## MISCELLANEOUS.

CONDITION OF THE JEWS IN THE EAST. —The war which is perhaps, at this mo-ment, thinning the ranks of Mussulmans and Russians, acts most remarkably on the Jews of Turkey and Russia. While the Rabbi of Constantinople has ordered prayers to be offered up in every synagogue throughout the Turkish dominion, beseeching for the success of the Otto-man arms; while Jewish legions and Jewish money are lavished with a free hand to aid the Sultan, the Jews in Russia are called on by ukase to supply men and find money to aid the Czar in his struggle. It is with them not a matter of choice; they have to kiss the rod that chastises them. More than one million em. More than one million Jews are subjects Hof the Czar, and have to submit to his will. The Rev. S. M. Isaacs informs us that letters have been received stating that a ukase has been issued by the Czar, prohibiting his Jewish subjects from sending any money for the relief of the poor in Palestine. This cruel edict will operate with terrible effect on the indigent Jews of Jerusalem, who have at all times received large con-tributions from Russia and Poland. The Rev. Mr. Isiacs remarks what a good thing it is for the Jews in the East that the Czar connot steel the hearts of the humane in the West.

A STARTLING PROPHECY.--The following rémarkable passage was written twenty years ago by the Duke of Ragusa, a Marshal of France, who died not long ago at Venice. It appears in his Memoirs, published before the commencement of the Turko-Russian difficulties:

"If an Anglo-French fleet passes the Dardanelles and arrives at Constantinople; if, at the same time, 50,000 men of the Alliance take up their position at Adrianople, the Russian squadron will retreat to Sebastopol, and will not again venture forth; if the Czar passes the Danube, and sends his army to the Balkans, he has to fight at once with the Balkans, he has to fight at once with the Turkish, French, and English forces; and by supposing the non-neutrality of the Court of Vienna, he is exposed to all the dangers of an Austrian army coming upon him from Transylvania."
