Author of "Beautiful Snow."

The best known of the several poems entitled "Beautiful Snow" was published anonymously, and its authorship, so far as we know, is still in doubt. Preparing for Canada Census.

Though the Canadian census will not be taken until June, 1921, preparations will soon begin, as it is a huge, slow task to organize and appoint commissioners and enumerators in every electoral district. In 1911 there were 9,703 enumerators. The appointments this time will be made by the Civil Service Commission and the patronage of the member of Parliament will be eliminated.

Trophy for Chatham.

EBERT IN TOUCH WITH THE ALLIES

Had 'Phone Talk With French Premier.

Entente Taking No Chances With Kapp.

Paris special cable: Despite the fresh reports to-day that the German military de facto regime under Dr. Wolfgang Kapp has thrown up the sponge, the Allies intend to maintain the closest "watch on the Rhine" and keep their troops at the strategic bridgeheads at their reinforced strength until there is absolute certainty that neither a reactionary nor a red revolution is sweeping the former empire.

Practically, the most important unofficial report from Berlin to-day was that France had sent a diplomatic mission to Stuttgart, where Friedrich Ebert and his Cabinet are holding forth. Another despatch had it that Ebert was in direct touch with the Allies to-day and had a telephonic conversation with Premier Millerand.

These reports were greeted with gratification by that section of the French press and public that has been urging France to take the initiative in encouraging the anti-Prussian separatist movement in South Germany, thus taking advantage of an opportunity to obviate the German menace forever by splitting the nation asunder.

A report that Marshal Foch gave Dr. Kapp 48 hours in which to resign, threatening to march into Germany if the demand was disobeyed, was denied officially. It caused a great sensation here, but in quarters where sane and logical heads predominate it was ridiculed from the outset.

STOCKMEN BOOST REGISTER FEES

Swine and Sheep Breeders Increase Scales.

Sheep Men Want Pact With U. S. Too.

Toronto despatch says: Increases in fees for registering pure-bred stock were decided on at the special meetings of the Canadian Swine and Sheep Breeders' Associations held yesterday afternoon at the Hotel Carls-Rite. The action taken in each instance was a ratification of resolutions forwarded at the annual meetings recently held.

The Swine Breeders met at one o'clock and authorized a new scale of fees, as follows: For animals under one year of age, \$1; animals over one and under two years, \$2; over two years, \$3, and for transfer of ownership, 50 cents. The fees heretofore have been 50 cents for registration of all animals under two years of age, and free registration of transfers of ownership for sixty days from the date of sale, and 50 cents beyond that period.

The Sheep Breeders assembled at three o'clock. The new scale of fees decided on was: For animals under one year, 50 cents; over one year and under two, \$1.00; over two years, \$2; transfer of ownership, 25 cents. Under the old scale the charge was 50 cents for animals registered before the December following the year of birth, and \$1 beyond that time limit, while transfer of ownership registrations were made free of charge within sixty days of the date of sale, with a 25-cent charge after that period.

The Sheep Breeders authorized their Executive Committee to endeavor to make reciprocal registration arrangements with the different American associations. It is desired to have Canadian registrations accepted in the United States and vice versa. Sheep breeders already enjoy this reciprocity with the American association.

Both associations would like a proposal to make charge for their registration record books, but it was decided not to proceed with any steps along this line.

UNFAIR TO WIFE BEATERS!

(Kingston Standard.)

Some men are peculiar. Take, for instance, R. B. McAlilly — what a name! the Justice of the Peace of Louisville, Miss., who has just posted up the following notice:

"To the citizens of the Fourth District—This is to notify you that when you commit any misdemeanor come to my office plead guilty and pay up. Misdemeanors from \$5 up. Whipping your wife from \$25 up.

Now what do you think of that? We know what you'll say—precisely the same thing that we say, that this is a clear bid for the woman vote and

a gross violation of the rights of Man with a capital M. The absurdity of it, that a man should be taxed more for beating his wife than for committing any other ordinary misdemeanor. Where is the justice of that, where the fairness, where the equity? We pause for reply.

No reply apparently being forthcoming we will answer the question ourselves. There is neither justice, nor fairness nor equity in the thing, just stop to consider. Man is the acknowledged head of the household, the Superior Being, the Lord and Master, the Big Noise, the Main Squeezee, the Chief Gazabo. The wife, by common consent, is only a Two Spot. In some countries, for instance, any property she owns belongs to the husband and she can not legally will it away from him—which, as all husbands will agree, is only right and proper. The noble Indian—with the accent on the noble—has the right idea of things. He lets his wife and the sun all day while the Squaw splits the wood, draws the water, tills the soil, bears the children, cooks the meals and does other such little trifles. The Indian is Heap Pig Chief while the Squaw is just the Squaw. And so it is all through life. The man is the Boss.

