TRAPPED A THIEF.

Caught in a Chest and Then Attempts Suicide.

London, Nov. 29.—A burglar attempted to commit suicide when he found himself trapped in a chest at a farmhouse near Newry, in the north of Ireland, yesterday.

High Marshall, the farmer, recently discovered that his house had been broken into. It was a profitable night for the thief, for he secured \$50 in money.

A series of petty thefts followed, and the farmer was convinced that the man who was robbing him must know in some way had gained a complete knowledge of the interior of the premises.

Police were called to the farmhouse for a week in the hope of discovering the thief prowling about the premises.

Neither the farmer nor the police, however, found any clue to the culprit, and the police watch was discontinued.

Yesterday morning Marshall had occasion to go into one of the rooms, and was astonished to see the lid of a chest raised. He was still more astonished to find a stranger slipping inside the chest.

It was one of those large and heavy pieces of furniture which are found chiefly in old country houses, and made a fairly comfortable place of repose.

The farmer pushed the chest lid down and sat on the box while he called for help. The noise awakened the trapped intruder, who hammered the sides of the chest and cried out to be released.

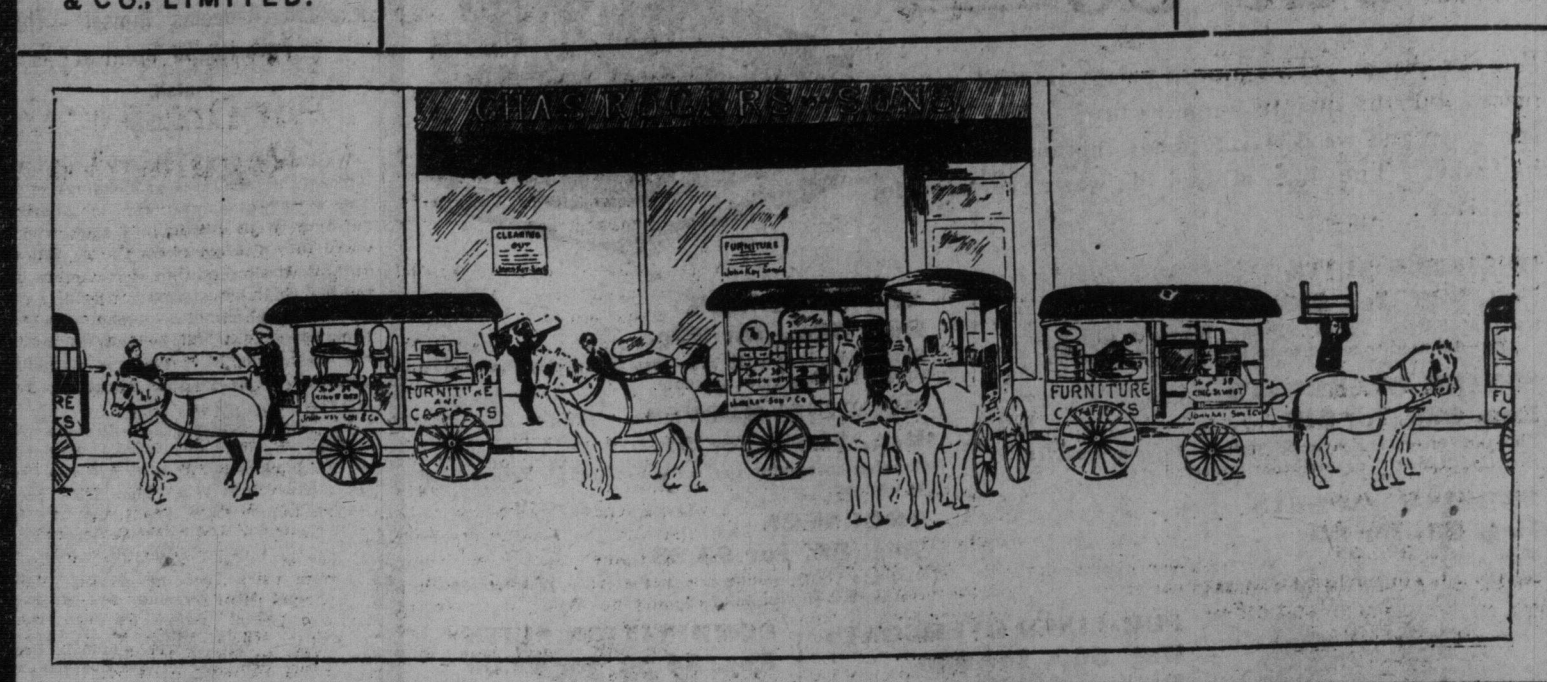

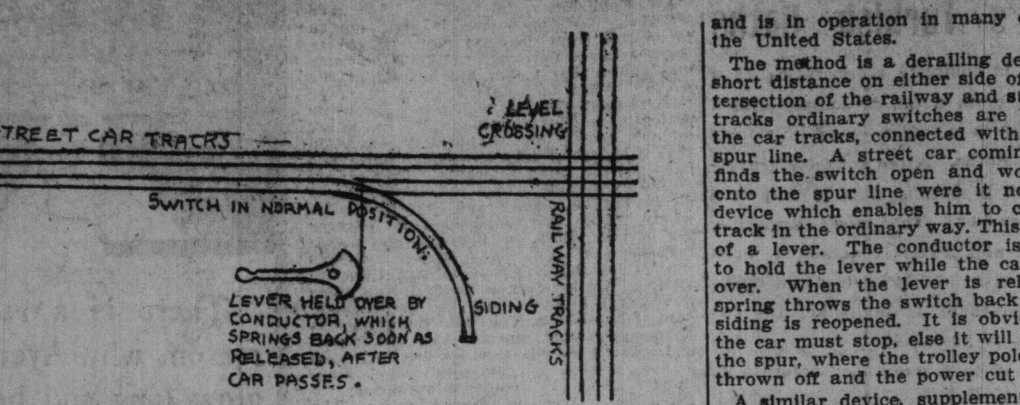
