At present your committee are not prepared to recommend any particular locality.

Your committee have been informed that the Engineer of the Great Western Road has expressed his opinion that that Company will move their Station on reasonable terms, and recommend that those terms be at once ascertained.

Aney do not in this report enlarge on matter forward, as they find not only the members of this Council but the public generally duly impressed with its impor-tance.

He had been taking with Mr. Swinyard, and he knew that the Great Western would not run the line into town without a tangible encouragement. The Grand Trunk will not let the Great Western run on their line, but by offering them ground on which to build they might bring the track down.

Mr. McCurry said the Committee could not tell what they would give before they knew what was wanted.

Mr. Melvin believed the report to be very nearly correct. It would be a benefit ot the Companies as well as to the town to have the Great Western station removed. It will not do to have two stations; they would do more harm than good. It is a Union Station that is required. The Council would not be doing justice if they said, we will give you such and such things. Assassination of Mr. McGee.

The assassination case was brought be fore the Police Magistrate of Ottawa on Thursday. The prisoner Whalën was brought in under guard, and placed in the dock on the direct charge of the murder of Mr Motice, laid before the authorities last night. He appeared somewhat worn and fatigued, as if he had passed a sleepless night, but assumed an air of apparent indifference. Mr O'Reilly, Q.C., Recorder of Kingston. appeared on behalf of the Crown. The information was laid by Detective O'Neil, and was to the effect that the prisoner on the 7th day of April, did feloniously and with malice aforethought kill and murder the Hon. Thos. D'Arcy McGee. The prisoner had no counsel.

left, first having felt a lump in each of
the pockets; in the left coat pocket I
found a box of pistol cartridges such as
those nased in Smith & Wesson's revolvers; those are

Six charges in chambers were found when taken, five of them appeared to have been in for some time, from the grease and dust round the edges, and discolouration; the other appeared only recently put in. My attention was then drawn to the revolver itself, one barrel was recordly greased on the inside, and the muzzle then showed indications of burnt powder, as if the revolver had been but recently discharged. I found also that in the front part of the cells, there were indications of grease having been carefully messed on the instruction.

From information received by the Police authorities as to his connection with Fenianism, they attempted to arrest him upon that charge after his release from prison, but he escaped.

BY ATLANTIC CABLE.

London, April 9th—The Fenian trials, which were to have commenced during the holidays, have been postponed to the 29th inst. The holidays commence tomorrow, from which day business will be generally suspended, until the morning of Tuesday next.

London, April 10—The war office is in receipt of later despatches from the British expedition in Africa operating for the relief of the English captives. General Napier, the commander of the British army, had reached latitude, 21. The Abyasinian King, Theodorus, was at Magdala, ready for a siege. His forces consisted of about 5,000 effective men. He had also 26 large guns. Gen. Napier had already completed his plans for a general assault on the works.

American Despatches.

New York, April 10—Among the passengers on the steamship Wm. Penn, arrived this evening from London, is S. J. Meaney, Fenian Head Centre, who was released from servitude by the British Government on condition he returned to the United States. He was placed on the vessel by British officers, and his pardon handed him as the vessel sailed. Chicago, April 11th—A fatal accident occurred last night is St. Mary's Calbedral. An alarm of fire was raised, which created a panic in the church, and a rush was made for the door, during which a portion of the galleries fell. Three females were instantly killed, and soveral others were severely injured, two of them will probably die.

Galveston, Texas, April 10—In a shooting affray in Hempstead, three whites were killed and two wounded.

The New Postal Law-Its Operations.

If we stated that the New Postal Law gave general satisfaction we should be very far from expressing the popular opinion concerning it. The provisions by which letters weighing ot more than half an ounce are trans mitted from one part of the Dominion to another for three cents is pleasing to everybody, but there are some of the other enactment which are considered, and not without reason, nuisanses and grievances. The part of the bill most loudly condemned is that Cir which regulates the postage on drop letters and transient newspapers. By the term drop letters, is to be understood those letters which are put into any particular post office to be taken A direct therefrom by the party to whom they are addressed. By the new law it has become imperative that these should be prepaid by the parties sending them, otherwise the addressee will not be allowed an opportunity of resing them, for they must at once be laid aside for transmission to the Dead Letter Office. It is not easy to imagine a more absurd enactment than this. Heretofore the one cent postage on drop letters was a perquisite of the postmasters when the money was paid, and of course when the mis sives were stamped the Post Office Department was the gainer. The object of the new law no doubt is to secure to the Government all the revenue thus accruing, but we do not imagine that they will be much richer in consequence. People will come in time to understand the fate of their letters if they be not prepaid, and they will prepay those that they drop, but the number of these will be very seriously diminished, and while the public will be incommoded the Department will not be the gainer. Under the old law we believe that there was but a comparatively small proportion of the unpaid drop letters which were not redeemed. But this is only anoth er verification of the old proverb that, "too much cookery spoils the broth.

In reference to the postage on transient newspapers it is as great a bore as that of which we have been speaking. If we recollect properly, at the time the Bill passed it was left to the wisdom and discretion of the Gover of postage should be one cent or two Fire & Burglar Proof Combined cents, that point not having been determined in Parliament. CAUTION TO REEVES AND DEPUTY REEVES .- By one of the amendments to the Municipal Act just adopted by the Legislature of Ontario at its recent session, reeves and deputy reeves of towns and townships, and aldermen of cities, are required, before they can act as magistrates, to qualify as such in the same way as magistrates appointed by the crown, by filing the affidavit of qualification with the Clerk of the Peace. Those interested will do well to attend to this matter, otherwise their judicial acts will be very apt to be set aside; while they will at the same time be liable to the penalty imposed by statute, namely, a fine of one hundred dollars for every offence, one moiety of which goes to Her Majesty, and the other moiety to such persons as will sue for the same, to be recovered, with full costs of suit by civil action or information in any court of competent jurisdiction. This requirement does not apply to mayors of towns and cities.
