German Retreat North Of Arras Into Belgian Territory Is Forecasted

Correspondent Reports Suggestive Activity Of Enemy In That Section

British, Before Cambrai, See Fires Burning Back of That Town—French Easily Occupy Place Close To La Fere—Ten More Villages In Laon Road Occupied

London, March 21.—The possibility of a German withdrawal in the region north of Arras, extending into Belgian territory, is forecasted in a Central News despatch from Amsterdam.

The despatch quotes a correspondent in Northern France as reporting that the Germans are developing great activity from a point north of La Bassée Canal to a point east of the Franco-Belgian frontier.

St. Quentin, reputed headquarters of the German emperor and his general staff for the two years following the battle of the Marne, and scene of a great French defeat in the war of 1870, is today within sight of the French infantry, who are following fast on the heels of the retreating German army.

Even more significant is the fact that the British, advancing on the north against Cambrai, another vital point on the Hindenburg line, have seen incendiary fires blazing in the rear of that town.

STORM CHECKS ADVANCE The only fact to offset these evidences that the Germans are still retreating is that the advance of both British and French materially slackened yesterday.

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LATEST REPORT FROM CANADIAN FRONT

London, March 21.—The following is issued by the Canadian war records office as a Canadian communique under date of March 18:

"The week on the whole has been uneventful. There were a few patrol encounters and the Germans made several ineffectual attempts to enter our trenches, in particular on Tuesday night. Three attacks were made after what was evidently a very carefully prepared bombardment. Not one of these attempts succeeded. On the contrary the attackers were driven back to their own lines and in one instance left two dead in front of our wire."

"Later in the week a storming party of our men succeeded in entering the German trenches despite heavy opposition. In some places there was hand-to-hand fighting but no prisoners could be secured. In others the garrison

H. S. COMPENSATION ACT

Non. E. H. Armstrong, commissioner of works and mines, has introduced a bill to amend the Workmen's Compensation Act of Nova Scotia. The amendments are numerous and the application of the act is extended by various definitions. The definition of "factory" is now more general, and includes any dock, wharf, quay or building thereon. The bill provides that "stevedoring" shall mean the loading or unloading of vessels or railway cars.

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



RUSSIANS WILL PREFER CANADA TO UNITED STATES

So Says Russian Consul at Chicago—Thinks Immigration Will Be Slow—Advices U.S. Exporters to Trade Through Canadian Channels

Antoine Volkoff, the Russian consul in Chicago, in a recent interview said that he did not expect any substantial emigration from Russia after the war, as the people would be needed at home. "Canada would probably get the cream of such immigration as might come to North America to farm on the prairies," he said. Further:

"Russia's needs after the war will be great because the war has brought many millions of men into contact with the latest methods for the first time. What we will need from America above all else will be machinery, in which Americans excel all other people, although I think Russian engineers have no superiors."

Through Canadian Channels

"It may be advantageous for some American firms to seek Russian trade through Canadian channels after the war, but I believe their best plan would be to open up branches in Russia, building plants there and sending over young men to live there after they have learned the Russian language. It takes an average youth eight months to acquire a commercial use of our difficult language."

"There is no doubt that Russia and Canada are the coming countries of the Occidental world, and their relations with each other and with the United States will be very close. Now is the time to consider all this."

Learn Russian Language

"Prof. Samuel Harper, of the University of Chicago, is doing a great deal of work about this."

So. America Eager For Baseball Tour

Scout Sullivan Says Giants-White Sox Trip Would Be a Success

Fred Sullivan, who has been to South America in the interests of the Chicago White Sox-New York Giants baseball combination, which plans to tour the southern continent next winter, has returned to New York with the tidings that the republics down there are all excited about the contemplated visit, and if war does not prevent, Comiskey and McGraw will show their baseball teams in that part of the world soon after the first of next year.

Sullivan went to South America armed with a letter from President Wilson. "This he displayed to the United States ambassadors and received due attention, Sullivan says about his visit."

"With President Wilson's letter in my possession to the ambassadors in the nature of my visit, my mission received class and prestige. The result was that the cordiality extended to me was quite satisfactory. I would have remained longer had not the break of our country with Germany come to pass, as it kept me in doubt whether I would get a boat when I wanted to return home. However, I promised the people in the South American cities where I stopped that I would return within six months and perhaps sooner."

