## COUNCIL MEETING

Regular Monthly Session on Wed-nesday Evening.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Council on Wednesday evening Mayor Chambers and all the board were present except Councillor Reid. Town Manager presented reports regarding the different branches of town government.

In the department of streets the expenditures during October amounted to \$312.43 with a pay-roll of \$233.10. The total amount expended on streets for the year has been \$369.908, and Mr. Stairs predicts that the estimates will probably be exceeded by about \$200. During the past month the work done included the application of tarvia to the permanent streets, the culvert at the bridge, hauling gravel, cleaning streets and ditches and small repairs. For water the expenditures have amounted to \$81.58 during the month, bringing the total outlay up to \$760.13 for the year. The pay-roll for the month amounted to \$33.45, and the work done included repairs to hydrants, cleaning out service pipes, renewing old service and the finishing of the work on Prospect street.

The sewers cost the town during the month \$53.61 with a total for the year.

Mr. Stairs reported that in order to improve the western outlet it was proposed by the Committee to construct a reservoir to provide for overflow during high tides and freshets. The expense of the police department was \$51.15, a total for the year of \$89.30. This, of course, does not include the salary of the policeman. The pay-roll for the month included \$18 for special police at hallowe en.

ABOUT BOOKS By the Acadian Bookman.

The poems in "White Winds of Dawn', by Frances Beatrice Taylor (Toronto: McClelland and Stewart, \$1.75) are chiefly on religious themes, especially on the birth of Jesus and on death. There is a decided note of mysticism in this religious verse, and yet deep insight, the meaning of Christianity as a way of life for this world. The author, though she does not always achieve verbal music in rhythm and in rhyme (the imperfect rhyme "house"—"bough" occurs four times in the slight volume), has considerable felicity in imagery, particularly in imagery of color, and in symbolic suggestion. The poems on the birth of Jesus make the volume a suitable Christmas gift.

### CANADA'S FUTURE

CANADA'S FUTURE

(From the Boston Post.)
Our restrictive immigration was are giving to Canada an opportunity that our northern neighbor has quickly grasped and is profiting thereby. Statistics just furnished by the Canadian Pacific Railway show that immigration into Canada during the first six months of the current year has increased by more than 40 per cent. Dominion authorities rejoice over these figures, as they have every reason so to do, because they may be accepted as an indication that "the first swell of a rising tide has set in towards the shores of the Dominion that bids fair to continue to an ever-increasing extent".

There is planty of room up there for these newcomers, who numbered 77,125 for these first six months as against 52,592 in a similar period of the previous year. They include nationals from about every country, even Russia sending over about 1500. The English government is not alone encouraging its people to emigrate, but is co-operating with the Canadian government in furnishing them with farms.

What Canada needs more than anything else is an increase of manpower. The cultivation of its fertile fields and the uncovering of its hidden wealth has been handicapped and blocked by the lack of hands to 16 the work. Canada can take care of millions of newcomers, provided they are willing and able to work. There are tremendous possibilities up there, that only await exploitation and maturity to give to the world and populous as any that are now in existence.



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
