

### Victim of Disaster Dies at th Hospital.

There passed away at the General Hospital on Saturday last, John Keels, of Bonavista, who was rescued from the s.s. Newfoundland in an ex-remely weak condition. The deceased was but on the threshold of manhood, being only twenty-two years of age, and is survived by a roung wife, who was almost constanty by his bedside during the last week of his illness. Capt. Wes. Kean visited him several times, while Rev. Brinton was in daily attendance, ministering to his spiritual wants, and was at his bedside a short time pefore the summons came.
