### MEETING OF AUTO ASSOCIATION

Delegates Appointed to Attend Good Roads Association Meeting.

A meeting of the Restigouche Automobile Association was held in the Curling Rink Tuesday evening, President Carr presiding.

The Secretary read a letter from the Secretary of the N. B. Auto. Association asking that a delegate be appointed to attend the Dominion Good Roads convention at Halifax, May 10th, 11th and 12th, and on motion Mr. R. K. Shivers was chosen.

It was also suggested that the Restigouche Association should be represented at the meeting of the N. B. Association to be held at St. John on May 3rd.

On motion the Secretary, H. B. Anselow was named to represent the local association at that meeting.

The matter of repairs to the road between Campbellton and Matapedia was discussed and a strong resolution passed calling upon the government to undertake this work at once was unanimously adopted.

A resolution favoring the change in the rules of the road to "firm to the right" was also adopted.

It was decided that a general meeting of the Restigouche Auto Association be called during the latter part of May to hear reports of the delegates and take up several important matters.

### MUCH PERMANENT WORK PROPOSED

Concrete Sidewalks to Be Laid in Different Wards—Other Business.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Firemen's Hall Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor McKay in the chair with Councillors Bisset, Chamberlain, St. Onge, Belle-Isle, Wallace and Moores present.

(Because of lack of space some routine business transacted is held over until next week.)

Coun. Wallace said that the engineer had made an estimate of \$5000.00 for the extension of the water and sewerage along Arran Street to Mr. Shephard's residence, or about \$2,000 to the lot upon which Mr. Richard Smith intends to build. This latter would serve several other lots.

Coun. Wallace said that an estimate of the concrete sidewalk most needed had been made and was as follows:

Water Street, subway, south side, 1450 feet.  
Queen Street, 400  
Prince William Street, 400  
Andrew Street, 745  
Dufferin to Minto Sts., 375  
Roseberry to Adam St., 350  
Roseberry to Andrew St., 100  
Along Minto, 375  
Roseberry to Jos. Duncan's, 650  
Along Sugarloaf, 450

In all about 5100 feet.

The amount laid last year was 1035 feet.

Coun. Moores drew attention to the necessity of street crossings as did also Coun. St. Onge.

Coun. Wallace agreed that crossings were in bad shape, but nothing could be done until frost was out of the ground. He said that permanent concrete crossings would be laid. A car of cement had been ordered.

In the meantime Couns. Bisset, Chamberlain and Moores had asked permission to retire, there then being only Couns. Wallace, St. Onge and Belle-Isle present.

Coun. Belle-Isle moved and Coun. Wallace seconded the following resolution:

In the opinion of this Council it has become necessary to reorganize the administration of the town's several departments and in order to do this, reasonable notice should be given to the several officers affected by this re-organization.

Be it therefore resolved that the chairman of the Finance, Public Property & Streets, Water & Sewerage, Police & License, and Electric Light Committees immediately serve written notice on the Town Clerk, the Town Auditor, A. G. Adams, the Street Commissioner, the Town Engineer, the Town Marshal and the Manager of the Electric Light system, that within thirty days from the first day of May, next, new appointments shall be made by this Council to fill the above mentioned offices.

staff of the Electric Light system, that each employee of that department be also served with a notice similar to that to be served to the heads of various departments, the notice of these employees to be served by the chairman of the Electric Light Committee.

His Worship thought that this resolution was a very important one to come up at the end of the meeting, and with only a bare quorum present.

Coun. Belle-Isle contended that this was the only time this matter could come up, under new business. It was not his fault if the councillors left before the end of the meeting.

His Worship was of the opinion that a motion of such importance should have been brought to the attention of every councillor and seriously considered. It was certainly a drastic move.

Coun. Belle-Isle did not think there was anything drastic in it. Nothing which could not be remedied. This was only serving notice that new officers will be appointed. There was nothing in the resolution to state that the old officers would not be re-appointed.

His Worship said he would like to be sure that this resolution was all right before it was put on the minutes. The Council had enough of improper resolutions.

Coun. St. Onge favored letting this matter stand over for a full meeting, so that all could discuss it.

