of 6 cents, and each Communicant \$1.47, a decrease of 3 cents.

For All Purposes the average family contribution was \$20.95, a decrease of \$2.20; and each

Communicant gave to the same at the rate of \$10.90 very nearly, decrease 44 cents.

It will be seen from these figures that the liberality of the Church has not kept pace with the increase of its families and membership. It would be a thrice-repeated tale to ascribe this to the general depression of business, which undoubtedly was deep and prevalent, and yet, judging from the figures that have passed under review, there were parts of the Church in which, apparently, this was not felt, or her constituency made special efforts under their zeal for the glory of their Redeemer, denying themselves for His sake. Neither should the fact be overlooked that large contributions have been made by those belonging to our Church, as well as by others, to the Armenian Relief and Indian Famine Funds, which do not appear in the books of any of our Treasurers, whether local or general. It is a matter of congratulation and thanksgiving, that the appeals made in behalf of these sufferers was received with such a prompt and liberal response, and, while we say it not in any spirit of pride or boasting, yet it may be affirmed as a matter of fact, that the members and adherents of our Church were not among the last to come forward with their offerings.

Your Committee adds, as has been done in former years, since the last union of the sections that form the Presbyterian Church in Canada, a statement of Payments for All Purposes.

#### MISSION STATIONS.

#### STATISTICS.

For reasons given on former occasions, your Committee have not separated these in all cases from Pastoral Charges. They have done so this year in the cases of the Synods of the Maritime Provinces, of Montreal and Ottawa, of Toronto and Kingston, and of Hamilton and London.

In these 4 Synods there were, referring to the Table for particulars, 306 Churches or Stations, 21,725 sittings, 4,391 families, 1,474 single persons, and 5,843 communicant members.

Communicants added during the year, 511, of whom 395 were on profession, and 116 on certificate. Communicants removed during the year: 53 by death, 84 by certificate, 55 without certificate.

There were C. in the Eldership, of whom 144 were in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, 34 in that of Manual and Ottawa, 28 in that of the Maritime Provinces, and 25 in that of Hamil-

There were 2,578 in attendance on weekly prayer meetings, not an average of 9 to each Station and 4,356 on Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes, with 629 engaged in Sabbath School work, an average of 7 scholars to each.

There were 7 Missionary Associations, 1 in the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, and 6 in that of Toronto and Kingston; 23 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, 11 in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, 9 in that of Toronto and Kingston, 2 in Montreal and Ottawa, and 1 in Hamilton and London.

Christian Endeavor Societies aggregated 34, and Young People's Societies 4, with a member-

ship of 884.

There were 14 ms uses and 2 rented houses; 9 churches and 2 manses were built during the year.

#### FINANCES.

Received from all sources in payment for supply of preaching, \$20,926; and paid by the Stations themselves, \$22,990, an average of \$70 to each, and of \$5 to every family, and \$4 to every communicant.

There were arrears of \$1,263 in three Synods, namely Montreal and Ottawa, \$448; Toronto and Kingston, \$795, of which \$404 were in one Presbytery, Owen Sound; and Hamilton and London, \$20. No arrears in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces.

The following other payments were made: \$10,334 on church or manse, \$4,313 for incidental expenses, making an aggregate for the three purposes of \$37,637.

Raised for congregational uses, \$18,931, and on mortgage or other securities. \$939.

Payments to the Schemes of the Church amounted to \$2,133, of which \$55 were paid by Sabath Schools and Bible Classes, \$82 by Yeung People's or Christian Endeavor Societies; \$59 to
Home Mission Fund by Christian Endeavor, Home Mission, or other Young People's Societies connected with the Stations.

To Presbytery and Synod Funds \$91 were paid; to all other religious and benevolent objects, \$228; and to ALL purposes, \$40,089—an increase on the contributions of the preceding year.

#### RETROSPECT AND COMPARISON.

Your Committee would take the liberty of reminding the Assembly that the report with which they are dealing is for the twentieth year since the Union of the then existing two divisions of the Presbyterian denomination in Canada—a Union which had been preceded and prepared for of the Presbyterian denomination in Canada—a Union which had been preceded and prepared for by long, serious, and prayeful deliberation and discussion—which was a matter of gladness and gratitude to many, of anxious and unfavorable anticipation to others, of disapprobation and condemnation to comparatively few. That union had followed another which had been effected twenty-four years previously, also between two branches of Presbyterians, and also in the city of Montreal, which has thus been the scene of two important and widely influential events, or, it may be said, epochs, in the religious history of the country. Your Committee will be pardoned if they brighty refer to the position of the parties to these Unions at each of the dates of their consummation.

