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## Fiume Blockaded.

No Foodstuffs Allowed to Reach the City--Railway Strike Leaders Arrested -- Crowds Greeted Asquith in London--Senate Likely to Give Peace Treaty Poor Reception -- Rioting Follows Strike in Milan.

### FIUME UNDER BLOCKADE.

FIUME, March 1. A siege of Fiume has begun with stringent blockade against commodities, including foodstuffs. "Perhaps we may appear to be lenient toward those occupying Fiume," said General Cavida, of the Government forces of Danuzio. "I am not offering them the slightest atom, but children must be cared for. That is why I allowed two hundred children to come out of Fiume and proceed to Milan." The citizens with whom he has talked seemed unanimous that the situation was critical, and that the city now is in the deepest of despair financially and commercially.

### NEUTRALS WILL PRESENT PROGRAMME.

THE HAGUE, March 1. As a result of conferences held at the Hague Peace Palace by representatives of Holland, Switzerland and Scandinavian countries, the Dutch Government is requested to present to the Secretary of the League of Nations a plan for a high court of nations agreed upon after long study by these neutrals.

### STRIKE LEADERS ARRESTED.

PARIS, March 1. Three active leaders in the Paris railroad unions were arrested this morning; they were M. Scollie, M. Lesque and M. Sigrand. Great excitement among unionists ensued when the news of the arrests became current. Secretary General Chaverot, of the Paris, Lyons and Mediterranean unions, and union leader Hourdetaux were arrested later. All those under detention are charged with "interference with liberty to work and provocation of disobedience." Five thousand persons have volunteered for service on the railroads during the strike, and two hundred chauffeurs have placed themselves at the disposal of the Ministry of Public Works in carrying out the Matin. Hundreds of students from the revictualing system, according to the Central High School have been placed at posts on the different railways, where they are being given practical instruction. Independent socialists in Alsace Lorraine have appealed to the railroad men to remain at work. Premier Millerand made a brief but optimistic statement on the strike conditions early this afternoon. He said to the newspapers: "The situation is satisfactory. Reports from companies and prefects bring confirmation of the amelioration of the conditions on all the systems."

### ASQUITH GIVEN OVATION.

LONDON, March 1. Former Premier Asquith, who was recently returned to Parliament by

the Paisley constituency, took his seat in the House of Commons to-day, after a trip through cheering crowds about his house in Cavendish Square and in front of Westminster station. Mr. Asquith has generally avoided the limelight during his career, but he consented to be the leading figure in a great demonstration by London Liberals to-day. Mr. Asquith's appearance in the House was greeted with cheers from Independent Liberals, Nationalists and a few favorites and Coalitionists. After he was seated, Premier Lloyd George arose and was frantically cheered by the Coalitionists. The Premier hurried across the Chamber and shook hands with Mr. Asquith.

### ASQUITH'S RETURN POPULAR.

LONDON, March 1. The return of former Premier Asquith to active service in Parliament to-day attracted considerable attention in advance from both press and public.

### TREATIES TABLED.

OTTAWA, March 1. In the House of Commons this afternoon, Hon. Mr. Rowell tabled the peace treaty with Bulgaria and the treaties between the Allies and Czecho-Slovakia and Serbs, Croats and Slovans.

### ADMIRAL ELECTED REGENT.

BUCHAREST, March 1. Admiral Nicholas Horthy, Commander in Chief of the Hungarian Army and former head of the Austro-Hungarian navy, was to-day elected Regent by the National Assembly.

### CANADA'S GOVERNOR-GENERAL INDISPOSED.

OTTAWA, March 1. His Excellency the Governor General is indisposed with a slight cold. It is stated at Government House that it is not flu, but for precautionary purposes he is remaining indoors.

### HAIG RELINQUISHES POST.

LONDON, March 1. Earl of Bessersyde, Field Marshal Haig, was received by King George at Buckingham Palace to-day on relinquishing his post as Commander in Chief.

