## CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

 ox.rakio.Snow storms in all sections of the province have interfered with the movement of lumber during the past week. The trade, nevertheless, is in a prosperous condition, and numerous enquiries continue to be received for lumber of all grades. These enquiries are not confined to the home market, but come also from United States houses. There is a scarcity even of pine lumber, and sone of the mills on the Georgian Bay have disposed of their entire dry stock. Since Jauuary ist last prices of white pine have advanced $\$ 1.50$ per thousand, and Norway bill stuff $\$ 1$ per thousand. Some manufacturers have a sinall stock which they are holding for higher prices. The urgency of demand seems to pertain to common and low grade lumber, and particularly such stock as is adapted for boxmaking. There are but fer shingles which have not passed out of first hands Laths are also low in stock and firm in price.
Dealers are experiencing much difficulty in locating any quantuty of dry lardwood lumber; in fact, orders are being refused owing to inability to purchase the stock. This condition will be relieved to some extent when the mills resume operations alihough it is not expected that the supply will equal the demand for most kinds of hardwoods. There were taken out in Western Ontario during the past winter a large quantity of maple logs, and there is a possibility that as these are manufactured and the lumber placed upon the market, prices will weaken. Log-run maple is being held at $\$ 12$ at the mill a fipure which we do not tbink will be maintained. In basswood, clm and ash there suo reason to expect any eduction in present prices, but on the other hand manufacturers should not expect to ad-
vance quotations unreasonably. The mill men are offering their production as log run and in some cases reluse to consider propositions for graded stock. It is learned that contracts have been entered into for mill cuts of the coming season at $\$ 15$.

QUEBEL ANB NEW BRUSSWICh.
Lumbermen in the province of Quebec are somewhat dissatisfied with the outlook for local trade. The season so far has been backward, and unless conditions mm prove, it will be difficult to adiance prices, although present quotations leave a marin of profit altoxicther inadeynate. The larger manufacturers cutung for export trade hope to sell their production at prices equal to those of last year. In New Brunswick trade prospects are improving, and the shipments to Great Britain, France, South America and the West Indies will likely consume the bulk of iheseaton's production of export lumber. An average domestic trade is also looked fot, $d s$, in addition to the usual building inerations, extensive harbor improve ments at St. John are likely to be undertaken.

MANITOMA AND bRITISH COIUNRIA
The spring trade in Manitoba and l3ritish Columbia has not yet commenced in full force, yet the lumber market is very strong. l'rices are advancing, and dealers are stocking up in antucipation of a large demand this year. Steps have been taken by both the manufacturers and dealers which are likely to result in placing the trade on a better footing. The Rat Portage mills supplying the Manitoba market have made a 50 cent advance on No. I and No. 2 red pine, No. 3 finishing, 1 1., it and $=$ inch red pine selects, and No. 3 clear white pine. No. 1 and No. 2 white pine have made the substantial advance of $\$ 3.70$, while laths are marked down five cents. The classification of boards has been changed so that ten to eighieen teet are now quoted at the same price all through. British Columbin siding, ceiling and flooring were recently
 higherthan last fall. British Columbia red cedar shingles are quoted at $\$ 2.25$ for No. 1, and \$2 for No. 2, delivered in Winnipeg. Some Washington shingles are being offered in Manitoba at $\$ 2.10$ but they are said to be of no better quality than British Columbia No. 2.

The retail dealers have taken similat action to that of the manufacturers, and have issued a new price list showing an
advance on various classes of luniber. They have also agreed to adheie closely o this list, and hope in this way to do a more profitable business. Last year cutting of prices was carried on to an un reasonable extent, and consequently few of the dealers inade a fair margin of profit.

Eistern dealers have purchased ireely in Wisconsin and on the upper lakes, the advanced prices asked by manuiacturers seeming to have no deterrent effect. In the pine trade the chief interest peatains to box lumber, as, it it is a question difficult'of solution as to where the stock will be ublained to keep the factories in operation. Mill culls are selling at from $\$ 7$ to $\$ 8$. and holders show no anxiety to dispose of their stock even at these figures. Al. though during the past winter there was a heavy input of logs, it is unlikely that the production of box lunber will exceed the production of box present prices will likely be maintained present prices will throughout the season, has alsn a stronger tone, and short ket has also sis lomber is likely to witness a good spring lumber is likely to witness a good, lath and demand. ## yormicn.

Advices from the l3ritish market tell of an active consumption of wood goods and a slight improvement in prices for delivery to consumers. At several of the poits the stock of spruce and pine is becoming teduced, and it is thought that importers will this month show a greater disposition to contract for new stock. When they realize that the production of lumber in Canada this year is likely to be slighty below the average in quantity, they will no doubt contract more freciy for their requirements.