"I will state that the big cities of South America are anxious for the introduction of our national game, especially in the cities of Bahia, Santos, Rio de Janeiro and Buenos Aires. In Buenos Aires, one of the prettiest cities in the world, they love outdoor sports. All are anxious to see the teams which made the last tour around the world under the auspices of Messrs Comiskey and McGraw. I assured them that so



THE GROCERY MARKET
The following comment on the market situation as regards flour stuffs appeared in Canadian Grocer last week:
Flour has been advanced an additional 30 cents a barrel during the week, which now makes the advance price again reach \$10 or over. The basic was occasioned through the continued firmness in the wheat market. There has been a general tendency in cooked meals and breads to advance. Live hogs are quoted at still higher levels. Dressed hogs are quoted at new high levels. The sugar situation continues to be one of considerable firmness. These advances, but the latter are restricting sales to prompt delivery orders. They will not book orders for future delivery at present prices. There has been a fairly heavy buying movement in sugar during the present week. Tea continues an object of much interest with importers and wholesalers. Advice received from London is that the British government intends to allow only such tea to proceed to Canada as has already been entered for shipment prior to the placing of the embargo. From this time forward the primary markets in India will be the centre of interest for tea men. Negotiations are proceeding for shipments of tea direct from those ports to Canada. Some cars of Alberta potatoes reached centre of the week. The first shipment of Porto Rican spring pineapples is expected to reach Canadian distributors within a few days. Business generally has been satisfactory during the week.

CHARGE FOR PATIENTS IN MAINE SANATORIA

(Bangor Commercial)

Charges for patients in the state sanatoria were considered by the committee on state sanatoria on Thursday afternoon. It was less a formal hearing than a friendly discussion, participated in by physicians and others who have studied the white plague and the best possible methods of preventing its spread in Maine.

The present law reads that the price paid by patients shall not exceed \$5 a week. There were two bills—one merely striking out the clause "85 a week," thus leaving the amount of payment optional with the sanatoria trustees, and the other providing that all patients shall be charged a sum equivalent to the cost of their care and maintenance but providing further that the trustees may, in their discretion, waive such charges, either wholly or in part. Both bills, it was brought out, were drawn at the suggestion of Governor Milliken, and their object is the same—to prevent persons simply able to pay a reasonable sum from receiving treatment at nominal cost, often taking the places of the very poor, who are refused admission because of lack of room.

The principal address was by Dr. W. C. Peters of Bangor, president of the Bangor Anti-Tuberculosis Association, who agreed there should be some legislation affecting well-to-do patients. He did not believe, however, that the best remedy lay in charging a price proportionate to the cost of board and nursing. Maine's great danger, he pointed out, is from the very poor—drifters in tenements and back streets, who used no precautions whatever and spread disease at every turn. Those of even moderate means, who live in decently sani-

lary homes and have reasonable regard for the rights of others, are not a menace. Yet these will do all in their power to the exclusion of the poor, even though the present limit of \$5 is raised, unless some restriction against them is invoked.

"These bills," said Dr. Peters, "gave the trustees no discretion whatever as to what patients shall be received. Far better, it seems to me, to draft one giving the trustees power to exclude from the sanatoria those able to pay, thus making room for the very poor. This will accomplish the object sought in the present bill—but, it seems to me, in a more effective manner."

"You would keep the limit" charged patients at \$17, asked Chairman Bartlett of the committee.

"Yes—why not?" responded Dr. Peters. "Why charge more when there are enough of the very poor to fill the state sanatoria four times over?"

Informal discussion brought out that there are three private sanatoria in Maine, the rates ranging from \$10 to \$15 a week. They are equipped to care for very many of the moderately well-to-do who now, because of the lower rate seek the state institutions.

Finally, as a compromise, Secretary Bagley of the state board of charities and corrections, suggested an amendment instructing the trustees to give preference among the applicants to those least able to pay. This would not be a mandatory discrimination against any particular class, for the trustees would be privileged to use their judgment, and yet the result would be the same. The suggestion met with favor by a majority of those present.

The hearing was rather unique in that none of those present appeared distinctly as either proponents or opponents of proposed bills. It was merely an informal discussion of how best to relieve suffering humanity and how best to combat one of Maine's greatest menaces—the white plague.

UTILIZING CANADIAN FOREST RESOURCES

(Forestry Branch, Ottawa)

The aim of the department of the interior in establishing, under the forestry branch, the forest products laboratories, was to bring to the aid of Canadians in their work of developing our natural resources the latest results of scientific research. In a word, the object is to link up science and industry.

