





ORGANIZATION OF CONFERENCE.

At the hour of 9 o'clock a.m., on Wednesday, the 5th June, the Conference met in the John Street Church, in the City of Hamilton. The Co-Delegate, the Rev. W. Jeffers, D.D., in the Chair.

QUESTION I.

Who have been appointed by the District Meetings to attend the Conference, and what Members of Conference are now present?

ANSWER.

After the usual devotional exercises, the Co-Delegate called for the names of the Ministers appointed by the District Meetings to attend the Conference. It was

found that three hundred and six had been thus appointed, of whom one hundred and ninety-five answered to their names.

The Co-Delegato briefly addressed the Conference, and read an extract from the reply of the British Conference to the address of this Conference last year, appointing the Rev. Jas. Elliott President of the Conference, and the Rev. Samuel Rose Co-Delegate for the coming year. The Rev. Jas. Gray was elected Secretary.

Ques. VI. Who have died since last Conference?

1. REV. HORACE DEAN.

He was born in Owego, Brome County, New York, on the 6th of January, 1799, and was brought with his family to this courtry while in his infancy. When about seve teen years of age he gave his heart to God, and his life to the service of the Church, through whose instrumentality he was induced to seck the Saviour. Six months after his conversion, his name was placed on the Circuit plan as an

exhorter, in which capacity, as well, as that of local preacher, he laboured zealously and successfully for Christ and for souls. At the York Conference of 1831, he was received on probation for the Christian ministry; and at the Hamilton Conference of 1835, under the Presidency of the venerable Wm Lord, he was ordained and admitted into full ministerial connexion. Newmarket, Whitby, Brock, Toronto, Barrie, and Rama, as well as other fields of labour, still retain pleasing reminiscences of Bro. Dean's self-denying services in his Master's cause. He spent some years of his itinerant life among the aborigines of the country, to whom he taught, in addition to the great truths of revelation, many valuable lessons pertaining to the secular-By precept and by example he incu cated ities of life. industry, punctuality, and sol riety, to his Indian audiences.

Bro. Dean was a plain, unassuming man; but, withal, courteous in his manners, grave and ministerial in his spirit and deportment. His expositions of divine truth, while they were clear and easily understood, se dom failed to carry conviction to the impenitent, and comfort to the believer. Few, if any, could listen to the fervent, pleading prayer of our late brotser, whether offered in the pulpit or at the domestic altar, without having the conviction forced on them that he " walked with God." In 1855 he took his place among his brethren, 'superannuate', 'and during the eleven years of comparative retirement, he laboured with very great acceptability in the pulpit, in the prayermeeting, and gothe members of his class, and in visiting the sick. His last sickurss was short. Only the sabbath three weeks pror to the closing scene he was at his appointment on a dis ant part of the Circuit, and hardly two short weeks was to shut up in the sick chamber ere his spirit passed away to the skies. He was patient, resigned, and hopeful in his sufferi gs Christ was the streng h or his heart, as he often excressed himself. He had great peace, and a brigh and blessed prospect of a better life. And when I fe's weary wheels stood sill—at noon on the Sabba h day, November 11th, 1866, aged 68-God took him home to share the felicities of the redeemed.

2. REV. ROBERT SHAW, B. A.

Brother Shaw was born in the Township of Goderich, on the 17th of September, 1835, and was savingly converted to God in the auturan of 1849 After spending six years at Victoria College, and completing the course of study in

that Institution, he was received as a probationer for the work of the Christian Ministry in June, 1859; and after about seven and a half years of faithful and useful labor, he fell at his post on the Point Abino Misson, on the 13th of

January, 1867, in the 31st year of his age.

His disease, typhoid fever, was brought on by excessive labor, and after a short but severe illness of ten days, terminated fatally. But he was ready for the change. When first taken ill he sald to his anxious and devoted wife, that if it were the will of the Lord he would like to live longer that he might do more to promote the glory of the Saviour, who had done so much for him, but immediately added—"But I am the Lord's—yes, blessed Jesus, I am thine; I bow to thy holy will;" and from that time his mind was calmly and sweetly stayed on God, assured that as for him to live had been Christ, for him to die was gain.

Bro. Shaw was young man of most amiable disposition; modest, kind, and unselfish, beloved by all who knew him, and most beloved by those who knew him best. He was a dutiful son, an affectionate brother, a devoted husband.

a true friend, and a sincere Christian.

He possessed an improving mind, was a good scholar, a diligent student, a faithful pastor, and an earnest, practical, and useful preacher, and had he been spared would doubtless have risen to a high position of influence and usefulness in the Church.

3. REV. OBRIN H. ELLSWORTH.

The Rev. Orrin H. Ellsworth was born in 1817. He was awakened to a sense of his fallen condition, and savingly converted to God, when about 19 years of age. He at once evinced.

" A yearning pity for mankind, A burning charity."

