Wednesday was a gala day in Wolfville. The much heralded Big Day fully came up to expectations. The weather was ideal and the large crowd which visited the town thoroughly enjoyed themselves. There was something doing on the campus all the time from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m. The refreshment booths and side shows did a flourishing business all day. All the athletic events were keenly contested and Wolfville carried off its share of honors.

A Valley Tennis Tournament was carried on all through the day and proved most interesting. Teams from Annapolis, Lawrence-town, Bridgetown, Windsor and Wolfville competed. They were unable to finish the events until the following day, and we hope to be able to publish the results next week.

The baseball game resulted in a win for Annapolis. It was a good game and keenly contested. In the first innings Wolfville scored three runs to the visitors' one and it looked as though it might be Wolfville's game. However in the next innings Annapolis scored seven, making the score 8-3, and the home team's chances did not look so bright. In the third innings Beardsley was taken out of the box and Arthur Brown put in his place. It was Brown's first game and he made a great showing. 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Liberals Nominate Candidates

The Liberals of Kings county held a convention at Kentville on Saturday, for the purpose of selecting candidates for the coming election. Archibald Foster, president of the Kings County Liberal Association, occupied the chair. There were eighty-one delegates present and the meeting was full of enthusiasm.

Hon. H. H. Wickwire was named in open convention and unanimously nominated. The convention then proceeded to select a colleague for the Minister of Highways and the following names were placed in nomination: John McDonald, W. B. Burgess, S. B. Chute, Jas. Durno, J. Howe Cox, J. Elliott Smith, A. L. Pelton, James Sealy, and S. Selfridge. J. Elliott Smith, James Sealy and S. Selfridge declined to have their names go before the Convention.

A ballot being taken, John McDonald was found to have a majority of all votes cast, while Mr. Burgess came second. Mr. McDonald's nomination was then made unanimous. Mr. McDonald is a son of Andrew S. McDonald, is a practical farmer and a graduate of Acadia University. Addresses were made by the candidates, Hon. Mr. Wickwire dealing with his roads policy at some length.

Canada's New Premier

The resignation of Sir Robert Borden as Prime Minister will take effect on Saturday. He will be succeeded by Hon. Arthur Meighen, Minister of the Interior, who has undertaken the formation of a new administration. Official announcement to this effect was issued from Government House on Wednesday night.

Honorable Mr. Meighen will be the first Western man to take over the chief executive of Canada. While he is a native of Ontario, Mr. Meighen has spent practically his whole life in the West. He has represented Portage La Prairie, Man., since 1908. Mr. Meighen was also the man who went with Sir Robert Borden to England in 1917 to attend the Imperial Conference. He is a barrister by profession having graduated from Toronto University in 1896. He is also remembered as the man who fathered the Compulsory Military Service Act and carried it through the House of Commons in 1917.

New Bank Manager at Wolfville, N. S.

The new manager of the Branch of the Bank of Montreal at Wolfville, N. S. is Mr. W. H. G. Phipps, late manager of the Branch at Curling, Nfld. Mr. Phipps has had a long record of service with Bank of Montreal. He was for a time in the Head Office at Montreal. Later he was transferred to Western Canada and served in various capacities in the New Westminster, Nelson, Victoria, Regina and Spokane, Wash. Branches. In 1917 he was assigned to the Managership of the Branch in Curling, Nfld. and has held this position until his present promotion. Mr. Phipps was born in France of English parents and came to Canada in 1882, before the completion of the C. P. R. He is the third son of the late Major H. E. Phipps who, by the way, was for some years Groom-in-waiting to H. M. Queen Victoria.

Notes and Comments

Canadian money, Canadian made, should stay in Canada for Canadian trade.

An inch of rain means that 101 tons of water have fallen upon every acre of soil.

It is suggested by an exchange that one reason for the high price of sugar is that it keeps well in storage.

The Pacific Coast States, California, Oregon, and Washington, have one motor car to every nine inhabitants.

For selling turkey and geese in excess of controlled prices a Glasgow firm of profiteers has been fined 250 pounds.

Germany will be required to pay the Allies as an indemnity 3,000,000,000 marks per year for a period of 37 years. This amount may be increased in the future if the Allies are convinced of Germany's ability to pay more.

Women have now been made eligible by Royal decree for the Victoria Cross. The order should have come earlier or be made retroactive to include the nurses who earned this supreme honor by their heroism during the war.

Norway is the first country in the world to propose national legislation specifying that motor trucks up to two tons capacity must be equipped with pneumatic tires, so as to prevent damage to cut down the excessive cost of highway repairs due to the use of solid tires.

Luxury Tax To Be Collected By Means of Revenue Stamps

As collection of luxury taxes under the present method is proving difficult, cumbersome and costly it has been decided to abandon the whole procedure in favor of collection by means of revenue stamps. These revenue stamps will be ready by August 1, and as soon as they are available to purchase by merchants the sending of duplicates of every sale receipt covering goods which are taxable will cease. This will be a great relief to merchants throughout the country.

The revenue stamps will be provided in denominations of from one to ten cents inclusive, thirteen cents, fifteen cents and all multitudes of ten cents up to one dollar. In addition there will be one, two, three, four, five and ten dollar stamps.