The fruit of this effort is seen in the issue, within the last few days, of a bulletin (No. 59) entitled "Canadian Woods for Structural Timbers." Without going into the details of the hundreds of tests, physical, chemical and preservative, which were made by the laboratories in studying the qualities of structural timbers, it will be sufficient to say that these tests show that some of our Canadian woods produce better, stronger and more durable timber than some of the yellow pines which have been imported into Canada in such quantities. The bulletin makes satisfactory reading for patriotic Canadians, and, besides, points the way by which Canadians can keep their money at home and at the same time secure the finest building timber in the world. Manufacturers are already making good use of the researches of these laboratories. Any citizens interested who have not yet received a copy of this bulletin, may have one free upon application to the Director of Forestry, Ottawa.

THE LOSS OF BABIES

(London Weekly Dispatch)

It is on the fearful day of August 3, 1914, that a statistician or, better still, some notable eugenicist, had ventured publicly to state that two years of war would show a million a hundred thousand babies in this country he would have been set down as a cringing prophet of the other way about. People of excellent intention harrowed by the feelings of the war, had ventured to say that would come down to earth in the first year of 1915. It happened that there were 65,000 fewer babies born than in 1914, they say.

The babies of 1918 are now known to be a number which equals the total population of a town like Northampton.

And it would seem, too, that the Jeremiah who grieved so doleful about the increase of war-time weddings are as far out of it as they were over the babies. The 860,000 marriages of 1918 dropped to 270,000 in 1915.

In peace time the marriage rate is a true indication of the state of trade and employment. In war time it is a true index to do with the number of men in the army than in the workshop. The wedding boom of 1916 was war wedding boom, with its 70,000 increase in that year.

In 1916 the man who was already married entered the ranks of the army and the wedding boom was over.

The great decrease in the number of babies born calls for more and more effort to preserve and protect the lives of the children that are born. There are signs that the best elements of the nation have awakened to the fact that a child's life is a precious asset to the country. We see it manifested in an increasing development of the infant welfare movement.

When the war is over Great Britain will know her fate. Nations alone can maintain her strength, and if nothing is done to stop the rapidly declining birth-rate, which began some years before the war, the days of this country are numbered.

UNITED CONGREGATIONS CHOSE KNOX AS NAME FOR CHURCH IN CITY

The amalgamation of St. John and St. Stephen's Presbyterian churches into what will be known as the Knox Presbyterian church, with services to be held in the St. Stephen's edifice, was practically completed yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the St. John presbytery. The union of the two parishes will be completed at a special meeting to be held in April, and the first services for the united congregations will be held Easter Sunday with Rev. M. H. Mandel, Florenceville (N. B.), as speaker in the morning, and Rev. H. A. Anderson at the evening services.

It was stated that the first act of the united church shall be to pay \$1,000 to the St. Stephen's church, which was the gift of the St. John presbytery. Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, whose resignation of the pulpit of St. John had made the union possible, Rev. A. MacKeigan was elected moderator for the special meeting to be held in St. John April 6, and the elders of the negotiating congregations were named as an interim session to act as a united body. The Rev. J. H. A. Anderson was granted the full authority to sell whatever property may be necessary to complete the amalgamation of the churches, and the statement of the resources and liabilities of each parish, together with such legal articles as may be necessary to convert property are to be turned over to the Eastern Trust Company before 8 o'clock on the evening of April 6. The pews in Knox church are to be free, as well as prayer books and hymn books.

AQUATIC

Details of Recent Swims

The New York Times is in receipt of the following account by a crewman of a recent midwinter swimming carnival at Honolulu, at which world's record performances were chronicled:

"The annual aquatic gala of the Hawaiian A. A. U. offered two days of remarkable competition and proved the most successful in history, drawing a crowd of more than 5,000 spectators."

"The course used was a 100-yard stretch between stationary docks, floating pontoons making the ends. Thick scum of oily substance made conditions rather poor the first day, but the water was much clearer the second, when records were shattered."

Clarence Lane of Honolulu easily won the 60-yard dash in 0.24, with John Kelly, also of Honolulu, second, and Perry McGillivray of the Illinois A. C. third.

"McGillivray, however, furnished a surprise in the 100-yard swim, which he completed in 1.30, gradually improving his time to 1.15, and finally finishing in 1.05 1-3. Kelly was third. The latter pair collided, however, and that may have influenced results."