Anxious to save souls from death, he began to exhort sinners to flee from the wrath to come, and, for five years, as a local preacher, faithfully served the Church of his choice. In 1852 he was called, to devote himself fully, to the work of the Christian ministry. Having travelled one year under the direction of the Chairman, he was ceived on trial at the Hamilton Conference in 1853, and, for the next fourteen years, travelled, successively and successfully, in the following circuits: Vienna, Paris, Stratford, Mitchell, Bayfield, and Kincardine; here, the Christian warrior fell at his post, victorious:

Mr. Elisworth was a truly good man. In all the relations which he core to his family, the Church, and the world, he adorned the Christian character; he enjoyed and preached a full salvation. He was a faithful minister of Jesus Christ; his popularity as a preacher rested not so much on the brilliancy of his efforts, as the plainness and unaffected simplicity with which he presented the vital truths of Christianity. He was particularly felicitous in introducing into his discourses illustrations from nature's open book; arresting the attention of his audience, and, with the quickness of thought, serding the barbed arrow to the conscience and the heart. Many a wanderer from God recognized in him a Nathan, saying to them, "Thou art the man"

Domestic and personal affliction were alike borne with becoming patience and submission. After his robust frame had become exhausted by waiting upon the sick, and he had seen his noble boy fall a prey to the malignant fever, his time came to lie down upon the bed of death." There he lay for nearly six long weeks, after his son s decease, till the brittle thread was severed. Jesus was always felt to be near to comfort him. He did not seem conscious that the Master was about to call him home so soon. He thought that he would soon recover to cheer his sorrow-stricken companion, and to resume his loved employ. But, when asked by one of his ministerial brethren, if he felt Christ dear to him, he replied, "My-Saviour-precious" To another, he said, "Religion is now my only comfort" And, when asked by another, if he felt ready, if the Master should call for him, he replied, "Ready, morning, noon, or night." Thus died our beloved brother Ellsworth, just having entered on the fiftieth year of his age, and in the fifteenth of his ministry.

4. REV. JOHN BLACK.

The late Rev. John Black was born in the town of Gorey, County of Wexford, Ireland, September 18th, 1790. He was brought up under the teachings of the Church of England, of which his parents were rigid member; but he "ran," (to use his own words,) " with the giddy multitude in the broad-ray, forgetful of God and eternity."

Having complied with the request of a near friend, in the year 1806, to hear a Methodist preacher, he was convinced under the sermon, "that the Preacher was a man of God," and himself a sinner, sure, if he died in his present state, his lot would be with the unhappy damned; and the conviction lay heavy on his heart for some time. A series of very heavy afflictions brought back with power thoughts of God and Eternity, which had measurably declined.

"I cried to God for mercy, Lord spare me a little longer that I may become acquainted with thee and with thy people. The Lord heard my prayer, and he raised me up." He now became a constant attendant on the Methodist ministry, travelling some miles to reach the nearest appointment.

At a prayer meeting in the year 1813 he was powerfully

converted to God.

"All the day long Christ was my joy and my song, and I, one of the weakest of men, knew that he is a prayer hearing and a sin-forgiving God." "I had my name enrolled with those whom I esteemed the people of the Lord, and by waiting upon God I obtained spiritual strength"

In 1819 he was appoint d leader of a class, and from time to time exercised his gifts as an exherter. In 1820 he emigrated to Canada, and in 1824, at the call of the Presiding Elder, the late Rev. Henry Ryan, went out to labor as a Methodist itinerant on the Cornwall circuit. In his own expressive language, "with Christ in my heart, and the prayers of the Church, I went out to warn sinners to flee from the wrath to come. Lord help thy servant that I may preach Christ and him crucified, and hold forth to the people a free, full, and present salvation."

Thus he continued for thirty two years amid the privations and arduous toils of the early itinerancy, travelling in succession the Cornwall, Rideau, Cobourg, Toronto, Perth, Mississipi, Ottawa, Peterboro', Bay of Quinte, Consecon, Colborne, Bath, Sidney, Napanee, Brighton, and Stirling Circuits, maintaining, as his journal shows, close communion with God, the most affectionate feelings to his colleagues, and solicitous concern for the souls committed to his charge: at the close of a very arduous year, remarking,—"I have heard that the love of Christ draws men through it e and through water, I know that his love and the worth of souls drew me through swamps and settlements."

In 1856 he was placed in a superannuated relation, continuing, how ver, to labour as his strength would a low, on the Si ney and a joining circuits.

In the fall of 1866 he was compelled by increasing infirmities to lay aside entirely the long loved and faithfully julfilled task of life. Much of the latter portion of this

time was spent in silent retirement with God. "I love Jesus and Jesus loves me," was the simple and expressive

experience of these closing scenes.

Shortly before his depature, in answer to an inquiry of a friend concerning the state of his mind, he answered with great earnestness—"Peace, thank God, perfect peace," after which he sank into a state of unconsciousness, till on the twenty—eighth or April, 1867, amid the tears of a loving a d sorrowing people, and honoured and beloved by his brethren, the s rvant of the Lord exchanged mortality for life, in the 76th year of his age, and the 43rd of his ministry.

H- was possessed of refined and gentlemanly manners, of a loving and humble spirit, much opposed to censoriousness, which he scrupulously avoided, and would reprove by silence, or sudible adminition, if indulated in in his presence. Until lotimately known he was of somewhat eccentric traits of character, but of exquisite ability in the management of the Church, and he succeeded to a degree rarely attained in winning to himself the affections of the people. He lived and deed honoured and beloved by all who knew him.

