



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

Special Cable to The World. PARIS. May 19. — (Copyright.) — There are now more than 1800 aero-planes in regular and active service in France. Each of them, under a bill introduced in the chamber of deputies by Minister of Public Works Thierry, must bear a distinguishing number like a taxicab, and every aeroplane must be subject to inspection at any time as to its airworthiness. There are also now in France more than ninety aviators with a license. These licenses in the Thierry bill are to be issued only to persons over 18 years old, and of good character. Air-men are to be made legally responsible for all damages. The carrying of ex-plosives, arms, carrier pigeons, cam-eras and wireless equipment is for-bidden. Keep Official Log.

Keep Official Log. A log is to be kept of every flight with passengers and the names of pas-sengers are to be open to officials' in-

spection. The aeroplanes of foreign govern-men's must not fly over France or her colonies. Rules as to foreign planes landing in France will be drawn up by executive officials, so that the govern-ment will be free to act as it pleases, without restriction of precedent or previous legislation.

From Fire.

Laden with tote-bags and grubstak-ed for months of sojourn in the wilds of Northern Ontario, the annual force of provincial fire-rangers has gone

of Northern Ontario, the annual force of provincial 'fire-rangers has gone forth to patrol waterways and forest districts and guard crown preserves from 'llicit practice or fire danger. In evidence of the intention of the gov-ernment to exert the utmost care in protecting this form of natural re-sources, only experienced men have been engaged this year and in no case was the application of one who had not served in the capacity before con-sidered by the minister. In all 300 men have been sent out to the different chief rangers for distri-bution among the organized regions, and these for the greater part are gath-ered from woodsmen and lumbermen who are well used to the woods and can swing an ax on occasion. This

can swing an ax on occasion. This latter feature has become a recognized part of the ranger's duties, the debris and slashings which often choke chan-nels and portages proving very sus-ceptible to conflagration. The list of rangers for the year shows
