NOTHING NEW RE YALU MILITARY SITUATION

LITTLE YALSU SHELLING PORT ARTHUR

Russians Move North, Intending to Make Yalu Their Defensive Base.

SPIRIT OF COSSACKS BROKEN.

London, March 11.—Speculation regarding the military situation on the Yalu River is most keen, but no news of a reliable character has been received.

The Dailly Express asserts that 200,000 troops have been shipped from Japan, and that a portion of the second army corps is now on its way to Korea.

According to a Tientsin correspondent of The Standard, the Russians are withdrawing all their superior troops from Port Arthur to Harbin and Kirin, because of the shortage of provisions and because it is doubtful whether or not they would be able to hold either to Port Arthur or Newchang against a Japanese attack.

The spirit of the Russian troops, who are largely recruits, has been broken by starvation, cold and harsh treatment from their officers.

The Standard this morning published an article, in which the writer points out the defenceless condition of the Amur River. Russia would profit from the experiences of the Boxer outbreak, he says, and has not forts or gunboats on the river which are as good as useless.

THAMER CHARGED WITH FORGERY.

Bokanan Fugitive Alleged to Have Secured \$300 From Ayr Bank.

Berlin, Ont., March 10.—John H. Thamer, who was arrested at Spokane and brought here by Detective Rogers, was arraigned today before Police Magistrate Weil on the charge of having forged the name of Jesse Clements on two notes for \$200 each.

W. H. Bowley, J.C., appeared for the crown, and E. P. Clement, K.C., defended the prisoner. The charges were laid in May, 1903, when the manager of the Bank of Commerce at Ayr, where it was alleged that "Thamer" had discounted notes and obtained the money. Mr. Clement swore that he had never seen the notes before, and had never permitted anyone to sign his name to them.

St. Petersburg, March 10.—The czar has received the following message from Viceroy Alexieff, dated today, at Mukden:

"The commander of the fortress reports that at about 1 o'clock this morning the outlines of vessels, apparently torpedo boats, were seen at sea, within the area swept by our searchlights.

"At 8 o'clock the Japanese opened fire on our cruisers and fortress. This opened at half past three and continued until 10 o'clock. I have the honor to report the above to your majesty.

have been miraculously opened, fortresses have been abandoned, captured, become second Ladysmiths, been stocked with ample supplies and reduced to a month's rations all within twenty-four hours. Well, indeed, may the average citizen abandon the attempt to make head or tail of these confounding rumors and resign himself to a patient waiting upon the lifting of the veil. After all, may not this enforced attitude of suspense, this knowledge that at any moment the darkness may be dispelled and the situation illuminated by the flash of the guns of the "little yellow" men be as titivating as a dose of real or imaginary horrors every morning. Anyway it is a novel experience, and when the blow is struck which, unless all precedents and precedents be in law in the shaping, the public may realize the wisdom which has prompted the conspiracy of silence and its necessity under the conditions of twentieth-century war.

SWEET REASONABLENESS IN PROHIBITION

In our haste, we have sometimes accused the Ross government of being arrogant, tyrannical, etc. We now desire to retract, at least to modify those charges. Anything more sweetly reasonable than the premier's dealing with the liquor evil, we have seldom heard of. We speak by the book, that is, by The Globe. There was a cautious and friendly meeting of Dr. Ross' supporters.

A REAL PARTY ISSUE

The greatest issue before the people of Ontario to-day arises out of the relations between municipalities and private corporations. The case of the City of Toronto, and its street railway company, the dispute between the City of Toronto and the Consumers' Gas Company—these are the really important questions that are now before the people. They are the questions on which the two parties should divide.

WAR NEWS UNDER DIFFICULTIES

This far eastern war will have at least one good effect, it is believed, military staff responsible for the conduct of the field operations. It will accustom people everywhere to a substantial restriction of the copious telegrams and special letters with which in all recent campaigns they have been literally deluged. With the unprecedented means of inter-communication which now exist throughout the great world there is no possibility of conveying information to any one country. Whatever becomes known to one is immediately flashed to the ends of the earth, possibly with disastrous results to the plans of the strategists, one of whose chief weapons is silence and secrecy. It is well known that Lord Kitchener and many other officers of the newer school are profoundly dissatisfied with the facilities and freedom hitherto accorded to war correspondents, particularly British and American. English-speaking citizens who must have their daily papers spiced every morning and afternoon with something which will flavor their jaded appetite for the sensational and the startling have been, partly at least, responsible for the extraordinary license with which special commissioners at the front have hitherto been accorded. The demand ensured the supply, and the supply in turn changed a moderate desire into a ravenous hunger for novelty and magnitude. Every skirmish became a desperate battle and every trifling reverse a disastrous defeat. And so the game went merrily on till the sense of proportion was lost, and with it all intelligent following of the progress of the campaign.

