As Butuns, we reit that our loyalty was untainled-as Constitutionahsts, we knew that our deanands were just; we acknowledged however that at wound be premature to call for any immediate expression on tie part of your Excsillency on the grievances which uave long so peculianly pressed on us, and we theretore intumated our intention, at a fitting period, through the medium of a body whom we had appomted to convey to your Excel lency a representation of tue aature of those grievances.

## The repiy of your Excellency was satisfac-

 tory in the highest degree. We wrre not a reconnition by your Exceilconcy of the Que bec Constitutional Association as a body ; we wished not to torce such a recognition, satis fied that your Exiellency, using those means of obtaining information which would n. turally present themselves to a person in your exalte British and lish inhabitants of this Province, united as one man, precluded as they have been from all share in the popular branch of the Legislature, had found it necessary select fersons in whom they couldreonfide, not as may perhaps have been falsely repre schted to your Lordship, for the purpose of overawing the Governeent, but of obtaiming abuses under which they suftered.Your invitation to personal and individual communication was all that we required, believing that our demands, based in equity, needed not the force of numbers to carry conviction.
The acts of your Lordship generally, on your assumption of the reins of governmen feelings of contidence which were springing reelings of conndence which were springing by your Lordship of the entire responsibility by your Lordship of the entire responsibility attaching to the government of these provinces, was an act which commed the manli opinion we had aiready comed of the maniness and energy of your character. We fel the difficulties of your situation, and each mau amongst us however numble his sphere, acknowledged it as a sacred duty to yield his support, and assistance if required, to lighte the difficulties of your arduous undertaking. The principle on which the appointment to your Exceilency's Councils were made, wa such as to command almost universal assent for integrity and talent your L.ordship's nomi nation was considered a sufficient guarantee, whilst the best pledge for strict impastiality was to be found in the very recent connection with the Colony of nearly all the members.
These eircumstances so anspicious to the result of your mission, my Lord, are introduced to shew that on the part of the British and
Irish inhabitants of this Province, so far from a

disposition to thwart and embarrass your Exceliency, there was and is the most anxious lesire to co -operate with the excrtiotis of your Lordship for the peace, welfare and good government of the l'rovince. But, my Lord its proportion to the pleasing hopes which your Excellency's character and acts have fostered will be taeir disappointment should their prayers be disregarded, and they again be subjected to the complicated evils under which they have long sutlered.-They feet, ny Lord that without any fault of theirs, they are deprived of those rights which from inancy they have been mstructed to prize above die itself, that they live uader a government possessing not even the outward semblance of reedom. They patiently a quiesce however in the temporary privation of their liberties but they call on your Lordship as the Governer of his Province so to direct its allairs as to inake heir yoke easy and their burden light. They all ou you to respect the few niguts and prvileges loft to them : one of them is that of Trial by Jury guaranteed to the inhabitants of his Province by the Imperial Act 14 Geo. 3 Chap. 83, commonly calied the Quebec Act. My Lord, the humble andividual who now -htures, with all respect to address you through the medium of the public press, preends not to any intluence in society, he meely expresses his own opinion, but the fearessly assents that a few more Ordinances of a siminar character with that which is the first omanate from your Excellency's Spectal Council will fix ? brand on your administration not easily to be eradicated.

My Lord, I shal, not dwell further on this painful subject, I shall not enlarge on the injury done to society, or the insult offored to public opinion, by the liberation of such men as Gironard, Scott ard others, who, in conjunction with the banished traitor Papineau, were the exciting oause of the late insurrection. Had the laws been permitted to take their course the whole of the facts connected with the late rebellion would have come to light; and had the leaders or any of them been convicted, your Lordship woutd, 1 am convinced, exer-
cising a sound judgement on each individual

case have so tompered justice with mercy as to uphold the majesty of the Empire, and establish the future security of the Province. It has been asserted that jurors would not have convicted even on the most couclusive evidence : this is such an imputation on the character of one class of Her Majesty's subjects as is not to be believed without anple proof; but even if admitted, the fact would show more plainly the necessity of establishing such ${ }^{A}$ systen as would prevent for the future the ands of justice from being defeated.
My Lord, there can be no desire on the
part of the writer to limit or restrict the eser part if the writer to limit or restrict the exercise of the mont pleasing right of the Sovereign, the mitigation of punishment, and the parden of offences : that right however involves a daty to society which is not to suffer from the mistaken le ity of the administrator of the laws. How far the interests of the loyal nhatitants of this Province have been promoted by the lenity shewn to those in continement for political offences is a question which time and Public Opinion to which all power is anbservient must shortly decide.
