WORK BEING PROVIDED FOR GUELPH CITIZENS

The Authorities Start Stone Crushing and Storm Drain Laying

GUELPH, Jan. 14.—The civic authorities of Guelph are looking after their citizens who are out of work, and to provide employment for them.

They have put a stone crushing plant in operation and have started to lay storm drains for the permanent pavement to be constructed on Waterloo avenue next spring. Already six hundred feet have been laid. Eighteen inch tile is being used, and the drain is being blasted through solid rock. The job is providing work for a number of men. Those in charge state that rock can be excavated during the winter just as easily and as cheaply as in the summer time.

APPROVE POLICIES OF HON. MR. HANNA

Temperance Deputation Lauds the Work of the Provincial Secretary

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—The brand of temperance legislation which the Ontario Government is turning forth yearly is becoming popularly recognized by the temperance people of the province as the bulwark of their advocacy. They are out now in force to stand behind the proposals recently made providing for the further shortening of hours. This plea was advanced in preference to any asking that the three-fifths clause be tampered with, as members of the Dominion alliance were wont to clamor for.

The coming of a deputation to Hon. W. J. Hanna yesterday was taken as a tribute to the work of the government was doing in logically restricting the traffic and each of the delegates acknowledged their approbation.

The requests of the deputation, which represented the churches and temperance interests of all the province, were in nature those set forth some time ago and were in short that the liquor sale be closed at 8 o'clock in the evening and in both bars and shops at noon on Saturday. They wished to urge also that the proposal to make all holidays "dry" be given the support of the provincial secretary. The desire being especially urgent in view of the sacred days, such as Good Friday.

All these things were asked to be embodied in legislation during the coming session, the visitors have the expectation that the government would follow their usual policy of gradual legislation, rather than a sweeping reform, which public opinion did not fully warrant.

Archdeacon Inglis praised the government highly for the work of last year, saying that it had worked so well that the people desired it amplified.