In the half mile race Lady Langer of the Los Angeles A. C. had things all her own way after passing the 500-yard mark and finished with a big lead of 11:30. She was followed by Harold Kruger of Honolulu and Norman Ross of San Francisco.

"The second day started with the 220-yard contest, which brought out Lane, Kruger, and McGillivray. Lane was again in the lead, but he was gradually overtaken by Kruger, who finished in 3:45, and McGillivray in 3:55. Lane was third in 4:15. The Illinois man made a world's record time of 2:24 1-2 with Ross being second in 2:38 1-2. Kruger led for third. A couple of body-lengths back.

"It will be noted that the time given is slower than the cable figures of 2:20 4-5."

The 440-yard race furnished a sensational finish. Langer drew away from his field after covering three laps, and at 400 yards matters seemed settled. Five yards separated him from Ross, his nearest rival, but the latter came on like a whirlwind, the stretch and had all but closed the gap when Langer reached the line with a bare foot-space in 5:17 3-5, a new international open water standard. McGillivray beat Langer for third place, many yards behind Ross.

"Kruger had no competition in the 1200-yard back-stroke swim in capturing the event in 1:57 1-2. Those who started against him had taken part in other races and were in no condition for a hard test."

"Miss Dorothy Burns of Los Angeles outswam all opponents in the women's races and won at 50 yards in 0:30 1-2, and at 220 yards in 3:20, the latter being a new American record for an open water course."

ATHLETIC

Overton Makes Record

New York, March 19.—Johnny Overton of Yale smashed the world's indoor record for the 1,000-yard run tonight at the National stadium, when he captured the 22nd Regiment Army.

Overton whirled around the smooth pine floor track in 2m. 14s., cutting 1-9 seconds from his own world's record, which he made in the same race a year ago.

Joe Ray of the Illinois A. C. who has made two world's marks this winter, was second, a badly beaten man. He finished fifteen yards behind Overton. David Caldwell of the Boston A. A. was third and J. J. O'Brien of the Victoria Club of Philadelphia was fourth.

Overton raced to the front with the mark of the gun and was never headed. He ran a race designed to kill off all opposition and he made it a complete success. The distance was obviously too short for Ray, who burned himself up trying to follow Overton's wonderful pace.

At the half-mile mark Overton was timed in 1m. 57 1-2s., with Ray hanging on like a leech only a few yards back. It was in the last 100 yards that he began to crack and he finally opened a gap of ten, then twelve and finally fifteen yards on the Illinois flyer, breaking the tape with a final sprint that was spectacular in the extreme.

Captain Gayton and Crew of the Harry W. Haynes, Which rounded

Captain William Gayton and his crew of five men arrived in the city this morning from Portland, Me., where they were landed on Sunday by the schooner Bluenose, having been picked up near Cashiers Ledge on Saturday, when their schooner, the Harry W. Haynes, foundered.

About an hour after being taken on board the schooner Bluenose they saw the Harry W. Haynes disappear beneath the waves. Upon their arrival in the city this morning the members of the crew were paid off by J. Willard Smith, local agent for the schooner.

THE STREET WORK

Commissioner Fisher Speaks of Finances in Connection With Department

That the department of public works is finding it difficult to do the required work and still keep within the financial allowances of the department was the statement made this morning by Commissioner G. Fred Fisher.

"I am determined to come out at the end of the year without a deficit," he said, "and I find that with so much work to do, which naturally requires many men, it is a difficult matter to keep the crews within reasonable numbers and still please the people. When I came into office the money looked large and I put on a large number of workers, but then in August I saw that the crews must be reduced if we expected to come out whole. This we did not do, and now it has come to an exchange of opinion between the street superintendent and myself as to what is to be done. He naturally favors getting the work done, while I believe that the estimates will not allow any great expenditure for labor. We have no more money for this purpose than we had last year, yet wages are higher, and things generally are more expensive. The workers, now ranging from thirty-five to forty a day, should be so distributed that all parts of the city will be benefited."

The people should bear in mind," continued the commissioner, "that March is the hardest month of the year for the street department, and it is practically impossible to keep the streets in such a condition that the people would not be obliged to make outlay for rubbers and waterproof boots."

Several crews were out yesterday removing ice formations from the streets, including a long stretch of Charlotte street. This work will be continued, largely on the shady sides of the street, until practically all is removed in the central sections of the city, and where traffic is the heaviest.
