IS ARRESTED ON A SERIOUS CHARGE

A. Elsliger Charged With Assault and Threatening to Shoot With a Rifle.

CASE CONTINUED

On Monday evening Constable Mann arrested Alex. Elsliger on charges of assault and threatening to shoot. He was arraigned before Police Judge Matheson on Tuesday and pleaded not guilty. From the evidence it appeared that Elsliger had taken a dislike to a dog owned by Mr. John White and had threatened to shoot it. At the latter end of October, he had been hanging around Mr. White's house with a gun, and had pointed the gun at Trevor White and told him to put up his hands or he would shoot. Later on it appears he followed a younger son out towards the shooting range and wrested his rifle from him. Some time later the dog died having been poisoned by some one. The case was continued till Saturday, accused being let out on bail.

ENJOYABLE FUNCTION AT NEW CARLISLE

Presentation Made to Retiring Rector of Parish of St. Andrew's

THE ADDRESS

A very enjoyable Harvest Thanksgiving Service and Supper took place at New Carlisle on the 8th of October. The Rev. R. J. Coleman, M. A. Rector of Dalhousie was the preacher and was assisted in the service by Rev. E. A. Dunn, Rector of New Carlisle and the Rev. A. J. Vibert the Incumbent of Shigawake.

After the service supper was served in the large and spacious parish hall, and at the close the following address was presented to the Rev. E. A. Dunn who left the next day for his new parish of Bergeville.

The address read as follows—
To the Rev. E. A. Dunn M. A. Rector of St. Andrew's church of New Carlisle, and St. Peter's of Paspébiac.

Rev. and dear Sir:
As you are about to leave us to take up duty at Bergeville your parishioners wish to express their regret at your departure from among them. The cord that naturally binds the pastor to his flock and vice versa is a very sacred one; when that tie is broken the shock is a very painful one, but as in this instance your removal from our midst is as we understand caused by your wish to be near the Lord Bishop (your kind father), in order to render him all the assistance you possibly can in his declining years, the motive is a good one and your paramount duty, and it we bow, feeling full well that your being so near him will be a service not only of pleasure and comfort, but of great helpfulness in the performance of his arduous duties.

We cannot see you leave without expressing our most grateful thanks for your zeal in the performance of your duties as our rector, the many improvements to St. Andrew's church, the creation of a new parish hall and horse shed at New Carlisle, the promotion of the restoration of St. Peter's church at Paspébiac and the great improvement to the rectory all stand as evidence of your noble work, and in a crowning feature in your administration of our finances. When you came the finances of part of the parish were comparatively speaking in a state of bankruptcy, whereas now everything is so much improved that we can see our way more clearly.

To dear Mrs. Dunn we also wish to express our sorrow in parting with one who has made herself so affable and such a good worker in all things connected with the welfare of the church.

As a small token of appreciation of your work in this parish we beg to tender you this subscription in coin.

Trusting you will feel sure that your parishioners here will ever retain for you and Mrs. Dunn the kindest of feelings and that our prayers will daily be offered for your happiness.

Wishing you and dear Mrs. Dunn much happiness and prosperity and that you may have every success in your new parish.

The above address was presented together with a purse of gold containing the sum of \$100 on behalf of both congregations.

The Rev. E. A. Dunn made a feeling reply, after which the National Anthem was sung and the evening was brought to a close.

THE TOWN AT LOG-GERHEADS RE STREET

Barricade Erected on Rosebury St. on Saturday Does not Last Very Long

WHAT NEXT?

The Town Council and Mr. S. M. Moores are having strained relations regarding ground used for street purposes on Rosebury Street. Mr. Moores owns the lease of a piece of ground over which the street passes and offered it to the town for sale. Their price to Mr. Moores was 40 cents per foot while his price is \$2600. Negotiations falling through Mr. Moores erected a barricade across the street on Saturday evening, blocking off the approach to the subway, but it was only up about an hour, it being removed by instructions from the town. A special meeting of the Council was held on Tuesday afternoon to consider the matter and it is expected that negotiations will be again opened to get the business settled. What is the only interesting feature of the matter is the fact that in 1903 this same land was offered to the town for \$350 and refused.