### CANADA AS SHIPBUILDER.

OTTAWA, March 1. Hon. Mr. Ballantyne, Minister of Naval Service, tabled in the House to-day the report of the Department of Naval Service and Fisheries Branch, and the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the fiscal year. The Minister's preamble to his report pointed out with satisfaction that in 1918 Canada stood third in the number of ships built. Canada turned out one hundred and forty-eight ships to Japan's hundred and sixteen, and stood fourth in tonnage, with a quarter of a million tons. This he considered a notable showing.

### POOR OUTLOOK FOR TREATY.

WASHINGTON, March 1. An early and unfavorable vote on the ratification of the peace treaty was forecasted in the Senate to-day when Republican leaders replying to the demands of the Treaty's irreconcilable Republican opponents, reaffirmed their decision not to accept any change in substances to the language in the Republican reservation to Article X.

### BOLSHEVISTS OCCUPY STAVROPOL.

LONDON, March 1. After stubborn fighting, the Bolsheviks on Sunday occupied the town of Stavropol, capital of the Government of Stavropol, in northern Caucasus, according to a Bolshevik communication received here to-night.

### JAP PRINCE FOR FRENCH MILITARY ACADEMY.

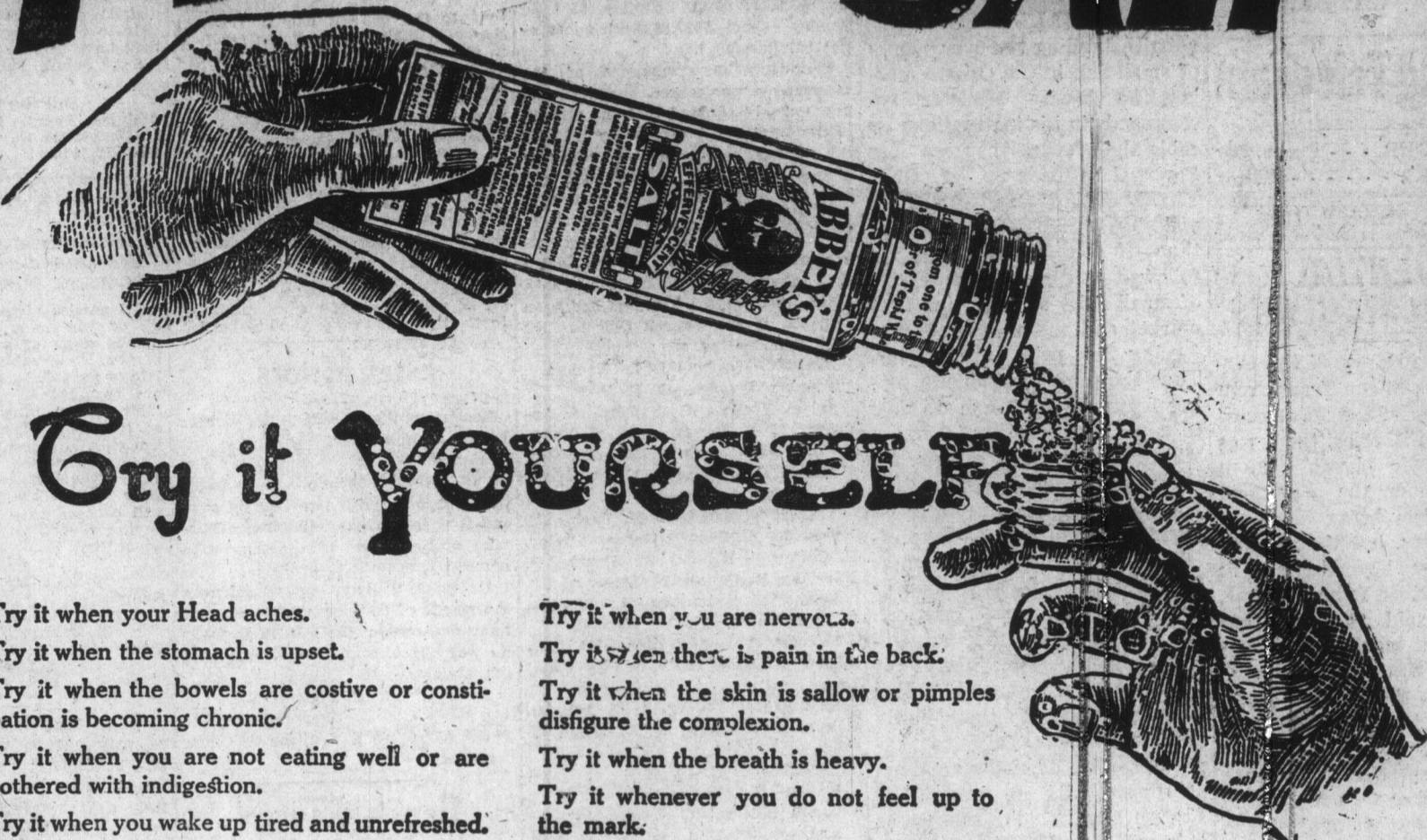
TOKIO, March 1. The Imperial Prince is to take a two year course of study at the French military school at St. Cyr. He will leave for France in April.

