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
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

HAMILTON, ONT.—The Terminal Co. are acquiring considerable property on King street, although the plans of the new building are as yet uncertain.—Building permits have been granted as follows: Dowswell Manufacturing Co., frame and steel warehouse, corner of Wellington and Simcoe streets, cost \$2,000; J.