5. THE REV. GEORGE F. PLAYTER.

The Rev. G. F. Playter was born in the city of London, England, in the year 1809. His first religious impressions were experienced when he was but five years of age, while in the city of Exeter. Early in life there was awakened within him a love for literature. This love continued through all the mutations of life, and he has left behind no little fruit of literary toil. In his eighteenth year he was converted under the ministry of the Rev. J. Burgess. His opening christian life was marked by great conscien-

tiousness, simplicity, economy, and liberality.

Six years after his conversion he came to Canada, settled in Montreal, and after much prayer, meditation, and abstinence, he clearly saw his providential path conducting to the itinerancy of the Wesleyan Church. He entered it, committing himself to the arduous and responsible work of the ministry with great self-distrust, yet with strong religione into the promised help of Him who hath said. 'Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world'. The first Conference appointment of Bro Playter was to the Matilda Circuit, in 1834, under the superintendence of the Rev. J. Carroll—one whose loving heart, intellectual abilities, and ministerial experience eminently fitted him

to cheer in discouragement, and to guide in perplexity. The remaining years of his probation were spent in Bytown, Gananoque, and Perth. He was ordained in Kingston, June, 1838. The six succeeding years were spent upon the Ottawa, Richmond, Sidney, and Yonge Street Circuits. During a part of this time Mr. Playter gave himself largely up to literary subjects, preparing two voluminous works for the press. These cost an immense amount of research and labour, and secured every hour that could be withheld from public duties. The manuscripts are a monument of his patient, persevering, literary and unrequited toil.

In 1840 Bro. Playter issued his "Voice from Canada." He was a writer of great power, clearness, and logical force. In 1844 he was elected Editor of the Christian Guardian, and retained that office for two years. The following year Mr Playter was appointed to Belleville and Shannonville, and the succeeding one, 1847 to Norwood. At this period our departed brother passed through great mental conflicts. The question of retiring from the active ministry, which had previously perplexed him, recurred, and pressed itself upon him with accumulated force, greatly harrassed him. He mentally debated the point long and anxiously, and finally determined to retire from the itinerancy. That he might have greater facilities for publishing the works he had carefully prepared in manuscript, he purchased a press and established himself in the town of Picton. He continued in connection with the press there for two years. This, in after life, he regarded as a grave error, and he sincerely regretted the false step he had taben. Though honestly designing to do right, he became fully conscious of the error of his judgment, and returned to the effective work in 1849, when he was appointed to Brighton, where he remained for three years The remainder of his work, as a travelling preacher, extending over a further period of six years, was performed on the Rawdon, Napanee, and Waterloo Circuits.

He retired upon the Superannuated List in 1858, taking up his abode upon his own farm within the bounds of the Frankfort Circuit His History of Methodisk Canada was here completed. One volume alone was issued, and is a volume of g eat interest Like many other a the s, however, Mr. P. did not find publishing to be remunerative and the financial loss entailed upon him by the issue of his first volume, induced him to suspend the issue of his second.

He lived to complete the History, leaving in manuscript ready for the press another volume, bringing the whole

down to the year 1847.

As a preacher and as a writer, Bro. Playter was more forcible than elegant. Strength rather than splendour appeared both in his writings and in his sermons. A downright honest and independent man, he contented himself with the naked statement of facts, and the plain exhibition of truths, without the slightest attempt at adornment. Perhaps he would have added to his fame and not have impaired his usefulness had he been less indifferent to all embellishment. But he was satisfied to present his thoughts clearly before the public, and apparently anxious to do so in as few words as possible. His sermons were remarkable for their clearness. He uttered nothing at random, nor anything not worth the uttering.

Through his whole christian course he sought to live a godly life. He was a man of rayer and of deep devotion. His professions were not loud, but he was a sincere, humble

lover of the Saviour

During his last illness our dear brother was fiercely assaulted by the enemy, but his confidence in his God was unshaken. He was made very happy, and this happiness continued till raised to the enjoyment of the fullness of joy in his Father's presence. He suffered long, and at times severely; but he received promised grace in required measure. He was a true Wesleyan. With the sermons of John, and the hymns of Charles, he was very familiar; and some of his last verbal efforts were to repeat stanza after stanza of the incomparable lyrics of the peerless Charles Wesley. He died in "the full assurance of hope," on Wednesday, the 24th of October, 1866, in the fifty-fifth year of his age, and in the thirty-second of his ministry.

6. REV. THOMAS CAMPBELL.

Our deceased brother was born of pious parents, members of the Wesleyan Church, in the north-west of Ireland, who brought him up in "the nurture and admonition of the Lord." The family emigrated to this country, about forty years ago, and settled in Canada East. In 1832 he attended a series of religious services, conducted by the late Rev. Wm Squire, in Montreal, when he became deeply concerned for the welfare of his soul; and, while the congregation were singing the doxology, he was enabled to believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, to the saving of his soul. He was

shortly afterwards appointed to the offices of class-leader and local-preacher, and he discharged these duties with punctuality and zeal. In 1837, he was proposed and accepted as a candidate for our ministry; and having finished a satisfactory and useful probation, he was ordained in 1841. He travelled several circuits in Eastern and Western Canada, until declining health incapacitated him for our itincrant work, and he was superannuated in 1860. Our beloved brother was a minister of deep piety, never light or trifling; he always maintained the gravity becoming the sacred office.