### YUDENITCH GIVEN FREEDOM.

COPENHAGEN, March 1. It is officially announced that the Lithuanian Government has permitted General Yudenitch, former commander of the Russian North West Army, and some of his staff officers to proceed to Paris, by way of Liban. The correspondent says that General Yudenitch and his Generals left Esthonia in an automobile, carrying a British flag. The correspondent states that Yudenitch is taking his private fortune, estimated at a hundred million Esthonian marks. O. Yudenitch's

### UNCONFIRMED REPORT.

LONDON, March 1. It is authoritatively learned that an unsuccessful attempt has been made to assassinate Lord Acton, British Minister to Finland, at Holsingfors.

### TEST BALLOONS SAFE.

NEW YORK, March 1. The three naval balloons which left Rockaway naval air station Saturday afternoon in an endurance flight, have

been accounted for, according to information received here. One of the balloons landed near Quebec at three o'clock yesterday morning, the second came down safely at Canton, New York, five hours later, and the third in Vermont yesterday afternoon.

### SOCIALISTS OBJECT TO PAYING WILLIAM.

BERLIN, March 1. Berlin Socialists have passed a resolution of protest against proposal of the Prussian Diet to compensate former Emperor William for loss of his throne. Warning was given that if the proposal is accepted, the socialists

will withdraw from the German Government.

### MALE WORKERS NOT INCLUDED.

TORONTO, March 1. Male workers are not to be covered by the minimum wage legislation at the coming session, according to Hon. Walter Rollo, Minister of Labor and Health. The measure is designed primarily for that protection of females, though probably will be made wide enough to cover boys under age.

### HAD VALUABLE CARGO.

BOSTON, March 1. The steamship Bohemian, which was reported disabled to-day on Sambro Ledges, left here last Saturday with sixty-four cabin passengers and a crew of about two hundred men and a valuable cargo. She had been expected to dock at Halifax for a few hours to-day to take on more cargo and coal.

### BORDER SMUGGLER KILLED.

EL PASO, Texas, March 1. An unidentified Mexican smuggler is dead and a northern Mexican is in a critical condition as a result of a battle yesterday between United States military border guards and Mexicans said to have been attempting to bring a quantity of whiskey into the United States. Ninety bottles of whiskey were seized by the soldiers.

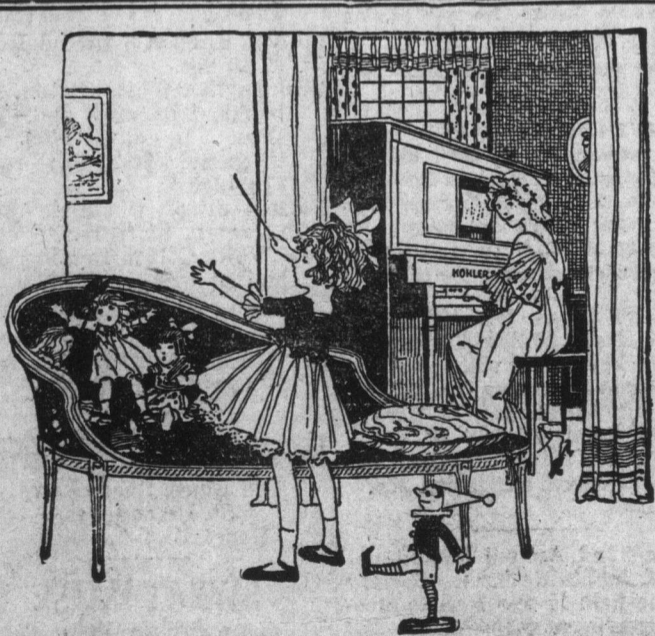
### RIOT AND STRIKE IN MILAN.