Does not the period reached in the history of the Church suggest that it is becoming to pause and look back on the way by which God has been leading us?

Does not duty demand that the retrospect be taken from the standpoint to which we have been brought? But an attempt at an historical survey must be resisted.

In 1861 the Union was between the Canada Presbyterian Church and the United Presbyterian Church in Canada. It will be remembered that the former consisted of those who had separated from the Presbyterian Church of Cauada in connection with the Church of Scotland, and who were moved to take this step by their sympathy with a similar movement on the part of hundreds of ministers and congregations, and thousands of people in Scotland—the mother country; and the latter of those who were bound by ties of sympathy and gratitude to that ecclesiastical organization in the same country which had resulted from the secession from the parent Church under the Erskines and their followers, under Gillespie and his followers. After various changes these secessions had been incorporated into the union of 1847, at which time the distinguishing and suggestive

commemorative name was taken of the United Presbyterian Church in Scotland.

However interesting and tempting to review the first planting and subsequent growth of these denominations in the land to which they had been directed to extend their operations, your Committee must forbear, but they cannot omit some statement of their numbers and work immediately prior to their union in 1861.

From a report on statistics for 1860, compiled with great care by Mr., new Dr. John Gray, who was then pastor, as he is still Pastor Emeritus of the congregation in Orillia, the following figures

are collected :-The number of Ministers in the 8 Presbyteries of which that Church consisted was 149; of communicants, 19,796; of Ruling Elders, 738; of week-day meetings, 322, at which there was an average attendance of 5,170, while the approximate attendance on the ministrations of the Lord's day was 50,911 at the forenoon diet of worship, and 37,300 at the later one, whether afternoon or evening. The number of manses was 44, an increase of 4 on the preceding year; families, 13,819; stipend promised, \$82,675; total contributions, \$134,953. We shall not follow out the additions of amounts contributed to the Schemes of the Church.

In a statistical report for the year ending 31st December, 1860, and presented at the meeting of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church in Canada in 1861 by the present Convener of your Committee, as part of the report of the Mission Committee, it is stated that no report had been received from the Presbytery of Canada East, in which there were 5 Ministers and 6 Congrega-tions, so that the report was not full. In other Presbyteries, too, there were 20 Congregations, just as there were some in the sister Church, which had not reported, detracting still farther from the actual position of the denomination, and the record of the work in which it was engaged.

In the 8 Presbyteries that had reported there were 63 ministers, 121 organized Congregations, and 33 Stations. The total average attendance was 16,297: members on the roll. 8,316: manufactured the state of

In the 8 Presbyteries that had reported there were 63 ministers, 121 organized Congregations, and 33 Stations. The total average attendance was 16,297; members on the roll, 8,316; members added during the year, 864, and removed, 475. In religious classes there were 5,085; attending prayer meeting, 2,448; number of churches, 92; sittings, 20,973; with 18 manses. The expenditure on stipend had been \$28,680.76; on church property, \$18,725.39; on Home Missions, \$2,630.87; on other Missions, \$684.45; on the Theological Fund, \$421.70½; other specified purposes, \$1,030.21; and incidental expenses, \$3,978.70. The total income had been \$52,016.134.

In a report on Statistics presented in 1875 to the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church, there will be found Statistics of Presbyteries from 1861, the year of the Union, till that From these it will be seen that an increase had taken place in the number of Ministers from year. regular charge, for the same period, the infiniters varying almost every year, was 2.11 the latter year, 85 in the earlier; vacancies also vary, but in 1861-62 there were 42, and in 1874-75 there were 72.

The first record of families is in 1865-66, when they were 19,229, and in 1874-75 they were 30 940.

In the course of the 14 years, that is from 1861-62 till 1874-75, the communicants had increased from 30,450 to 56,241, that is by 25,791. Mention need not be made of additions, diminutions and baptisms throughout the period, but the number in Sabbath Schools had risen from 14,005 to 37,655, and in Bible Classes from 4,604 to 10,373. There had also been an increase in Elders from 1,164 to 2,029, and in other office bearers from 1,963 to 3,148, both for the period ending with 1873-74, no report of those appearing in the following year.

