BOTHA AGGRESSIVE

He Criticises Government and May Run for the Commons.

London, July 21.—Gen. Botha will sail for Europe this week. The nature of his mission is a matter of conjecture, but it is credited that he will stand as a candidate for the English Parliament as a Liberal, in hope of maintaining his countrymen's claims from a place where he can reach the greatest audience.—the floor of the House of Commons.

The letter of the former Boer commander-in-chief, General Louis Botha, in which he described Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's tour as a dismal failure, and the present regime in South Africa as a barren record of promises that have not been fulfilled, has angered a section of the Conservative press of England and the leading Government organ, the Standard, calls for his deportation from South Africa, and says he should be made to live abroad like Mr. Kruger.

The London Standard demands Gen. Botha's deportation from South Africa for denouncing the system of government there.

TRACED FROM IRELAND

A Belfast Postmistress Arrested at Windsor for Embezzlement.

Windsor, Ont., July 21.—Detectives Campeau and Mahoney of this city, and Secret Service Officer Chamberlain, of Ottawa, made a big capture here yesterday morning, when they placed under arrest Mrs. Ellen McKee, formerly sub-postmistress at Tubbermore, a suburb of Belfast, Ireland.

Mrs. McKee is wanted by the Irish authorities on a charge of embezzling about \$2,500 from the postoffice savings deposits and for forging receipts.

RETAIN MANITOBA

Returns Say 20 Conservatives and 10 Liberals,

WITH EIGHT SEATS DOUBTFUL

All the Ministers Are Elected With Possible Exception of Mr. McFadden.

Winnipeg, July 20.—The Manitoba general elections, held today, resulted in the return of the Roblin Government by substantially the same majority as in the House just dissolved. All the cabinet ministers are elected, with the possible exception of Mr. McFadden, Provincial Secretary, who is ten behind, with one poll to hear from. Premier Roblin was elected by about 166 in Dufferin, Attorney-General Campbell by 174 in Morris, Treasurer Davidson by 124 in Beautiful Plains, and Minister of Public Works Rogers by 150 majority in Manitou. All the contests in Winnipeg were very close, the combined majority for the three seats not exceeding 250. Hon. J. D. Cameron's defeat in South Winnipeg is especially regretted, as he stands head and shoulders over his opponent in political ability.

Returns up to this hour give the Conservatives 20, Liberals 10, and 8 doubtful seats.

Election day opened with rain, but it was not heavy enough to make the country roads too heavy for residents at outlying polls to get to their booths. In this city the vote was very heavy, a full half polled before the noon hour. Several instances of sharp work were reported at Liberal headquarters. In a couple of polls partisan deputies refused to allow voters to mark their ballots because their names were not on the very defective printed lists of voters. In all instances, the names were looked up and found to be in the certified lists, but as the voters were Liberal the deputies refused them the ballots.

The campaign has been remarkable in many ways, for never has a Government made more desperate efforts to hang on to the reins of power than did Mr. Roblin and his Ministers. Railways, bridges, grain elevators, and normal schools were promised to almost every hamlet. The promised reconstruction of separate schools and a more rigid law against the liquor traffic were also promised. The Liberals on the other hand, made no promises beyond stating that the same economic policy would be carried out should they be returned to power. The Press exposed jobbery in connection with the Macdonald drainage contract, in which it was charged that \$500 had been taken from the contractors' pockets by Mr. Roblin's ministers before a settlement for amounts due could be made.

THE RESULTS.

The G. N. W. press service gives the following results: Avondale—Argue (Con.) elected, 150 majority. Assiniboia—Prenfontaine (Lib.), 21 ahead, 3 polls to hear from. Arthur—Thompson (Con.) elected by about 15 majority. Beautiful Plains—Davidson (Con.) probably elected; small majority. Birnie—Mickle (Lib.) elected, 288 majority. Excalibur—Briggs (Con.) elected, 20 majority. Dufferin—Roblin (Con.) elected, probable majority 400. Emerson—Walters (Lib.) leading by 5, with 3 polling divisions to hear from. Gimli—Election July 30. Gladstone—Wilson (Con.) leading by 100, 3 or 4 places to hear from. Landsdowne—Norris (Lib.) probably elected, 15 majority. Manitou—Rogers (Con.) leading by 40, with two polls to hear from. Minnedosa—Waddell (Con.) elected, 80 majority. Morden—Ruddell (Con.) elected, 88 majority. Morris—Campbell (Con.) elected, 150 majority. Mountain—Johnson (Con.) elected by about 175 majority. Dauphin—Gunn (Con.) elected by about 120 majority. Rockwood—Riley (Con.) probably elected by small majority.

Returns from the constituencies are very incomplete. The Government claims 25 seats to 4. The Cabinet have all been re-elected with the probable exception of Dr. McFadden in Emerson, where the vote is very close.