MILAN, March 1. As a result of a collision between a crowd and the police here yesterday, in which officers attacked the mob, two civilians were mortally wounded. A general strike was declared at midnight. Work was suspended throughout the city to-day. The clash occurred in connection with a meeting of demobilized troops. The police fired when stones were thrown from the crowd. The two wounded men died during the night.

#### CONFIDENTIAL CIRCULARS.

In the early days of the Circular Letters to the Trade from the facile pen of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, there was a great parade of publicity, in order to show the men just what was being done in their interests, but that publicity did not get beyond the third Circular of the famous issue. To-day, the said Circulars are being issued, marked Confidential. Why the sudden change of front? Is the Wordy President afraid that the fishermen of the North do not appreciate his European efforts, or that they have come to a realization that his campaign against the Portuguese and Spaniards and Italians, assisted by Hawes & Co., has failed ignobly, and that his attempt to browbeat the fish buyers in these markets has ended in a climb down and ignominious surrender? Fish is being sold abroad to-day at the prices set upon it by the purchasers themselves, and Mr. Coaker has been one of the first exporters to accept the inevitable and get in out of the wet. Many of the unfavorable conditions abroad have been brought about by his amateurish tinkering with foreign markets and his determination to impose his own will upon both exporters and consignees, because of the ministerial position held by him, and because of his powers as the dictator to the backbone or stamina to recall him ere he does incalculable mischief.

The very last Confidential Circular is a gem of its kind. "After a personal examination of the markets and consultation with Mr. Hawes and the buyers," Mr. Coaker advises "that it has been decided to fix prices in Portugal at 81 shillings per quintal, nett." Eighty-five shillings was the minimum price in the famous regulation, and no shipper could get a license to export, unless he guaranteed that sale would not be made under that figure. Mr. Coaker has been made to take "back water," since his trip across. A considerable lot of fish has also been sold in Oporto at seventy shillings and under, the cause for this considerable decline being, according to the Circular, under review, due to the poor quality of the fish shipped and AN OVER SUPPLY OF SMALL FISH. Yet notwithstanding the over supply of small fish in the Oporto market, the all-wise Minister recommends in his instructions by cable that future cargoes for Portugal be made up of ONE THIRD LARGE and MEDIUM and TWO THIRDS SMALL, thus—if his instructions are followed—increasing the stocks of small fish already in that market and as a consequence forcing the price still lower. Thus the prospects for an opening figure on 1920 fish dwindle to a point where the fishermen will not get a fair return for their catch, and competition from other fish producing countries will have a disastrous effect on Newfoundland trade. To conceal this fact from our own fishermen were criminal. As the producers they are entitled to be made cognizant of conditions, and secret circulars—an invention of the Wordy President—addressed to exporters only, do not give them an opportunity to study the foreign situation in the same measure as other secret circulars addressed to Local F.P.U. Councils, help them to a knowledge of local affairs. Why this difference now? The Confidential Circular, from a perusal of which the Portuguese market conditions have been ascertained, according to the Advisory Board, through Mr. Coaker, concludes:

"It is believed, (note that even Mr. Coaker is not sure himself) that in view of the readjustment of prices and conditions, there will be an improved demand at an early date, and, as a matter of fact, Oporto dealers have now agreed to make outright purchases at the regular prices." Whatever they may be. So ends fiasco No. 1.

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#### Annual Meeting St. Mary's Church.