Looking at the financial operations of the Church during this period it is seen that there was an equally gratifying progress. It would occupy too much time to present a detailed account

of these and your Committee will therefore confine themselves to a few particulars,

The stipend promised in the beginning of the period was \$106,757, and paid was \$104,144.41; in 1874-75 the amounts respectively were \$254,515.85 and \$270,690.23, the latter by the congregations

from their own funds without any aid from outside sources an increase of \$166,545.82.

Other contributions for Congregational Purposes had risen from \$56,937.07 to \$285,415.94, an increase of \$228,478.87, and the total contributions for these purposes had increased by \$390,550.67. the amounts being \$156,146.59 in 1861-62 and \$546,697.26 in 1874-75.

The Schemes of the Church at that time embraced College Fund, Home Mission Fund, Foreign Mission Fund, Widows' and Orphans' and Aged Ministers' Fund, Synod or Assembly Fund, French Canadian Mission, Kankakee Mission, and the total contributions for these in 1861-62 were \$16,346.59, and in 1874-75, \$57,876.02, an increase of \$41,529.43. In 1869-70 Sabbath Schools were requested to contribute to one or other of these Schemes, and their contributions were in addition to those by congregations and were included in the figures just given

Contributions to the College Building Fund were reported in 1861-62, 1863-64 and the six years beginning with 1869-70, and these amounted to \$69,934.32.

For other Benevolent Purposes the payments as might be expected, varied in different rs. At the first they were \$2,984.91, at the last \$32,112.26, an increase of \$23,127.35.

The total for All Purposes was \$195,027.88 in 1861-62, and \$667,274.29 in 1874-75, an increase of

8472,246.41.

The number of Manses had increased from 74 to 198, with 25 rented houses.

The following summations are presented: In the course of 14 years included in this comparison \$2,362,828.47 had been paid as Stipend; \$2,188,401.26 for Other Congregational Purposes; \$4,547,159.72 for All Congregational Purposes; \$520,502.37 for Schemes of the Church; \$204,105 for Other Benevolent Objects; and \$5,415,025.25 for All Purposes.

For reasons that will at once suggest themselves, a comparison cannot be made of the Totals in Statistics except in Additions, Diminutions and Baptisms, which were respectively 65,267, 36,817

and 61,129.

It would not be proper to pass on from this point without mentioning that, however gratifying the progress of the Church after the Union, the figures given do not state all. It was the complaint then, as it is still, that there are Congregations that did not send in their Returns. In the first year after the Union there were 57 such; in the last year, 1874-75, there were 27. Had these been actuated by the spirit of loyalty to their Zion, the results in all the items specified would have been more favorable, and increased reasons would be seen for abundant thanksgiving to the King and Head of the Church for the great things He had done for us.

In 1875, as mentioned before, the Union was consumated between the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland and the Canada Presbyterian Church. former of these began its work in Canada in the year 1765 with the Ministry of Rev. Geo. Henry at Quebec, and he was succeeded in that charge in 1784 by Dr. Spark, who was ordained with the view of taking that charge by the Presbytery of Ellon in Scotland. The next Congregation

The country was only beginning to open up to settlers, and the Church of Scotland evinced its desire to supply the spiritual wants of those choosing it for their home. Very interesting facts connected with its first and subsequent efforts are contained in "A Historical and Statistical Report of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in Connection with the Church of Scotland for the Year 1806," by Mr. James Croil of Montreal, whose name is well known throughout our land, whose influence and usefulness are felt extensively, and will continue to be after he has served his generation by the will of God and fallen asleep.

Through the kindness of Mr. Croil your Committee have had access to the Returns from Congregations in that Church for 1873. These do not embrace so many items as those of the Churches that have been under consideration, but the following is a summary of thom as given:

The number of Families was 11,945 or 59,725 persons, reckoning 5 as the average of each Family. Communicants numbered 17,274, and overseeing these in the Lord were 615. Some of the Congregations do not report their Eldership, if they had any in the office. In Sabbath Schools there were 10,292 and in Bible Classes 1,777, making an aggregate of 12,070, under 1,195 Teachers, an average of more than 10 to each. average of more than 10 to each.

The estimate of Stipend promised, including the sums received from the Temporalities and Sustentation Funds, hased upon the returns for 1873, from 70 Congregations, was \$63,998, which

Sustentation Funds, based upon the returns for 1873, from 70 Congregations, was \$0.5,528, which would give an average of \$914 to each.

