Sandy Hook, N. J., July 15-A yachting armada gathered off the Hook today for the first America's Cup race in 17 years. Private craft, excursion boats and airplanes speeding southward across New York Bay found nestling behind the great sand spit, two sloops that are the pride of Great Britain and the United States, Shamrock IV, challenger, with sleek green sides, and Resolute, the defender, dazzling in her coat of

Aboard them were Captain William P. Burton and his crew of British tars, and Captain Charles Francis Adams, of Boston, with his yankee sailormen. White clad figures gazed aloft scanning the reavens for clouds that betokened winds favorable or unfavorable.

With the start set for noon from the Ambrose Channel Light vessel the rival skippers conversed with their navigators regarding weather and wind conditions which would determine the course to be set them by the race committee. Sir Thomas Lipton, making his fourth attempt to lift the bottomiess pewter mug, emblem of sailing supremacy of the sea, cast his eye to weather and remarked:—"If the wind will hold its present strength, PH ask nothing better for my Irish challenger. The Shamrock IV. is a fine boat, and I hope to win."

Captain Burton had, his crew up with sunrive, sand before six o'clock a boat load of sailors were on their way from the tender Killarney to the challenger to remove sail covers and sand headsails up with stops.

"My opinion is that the first hour of today's race will tell the story of the America's Cup contest," said the Shamrock's skipper. "We will then know what each sloop can do."

"We should have no complaint to make of this weather," said Captain Adams, "and I believe Resolute will give a good account of herself. "Sir Thomas' ship should make it interesting," added the United States skipper, as he surveyed the green bodied Shamrock from whose lowering top-mast fluttered Sir Thomas' flag.

Official Returns From Plebiscite In St. John

A total of 15,254 votes was cast in the prohibition plebiscite in St. John city and county on Saturday last and only 353 ballots were rejected from all the polls. In giving the official returns yesterday, High Sheriff Amon A. Wilson, returning officer for the county, said that the rejected ballots were about equally divided among those who showed partiality for prohibition and those who were opposed to the act. Some of the spoiled ballots were marked with four Xs in the section which showed the voter to be in favor of light wines and beer; some put an "X" in all four sections; some marked out the sections they did not like; others wrote their names on the ballot. Some few of the rejected ballots showed the voter was in favor of prohibition and also in favor of the sale of light wines and beer. In referring to these, Sheriff Wilson said that he would have credited these votes, as it was a perfectly legitimate ballot. In all, the city and county gave a majority of 1,851 for the prohibition act, and 1,018 against the sale of light wines and beer under government control. In the city 11,622 votes were cast by the electorate of more than 28,000, and 3,012 votes were cast in the county, from a list of more than 7,000 qualified voters. 

Report That Prairie Producers Market All Own Product Is Denied-Depends on Freight.

Calgary, July 15—The statement of a leading coal merchant" in Montreal, contained in a Canadian Press despatch "a leading coal merchant in Mointean, contained in a Canadian Press despatch from that city, that the mines in the West "already market all their own product," as an instance, in the opinion of coal operators and others here, of the deliberate campaign on the part of some persons in the east to keep the western product out of the eastern market.

"The actual facts are that all domestic coal mines in Alberta, owing to lack of orders, are at the present time working to only about 25 per cent. of their capacity. This particularly applies to Drumheller, the largest domestic coal producing district of the Province," a dealer said.


When the despatch mentioned was shown to W. F. McNeil, the Secretary of the Western Coal Operators' Association, this official at once referred to Drumheller as a case in point where lack of orders was the cause of the present limited output. The Montreal merchant he said, was atterly unacquainted with the actual position of facts in the west. In Mr. McNeil's opinion the thing for eastern people to do was to make arrangements for all the coal they could get from the United States to go to Ontario and Quebec, allowing the western coal to take care of markets from the Great Lakes west. That, he said, was a feasible proposition. He strongly asserted that it was the height of folly for people of Manitoba to burn eastern coal when the people of Ontario were suffering for want of the product and mines in Alberta were shut down owing to there being no orders.






