



ENGLISH PRE-RAPHAELITES Subject of Lecture in the University

Summer Course.

An interesting lecture was given last evening by Prof. J. Home Cameron in the physics building of the university on "English Pre-Raphaelites." In this class the lecturer arranged the names of Holman Hunt, Dante Gabriel Rossetti, Sir John Millais, and along with these, altho not a member of the order, the name of Ford Madox Brown. MANCHESTER, Mass., July 26.-The Seawanhaka Cup to-day, defeating the challenger, the St. Lawrence, in the 12-mile triangular course by 4 minutes 45 seconds.

The cup hunters prefaced their second attempt to gain international honors by a sail-drying contest, made necessary from yesterday's ducking. In this the weather proved a good assistant, for a fine northwester supplanted the uncertainty of the first day, and for several hours this foremon all the canvas of both yachts lapped and swirled in the breeze. The slight superiority which the defender, Massachusetts, showed yesterday in the mile and one-third of windward work, in which both boats had the same conditions, gave the holders of the cup considerable confidence to-day.

The yachts were sent on another 12-mile triangular race to-day. The boats sailed three times around, with each side of the course a mile and one-third in leagth. The judges sent word to the yachts that the warning signal would be sounded at 2 p.m.

There was plenty of breeze when the boats were sent away at 2.10 p.m. The committee gave the racers a course the first two legs of which were reaching with a beat to the finish.

The St. Lawrence crossed the line slightly ahead of the Massachusetts, and, with booms well out to port and spinnakers far forward on the starboard side, both legged it for the first mark. It was a very clear day, and the sea was comparatively smooth.

Laurier Skates on Thin Ice in Speaking About the Future of the Dominion.

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PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., July 26 .-(Special.)—The reception which Sir Wilfrid was accorded to-day eclipsed all previous demonstrations in this tour, excepting those in the larger citles. A large crowd met the train on its arrival, the town was gaily decorater, and the premier was given an ovation, the memory of which will linger for many a day. 

Americans Merely Given "Liberty" to Fish Under Equal Conditions. (Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
