GROUNDS OF PROTEST. "We, the undersigned Ministers and Elders, members of the Presbytery of Saint John, do, in our own name and in the name of all who may choose to adhere to us, hereby solemnly pro-

to adhere to us, hereby solemnly pro-test that:

"The real historical and hereditary identity of the Presbyterian Church in Canada consists in her faithful adher-ence to her Standards of Doctrine, namely (a) The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as being the only infallible rule of faith and man-ners; (b) the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Larger and Shorter Catechisims as her subordinate standof Faith and the Larger and Shorter Catechisims as her subordinate standards, and (c) the principles and practice of the Presbyterian Churches as laid down generally in the form of Church Government and the Directory for Pablic Worship of God, all set forth in the Basis of Union of 1875.

"We do further project that the deci-"We do further protest that the deci sion of the prevailing party in the Presbyterian Church in Canada to merge that Church in another Church holding different standards and polity is beyond the powers of the General Assembly, and that we cannot comply with the course pursued.