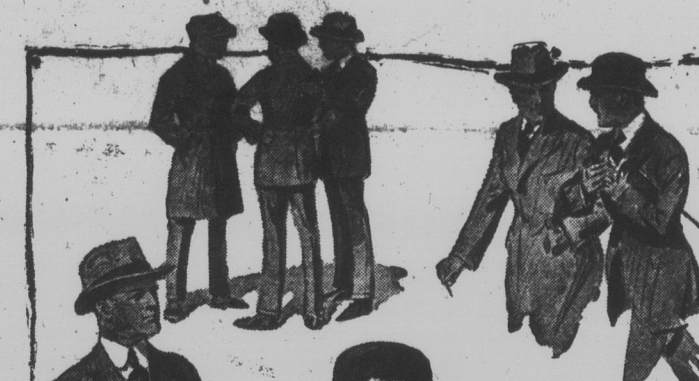
His Worship said that he would put the motion, but would do so under protest.

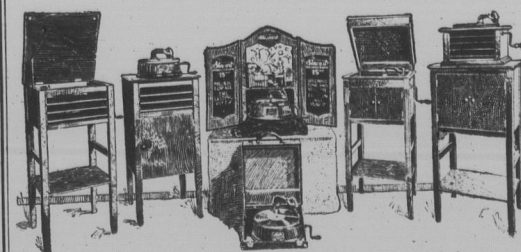

## HEALTH WEEK INAUGURATED

Stirring Addresses to Crowded House Attentively Listened To.

The New Brunswick Health week campaign opened here in the Imperial Theatre on Monday night when Colonel J. A. Amyot, M.D., C.M.G., Deputy Minister of Health for the Dominion of Canada, and Mr. N. L. Burnette, Director of Occupation for the Canadian National Committee on Mental Hygiene, delivered very instructive addresses, the former confining his remarks to the general problems of hygiene, as they affected communities, and the need of greater care being exercised over the water and milk supplies of communities, while the latter spoke on "Mental Hygiene," and advocated methods to aid this phase of health work.

The large auditorium was crowded to the doors, many being turned away as there was not even standing room.

**COLONEL AMYOT.**

Colonel Amyot, M.D., C.M.G., Ottawa, pointed out the general problems of hygiene, and advocated that citizens exercise greater care in the matter of milk and water supply. He alluded to garbage and the necessity of its destruction as it was a trying place for flies—one medium which carried much disease. He described the growth of flies and the ultimate results should garbage heaps be allowed to remain undisturbed. Continuing, he pointed out that the mortality from typhoid, tuberculosis and among infants could be greatly reduced by taking ordinary precautions of having fresh air in the homes and greater care over water and milk supply, etc.

Col. Amyot advocated pasteurizing of milk. This could be done at home by heating the milk to 140 degrees Fahrenheit, for twenty minutes, and keeping it in a cool place until it is used. It is not necessary to boil it, although boiling will do no harm. He emphasized the importance of care in the handling of milk which is given to children.

Col. Amyot also spoke of the benefits of school inspection.

Speaking of tuberculosis he pointed out the importance of treatment in its early stages.

**MR. N. L. BURNETTE.**

Mr. Burnette, Toronto, Director of Occupation for the Canadian National Committee on Mental Hygiene, confined his address to that phase of public health. This commission, which he represented was, he pointed out, a national association and was organized to supervise the mental health of the people. He paid a distinct compliment to the Hon. Dr. Wm. F. Roberts, Minister of Health for the Province of New Brunswick, and made reference to the New Brunswick Health Act, pointing out that it was a model one, and an excellent piece of legislation.

