For the past week the position had harassed and perplexed the Foreign Office in London more than even the Bering Sea question ever did. The Sultan stole a march upon English diplomacy by sending a firman so phrased as to excludge from the Egyptian frontier the whole Sinai Peninsula and part of the Red Sea littoral, which were ceded to Ismail Pasha and have been held by Egypt for half a century. Before the firman was drafted the English Ambassador at Constantinople, alive to the possibility of some action of this sort, demanded that the document should not introduce any ing the firman investing the Khedive is of some action of this sort, demanded that the document should not introduce any question concerning the frontier, and received assurance that the firman would not touch the Khedive's rights. When the Sultan's envoy, Eyoub Pasha, arrived at Cairo, the British Minister, Sir Evelyn Baring, suspecting some duplicity, asked for a copy of the documents, and when Eyoub Pasha reiused to communicate the contents of the firman till after the investiture, Minister Baring advised the Khedive not to proceed with the ceremony. Eyoub Pasha then disclosed the substance of the firman, the nature of which had been known to and approved by France and Russia before the missive left Constantinople. The Consults-General at Cairo at once ranged themselves on two sides, the Italian and Austrian representatives meeting at the English Embassy and the French and Russian diplomats at the residence of the Turkish plenipatentiary.

It appears from a leader entitled "Annexation Nonsense," lately published in the Montreal Herald, that the Canadian Tories have hit upon a new plan of checking the growth of sentiment in favor of a political fusion of the Dominion with the United States. Each Province of the Dominion will continue to exercise the large measure of local independence which under our system belongs to the States, and which includes all powers not expressly delegated to the Federal Government. Each Province will, indeed, acquire more autonomy than it now possesses, for in-Each Province will, indeed, acquire more autonomy than it now possesses, for instead of a Lieutenant-Governor appointed by the Dominion Governor-General, himself the appointee of a distant sovereign, it will have at the head of its State Administration a Governor elected by the people. It will have, in fact, the power of molding for itself through a State constitution just such a form of local government as it may prefer, subject only to the definite preserving. such a form of local government as it may prefer, subject only to the definite prescriptions of our federal organic law. No intelligent person can compare in detail the mixed scheme of tederal and local government which now obtains in Canada with the state of things existing on this side of the border, and not recognize that every Canadian Province would enjoy more local independence within the Union than it has outside of it.

But we are told that American politicians But we are told that American politicians would object to annexation because they cannot foresee with certainty how the Canadians would vote. If on such a pretext any of our politicians tried to frustrate the union of the Anglo-Saxon race upon this continent, he would be swiftly relegated by the people to private life. There is no longer any sectional empres. relegated by the people to private life. There is no longer any sectional apprehension in this country with regard to the admission of Canada, as there was when Lord Elgin negotiated his reciprocity treaty, at which time the Southern slaveholders feared a disturbance of the political equilibrium from the addition of a number of free States. At present the interest of no class or section could conceivably be threatened by the acquisition of Canada As to the alleged uncertainty regarding the party affiliations which the Canadians might form, that is a point in dians might form, that is a point in their favor. Nothing could be more preposterous than to suppose that because we have made some of our Territories wait some time be-fore we have bestowed on them the full rights of Statehoot, we should deal in the same way with Canada. The inhabitants of our Tertitories are the subjects of our Federal Government, possessing only such rights as it sees fit to give them. The Canadians, on the other hand, are freemen, cur full political equals before as well as after annexation, and we should well understand that, if they offered to enter the Union, it would be a question of now or never, and that the opportunity once missed might never again present itself. We should treat them with as much deference and liberality as we treated Texas, which, it will be remembered, had been un independent republic for eight years before it was admitted to the Union. To Texas we made some extraordinary concessions, including the right to divide itself at its own discretion into five States, and to acquire a corresponding representation in the United States Senate. The privilege has never been exercised, and we mention it only to show how differently we comport ourselves with regard to the admission of an independent commonwealth on the one hand, and with reference to the admission of one of our own Territories on the other.

That the public debt of the Dominion Government would be assumed be this country and incorporated with the national debt of the United States is a matter of curse. Why not? Would not the Canadians, transformed into American citizens, be doing their part through taxation to pay the interest on the whole public debt thus consolidated? On the other hand, we could not be expected to assume the municipal debts contracted by Canadian cities. But indirectly we should help to pay them, through the tremendous increase of Canadian population and prosperity which would be sure to follow annexation. The disposition of the Provincial debts might present some difficulty, and indeed this is the only point which would require mature consideration and concessions on both sides. It is probable, however, that if the Canadian Provinces would, in their collective capacity, do what Texas did, make over to us a certain portion of the outlying public lands, we might deem it expedient, and even profitable, to relieve them of their Provincial debts, and thus enable them to start fair in their new political career.

Other railway grants were awarded on like conditions. The Oxfords slackened their stroke before reaching Mortlake, but a very short distance from the winning line, and allowed their opponents to approach them. Then ensued an exciting finish. The Cantabs, worn out by their struggle, braced themselves for a final effort. Sturdily they bent to their task. Their boat jumped forward beneath the impulse of their lusty strokes, but all was to no avail. Comparatively fresh, the dark blues played with their opponents, and crossed the line at the Old Ship Inn an easy winner by two lengths and a quarter. The uproar at the finish was indescribable. Oxford's time was 19 minutes and 21 seconds. The me is the best ever made over the present course; the best previous time was 19 minutes and 35 seconds, made by the Cambridge crew when they won in 1873 by three-quarters of a length. It was in this race that sliding seats were first utilized by the university crews.

Take notice that the court will be moved in behalf of John Boyd Jennings, of the city of London, in the Province of Ontario, hotel-keeper, on Tuesday, the 12th day of April, A.D., 1892, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, or so soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, that a certain bylaw passed by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of London, on the 16th day of February, now last past, numbered 630, and instituted a bylaw relating to tavern and shop licenses, shall be quashed, and that so much as relates or purports to relate to tavern licenses shall be, and that so much that as relates, or purports to relate to shop licenses, shall be quashed, on the ground that the said council and corporation had no power to pass the same, and that the

licenses, shall be quashed, on the ground that the said council and corporation had no power to pass the same, and that the same does not specify what description of licenses are thereby intended to be referred to or limited, or for what purpose the licenses thereby referred to are to be issued, and that if the same was intended to include licenses issued under the Liquor License Act, the same should have specified that fact and the particular description of licenses under that act which was thereby intended to be referred to and have limited the number thereof, and that the said by law if of any force includes matters which if within the power of the council should be the subject of distinct bylaws.