A few weeks before his eath, he had a slight attack of paralysis, which made the impression upon his mind that he would not recover; and he said to a friend, "The vessel is wrecked, but the cargo is insured." On his deathbed he stated, "I have no ecstacy, but I have abiding peace; I have no doubts, fears, or temptations; all is peace; I am walking through the valley and shadow of death; but I fear no evil, God is with me; yes! God is with me. 'For to me to live is Christ; and to die is gain.'" These were the last words of the dying minister of Christ. He departed this life on the 12th of November, 1866, in the fifty-fifth year of his age and the 29th of his ministry.

7. REV. HENRY BERSON.

He was born the 7th of December, 1829, in the town of Nottingham, England.

His parents were Wesleyans, and his father a local preacher. When 15 years of age he removed to the town of Leeds, Yorkshire, where he resided for several years, during which period he became truly converted to God in 1857 Mr. Becson came to Canada, and connected himself with the Wesleyan Church.

In 1858 he was admitted on trial by the Conference, and appointed to Chatham. In 1860 he was appointed to the city of Hamilton, and laboured with great acceptance to the people In 1864 he was received into full connexion with the Conference, and ordained, and was appointed to the Chaudiere Mission, in connection with the city of

Ottawa, where he was universally beloved.

An insidious disease began to develop itself in the first year of his labours in that place; but, during the second year, it assumed a malignant type; and, after painfully severe and protracted suffering, terminated in death.

During his illness patience had its perfect work, and a heavenly sweetness marked all his conversations. He enjoyed a full assurance that all would be well, whether life or death. Resting on the precious atonement, he rejoiced greatly in the possession of an unwavering confidence in the biessed Saviour, and a glorious hope of immortality.

TREASURERS OF CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COM-MITTEE FOR 1867.

Your Committee rejoice in being able to report steady progress in our Sunday School work throughout the entire Connexion.

The improved Schedules issued during the past year have furnished your Committee with a more complete and comprehensive view of the state of our Sunday Schools than in any former year. The information thus supplied, is, on the whole, very gratifying, exhibiting, as it does, an increase in the number of teachers, and of scholars; and, also, showing that nearly fifteen thousand dollars have been raised by the schools during the year, of which about four thousand dollars were for Missionary, and eleven thousand dollars for school purposes. At the same time, there are certain facts which are not of so pleasing a character, and which demand the serious consideration of the Conference.

While the Reports show an aggregate of about fitteen hundred preaching appointments in the various Circuits and Missions, there are but a little over seven hundred Wesleyan Schools in operation. Of this number, less than one-half are governed by the disciplinary constitution, while in more than three hundred the catechisms of our Church are not used; two hundred and sixteen Union Schools are reported, in which our people co-operate. The entire staff of Teachers amounts to nearly seven thousand, of whom more than two thousand are not members of our Church.

Your Committee would again call the attention of the Conference to the important subject of our Sanday School literature. The number of volumes in libraries this year is about one hundred and nineteen thousand, but of these considerably less than one-half are Methodist publications. Your Committee also observe that out of seven hundred and twenty-one schools only two hundred and litteen take the Sunday School Advocate, representing a circulation of about seven thousand copies. They are convinced that if the matter was taken up heartily by our Ministers and Preachers, the circulation of that incomparable periodical might be increased fourfold. Seventy-one Schools are reported as subscribing for other papers.

It also appears from the reports that no effort has hitherto been made to supply magazines or papers for the use of our Sunday School Teachers. In connection with this subject it may be mentioned that your Committee have had before them a memorial from the Sunday School Committee of the Montreal Centre Circuit, arging the publication of a scheme of lessons for the use of our Sunday Schools, and, also, recommending that, if possible, brief notes on the lessons be published in the Guardian for the benefit of Teachers. In view of the whole case your Committee would recommend that the Book Steward be authorized, should be obtain sufficient promise of support, to begin the publication

of a monthly magazine or paper which might afford the desired help to teachers, serve as a medium of intercommunion among them, and, at the same time advocate, among the people at large, the claims of our Sunday School work.

Your Committee would again most respectfully, yet strongly, urge upon the Conference the importance of at once carrying out the provisions of the discipline for the organization of a Wesleyan Sunday School Union, believing that such a course would give a much needed impetus to the Subbath School enterprise, greatly strengthen the connexional spirit, and vastly increase the efficiency of this important department of the Church's work.

Your Committee would also recommend that efforts be made in every part of the Connexion, to increase the interest of our people in Sunday School matters by holding District Sunday School Conventions, in which, by the free interchange of views, our Teachers might aid each other in the discharge of their important duties. They would further recommend that this subject be brought up for consideration at the Financial District Meetings, and that, if practicable, arrangements be made for holding such conventions during the month of October.

ORDER OF CONNEXIONAL FUND.