Mr. Burnette pointed out that the public schools of the Dominion were organized and their systems devised for what was supposed to be normal children, but that in every locality it was generally found that a certain proportion of the whole—in some cases a very small proportion—existed who were mentally handicapped, and who could not benefit by the ordinary school methods. Here lurked a danger, in the opinion of the speaker, as he alluded to the future lives of this small proportion of the young citizens of Canada as it had been found that by careful study in prisons and reformatories that a large percentage of the criminals and inmates of these institutions came from the mentally deficient class. He believed that by the more scientific methods this mental retardation could be arrested. To further point out the dangers that lie at the door of the country with the mentally deficient problem, the speaker referred to a study which the department had made in one prison. Here one hundred men had repeatedly been sentenced to terms, in all aggregating one hundred and six years for an aggregation of eighteen hundred and thirty-nine offences (committed by the one hundred over whom the department had had the closest study). He advocated that this calibre of pupils, be put to one side under special and careful tutelage and by using special methods a great deal could be done. This he claimed was not a theory but practical as it had been tried and was marked with success. The ordinary individual might say, added Mr. Burnette, that this two percent of the mentally deficient might ultimately produce a percentage of 30 percent criminal and 50 percent prostitutes. The efforts of the nation, he claimed,

should be devoted to just such scholars as he spoke of as this devotion in the end tend to lessen the criminal dependent and pauper percentages.

Mr. Burnette pointed out that the problem of the mentally deficient child was Dominion-wide. New Brunswick was no exception in this respect. If the problem was left to itself the taxes of the citizens of the Dominion would grow, to establish institutions for the care of such as he was interested in. He urged that every Canadian co-operate and that the mentally handicapped child be given attention at the moment he showed signs of mental retardation.

His Honor Judge McLatchey presided. At the close of the addresses Dr. Murray in a brief address moved a vote of thanks to the speakers. This was ably seconded by Mr. A. T. LeBlanc.

Mr. F. W. Campbell favored the audience with a solo which was warmly applauded.

## GRAVE WARNING ON COAL SITUATION

Ontario Administrator Says Many Will Go Short Next Year.

TORONTO, April 22.—"A careful study of present anthracite coal conditions has convinced me that coal consumers of this Continent are to be warned down the hill of false security at a dangerous speed and when they strike against the wall of solid facts some are going to suffer," said H. A. Harrington, Ontario fuel administrator, in a statement issued today following a trip through the U. S. anthracite regions.

"Although we have gone through perilous situations during the past five winters with a minimum of discomfort, thanks to Providence, there is such a thing as presumption of Divine beneficence, and as it is apparent the public are falling into the grave error, it is high time to jolt them back onto the highway of security."

"The condition obtains not alone in Ontario, but is Continent-wide in its destructive influence. If Ontario alone was at fault, there would be some hope for us during the coming winter. But when the United States is affected we will have a rude awakening to our dependence on the United States mines when 15,000,000 consumers wish for coal at the same time."

"The annual production of anthracite coal is limited; the highest possible production of anthracite we can hope for during the present coal year is 93,000,000 tons of which 25 per cent, or 23,250,000 tons, will be steam sizes and unavailable for household use, leaving 67,750,000 tons to meet demands aggregating 82,000,000 tons. It is obvious that someone will go short."

**PEOPLE APATHETIC.**

"Never before in the history of anthracite has there been such a general apathy to purchasing winter coal supplies; never before have the people so deliberately closed their ears to repeated warnings, and never before was an array of indisputable facts available to support this warning."

"In order to supply normal demands for anthracite in the United States and Canada, a continuous production of 47,500,000 tons must be maintained every month."

"The record of the past four weeks shows a production of 6,584,000, or 1,45,000 tons short; one more month of this, and Canada's requirements, about 4,500,000 tons, will be seriously endangered."

"There being no purchasing by the public, coal dealers throughout the Continent are not ordering coal, and operators are consequently not mining. Coal cars to the number of 175,000 are idle, and when we realize that this number of cars is 40,000 short of capacity required for normal shipments, the danger arising from transportation difficulties is obvious."

"I wish in all sincerity to send this warning ringing throughout the Dominion. Get in your winter's supply of anthracite coal now. If you delay, you most certainly will go without when you seek it next fall."

**SOMETHING WILL BREAK.**

"Ontario, of all the Provinces, is absolutely dependent upon the United States for fuel, and excepting at a heavy financial sacrifice, will be helpless unless this warning is heeded."