MIGHT HAVE BEEN GRAVE FATALITY

Two Men Have Narrow Escape From Drowning While Out Duck Shooting

GUN WENT OFF

On Tuesday evening Art McKenzie and Wm. Fraser left here in a canoe to do a little wild goose shooting. When in the middle of the channel a flock came towards them and McKenzie reached for his gun which was lying in the bottom of the canoe ready cocked. By some mischance when lifting it, the trigger fell, exploding the cartridge and knocking a hole in the bottom of the canoe. The water rushed in at an alarming rate and the men made for the Point la Garde side of the river. Very soon the canoe filled and overturned McKenzie getting on top while Fraser remained in the water at the bow holding on. After being over an hour in the water they successfully made a landing, and are now none the worse of their adventure.

GIRL FOUGHT AT HER LOVER'S SIDE

Servian Typist Named the "Queen of the Army"

London, Nov. 7.—The Daily Mirror's correspondent with the Servians in a despatch from Vrnja, says:

No more romantic incident has been recorded in this war than the bravery of Sophie Lobitzka Jevnovitch, a beautiful brunette, aged 22, a Belgrade typist, whose sweetheart is a law student.

The student, whose name is Michael Stepanovitch, joined the army as a volunteer and Sophie tearfully pleaded for permission to join also, but the authorities were obdurate. She threatened suicide and permission ultimately was given.

"She donned a uniform, had her hair cut and joined her sweetheart at Merderi."

"Sophie fought among the bravest in the skirmishes with the Albanians and has been named the 'Queen of the Army.'"

"Michael declares he will marry his heroic bride at Uskub, and that the wedding ring shall be made from a Turkish gun."

S.S. ROYAL GEORGE RUNS AGROUND

Vessel Runs Ashore at Laurent, Island of Orleans.

Hard and fast on the rocks at St. Laurent, Island of Orleans, is the Royal Line steamer, Royal George, bound from Bristol to Quebec and Montreal, with nine hundred and two passengers on board, as well as a general cargo. The vessel ran aground about half past five o'clock, Wednesday afternoon, and her position is a bad one in view of the fact that she is so far in shore. The vessel went aground at low tide, and during a heavy and thick fog.

The pilot in charge of the vessel at the time was, Mr. Sam Rioux, an old and experienced navigator, and he is still with the vessel.

What was the actual cause of the accident has not yet been made public but various reasons are ascribed, one of which is to the effect that possibly the pilot mistook a cottage light for the buoy light on the St. Laurent wharf. Yet another is that the light of a barge moored at the wharf was mistaken. These conjectures, however, will only be accurately developed when an investigation into the mishap is held.

When the vessel grounded there was absolutely no excitement on board as none of the passengers were aware of what had happened for fully half an hour after the occurrence, and even when they did become acquainted with the same they took the situation in a philosophical manner.

There are about five hundred passengers on board, but these it is expected, will be brought up this afternoon by the ferry steamers Polaris and Pilot.

The tugs which went to the vessel's assistance are all anchored in the vicinity, unable to get near the ship, the difficulty being enhanced by the very high wind and rain storm prevailing, which precludes all efforts for approach.

While it is hoped that the steamer may be safely floated, yet there is a fear expressed among shipping men that she will become a loss. One of the reasons expressed in a hope for the opposite, however, is the fact that while the steamer is a high and narrow one, she has a flat bottom, and many believe this will aid her in escaping destruction.

NOT ALLOWED TO RAISE RATES

Order Issued in Regard to Carriage of Freight

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—Railroad carriage companies in Eastern Canada will not be allowed to raise their rates from 5 to 10 cents per ton on Nov. 15th as they intended. The Railway Commission yesterday afternoon ordered that the new schedule of tariffs be set aside until judgment has been passed upon them. The case will come up again for hearing on Dec. 17th.

THE DEMOCRATS DON'T WIN OFTEN

Cleveland And Wilson Only Two Since Civil War

The last time the Democrats won a presidential election in the United States was in November 1892, when Grover Cleveland defeated Benjamin Harrison very decisively.

This was Cleveland's second term in the chair, as he had been elected in 1884, defeating James G. Blaine.

Cleveland and Wilson are the only Democratic Presidents elected since the civil war. It is somewhat remarkable that both Cleveland and Wilson were prominent in Princeton University before entering politics.