Resolved,—That the Connexional Finds shall be taken up in the following order, viz:—

- 1. Church Relief Fund, in the nonth of July.
- 2. Contingent, in the months of September, and of March.
- 3. Superannuation, in the month of November or December.
 - 4. Educational, in the month of December.

FINANCIAL COMMITTEES.

Reso'ved,—That the time for the meeting of Financial Comm tters shall be as follows, viz:—

1 The Financial S cretaries are to meet the Trensurers of the virious funds; on Tuesday, at 2 o'clock, P.M. next preceding the Wednesday on which the Conference meets, in order to pay to the Treasurers the amounts raised on their Districts, and paid to them on behalf of the Connexional Funds.

INCOME OF DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

CHAIRMEN AND DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the General Superintendent of Missions, the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable, after the close of each Meeting.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

- 1. Resolved,—That believing in the universal and perpetual obligation of the Sabbath, and regretting any laxity in opinion or practice which may prevail, we feel it our duty distinctly to avow our firm belief in its sanctity, in the necessity of its strict observance, and in the untold benefits resulting to the community from its establishment.
- 2. Resolved,—That we strongly disapprove of the practice of encouraging or allowing places to be opened on the Sabbath, in the vicinity of our Camp-Meetings, for the sale of groceries or provisions of any kind; and we would recommend our brethren to discountenance such places, and, if need be, to carry out mildly, but firmly, the existing enactments of the civil law against them.

SACRAMENTAL WINE.

Resolved,—That the following Resolution be re-affirmed and published in the Minutes of Conference, viz:—

"That, whereas this Conference heretofore passed a rule requiring the use of the Port Wine of commerce in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper; and, whereas, there is now made in Canada a pure wine from the cultivated grape, the Conference now riters its aforesaid law, so as to allow the wine made from its own produced grape, when such is preferred by any of our Churches."

PREACHERS ATTENDING COLLEGE.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Preachers who have travelled four years, and are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full connexion and ordination are thereby deferred.

RELATING TO THE BOOK ROOM.

Residved,—That every Minister and Preacher is hencefor h peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—That in case of any Minister or Preacher, who is indebted the amount of \$100 to the Book Room, the Book Steward shall be authorized to draw on the Trensurer of any connexional funds on which that brother may have a telaim, to the amount of not more than 25 per cent. of his claim annually until his debt is paid; and that a like proportion prevail when the indebtedness is larger than the sum named.

Resolved,—That the brethren indebted to the Book Room, they not being claimants on the connexional funds, be required to settle all overdue accounts, and pay the same within two years.

CANDIDATES' TRIAL SERMON.

Resolved,—That this Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion of the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such candidate to the Conference.

BIBLE SOCIETY.

exhibiting that regard by co-operating with its Canadian Auxiliary, the Upper Canada Bible Society, it is with deep regret we learn, that for questionable reasons, the Board of Directors at Toronto has, by official circular to the branches, so interfered with the broad catholicity of that institution as necessarily to alienate several influential denominations of the Christian Church; and we hereby express our regret, that so preferential a concession to a single denomination as a permission to the branches to sell its denominational Psalmody should be permitted to do violence to the sympathy of other, and no less influential sections of the Christian Church.






REPORT OF THE TREASURERS OF VICTORIA COLLEGE FOR 1866 AND 1367.

The Treasurers of Victoria College, in presenting their Report to the Annual Meeting, in addition to the presentation of their usual Balance Sheet, would briefly review the proceedings of the past—especial y of the past year-in which they see much that cannot fail to call forth the devout gratitude of the friends and patrons of that useful Institution. The position in which it is now placed may be in a great measure attributed to the steady, persevering efforts of the Board in the midst of much discouragement and great embarrassments arising from various causes, to execute and complete the arrangements which were entered into by the Annual Meeting in 1863. The following extract from a former Treasurer's Report may serve to give some idea of the exceedingly depressed financial state of the Institution prior to the making of those arrangements: -" Since the presentation of the balance sheet, the June quarterly sularies have had to be provided for, and the result is that the Treusurer has overdrawn to the amount of the Government grant, so that for the remainder of the year no means are provided for the heavy outlay of interest, salaries and incidentals. financial state of the College is now such that the whole machinery must be stopped, or some means provided for liquidating the debts." Such was the reported state of affairs prior to the arrangements of To provide the means here said to be necessary to prevent the whole machinery from stopping, it is well known that the members of this Conference submitted to a measure which can find no parallel in the history of Methodism, viz., to have their incomes taxed, which no one can say are any too much for the support of their families. Thus the machinery was kept moving until sufficient money could be raised by S OF ND 1367.

