

The speaker next touched upon the necessity to increase Canada's export trade. "As citizens and business men, we should stimulate the export trade of the country," he counselled. "We must increase our revenue. We must create surplus money in order to carry on the business of the country. Canada is trying to find new markets. The delegation of the Boards of Trade and the C. M. 

After the meetings of the Dominion board of railway commissioners in Halifax and St. John, there was a conference held between representatives of the railways and the farmers about the rates on fertilizers. 





The first returns showed heavy majorities for Mr. Meighen in the towns and villages and these majorities were never in danger by the Progressive in the rural parts.

In the election of December last, 8,-731 votes were cast in Grenville and of these Casselman, Conservative, received 4,325; Payne, Progressive, 2,392, and Mc-Intosh, Liberal, 2,014.

Today's contest with its 1,620 majority for Mr. Meighen brought out a much lighter vote, though the weather in eastern Ontario was all that could be desired for the polling. Complete returns give Meighen, Conservative, 4,438; Patterson, Progressive, 2,818.

With his election today Hon. Mr. Meighen is assured of an income of \$14,000, \$10,000 of which he will receive as opposition leader, the remainder being the sessional indemnity. Some time ago Hon.