Coal is not moving up the lakes in normal quantities, the people of the United States are not buying; the people, particularly in Ontario, are not buying; when the rush comes and efforts are made with 70,000,000 tons or less to meet requirements of 82,000,000 tons, and 175,000 cars badly in need of repairs, are forced to do the work of 215,000 first class cars, something is going to break, and some centre of distribution seriously disturbed, and I feel satisfied that we fully appreciate the fact that it will not be the United States."

"During the war, when our coal situation was at times acute, a common interest impelled the United States to treat us as one of their own."

"If this warning goes unheeded, we cannot expect a repetition of this generous spirit, as the means to obviate the necessity of seeking it are now at our command."

Of course what applies to Ontario applies to New Brunswick as well.

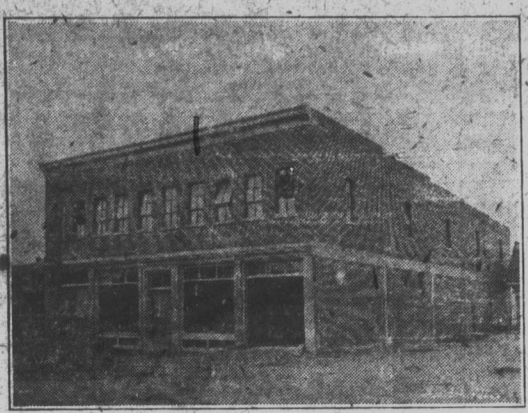

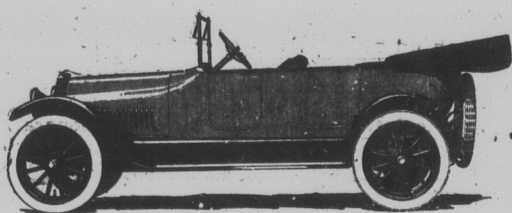

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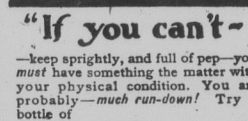

ALLAN A. CROCKET

DEAD AT LOS ANGELES

Son of Late, Dr. William Crockett, Frederickton.

FREDERICKTON, April 25.—Word was received here this morning of the death at Alameda, Cal., of Allan A. Crockett, fourth son of the late Dr. Crockett, formerly chief of police of Boston, and education of New Brunswick, and Mrs. Crockett, of this city. His death followed an operation for an affection of the eye several weeks ago, the trouble having developed unexpectedly when he was enjoying the best of health and making preparations to come here this year with his daughters to visit his mother.

The late Mr. Crockett was born at Chatham, N. B., on May 2, 1864, and left here 40 years ago for Boston after having qualified as a mechanical engineer in this city. He was afterwards for some time engaged on the construction of the Panama Canal, but has spent practically all his life since leaving here at San Francisco with the exception of a few years he was in Australia, where he was married. He wrote largely for mechanical journals and at various times had addressed important gatherings in American cities on mechanical subjects.

Besides his widow he is survived by four sons, two of whom were overseas in the American Expeditionary Force during the war, and two daughters. His mother, Mrs. William Crockett, of this city; six brothers, James H. Crockett, Dr. W. C. Crockett and Mr. Justice Crockett, of this city; Charles S. O. 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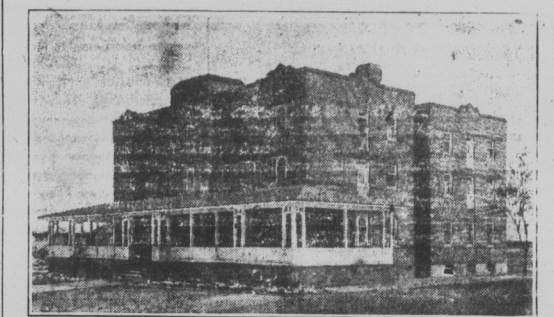
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## HOSTEL AT MONCTON

Modern Residence Completed For Girl Employees Of Atlantic Underwear Limited.