a general subscription to pay off a debt of some \$30.-An accumulation of debt was prevented, and the Connexion saved from the mortifying and painful necessity of not doing any thing (at least for some rears) towards advancing the educational interests of our rising country, and the College Board was saved from a legal prosecution for the non-fulfilment of their olligations to persons who those had paid their scholarship notes. The balance of the debt reported at the last Annual Meeting, on which a large amount of interest had to be paid, is now entirely wiped out; "we owe no man any thing but love." Ail the claims of our creditors in England, as well as those in Canada, have been fully met. There is now no debt on which INTEREST has to be paid. Such have been the encouraging and satisfactory results of the self-sacrificing spirit of the Preachers, the industry of the Agents employed by the Board, and the generous subscriptions of our members and friends in Eastern and Western Canada, some of whose subscriptions were really princely, such as those of Edward Jackson, Esq., of Hamilton, and John McDonald, M. P. P., of Toronto, each of whom gave \$1,000. It is the settled purpose of the Treasurers and those associated with them in the daily management of the affairs of the Institution, to guard the interests committed to them, and so to economize, as to prevent, if possible, any excess of expenditure over the annual income. In entering at the commencement of the year upon the work of collecting the subscriptions and notes which were in the hands of the Agents who had been previously employed, we found it necessary to depart from the first arrangement that was made. It was thought by some, that we might avail ourselves of the services of one or both of the former Agents for two or three months of the year, to collect these arrears. This, from causes not necessary to be named here, we soon found to be impracticable. The failure, however, of this plan has been a pecuniary advantage to the College:

what would in all probability have cost us more than a thousand dollars, was accomplished for less than half that amount, by employing a young man who has given the whole of his time to the work. The collecting part of the task assigned him was far from being an easy one, for it was nothing more than gleaning after those who had reaped and gathered all they could, leaving very little in any one place; so that our Agent this year has had to travel over the whole ground occupied by two Agents last year. As might be expected, he found, from various causes, many of the subscriptions and notes to be worthless. No one, perhaps, under the circumstances, would have done better than he has. In addition to collecting what he could of these arrears, he has obtained a considerable amount of new subscriptions to make up for losses on old accounts; and he has also secured special subscriptions, principally from those who are proud to call Victoria College their Alma Mater, to pay for the splendid cabinet which Dr. Harris, the late Professor of Natural Science, had procured and arranged for the benefit of his classes, entirely at his own expense. This is now the property of the College Board, and is paid for by these special subscriptions. Thus while we have been gathering up the fragments that were left to obtain the sum necessary to secure the payment of Mr. McDonald's subscription of \$1,000, that the balance of the debt might be paid off, we have also secured the improved facilities required to enable the learned Professor of Natural Sciences to conduct his department much more efficiently than formerly. The buildings, grounds, and fences, have been materially improved during the year, presenting today a very different appearance, at least externally, to that which they presented a year or two ago; this has added to the outlay of the year some \$300, but a similar item is not likely to appear again for the next thirty or forty years, which is about the number of years the old fonce had been standing. extraordinary claims that have been presented during the year; there would have been a balance in our favour if the foreign Missionary Districts had paid the full amount of their income tax as other Districts have done. The whole of this tax for three years is still due from those Districts, with the exception of \$74 paid by Dr. Wood for Vancouver's Island, in 1864. There are also due on subscriptions and notes the sum of three thousand nine hundred and ten dollars, which ought to be paid with as little delay as possible. This balance. when collected, might be applied so as to obviate the necessity of anticipating the Government Grant in paying off salaries and meeting other necessary expenses, leaving us free to begin the year with this grant in prospect. Or it might be added to the investments. and thus increase the amount of our annual income by increasing the amount of interest from invested funds. Whatever is done with it there should be no delay in collecting it, for every hour's delay will render it more difficult to collect. As we are now out of debt let us gather up the remaining fragments, that nothing be lost, and in every reasonable way so economize as to keep out of debt, and hand down to those who may succeed us an Institution efficiently conducted, free from all pecuniary embarrassments. In presenting to you that estimates for the coming year, we have been as economical as the important interests we have to provide for will allow. You will perceive that in the probable amount of income we have taken in a source of income, which is entirely new, the avails of which have been from the commencement applied to special objects, but which will for the present be applied to assist in paying the regular expenses of the College. This is the graduation fees. These fees, since the affiliation of the Montreal School of Medicine and Surgery with Victoria College, and the paying off the debt on the buildings of the Medical Department in Toronto, will prove to be a considerable source of income. Arrangements have also been made to establish a Department of Arts and Science, and a Law Faculty in Montreal, in connection with the French-Canadian Institute, which has applied to be affiliated with Victoria College, during the past year. A proposal also has been received from the Trustees of the Grammar School in the town of Cebourg, to connect that School with the College. These arrangements must necessarily prove advantageous by increasing the number of students, enlarging our field of operations, and adding to the annual income. Whatever others may think of these things, we regard them as encouraging indications of coming prosperity.

In conclusion, it must be patent to all who take any interest in these matters, that if we are united in our efforts to advance them, some of us may live to see the most satisfactory results from all this labour and sacrifice. Our youth will be preserved from being seduced away from the Church of their fathers, and thus an Institution that we have struggled so long and so hard to sustain, will amply reward us for all by becoming a source of strength to the cause of our common Christianity, a power in the land, and which will be found in all time to come doing its part towards advancing the future greatness and stability of this far-spreading and growing. THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA,

TO THE

MEMBERS-OF THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

"Grace be unto you and peace from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ, who gave himself for our sins, that he might deliver us from this present evil world, according to the will of God and our Father, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen."

