Madison, Wis., Dec. 3.—State Fire Marshal T. M. Purcell in a statement today said that his department has collected evidence which shows the existence of an "arson trust" operating in Wisconsin and other states for a number of years. He added that warrants have been issued for the arrest of several of the alleged principals most of whom live outside of Wisconsin. The setting of fires was carried on, according to Mr. Purcell, in conjunction with a band of adjusters of fire losses.

BRIDGE FALLS SEVERAL CARS GO DOWN

Canadian Northern Railway's Big Trestle Bridge Collapsed When Freight Train Was Backed Across It. Porth Worth, Texas, Dec. 3.—John Beal Sneed was today found not guilty of the murder of Captain Al. G. Boyce, Sneed shot Captain Boyce to death on January 13 in Fort Worth, soon after Sneed returned from Winnipeg with his wife, with whom Al. G. Boyce, Jr., son of Capt. Boyce had eloped. Sneed claimed self-defence and also a conspiracy on the part of the Boyces to rob him of his wife.

TRIPLE TRAGEDY

Rockland, Me., Dec. 3.—Mrs. Austin Elwell, of Cushing, killed her two small children and herself by jumping with them into an abandoned limestone quarry, 400 feet deep and nearly filled with water. Family troubles, it is believed, caused the act. Mrs. Elwell was twenty-three years old, and the children, both boys, were aged five and four respectively.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry will not be made for a quarter section on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or intending homesteader.

Butter—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in case of three years. A homesteader may have within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres acreage owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader to first standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption until he has resided for a period of six years from date of homestead entry, provided the State required for homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead on certain lands for \$150 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each three years, and cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.

MR. PUGSLEY IS ANXIOUS.

It is quite evident that Hon. William Pugsley does not propose that his light shall be hidden under a bushel. After a lengthy and but somewhat meaningless speech in the House of Commons he hurried from the capital to St. John. He escaped the interviewer as he rushed through Montreal—an event sufficiently unusual as to attract attention in newspaper and political circles. But the interviewer did not escape Mr. Pugsley on his arrival in this city and nearly a column of yesterday's Telegraph is used to permit the Minister of Public Works to express his views on various topics. From what he says there is something the matter as between the Government, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. and Dr. Pugsley himself. The difficulty so far as the general public have been able to get at it is that the Grand Trunk Pacific directors have declined to operate the National Transcontinental Railway in this section and that the Government to protect private interests, and to prevent the deterioration of the road, have been compelled temporarily to undertake its operation, there being no means within the power of the Government to compel the company to operate the railway before its completion. This is a condition alleged to be due to the careless preparation of the contract by Sir Wilfrid Laurier's lawyers and officials. Dr. Pugsley puts it somewhat differently.

But this is not the only subject Dr. Pugsley deals with. He wants the Government to make all the preparations for the coming of the Grand Trunk Pacific to St. John right away. He wants grain elevators built, yard room provided and many other things done immediately, and blames the Government for not having already taken action. At the risk of being charged with greed, the people of St. John want all done that Mr. Pugsley suggests and much more, and for Mr. Pugsley's information, if he has not heard it before, are making strong efforts to have their wishes carried out, and have not met with an unfriendly reception from the Government.

Mr. Pugsley would have the people believe that all these things would have been done already had Sir Wilfrid Laurier not been defeated. Mr. Pugsley forgets that he permitted three full years to elapse after telling the people of this city that wharves and warehouses would be ready in Courtenay Bay when the first train over the Grand Trunk Pacific would reach tidewater without moving a hand. Where was Mr. Pugsley's anxiety then? He was a member of Sir Wilfrid's Government and presumably clothed with power to carry out his wishes and those of the constituency he represented. He was not able to do any of the things he now suggests and was forced out of office with a record of broken pledges.

THE WORLD'S COMMERCE.

The result of a compilation from the official publications of about seventy leading countries, recently made by the statistical division of the United States Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, indicates that the world's international commerce will establish a new record in 1913. It is anticipated that the total will aggregate \$25,000,000,000 against \$21,000,000,000 in 1912; \$20,000,000,000 in 1910 and \$17,500,000,000 in 1909, having thus doubled in twenty-two years.