The annual meeting of the congregation of the Parish of St. Mary the Virgin, was held in the Church Rooms last night, the Rector, Rev. A. B. S. Stirling, presiding. The attendance was large and the meeting itself one of the most enthusiastic ever held. The submitted Reports were very satisfactory, showing the financial status away in advance of previous years. The totals of the collections toward the various funds for 1919 follow: General Church, \$4,755.43; Tower, \$1,110.91; New Vestry, \$678.24; Choir Surplice, \$380.00; Sunday School, \$527.88, with substantial balances in hand.

Following the acceptance of the accounts, it was moved, seconded and unanimously adopted that the stipend of the Rector be increased by \$600 for the current year, and also that an honorarium of \$200 be awarded the reverend gentleman out of the 1919 collections. The organist, Mr. G. B. Lloyd, was voted an increase in salary in consideration of the extra time taken in training the choir. Wilson, Secretary of the C.H.E., yesterday, stated that Miss Mary E. O'Neill had won the senior Canada-Newfoundland music scholarship of \$300. As this scholarship is competed for by all Canada and this country, Miss O'Neill's success in being the winner can be gauged by everyone. A daughter of Mr. T. H. O'Neill, she was only 14 when she won the scholarship. Sister Josephine Walsh, of the Presentation Convent, Cathedral Square, was the young music student's teacher, and to her is due warm congratulations. Miss O'Neill undoubtedly possesses musical talent of no mean order and with still more study should in time take her place among the best musicians. Her marks were 91 out of 100.

#### Only Three Sealers Ready.

The Neptune, Thetis and Terra Nova are the only sealing steamers that are all ready for the forthcoming seal-hunt. The Diana and Viking are now on their way to Louisbourg for coal and oil, on the way up or down, ice is met with and delay results, their hopes of getting away to the icefields in time will be slim. The Seal, which left Louisbourg yesterday, has yet to go on dry dock and have two blades adjusted to her propellers. She will also have crew accommodation made.

CATTLE TRAIN COLLISION. UTICA, N.Y., Mar. 2. Scores of animals were killed and hundreds injured when a live stock express train of Swift & Co., with 45 cars loaded with cattle and hogs, was wrecked near here yesterday.

A HERM ENEMY. BELGRADE, Mar. 2. Typhus has again broken out in Serbia and is being spread with alarming rapidity by refugees fleeing from the Bolshevik on the south Russian front.

WORTHY OF EMULATION. BEIRNE, Mar. 2. Brewers, blacksmiths and profiteers are being placarded and marched in chains through the streets and market places of Bulgarian cities, according to advices received here. This is said to be producing good results.

BLAZE IN CHINATOWN. NEW YORK, Mar. 2. Chinatown lost its oriental placidity last night when flames swept an apartment house in which Tom Lee, late Mayor, had his headquarters, and threatened to raze the Joss House on Mott Street, in which thousands of Chinamen have bowed their heads in worship. Scores of Chinamen refused to leave their personal effects and had to be carried down extension ladders to safety.

A PATRIOTIC RESOLUTION. ST. JOHN, N.B., March 2. A resolution was adopted by the Great War Veterans' Association of the city, last night, asking members to refrain from purchasing Hearst publications, and petitioning the Government to forbid the sale of pulp or newspaper produced in Canada to these newspapers and magazines. Another resolution was adopted asking the Government to segregate returned soldiers mentally ill, as the result of their war experiences, from other patients in institutions. The Association was opposed to having soldier patients confined in general institutions for the insane. N. F. Mc-

### Side Talks by Ruth Cameron

#### PROVING ONE IS NOT WELL BRED

How can people feel that by fussing about what is brought them to eat, and by speaking rudely to those that serve them, they impress their superior quality on the spectators? It would not seem as if they could and yet every once in a while one meets someone who gives every evidence of having that idea.

A man who manages a large hotel told me that last year he had to tell four people that they could not be accommodated again, and of these, three were not wanted partly because they treated the servants in such a disagreeable way and found so much fault with the table. (It is a hotel famous for its excellent table.)

One of them delivered such a tirade about the fact that a waitress forgot to bring her one item on her order, that the waitress, who is a well-poised person and never known to do such a thing, broke down and wept.