Contributions to the Schemes, which were Widows' and Orphans', Bursary, French Mission, Sustentation, Presbytery's Home Mission and Manitoba Mission, for the year ending 1st May, 1874, were \$15,403, or adding Queen's College Endowment Fund, \$17,568.

There were paid for Other Purposes not enumerated \$47,482, and for All Purposes, \$104,661. Such, then, was the standing of this Branch of the Presbyterian Church two years before the Union of \$1875.

Union of 1875.

Your Committee come now to the Returns for 1875-76, ten years after the last Union, and

proceed to give the following particulars:

At that time there were 33 Presbyteries, but from 3 of these no returns had been received, and the same must be said of Congregations or Mission Stations in each of the others. Altogether 745 Congregations had reported. In these Presbyteries there were 706 Congregations, with 120 vacancies, with 1,135 Stations supplied in regular charge, and 130 not in regular charge. The number of Ministers was 579, of Families 54,132, and of Communicants 88,222; of Elders 3,412, which gave an average of about 16 Families and 26 Members in full Communic to each, and 4,970 which gave an average of about 16 Falmies and 20 Members in 10 Comminue to each, and 4,370 other office-bearers. At week-day meetings the attendance was 1,056, with 30 reported as held occasionally, the attendance not given. In Sabbath Schools there were 62,105, and in Bible Classes 17,099, making together 79,204, under 7,139 Teachers, an average of 11 scholars to each. The number of sittings in the places of worship occupied was 249,953, with 313 Manses and 35 Rented Houses. The Sacrament of Baptism was administered to 8,989 children and 501 adults.

According to the returns for 1895, twenty years after the one referred to, there are 50 Presbytisis in the Classes.

teries in the 6 Synods embraced in the Church in the Dominion, extending as it does from the Island of Newfoundland in the Atlantic to the shores of the Pacific, not to speak of those lying outside of Canada. In these Presbyteries or Synods there are, including Mission Stations, 2,738 Churches or Stations supplied, of which 2,432 are in connection with stated pastoral charges, with 56,829 sittings, an increase of 318,338; with 106,601 families, an increase of 52,472; Communicants, 202,247, an increase of 114,019. In the Eldership there were 7,138, an increase of 3,726, and allowing an average of 15 families and 28 Communicants to each, while the other office-bearers numbered 11,305, an increase of 6,335. The attendance at week-day prayer meetings was 67,006, and in Sab-

The attendance at week-day prayer meetings was 67,006, and in Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes 160,460, under 18,707 Teachers and others engaged in Sabbath School work, giving to each about 8 scholars. The increase in the attendance has been 81,256, and in Teachers 11,568. The number of Manses was 682, increase 309; and of Rented Houses 60, increase 25. Baptism was administered to 10,895 infants and 1,359 adults, an aggregate of 12,165, giving an increase in the former of 1,817, in the latter of 798; in both of 2,615.

Taking next the Financial Statements the following results present themselves in 1875-76 and 1896: The stipend promised from all sources in the former year was \$142,891.21, while in 1896 it was \$986,028, an increase of \$543,133.79; and the same paid by Congregations alone was \$105,192.25 and \$893,033, an increase of \$187,840.75. Payments for All Congregational Purposes amounted at the former date to \$835,668.094, and at the latter to \$1,781,560, increase \$915,891.90. It might be interesting to run our comparison through the different Schemes of the Church, but it must be confined to the total payments, which were: in 1875-6, \$93,610.62, and in 1896, \$292,513, increase \$193,802.38. The total contributions for All Purposes according to the earlier report were \$932,671.813; accord-

The total contributions for All Purposes according to the earlier report were \$982,671.81\(\frac{1}{2}\); according to the later, \$2,180,390, increase \$1,197,718.18\(\frac{1}{2}\). It may not be out of place here to remark that the total income of the Church since the Union has been \$35,762,635, exclusive of amounts contributed by Mission Stations, which for the last year were upwards of \$10,000, and upwards of \$37,000 the year previously. It should also be remarked that every year there has been an increase of income on the preceding one, except three, namely, 1886-7, when there was a decrease of \$47,301; 1890, of \$52,141; and 1893, of \$19,871. The aggregate of the increases alone is \$1,301,630, and if from this that of the decrease is deducted there is left a net increases. there is left a net increase of \$1,182,317.

