NEWS TOPICS OF A WEEK

Important Events in Few Words For Busy Readers

THE FIRE RECORD.
The Montreal sugar refinery was burned, involving a loss of \$500,000.

THE WORLD OF WOMEN.
Marie Corelli, the English authoress, vigorously denounces female bicycling, which she regards as the height of feminine vulgarity.

BASEBALL.
Fred Crane, the famous baseball pitcher, and holder of the world's record for long distance throwing, committed suicide by drinking morphine in Rochester.

NATURAL PHENOMENA.
Manitobans are enjoying a forecast of winter.

THE STORM OF SATURDAY raged fiercely on the Atlantic coast, and the Niagara boats from Toronto had very rough passages, and it is feared that many shipping disasters on the lakes have yet to be reported.

THE INDUSTRIAL WORLD.
Tom Mann's scheme for an universal dockers' strike looks very formidable, but the masters of the British Shipping Federation profess not to be alarmed.

THE DEAD.
Within ten days there have been five deaths from typhoid fever in one family in East Zorra.

LEWIS SAUVIE, employed in a stove mill four miles from Comber, Ont., dropped dead from heart failure.

Mayor Callaghan of Collingwood, Ont., was found dead in his bed. The deceased, who was 60 years of age, and unmarried, had retired the previous night in his usual habit.

It is understood that The Chatham Banner is to be sold, as Messrs. Berridge and McKay will be taking charge of The Herald.

In interview the principal Ottawa lumbermen, who met at the Ottawa Club on Saturday, said that this season would be about the same as last year, but that they expected a smaller number of men in the woods.

THE RELIGIOUS WORLD.
The foundations of the Roman Catholic cathedral at Westminister have been completed.

Rev. C. H. Shute, rector of St. Barnabas' Church, St. Catharines, intends handing in his resignation shortly.

The Rev. Father Point, the oldest priest in the Dominion, died on Saturday at the Jesuit College in Montreal.

The Pope, in an apostolic letter, proclaims that the Anglican ordinations are absolutely invalid, and his Holiness invites the Anglicans to return to Catholic unity.

THE COMPLETE RETURNS of Monday's elections show a Republican plurality in Maine of 4372.

The latest advices from Madagascar describe the island within the French protectorate as in a horrible condition of anarchy.

The press bureau at the National Democratic convention in Glasgow calculates that Mr. Bryan, in November, will carry 20 out of the 45 states, and 223 electoral votes.

FOR MEN OF WAR.
The new armoured battleship Illustrious was launched from the Chatham dockyards.

Interesting tests were made at the Niagara river, which have shown the penetrating power of the Lee-Enfield rifle bullets.

Chancellor von Hohenlohe is expected to succeed to the office of German Emperor on the 15th of October.

The Anglo-Egyptian expedition, numbering about fifteen thousand men, advanced on Friday to Baris, on the Nile. On Saturday they occupied Kerdah, on the Nile, almost without opposition. The troops hurried forward to Dongola, only thirty miles distant, and met the dervishes in force on the Nile. After defeating them with heavy loss, they sent the dervishes on to practically undefended. A small force of British troops, consisting of a company of British troops, followed up to Dongola, and will hold it till the arrival of all the troops.

THE GREEN AND AZAR.
Early last week J. J. P. Tyan, the alleged No. 1 of the Invidious who killed Lord Henry Cavendish, was arrested in France on a charge of being concerned in a conspiracy to blow up with dynamite Her Majesty Queen Victoria and the Car on the occasion of the latter's visit.

The French Government has received a formal demand from Great Britain for the extradition of Patrick J. Tyan. The Irish Executive took steps to bring about the extradition of Tyan, in custody at Boulogne, on the charge of having been connected with the Phoenix Park murders.
