Latter Angling for Presidential Nomination?

A DEFINITE SPLIT

It Came at the Jackson Dinner Over the Question of Making the Peace Treaty an Issue in the Elections.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Washington, D. C., Jan. 9—A split be-ween President Wilson and William ennings Bryan over whether the League f Nations should be made an issue at the coming election topped off the Jack-on day deliberations of the Democratic

party chiefs.

It came at the Jackson day dinner, as the climax of a day in which San Francisco had been chosen as the meeting place of the Democratic national committee in June, and it charged the air with political electricity.

President Wilson, in his message read to the diners, assembled in two separate halis, declared that "the clear and single way out" was to submit the question to the voters as "a great and solemn referendum."

the voters as "a great and solemn referendum."

Mr. Bryan, showing all the old-time vigor with which he led the fight for the president's nomination at Baltimore in 1912, declared that the Democratic party could not go before the country on that issue, because it involved a delay of fourteen months, and meant success only if the Democrats captured a two-thirds majority of the senate. The party, Mr. Bryan declared, must secure such compromises as may be possible."

The disagreement between the president and his former secretary of state, the first in public view since Mr. Bryan left the cabinet because he did not agree with the president's course in the diplomatic negotiations with Germany, was thus disclosed as a fact, although it has been rumored and reported in the underground currents of national politics. In the opinion of the political leaders it crystalized an issue.

President Wilson in his message said nothing whatever about a third term for himself, and neither did he make any formal announcement of his intended retirement to private life as some had forecast he would. Mr. Bryan said nothing







LANDRU OCCUPIED Skull in Good Shape of Preservation is Part of the Discovery

Paris, Jan. 9—Police officials investigating charges against Henri Landru, the alleged "bluebeard," who is accused of slaying a number of women and destroying their bodies, claim to have found about fifteen pounds of human bones in a house where Landru lived. Among the bones was a skull in a good state of preservation. Some of the bones had been cut with a saw, the teeth of which left peculiar marks which were easily recognizable.

It is said the saw with which the mark was done has been found and marks made by its teeth coincide with those found on the bone fragments. Inquiry as to the alleged operations of Landru's wife, says the Eclair, shows she was a "devoted accomplice" of her husband and "knew of everything he did." It is also charged their children aided in disposing of property secured by Landru in the course of his alleged crimes.

OVER THE OCEAN

New Project for Flight Across Atlantic

Although Aeroplane and Airship Have Crossed from North America to Britan, Future is Thought to Lie in Air-Boats.

London, Jan. 8—The announcement that another attempt may soon be made to fly across the Atlantic, this time with Berguet aeroplane, again revives interest as to what type of aerial craft will finally come into common use for crossing by air from Europe to the United States.

The great, but decidedly sporting achievements, which have already taken place, may mean nothing at all as regards the development of air-craft. We knew before the war that an aeroplane could maintain flight for more than 20 hours; 24 hours had been exceeded on one occasion. We knew that exceptional pilots could endure even that prolonged strain.

strain.

Nor was it necessary to fly the Atlantic in order to prove that aircraft can be accurately navigated out of sight of land. Directional wireless makes that possible; and it is in use every day. But apart from that, there are instruments and methods now available (although quite lately said to be impossible) which enable the aerial navigator to make a close estimate of the drift even when no fixed landmarks are in sight.

Previous Tests Neglected.

The astonishing thing about the trans-Atlantic project was that none of the entrants made sure beforehand that he possessed the physical capability. Some of them had made 10 and even 12-hour of them had made 10 and even 12-hour flights; but there is a great deal of difference between such flights, made within reach of home, and 18 or 20 hours piloting under circumstances which will inevitably give intense anxiety. For example, contrary to copular belief, the shaking and jolting of land machines; and certain types of engine will not endure taxying even on small waves, which, at high speed, seem as hard as concrete. Now the advantages, again contrary to what was at one time almost uni-versally held, begin in the aerodymatics of the air-boat. Actually, the boat is lighter and offers less air-resistance than the wheeled underconsister. This edvanlighter and offers less air-resistance than the wheeled undercarriage. This advantage can be used for greater petrol capacity and for higher speed, although the latter is less important; and it is greatly increased by the fact that there is no reason why the air-boat should be given a high altitude capacity. 
be given a high altitude capacity. For all purposes, until we reach the stage when we can make intelligent use of upper currents of the air that will one day be accurately charted, the air-boat, can safely fly at low altitudes, which in overland flying would more often than not be dangerous from the point of view of forced landings, besides being an annoyance to the people below.

Another advantage of the air-boat is its independence of specially equipped landing-places. It can come down anywhere on the water, and for that reason alone is likely in the long run to present a smaller bill of costs for repairs. Commercially, it will have the advantage of being in competition with comparatively slow traffic, whereas in many parts the aeroplane will at first be ruled out by superior railway facilities. What has been said must not be taken as an argument in favor of the exclusive use of sea aeroplanes, or as indicating any paralyzing defect of land machines: quite the contrary, each division will have its sphere. The two-seater aeroplane, which was the first to fly direct across the Atlantic, is utterly unsuited to that class of work; and it will be one's duty to make that perfectly plain when the time comes. Yet the two-seater has its definite place in the aeronautical scheme; and that place cannot be enroached upon either by the air-boat or by the big airship.