The three big colleges were represented in the contest on Tuesday last. Wilson, a Princeton man, Roosevelt, Harvard, and Taft, Yale. From present appearances, Wilson's majority is the largest ever given a President.

THE SUFFRAGETTES THREATEN REPRISALS

Amendment to Provide Woman Suffrage in Home Rule Bill

London, Nov. 5.—The suffrage movement suffered a set-back in the House of Commons today when an amendment providing for woman suffrage which it was desired to include in the Home Rule Bill for Ireland was defeated by 314 against 141 votes. The suffragettes declare that they will retaliate by organizing out breaks in Ireland.

LOST IN THE WOODS NEAR MATAPEDIA

The Seven Year Old Daughter
of Ernest Burabe In The
Woods Five Days.

NO FOOD OR SHELTER

One of the most remarkable in-
stances of exposure and endurance
that ever happened in this part of
the country, happened last week in
the village of St. Adre about five
miles from Matapedia.

On the morning of Oct. 28rd Mr.
Ernest Burabe accompanied by his
three children, two girls and a boy
went into the woods about a mile
from their home, where the father
was engaged cutting logs. The
three children played around where
he was working till about 10 a. m.
when the eldest girl said she would
like to go home.

As the children had often come
to the woods before with their fa-
thers dinner, Mr. Burabe did not feel
alarmed at letting her go, the two
other children staying with him till
the evening.

About 4 p. m. Mr. Burabe and his
two children started home. You
may imagine his feelings upon reach-
ing there and learning that his little
daughter had not arrived home.

He immediately started back to
the woods, thinking that he could
find her before dark came on, but
he was doomed to disappointment,
after searching the woods in vain
till about 10 p. m. He then began
to realize that the child had strayed
deep into the forest and returned
home to give the alarm to the neigh-
bors.

A large party started for the woods
and searched till morning, but no
trace could be found of the missing
one. The search was kept up all
day Thursday with no better results.

When the news reached Matapedia
and the surrounding country that
this seven year old girl had been
in the woods for two days, great
excitement was manifested
and much sympathy was felt for the
little one lost in the woods, more
especially as a heavy rain storm set
in and people realized that if the
child was to be found alive, that
her rescue measures must be taken.
Notwithstanding the terrible storm
that was raging search parties were
organized from all parts of the coun-
try from Matapedia, Legacy Settle-
ment and McDavids Mountain, and
started in search of the lost child.

Mayor S. M. Adams of Matapedia
besides offering a reward of \$25.00
to the party finding the little girl,
did all in his power to arrange search
parties and encourage them to pro-
secute the search.

On Friday and Saturday both
night and day although the rain was
pouring down in torrents hundreds
of men searched in vain. By this
time the stoutest hearts had given
up all hopes of finding the child
alive. It was not thought possible
that a girl of her tender years could
survive for four days in such a terri-
ble storm without food or shelter
but the people had made up their
minds that the little one must be
found.

On Sunday morning hundreds of
sorrowful searchers made their way
to the woods, the whole country had
turned out. It is estimated that over
two hundred men were in the woods
aiding in the search.

From Matapedia we notice Mayor
S. M. Adams and his son James,
Councillor Octave Gallant, Joseph
L. Dorion and a large number of
other residents.

From Legacy Settlement headed
by Councillor Ambrose Legacy,
came almost every man.

Mr. John and Alexander McDavid
of McDavids Mountain were also
present with a large party.

Major Desjardins of the militia and
practically the whole settlement had
turned out, search was kept up all
day and as every foot of ground had
been covered, it was feared by many
that some wild animal had devoured
the child.

You may imagine the feeling of
the people when about 4 o'clock
p. m. on Sunday, Oct. 27th the sig-
nal rang through the mountains that
the child had been found, and when
it became known that she was alive
a great cheer arose from the joyful
searchers.

The man who had the good for-
tune to find the child was Mr. John
Cyr, who lives about three miles
from the Burabe home.

