

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

London, March 25.
Sir Stafford Northcote has advised the Hudson Bay Company to accept the proposition of Earl Granville, the Colonial Secretary, and cede their territorial rights in British North America for £300,000, considering it the best offer they can obtain.

The Pope has invited the Sovereigns to send ecclesiastics to represent them in the General Council in the Church at Rome.

The bulletin in the Bank of England has decreased £84,000 since last week.

No political news of interest.
Despatches from Paris speak of sedition meetings and several arrests.

Fredericton, March 27.
Provincial Secretary submitted the following documents: Report on Public Works of the Dominion, statement of receipts and expenditure of public Hospital St. John, report on the University and Collegiate School; Statements of Bank of British North America, People's Bank, St. Stephen Bank, and Central Fire Insurance Company; Report of the Mount Allison Academy.

Mr. Stevenson introduced a bill to repeal the law relating to deserters.

Mr. Moore introduced a bill to abolish Judges' Fees in the Supreme Court.

The friends of University are working for a grant for the purpose of erecting a Museum building.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the Report of the Committee on Fry's claim and adopted the Report.

Mr. King introduced a bill to prevent bribery at elections and to provide for investigation into converted elections.

Bill relating to Dorchester Street, St. John agreed to.

Mr. White introduced a bill relating to the qualification of voters for municipal Councils.

Bill to extend time for building Street Railway, St. John, agreed to.

Bill to extend time for holding Court of General Sessions St. John, agreed to.

Mr. Needham introduced a bill to continue the Act to incorporate Fredericton Boom Company.

Bill authorizing assessment for the completion of public landing, Indian town, agreed to.

In reply to Mr. Hault, Attorney General said that the Receiver General's books are open to the inspection of Members of Assembly.

Fredericton, March 30.
Mr. White introduced a bill to make the standard weight of oats 30 pounds to a bushel.

Mr. Kerr moved that the railway investigating committee be invested with power to examine witnesses on oath—carried.

Mr. McQueen moved that Crown Land investigating committee be invested with the same power—carried.

Mr. Needham gave notice of a motion for a Committee to sit during the recess and prepare plans and specifications for new parliament buildings.

Mr. Lindsay introduced a bill to abolish the General Sessions, Carleton County.

FEARFUL TRAGEDY.

A most fearful tragedy has just been enacted on a lonely road in a thirteenth century part of Oregon. A man and his wife who kept a hotel, went away on a visit, leaving their two daughters in charge of the house. The girls being rather timid got two of the daughters of a neighbor to stay with them. Just at dusk the first night after the parents left, a man called at the house and wished to stay over night but was refused. He pleaded so hard, urging that he was very hungry and tired, and that it was so far to any other place of shelter, and they finally consented, on condition that he would allow himself to be locked in his room. Two of the girls slept up stairs the other two below. In the night the two girls above heard a noise and were afraid to move. The traveller also heard a noise and knowing that something was wrong he burst open the door of his room and beheld four masked men ascending the stairs. He shot two of them dead—the other two escaped. When the mask-wearers were removed from the dead men's faces one of them was discovered to be the father of the two girls who were spending the night with the others. He had killed his own daughter and one of the others, and then supposing the coast clear had proceeded to rob the house, when death reached him by the hand of the traveller. The two other girls were unharmed, thanks to entering a strange room.

Messrs. G. B. Bright & Co., in their Liverpool Circular, March 13, report the sale at auction of the cargo of the "John B. Light" from St. John, at an average of £8 10s 8d, rice Duale.

Timber.—By auction yesterday the yarded cargoes per "John Bright" and "Philadelphia" from St. John N. B., brought £8 per standard.

In their Liverpool Circular, 2nd March, Messrs. Coltart & Co., say:—

The improved demand, referred to in our annual circular, which sprung up after the turn of the year, did not long continue, and we have to report a very quiet market. This can only be accounted for by the continued depression in our manufacturing districts; in other directions there is strong evidence of improvement.

Order in Council says that from and after this date there shall be allowed for tare on sugar inspected in hogsheds 12 per centum, in tierces 14 per centum of the gross weight of each and in barrels an allowance of 26 lbs. each.

TAX PAYER.

SAINT ANDREWS, MARCH 31, 1869.

Under the heading "Railway Extension Northwest," in the "Morning Journal" of the 29th inst., is a lengthy leader on the pamphlet entitled "An Account of the St. Andrews and Quebec Railway, being the original Intercolonial Railway" from its first inception in 1835 to the present time. We heartily endorse the Journal's statements, and still have faith, notwithstanding the long delay and many discouragements through which the undertaking has passed, that the idea advanced by our contemporary will yet be carried out, and that there will be a direct line from St. Andrews to Quebec. We have only space for the following extract:—

"What invests the affairs of the 'St. Andrews Railway' with considerable interest at present is the fact that the Province has invested so much money in it, the securities for which having passed to the Dominion Government, are entitled to be placed to the credit of the Province, leaving so much more money free, and which could be applied by the Local Government to the extension of the line Northward. If provincial aid to a reasonable extent were afforded to this project, and the Railway Bonds of the St. Andrews Road, now selling for very little, purchased, an extension might be reached at least as far as Grand Falls, that would soon cause the value of the St. Andrews bonds to increase one hundred per cent. and add to the traffic of all the other Provincial Railroads. Last year the gross receipts of the St. Andrews Road were \$100,000. With the branches now in progress it would not be too much to expect an increase of from 50 to 75 per cent. On the supposition that the extension and the St. Andrews Road should both belong to one Company, we should here have a nice little addition either towards improving or extending the road, and one that would every year become larger. Then the Counties and Branch Railroads interested would have to lend some further aid."