This estimate of the probable aggregate of world commerce in 1913, according to the Wall Street Journal, is based upon the official figures of trade of the various countries during such portions of the year as can be shown, covering in most cases the first six months and in some instances extending down to the end of September. Nearly all the important countries show larger totals for 1912 than in 1911, or any earlier year. Reducing the figures to a common basis (the monthly average for such parts of the year as are available), imports into the United Kingdom increased from \$365,000,000 per month in 1911 to \$386,000,000 in 1912; the United States, from \$125,000,000 to \$148,000,000; Germany from \$180,000,000 to \$205,000,000; Austria-Hungary from \$51,000,000 to \$58,000,000; Belgium from \$67,000,000 to \$70,000,000; and Canada from \$30,000,000 to \$52,000,000.

A few countries show a decrease in their monthly importations: France from an average of \$122,000,000 per month in 1911 to \$127,000,000 in 1912; Argentina from \$21,000,000 to \$20,000,000. Practically every country increased its exports, the average monthly exportation of Canada, for example, increasing from \$20,000,000 in 1911 to \$27,000,000 in 1912; France from \$94,000,000 to \$102,000,000; Germany from \$152,000,000 to \$168,000,000; India from \$81,000,000 to \$86,500,000; the United Kingdom from \$179,000,000 to \$192,000,000, and the United States from \$158,000,000 to \$171,000,000; while that of Argentina decreased from \$19,000,000 in 1911 to \$18,000,000 in 1912, and that of Russia from \$59,000,000 to \$51,000,000. The total value of imports into the seventy principal countries and colonies of the world in 1911 approximated \$17,600,000,000. It is of interest to note that the largest markets for American products, measured by their valuation of imports from the United States are the United Kingdom, \$272,000,000; Canada, \$255,000,000; Germany, \$235,000,000; France \$119,000,000; Netherlands, \$117,000,000.

LIBERAL ATTACK ON SIR GEORGE ROSS.

The election of Sir George Ross to lead the Liberal majority in the Senate has not been allowed to pass without adverse comment in the Opposition press. The Huron Examiner, published by Mr. M. G. McLean, former Liberal member for South Huron, and one of the oldest Liberal politicians in Ontario, delivers itself as follows:

"It is not surprising that the Conservative party should gloat over the action of the Liberal Senators. The Senate has done some queer things in the past, but that ancient relic has never done a stranger thing than was done by the Liberal members of the Senate when they selected Sir George Ross as their leader and chief spokesman. It was Sir George Ross and Sir John Gibson who wrecked the Liberal party in Ontario and gave Sir James Whitney his opportunity. It was the speeches and writings of Sir George Ross as much as any other thing that defeated the Liberal party in September, 1911, and unless he is gagged and manacled he will keep Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers in the cold chains of Opposition so long as he occupies his present position. It is an awfully long step downwards from Sir Richard Cartwright, the late Liberal leader in the Senate, to Sir George Ross, the present leader. Sir Richard was a statesman, a patriot, and a true man. Sir George Ross is gifted beyond the majority of his fellows. As a versatile public speaker he has been heard in every part of the province of an enviable share of patient persistency, especially in his own interests. But he is an opportunist more than a statesman. It is no wonder, therefore, that the action of the Liberal Senators rejoices the heart of every Little Canadian, every Tory Jingo and every Trade Restrictionist in Canada."

Evidently the Examiner has a keen recollection of the downfall of the Liberal party in Ontario. It is not slow to take the opportunity to place the blame where it rightly belonged. Neither can there be any question that Sir George Ross contributed to the defeat of the Liberals last year. Coming from a Liberal newspaper these admissions that there is open dissension in the party are significant.

CIVIC GOVERNMENT.

The electors of the city of San Jose, California, are about to vote upon a new charter, to which some interest attaches, as it is claimed to be based on the latest approved principles of business management. From a review of the charter, in the Toronto World, it appears that it was framed by a board of freeholders selected on account of the personality, capacity and civic loyalty of its members. In the course of fulfilling the duty entrusted to them, they obtained and studied the most recent charters adopted in the United States, and particularly devoted their attention to the merits and defects of civic government by elected commissions. After four months' work, the board has unanimously recommended a new charter for San Jose which they claim embodies features of the present charter and the result of the experience of other cities.

The board recognized that the defective administration, which led to the reform movement, lay in the diffusion of power and the dispersal of responsibility. San Jose is now being asked to sanction the appointment of a mayor as its business manager. He will sit for four years at a good salary, and must devote his whole time to the city's affairs. For the subordinate officials he appoints he will be held strictly accountable, and if he fails to discharge his trust, the electors can remove him by exercising their power of recall.