Has not the Lord been mindful of us and blessed us, and if progress is an evidence of His approval it is manifest that He has given His to the union which brought together the two streams

or, say, three—of religious influence and effort which were flowing through our land. May it not be expected that he will bless us still?

And let it be remembered that no account has been taken in the record that has been compiled and offered of what He has called and enabled our Zion to do in the way of missionary enterprise and extension on the Foreign Field. It may be well said that a great door and effectual has been

opened, and He has inclined the hearts of His people to enter in. Wider opportunities are every day presenting themselves, and we are called to look upon many fields already ripe to the harvest. There are gratifying records of success already achieved; some account of these should, perhaps, have appeared in this report, but your Committee has not heretofore collected them, nor have they been instructed to do so. Promise of even greater results are before the faith of the Church. She is called to believe, pray, and be a ce-worker with God along the lines He has laid down for the attainment of His purpose that Jerusalem shall be made a praise to the ends of

the earth.

Your Committee were anxious to give a full and correct general summary on certain points of importance not embraced in the forms sent out to congregations. After considerable delay, and in some instances repeated applications, they have collected the following, but there is one Presbytery from which returns had not come, namely:—Calgary.

Collecting the replies given it is found that there were 936 Pasteral Charges in Presbyteries at the close of last year, and of these 21½ did not send in their annual report. There were 69 vacant charges, of which there were 5 in Sydney and Halifax each, 4 in Glengarry, Saugeen, Montreal; in 6 other Presbyteries there were 3 each, in 10 there were two each, 1 in each of 9, in 18 none, 2 no report. Of these vacant charges 14 had not reported. The number of Mission Stations was 494, but some of these were "groups," some "fields." In Halifax there were 10, including Ordained Missionaries; in Quebec and Cttawa 14, chiefly French; in Rock Lake 11 Fields with 40 Stations; in Regina 26; in Barrie 96; and so on. Only 6 Presbyteries report they have none, namely: Lunenburg and Shelburne, Whitby, Stratford, Huron, Maitland, Superior. Of these Stations 54 had not reported.

Miramichi does not report. The smallest numbers are in Superior and Melita, 4 in each. Besides these there are 47 Ministers whose names are not on the rolls of Presbyteries in whose bounds they reside, nor on the Appendix; 5 of these in Barrie, 4 in Montreal and 4 in Regina, 3 in Ottawa and 3 in Sarnia, and so on. Fifty-four Ministers demitted their charge during the year, 6 of these in the Presbytery of Halfax and 5 in that of Orangeville; in Peterborough 4, Barrie 3, not to come to lower figures. Six Ministers were translated on call to other congregations in the same Presbytery in which they had been settled, and 34 to charges in other Presbyteries, making 40 changes in all. Students to the number of 78 were licensed by 26 Presbyteries; the highest number, 12, being in Halifax, 11 in Toronto, 10 in Montreal, 7 in Winnipeg, and so down. During the year 11 Ministers, including 1 Student, died.

Of the 48 Presbyteries reporting, 41 close their year with the calendar year, 43 have Committees on Statistics, 32 call for names of non-reporting congregations at some meeting in the early part of the year, 34 devote some time to the examination of the report that is prepared for the Assembly's committee.

For years an effort has been made by the Committee on Statistics to ascertain with some degree of definiteness and certainty the total number of Presbyterians in the Dominion who were in attendance upon ordinances, or were under the care of the office-bearers of the Church, so that by comparing these with the number reporting themselves as Presbyterians with those employed in taking the decennial Dominion census they might be able to come to a conclusion as to the number living in neglect of spiritual privileges. For this purpose a question was introduced some time ago in the forms sent out asking for the total number under pastoral oversight. Owing to its meaning and design being misunderstood, or some other cause, very few Sessions replied to this, and it failed in its purpose and last year it was withdrawn. Your Committee are thrown upon the former practice of estimating the total Presbyterian population of our land.

According to the returns made there were in our Church 106,664 families, and reckoning each as consisting of 5 individuals, the number is 533,020. It is a question whether or not the number of single persons should be added to these, but doing this an aggregate is reached of 562,378. According to the last general census there were 754,213 Presbyterians in Canada, with 708 Reformed

and 425 others. This makes a difference of 191,835.

