Ottawa, July 5.—The minister of agriculture has authorized a special inquiry to be made into the fruit growing industry of Canada under the direction of J. A. Rudlick, dairy and cold storage commissioner.

The well known fruit grower, W. H. Bunting of St. Catharines, Ontario has been engaged to conduct the inquiry. The report which should be a very valuable one, will be available for the Dominion Fruit Growers' Conference, to be held at Ottawa next winter.

CANADA REPRESENTED IN STEEL CONFERENCE

Brussels, July 5.—The steel interests of Canada, England, United States, France, Germany, Belgium, Italy, Austria and Spain were represented by 160 delegates who met in conference today preliminary to the formation of an international association, broadly similar to the American Steel Institute.

MR. BORDEEN IS IN MANITOBA

Conservative Leader and Party Held Three Meetings Yesterday.

Reciprocity Pact Discussed with President of Grain Growers, and Mr. Borden Reiterates His Position on Subject -- He Says Government Has no Mandate.

Minneapolis, Man., July 5.—R. L. Borden and his party are in Manitoba again and spent today in the constituency of Marquette, represented by Dr. Roche, who has been the opposition leader's chief lieutenant on the present tour.

Three meetings were held today and were largely attended. The special train left Yorkton during the night and at 10 o'clock this morning Mr. Borden addressed a good sized meeting at Binscarth.

At Shoal Lake, Mr. Borden was again waited on by the grain growers and their president R. C. Henders bitterly assailed the western members of parliament who were opposing the pact and called upon the grain growers to defeat them at the polls.

Mr. Borden again made his position perfectly clear on the reciprocity issue, adding that as the organized farmers professed to favor the principle of the referendum they should support him in his demand that the people be consulted before the agreement went into effect.

Mr. Henders replied to this that no mandate from the people was necessary as the grain growers by resolution and otherwise had come out in favor of reciprocity.

To this the opposition leader replied, that the reciprocity agreement could not assist them in their crusade, as it definitely fixed the duty on certain implements at fifteen per cent.

Tomorrow Mr. Borden strikes Grandview and Dauphin in Glen Campbell's constituency. For some days now the weather has been so cool that the steam heat has been turned on in the special car.

BROILING HOT IN MONTREAL

Heat Wave Exacting Terrible Toll From Children—146 Babies Died During Last Two Days.

Montreal, July 5.—Hopes raised in the hearts of Montrealers by a sudden fall in temperature late last night, which drove the mercury down to 64, faded rapidly during the day as the thermometer, hour by hour, registered higher temperatures and the heat wave resumed its siege of the city with scarcely abated vigor.

Terrible as has been the infant death toll in past summers in this city the present prolonged heat wave has increased the number of deaths to an awful extent. On Monday and Tuesday no less than 146 deaths of children were recorded at the city hall and today the officials were kept busy recording sad news brought them by sorrowing parents.

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CROP NEWS WAS AGAIN A BIG FACTOR

New York, July 5.—Movements of stocks seemed to be governed largely today by the tenor of reports in regard to crop prospects. The selling movement of Monday was resumed on a larger scale, and pronounced weakness developed, the action of the market suggesting that it was suffering from the effects of a crop scare.

Official denial that the Erie road was to be affiliated with Canadian Pacific caused a sharp setback in the Erie's as well as in the stock of the Canadian Pacific road, and the selling of these issues, presumably of a speculative character, was among the day's most prominent features.

While the crop, as a whole, could experience considerable deterioration without impairing the prospect of the largest yields on record, yet the fact that cannot be overlooked that a 14,000,000 bale crop would not exceed the prospect of the July option as evidence that the campaign in the old crop months had been abandoned.
