Pathetic and Impressive Incidents of Leo's Dying Hours.

HIS LAST ACT A BENEDICTION

An Early Conclave of the Cardinals Expected-Opinions of the English Press.

Rome, July 20.-The Pope died shortly after 4 o'clock this afternoon. His last moments were comparatively peaceful and painless, and were preceded by a period of insensibility. Around the bedside at the final moment were the cardinals, the relatives and members of the papal court. Before lapsing into unconsciousness the dying Pontiff feebly moved his lips, his last articulate words being those use in bestowing a benediction. Gradually the shadow of death spread over the Pontiff, his extremities became cold, his features assumed the fixed rigidity of death, and Dr. Lapponi noted his last fluttering heart-

When it became known shortly after 4 p.m. that the Pope's journey through the valley of death was almost finished, Cardinal Vannutelli hurried to his bedside, followed shortly afterwards by what is called in Vatican phraseology "the papel secret family," and the "noble family," besides the "personal family," including the late Pope's nephews-Comte Ludovico, Riccardo and Camillo-and also all the cardinals at the Vatican, who afterwards retired to the adjoining library, after they had been allowed to kiss the Pope's hand and pass along, presenting another of those pictures which will live in the memory of all those participating in it. The aged Pontiff was lying unconscious, propped up, to assist him in breathing, one hand laid on the red silk coverlet, the heavy pontifical ring being in danger of falling from the shrunken finger, while the other hand clutched his rosary and crucifix. 

A MISSIONARY TORTURED

The Sultan Imprisons Graduate of the American College.

Boston, July 21.-Word has just been received by Dr. Barton, of the Ameri-Board of Foreign Missions, that Professor Tenekijian, of Euphrates College, Harpoot, a graduate of the American College, at Constantinople, is a captive in a Turkish prison, un-dergoing the most horrible tortures. GOVERNMENT'S RAILWAY POLICY

Expected It Will Be Brought Down in a Day or Two.

AMENDMENT TO FISHERIES ACT

Government Bills Passed-Mr. Sifton's Estimates Again Taken Into Consideration.

Ottawa, July 20.-The bill to amend the Fisheries Act was given its third reading today in the Commons. Under its ruling the Minister of Marine and Fisheries is permitted to issue licenses for purse seine fishing in the British Columbia tidewaters. In the hunting of whales the use of explosives is allowed. The clause authorizing the use of trap nets was struck out. The House then went into committee on Mr. Fielding's bill respecting Dominion notes.

Mr. Clark (West Toronto) called attention to the continual complaints from the public with regard to the filthy condition of Canadian paper

Mr. Fielding replied that the Government had made an effort to overcome this by increasing the issue of Dominion paper currency and redeeming the bills more frequently. He thought this had resulted in a greatly improved condition of things. Mr. Clarke asked if any pressure had been brought upon the banks with re-

gard to their currency. Mr. Fielding said that this must remain with the public themselves. Mr. Clarke replied that public opinion did not seem to be sufficient. It was a regular nuisance that so much mutilated bills and coin should be in circulation, and legislation was required in the matter.
