





Upwards of eleven thousand people were carried as passengers from Newfoundland to North Sydney during the six months ending October Ing the six months ending October 31st by the steamers Kyle and Sable I., the former making tri-weekly trips from Port aux Basques, while the latter makes only one trip a week direct from St. John's. This exceeds the total number carried by both steamers during the whole of 1919, and judging from the heavy traffic every other day from the ancient colony the present season, when closed, will establish a record hitherto unequalled since the inauguration of the service nearly a quarter of a century ago .-- North Syd ney Herald.



On November 8, 1674, during the eign of Charles the Second, John Milton died at his residence in Bunhill Row, London, and his remains were buried in the Parish Church of St. Giles', Cripplegate, where there is a monument to his memory. Another monument was erected to him in Westminster Abbey. He was born in Broad Street, London, on December 9. 1608. and his careful education by his literary and musical father was continued at St. Paul's' School, and at Cambridge, at .which he afterwards composed "Comus," considered an exquisite poem, "L'Allegro," "Il Penseroso," "Lycidas," and "Sonnets"; but the one that became by far the most celebrated is "Paradise Lost." for which, however, he could hardly find a publisher, and received for it only five pounds. Compared with the present time money was then so scarce that the price of neessaries was nominally only a third of what it is now. In "Paradise Lost" he refers to the fact that he had become totally blind. But his "Paradise Regained," the brighter and Christian side, has been unfairly depreciated. His favorite place for


