## BRITISH ARMY CASUALTIES 381,983

London, Sept. 14.-Official announcement was made today in the se of Commons that the total of British war casualties up to Aug-21 was 381,983 officers and men killed, wounded or missing.

Detailed figures of the casualties were announced as follows: Killed and died of wounds-Officers, 4,965; other ranks, 70,992. Wounded-Officers, 9,973; other ranks, 241,086. Missing-Officers, 1,501; other ranks, 53,466.

These figures refer to the army alone. The losses of the British army during the summer were somewhat

maller than in April and May. The last previous statement of the total of British casualties was issued by Premier Asquith on June 9, It gave a total of 258,069 up to May 31. The losses from that time up to August 21 are therefore shown to have been 123,914, a daily average of about 1,500. In the two months before the end of May, the period covered in the preceding announcement, the losses averaged about 2,000 a day.



London, Sept. 14-Reuter's Petrograd correspondent sends the following telegram forwarded by Emperor Nicholas to King George: "In this serious time my country is going through I have decided to take the leadership of my armies in my own hands. In announcing to you this fact I once more express my conviction that, with God's help and through the combined efforts of the Allies, their final victory will crown this bloody war."

The Emperor, according to the correspondent, received this reply from King George:



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



# CROP IN CANADA'S HISTORY

Preliminary estimate shows this year's crop 33 p. c. greater than previous highest yield, in 1913-Estimated at 308,839,800 bushels.

Ottawa, Sept. 13—In a bulletin issued today the census and statistics office publishes its annual preliminary estimate of the principal grain crops.



EACH INDIVIDUAL CASE IS SUBJECT TO THE REPORT OF LOCAL COMMITTEES, who shall consider all the circumstances of families affect ed, with respect to the earnings of members of such families, amounts received from former employers of the soldiers and other sources of income

Every reasonable provision is thus made for dependent relatives.