Or taking the Previnces, the census returns give 40,530 for New Brunswick, 108,520 for Nova Scotia, and 32,988 for Prince Edward Island; total, 182,038 for the territory covered by the Synod of Maritime Provinces, Newfoundland being included in the latter but not in the former. According to our returns the Presbytorian population is 23,263 families, which at 5 per family give 116,315, with 259 single persons, making an aggregate of 120,574, difference between the Dominion census and Church returns 61,464.

In the Province of Quebec there are reported 52,659 Presbyterians, and in Ontario 452,712, or a total of 505,371. As the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa takes in part of the Province of Ontario we cannot compare the returns from the one quarter with those from the other; but if we did it

would show a difference of 58,528.

Neither can we do this with those of Ontario and Manitoba, because our Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories embraces part of the Province of Ontario. But overlooking this and regarding that Synod as coterminous with Manitoba and the North-West Territories, the population according to the general census is: Manitoba, 38,997; the Territories, 12,547; total, 51,544. According to our returns 48,652, difference 2,892.

In British Columbia again the population is given as 15,260. Our returns give 19,670, difference 4,410 in favor of the Church, to be accounted for by the difference in territory.

To this there must be added the population in Delayed Returns, 629 families, 65 single persons, and in Mission Stations 4,331 families, 1,474 single persons, making an aggregate of

Your Committee conclude with the following recommendations:

1. That the Assembly renew with emphasis its injunction to Presbyteries to be careful, prompt and faithful in having returns from all the charges, whether vacant or settled, and stations in their bounds procured and forwarded to the Committee in good time, as required by previous injunctions

of the Supreme Court.

2. That Presbyteries have reported to them by their Clerk or the Convener of their Committee on Statistics the returns made, and that they spend some time in considering the same.

3. That the Committee to be appointed be instructed to adopt means for procuring and presenting in summary form information regarding the Church's equipment to prepare Students for the ministry, the state and progress of her work in foreign fields, and such other matters as may be expected in a Statistical Report.

### REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

(WESTERN SECTION).

Your Committee present herewith detailed statements from the Rev. Dr. Warden, General Agent of the Church, as to the several funds. The amounts received for the respective schemes are such as to call forth devout gratitude to God for the liberality shown by the membership of the Church during the year. The amounts received by Dr. Warden for the principal schemes, not including interest on investments, are as follows:—

The total amount of money received by the Agent of the Church during the year, including interest on investments, repayment of loans, etc., was \$527,687.81.

It is encouraging to report that notwithstanding the continued commercial depression throughout the country, nearly all of the schemes closed the year with a balance on the right side. While the Foreign Mission Fund is in debt to the extent of \$9,685.67, it is not because of lessened interest or diminished liberality upon the part of the people, because the contributions for Foreign Missions this year are \$26,000 in excess of the preceding one. If the contributions for the India Famine Fund are included, the total amount received for Foreign work is upwards of \$40,000 in excess of that of any preceding year in the history of the Church. This has been brought about largely because of the special appeal of the Foreign Mission Committee, which was responded to in an exceptionally liberal manner by the Church generally—It is undesirable that this should be frequently repeated. In the judgment of your Committee it is not wise to increase the expenditure of any Mission Scheme of the Church to such an extent as to require a very large amount in excess of the receipts of the preceding year.

Your Committee would again call attention to the desirability of congregations forwarding their Missionary money quarterly to the Agent of the Church. By so doing a large amount would be saved in interest. During the year just ended it was necessary to obtain advances to the extent of upwards of \$100,000, to enable the Agent to meet the payments in connection with various departments of the work. This entailed a heavy expenditure for interest—the amount for the Foreign Mission Committee alone exceeding \$1,500. It is encouraging to know that several congregations have adopted the plan of forwarding their Missionary money quarterly. The amount received in this way last year was about \$13,000. Were this method adopted by all the congregations of the

Church, it would be unnecessary to discount notes at the bank. As it is, nearly two-thirds of the total contributions for the Schemes of the Church are received during the last three months of the year.

As reported to last Assembly a considerable number of properties, on which loans were made in former years, have reverted to the Church, from the inability of borrowers to meet their engagements. In the financial statement appended to this report, full details are given regarding these. It must not, however, be assumed that the loss to be sustained will be at all the equivalent of the amount loaned upon these properties. While some of these are vacant lands, which bring in no revenue, and on which taxes, etc., require to be paid, others are revenue producing properties. Until they are disposed of the loss in annual revenue from year to year will be considerable. It is heped, however, that as Lusiness improves, the value of real estate will increase, so that the loss sustained may be reduced. Due care is being exercised so as to guard the interests of the Church in this matter, and to make the loss as light as possible.