Other elective officials are an auditor, five councillors and a police judge. These officials, as well as the mayor, will be chosen under the dual system of elections, which ensures that the successful candidates are the selection of a majority of the voters. Along with his sample ballot, every voter will receive a copy of the proposed charter, and this will be placed in the best position to approve or disapprove its provisions.

St. John wants all the information procurable on the best methods of securing a system of equitable taxation. Mr. A. B. Farmer is an intelligent advocate of the single tax and apparently a humble disciple of Henry George. This, however, does not prove that single tax is the best method or the only method of taxation. Mr. Farmer made a strong argument in its favor. There are just as strong and better arguments against its adoption in a community like this. The subject is one which must not be decided overnight. It must be weighed thoroughly if justice is to be done all round. Heavy taxes are out of the question, but some of the rough edges should be trimmed off the present law at the next session of the Legislature. The amendments made to the law two or three years ago were along such lines. If vacant lots were assessed at similar valuations to adjacent improved property the results would be beneficial. We might also go the length of fixing the value of land and buildings on a basis of earnings. These things would reduce the percentage of taxation and would open the door for further improvement. To value real estate on a basis of its earnings would equalize taxation on this class of property and would permit the abandonment of the present unjust income tax. The present indications are that St. John does not want a radical change in the method of assessment, but wishes a change which will equalize taxation more thoroughly than the present law.

The address of welcome which was handed to the Right Rev. Edward A. LeBlanc, the new Roman Catholic Bishop of St. John, last evening, by Dr. Quigley, by whom it was prepared and read, will be handed down as among the choicest of our local classics. The committee who chose Dr. Quigley for this pleasant task could not have made a better selection. A master of languages, it is evident that he has labored with zeal and care with the best that was in him to prepare an address that would convey in the choicest English the loyal sentiment of the people of the diocese to the new prelate sent to rule over them, and at the same time depict their zeal in the cause of the church, he represents and of whose communion they are. The address was magnificently delivered by its author who for the occasion was garbed in the robes of office of a doctor of philosophy, an honor accorded him by Pope Leo XIII.

There was something really beautiful and childlike in the manner in which Commissioner Schofield announced that the civic commission had only increased the debt of the city this year by \$11,500 because the bonds to the extent of \$21,000 had been redeemed out of the sinking fund. Everyone has listened to just such statements from members of the Common Council in years past. The increases in the debt have always been touched on in the same childlike and bland manner, and almost in the same language as that employed by Commissioner Schofield, yet in twenty years the civic debt has been more than doubled and the annual assessment has grown from somewhere in the neighborhood of \$200,000 to over \$600,000, and next year, unless all signs fail, the enormous sum of \$650,000, at least, will be necessary to maintain the civic services.

There does not appear any good necessity for the exceeding wrath of the Times over what some person has said or done respecting the use of the public school buildings by the Playground Association as social centres, and the holding of entertainments, and the doing of whatever is necessary to get the people of a neighborhood better acquainted and seeking the improvement of social conditions.

On Saturday, November 30, William Scott, of St. Croix, was taken before Magistrate Lawson, at McAdam and fined \$100 and costs for exporting partridge and shooting deer without a license. Chief Warden W. J. Deane looked after the prosecution in the interests of the government.

Edward Trainor's Condition.

Edward Trainor, who is at the general public hospital as the result of injuries received while working at Golden Grove, was reported last night to be resting as well as could be expected. His condition is considered serious and little hopes are entertained for his recovery.

Talked Assessment.

The city commissioners held a long conference with the assessors yesterday and went into the question of revising the assessment system. It is said the commissioners are considering the matter of changing the assessment law so as to increase taxes on land values and make partial exemptions on buildings.

Looking for Farm Here.

Jonas Smith, who has been farming in Western Canada for some years, has come to New Brunswick and is looking around for a farm here. Yesterday he was in Charlotte county inspecting some lands there. He believes that the east is a better place to establish a home than the West. Mr. Smith is accompanied by his wife.

New Post Office Officials.

In order to handle the additional business the following have been appointed to the railway mail service for the Christmas season and will probably go on duty this week: Amos Toole, Henry S. Day, Richard H. Stewart, John M. Barton, John F. Cummins, of St. John; F. C. Taylor, Hoyt Station; Horace G. Foster, St. Stephen; and James Cameron, Harcourt. Zill Cowan of St. John and G. W. Gaynor of Salisbury were added to the permanent force this week.

