Why Land should be Drained.

In improving a farm, as in building a house, the first thing requisite is a good foundation. When we first undertake the care of land, we should regard the fundamental thing in agriculture was manure, and we directed our energies to the accumulation of all manner of fertilizers.

Another advantage of draining, which may seem antagonistic to the last mentioned, is that it enables the crops better to resist the effects of drought. This is not simply because the roots extend to a greater depth—though this is true, as every observing farmer knows that the roots extend down in search of moisture in a dry time; but a well-drained, friable soil is always capable of absorbing more moisture from the air, and also of drawing it up from below, by capillary attraction, than one that is puddled and baked like a brick.
