[By Special Wire to The Courier] JOHANNESBURG, Jan. 15.-Mr. Bain, secretary of the South African Federation of Trades, and his band of 300 comrades, who had barricaded themselves in the Trades Hall since Tuesday, surrendered unconditionally to the police to-day. Mr. Bain and ten of the ringleaders were arrested and lodged in jail.

A seven-pounder field gun trained on the Trades Hall proved an irresistible argument to Mr. Bain and his companions. 