One of the most modern girls' hostels in Canada has recently been completed by Atlantic Underwear Limited, for the accommodation of their girl employees at Moncton, N. B. The hostel for employees is an innovation in the Maritime Provinces, and the Atlantic Underwear Company is to be congratulated upon its progressiveness in thus providing congenial and wholesome quarters for their girls. The building occupies a commanding view of the surrounding country, is of brick fire-proof construction, and the lighting and sanitation are modern to the last degree.

The residence was planned by J. W. Fraser, A. R., I.B.A., of Moncton. It contains a library, living and rest rooms, a first aid hospital ward, well-lighted and aired bed-rooms, ample bathrooms and a well equipped laundry for the use of the girls. The hostel is in charge of a matron, and a chef supervises the kitchen. Food and lodging are provided at cost, and will not be in excess of Five Dollars a week.

Recreation facilities have not been overlooked, for the Company realizes that good food and rooms are not sufficient for the welfare of the employees. The girls will be permitted to entertain their friends, and in addition to a good dance floor and musical instruments, games, etc. are provided for this purpose. For outdoor amusement tennis courts and croquet lawns will be completed by early summer.

The necessary permission being given Coun. Belle-Ile withdrew his motion and made it a notice of motion for the next meeting which is to be held next Monday evening.

The Council then adjourned.

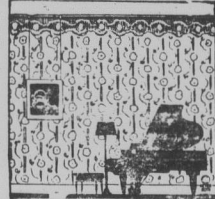

Five hundred women passed through Salvation Army Rescue Homes in Canada East during 1920, and only 13 of these (less than three per cent.) proved unsatisfactory.

This is only one branch of the work for which the Self-Denial Appeal is being made, but the signal success achieved in dealing with women of the admittedly difficult class referred to has been more than equalled in many other spheres of Army labour.

In Prison Work, Labour Bureaux, Dispensaries, Summer Camps for Children, Children's Homes, Maternity Hospitals, Police Court Work, General Relief Work, and Women's Industrial Homes, as well as in many other ways, the best interests of the community are served by the Army of the Helping Hand in taking hold of the individual and meeting his or her needs, whatever they may be.

As is known, the ramifications of the Army's work are world-wide, and the Self-Denial Appeal is made for the purpose of raising money for maintaining and extending its operations.

Commissioner Richards is asking for \$500,000, and in view of the splendid service the Organization has rendered in so many different ways the amount named should be readily forthcoming.

**BODY OF YOUNG WOMAN IN RIVER**

Unidentified Remains Were Found in St. Lawrence at Longue Pointe.

Montreal, April 25.—The discovery of the body of a young woman between 20 and 25 years of age, so far unidentified, was made Saturday afternoon in the St. Lawrence river at Longue Pointe. The body appeared to have been in the river for a month, and was fully dressed, having over the other garments a seal coat with alaska collar and cuffs. No marks of identification could be found on the clothing and the woman wore no jewelry. The nose had been broken and red marks appeared over and around the eyes after the body had been removed to the morgue. It is thought, however, that these may have been caused by the body striking some obstruction in the water. The clothing was of good quality and seemed to have been new. The undergarments were of silk. There is no clue whatever to identify of the deceased at present.

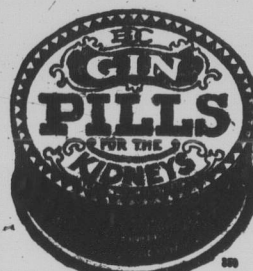

Provincial organizations on Social Hygiene (Venereal Disease) Child Welfare and Tuberculosis are to be formed at Moncton, Fredericton and St. John respectively during the week.

### LONDON'S FIRST THEATRE.

It Was Once a Crime to Attend a Play.

"There was a time, shortly after the first theatre was opened in London, when the opposition to the new form of entertainment was so great that an order was passed by Parliament for the compulsory closing of these 'palaces of amusement,' and making it a crime to be present as a spectator at a play.

This was in 1642, when only two theatres were in London. The first of these was built by an actor, James Burbage, at Shoreditch, in 1576, and called 'The Theatre.' A year or so later a second theatre was built at Shoreditch, and these two playhouses entered to London audiences until the suppression of the theatres.

