BRITISH FREEDOM

Next summer there will be inaugurated in South Africa another great self-governing state of the British Empire, formed by the union of the Colonies of The Cape, Natal, Orange River, Transvaal and several little territories enclosed by or contiguous to those above named. The new state will be entirely independent of the British Islands, but, having the same monarch as the United Kingdom and the other British possessions, will remain a part of the great British Empire, of which Canada, Newfoundland, Australia and New Zealand are parts entirely independent of each other and practically independent of the mother country as well. As in Canada the two languages most spoken, are placed on an equal footing, the two in the South Africa case being English and Dutch. It speaks volumes for British justice and fair play that such generosity is shown the nationality that seven years ago had just been completely conquered in a hard fought three years' war. The Dutch of South Africa are now likely to ever call in the armies of Germany or any other power to free them from British tyranny. The probability is that they will prove, as did the French in Canada during the two great struggles between Britain and the United States, the most ardent and determined supporters of British connection.

Britain's practical recognition of the absolute independence of all her self governing colonies, under the same sovereign, marks an era in colonial history. No other nation has done so. Spain lost all her American colonies except Porto Rico, by rebellion, the party granting of equal rights to Cuba, not sufficing to hold that island loyal to the homeland. Britain, trusting to the inherent loyalty of her dependent kinsmen, has recognized them as equals, and thus laid the foundation upon which may soon be built up an organic union of states of equal rank, in which each for its own and the common good will give up part of its sovereignty to a general parliament freely elected by the people of each state in numbers proportionate to the total population of each. Such a union, when once formed by the free choice of its component parts, will last. The day of colonial rebellion in British history would seem to have passed forever.

The only defect in the constitution of South Africa is its ignoring all races but the European. It is hard on the negroes, who form five sixths of the population and who were moreover, the owners of the land when the Whites arrived, to be debarred from any share in the government. The Whites have no right to thus exclude other races. If they do not wish to be influenced by other races, they should leave them alone and divide the land with them. The Negroes of South Africa, as well as the Hindu immigrants there, will, by and by, strike for their free

dom and they will ultimately get it. It would be wiser, not to say anything of the justice of the case, to give them their rights now.

TOBIQUE VALLEY EXTENSION SOON

New Railway to Connect C. P. R.
and G. T. P.—Charters to Run
to Campbellton.

WILL SAVE 125 MILES.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 25.—Mr. J. E. Stewart of Andover, was in the city yesterday on business in connection with the extension of the Tobique Valley Railroad from Plaster Rock to Riley Brook, a distance of about twenty-eight miles.

Speaking with a reporter, Mr. Stewart said that the contract for the new road would soon be let and the construction work would begin this year. The new road is of importance not so much on account of its length as because of the fact that it is a step towards connecting the C. P. R. and the G. T. P. railways near the St. John river with the I. C. R. on the North Shore. The road at present runs from Plaster Rock, a distance of about twenty-eight miles, and a charter has been obtained from the Government by which it is possible to continue it to meet the I. C. R. at Campbellton, over thirty miles distant in carrying out this work the Inter-

national Railway now being completed will be turned at a point near Campbellton.
The proposed road is also of importance on account of the saving that will be effected in the distance between various points at travel. West-wardly going it will shorten the route about one hundred and twenty-five miles the haul from Madam Junction to Campbellton or other points on the North Shore at the present time being made by the I. C. R. from St. John would be eliminated.

It has not yet been decided by the company, who will operate the road after it is built. It is understood that the G. T. P. is negotiating to acquire the road as a feeder and in order to be in a position to secure the east end of the road when constructed. The C. P. R. was operating the Plaster Rock branch, are also said to be desirous of securing control of the line.

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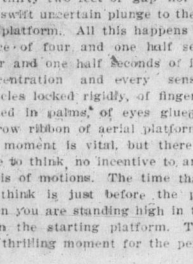

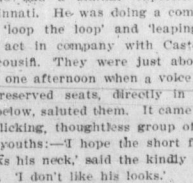
