Expedition "Shaping up"

The St. Pierre et Miquelon expedition slated to leave UNB early in May is "favourably shaping up" according to party chief Edward Boswell of Brantford, Ontario. In an exclusive release to the Brunswickan this week he announced that the group has been able to obtain diving equipment from the Western-Morris Research Institute on the lendlease system. The equipment will be used to take underwater rock tappings to determine if there is any justification for further investigation of mineral deposits in the pre-Cambrian reefs surrounding the islands.

FREDERICTON - A silence of guilt rested squarely on the shoulders of the Carleton, the student newspaper, at Carleton University, Ottawa, as the final issue of the Brunswickan of the college year was being readied for the printer, Wednesday night.

Brunswickan Editor-in-Chief David Folster, after consultation with Canadian University Press President Douglas Parkinson, announced that the UNB newspaper was taking formal measures against the Carleton for enacting "the most blatant exhibition of outright plagiarism that I have ever had the misfortune of seeing."

The incident arose when the Ottawa college paper sponsored a contest on the front page of the February 26 issue identical in every detail (except the mystery co-eds and prizes) to the "Sensational Seven" Contest the instance menth before in the pages of tional Seven" Contest run just one month before in the pages of

In a letter dispatched to Mr. Noel Norenius, editor of the Carleton, the Brunswickan demanded a front page apology or else the Carleton would be faced with the possibility of legal action.

(The full text of the letter sent to the Carleton is reprinted elsewhere on this page.)

Meanwhile, the Brunswickan is considering drafting a proposal to present at the next Canadian University Press conference which would eliminate a repetition of such an incident, or else result in serious censure of the offender paper.

## TEXT OF LETTER FORWARDED TO CARLETON

March 15, 1960.

The Editor, The Carleton, Carleton University, OTTAWA, Ontario. Attention Mr. Norenius:

Mr. Parkinson (Pres. CUP) has asked me to put in your hands a formal announcement of our intentions concerning your recent act of plagiarism on the Brunswickan.

As you know the BRUNSWICKAN sponsored a con-As you know the BRUNSWICKAN sponsored a contest; viz. the "Sensational Seven Contest". There is no doubt in my mind that your "Tantalizing Ten Contest" is nothing other than plagiarism. The tone of the two contests is exactly the same; the wording, although slightly changed, is nearly the same; the wording although slightly changed is nearly the same; and your paper even identical; the rules are exactly the same; and your paper even went so far as to use our idea of a ruler above the masthead.

However, I do not wish to debate the similarity of these two contests. We have consulted legal advice from four sources and all of our advisors are of the singular opinion that you would easily be defeated in the courts.

We, of course, will offer an alternative. If you decide to issue an apology on the headline of your front page, a story explaining how you "thought of the idea", and an apology for not giving the BRUNSWICKAN credit for the idea of the contest, we will be willing to terminate legal


However, the choice is yours. If you feel that this is a "gag issue" or that we are bluffing. I would most strongly recommend that you do not print an apology. Since our paper is holding all the cards, we do not particularly care which alternative you choose.

If you do plan to print an apology we would appreciate hearing from you by wire so that we may advise our lawyers. I respectfully await your decision.




