Shall we go back on tradition and the historians of Newfoundland, even though so eminent a personage as His Excellency would damp our enthusiasm by casting doubt on the long accepted fact that Newfoundland, the beginning of the British Empire overseas was discovered by Cabot on the 24th of June, fourteen hundred and ninety-seven.



This action if followed to any considerable extent would affect all the good recently arrived at by the Manufactures Association regarding Home Industries and the labor question and build up a large mail order business with Canada and the United States.—Harbor Grace Standard.

The Moderate Prohibitionists are arranging for a public meeting this week to secure the passing of the Plebiscite Bill now before the Legislature. The Committee intends to fight the proposed amendment to insert a bone-dry clause. The present Bill has but two questions, one asking the elector if he favours the proposals of the Royal Commission; the other those of the Moderate Prohibition Committee. A majority decides which of these proposals shall become law.






