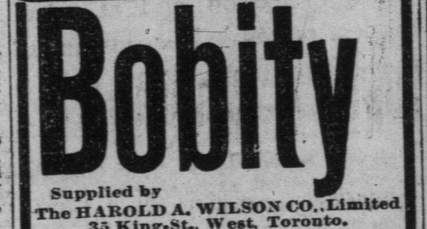

TORONTO AND NIAGARA FALLS POWER.

According to The Globe Toronto's two big problems are the opening up of Northern Ontario and the supply of cheap power from Niagara Falls. The Globe takes the same view as we do in regard to Niagara Falls power. Toronto must have it. It is the all-important question. Six years ago the Ontario Government entered into an agreement with the Canadian Niagara Power Company, whereby the latter acquired a monopoly of the power which Toronto is now anxious to secure. This company is composed of Americans. It is like the company that is operating so extensively on the United States side of the river. Last week the City Engineer was commissioned to make enquiries as to the cost and prospects of having Niagara power wired to Toronto. Where did the city's representative go to make his enquiries? He went to the Ontario Government, to Niagara Falls (New York), and to Buffalo. The control of the Canadian Niagara Falls has been transferred from Canada to the United States. Instead of going to the Ontario Legislative buildings to make arrangements for the supply of power our representative is obliged to visit a foreign country, a hostile country, and to treat with a foreign corporation. And what result? We are told that this corporation was studiously reticent, that its officers would not impart the information asked by the city. The City of Toronto is now prepared to make a bona fide application for Niagara Falls power. But it is impossible to negotiate with anyone to furnish the supply. The American company does not intend to develop power in Canada until after the wants of its big customers in the United States are supplied. The Ontario Government has parted with its proprietary rights in Niagara Falls power, and there is no use applying to them.

Toronto must agitate for the cancellation of the agreement with the American company. A league was recently organized at Niagara Falls and adjoining localities to effect this very same purpose. The

development of Niagara Falls power is not a local question. It affects the whole of Ontario from Toronto to Detroit. Hamilton, London, Brantford, St. Catharines, Guelph and a score of other centres are as much interested in the development of this power. All Western Ontario should join the League and insist on the cancellation of the franchise held by the Canadian Niagara Power Company. The company has violated its agreement, and the Government can cancel it if it desires to do so. The feeling throughout Ontario in favor of cancellation is becoming stronger every day, and it looks as if the Government will be forced to comply with the demands of the people. Under the agreement the company undertook to begin the work of construction before May 1, 1897, and by Nov. 1, 1898, it was to have completed water connections for the development of 25,000 horse power and to have actually ready for use and transmission 10,000 developed horse power. The company has not begun the work of construction, and there is no possibility of its having ten thousand acre power for delivery by Nov. 1 next. Under the circumstances the Government would be fully justified in cancelling the agreement.

Experts who ought to know say that it will cost no more to deliver power to Toronto than it does to Buffalo. The cost of the transmission line will of course be considerably greater, but this is more than offset by the great economy of installing the plant on the Canadian side of the river as compared with the plant by which Buffalo is supplied.

Let the Government cancel its agreement with the separate company, and it will not be very long before Toronto and all Western Ontario will be in possession of an agency that will effect an industrial revolution.