A MISSIONARY TORTURED

The Sultan Imprisons Graduate of the American College.

Boston, July 21.—Word has just been received by Dr. Barton, of the American Board of Foreign Missions, that Professor Tenekjian, a graduate of the American College, at Constantinople, a captive of the Turkish priests, undergoing the most horrible tortures.

Professor Tenekjian is charged with conspiring against the Sultan, and with fomenting revolution. It can be stated positively that the charges are trumped up, and a striking phase of a blood policy of the Sultan to harass the American missionaries and those who attend the missionary schools in Armenia.

Professor Tenekjian may even now be dead as the result of the fiendish acts of his Turkish guards. According to the missionary reports he was threatened with death if he did not confess that American missionaries were plotting against the Sultan's life.

He had been on starvation diet for days, when Consul Norton interfered, routing a Turkish official out of bed at midnight to secure a hearing.

GOVERNMENT'S RAILWAY POLICY

Expected It Will Be Brought Down in a Day or Two.

AMENDMENT TO FISHERIES ACT

Government Bills Passed—Mr. Sifton's Estimates Again Taken Into Consideration.

Ottawa, July 20.—The bill to amend the Fisheries Act was given its third reading today in the Commons. Under its ruling the Minister of Marine and Fisheries is permitted to issue licenses for purse seine fishing in the British Columbia tidewaters. In the hunting of whales the use of explosives is allowed. The clause authorizing the use of trap nets was struck out.

The House then went into committee on Mr. Fielding's bill respecting Dominion notes.

Mr. Clark (West Toronto) called attention to the continual complaints from the public with regard to the filthy condition of Canadian paper money.

Mr. Fielding replied that the Government had made an effort to overcome this by increasing the issue of Dominion paper currency and redeeming the bills more frequently. He thought this had resulted in a greatly improved condition of things.

Mr. Clarke asked if any pressure had been brought upon the banks with regard to their currency.

Mr. Fielding said that this must remain with the public themselves.

Mr. Clarke replied that public opinion did not seem to be sufficient. It was a regular nuisance that so much mutilated bills and coin should be in circulation, and legislation was required in the matter.

After some further discussion the bill was put through its final stages and passed.

The bill respecting steamboat inspection was also dealt with in committee and finally passed.

Mr. Prefontaine's bill respecting certificates to masters and mates of ships was treated in like manner, and also was his bill respecting the safety of ships.

These were all technical measures of little general interest.

House adjourned as usual to the date on which the Government proposed to bring down the railway measure.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that it would certainly be brought down this week.

The House then went into supply, taking up Mr. Sifton's supplementary estimates.

Lieut.-Col. Sam Hughes gives notice that at the first convenient opportunity in the motion to go into supply he will call the attention of the House to certain data bearing on secret reports from his excellency, not as a Canadian, but as an imperial officer to the imperial authorities, during 1899 and subsequently, concerning the action and services of Col. Sara Hughes and the conduct of the imperial authorities regarding the same.

The Senate sat for only a few minutes this evening when the Ellen McCreedy Bill was passed.

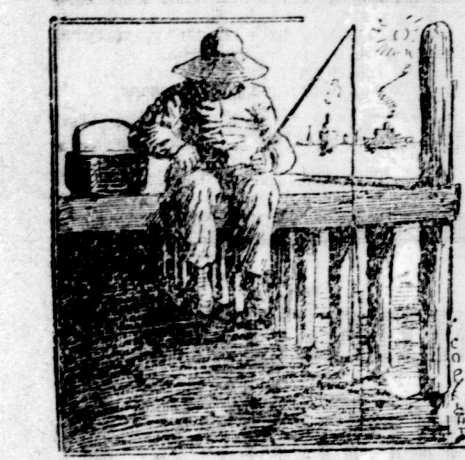

COUNCIL PETITIONED FOR BIG STRETCH OF PAVEMENT

Many Residents of King Street Want Bituthylic Roadway.

The unaccustomed visitor to meetings of London's city council, whose curiosity may have prompted him to drop into the city hall between 5 and 11:30 last evening, could not have avoided being deeply impressed with the vast amount of talking the majority of the aldermen can do, when they are in the humor—and it is on rare occasions that they are not—and also with the great weight of many of the arguments set forth in support of the cause they may see fit to advocate.

At the regular meeting of the council last night, some of the chosen twelve talked so much that at one stage of the proceedings the mayor frankly acknowledged that he did not know just where he was—and none of the aldermen volunteered to enlighten him. The talk was about many things—the sale of city lands, permanent pavements, cancellation of a city contract and the results that might follow, the division of the band concert grant, etc.—and at times there was a wandering far from the questions under discussion. All of the members were present.
