The dead are Lucille, the 40-year-old daughter of James Holmes, a farmer, and a six-month-old baby. The engine struck the automobile about 30 feet.

EDMONTON, July 2.—Although yesterday was a holiday, the strike in the Edmonton coal fields was officially in effect, according to representatives of the miners' union. The strike came into effect with the expiration of the agreement between the miners and operators at midnight on June 30.

Whoooping Cough Causes Deaths in N.S.

BRIDGEWATER, N. S., July 2.—Whoooping cough was Nova Scotia's most fatal communicable disease last year, its presence resulting in deaths equal in number to that of typhoid, measles, diphtheria, and scarlet fever combined, according to a statement made yesterday at the annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Medical Society in this session here.

No statement has been made as to when the elections will take place but the present legislature will lapse in October.

LABOR HELPED

Message From Moscow Flows Into Great Britain For Use Against Government

LABOR SUSPICIOUS

Whether Chamberlain and Baldwin are prepared at this juncture to sanction a break is a matter of great doubt. In labor quarters there is grave suspicion today that such action, however, is a mere camouflage and may be a small percentage of the part of many ministerialists that Soviet money is still coming into England to assist the reds in the British labor organization, and that view is shared also by some astute laborites, though at the present time they are not giving voice to such opinions.

BREAK OPPOSED

Labor as a whole and many Liberals are opposed to any break with Moscow, and there is also a feeling among them that such a step should be avoided if at all possible.

PEACE THREATENED

A complete break might also determine Moscow to open up old scores with Poland and Rumania and thereby will add greatly to the dangers of European peace in the eastern European corridor.


American Tourists Visit Paris Instead of Going to London

REFUSES TO TELL FATE OF CHILD

Mrs. Mary Jones Goes to Prison—Kidnapped Boy—Censured by Judge.

NEW YORK, July 2.—Mrs. Mary Jones, taken away to serve the sentence of 25 to 40 years in prison for kidnapping 3-year-old Raymond von Mauski last March, resisted all attempts to get from her the secret of the boy's whereabouts.

Wicked Woman. "I think you have killed the boy and that is why you won't answer," said the judge.

Then she was taken to prison. Mrs. Jones is an attractive, intelligent woman, 40 years of age.

Selected Child in Street. While out on bail, awaiting trial, she spotted the little Mauski boy on the street.

Now she elicits to go to prison, virtually for life, rather than tell whether or not the child is alive or dead.

EARLY HISTORY TOLD IN PRINTS AND WRITINGS

Saint John Archives Office Opened With Alluring Display

MUCH IS THERE TO GRIP ATTENTION

Pictures of Early Scenes in New Brunswick Among the Exhibits.

New Brunswick history since its earliest beginnings is attractively set forth in the archive rooms of the Dominion Savings Bank building today under the direction of Major Gustav Lanctot, K. C., archivist, from Ottawa. Major Lanctot was very busy this morning arranging pictures and documents so that all might be seen to the best advantage. He said he was endeavoring to make the exhibit one of special interest to students, so that facts concerning New Brunswick might be available for writers, historians and any who wished to know about the interesting beginnings and accomplishments of this province.

OF MUCH INTEREST

To those who think that archives mean dry old papers, with illegible writing and uninteresting information, opened informally at 10 o'clock, with several visitors at that hour, disabused the mind. Documents and maps are plenty, but on first entering the room, one is impressed that a select art gallery has been opened for the benefit of the public. The pictures are quaint, rich in coloring and in many cases amusing. Plans for a dry dock to be built at Navy Island are shown dated 1828.

FASHIONABLES OF 1834

One picture shows the "New Brunswick Fashionable" of 1834. The information points after the statement. They are assembling for a sleighing party in January, 1834, at "Fredericktown" the dresses of the ladies, pelisses and bonnets, are various in color and the whole is a most delectable appearance. The name of the producer of the picture is a familiar one in New Brunswick history. "Francis Henery, bookbinder, stationer and binder, of Fredericktown." Nearly all the pictures are scenes of winter, where any festivities are under way.

Where industry flourishes, lovely woodland scenes, with pretty greenery, men at work, with camp fires, and background and bright splashes of color from flowers, mill wheels and what may have given hope in those early days that there was something besides snow in New Brunswick.

SAM SLICK

Judge Halliburton ("Sam Slick") is shown in a clever drawing as a noble animal. The drawing was done by Mr. Torre, of Halifax, N. S. The picture of the Blizzard property on Long Island and the old time assembling of the officers of Saint John and "Fredericktown" in 1824, in February are not unknown to Saint John people. Mrs. Thomas Bustin, of Princess street, possesses a similar picture. Stephen Blizzard was married to Miss Bustin, sister of the late Thomas Bustin, and when Mrs. Blizzard died, in her hand, she left the picture to her sister-in-law, Mrs. Bustin.

BOOK SECTION

A bookcase holds books that are substantial in binding, and have some alluring titles. A book of dispatches from the British secretary of state from 1827 to 1840 is available for students. It shows the handwriting of the many secretaries through the years and is a work of art. Oliver Cromwell's handwriting is seen and that of General Amherst, to Colonel Monckton in letters written in 1758. Those who visit the room are advised to have no other engagement for several hours, to absorb the privileges of the opportunity offered.

The Saint John office is under the direction of Dr. J. D. Logan, of Halifax, and Miss Vera Daye is assistant archivist here.