WILL BRING MANY ENGLISH FARMERS TO THIS PROVINCE

"And the farmer nearly dropped dead when I told him that farmers in the old country had to pay anywhere from \$2,000 to \$3,000 in rent to a landlord for the use of a farm no bigger than his," said W. W. Cortell, St. John representative of the Canadian Improved Farms Co., London, England.

"But then the English farmers have a great market," said the New Brunswick farmer.

The Canadian Improved Farms Company of London, Eng., has purchased the Wm. Day property near Public Landing on the St. John River. They have known out-of-the-way farmers in the past week or so to look over the situation in the province and all have been pleased with conditions here, and expect to eventually locate in the province.

Erection of Mammoth Plant in St. John Now Assured—Refinery will have Seven Large Buildings with Floor Space of 8,000,000 Square Feet.

A sugar refinery involving a capital expenditure of about \$2,000,000, with a capacity of 2,500 barrels a day, and providing employment for about 700 men is assured for St. John. Yesterday the Atlantic Sugar Refining Company deposited \$100,000 with the city as a guarantee that the refinery would be built. The refinery will consist of seven large buildings with a floor space of 8,000,000 square feet. Some of the buildings will be ten stories in height.

Yesterday F. H. Anson of Montreal, accompanied by Henry Holgate, a well known construction engineer of Montreal and J. F. Stillman of New York, who has been connected with the construction of many large sugar refineries in the United States, arrived in the city.

They spent the most of the day looking over the site of the refinery and will be in the city some time getting data for the final shaping up of the plans.

Yesterday afternoon Fred R. Taylor visited city hall and on behalf of the company deposited a certified bank check of \$100,000. The agreement respecting the guarantee was already signed by D. Lorne McGibbon and the officers of the company, and after the check was turned over to the chamberlain, the mayor and commissioners affixed their signatures to the agreement.

Will Start Work in April. When seen last evening Mr. Anson said the company planned on starting work in April and would push the construction as rapidly as possible. "We have," he said, "been working on the plans for the refinery since last July, and it remains for the architects and engineers to work out the details."

REV. DR. McINTYRE APPOINTED TREASURER OF HOME MISSION BOARD

He Succeeds Judge Emerson who is Seriously Ill—Meeting of Baptist Home Mission Board.

The quarterly mission of the Baptist home mission board was held yesterday in the rooms of the board. The reports of the quarter were submitted at the morning session and were encouraging. The treasurer reported a balance of \$1,183.03; the expenditures for the three months being \$1,537.43.

Rev. Dr. McIntyre was appointed treasurer in succession to Judge Emerson who is seriously ill. At the afternoon session an interesting account of his conversion and call to the ministry was given by C. T. Jader, a Norwegian, who is also versed in the English and German languages and who has done missionary work in India. Presenting excellent credentials, he was accepted by the board for one of the fields of the board.

Rev. Wellington Camp was appointed chairman of the committee to devise plans for increasing the home mission funds, in place of Rev. J. B. Gauque, who has resigned to take up work in Nova Scotia.

The superintendent reported the acceptance of the call to the Gagetown field by Rev. A. S. Evans, lately of Hatfield's Point.

Rev. W. Camp, C. Wilson and Rev. Dr. J. McLeod were appointed a committee to revise the association's rules and regulating pastorates of the home churches.

Rev. E. A. Allaby was reappointed to act as the board's representative in connection with the work among the immigrants at the winter work.

CITY CORNET BAND HOLDS GOOD SMOKER

The members of the City Cornet Band and a number of guests of the band celebrated the 30th anniversary of the band last evening by holding a smoker in the band rooms, King street east. There was a large number present and a most enjoyable evening was spent in speeches, songs and dances, while the band rendered several selections during the evening.

The City Cornet was 33 years old on Nov. 15th, but owing to a concert which was recently given by the band it was decided to hold off the celebration until last evening.

Among those who delivered addresses was the president of the band, J. Connelly, who is a charter member of the band, and in still one of its most valuable members. During the many years that the City Cornet Band has been in existence there have been many changes and many of the old members have passed away or left the city.

This musical organization, which is one of the most popular in the Maritime Provinces, was probably never in a stronger condition than it is at present. Their most efficient director, Frank Waddington, has for some time past been kept very busy with a large number of young recruits who are learning fast and in a short time will be fairly qualified to perform with the band. They are at present known as the City Cornet Juvenile band, and they launched a great surprise at the recent concert in the Opera House when the youngsters rendered a selection which was highly creditable.
