

The Postmaster General's Report.

The report of the Postmaster General for the past year, presents some very interesting details, and exhibits very satisfactory statistics respecting the general progress of the whole community.

From the statistics and figures supplied by this report, we are enabled to judge of the manner in which the affairs of the department are administered; and, on the whole, the result is satisfactory.

In the returns of the Money order and Savings Bank department, we find very satisfactory evidence of their constantly increasing usefulness.

Coming nearer home, to Guelph itself, we find that the gross revenues for the office here, during the past year, was \$9,092.91, including interest.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT. Mr. Speaker read a letter from Colonel Gilmour, Clerk of the Assembly of Ontario, accompanying a memorial from the Ontario Legislature, in favor of passing a Prohibitory Liquor Law.

Mr. Young (Waterloo) moved the House into Committee, to consider the resolution relating to the disadvantages under which naturalized Germans suffer, and praying that steps may be taken for redress by the negotiation of a naturalization treaty between Great Britain and the German States.

Mr. Young (Waterloo) moved for a return showing the total amount of revenue derived from postage on newspapers, and advertising, if possible, the amount derived from newspapers sent from the office of publication and those of circulation through the mails.

The House then went into Committee of Supply, and passed a number of items after which the House adjourned.

Finding it impossible to send a message to warn the approaching train of danger, the brave girl seized a red lamp, and ran up the line swinging it above her head. The engineer saw the signal in time to avoid a fearful disaster. The engine ran against the tree, however, with sufficient force to disconnect a large branch, which struck the girl on the shoulder, and inflicted the injuries which resulted in her death. The passengers were so grateful for their escape that an attempt was immediately made to reward her, but she firmly declined to accept anything for having done her duty. Such a record of personal heroism should not be allowed to go unrecorded, and the men and women who were on the train on that August night might have now an opportunity to mark their appreciation of poor Lettice's bravery by causing a handsome monument to be erected to her memory.
