TWENTIETH YEAR

MUST KEEP CHINA OPEN

Lord Charles Beresford Sticks to His Story Regarding the Far East.

Lord Charles Does Not Suggest a Cut and Dried Alliance, but Britain, America, Germany and Japan Should Agree to Work Together and Keep China on Her Feet—Empress Dowager Is the Chief Power Among the Celestians.

London, March 8.—Rear Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, who has just completed his tour of the world in the interests of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Great Britain, in an interview with a representative of the Associated Press to-day, reiterated his well-known views on the subject of the "open door" in China, as being the only possible policy of Great Britain. In so doing, he said, it was impossible to estimate the importance of the Chinese market, a single province of which was worth the whole of Africa from a commercial point of view.

THE ONLY POSSIBLE POLICY

Any Other Would Bring All Kinds of Entanglements and Almost Certainly War.

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Interview With His Lordship.

London, March 8.—The Daily Mail publishes an interview this morning with Lord Beresford. He told "The Daily Mail" that he could say little about his tour until he had completed his voluminous report to the Associated Chambers of Commerce, which sent him out on his tour, but he insisted that if all the powers be granted the Chinese market, it could only result in quarrels and war.

Must Keep China on Her Feet.

"It is absolutely necessary," he said, "to keep China on her feet. Better stand up now for the open door than venture upon the dangerous course of spheres of influence. I do not think America would join such an alliance. But America, Germany and Japan might agree to work together to maintain the open door. The Chinese market is a vast one, and a very clever woman. She signs the popular edicts herself and makes the emperor sign the unpopular ones. The provincial rulers are more progressive than those at Peking. They all favor the open door policy and only want to save China's face; but they think we are afraid of Russia. We must help China, which will not be a difficult task."

STEVES GOT TWENTY YEARS.

The Tramp Who Shot a Pal at Paris Station Found Guilty of Manslaughter.

Brantford, March 8.—At the Assizes here, the case of Steves, the tramp, for murder at Paris Station, was commenced, and continued this evening. Some half-dozen witnesses gave evidence for the prosecution. The prisoner pleaded guilty to manslaughter. The jury brought in a verdict of manslaughter. Steves was sentenced to 20 years' imprisonment.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION

Ontario House Will Take Its Choice of Two Bills With the Same Object.

Ontario's legislators were busy yesterday. Deputations were in evidence and much business was done in the House. Chief in interest was the Attorney-General's bill to amend the Workmen's Compensation for Injuries Act. It provides for a court of arbitration and for more speedy and economical procedure.

The number of hospitals receiving Government aid is 48. Three were placed on the list during the year: St. Luke's, Toronto; St. Michael's, Toronto; and the Orthopedic Hospital, Toronto.

The grant of the Government was formerly \$1,000,000. It is now \$1,100,000, which is divided among the various hospitals according to their work done.

How long the Legislature will continue to grant aid it is difficult to say, says Mr. Hardy. But it is natural to suppose that as these institutions become more self-sustaining by fees and private contributions, the Government grant will become less.

Complaining About the Bill. A deputation including Messrs. J. K. McDonald, Alexander Bruce, Hockin, S. M. Kenney, J. Bradshaw, J. G. Richter, H. Sutherland, representing life insurance companies, appeared to oppose the bill. They complained that the new bill dealt unfairly with life insurance companies.