With a view to reduce the expenditure in connection with printing, more particularly of the Assembly volume, your Committee would suggest the propriety of the annual reports of many of the Committees being greatly shortened. Apart from the question of expense there is greater likelihood of these reports being read, if reduced in size. With the existence of a Missionary Record published monthly, in direct connection with the General Assembly, much of the matter now given in annual reports could be published there, and that to advantage to the work of the Church generally. The circulation of the Record is in the neighborhood of 50,000 every month, so that the substance matter of many of the reports, if appearing in its columns, would be read by a much larger constitutency than at present.

At present the financial year of the Church closes on the 30th April. The time between this and the meeting of Assembly is so brief as not to afford suitable opportunity for adjusting accounts and carefully preparing the annual financial statements of the several Funds. Your Committee therefore recommend that hereafter the financial year terminate on the 31st March. This would not inconvenience the congregations of the Church, and would be of great service to nearly all of the Committees, some of whom pay half-yearly grants and claims in the end of March without knowing whether the receipts at the end of the year will be sufficient to enable them to do so.

### OBITUARY NOTICES.

Rev. John Mutch was born near Montrose, Scotland, 16th December, 1852. His parents came to Canada when he was a few months old and settled in the township of Egremont, Grey County. Ont. He received his preparatory education in Hamilton Collegiate Institute and Toronto University, and took his theological course in Knox College, from which he graduated in 1883, and on September 25 of the same year he was ordained as first pastor of what is now Chalmers Church, Toronto, where he labored with faithfulness and success for over thirteen years. Early last month, March, he was suddenly taken ill with appendicitis. An operation was performed, but on the 13th, after a little more than a week's illness, he passed from suffering to eternal rest.

Rev. John Campbell was born and spent his early life in New Brunswick. His literary and theological courses were pursued in Knox College, Toronto. His first and only charge was Granton, Ont., where he died in the early autumn of 1896. He was highly esteemed by those who knew him and successful as a worker.

Rev. Donald McLeod B.A., was born in Strathalbyn, P.E.I. He prepared for the ministry at Dalhousie College and the Presbyterian College, Halifax. He was ordained and inducted 21st August, 1878. In March, 1897, he ceased from his labors, being the minister of Priceville, Ont.

Rev. C. M. MacKeracher was born at Aberfeldy, Scotland; educated in Edinburgh University; ordained 22nd August, 1861; was minister at Gwillimbury and Bradford till May, 1867, in which month he was inducted to English River and Howick, where he continued to minister till he was called to his rest.

Rev. George Smellie, D.D., was born in the north of Scotland; educated at Edinboro' University; ordained in 1836, and inducted into the only pastoral charge which he held, in the land of his adoption, viz., Melville Church, Fergus, in the Presbytery of Gueland, Ont. His pastorate here began in 1843 and ended in 1896. His predecessor was the land of Academic Prior to Dr. Smellie's coming to Canada he was for some time assistant in one of the parish churches in North Britain, and he is the author of an interesting memoir of the late Rev. Dr. Bayne, of Galt, one of his co-presbyters. Dr. Smellie was a man of ripe scholarship, dignified and courteous to all with whom he had dealings. His influence as a man of God and minister of the New Testament was felt and acknowledged, not only by those with whom he was more intimately associated, but also over a wide region of Canada, east and west, and his name and memory will be long cherished in affectionate remembrance. Where best known he was held in highest esteem. Ever faithful to the charge "Preach the Word."

Rev George Porteous was born in Quebec in 1832. He received his collegiate training at Queen's University, Kingston, where he graduated in 1854. His first charge was on Wolfe Island, where he was ordained and inducted by the Presbytery of Kingston in 1860. Either as a missionary or settled pastor Mr. Porteous rendered service to the Church, under direction of Presbytery, in the following fields from time to time, viz.: Iroquois, Toledo, Harrowsmith, and L'Amable. Owing to ill-health he was permitted to retire from active service, when in 1897 death came to him as a messenger of peace.