United Fruit Growers

The annual meeting of the United Fruit Companies Ltd., was held in Kentville last week and was largely attended. The reports of the president as well as the Board of Management indicated that the past year of the company was the most successful they had ever had, the turnover being around three million dollars for the year. The company elected all its old officers as follows:—President F. K. Bishop; Vice President, E. H. Johnson; Secretary, K. L. Pineo. The Board of Management is as follows:—President Bishop; Vice President Johnson, V. D. Leonard, and Dr. P. M. Balcom.

The matter of the erection of canneries and vinegar plants as recently ordered by the Board was endorsed, and the first start will be at Aylesford, where a cannery, as well as a vinegar factory will be erected and ready for business this season.

Another important matter decided was that hereafter Nova Scotia apples will be packed in boxes instead of barrels. This will place them as far as packing is concerned on a par with western apples.

"Your Teeth"

SOME DO AND SOME DON'T

There are two classes of people in the world, those who do brush their teeth and those who don't. If you are a member of the "dons" now is your chance to join the "doos." Nearly all of the people who believe in soap, believe also in the tooth brush.

There are many kinds and shapes of tooth brushes, so many in fact, that the average citizen usually walks into the neighborhood drug store, whispers his secret to the clerk, and takes any brush that renders the largest margin of profit to the business.

There are people who become very much attached to their tooth brushes; they are not so much attached to the principal of brushing their teeth as they are to the individual brush. This is a good idea if it isn't carried too far. It is no longer good form to use the tooth brush as an heirloom. An heirloom to be successful is supposed to be used with gratifying results by successive generations. Each generation is expected to have its own tooth brush, in fact in the best families, a tooth brush should retire from active duty in about three months, or less.

When you select a brush, get a medium or a small size so that you will have enough room in your mouth to move it around. The bristles should be set a little distance apart and should be cut wedge-shaped at the brushing end. This makes the brush more lively and it will do far better work than a smooth cut brush with the bristles set close together.

Brush your teeth with an up-and-down movement, inside and out and on the occlusal or biting surfaces. But, don't forget to brush your gums. Brush your gums with a circular movement and go after your cheeks and tongue. Instead of directing people to brush their teeth we should say "brush your whole mouth." Be one of the "doos"; the taste is remembered long after the cost is forgotten.

Miss Charlena Pearson returned to her home here recently, having resigned her position in the post-office at Yarmouth.

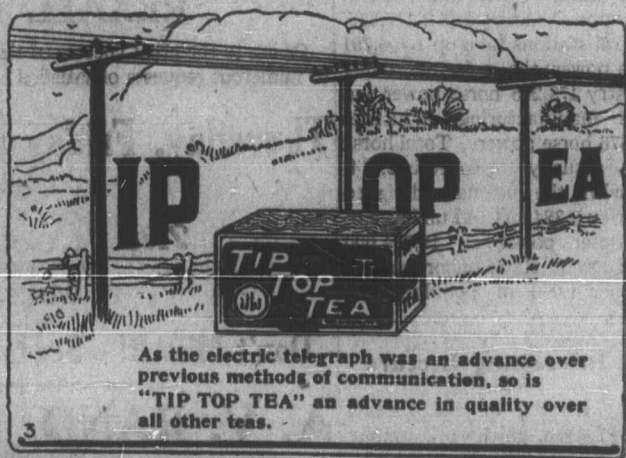
Miss Lillian Bishop, who has been ill and confined to her room the past three weeks, we are glad to state is much better.

Editorial Jottings

When Parliament prorogued last week there was none of the accustomed pomp. The Governor-General attended without a guard of honor. The innovation saved the country many thousands of dollars, and set an example which might well be made the custom in connection with parliamentary openings and closings at Ottawa, at Halifax and at every other Canadian capital.

For the whole of Canada, the total water wheel and turbine horse power installed is 2,417,896. Central stations take up 1,756,791 horse power; the pulp and paper industry 473,265 horse power and other manufacturing industries 436,376 horse power. Total horse power actually employed is 2,214,721 with the ultimate designed capacity 3,384,808 and undeveloped water power of 19,554,000 horse power. Ratio of horse power to every 1,000 of population is 274.

An Interesting Lecture

Miss Russell, of the Zenana Bible Mission, which works among the women of India, gave a very interesting address on her work, in St. John's Rectory, on Wednesday evening of last week. A good many attended including the heads of every woman's missionary society in the town, the society represented by Miss Russell being inter-denominational. The lecture was preceded by a very interesting tableau illustrating the work of these devoted ladies and also a Mohammedan marriage. Miss Russell described the terrible life of the Mohammedan women in India, the child wives and child widows who are treated with great cruelty. Owing to the labors of the missionaries, however, there has been a marked improvement of late in the condition of these women. Miss Russell, who was born in India and is the daughter of a British officer, is a lady of most charming personality and an excellent speaker. Mrs. L. H. Moore, Mrs. Coit and Mrs. W. H. MOTORS AND MOTORING: A Page Full of Interest to the Owner or Prospective Owner of an Automobile.

