In the war of manifestos which the political leaders are daily handing out to the press, the Government is making it abundantly evident that it intends to force through a measure limiting debate, unless the Opposition sees fit to swallow the Naval Aid Act with all that it implies. The excuse for such action is said to be in the obstruction of all public business by the Opposition before the Easter recess, and Mr. Borden is authority for the statement that a reaumption of the alleged obstruction tactics will bring about instant reprisals in the form of closure. As a matter of fact the Liberals did not obstruct all public business before Easter. The offer was made by them to assist in giving the West Indian treaty third reading, that full advantage might be taken of the Spring trade with the Islands. On the two occasions on which supply was asked it was instantly granted. Hearings on the Bank Act before the Banking Committee.


of Canada is not likely to prove easy to carry out and will be resisted in Parlia-ment to the uttermost. More than that, the effort to make the Opposition appear guilty of delaying business will be futile

guilty of delaying business will be futile also, because every item of public expenditure, brought forward by the Government, has been passed upon promptly and in order, and every other Bill save the Navy Bill has been treated with every generosity. If Mr. Bordon is determined to hold up all public business, to make everything wait upon his contribution policy, then Mr. Borden is guilty of the crime of causelessly bringing direct injury upon the country which he was elected to govern, and of using his office to earry out the wishes and ideas of the enemies of Canada and of British connection. The threat of the gag means simply that the Administration is ready to hold the pistol to Canada's head in order to force from her thirty-five millions to send out of the country to where it is not needed.



CLAIMS THAT RADIUM Can prolong life, made by Ger-

LONDON, April 2.—Claims that rad um can restore hardened arteries of middle-aged people to a healthy condition and prolong life were made by Dr. Saubermaun, Berlin, lecturing in London before the Routgen Society. If they are correct it will be possible, for a few pounds, to buy radium apparatus which can manufacture the elizir of youthfulness.

The apparatus consists of an earthenware receptable containing a minute amount of radium, which is placed in the bottom of a glass bottle. The bottle is filled with water and in the course of time the water becomes charged with radium emanations and the radium remains active for hundreds of years. So it is only necessary to renew the water in order to get any number of doses. man doctor.

DEATH OF SIR GORDON SPRIGO A LOSS TO SOUTH AFRICA.

eteran Statesman Who Went To the Dark Continent In Search of Health and Entered Politics-Was Prime Minister of Cape Colony on Four Occasions and Saw Two Wars In That Country.

South Africa, in the recent death of Sir Gordon Sprigg, mourns a statesman who had played a distinguished part in the public life of the country. Sir Gordon was Premier of Cape Colony on no fewer than four occasions. Born in Inswich in 1830, the son of a Baptist minister, he began life in London as a journalist, and was a Parliamentary reporter and contributor to various newspapers. When twenty-eight his health broke down, and, like Cecil Rhodes, he went to South Africa in search of health. So ill was he when he left England that he had to be carried on the ship. Becoming a farmer, he soon became the possessor of great herds of cattle and sheep. The settler was drawn into politics, and eleven years after his artiful he was elected to the Cape House of Assembly. He quickly came to the Tront, and a decade later was made Premier. Radium and Photography. The alpha and beta rays of radium the positive and negative particles in-to which the atom breaks up, are now studied by photography. The process has been developed in recent months has been developed in recent months by C. T. R. Wilson, and was illustrated by Prof. W. H. Bragg, at the last meeting of the British Association.

The bit of radium is held in a short glass cylinder six inches in diameter, one end of which is closed with a glass plate, while a movable piston is fitted into the other. A few months later he entered, with his brother, the same post office, and said he wanted to send some more money home. The postmaster said to him, "Why don't you use the banks, you will get it a little cheaper," and he replied, "I found the last money went safely, and my friends got it easily, and I want to send it through the post office." "How much have you this time?" he was asked, and he counted out another roll of over \$4,000; now that \$4,000 added to the \$3,000, makes \$7,000 that those two brothers sent home from Nova Scotia to their friends in seven years. There are many here who may be inclined to disbelieve it, but I can understand it perfectly well. They earn monthly, let me say, \$65; and they pay only \$4.00 a week for board, and I don't see what is to hinder a single man from saving \$42 a month with that wage. Now, the moral is, if immigrants can save such amounts, our own men can do the same if they will only set their minds to it. It shows thrift. I know it is against the socialistic idea, this matter of thrift, because they discountenance it. I know that in a lodge of the P. W. A. some of the members did say they have nothing to do with industry, with sobriety or thrift; that the only idea of a labor. union is to get better wages from the employer. A MARVELLOUS MEMORY.

Presbyterian Minister Who Knew the Of the many examples of prodigious memories which have been recorded from time to time, none, perhaps, have been so remarkable as the case of Rev. Thomas Threlkeld, who was a Presbyterian minister at Rochdale for twenty-eight years, and died there in April, 1306, at the age of sixty-seven. Threlkeld's memory first attracted attention when he attended the Grammar School at Daventry, where he began to make a close study of the Bible. When a passage was recited to him he could immediately give it chapter and verse, and, on the other hand, if a chapter and verse were given he could at once repeat the passage. Bible By Hearte

Both at Daventry and Warrington, where he went to finish his education, his fellow students delighted in putting his memory to the test, and never once was it known to be at fault.

In later years, says Mr. Frank Hird, in "Lancashire Stories." "Threlkeld was looked upon as a living concordance to the Bible in Rochdale and the neighborhood, and was constantly asked the most puzzling questions by his brother ministers, sometimes acturally for information, but generally for mere amusement. He was never known to be wrong." Threkeld's powers of memory, however, were not solely concerned with theology. He was also a linguist, and knew thine bir ten languages; while dates were a proposition with him, no matter how minimportant. His knowledge of histories dates, of chronology, heraldry, and stynesticy was encyclopaedic, and one of this avorite amusements was to go difficult the succession in the Episcopal Sees and trace the pedigrees of familiar.

Having overcome the financial difficulties of that country, Sir Edgar returned to Constantinople as Governor of the Imperial Ottoman Bank, and succeeded in placing Sultan Abdul Hamid's Government on a satisfactory financial footing.