## NEW BRUNSWICK CEDAR SHINGLES.

Jrices of cedar shingles liave again advanced, market quotations now being as follows, delivered strictly on boston freight rales : 1: x rass, $\$ 2.55$ to $\$ 2.90$; Clears, $\$ 2.45$ to $\$ 2.50$; Saps and 2nd Clears, \$i.goto $\$ 2$. The indications now ate much in favor of continued advances. The usiner mulls are practically cleaned nut of all grades, and have alteady, accepted enough orders to consume all that can tre bade hefore they are olsliged to shat down; in fact, a mumber of winter mill operators are owersold, and are seurying around anongst themselves in an endeavor to replace sone of their aceepted orders at frgures that will alluw them to escijec withous loss, best they are finding a great ical of diffichity in so eeplacing such oidets, it is yet about zwo montis hefore the hemembthe a decat deash Befure that lime, thete binst ie agreat deanth of shmgles, and operamps whu can supply the goons will then be ahle whet their asking price wither this year for anything lme :accentiontedelivery.

## STOCKS AND PRICES.

The lligh Commissioner in I.nadon, Eng., bas received enguiries for addresses of Canadian shipyers of wood pulp and walnut and birch logs.
At Alpena, Mich., sales of black ash are being made at $\$ 17$ per thousand, clm at $\$ 10$, and heminck at $\$ S$ and $\$ 0$. Alill culls are sclling as high as son.
J.1). Nedrthur's men have finished cuiting loses on the Bird Tail Creek limits io the nortit of liirtle, Man, and are now to the norti of birite, Man, and are wow be preparing for the drive
cut at die dirtle mitl.
The Columbin River I.umber Co, of Golden, 13.C., have liad $2,000,000 \mathrm{ft}$. of logs :aken out this winter at Blacberry.

These will be flated into the Columbia river by means of a chute.

It is announced that F. P. R. (iraves, of Siginaw, Mich., has contracted for the shingle :imber on 10,000 acres of land near Spanisis diver, Ont., antl that he will buld a shingle mill at that point.

Three timber berths on the 'Iatagouche river, in New Brunswick, aghegamm 25 square miles, were sold at the crown lands office, l-redericton, N. 13., hast week, to Sunner $\&$ Co., at the upset price of $\$ 8$ per mile.
W. W. Harris, a pulp woud contractor in the Sudbury distict, states that during 1898 he handled over 100,000 , cords of wood, principally poplar. The supply of wood in that district, he says, is practic ally inexhatistible.
J. A. Christie, of Brandon, Man., had about 150 men it work this winter in eacl of has logeine camps at Shell River and on the MicLaren-Shields limit which he recently purchased. The logs cut on these limits will be sawn at his mill at Brandon.
J. D. McArthur, who has purclased the lumbering business of H. l: Mitchell at Selkirk, M:In., will operate the plant on an extensive scale this winter. The pur chase includes the mill at Selkirk, extensive timber limits on Lake Winnipes, lumber on hand, etc.
J. R. McConell, the well known lumbernan of Marysville, N. 13., has finished operations on the Aroostook river. The cut in that vicinity was about $2,500,00$ feet Mr. McConnell has disposed of all his lurber to the Ashland Lumber Co., at a very satisfactory figure.
The Department of Trade and Cummerce at Ottawa has received a communi cation from Mr. W. Grey- Wilson, C.M.G., Governor of the Falkland Islands, asking for quotations for specified quantities of lumber, chiefly pitch pine and white pine. The quantity figures up to about 250,000 feet.
J. E. McCollum, who has been lumbering oas a tributary of the Tobique river, in New Brunswick, estimates the producion of lojs on that river this winter at about $18,000,000$ fect, as against 24,000 , 00 feet last year. Most ot this is spruce, although R. K. Beveridge, IV. Reed and L. Reed got out a quantity of red pine.

Inness, Homeon $\&$ Co. are cuting $1,000,000$ feet of pulp wood for the Acadia l'ulp Company, near Liverpool, N. S. G. A. Colp is getting out a million feet of pulp wond in the same neighborhood. $D$. C. Muthall and J. A. Hunt are cutting a large quandity near Liverpool for them. selies and for the Acadia l'ulp Company.

The trade retuins for the Dominion for the elght months ending February 2 Sth last show an increase in the aggregate trade of the country of $\$ 11,640,441$, as compared with the same period of las year. Produce of the forest was exported to the value of $\$ 20,292,2 \mathrm{~S} 9$, as akinst $\$ 20,599.540$ for the corresponding period one year isgo.
The Nova Scotia government has just sranted a lease for 30 years of timber lumits in Vicioria and Inverness counites Cape Breton, N. S., to thee American capitalists, Messrs. l.. Sanborn and Robi 13. I3lodjett, of loston, and Daniel F Eimery, jr., of Poriland, Me. Ihe limits comprise nearly 1,000 square miles, and are leased for the purpose of converting the timber therenn into pulp and paper. The purchasers will form a company, to be known as The North Alwerican Paper and rulp Co., L.id.