Not merely as an annual custom do we thus greet you, but we heartily rejoice in the opportunity thus given us to testify our unabated love to you in Christ Jesus, and our earnest desire that the bonds by which we are united may never be relaxed; but that by mutual and zealous affection and undiminished energy, we may as pastors, fulfill our obligations to God; "Ye also helping together by prayer for us, that for the gift bestowed upon us by the means of many persons, thanks may be given by many on our behalf. For our rejoicing is this, the testimony of our conscience, that in simplicity and godly sincerity, not with fleshly wisdom, but by the grace of God, we have had our conversation in the world, and more abundantly to you-ward."

The review of the work of God this year has occasioned both gratitude and humiliation. We praise God with joyful hearts that our labour has not been in vain

The numerical increase of our societies in the Lord. has exceeded that of many former vears. returns show a nett gain of 1689 persons, who have been brought into church-fellowship with us. Yet there is no cause in this for boasting, but rather would we humble ourselves before God. When we consider how great a number of ministers, local preachers, leaders and other official persons are united together for the professed purpose of bringing the world to Christ, it would seem that the results of our conjoint labours should be greater than they are. For ourselves, we resolve before God to consecrate ourselves anew and with apostolic courage, amidst abounding iniquity, and insidious error, to preach with more fervency and simplicity the glorious gospel of the blessed God.

Suffer us, dear brethren, to remind you of what may be considered the chief hindrances to spiritual growth in the Church, and progressive power over the world. It is much to be feared that many who nominally hold fellowship with us, are embarrassed and impeded in everything that tends to Christian vitality and activity, by the worldly spirit which they cherish, and by yielding unduly to the secular tendencies of the times. These destroy all relish for private devotion, and the thoughtful reading of the word of God. Family worship is neglected, and those who should have daily presented to them a living example of the divine life, are led to infer that religion is a mere profession, and the service of God a secondary matter—not the

one thing needful.

The secularity against which we affectionately warn you, has many and fearful collateral evils: most prominent is the inattention paid to the children and young persons who constitute the household, in all that relates to their conversion and religious culture. While the Saviour is heard in the genule breathings of his Divine love saying, "Suffer the little children to come unto me," multitudes of these little ones are, by the care-

As a merns of promoting personal religion and the revival of the work of God, we again carnestly and affectionately entreat you not to neglect those special means of grace, which have been, from the beginning, the strength and glory of the Connexion—our classmeetings and prayer-meetings. The neglect of these in many places painfully accounts for spiritual dearth, and the lamentable want of success to ministerial labour of which complaint is frequently made. Success cannot be expected where the members of the Church neglect the means of christian fellowship and prayer.

Your own peace and prosperity depend on fidelity, and with the fruits of righteousness there will follow showers of grace, and glorious revivals of religion.

We cannot refrain from referring to those political changes which are shortly to be effected for the government of this country. The Dominion of Canada, embracing several Provinces, has been established by Imperial authority, invoked by the several Local Parlia-Within a very short period those who possess ments. the elective franchise will be required to exercise it. the heat of political conflict there is great danger of losing sight of the claims of religion. Use your rights in the fear of God, and be not led into the extremes of partizanship. Eschew every tendency to an undue spirit of strife and contention. Cultivate peaceful relations with those who differ from you in judgment, and pray that God, "by whom kings rule and princes decree justice," may guide the future of our expanding Dominion, and establish the constitution on a firm and immovable basis, an imperishable gem in the crown of our beloved Queen Victoria.

You will be gratified to know that our Connexional Funds have been sustained and increased, but it is felt to be a cause of regret that the Fund for the support of Superannuated Ministers, and the Widows and Orphans of deceased Ministers, is not commensurate with the demands made upon it, and it is painful to state that the comparatively small amount allowed to the claimants has been diminished by one-tenth. The Conference therefore earnestly entreats all the members of our Church to consider the necessities of our worn-out Ministers, and manifest a practical sympathy for the widows and children, most of whom are exclusively dependent on your christian liberality. So deeply impessed were the ministers of the Conference with this fact, that they have unanimously agreed to raise their own annual subscription from four to five dollars.

We commend to your notice the Female College at Hamilton as an Institution eminently worthy of support, in which your daughters will receive a thorough education, and by careful culture become the ornaments and strength of society. We rejoice to assure you of its prosperity, and the growing interest which is manifested towards it throughout the country, and which,

we trust, will continue to increase.

The Conference has been one of great interest, and characterized by cordial harmony during the discussion of important and exciting subjects. Our religious services have been attended by the divine blessing. The rich unction of the Holy Ghost has rested on our assemblies, and we shall go to our various fields of labour earnestly desiring God's assistance and your co-

operation.