Under such circumstances the question naturally arises why should this Mississippi Justice of the Peace ask a man \$25 for beating his wife and only \$5 for getting drunk. Has a wife-beater no rights that the law can respect? Must a husband merely because of this implied threat on the part of this Justice, be denied the blessed privilege of giving the lady of the house a playful tap or two over the eye when the spirit moves him? Or must he ever hereafter be constrained before he begins his punning, to ask himself the question "Is it worth the \$25?" Perish the thought!

Plants Can See, Touch and Taste

Plants possess at least three senses—sight, touch and taste. Though their manner of expressing their emotions is very modest, they are far from being inert. A very brief microscopic study of their life shows that they possess a sentient existence which, though less perfect than that of the higher animals, in some cases is equal to the sentient life of the polype and sponge.

Sight is the best developed of the vegetable senses. By this sense the plant perceives the light, though it does not distinguish objects. The earth worm, the coral insect and the oyster enjoy about the same amount of sight; they have no localized visual organ, but they perceive the difference between light and darkness. When a ray of light reaches them they contract under the stimulus.

The influence of light is clearly shown by the plant kept in a room where there is only one window; the plant is so eager to get the light that it crosses its stems and turns its leaves broadside toward the window. This action has led students of plants to say that plants are "heliotropic." Physiologists say that the plant bends toward the light because the side in darkness grows faster than the other side. The simplest explanation is that the plant perceives the light and that it shows that it perceives it. The stem of the plant is perceptive. Its sensitiveness of perception goes as far as its root, but the root shows its perception in a different way. If the stem is heliotropic the root is negatively heliotropic. The stem shows that it perceives the light by turning toward it, the root shows that it perceives the light by turning from it, just as persons with weak eyes turn from the light and seek the shadow when the light is strong.

A sense equally well developed in plants is that of touch. The sensitive plant is the exemplary case; the slightest touch causes it to curl its leaves and eventually it droops them toward the ground. Naturalists have explained this action by saying that a touch so influences the leaf that it drives the water to the depression in the stem and that the leaf immediately wilts for lack of internal moisture. Even if that is true, the plant is influenced by the contact of something outside itself. When an animal is influenced in the same way the result is due to the animal's sense of touch.

The sense of taste is an endowment of plants of the lower orders, algae among others. When particles of different kinds are thrown in the water among the algae, the plants make a choice at once and cling to the objects they can assimilate; and if they are capable of perceiving the flavor of their ailments and of choosing certain kinds out of a mass of different kinds, they may be said to be endowed with the sense of taste. Among the higher plants the sense of taste is less common and less easily distinguished, but in many cases it is undeniably present.

If an insect is set on the leaf of one of the drosera, the tentacles of the plant fall upon the morsel at once. If a non-nutritive substance is set on the same place, the plant gives no sign of recognition. The microscope

Turk Capital Seized by the Ally Forces

Constantinople Cable—Allied troops have occupied this city, and the great guns of the British dreadnaught Benbow and other giant Allied warships, moored to quays or anchored in the Golden Horn, command both sides of the Bosphorus. Every ship is cleared for action.

The actual arrival of Allied forces caused little alarm, nor were there any signs of panic, except in Stamboul. Shopkeepers near the War Office there closed their places of business when it was heard the Allies were coming, but the troops inspired confidence, and the stores were soon reopened.

All the Allied powers participated in the movement, being under orders from the British commander-in-chief here, the Italian contingent including detachments having Moslems on their rosters. Four thousand blue-jackets and marines were landed by the British warships.

Plants possess, then, the senses of sight, touch and taste. They have given no evidence of other senses, but some branches of the algae family have two microscopic organs with many granulations which move incessantly. The two organs are remarkably like the organs of hearing of mollusks, worms and other low forms of animal life. The creatures of the vegetable world have a remarkable sense of direction in space. If a root growing vertically is set in the earth horizontally, it begins at once to turn the end of its root toward the centre of the earth.

Simultaneously with advices of the release of Dr. Skelton, came news of the capture by the same band of bandits of a British missionary named Metcalfe, belonging to the China Inland Mission.

Dominion of Canada

Your Income Tax Return Should be Filed at Once!!

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

CLASS 1

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920:

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

NOTE—Individuals comprising partnership must file returns in their individual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

PENALTY

Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.

Time Limit

All persons in Class 1, as shown herein, must file on or before the 31st of March, 1920.

All persons in Class 2, as shown herein, must file on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

General Instructions

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation, or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly, and avoid penalties

CLASS 2

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920:

All individuals other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

Farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1 A.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must use Form T 2.

PENALTY

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provisions of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100.00 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$1,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

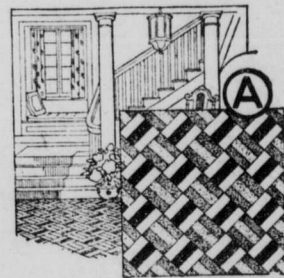
