





THE DIVORCE PROBLEM

Protestant Churches in Conference to Draft a Common Law.

New York, March 24. - Agitation against divorce and the marriage of divorced persons has resulted in a meeting here of eminent Protestant ministers and laymen, who will attempt to solve the problem of uniform legis-lation on the subject by the states of the Union. A meeting of the executive committee of the conference, presided over by Bishop Doane, of Albany drafted a rough outline of the proposed law which later will be presented to the full meeting for discussion. The conference is a direct result of action taken by the Protestant Episcopal

Church in its last general conference la at San Francisco. Every effort will be made to forever solve the divorce evil, so far as the Protestant churches are concerned," declared Right Rev. David H. Green bishop coadjutor of the Episcopal archdiocese of New York. "The Roman Catholic Church was invited to parti-cipate in the deliberations of the conference, but declined. The opposition of that church regarding divorce is

well known, however. "Personally, I do not believe in divorce or remarriage, but in separa-tion only. Other gentlemen at the conerence may have other views; but it is the purpose of the representatives of Episcopel, Methodist, Presbyterian, Evangelical, Lutheran, Baptist, Congregational, Universalist, Unitarian and Reformed Presbyterian Churches to decide upon some final method involving a comity of relation and uniform practice to treat the great evil of divorce in this country, so that persons who were married under the rites of one church cannot after securing divorces, remarry under the rites of some other Protestant church."