Mr. Cyr who found the child is
not in very good health and was
unable owing to the storm to go out
to search before Sunday although
his two boys had been out all the
week. Mr. Cyr has a little dog
which he prizes very highly. On
Saturday evening when the weather
began to clear up he decided to go
out on Sunday and look for the lost
child. He noticed the dog acting in
a somewhat peculiar manner, so
he remarked to the dog that they
would go out on Sunday and find
the little girl. About 4 o'clock Sun-
day morning the dog went to Mr.
Cyr's room, jumped on the bed and
awoke him. Mr. Cyr thought that
it was acting strange, so he got
up and made ready for the search.
About 10 a. m. he started for the
woods, the dog leading the way.
All day through miles of rough
country the noble animal led his
master, when about 4 o'clock in the
afternoon, Mr. Cyr was somewhat
startled to hear a sharp bark from
the dog some distance in advance.
Mr. Cyr hurried to the spot and to
his surprise and great joy there was
the little heroine in a kneeling po-
sition leaning against a birch tree
conscious and able to speak.

It is supposed that the dog had
found the child on the day before
and that is the reason it was able
to lead its master directly to where
the little one was. This theory is
also supported by the fact that
when found she told Mr. Cyr that
she had seen nothing but a little
animal. Her clothing were drenched
and her hands and feet terribly
swollen. Mr. Cyr wrapped the little
one in his coat and started for his
own home as it was nearer than the
home of the child's parents. Hun-
dreds of people had gathered at the
Cyr home and when Mr. Cyr arrived
with a large party of searchers
bearing the little one, the scenes of
joy were undecipherable, women wept
for joy and men cheered themselves
hoarse. Under the directions of
Mayor S. M. Adams and the tender
care of Mr. and Mrs. Cyr the little
heroine was gently and tenderly
cared for until the arrival of the
child's parents. The meeting of the
mother and child was most pathetic.
Dr. Gravel of Matapedia was im-
mediately sent for and upon his arrival
he found the little one very weak,
and grave fears were held out for her
recovery, but under the skillful
treatment of the Dr. the little one
began to recover and the latest re-
ports are that she was removed to
her own home and that she is past
danger.

It appears that after leaving her
father on Wednesday morning that
she took the wrong trail and in-
stead of going towards her home
she went in the opposite direction.

People who know the woods that
she was lost in say that she could
not possibly have found any shelter
whatever, and that she must have
been exposed to the storm for the
full five days that she was out, and
without food. It is looked upon
here as miraculous.

A strange feature of the case and
probably that which saved her
life was that when she left home on
Wednesday morning she carried
with her a cocoanut shell which she
used for gathering gum and when
found she still had the shell in her
hand. She told her mother that
when she got thirsty she caught the
rain drops in the shell and drank
them.

Mr. Burabe and family feel very
deeply the debt of gratitude they
owe, and are loath in their praise of
neighbors and friends for their kind
assistance and sympathy. To the
Mayor and Councillors of St. An-
drew to Mr. John and Alexander
McDavid and other friends from
McDavids Mountains, Councillors
Octave Gallant, Ambrose Legacy,
Jos. L. Dorion and others from
Matapedia, who generously assisted
in the search for his child. To
Mayor S. M. Adams of Matapedia
who besides paying the reward of
\$25.00 for finding the child, made a
handsome present to the little one,
but above all their heart felt thanks
and long gratitude to Mr. John Cyr
the man who nobly sought, found
and saved from certain death their
little daughter Jean.

STILL HOSTILE TO THE CHRISTAIN

Reinforcement are Being Hur-
ried to the Front From
Bulgaria

FIGHTING CONTINUES

London, Nov. 5.—The situation
in Constantinople grows graver every
day. The hostility to Europeans in-
creases and is shown more openly
and arrogantly as days pass. The
lower classes express their fierce an-
imosity without any attempt at con-
cealment. Some workmen's guilds
openly boast that they have taken a
sacred vow to massacre every Chris-
tian in Constantinople should the
Bulgarians enter the city or should
Roumania be severed from Tur-
key. Fanatics swear on the Koran
to take a terrible vengeance on the
"infidel." The theological students,
always a dangerous element, are
now preaching incendiarism to the
mob in out of the way mosques.

Sofia, Nov. 5.—Reinforcements
continue to proceed to the front from
the Bulgarian capital in considerable
numbers. Some Serbian troops
passed through here yesterday for
Adrianople, and to-day eight bat-
talions of volunteers, including Ma-
cedonians and Russians, entrained for
the front. It is reported that fight-
ing still continues in the neighbor-
hood of Serai and Tcholar.