PROPER EDUCATION IN FORESTRY FOR FARMERS AND FOR EXPERTS

The fifth annual meeting of the Canadian Forestry Association filled the members' reception room in the parliament buildings with a gathering of solid and intellectual-looking gentlemen. Hiram Robinson presided in his official right, and in an informal address called attention to fire as the greatest enemy of the Canadian forests. Careless settlers, smokers, and the railways were the chief offenders. Secretary Stewart reported a membership of 479, an increase of 78. Father Burke is a retiring member and delegate from Prince Edward Island. The forestry legislation of the year was reviewed by Mr. Stewart. Tree planting is being encouraged in the Northwest and 1,700,000 will be supplied to settlers this year.

QUEEN'S CRAWFORD GUILTY OF CONSPIRACY TO DEFRAUD BANK

Queen's Crawford was last night found guilty by a jury of conspiracy to defraud the Bank of British North America. The case showed how easy it is at times for persons without means to establish a credit. A young chap, Milton G. Stagg, bought a grain elevator, and to do this he gave a note for \$50,000. The bank, however, refused to cash it because the amount of money he put into the elevator was not sufficient. In order to raise funds, he and his wife, Crawford, who was a clerk in the Central Canada Loan and Investment Company, commenced a series of "kites." They kept this up until the "kites" were caught. Crawford had to resort to other means and concluded to do the bank this thing.

WOULD SACRIFICE CHILDREN

Bangor, Me., March 10.—Maniacal proceedings are reported among the 500 members of a so-called religious sect living in a colony on Beals Island. Second Reading of Temiskaming Railway Bill Not Opposed by Conservatives

The bill of Hon. F. R. Latchford, making provision for the extension of the Temiskaming Railway to a point at or near Lake Abitibi in the province of Ontario, and for the purpose of forming a junction with the proposed Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, was given its second reading in the legislature yesterday. This is one of the two measures the government proposed for the session. The extension of the railway, at two months have elapsed since the legislature passed a bill in relation to the extension of public works, who has been held for the past week and it still suffers from uncertainty. PROTECTION FOR STOCK BRED IN THE CABINET

Hon. Mr. Fisher Announces Some New and Important Regulations to Be Made.

Ottawa, March 10.—The National Stock Breeders' Association waited on Hon. Mr. Fisher and the Hon. Mr. Sifton to-day and presented the resolutions passed by the convention, and which have been published before. In reply, Hon. Sydney Fisher made a number of important announcements. It might be better, perhaps, said he, to prohibit the importation of certain breeds of live stock in this country, rather than simply try by a customs trick to keep them out. However, the public interest in the importation of certain breeds of live stock in this country, and the public service generally, personally, he would be in favor of saying that certain animals which are harmful to the breeds in Canada should be excluded, just as the importation of certain posters was prohibited as being prejudicial to moths.

Important New Regulations

Dr. Rutherford, head of the veterinary branch of the department of agriculture, had drawn up a series of new regulations in regard to quarantine, which would be passed in a week or so, and would be considerably more effective than the present ones. Under these regulations the number of horses and swine to be imported into the country were limited to certain specific ports, at each of which it was proposed to have a veterinary officer to carefully inspect the animals coming in.

Resolutions to Be Considered

It would be perfectly right, Mr. Fisher went on to say, to carefully select the registers with the certificates they should recognize as showing the animals which were pure-bred. He proposed to ask the minister of customs to make such a regulation, and he thanked them for their hints as to drawing up the list. It was proposed that pure-bred animals only had been allowed to enter the country, and he proposed that such a regulation might prevent the sale in Canada of the best some of the best stock. If a man from the United States came here and held a sale of the best quality of stock it would hurt our people. Of course, if they safeguarded the record they might also safeguard the live stock, whether imported by a resident of Canada or a foreigner. He had not thought of that. However, all the resolutions would be considered with the greatest possible care and sympathy. Mr. Sifton spoke briefly, saying that he would be glad to cooperate with his colleague, Mr. Fisher, in doing what was best to protect the live stock interests.
