

England Ponders Currency Inflation To Revive Trade

£100,000,000 Flotation to Reduce Unemployment-Minister Scouts Proposal.

London, Oct. 15.—Currency inflation as a means of reviving Great Britain's sagging trade and of reducing unemployment is now being widely discussed. That such a scheme has been suggested to the Government by reputable authorities is known, and one proposal involving the sum of £100,000,000 was said by Minister of Labor Barlow to have been put forward by no less an authority than Frederick Goodenough, chairman of Barclay's Bank.

Mr. Barlow said such a proposal was worth consideration, but that neither he nor the Government was responsible for it. A number of plans, he added, have been considered and "developments are in sight." The minister ex-

Coolidge Silent on Lloyd George Plan-Borah Opposed.

Washington, Oct. 16.—Comment is withheld at the White House on the proposal of David Lloyd George for an understanding between the United States and the British Empire for world peace. President Coolidge made no statement on the proposal and gave no indication whether the Government viewed the project favorably or otherwise.

It is not expected that any comment will be made on the Lloyd George plan by any one qualified to represent the views of the Chief Executive on the subject. The feeling of the President is understood to be that Lloyd George, distinguished as he is, nevertheless is not speaking as an official of the British Government.

If such a proposition were to come from Britain officially, then this Government would feel impelled to give it serious consideration. For the present the plan for such an understanding as Lloyd George would bring about is viewed in Administration quarters as an unofficial expression, which does not call for an expression of an official sort here.

Borah Opposes Any "Understanding."

Little comment is made here on the proposal of Lloyd George by persons qualified to go into the subject. Some said that if there was to be any arrangement for world peace with Great Britain it probably would have to be in the form of an actual treaty if it was to be regarded as binding on the United States. Lloyd George apparently does not favor a treaty so much as an informal understanding.

Senator Borah of Idaho opposed the idea of any understanding of the sort provided by Lloyd George, whether with Great Britain or any other power. He said:—



WOMEN'S CITY CLUB FOR BIG BOND ISSUE

Favors \$50,000,000 for N. Y. Institutions to Be Voted on In November.

In November.

New York, Oct. 16.—The Committee on Public Health and the Board of Directors of the Women's City Club of New York, of which Miss Mary Garrett Hay is president, has gone on secord as favoring the bond issue of \$50,000,000 for State hospitals and other State institutions which is to be voted upon at the November election. Resolutions adopted urge the members of the club to vote favorably and to exert all practical efforts towards disveminating information of the subject."

The preamble to the resolution points out that "a large number of the buildings of the State hospitals for the insane, feeble-minded, crippled chridren, incipient tuberculosis and other unfortunates were erected before modern methods of fireproofing were known, and are a constant and serious menace to the lives of the patients and their caretakers." The preamble continues:

"The overcrowding in the hospitals for the ansane, amounting to more than 1,000 patients, an excess of about 24 percent. over their proper capacity, further increases the fire hazard and seriously netrieres with curative treatment, relucing the possibilities of recovery.

"The State institutions for the feeble-sinded who are a menace to themselves and to the welfare of the communities which they live."