Another found fault about everything that was done for her and constantly made disagreeable remarks about the waitresses with the deliberate intent of being overheard, as for instance: "Isn't it a scream the way those girls do their hair! The cheaper and more unbecoming a way is the better they like it. I suppose they can't help being stupid and ignorant; if they could, they wouldn't be doing menial work," et cetera.

The girls come to hate her so that there was finally a mutiny in the dining-room because no one was willing to wait on her.

She Threw the Ice Cream at the Waitress.

The third was indignant because she found a lump of ice in some ice cream and she actually threw the ice cream at the waitress in front of a crowded dining room. The mental process of a woman who would hold the waitress to blame for something which was presumably the cook's fault were about on a par with her manners.

Nothing is a surer sign of the fact that one is not a true gentleman or gentlewoman than to treat rudely those who serve one.

#### Of Course One Wants to be Well Served But—

People of true breeding like to be well served, of course, and quietly insist upon it. But they do not do it in a way which makes those who serve them uncomfortable and themselves conspicuous.

And when they do receive good service, they show themselves grateful for it, instead of accepting it with an assumption of indifference that is intended to show that they have always been used to the best—but only proves to those who know, how second-rate they really are.

#### A. F. L. is Getting Into Politics.

Washington.—The American Federation of Labor is getting into politics on a wholesale scale and will take an active part in the 1920 presidential and congressional election in the United States.

The first comprehensive political campaign undertaken by United States labor to control Congress and elect friendly national and state officials is now being prepared here. The fight will be independent of present political parties.

Details of the scheme have been worked out by a committee made up of the executive council of the A. F. of L. and department presidents of that organization in session in Washington for several days. Samuel Gompers, president of the federation, promises a statement to-morrow. The plan was actually originated at the general labor conference held here December 13.

Representatives in Congress who are believed to be unfriendly to organized labor will be vigorously opposed for re-election, and new candidates hostile to the interests of labor will also be opposed. The federation will call to its aid all crafts affiliated with the central body, and every congressional district will be canvassed. An army of organizers and workers will be placed in the field. The federation claims a membership of more than four million.

The campaign will embrace state as well as federal affairs. Efforts will be made in the various states to secure the election of governors, judges and legislatures friendly to organized labor.

#### NOT "THIRD PARTY."

According to labor leaders, who discussed the movement to-day, there is to be no effort to establish a "third party." There will be no attempt to

reach an agreement with national farm organizations. However, the federation hopes for the co-operation of friendly state and local farm bodies, especially in such states as North Dakota, where the Non-Partisan League is strong.

White heads of the Big Four railroad brotherhoods, now in Washington for wage conferences with the Director-General of Railroads, refused to say to-day whether they were aiding in the campaign, the newspaper Labor, official organ of the railway men, will publish an editorial to-morrow supporting the political move.

The editorial declares that there should be at least 200 workers and farmers in Congress, instead of the "lawyers, the bankers, the trust-borgs, and the mine operators," now holding seats.

"Labor and the farmer have the votes," the editorial says. "They only need to mobilize these votes for results. They should begin to organize now. It will be too late after the primaries close. And there never was greater reason for such a union and for such an action than now."

The editorial condemns the return of the railroads to private ownership, universal training, intervention in Mexico, anti-strike legislation and "a new alien and sedition law." Privilege, it says, wants "an attorney-general of its own choosing, so it can put men in jail for even discussing the right to strike."

"In a Republican district a man should be nominated who can be re-

lied upon to oppose these things," it continues. "In a Democratic district a Democrat should be nominated who will oppose these things."

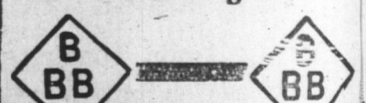

### Veterans Seek 10 p.c. Rebate.

One of these matters has been the seeking of a rebate of ten per cent. on all clothing necessaries which must be purchased by the men after discharge, and for which reasonable consideration is asked in 1920. It is hoped to make this new arrangement effective within a short time, and Col. ### Reid Fleet Notes.