Care of Cars

Few people realize that barring unavoidable accident the life of a car depends largely on the care and skill of the driver. In fact it may be said that eighty per cent. of the life of an automobile is used up by the driver himself. If the car is built by a reputable firm—and there are practically no fly-by-night makers in the industry—and is properly inspected, there is not the slightest reason why the car should wear out for a considerable number of years.

In the early years of the development of the automobile there were such constant changes and improvements from year to year that there was a wide difference between the up-to-date model and car that was two or even one year old. But the changes and improvements of today are to a large extent minor ones. It would be difficult to add more power to most of the modern engines or more grace to the bodies, so that a "this year's model" does not mean so much as it did five or ten years ago.

Yet the average driver takes but little care of his car. Watch him as he starts the motor and lets it run long enough to get in-to gear, drops in the clutch and is off. Usually he drops in the clutch with a bang and the car leaps half way across the street with a bang. If he had handled the clutch as he should and started slowly, he would add many thousand miles to the life of his car.

A car is a delicately adjusted piece of machinery and not merely the product of a group of blacksmiths and rough carpenters.

When the clutch is let in carelessly the universal joints take up some of the strain, but most of it is transmitted direct to the pinion gears and the faster gear in the differential. The fact that cars stand up under constant ill-use and constant wear and tear over a number of years speaks volumes for the car and the care with which every part is built.

Hints For The Tourist

Every motorist at this time of year is compelled to drive over roads on which it is very difficult to secure traction and one who must take all roads, as in cross-country touring, will benefit by these suggestions. Getting a car or out of difficult places, through while quite simple, should be thoroughly understood if one does not want to come to grief. The average car when in good condition has sufficient power to pull itself out of almost any predicament if the power is properly applied.

If bad roads are encountered, and it appears that chains will be necessary, it is far better to put them on before the mud is actually reached. However, they can be applied, even when the tires are deep in the mud, by spreading one of the hooks from a set of cross-links of the chain so that it can be placed around a spoke, and attaching the ends of the chain to this hook. The wheel can then be slowly reversed by applying the power of the motor, and this application of power will pull the chain around to the rear when the ends can be hooked together. If mud hooks or some of the anti-skids in separate units are carried in the tool-box, they can be ap-

plied to the top of the wheel when the lowest part is moved.

It is also possible to use the tire chains as mud hooks by wrapping them around the tires and rims and fastening the ends to a spoke. Be sure to fasten the chains securely, for if they come loose they are liable to catch in the grease cups or other projections around the brake drum and cause considerable damage.

Chains can be placed on the wheels without a jack by stretching them on the road in the rear of the car so that they will be in line with the wheels. Move the car back several feet, so that the ends of the chains will be brought to convenient position for hooking them together.

Well Inflated Tires Live Long

The only way to make tires last as long as they should is to treat them properly, and the only way to treat them properly is to give them a plentiful diet of straight, unadulterated air.

If this diet is varied, and allowed to weaken and become diluted, the tire suffers from under nourishment, just as a child wastes away when its food is insufficient.

If tires are kept up to the proper pressure, they will last a long time and give a great deal of service.

Radiator Repair

To make a good emergency repair of a honeycomb radiator, use a small belt, longer than the depth of the radiator and fine enough to go through the hole in the honeycomb. On each end of this bolt a steel washer is placed with

a rubber inside. Tighten the nut on this bolt and rubber washers are drawn tight enough to stop the leak. This repair cannot be made on a tubular radiator.

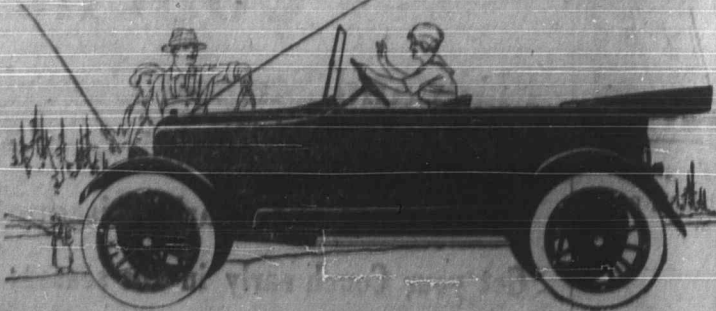

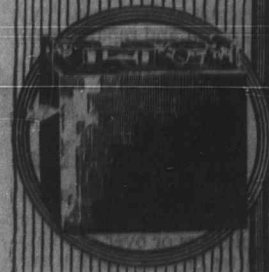

Grow The Small Fruits At Home

In the process of getting the most out of the backyard garden, many amateur gardeners have over-looked the cultivation of small fruits.

Fresh fruit on the table has almost become a luxury. The high prices which these fruits are commanding, and their growing scarcity on the market, are due largely to lack of help and the enhanced cost of picking and transportation.

The growing of raspberries, currants and gooseberries is very simple, and their value both for use as fresh fruit and for baking and preserving purposes, should make their cultivation much more extensive. There are no fruits that respond more quickly to good treatment, but they will also stand a considerable amount of neglect. Large fruit and productive bushes, however, can only be expected when they are given proper attention.