THE LEGISLATURE.—Since the decision on the 'Want of Confidence' Vote, the House has driven on the business of the country, several bills have been agreed to in committee, among them a bill relating to Judge's fees introduced by the Attorney General; the fees are in future to be paid to the Clerk of the Pleas, and by him handed over to the Receiver General, as public moneys. The House went into Supply on Monday, Government Estimates were laid before the House in printed form. The available Income for 1869 is set down at \$184,194.02, and the estimated expenditure at \$181,076.91, leaving an excess of income of \$2,117.11. The amount to be realized from Export Duty is \$60,000 being \$11,000 less than was collected last year. Education is to have \$110,250. Public Works \$294,000. On some of the details there will be a saving, while others are increased.

The Committee on Public Accounts have laid their Report before the House, in which they make several recommendations with reference to balances held over by some Deputy Treasurers, amounts paid for deserters and the "Lumber Asylum"; they also advert to the fact that the Chief Commissioner of Works made more extensive supervision last year than the year previous. The committee say with reference to the Export Duty returns:—

"The Committee desire to call attention to the small amount of Export Duty collected at the Ports of St. Stephen, Bay Verte and Cape Terrestrial, accounts not at all commensurate with the large quantities of Lumber manufactured at or passing out of the Province at these ports, and would recommend that measures be adopted to secure the collection of such Duty from these Ports."

The English Mail by R. M. S. City of Cork arrived at Halifax on Saturday last, and arrived Tuesday morning.

After April 1, the International Steamers will make two trips a week between Boston and St. John.

BOOT AND SHOE FACTORY.—It affords us pleasure to publish the letter of "Progress," which appears on the first page of this day's impression, on the advisability of establishing manufacturing in this place. The writer suggests that a commencement for this laudable purpose should be made, by forming a company for establishing a Boot and Shoe Factory, which would be as profitable to the proprietors as advantageous to the town. He cites instances of what was done in other places not so favorably situated as St. Andrews, by the erection of manufacturing. We believe his plans are feasible,—that capital can be obtained here, and that with a moderate share of energy and perseverance the undertaking can be carried out. As the writer intends following up the matter, we will not anticipate by entering into details, but add, that several enterprising persons here will lend a helping hand to forward the undertaking.

The St. John Telegraph says:—"We understand that under authority from the Department of Marine, W. M. Smith, Esq., accompanied by Mr. Harley, Inspector of Lighthouses, proceeded to Lepreau and made choice of a site for the new Fog Whistle at that place. The spot selected is within a few hundred feet of the Light. Tenders will be asked presently for the erection of a building and the construction of the machinery."

It is also understood that Mr. Harley has selected a site on Port Howe for a Time Ball and Observatory, under instructions from the Marine Department.

These facts go to show that the Dominion Government do not propose to neglect Maritime interests in this quarter."

We can also bear testimony to Mr. Harley's efficiency and attention to his duties as Light House Inspector in this County; he has suggested improvements in the Lighthouse department, and has selected sites for the erection of Lighthouses in places where they will be of great service to the shipping interest; he will also issue tenders in a few days, for the repair of the Marine Hospital in this locality. Mr. Harley understands and performs his duties as a Dominion officer, in a manner which gives entire satisfaction.—[Ed. Stand.]

We learn from St. John papers that precious stones and valuable gold deposits have recently been discovered in this Province.—That New Brunswick is rich in mineral resources is well known; it only requires capital to develop them. The County of Charlotte it is admitted has splendid copper deposits, a large and beautiful specimen may be seen in the Post Office window; and Dr. Gesner while here several years ago, picked up good specimens of emerald at Bay Side, which we believe is still in St. John where it was taken by a former resident of this town. Coal it is said has also been picked up, but whether it abounded in sufficient quantities to warrant opening a mine, was not determined.

Looking over our files for 1840 we noticed the Custom House returns for the Ports in this County for the year ending Jan. 5, 1840 from which we select the following abstracts. It will be remembered, that rafts of timber, deals and boards were rafted to St. Andrews, as the Railway was not in operation at that time:—

A resolution in opposition to the veto power being placed in the hands of the Bishop, was unanimously adopted.

A new method of raising money was successfully adopted by the Rector of All Saints Church, as follows: two Sundays ago, an envelope addressed to each pew holder was placed in the pews of that church, in which was enclosed a card on which each party was by the rector invited to mark down the amount they would subscribe during the coming church year, payable in quarterly installments, towards the liquidation of the debt on the church, and also to enclose whatever amount they at present felt disposed to same purpose, the envelopes to be placed on the plates at the offertory collection on Easter Sunday. The congregation generously responded to the appeal, the contribution amounts to \$164 34 of which \$184 34 was cash, the balance engagements to pay during the year. This act speaks volumes for the christian liberality of the people.

Montreal, March 29.

WARLIKE.—Bismark has advised the South German States to be ready to take the field next spring.

The last Royal Gazette announces the appointment of Hon. John McAdam to the office of President of the Executive Council.

It appears that the Imperial Government has informed Prince Edward Island that it is not competent for her to enter into negotiations with the United States with a view to Reciprocity, without the co-operation of the British North American Provinces. Evidently the Home Government is determined that the Islanders shall have no privileges which the Confederation cannot obtain—Globe.

The mails between Italy and France have been badly snowed up this winter. One entire train is buried under the summit of Mont Cenis Pass by an avalanche. The worst parts of the routes are now traversed by mail carriers on snow shoes.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge becomes, by the death of Lord Gough, formally the senior officer of the British army, although by length of service Gen. Sir J. F. Fitzgerald is the senior. The latter entered the army in 1793. There are five others whose commissions were issued before the beginning of the present century.