Rev. Nathaniel Paterson was born in Galashields, Scotland; educated at Glasgow University and Knox College, Toronto; he was ordained 19th July, 1859. His pastorates were: Merrickville, 1859-62; York Mills, 1862-66; Martintown, 1866-78, and Bayfield, 1878 to the end.

Rev. Wm. J. Smythe, Ph.D., was son of a teacher. He was born in Belfast, Ireland; graduate of Knox College, Toronto, Queen's College, Kingston; ordained and inducted 20th October, 1878; died 1897, leaving a widow, two sons and one daughter. He was latterly pastor of Calvin Church, Montreal, by whom he was much beloved. In disposition he was kindly and self-sacrificing.

Rev. Hugh Lamont, D.D., who died recently at Little Metis, was one of our older ministers, and exceedingly kindly in disposition. Of Highland blood, he came to this country from Islay, Scotland, and was first settled in Finch, being ord ined 22nd Feb., 1865, among a settlement of his own people; afterwards having change of Dalhousie Mills, Lako Megantic and Little Metis.

Rev. John McGillivray was born in Goderich, 1858, son of an elder of our Church. He graduated from the University of Toronto in 1883 and Knox College, 1887. He was called to Melville Church, Westmount, Montreal, and ordained and inducted to that charge and remained in his first charge up to the time of his death, Feb. 1897. He was greatly beloved by his people, and held in highest esteem by his brother ministers of other denominations, who were well represented at his funeral. He leaves a widow and two children. He was a brother of Rev. D. McGillivray, of Honan Chinese Mission.

Rev. Henry Knox, O.M. Up to the time of his death Mr. Knox was serving as an ordained missionary in the bounds of the Presbytery of Guelph, on the mission of Hawkesville and Linwood. In early life Mr. Knox had followed the profession of teaching in various parts of Western Cadada, when he felt under God strongly drawn towards the work of the Christian ministry. On application to the Presbytery, Mr. Knox labored as catechist or missionary in different fields with increasing favor among the people, giving evidence of rare gifts along evangelistic lines. After a lengthened probation, application was made on his behalf for licensure and ordination with the view of his being designated to a particular locality. Leave having been granted, Mr. Knox was duly licensed and ordained. He then served for a time on the field alluded to until failing health compelled him to exchange it for one less laborious. An earnest and devoted servant of Jesus Christ, Mr. Knox gave himself wholly to the ministry of the Church, until in the spring of this current year death came to him suddenly as a messenger of peace.

Rev. Duncan Campbell, B.A., was born at Barrie, Ont., in May, 1858, receiving his elementary education in the Public and High School of that town. Coming to Manitoba he entered Manitoba College, from which he was graduated in Arts in 1888 and in theology in 1891. He was licensed by the Presbytery of Winnipeg in May, 1891, and ordained and inducted at Holland, Man., Aug. 11th, 1891. He remained in this, his first and only pastorate, till November of 1896, when he resigned owing to impaired health, largely due to overwork. His Sabbath duties during the five years of his ministry consisted of preaching three times, teaching two Bible classes and superintending a Sabbath School. After taking a much-needed rest it was his purpose to resume the work of the ministry, but the Master had ordered otherwise. After a brief illness he was called away March 8th, 1897, leaving a widow and two small children. Mr. Campbell was first clerk of Glenboro Presbytery, holding the position till the time of his resignation. Large-hearted, kind and sympathetic, he made friends of all whom he met. As student and preacher he was faithful and earnest.

Rev. Samuel Jones, Brussels, Ont., died on May 22nd, 1897, at the ripe age of 89. He was born at Kingston, Seymour, Wales, in January, 1808. He was brought up among the Welsh Calvinistic Methodists, and when a young lad began a life of Christian activity and usefulness. In 1853 he was ordained in the Baptist Church and labored as a missionary in Laneashire and Yorkshire, England. In 1856 he crossed the Atlantic and for seven years labored with the Baptist denomination at Elizabethtown, N.Y., and then removed to Canada, preaching at Beamsville and St. Marys, when in 1866 he applied for admission to the ministry of the Canada Presbyterian Church and was regived by the Synod of Hamilton. He was inducted into the pastorate of Knox Churc., Ainleyville now Brussels, on May 7th, 1867, where he labored with diligence, fidelity and success for twenty years, retiring from the active duties of the ministry owing to the infirmities of advancing years, with the approval of the General Assembly in 1887.
