BROKEN PROMISES.

Written by Hamilton Freeman for Queen Victoria.

OTTAWA, May 30.—A Winnipeg special today says:—A statement of the claims of the Province of Manitoba, compiled by the Farmers' Union, has been forwarded to the Governor General.

The petition is an exhaustive document, comprising nearly 100 pages, and is signed by Dr. Fleming, H. G. Clarke and George Farver, on behalf of the union. On the question of settling the land claims, it says:

"The pretended reason given was the amount of business and the difficulties of settlement. The real reason was that a ring was formed among the officials in the Department of the Interior of Ottawa, and under manipulations of that ring two kinds of people only could get patents for the land whether their claims were good or not.

First, those who were in power themselves or who could command powerful influence on the Senators or members of the Commons or of the Government; second, those who were ready and willing to pay such a sum for their patents, whether their claims were good or bad, as might be demanded by the agents of the ring in the Department of the Interior.

Other persons who tried to get their claims settled on their patents issued were treated with silent contempt, so that they were compelled, after years of waiting, to dispose of their claims to land sharks or ring agents for an price they chose to offer.

"These are the simple and dispassionate facts; let the Government deny them if they can in the teeth of the private investigation now going on at Ottawa. Our weakness, which with a generous Government ought to secure for us consideration and fairly, is taken advantage of, and we have no other recourse left than agitation to make our grievances known to the Empire and thus secure a hearing. We are accused of being disloyal. We indignantly deny this imputation, and point with sorrowful pride to the fact that while we are trying to secure consideration and justice, our sons and brothers have left their farms to grow to weeds while they are away in the Northwest Territory risking and laying down their lives, like loyal sons of Canada, to defend the supremacy of the flag of our forefathers from the touch of half breeds and savages, driven to despair by misgovernment and by the acts of incompetent and dishonest Government officials."

The lengthy document concludes as follows:—"We feel that instead of any longer agitating the question of Manitoba's right here, only to find ourselves again put off by the shuffling tricks of party politicians or by a betrayal by party tools who do not hesitate to sacrifice the country to their personal profit or advantage, the proper course is to ask Her Majesty to intervene. We will not be deterred from that course by any cry of disloyalty that may be howled at us by any political party or by a slavish and mercenary party press. As British subjects, we take the constitutional means, which is hallowed by time and custom in the British nation.

Colborne. Petition of Jacob Flick and 30 others, requesting the council to make no change in the boundary of S. S. No. 4, as the section was small enough in area at present. As no change could be made before next year, the matter was laid over for the present.

Colborne. Petition of Richard Rowden and 11 others, praying the council to have a wire fence erected on the east side of lot No 10, 3rd con., E. D.

Colborne. The clerk was instructed to notify Wm. Good, sen., and Emanuel Mitchell, to comply with the wire fence by-law.

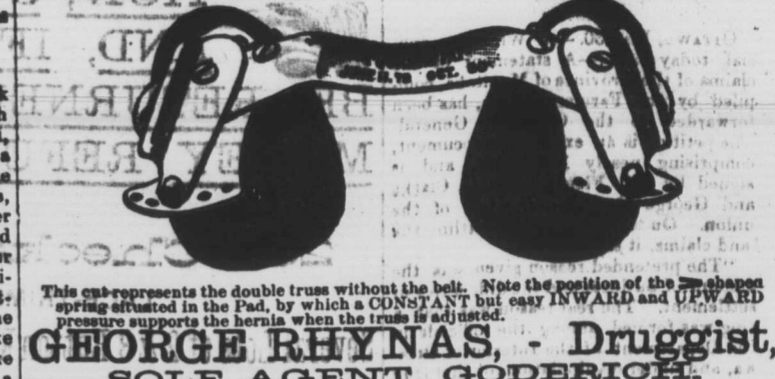

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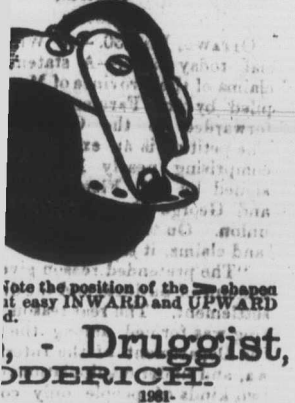

THE BUFFALO.

No More Herds of Bison on the Plains.

His Hunters and Sportsmen Have Wiped them out at Last.

MILES CITY, Mon., April 24.—Less than nine years ago this spot was covered with the tepees and lodges of Sitting Bull's warriors, then at war with the United States.

When we had passed through this herd at the close of the third day about 3 o'clock in the afternoon, the scouts reported another tremendous herd in the distance, coming directly towards us at full speed.

The herd which we travelled through for three days was not in motion, but was encamped in small scattered bands, and lined every foot of the road we travelled.

In 1877 the plains and prairie of Montana were the home of the bison. As long as the Indians remained hostile and at war with the whites, just so long was the salvation of the buffalo assured.

In 1815 the buffalo ranges extended as far east as Illinois, Minnesota, and Iowa; and when the Mississippi River marked the eastern boundary of the grazing grounds.

The flesh was their staple food, and the sinews became arrow coats. The Indians used the horns for many necessities of life.

The buffaloes were all right until about seven years ago, when the Indians were conquered, which opened up the country and let the hide hunter in.

In these days his hide hunters began to pay attention to other brutes besides bison. In 1880 the number of buffalo bagged on the Yellowstone aggregated about

100,000. On the Missouri River and its tributaries the same number were secured, making about 200,000 in all.

In 1883 there was marked falling off in the supply of robes and skins. Nevertheless, 100,000 buffalo robes were shipped from Gladstone alone, and as many more from other points on the railroad.

To sum the matter up, these courses of the hides and robes exported from this section represent about two-thirds of the actual number of animals killed.

There may be a few herds north of the International boundary line in the Indian northwest, but either Riel's sharpshooters or Middleton's militia, or both together, will make short work of them.