All the fleet of the Reid-Newfoundland Co's steamers are expected to come here this week and renew old schedules, now that the cross country train service in the ancient colony has been restored, after one of the most severe winters in the history of that place. Loading steamers at Louisburg was a pretty expensive proposition for the Company, it being estimated that each cargo on the various steamers cost all the way from \$800 to \$1,000 more than if they were loaded at North Sydney.

After an exceptionally good run direct from St. John's, Nfld., the steamer Kyle arrived in port last Wednesday with fifty passengers as well as a large quantity of mail matter. The passengers speak in glowing terms of the skilful manner in which Captain Stevenson handled his ship when he encountered heavy ice on the Newfoundland coast. Mr. Colin Taver- nor, the popular wireless operator on the Glenoe, is relieving on the Kyle for a few trips as well as Mr. John Mulroney, chief steward on the Glenoe, who is filling Mr. Pike's place on the Kyle during a month's rest of the latter. Owing to the heavy ice barrier that shuts out Sydney from the outside world by water, the Kyle was obliged to take her bunker supplies from the Scotia pier, when she sailed direct for St. John's—North Sydney Herald, Feb. 25.

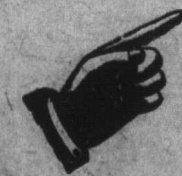

## Some Traditions of Newfoundland.

Handed Down From the Garnered Stories of the Forefathers of the Race. Tales of Daring and Prowess on Land and Sea. Some glimpses of the Fishery as Carried on Two Hundred Years Ago in St. John's, Trinity, Tilton Harbor and Fogo. A Just Tribute to His Grace the Late Archbishop Howley and Rev. Canon Smith Who Accomplished so Much in Gathering up the Traditions of Their Native Land.

The following is a copy of the document referred to in closing memorandum of agreement made in the month of January, 1824, between George Garland & Sons, merchants, on the one part, and the masters and crews of the after-mentioned schooners on sailing voyage, on the other part, in which the said George Garland & Sons are to provide craft with every requisite equipment for such undertaking, and with sufficient customary allowances of diet for the crews, at their expense. And such risk the said George Garland & Sons are to have one-half of the seals and profits of such voyage, and the remainder to be divided shares to each man. And it is further agreed on the part of the masters and crew of each schooner as follows, viz.: To the master the sum of five guineas will be given as a reward for such service. To such crew as were never at the ice, a compensation for their berths all pay twenty-five shillings per month. Old hands twenty shillings per month. After gunners, ten shillings per month, and such as go to take charge of punts their berths free. In consideration of each man's being properly performed to the satisfaction of the master in whose charge the schooner is placed, we, the crew of the said schooners, have subscribed our names, and about which fulfillment it fully fulfies the said George Garland & Sons in stopping our shares for the rest of such remaining crew."

#### CORROBORATIVE PROOF.

In bringing this matter under the notice of my esteemed friend Rev. Canon Smith, about six years ago, he wrote in reply: "You are quite right as the statement you make as to the Dart, Active and other craft having sailed for the sealfishery in 1824 from Trinity, and not from Greenspond. You are also right as to the firm that owned these craft being that of George Garland & Sons. It is quite true that in 1824 the Garlands had business premises at Greenspond, but they were small, and of little account in comparison with their premises at Trinity and New Harbor. Trinity was the firm's headquarters. Drawbridge was the firm's winter agent at Trinity for many years. Although he had left Trinity years before my time, nevertheless in my day Drawbridge's name as being Garland's agent was a household word there. The Garlands frequently resided at Trinity, but, as far as I could learn, they never resided a winter there before 1830, when John Bigley Garland, first Speaker of our House of Assembly, lived in Trinity. Before that date they generally managed their business by a winter agent in the winter season. You need not be at all surprised at people who are not at all familiar with Trinity history mixing up Trinity affairs with those of Greenspond, when you read the following statement which appeared in a local paper, and sent to Trinity of all other places. The correspondent said: 'In 1857 Capt. Henry Andrews sailed to the sealfishery from Greenspond in a schooner called the 'Ann,' and brought her from the ice loaded with 9,500 seals.' Now, as a boy of

