Belgian Army Saved Dunkirk and Calais

Chicago, Dec. 23.—A call for Turkish reservists now living here was issued today by Theodore Proulx, acting Turkish consul general.
"Owing to the general mobilization in the Ottoman Empire," he said, "calling to the colors Turkish subjects who belong to the 1890, 1891, 1892 and 1893 classes of the active army, and those of the reserve and territorial army—classes of 1860-1890—must communicate with this office, so it may be learned upon what condition they may obtain an exoneration from the call to colors and secure their certificate of nationality."
Washington, Dec. 23.—Delayed advices to the United States government from Constaninople say that Turkish officials regarded the loss of the battleship Messudieh, which was blown up by a British submarine recently, as a severe loss. The feat caused consternation in the Turkish capital, because of the fear that more submarines would penetrate the Dardanelles in the Turke.

NO STANDARD CHRISTMAS

BATTLE IMMINENT THIRTY MILES FROM CRACOW; RUSSIAN ARMY ON THE OFFENSIVE IN GALICIA

Germans Find Road to Warsaw Blocked and Make Attack South- MINISTER SHOT west of the City - Inflict Heavy Loss on Enemy in Carpathian District — Allies Continue to Make Small Gains in West —Renewed Activity Along Belgian Coast — Emperor of Austria Reported Dying.

London, Dec. 23.—The Allies in the west, the Germans in Poland, and the Russians in East Prussia and Galicia continue TURKS BELIEVED their offensive operations, but the advances gained have been so slight as to be almost imperceptible. In the long run, however, the ground which is being taken may prove vital, and the various armies are fighting with an intensity which has not been exceeded since the war began.

In Poland the centre of interest has shifted slightly to the south. Finding the direct road to Warsaw blocked by Russian reinforcements, the Germans made an attack from the southwest, and have reached Skierniewice, which is some forty miles from the Polish capital. They have thus far failed British Submarine's Feat Opento pierce the Russian lines, but they have forced Grand Duke Nicholas to withdraw his forces from before Cracow. In this, one of the chlef aims of their offensive against Russia, the Germans have been successful...

IN GALICIA RUSSIANS ON OFFENSIVE.

In Galicia, Russia has resumed the offensive against the Austro-German forces which have poured in from the west and across the Car-pathians. According to the latest Petrograd report the Russians have inflicted heavy losses on these forces, while in the north they have pursued back into the interior of East Prussia a small German army, which made a feint at Warsaw from the northwest.

Although the Allies have scored some successes in the battles in the west, they are meeting with very stubborn resistance, and military men warn the public that very heavy casualties must be expected before any serious impression can be made on the German entrenchments.

any serious impression can be made on the German entrenchments. Activity seems to have been resumed along the Belgian coast, for it is announced that slight progress has been made by the Allies between the sea and the road from Nieuport to Westende.

At other points similar fighting is proceeding with here successes and there reverse, or failure of attack.

The airmen of both sides have been extremely busy, and aeroplanes have been swarming over Belgium, the aviators reconnoitering movements of the opposing troops and occasionally dropping bombs. Bruges and Brussels have been visited by aviators from the ranks of the allies while Bethune and other towns in Northern France have received attention from the Germans.

MUST POSTPONE THE CELEBRATION UNTIL WAR ENDS

London, Dec. 24 (2.20 a.m.)—The British committee concerned with the celebration of the centenary of peace between the United States and Great Britain today made public a manifesto expressing regret that since the City of Ghent, where the treaty of peace was signed, is occupied by the Germans it will be necessary to postpone the celebration until the European war has ended. The mani.esto expresses the hope that the unarmed frontier between the United States and Canada may long continue as an example to the world of the safe defense of mutual respect and trust in the affairs of nations.

Official Announcement of Russian Successes in Galicia spells definite defeat of enemy- Austrian attempt to join forces with Germans at Przemysl results disastrously to their troops--Russians moving to close in on five divisions of German Cavalry along Nida River - Czar's army in strong pe-

Petrograd, Dec. 23 (via London).—Large bodies of Russian troops are moving toward Cracow, the Galician stronghold from the north and east. An important battle apparently is developing in Southwestern Poland, near Cracow. While the Germans are not relaxing their efforts along the line from Sochaczew to Skierniewice in the movement toward Warsaw, the greatest activity Tuesday was in the vicnity of Mischow and Andrejew, immediately northeast of Cracow. The Russians have moved back to positions along the left bank of the Nida river near its junction with the Vistula thirty miles east of Cracow. The objective, of the Austro-German forces in this vicinity appears to be Kielos. Their front extends about seventy miles from the right bank of the Nida.

Their strength is estimated at eight to ten army corpe (320,000 to 400,000 men.)

The Teutonic allies on Decembe 12 attacked the outskirts of Pin

The Teutonic allies on Decembe 12 attacked the outskirts of Pinzow, 25 miles east of Miechow, and were successful in crossing the river. Subsequently, however, they were thrown back with heavy losses, after a desperate fight.

The Russians are in force along the Pilica river, twenty miles southeast of Plotrkow.

The Nida river is occupied by five divisions of German cavalry. The two Russian armies are seeking to close in, moving in the direction of Opeczno. Near the latter point, in the vicinity of the town of Shadboro, an Austrian force was defeated several days ago, losing 1,000 men and 17 officers. and 17 officers.

DECISIVE DEFEAT OF THIRD AUSTRIAN ADVANCE.

It is the opinion of Russian military critics that the action in this territory is intended by the Germans to draw away the Russians from the vicinity of Cracow by threatening their communications.

The official announcement of Russian successes in Galicla is interpreted here as meaning a definite defeat of the third Austrian advance. The Russians claim to have taken the offensive, attacking successfully the entire southern frontier forces of the Austrians under General Boehm-Ermolli.

Boehm-Ermoili.

The attack extended along the River Dunajeo as far as the upper valley of the San. The Austrians who advanced over the Mazolaboretz Pass in the Carpathians toward Dukla were attacked along a front from Lisko to Sanak. The Austrians attempted to unite forces with the garrison at Przemysi. A serious of attempts in that direction is reported to have failed. The Przemysi garrison on December 18 made a desperate sortie but was driven back on the fortifications with heavy losses. Simultaneously the Austrian division which was advancing toward Dukla was attacked with bayonets and forced to flee, leaving an enormous number of dead. The Russians captured 1,000 prisoners, including tanofficers.