After play were once more permitted several new theatres appeared, including 'The Globe' at Southwark, which was built by James Burbage. 'The Swan' and the 'Blackfriars' and 'Whitefriars' theatres.

Probably the most luxurious of these early theatres was 'The Fortune,' built by Edward Alleyn, an actor, in 1594, and so christened because it cost its owner the then fabulous sum, including the ground it stood on, of £13,120.

The only illumination during the performance was that afforded by candlelight, gas being unknown until 1817, when the first performance by gaslight was given at Drury Lane.

The Japanese Woman.

Mr. Sydney Greenbie has a high opinion of the Japanese woman. The Japanese man, he says in Japan Real and Imaginary, has been made effeminate by the attentions of the woman. He occupies the same place in his society as does our woman in ours.

"Foreigners seldom get a chance to look into the home life of the Japanese simply because in the majority of cases there is no such thing," he writes. "Even were you to speak the language fluently, they are not trained for social lives, and the reason is as much that they are too bashful as that the Japanese is wilfully reserved. I have been in the home of a few well-to-do Japanese, and in each case the woman would be introduced, but would retire soon after. The homes are the quietest. Among the educated and the converted, the woman does come forward a little, but generally finds more pleasure in serving delicacies than entering the conversation. This is due to the absence of natural selection in the matter of mating. Were a man free to choose, he would decide upon a woman who would not only be wife and mother, but also companion. As it is, only rarely are the dull and stupid eliminated. The parents are more concerned about having meek and obedient daughters-in-law whom they can manage than that their sons should have pleasant companions.

### A New Duke of Edinburgh.

In due course Prince Henry is to follow in the footsteps of the Duke of York, become a duke in his own right. North of the Tweed the hope is being expressed that he will be created Duke of Edinburgh. When the King was at Holyrood recently he was informally approached upon this matter, and promised to give it his best attention.

Before this title could be conferred upon Prince Henry, it is probable that the King would like to confer with the Queen of Rumania and other daughters of the late Duke of Edinburgh in order to learn whether they would have any objections to this title being revived. It is probable that this dukedom will be conferred upon Prince Henry upon his twenty-first birthday at the end of next March.

### Ireland and Literature.

"There are people in Dublin who seem to believe that Ireland has produced a greater literature than England and will denounce you as a traitor to your country if you profess that she cannot show poets of the stature of Chaucer, Shakespeare, Milton, Shelley, Keats, Wordsworth, Browning and Tennyson. With the exception of Mr. Yeats," writes Mr. St. John Ervine in the North American Review.

I am the sort of patriot who would like to see his country raise herself to the level of other countries, but I am not the sort of patriot who will pretend that she is on the level of England, France, and Germany when, in fact, she is far below it."

Viscount Elbhank's Heir.  
The Hon. Gideon Murray, M.P., who became the heir to his father, Viscount Elbhank, by the late death of his elder brother, the former Liberal Chief Whip, is as widely known in West Indian as in political circles.

For six years Mr. Murray was administrator of the beautiful island of St. Vincent, where the arrowroot comes from. His popularity was shared by Mrs. Murray, who, on their departure for St. Lucia in 1915, received many farewell gifts, including a diamond star, from the women of St. Vincent. Mr. Murray's political courage found expression in a scheme which he propounded for solving the difficult problem of the West Indian federation.

She had worried the passengers on either side of her as to whether she was nearing her destination. 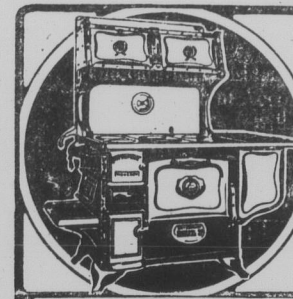

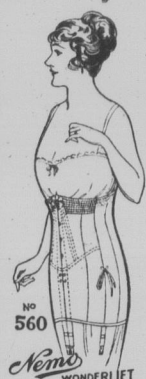

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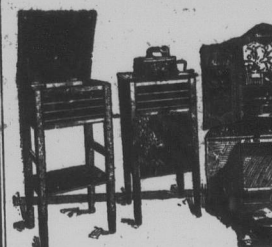
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
