Imperial Parliament.

"A member of Parliament" writes thus to the New York Herald:—The members' lobby was in a high state of excitement on the 8th inst., everybody wondering as to the result of the military mutiny against the Government.

Whispers were circulated by the White House that the Emperor's royal commission to enquire into the whole state of the army were pressed to the flip in Flon, during the winter, is said to be fitted up better than ever.

It seemed inconceivable that they would take this extreme course, and the threat of resignation is now made so frequently and on such slight provocation that it may soon lead to some effect.

The military will not act wily in pressing its followers too hard. It feels confident and takes a high handed course on all occasions; but such a policy cannot be pursued through all vicissitudes of the season without grave danger.