In this pastoral address it is not necessary to dwell at length on those subjects which necessarily form the themes of our pulpit ministrations; yet we cannot withhold the expression of our conviction that the times in which we live, marked by the prevalence of dangerous and encroaching theological error, together with the shameful efforts made in many places to introduce into public worship the forms of Popish idolatry, require the strictest fidelity on our part, and we pledge

ourselves anew to abide by the ancient land-marks, believing that the glorious doctrines of the Reformation and of Wesleyan Methodism will, under God, be the means of arresting the threatened destruction, and restore the peace and harmony of the Church of Christ. "Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. REV. FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

Your affectionate address has greatly instructed and encouraged us; and we rejoice to learn, from private sources, that your ecclesiastical year, now closing, has been one of increased prosperity and blessing in all departments of your divine work. This has also been a prosperous and happy year with us in regard to all our Institutions and operations. Our Collegiate Institutions have been increasingly prosperous and efficient: there is perfect peace in all our circuits, and many of them have been blessed with seasons of spiritual refreshing; while a large number of excellent places of worship has been erected. The missionary liberality of our people has also advanced; and our missionary work, both among the new settlements and Indian tribes. has been characterised by unabated progress,—we having 193 Missionaries, and 20,735 members on our Indian and Domestic, or Home, Missions; besides the distant work, in which we co-operate with you, in Hudson's Bay and British Columbia. During our present sesssion we have received into full connexion and ordained twenty-three young men, who had faithfully fulfilled their four years of probation, passed all their examinations, and proved themselves successful ministers of the gospel; and we have received 19 young men on trial. The whole number of members in our

societies is 58,262; being an increase of 1,689 during the year; the whole number of ministers in our Conference is 612, including Superannuated Ministers and Preachers on trial. Our Female College numbers 140 pupils; our Victoria University includes 63 undergraduates in Arts, 8 in Law, 223 in Medicine, and 58 pupils in the preparatory school. We have 721 Sabbath Schools, in which there are 48,495 pupils, (of whom 3,606 meet in class;) 6,906 teachers; with 118,967 volumes in the libraries We occupy seventeen Indian Missions, on which there are 2,044 church members, speaking three different Indian tongues; we have 140 Domestic Missicas, including 18,691 church menbers, and on which there are 193 ministerial labourers. Thus, in Canada alone, (irrespective of those in Hudson's Bay and British Columbia,) we have upwards of 200 Missions, on which the Gospel is preached in six different languages, and which are entirely supported by the liberality of our congregations. In the last official census of Canada, upwards of 350,000 of the population returned themselves as adherents to Methodism; and we believe a much larger number are attendants upon our ministry.

But we are far from satisfied with this measure of success; we are humbled and abased that it is not many fold greater. We believe, with the agencies we employ, and the fields of labour opened to us, that we ought to gather thousands to Christ, where we gather only hundreds. We have humbling and painful searchings of heart on this subject; we renew our covenant engagements with our Divine Master and with each other; to pray with and for each other whenever we meet, before parting, as far as possible; to talk and pray with others, whenever practicable, in regard to their soul's salvation; to seek a deeper baptism of the Holy Spirit, that we may be at all times enlightened, empowered, and anointed for every part of our great work, and find in it our meat and our drink; to be

instant in season and out of season, always abounding in the work of the Lord; looking for the fullness of the blessing in our own souls, and in our congregations.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

We thank you for your affectionate Address, and for your excellent Deputation, in the persons of the Reverend Doctors Richey and Pickard—brethren honored and beloved—to whose communications, we have listened with great interest and delight. We refer you to them for information in regard to the state and progress of the work of God amongst ourselves.

We may simply state that we have received 19 young men on trial at this session, and 23 young men into full connexion, after a satisfactory probation of four years; that we number 612 Ministerial labourers, including Superannuated Ministers and Preachers on trial; that the number of members in our Societies is 58,262; that we have 193 Missionaries, and 20,735 members on our Domestic and Indian Missions, supported entirely by the liberality of our congregations, apart from the distant work in which we co-operate with the Parent Society in Hudson's Bay and British Columbia; that our Female College numbers 140 pupils, and our Victoria University includes 63 Undergraduates in Arts, 8 in Law, and 223 in Medicine, and 58 pupils in the preparatory school; that we have 721 Sabbath Schools, including 6,906 teachers, 48,495 pupils, (of whom 3,600 meet in class,) and 118,976 volumes in the libraries. Our people have erected a large number of excellent churches during the year, and we

have had gracious revivals on many Circuits.

We have not thought it expedient, the present Session, to form several Annual Conferences, with one General Legislative Conference; and upon no other plan, as we are given to understand by your Representatives, is it likely that you would be willing to establish a more intimate ecclesiastical connexion with the Wesleyan Methodist Conference and Church in Canada. But though we yet remain separate and distinct bodies, we are one in heart, in doctrine, in worship, in church polity, in usages, in operations and aims; and we trust that at no distant day we shall be more perfectly united together in one great Christian community of Conferences and Churches.

Our greetings will be presented to you by our beloved Brother, the Rev. Lachlan Taylor, D.D., whose visit to your Conference will, we trust, strengthen our bonds of Christian fellowship, and be promotive of those common sympathies which animate us as members of the

great Methodist family.

We go forth to our appointed fields of labour resolved with renewed devotion and fidelity to consecrate ourselves to our great work of spreading scriptural truth and holiness throughout the land; and we unite our earnest prayers with yours, that God will pour upon you and us both the unction of His Holy Spirit, for the office and work of the ministry in those portions of His vineyard which He has respectfully assigned to us.