SAYS GERMANY MEANS WAR

London, Oct. 29.—"Germany will make war," was the title of an impressive speech made by Lord Roberts at Manchester last week. He said:

"Now, just as in 1866 and 1870, war will take place the instant German forces by land and sea are, by their superiority at every point, as certain of victory as anything in human calculation can be made certain."

"Germany strikes when Germany's hour has struck; that is the time-honored policy of her Foreign Office. It is her policy at the present hour, is, or should be the policy of every nation prepared to play a great part in history."

"Under that policy Germany has, within the last ten years, sprung as at one bound from one of the weakest naval powers to that of the greatest naval powers, save one, upon the globe. To-day every British warship and every British merchant vessel thrills in all her iron nerves to that mighty presence."

"The fact is we have lost command of every sea but one—the North Sea—and our supremacy over that sea is now a matter of debate. In other words, whereas your forefathers traded as their right an every sea, you now only trade by the sufferance of other powers."

"We may stand still, Germany always advances, and the line along which she is moving is now most manifest; it is towards complete supremacy by land and sea."

"Contrasted with our own apathy or puerile spasmodic efforts, how impressive is this magnificent unrelenting energy. It has the mark of true greatness; it extorts admiration even from those against whom it is directed."

"We have a fleet, but that fleet is rapidly becoming unequal to the enemies by which we may be opposed, further shows the inadequacy of our land forces and our fleet is maimed and hampered in its action and nature as a fleet."

best of the boys, to paralyze or stupefy their hearts, lungs, brains and spirits by the cigarette habit? For, of all the means yet discovered for stopping growth and development in the young, the cigarette is the very worst. It is bad enough for a lad or young man to smoke a pipe; but better that he smoke ten pipes full of tobacco than even one cigarette, which is well named "a coffin tack". Dr. Kerr of England, who is doubtless the greatest specialist on the effects of narcotics, published his discoveries concerning the results of cigarette smoking. Take, for example, what he says in the matter of smoking tea cigarettes, which was becoming fashionable: "One tea cigarette, says the Doctor produces as much narcotic effect as forty cups of ordinary brewed tea." What then must be the devilish power of the tobacco cigarette upon the vital and mental energies of the boys!

Recently the writer was called upon to give testimonials of good character for two noble, manly boys who have previously been in his employ. The letters were cheerfully written and assisted materially in procuring both lads honorable and promising positions. Since then he has been mortified by the sight and knowledge that each of those youngsters is swagging about the streets smoking cigarettes. I like to help boys, for to do so is a joy. But I would not have given those boys even one little word of written commendation had I suspected that they had acquired or were about to acquire the cigarette habit. Both lads had been regarded by me as perfect little gentlemen. Both have the most excellent parentage and parental training. But neither of them seems to appreciate these advantages, or to care for the feelings

of those who have heretofore taken so much pleasure in helping them to get started on successful careers. That is another and one of the worst curses of the cigarette habit in the young. It makes an indifferent, brutalized "Smart Aleck" of the most manly boys.

Save the boys! They are worth saving! Save them from the cigarette, at the risk of not saving some old gin-bibber from his bottle. If Canada is to take rank, as we all pray, amongst the great nations of the world, it will be because of its average manhood. THE STORY OF JOHN INGLIS

The story of John Inglis, says Robson Black in November Canada Monthly, is typical of the cases cared for by the Prison Farm at Guelph.

His crime was clearly in the list of academics. Employed on a lake steamer for his college vacation, he refused one day, to accept the taunt of his comrades and joined a shore-going party with the result that he became violently drunk. Hali craved by his first indulgence, he returned to the steamer to obtain more funds and, finding none, came off with an officer's suit-case which he pawned, believing it to be his own. Arrest followed. His defence was flimsy and he went down to the Central Prison, Toronto, for six months. Such a "convict" was of course immediately chosen as a candidate for the Prison Farm. Upon his arrival he found to his amazement that, although freedom was to be restricted to certain areas for the period of his sentence, the idea of "restriction" received an elastic interpretation. The Warden, Dr. Gilmour, a man of letters and a man of letters, said to the man as he came to the farm:

I want you to understand first of all that it is a place built by the Government not to do you up," said he, "but to help you make a man of yourself. If you have a sincere desire to take a square grip and make the best years of your life of benefit to you and

your fellow men, we want to help you carry that out the best way we can. You will have to work hard and be obedient, but every hour will put you in better shape to face the world once more. I place you on your word of honor, or not to escape, even though every opportunity invites you. Capture is practically certain and with it you never get another chance. I shall watch your progress personally, nor do I believe you will disappoint me."