twelve years old, I was living in Trinity in 1857, and I have a distant recollection of seeing Capt. Henry Andrews sail out of Trinity Harbor for the sealfishery early on the morning of March 10th, 1857. He sailed in his own brig Peerless. She was 145 tons register, and on the 28th March he was off Trinity Harbor, on his way to St. John's to land his seals there, with the Peerless loaded with 9,000 not 9,500 seals. He owned at that time two brigs, one the Peerless, the other the Blooming Lass. No schooner of those days could possibly carry 9,000, all in their prime—as Andrews' were—averaging as his did fifty pounds in weight—all young harps. It is somewhat singular that, in 1850, Captain Alex. Graham sailed to the ice from Trinity, in command of a vessel called the Active. Perhaps this Active may have been the same craft that sailed from Trinity in 1824. The Garlands of Trinity were relatives of those of Carbonear. The tradition is that some time about the middle of the seventeenth century, or between 1650 and 1670, two brothers named Garland lived at Poole, England. One came out to Carbonear and started business there; the other, a younger brother, at a later date, came out and started business at Trinity. It is certain that both the Carbonear and Trinity firms were in existence in 1794. The George Garland, who was head of the firm at Trinity, in 1824, was then probably about seventy years old, but, not much, if any, older than that—probably not so old. He was a direct descendant of the first Garland, who did business at Trinity—probably his grandson, or, more likely his great-grandson."

#### EULOGY OF CANON SMITH.

Like His Grace, the late Archbishop Howley, anything that comes from the pen of Rev. Canon Smith is of the greatest interest, and no person has greater experience amongst our people than has the venerable Canon, who takes such delight in relating the stories of the deeds of daring, pluck, endurance and adventure of our countrymen. The Canon, as with the Archbishop, is primarily a Newfoundland—first, last and all the time. Everything that emanates from his pen shows a thorough knowledge of our country and our people, which has been gleaned from the best possible of all sources—the people themselves—and the scenes and events, manners and customs of our people are written by the Canon in a philosophic and logical calm, which shows the master hand—far different from the rhapsody of most writers, who use up quite a quantity of ink and paper, but who are absolutely ignorant of the events which they endeavor to describe. I came across another old document some years ago, which I am sure will be of interest to the readers of the Telegram. It will give them an idea of the price of seals seventy-seven years ago, and the terms on which they were sold in those far off days: "Bought of Capt. A. Munden, the cargo of seals on board the brig Highlander, consisting of about six thousand seals, at twenty-one shillings per cwt., for young harp seals, and seventeen shillings per cwt. for old seals, payable one half cash on delivery, the other half next Fall. Tare 1½ lb. on young seals; tare on old seals as it may appear."

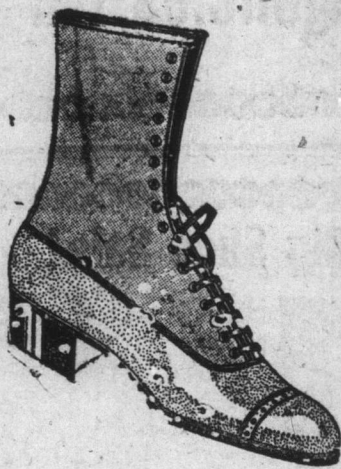

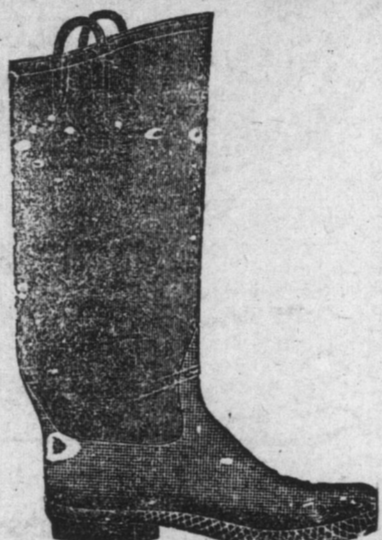

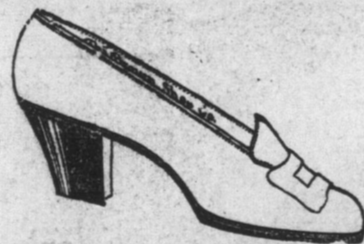
