



Hon. W. J. Hanna, as provincial secretary, has put into practice some of the most modern ideas in prison management the experts of any country have been able to devise. The latest was announced last week, in the opening of the industrial farm in the Township of Burwash, twenty-one miles north of Sudbury. It is an extension of the plan already put into successful operation at Fort William, where 1,000 acres were set aside. Of this 700 acres have been cleared since two years ago. The crops, especially oats, potatoes and roots, have been equal to any in the province, and the grazing and fodder have been unsurpassed. On this farm there are fortyfive head of stock. What has thus been done experimentally affords the basis for the greater enterprise now taken in hand.





GERMANS ADVANCING ON OSTEND.

London, Oct. 11, 12.11 p. m.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from The Hague, dated Saturday, says that according to trustworthy information from Belgium, the Germans are advancing swiftly toward Ostend, with the object of making the king, queen and government officials of Belgium prisoners. It is said that the queen has left for England.

London, Oct. 12, 4.15 a.m.—Germany has imposed a fine of \$20,000,000 (\$100,000,000) on Antwerp as a war indemnity.

London, Oct. 11, 9.30 p.m.—With the conclusion of that phase of the war of the nations which came with the fall of Antwerp, the censorship has again drawn a veil over the fighting in the greater part of the European continent.