Inglis did not disappoint. In the three months of his life on the Prison Farm, the young student grew robust, tan-checked and physically wholesome. He was in what a physical director would have called "the pink of condition." Upon the last day of his term Warden Gilmour provided him with a ticket to a distant town and wished him well with these words:

"I am not sending you to the town, you came from, nor to your father's home, for that is too often a stumbling block to the future. When you are given employment, better tell your boss where you came from. Be frank with him, because sooner or later some one finds out these disgraceful secrets and tells them to your employer, who may regard you as a scoundrel. You will find that the average boss respects your confidence and you will be the gainer thereby."

Inglis is to-day the proprietor of a respectable business in the Southern States and has been nominated by his fellow townsmen for a place on the municipal council.

Minimized Ice Danger

On the steamship Royal Edward, from Bristol, was Dr. Meyer Coplans, bacteriologist of public health in the University of Leeds, Eng. Dr. Coplans made the voyage for the purpose of testing an apparatus he has invented as an aid to navigators in fog and haze and for detecting the presence of icebergs. His instrument "tossed" the presence of icebergs three miles and a half away and sounded an alarm on three occasions in the vicinity of ice.

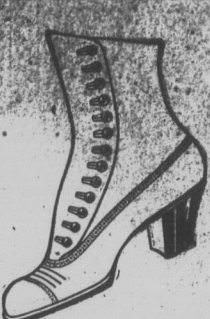

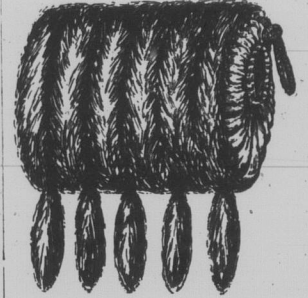

FRENCHMAN'S OPINION OF CANADA'S FUTURE

Declares the Dominion Can Never Hold Together.

That Canada does not possess the elements of enduring nationhood was the opinion expressed this morning by M. Henri Bertilland, the great French conversationalist, who, for the past month, has been engaged on a careful analysis of the French Canadian situation, which he will embody in a series of feature articles for the European journals.

M. Bertilland believes that French Canada is to become ultimately an independent French republic. "The statesmen who wrought the fabric of your Dominion," said the "Sidney Brooks of France," "are worthy of high praise for their constructive policy, but their handiwork was foredoomed to destruction by warring forces far more potent than could be endured by the artificial bulwarks of government. I have gone in to this matter, thoroughly. I have conversed with representatives of every class in your conglomerate population. After all this, the only opinion I can offer candidly is that your dreams of a United Dominion, let alone a united Empire, are mere folly."

TYPIES ARE DIFFERENT

"What has the habitant of the St. Lawrence Valley in common with the fishermen of the Fraser? Nothing! In fact it would be difficult to imagine two types more essentially different in creed, race, and point of view. Furthermore, there can be no reconciling the conflicting interests of this great country. Your western farmer clamors for reciprocal trade with the United States, and he will not sacrifice permanently his material prosperity on account of a policy of selfish protection, fostered by Canadian vested interests."

"British Columbia's imperialism is the bugbear of nationalistic Quebec. What up the one case mean self-preservation, in the other signifies taxation without representation."

WORKING OUT DESTINY

"This viewpoint is novel," I admit, continued M. Bertilland, "but I look merely at facts, tendencies and analogies. This great country will work out its destiny through a process of economic and political evolution. Many years may elapse before your political rapscodas are disillusioned, but the hour of destiny is certain. French Canada will be a great republic, including not only the two and a half millions of its people, but also the two millions of co-religionists and co-linguists in the United States. The middle western provinces will become states of the American Union. British Columbia will evolve from a stage of dependency upon British naval protection to be either an Asiatic colony or a petty independent kingdom."
