Jeremiah Curtin.

In the death of Jeremiah Curtin, at Bristol, Vermont, some days ago at the age of 66, there was closed a most industrious, useful and brilliant career...

One of his last productions, his translation of Stenhiwicz's "On the Field of Glory," which bears on its title page the date of the present year, was dedicated to Sir Thomas G. Shange...

The Little Joys of Life.

A nation without reverence has begun to die; its festal crowd, though it may still grin. A nation whose youth are without enthusiasm has no future beyond the piling up of dollars.

One can easily understand why, among Catholics, there is not so much hero-worship as there ought to be. It is because our greatest heroes are not even mentioned in current literature, and because they are not well represented in our young people.

If the saints whose heroism appeals most to the young could be brought nearer to the natural young person, they would soon be as friends, daily companions—heroes, not distant beings whose halo guarded them from contact. One need only know St. Francis of Assisi to be very fond of him. He had a sense of humor, too, but an acute sense of levity. And yet the only readable life of this hero and friend has been written by a Protestant.

Our young people need only know the saint—not out of Alban Butler's sketches, but illumined with reality—to be filled with an enthusiasm which Carlyle would have them waste on the wrong kind of heroes. One of the most interesting pictures of a priest in American literature—of which late abounds in pictures of good priests—is that of Pere M'obaux, in Miss Woolson's novel "Anne."

It is recalled that "Quo Vadis" draws most of its local color from Rome, and that it was while in the Eternal City that Curtin and Stenhiwicz formed that remarkable literary and personal friendship which brought them much of fame and something of fortune.

Curtin had decided to visit Rome in connection with a strange literary quest. When he was a student in Harvard College, his first idea was to learn the Aryan languages—all the languages that are spoken now or were spoken at any time by the Aryan stock from the Bay of Bengal to the Bay of Massachusetts.

"A great friend of mine," he explained at the time, "Professor John Fiske, and myself talked these things over. At that time in our student plans we divided the work between us. He was to be the great man on mythology. I got at the mythologies and he went to history."

In his quest Mr. Curtin became an expert. The Gaelic languages were to him the most interesting of all those spoken by white men for reasons of the very striking peculiarities that he found in them, and which became the more striking the more he studied them. He was accustomed to keep up his practice of the Gaelic by reading the New Testament in the Irish language. Then he was forced into the study of the Slav languages; but all the time he was engaged at these he studied Gaelic.

Items of Interest.

In a letter to the London "Catholic Times" Rev. George Tyrrell, formerly of the Society of Jesus, characterizes as "a gross slander" the statement made by the Roman correspondent of that journal that Rev. Tyrrell had "communicated with Rome on the subject of dogmatic teaching."

According to press cablegrams from Rome, it is reported "on good Vatican authority" that the Pope, in order to satisfy many requests for the appointment of foreign Cardinals, will hold another consistory in June, when he will appoint several non-Italian Cardinals, including, perhaps, an Englishman and an American.

Another press cablegram says an envoy from the Emperor of China is shortly expected at the Vatican to request the Pope to establish direct diplomatic relations with China and place Catholic missionaries under the protection of their respective nationalities.

Very Rev. Father Campbell, S. J., of Glasgow, is shortly leaving Scotland and on a Gaelic mission to the Catholic Gaelic-speaking Gaels of Canada, of whom it is estimated there are above 200,000 in this country.

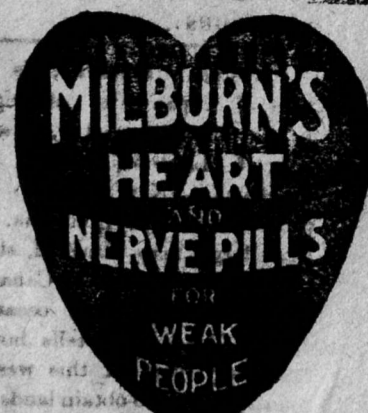

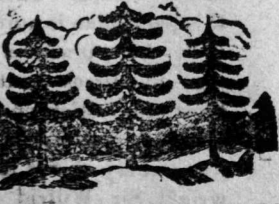

He closed his speech with a motion expressing regret that the Government had sanctioned and condoned the violation of the resolution by officials "who notwithstanding such deliberate violation have been continued in positions of public trust and responsibility and in the enjoyment of salary paid from the public exchequer."

A PROMISE FROM THE THRONE

Among the measures promised in the speech from the Throne was a bill to amend the election act for the purpose of preventing frauds and corruption at the polls.

Ottawa Weekly Letter.

OFFICIALS IN POLITICS

Pledges Broken and Resolutions Disobeyed—Mr. Fielding Profits by the Violation—And then goes to Parliament With a New Interpretation.

ELECTION FRAUDS WILL GO ON.

No Legislation Against Ballot Switching—Though Promised in the Speech From the Throne—Ghastly List of Election Crimes—But Majority Votes That It Is All Right.

JUG HANDLED RELATIONS WITH GERMANY.

Dredging and a Ballot Story Disappearing Ministers—Ayleworth's Astounding Blunder—A Foul Plot Against Mr. Oliver.

MADE TO BE BROKEN

This motion was moved by Mr. Lake of Qu' Appelle, a conservative, and was supported by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and carried without a dissenting vote. Sir Wilfrid's speech was a distinct pledge that the Government would not let its officers to engage in partisan work.

THE GOVERNMENT OPPOSES

Mr. Fielding, who on the Government side is now leading the Government gave no excuse for the failure to introduce the promised measure. Mainly his speech was a statement that corruption in elections was an old offense, that the Tories had not been free from it.

OTHER OFFICIAL OFFENDERS.

Mr. Luke supporting the motion gave a long list of instances in the West where officials took part in campaigns. Mr. Boyce of Algoma furnished several examples, including that of the postmaster of Thessalon, a vigorous politician who became a defaulter to the Department, was discharged and reappointed and still holds the office, receiving a salary of over \$1,000 and giving much of his time to private business contrary to the declared rule of the Department.

PETTY OFFICERS DO NOT COUNT.

To these and other instances, some of which Mr. Foster produced, Mr. Fielding had only one reply. He pleaded that many of these officers and especially those who interfered in his own election, were not drawing from the Government sufficient salary to maintain them, but were only partly dependant on their office for a living though as a matter of fact some of them received as much as \$700. Thus Mr. Fielding declares that the resolution of 1905 applies to only about one twentieth of public officials.

A NEW RULE

Nothing was said about salary limit when the House declared that no officer should be allowed to take part in campaigns. Sir Wilfrid made his pledges respecting all office holders. There was no such exemption in the mind of the Government after 1896 when they dismissed rural postmasters and petty officials, earning \$25. \$50. a year. Scores of such public officers were turned out for simply expressing an opinion about politics or for cheering at a public meeting. But Mr. Fielding now authorizes all officers who do not live entirely on their public position to throw themselves into an election campaign with all possible vigour.
